Post Office To Close Half Day On Wednesdays

Because of the 40-hour work week for all Postal Clerks and City Carriers which went into effect October 11, 1935, it is necessary that the local postoffice close one half day each week. Since so many people come to town to do their trading on Saturdays, it is thought that less inconvenience will be felt by closing at noon Wednesday's and until further notice the Lamesa office will close Wednesday noon, each week.

While the 44 hour week was in effect during the past several years, the Lamesa office has remained open the full six days per week, though most second class and practically all first class offices have closed at least a half day a week. The limited amount of auxiliary clerk-carrier hire granted does not permit us to continue to remain open full time.

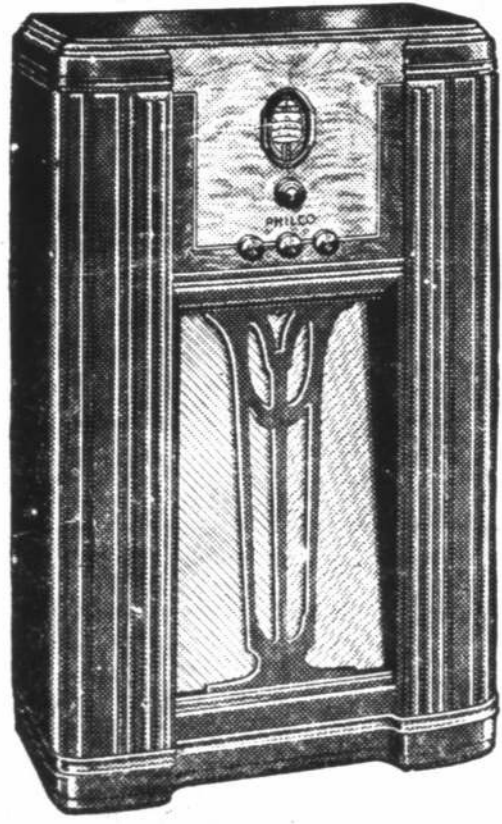

DAWSON COUNTY HAS FIRST FREEZE

Old Man Winter put in his first real appearance of the season on the South Plains Sunday night, November 10. Freezing weather was reported from all parts of the county resulting in the killing of vegetation. Damage to crops here are not thought to be serious according to reports. Of course some cotton will be lost due to the cold weather but the feed crop over the county was practically assured. The past few days have been ideal for cotton harvesting and the fleecy staple is moving into town at a rapid rate. Gins are running steadily throughout the day and in some instances at night.

Less than a third of the Dawson county crop has been harvested and fair weather is much to be desired in these parts.

Tornadoes Meet Post In Conference Game

The Lamesa High School Golden Tornadoes play their final conference game of this year Friday afternoon when they travel to Post to play the Post Antelopes.

The Post team, although it has lost most of its games this season, is expected to give the Tornadoes considerable trouble.

The Tornadoes will be seriously handicapped by the loss of several first string men who were injured in the Slaton game Monday. It is thought however, that the reserves will be able to fill up these holes quite capably and a Tornado victory is predicted.

Duck Season Opens Nov. 20 Closes Dec. 19

Duck season opens in Texas on Nov. 20 and closes on December 19. Previous announcements stated the open season on ducks opened in Texas on October 26. The State permitted open season on that date, but Federal regulations reset the date to November 20.

Shooting hours are from seven o'clock a. m. to 4 o'clock p. m. Bag limit is 10 daily per hunter. Hunting is allowed only on Friday, Saturday and Sunday of each week. Each repeating, autoloading or automatic gun must have a plug in the magazine so that the gun will contain only three shells.

All hunters must have a hunting license if hunting out of the county. License may be secured at all hardware stores, Cason's Cafe, Morris-Cleveland Drug and at the County Clerk's Office. All hunters must secure Federal Duck Stamps at the post office regardless of where they hunt. The price of this stamp is \$1.00. The use of live decoys is forbidden, also all rifles are forbidden by Federal regulations.

SLATON DEFEATS LAMESA 21 TO 0

The king is dead! A powerful and hard fighting club from Slaton that would not be stopped almost unbelievably ended a brilliant grid victory series for Lamesa here Monday afternoon when it slammed the perennial kings of West Texas class B football in a rousing 21 to 0 reversal.

Lamesa's Tornadoes had won 32 football games in a row, some of them from Class A teams. Two more victories and they'd have established a new all-time record in Texas, the present record being 33 straight. While winning those games the Lamesa team had won two regional championships which means as many district and bi-district titles.

Doped to win handily, although Slaton has improved greatly since early season the Tornadoes just couldn't get going. They were outdone in all departments; taking a licking such as only a high-riding team does when it finally goes down.

Using deceptive spinner and reverse plays the Tigers scored in the first period and from then on had the game

GIVE THE BOYS A BOOST

Although the Tornadoes were overwhelmingly defeated by Slaton in the Armistice Day clash all is not lost. It is the opinion of the Courier that Lamesa's football team has made an imposing record the past three years, one that any school might be proud of. Observation has taught us that reverses are suffered in all lines of endeavor and evidently football is no exception to the rule. We still think that the Tornado team is composed of a mighty fine bunch of boys and coached by one of the best coaches in Texas, F. T. McCollum. The Slaton Tigers played an inspired game and are deserving of the highest praise for the good showing made. No doubt the Lamesa team and coaching staff have been the subject of considerable criticism in the past few days, but it must be remembered that each game played usually produces a loser. So why not be a good loser and give the boys a boost.

Well under control. They scored again in the third quarter on a touchdown and field goal and added the final six points in the fourth quarter when a Slaton player intercepted a Lamesa pass and ran 45 yards to score.

Eugene Boswell, star Lamesa player, was badly hurt on his first attempt to carry the ball, and although he remained in the game, a useless right arm kept him from playing his usual stellar game. McKinnon, ace broken-field runner of the Tornadoes was injured in the second quarter, suffering a broken nose, and although he too returned to the game in the second half, the Tornadoes were stopped cold.

By virtue of this victory the Slaton team went to the head of the southern division of District 5. Unbeaten thru three previous games, although tied by Brownfield, the Tigers were trailing Lamesa only because of the tie. Lamesa with one-sided victories over Brownfield and Tahoka, dropped from the championship picture with still a game to be played with Post.

Outstanding for the Slaton team were Garland, halfback, W. Henry, fullback, and L. Henry, quarterback, and their entire line, which played hard football all afternoon. For Lamesa the entire team fought hard and played themselves out, to no avail.

A crowd estimated at 3,000 people turned out for this game, with a large number of them being from Slaton. O'Donnell, Brownfield, Tahoka, and other nearby cities were also well represented. Slaton's special train alone brought over 500 fans.

Preparations were started Wednesday morning of this week for the paving of Bryan Street from the city limits on the north to the end of the city limits on the south. Work of crushing the rock for the base was underway Wednesday and immediate work on the street will start next week.

A forty-foot paving, of asphalt materials on impacted caliche base, will be placed on the entire street, with curb and gutter. A new forty foot bridge will also be placed across the draw.

The paving of this street was made possible by the securing of a W. P. A. loan, the work to be done with labor from the relief rolls. Mr. U. D. Alexander, W. P. A. project man is stationed in Lamesa to over see this work.

Work of hardsurfacing Houston Street from the southern city limits to North Fourth Street and the street leading south from the southwest corner of the square to the Lamesa Sanitarium will also be started in the near future.

PWA Projects Approved for County

Through the governmental agency known as WPA (Work Progress Administration) Dawson county has a works program that bids fair to equal that of any South Plains county and to be of immense benefits to local citizens through the utility of the works to be performed and in employment.

The local projects were explained in detail by Mr. Garfa, consulting and directing engineer for both city and county at the Luncheon Club meeting on Tuesday. Mr. Garfa stated that projects approved and for which money is available include paving of Bryan Street across town from north to south and paving the Stanton road from the south city limits of Lamesa to the Martin county line, each paving project to be of asphalt materials on impacted caliche base. The Bryan street improvement will include curb and gutter, a new bridge across the draw and will be forty feet in width. Houston street is to be hardsurfaced from the southern city limits to North Fourth street and the street leading south from the south west corner of the square is to be paved to the Lamesa Sanitarium.

The Stanton road project will be of standard paving with short corners and curves eliminated and is expected to be built on such specifications that it will be a permanent road to serve the southwest portion of this county.

Property owners will participate in the street paving projects on a front footage basis with the City bearing the frontage cost on crossings and intersections, the costs being nominal when compared to the costs of permanent paving on a total cost basis.

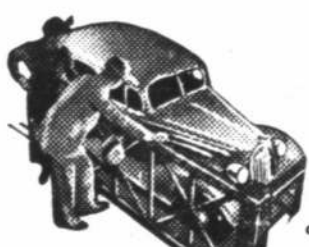

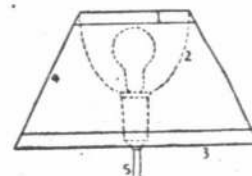

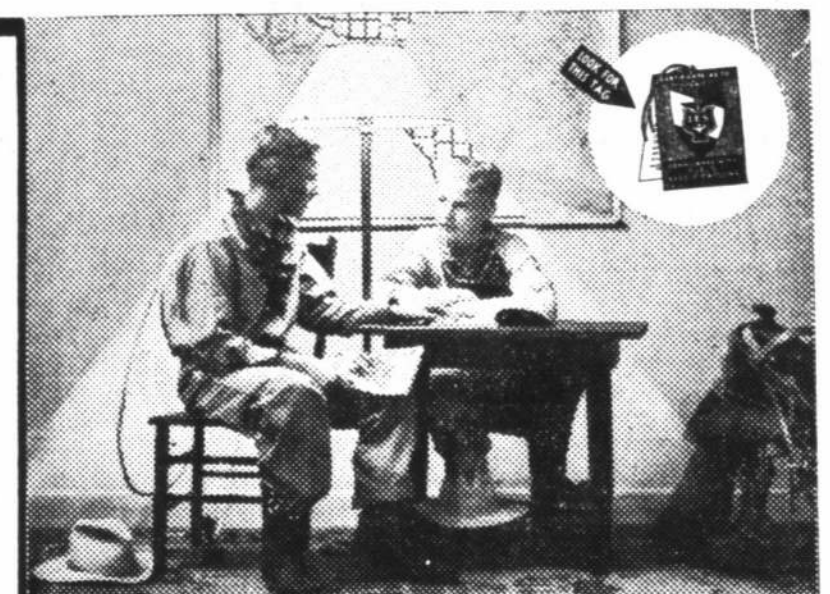

To All Corn-Hog Contract Signers

The supervisors will check up on hogs on all corn and hog contracts some time in December. Each contract signer should be ready to give him information on all hogs farrowed or handled during the year beginning December 1, 1934 ending December 1, 1935.

Hogs will have to be checked on every contract regardless of whether a signer has a hog contract or not.

Any hogs a 1935 corn-hog contract signer may have produced in 1935 in excess of the production permitted under the terms of the contract to which he is a party must be disposed of on or before November 30, 1935, in accordance with the directions of the Secretary of Agriculture, of the corn-hog contract to which such producer is a party is to be considered as having been complied with in full.

The Secretary of Agriculture has directed that a contract signer may dispose of excess pigs by giving them to one of the following organizations: (1) Federal Emergency Relief Administration, (2) County Poor Farm, (3) Red Cross, or (4) Salvation Army. The Secretary has not authorized contract signers to dispose of excess pigs on the farm. When the field supervisor visits the farm soon after November 30 to make the final check of compliance, any excess pigs disposed of on the farm after receipt of this notice that were suitable for human consumption or further feeding will be included in such producer's 1935 production, regardless of the disposition that may have been made of the carcasses.

When the final check of compliance is made, hog production will be checked as of November 30, and any pigs produced from 1935 litters owned by the contract signer when farrowed will be counted in the contract signers production for 1935 and the compliance certificate completed on that basis. If there are excess pigs on hand December 1, 1935, the contract pertaining thereto must not be certified as having been complied with in full, regardless of the disposition that may be made of such excess pigs after the termination of the contract year on November 30. In order to avoid non-compliance it is necessary, therefore, that the contract signer make an accurate count of his hogs and dispose of any excess hogs in an authorized manner by November 30.

ON TEXAS FARMS

In Randall county, 22,235 quarts of canned foods valued at \$4,730.40 have been added to the pantries of 120 home demonstration club women during the last canning season. \$2,072.69 worth of dried or cured products, cheese and lard have been added.

Mrs. W. T. Spires, a Kleberg county home demonstration club member finds that asparagus is a practical vegetable to grow in the South Texas home garden. It produces with little attention, and is a valuable green vegetable at seasons when there is not much else in the garden. Mrs. Spires plants came from seed and are now four years old; she cuts sprouts in the fall after rains as well as in the spring.

Following the trench silo demonstration arranged and given by A. R. Bateman and E. R. Eudaly, there is an unusual interest among the farmers of Parmer county. Ten silos have been dug and filled. That many more are now under construction.

One hundred and forty-three rural yards have been sodded to Bermuda grass in Hill county this year as a result of the Extension landscaping program.

A production of 60 bushels of corn per acre and 200 bushels of potatoes per acre is the result of crop rotation in which cowpeas and alfalfa have played an important part on the farm of L. G. Gossett, who lives in the Burr community in Wharton county. In discussing his farm operations with the county agricultural agent, Mr. Gossett stated that he had never raised any cotton and that he had not known there was a depression on.

PECANS MAY SPREAD COMMUNICABLE DISEASES

Austin, Nov. 12.—Pecans, the favorite nut of thousands of people, may be the source for the spread of disease, according to E. C. Koerth, Director, Bureau of Food and Drugs. The pecan itself is not to blame, but the manner in which it is shelled and later handled is the cause for this warning.

The shelled pecan industry has assumed large proportions in the last few years and the shellers in other states have attacked the Texas product on the ground that the shelled nuts are not handled in a sanitary manner. The large packing houses that have the nuts shelled in their own packing

plants maintain a satisfactory standard of sanitation. The evil of the shelled pecan industry is where pecans are taken into individual homes where no supervision is possible.

Many Mexicans, Negroes, and a few whites do this work at home, with at times the neighbors coming in to help them out. It is possible for the communicable diseases to spread by shelled pecans, and for that reason it will be to the public's advantage to ask where the pecans were shelled and under what conditions. The food inspectors of the State Department of Health have investigated the home shelling of pecans for hire and report that many homes where this work is done are most unsanitary.
