County Attorney Resigns

Recommends Perry Barber For Post

County Attorney Dan L. Barber has resigned his office effective April 1.

Simultaneously, the 30-year-

old lawyer recommended his uncle, Perry Barber, to succeed him as county attorney.

Dan Barber's resignation and recommendation was submitted Monday in a letter to Commissioner's Court. He said he will again join with his father, Dell Barber, in private law practice.

It was a courthouse surprise in view of the fact that the county attorney Jan. 9 had publicly announced his candidacy for election to the county office in the upcoming Democratic Party Primary election. However, Barber had not paid his Democratic Primary filing fee and his name will not be listed on the ballot.

"I would like to take this opportunity to thank you all for your appointment of me as county attorney," Barber wrote. "I have enjoyed our association over the past year and 2 months."

"I regret I must at this time tender my resignation as county attorney effective April 1. I feel that it would be of greater benefit to my personal career, particularly in a financial sense, to re-enter private practice with my father."

"I wish to recommend to you as my replacement the Honorable Perry Barber, attorney at law, a man of long standing in the community with much experience both as a private attorney and as a prosecutor."

Dan Barber was appointed to

the county attorneyship Jan. 1, 1971, to fill the 2 years remaining for the term of Frank Ginzel, who on the same date moved up from county attorney to district attorney.

Prior to his appointment, the young Barber had practiced law with his father, Dell Barber, after receiving his law degree from Baylor University School of Law and qualifying for law practice.

County Judge Bill F. Carter said Barber's resignation would come before Commissioners Court Tuesday at the court's regular meeting.

Whether the court will follow the county attorney's recommendation and appoint Perry Barber to the position remains to be seen. When Dan Barber was appointed 14 months ago,

Attorney Joe Earnest also sought the appointment.

Perry Barber recently returned to Colorado City after serving as assistant district attorney in Abilene and Houston. Prior to that, he had practiced law in Colorado City for a long time and also served as municipal judge.

TOWN TALK

Merchants throughout the nation are screaming about high losses to shoplifters.

If you think this isn't true in Colorado City, think again.

Although shoplifting here is considered below the national average, it is still cause for great concern. There are several stores with retail losses of nearly \$10,000 each annually.

Statistically, 40 per cent of all people will steal if the opportunity arises, 30 per cent will not steal and 30 per cent will steal regardless of what you do in an effort to stop them.

Some Colorado City businessmen are intensifying their efforts to cut down opportunities for people to steal.

Some people consider shoplifting a laughing matter. But there's nothing funny about the \$3 billion loss suffered by American business each year.

And, there's nothing funny about going to jail. That's exactly what happens to shoplifters.

City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr., is currently working on the city budget for the next fiscal year, beginning May 1.

In that budget is a proposal that is sure to arouse a lot of interest.

Sadler is planning to propose to the City Council that the city undertake a pilot project on the use of plastic trash bags.

Now as small as matter as that is, you'd be surprised of how much controversy has ensued during similar programs in other cities.

Under Sadler's proposal, the city would furnish the bags to a certain part of town for a specified time to see if the residents liked it and if it would make the gathering of refuse more efficient.

Also being considered, as it has in other cities, is the proposal to have residents carry the bags to the curb rather than have garbage pick-up in the alley.

This is a matter that has also raised a few eyebrows in other cities.

Filing Is Re-Opened

15 Days More For County Attorney

Resignation of County Attorney Dan Barber re-opens the ballot filing period for possible candidates for that office.

County Democratic Chairman Tom Rees said Wednesday that the new deadline for county attorney candidates will be 15 days from Tuesday, Feb. 29.

The filing extension was revealed by the Democratic Party chairman after a check of state voting statutes.

He interpreted the statutes to provide the additional period from the date that Barber gave notice he was resigning the county attorneyship and would not be a candidate in the Democratic Primary.

This development, which re-opens the filing by candidates, could put an entirely new light on the county attorney's office.

Barber, in his letter of resignation to Commissioners Court, recommended as his replacement his uncle, Perry Barber, who recently moved back to Colorado City after serving on the staff of district attorneys in Abilene and Houston.

Commissioners Court in 1970 appointed Dan Barber to the county office in preference to another attorney, Joe Earnest. And, in recent days, there has been talk by several Earnest supporters to develop a write-in campaign for Earnest in the upcoming primary election.

Now, the additional filing period leaves the way open for either of the two--Perry Barber or Earnest--to obtain a place on the ballot that unexpectedly now

lists no candidate for the county attorney's office.

Rees said his study of the

Texas Election Code indicates a vacated public office cannot be filled by write-in vote.

Plane Crash Investigated

Thompson, Two Others Killed

An investigation by the National Transportation Safety Board is underway to determine cause of the crash of a light plane Saturday evening into Lake Colorado City, killing the three men aboard.

The three victims were:

--Robert Massie Thompson, 49, of 1432 Waco in Colorado City, chief engineer for West Texas Gulf Company.

--Robert Nail, 51, of Odessa, also an employee of West Texas Gulf.

--Bobby Joe Brown, 45, also of Odessa, a contractor, co-owner of the plane and the craft's apparent pilot.

The plane went to the bottom of Lake Colorado City in about 18-feet of water at 6 p.m. Saturday. Seven hours later the plane was extracted from the lake with a tow line

manned by scores of volunteers.

When the plane was brought to shore, Brown was in the pilot's seat, leading investigators to believe he was the pilot.

There is a difference of opinion on circumstances surrounding the crash of the single-engine, four-seat craft.

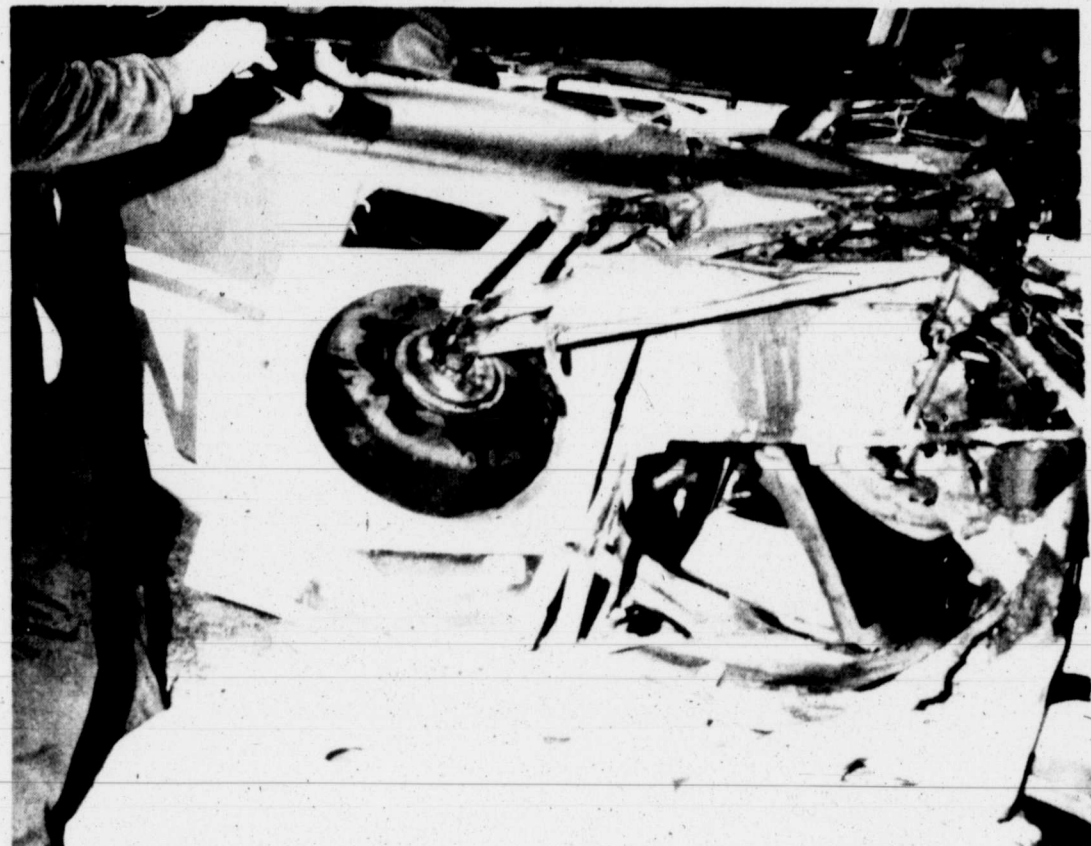
Earlier in the afternoon, several persons had seen the aqua and white plane flying over Lake Champion.

Only seconds before the crash, several fishermen, Paul Winkle and Bert Bradberry, said they were fishing in front of their lakeside cottages when the crash occurred.

They recounted that the plane was flying low over the lake and as the right wing of the plane dipped as the pilot put the craft into a climbing

turn, the wing tip hit the water, tearing off the wing and the remaining part of the aircraft catapulted into the water.

There were other witnesses who said the wing hit a steel tension wire over a power line, ripping off the wing.

From all indications, the

three men were killed instantly when the plane hit the water.

Two divers from Sweetwater, James Ryeron and Gene Lambert, were summoned and attempted to recover the bodies before the plane was pulled. See CRASH Page 6

Red Cross Drive Seeks \$3,200

The Mitchell County Chapter of the American Red Cross will kick-off its annual fund drive March 6, Mrs. Dick (Gwen) Wistrand, chapter chairman, has announced.

Drive of the goal which last year raised \$2,100, this year is \$3,200, Mrs. Wistrand said.

Glen Coon of Loraine is general chairman of the drive. Co-chairmen are Mrs. Rex McKenney of Westbrook and Henry Bilberry, of Colorado City.

Of the total raised, 40 per cent is sent to the national organization for disasters, blood program, international relations and service to members of the armed forces and their relatives.

The remaining 60 per cent goes for services rendered by the county organization.

Mitchell County has received aid from the national fund three times, once in the early 1920's after a tornado, in 1939 following a flood and in 1962 after a tornado hit Loraine.

Mrs. Wistrand said the fund raising campaign will be conducted through the mail and on a person-to-person basis. She noted that fund raisers will endeavor not to duplicate efforts.

The Red Cross Chapter in Mitchell County has been extremely active.

During the period from June

30 to Jan. 1, the local chapter has served 165 cases covering servicemen, veterans, and civilians and made 79 phone calls concerning emergency leaves, death, illness, family problems, extension of leave, grants and loans.

There are now 179 Mitchell County men in the service with 12 serving in Vietnam. Families having relatives in the armed forces have been asked to contact the Red Cross here by phoning 728-5012 or 728-3180 so that files might be kept up to date.

Mrs. L. A. Strain, chairman of volunteer service, sent 30 gift bags to Vietnam for Christmas. She was assisted by Sunday School Classes and other organizations.

One activity planned by the Red Cross is a 10-hour First Aid Course to be offered in March. Anyone interested should call 728-5012 or 728-2478 and let the Red Cross know which evening you would prefer for attending classes or if Saturday would be a better day.

In addition to Mrs. Wistrand, other Red Cross officers are Glen Coon, vice chairman; Bob Reilly, treasurer; and Mrs. Boyd Dozier, secretary.

Wolves Win 2 In Relays

Colorado High ran to first places in the 880 and mile Saturday in their won Lone Wolf Relays.

But the championship went to Vernon High, a perennial North Texas AAA track power.

The strong arm of Lawrence Gaini and the fleet hurdling of Jerry Kieschnick led Vernon in its successful title quest.

In the final count, the Lions claimed 118 points -- 31 more than second place Stamford's 87. Colorado City with 52 points was sixth in the field of 7 schools trailing behind Lamesa, Lake View and Coahoma but beating Stanton.

Gaini won the discus with a toss of 144 feet 4 inches, then repeated in the shot put with a first-place heave of 50 feet 8 inches.

Wrapping up the victory for Vernon, a school which has won 11 district titles in recent years along with 3 regional meets, was Kieschnick with firsts in the 120-yard high hurdles (16.4 seconds) and 390-yard intermediate hurdles (43.5 seconds).

Only one new record was established in the meet which started with chilly morning prelims, then warmed up during afternoon finals.

Jerry Lambright of Lamesa set the new mark when he cleared 12 feet 2 inches in the pole vault, breaking the relays' previous record of 12 feet even established by Burney of Snyder in 1969.

Coach Dell Riley's Wolves were impressive in the 800 and mile. Roy Garcia won the half mile with 2:07.9, finishing just See TRACK Page 7

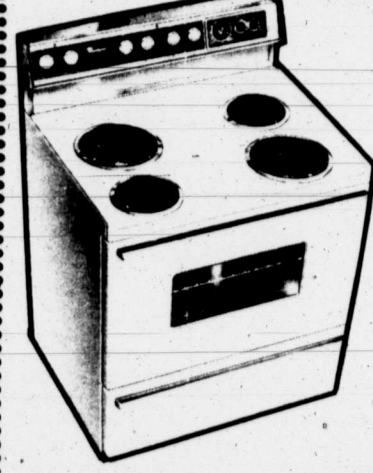

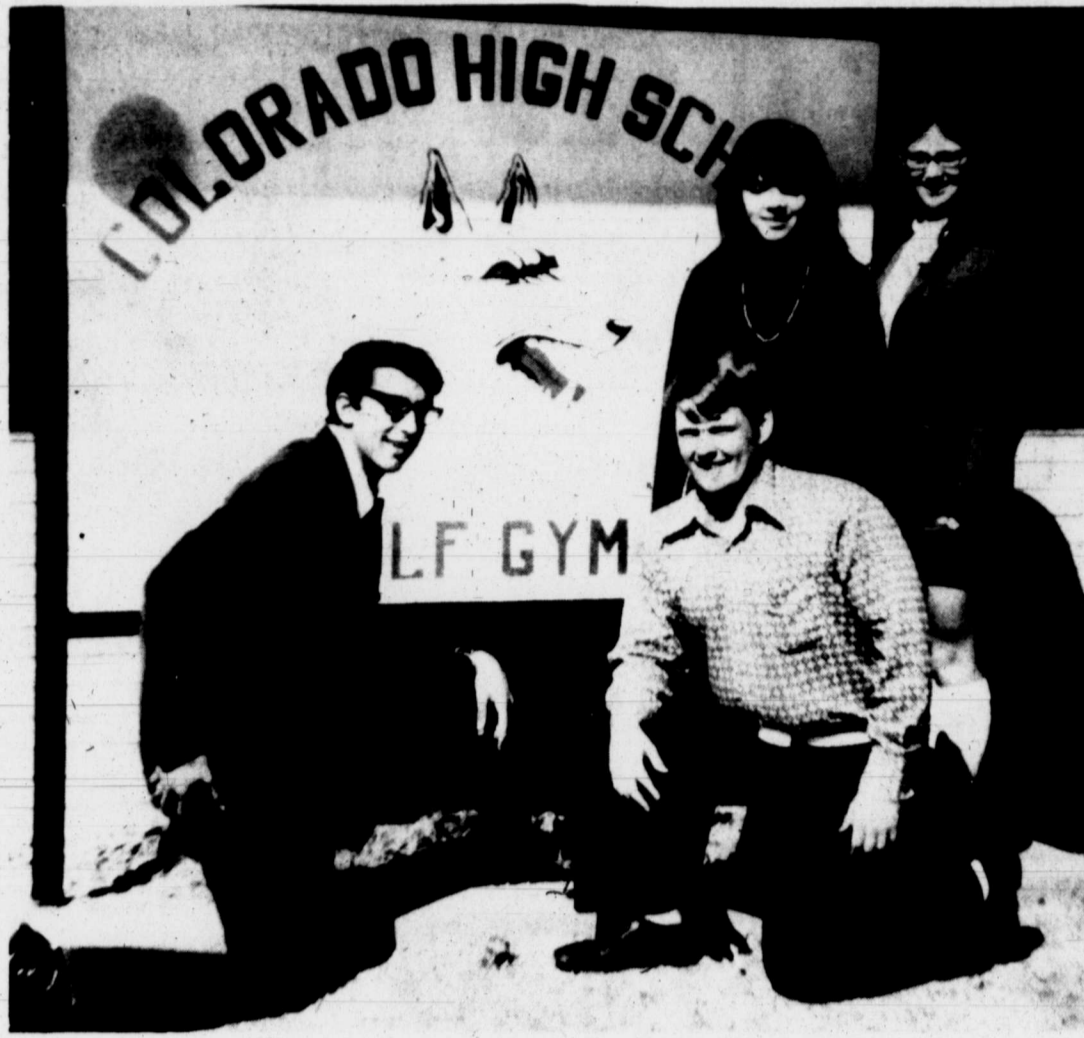

Funeral Rites For Ex-Mayor

Funeral service for Glenn R. (Bob) Robinson, former Colorado City mayor, civic and industrial leader, was conducted Monday afternoon in Big Spring's First Presbyterian Church.

The 52-year-old head of Robinson Drilling Company succumbed shortly after midnight Sunday in Big Spring's Hogan-Malone Hospital with injuries received in a one-car highway accident Tuesday.

Conducting the funeral service was Rev. R. Earl Price, minister of the church, assisted by Rev. R. Gage Lloyd, pastor emeritus.

Robinson, who founded Robinson Drilling Company with his father here in Colorado City early 1947, was instrumental in a major portion of the development of oil fields within Mitchell, Howard, Scurry counties and a wide radius of this West Texas area.

This company was headquartered here in Colorado City until moving to Big Spring in 1966. At the time of its move, it had the third largest industrial payroll within Mitchell County.

He was mayor of Colorado City from 1960 to 1962, a period when major street paving and sewer programs were financed and the city's airport dedicated.

In addition, he was one of the organizers of Colorado City Industrial Team Inc., a leader in Chamber of Commerce projects and a spearhead here for Republican Party campaigns.

After his move to Big Spring, Robinson continued his ownership and development of his Wild Horse Creek Ranch south of Westbrook and only recently

ly had purchased stock show cattle for ranch stock.

He was an elder in Big Spring's First Presbyterian Church after formerly serving as a member of the official church board here.

A native of Miami, Okla., Robinson was a petroleum engineering graduate of University of Oklahoma. During World War 2, he was awarded the Bronze Star medal as a combat officer with 95th Infantry Division.

He and the former Myra Brown of Colorado City were married here April 5, 1942.

Survivors include his wife, a son, Dr. Mike Robinson, who is doing exploration in Libya, Africa; two daughters, Mrs. Ronny Crowmover of College Station and Miss Anne Robinson, student at Southern Methodist University; his mother, Mrs. Glenn O. Robinson, and his brother, Dr. Jack Robinson, both of Miami, Okla.

Pallbearers were Robert B. Aycock, Robert F. Fee Jr. and Bennie Black, Colorado City; Chester Miller and Ray Alexander, Big Spring; J. A. Prescott and H. L. Warneke, Snyder. Honorary pallbearers were members of the First Presbyterian churches of Colorado City and Big Spring.

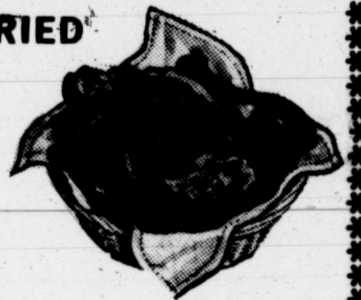
