LANHAM FLAYS REPUBLICANS FOR NEGLECTING HEROES

Washington, Jan. 18.—The Republican party was arraigned for its eagerness to pay an indemnity to the relatives of a negro rapist in the passing of the Dyer anti-lynching bill, while the Republican administration is derelict in taking care of the widows of war heroes, by Congressman Fritz Lanham, of Fort Worth, today. Lanham called attention to the constant delay in paying insurance premiums to widows of World War heroes.

"The Republican majority has now spent nearly three weeks in passing this anti-lynching bill, the purpose of which is to coerce the Southern States and to vouchsafe to the Republican party the negro votes," he said. "The outstanding feature of the bill is that it compels the country to pay to the widow or next of kin of a negro rapist \$10,000. What is the administration doing to redeem its promise to pay bonuses to soldiers all over the country. Relatives of deceased soldiers are suffering because of nonpayment by Government of its obligations, but the Republican majority is too busy with this lynching bill to hear their voice."

WRITTEN CONFESSION IN BURGLARY CASE

A man giving his name as Phillip Lawrence, has made a written confession of the burglarizing of the Junction Grocery Co. store, as mentioned in last week's paper.

Tuesday of this week, Sheriff Slaughter and Deputy Eldridge of Menard brought over a Mexican that was arrested Monday a week ago in Menard, suspected as being an accomplice in burglarizing the Wal Mains store at that place. The man held here admits being an accomplice in the burglary there, and states that a Mexican who went by the name of Jose went into the store with him. When the Mexican was taken to the jail Lawrence stated that he was the Mexican, but later in a written statement, he would not make the statement as positive. The Mexican claims his name is Manuel Gabella, and that he came to Menard from Houston, looking for work. He had a letter addressed to that name. His left hand is cut off about two inches below the wrist joint. He appears to be about twenty-five years old, and speaks English well.

This room is connected by electric call bells, with the front of the bank, the cashier's desk, the stenographer's desk and Mr. Denman's desk, making a very convenient and effective arrangement.

Mr. Patterson now has the jewelry store in the front, and with a few minor additions and changes will have everything well arranged to accommodate his jewelry and watchmaking business. He expects to utilize the large plate glass window for a display window as soon as he can get the material and can have the work done.

Old Trail Driver Crossed Nation 16 Times Driving Cattle To Markets, Dead

Milam M. Fitzgerald, 78 years of age, born in the Republic of Texas the year before the country joined the Union, died at his home, 539 Delmar Street, at 9:20 o'clock last night. He had lived in San Antonio for 21 years.

Mr. Fitzgerald was one of the old trail drivers and crossed the Western States 16 times while driving over the old trail route to the Pacific Coast.

Surviving he leaves a widow, Mrs. Augustus Fitzgerald; two sons, S. M. Fitzgerald of Houston and David L. Fitzgerald of Cleveland, Ohio; two daughters, Mrs. M. J. Irish of Los Angeles, Cal., and Mrs. C. E. McMane of San Antonio.

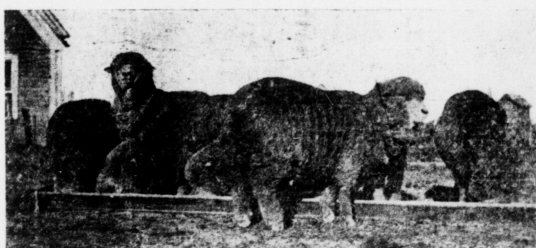
If he had lived until today he would have been 78 years of age, having died on the night before his birthday.—San Antonio Express.

LEGISLATORS DON'T TRUST STATE BOARDS DR. VINSON ASSERTS

Austin, Jan. 18.—"Absolutely no confidence is reposed in the governing board of any State institution by the Legislature of the State," Dr. Robert E. Vinson, president of the University of Texas, declared before the executive board of the Federated Clubs of Texas, which yesterday began a two-day session here.

"Rascality of the officials is presupposed, and we are so hampered by petty restrictions as to make progress very uncertain and almost impossible," Dr. Vinson continued.

"Never before in my opinion has the educational system of Texas been in such jeopardy. The educational institutions of the State must be made independent of the Governor, the Legislature, the Supreme Court. There is but one way of attaining this goal, and that is by constitutional amendment."

EVIDENCE OF STILL FOUND IN PASTURE

Upon information furnished to Deputy Sheriff Ben Joiner, he, with several others, searched an old goat shed in the Russell pasture, on Bear Creek, on Wednesday of this week and found where a quantity of maul had been cooked, but the apparatus used had been moved away. They followed some wagon tracks from this place into Joe Bishop's place, then back into a draw in the Russell pasture, where they found a barrel with a quantity of maul in it. They found a fire burning at this place, where the maul had doubtless been cooked.

FEDERAL DISTRICT ROAD ENGINEER HERE

Division Engineer E. P. Sexton, for the U. S. Department of Agriculture, with headquarters at Fort Worth, was here this week to make a final inspection of the recently completed highway in this county, and to get up a preliminary working sketch of the proposed highway extension up the North Llano from the six mile crossing to Roosevelt. He was also making a report to the Department of all the public roads in this county. Divisions A and B of Federal Project number 133A, which is the two sections on the Old Spanish Trail, recently completed, have been conditionally accepted by the Federal Government, and have also been previously accepted by the State Highway Department after having been inspected by Highway Engineer Merle. With the erection of only a small amount of work yet to be done, the road is ready to be accepted by the county, when the contract have fulfilled that part of the contract requiring them to keep the road in repair thirty days after the Federal and State Departments have accepted it. To date this county has received approximately \$100,000 State and Federal aid for highway construction.

The construction work on the road from the six mile crossing on the North Llano to Roosevelt will probably begin about March 1st, as that is about the earliest date that arrangements can be made for commencing this work.

With the completion of this division or section along the Old Spanish Trail, and that being done now in Kerr County, beginning at the Kimble county line, Kimble county will have one of the best highways in the state, extending the entire length of the county.

Other roads leading into this highway are in better than average condition, as compared with roads in other sections of the state. Yet after the construction of the highway and roads in the county, we still have a comparatively small indebtedness.

With the completion of the present building program in Kerr county, we will have a direct connection with San Antonio, and one day freight and passenger service from that city will be of inestimable value to this part of the state.

We note from the San Angelo Standard that Sutton county is soon to build a gravelled road from Sonora to the Sutton county line. This will connect with the Schleicher county road coming down from San Angelo, and with the exception of the road from the line of Kimble county to Sonora, we will have a direct highway connection with the San Angelo country. That will be another great advantage to this county, and travel from San Antonio to Northwest Texas will pass this way. We miss our guess if there are not more tourists in the section next summer than there has ever been, and with facilities, which will be put along the route, the highway will come into its own. We have everything that tourists are seeking tourist destinations. There is no earthly reason why people going to Colorado for the summer when they can find here in this section everything—and more, too—that can be found in far away places. Let's get ready for them, boys, for they are sure coming.

30 NEW LEGION POSTS FORMED IN 30 DAYS.

Austin, Jan. 7.—Thirty new posts of the American Legion have been organized in Texas during the past ninety days, and a number are in process of organization, declared Major Wayne Davis of Goliad, State commander of the American Legion, who spent the day here in conference with Adjutant General Thomas D. Barton.

Major Davis said there were now 342 American Legion posts in the State of Texas and they were in a flourishing condition adding new members daily. The State commander reiterated the opposition to the plan to reduce the compensation of medical officers in charge of hospitals throughout the country who are attending to disabled soldiers.

"I am glad to say that the plan has been abandoned," said Commander Davis. "Had it prevailed it would have resulted in many of the efficient medical officers now on duty in these hospitals resigning their posts."

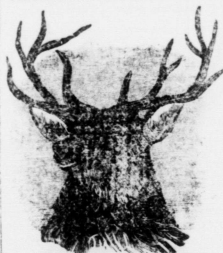

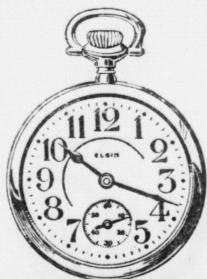

D. McPherrin of Imperial, California, and H. J. Lewis of San Diego, California, are trustees and active managers, upon each of whom service may be had at the above named places hereinafter styled defendant; and for cause of action plaintiff respectfully represents to the court:

That heretofore, to-wit, on or about the first day of June, A. D. 1920, plaintiff entered into a contract of employment with defendant, in which said contract plaintiff agreed to render certain services to defendant and for which services defendant herein promised to pay to plaintiff the sum of \$500.00 per month for the time that plaintiff remained in the employ of defendant; that said contract of employment was to cover a period of one year from June 1st, 1920; that plaintiff remained in the services of defendant during this time and at all times performed all duties and obligations involving upon him by virtue of said contract of employment hereinabove mentioned, but that defendant wholly failed to comply with its contract in every particular and has failed to pay plaintiff the money due him by virtue of said contract of employment or any part thereof.

That thereafter, to-wit, on the 14th day of December, A. D. 1920, defendant company made, executed and delivered to this plaintiff, through its trustees and managers aforesaid, a certain power of attorney, which is hereto attached and marked exhibit "A," to which said power of attorney reference is here made for the purpose of establishing the stipulations and agreements therein contained, the powers and rights thereby granted to be in force for a period of six months from date thereof.

That thereafter, to-wit, on the 27th day of May, A. D. 1921, defendant company made, executed and delivered to this plaintiff, through its trustees and managers aforesaid, a second power of attorney, which said second power of attorney is hereto attached and marked

exhibit "B," to which said second power of attorney reference is here made for the purpose of establishing the stipulations and agreements contained therein, and that the powers and rights thereby granted were to remain in force for a period of two months from date thereof.

That under and by virtue of said powers of attorney hereinabove set out, plaintiff was duly authorized and empowered in behalf of defendant "to ask, demand, sue for, recover, collect and receive all sums of money and payments whatsoever as now or shall hereafter become due, owing or payable to said Syndicate, and to have, use and take all lawful ways and means in the name of said Syndicate or otherwise, for the recovery thereof; to close, terminate and wind up all of the business of the said Syndicate in the State of Texas; to sell any and all property, both real and personal belonging to said Syndicate in the State of Texas; to pay or compromise all debts or claims now held by any person in the State of Texas, save and except lease holder agreements, or by the State of Texas against said Syndicate." That in the discharge of the duties and powers hereinabove set forth, plaintiff paid off laborers of defendant, paid freight for defendant and paid the State and county taxes for Kimble County, Texas, on the property belonging to defendant situated

in Kimble County Texas, out of plaintiff's individual funds; that all moneys spent by plaintiff in behalf of defendant are fully set forth in an itemized statement hereto attached and marked exhibit "C," to which said statement reference is here made for the purpose of establishing the amounts so spent by this plaintiff in behalf of this defendant.

That plaintiff's employment continued with defendant up to and including the 27th day of July, A. 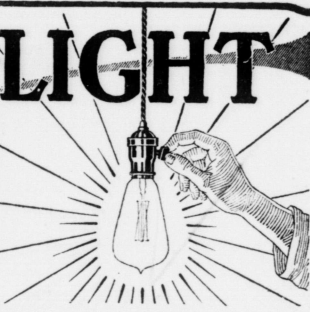

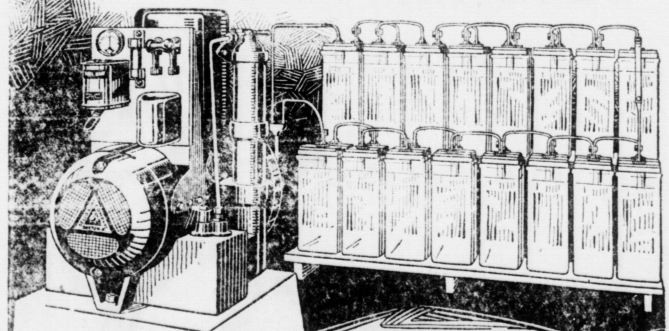
