Elections show low voter turnout

Low-key election campaigns and a lack of contested races apparently kept voters away from the polls Saturday in Mitchell County.

Voters decided on a number of city, school and hospital district races, but there were only two contested races in the county - the Colorado Independent School District board of trustees and the Loraine Independent School District board of trustees.

The election results include:

Colorado ISD
Incumbent Ronnie Aston lost his bid for re-election to the Colorado Independent School district board of trustees Saturday with 176 votes compared to Dwayne Harris with 194, Brenda Aguilon with 194 and Floyd Lee Ritchey with 204. Harris and Ritchey are also incumbents.

They along with Mrs. Aguilon were elected to three-year terms.

Eddie Gregory was elected to a one-year unexpired term with 156 votes. He beat David H. Lelek who had 53 votes and John C. Taylor with 42.

A total of 263 votes were cast in the election.

Loraine ISD
Robert Dale Finley, with 91

votes, and Frank Garcia, with 85, were elected to three-year terms on the Loraine Independent School District board of trustees. They won over Richard Cooper who had 56 votes. Finley and Garcia are both incumbents.

There were 123 votes cast.

City of Colorado City
Tom Lovell, Robert Hoback and Phil Anderson were elected

to the Colorado City Council Saturday with Lovell receiving 104 votes, Hoback, 122, and Anderson 113. Lovell and Hoback are incumbents. Anderson was elected to the spot currently held by Jesse Munoz who chose not to seek re-election.

A total of 129 votes were cast.

Loraine council OKs agreement

The Loraine City Council, meeting in regular session Thursday night, agreed to an informal agreement with Frank Garcia to pump water out of the city's three holding tanks at the water treatment plant.

Garcia, who farms in the area adjacent to the plant, uses the water to irrigate his fields. Councilman Cesarino Martinez said he had talked with Garcia about continuing to use the water. Garcia said he would, but asked that the city provide a tank of butane for the times he doesn't need the water but will continue nonetheless to pump water out of the holding tanks.

Mayor Roy Price explained that by allowing Garcia to pump the water, it benefits both the city and Garcia. Otherwise, the city would have to go through the necessary steps with the Department of Health to pump the water into a creek when the holding tanks become full.

Garcia has pumped the water out of the holding tanks for several years, Price said. Last year, the city furnished him a tank of butane to keep the pump running at times Garcia didn't need the water.

In other business, the council unanimously agreed to raise Joe White's salary from \$800 to \$1,000 a month. White is acting water and sewer superintendent while Lynn Morris is hospitalized.

The council agreed to study the possibility of keeping the city landfill open an additional day each week. Presently, the landfill is open only on Saturdays.

Council members also agreed to pay the election judge for Saturday's election \$25 and the two assistants \$22 each, the same amount as paid last year. The council will meet Tuesday, April 8 at 6:30 p.m. to canvass the votes from Saturday's election.

Commodity distribution set

Commodities of butter, cheese and flour will be distributed Wednesday at the Ag Barn, in Loraine and in Westbrook and Thursday at the Wallace Center.

Wednesday's schedule at the Ag Barn is 1-2:30 p.m. for senior citizens, 2:30-4 p.m. for

those under 60 and from 4:30-6 p.m. for new applications. Commodities will be distributed in Loraine from 1-3 p.m. and in Westbrook from 1-5 p.m.

On Thursday at the Wallace Center, commodities will be distributed from 9-11:30 a.m.

'On Golden Pond' proves to be a hit for Playhouse

"On Golden Pond", currently playing at the Colorado City Opera House, is a fitting production with which to begin the new season for the Playhouse.

An excellent story, combined with superb acting and skillful direction, can only bring continued success to the local theater group.

The play, directed by Walter Hearin and starring Tandy Curlee, Marie Jackson, Kent Womack, Elaine Kelly, Ruben Hurt and Tom Kelly, keeps the audience laughing through both acts.

The play tells the story of an elderly couple, Norman and Ethel Thayer, played by Curlee

Curlee, through a combination of good acting and makeup, makes a very convincing 80 year old. The cantankerous retired college professor seems to have everyone fooled but his wife of many years who at one point during the play admonishes her husband with a line that goes something like "You're such a nice man - it's a shame nobody knows it but me".

Jail escapee arrested

A prisoner in the Mitchell County Jail who walked away from the facility this past Sunday was apprehended in Midland Wednesday and returned to the local jail Thursday.

Sheriff's department Chief Deputy Edward Tersero said that Mike Yarbrough, 32, was

arrested by the criminal investigation team of the Midland Police Department after an anonymous tip was received. Tersero said Yarbrough, originally from Midland, was staying at the home of the friend and tried to run from officers when they went to arrest him. Yarbrough, who was in jail

on charges of unauthorized use of a motor vehicle and forgery, now faces an additional charge of escape from a penal institution, said Tersero.

Yarbrough walked away from the jail Sunday night about 9 o'clock after using the telephone.

Man dies in ultra-light crash

A 24-year-old Loraine man was killed Wednesday when the ultra-light helicopter he was piloting flipped and plummeted 100 feet to the ground.

Ricky Glenn Hallmark, a student at Southwest Texas University in San Marcos where the accident happened, was pronounced dead an hour after the crash at a San Marcos hospital. Funeral services for Hallmark were Saturday at 2 p.m. at the First United Methodist Church in Loraine with the Rev.

Rita Richards and the Rev. Rick Aldre officiating. Burial was in the Loraine Cemetery under the direction of Kiker-Seale Funeral Home.

He was born in Loraine and a 1979 graduate of Loraine High School. He was on the dean's list at Southwest Texas University and was a member of the Methodist Church.

Hallmark belonged to a sky diving club that consisted of five

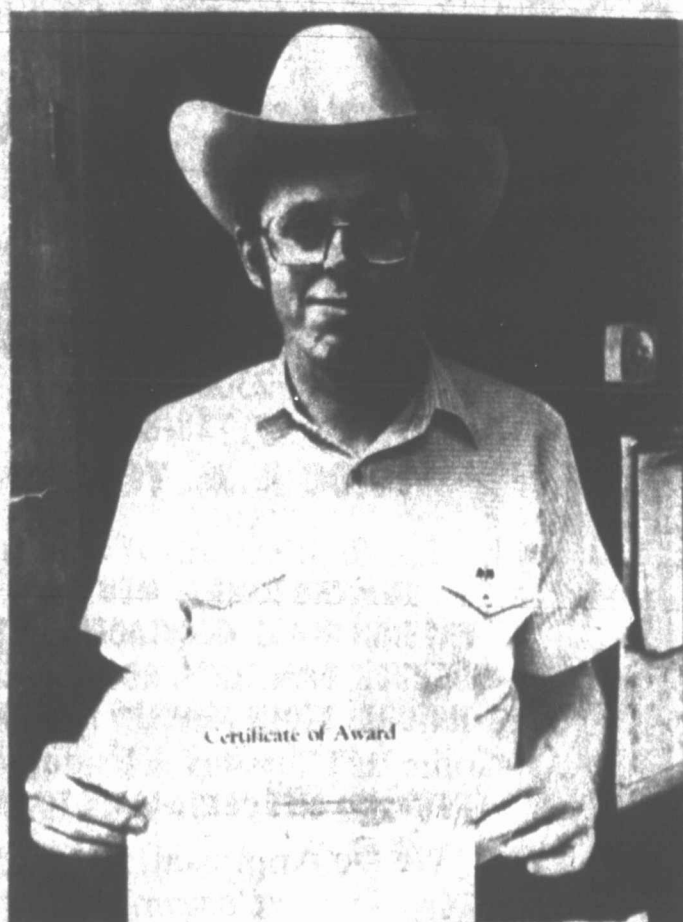
close friends.

The four remaining did a final tribute jump in Ricky's memory after the burial services.

teaches Billy to clean all the fish as well as the rest of his chores. "What good is a dwarf if he can't do your chores," Norman tells Ethel at one point.

Ethel, a loving and devoted wife, lets Norman and Billy go their own way for the summer. "I should have rented your father a 15-year-old boy years ago," she tells her daughter who returns to take Billy back to California.

Womack, who plays Charlie the postman, brings some of the biggest laughs of the evening with his own infectious laughter. Charlie was the childhood sweetheart of Chelsea and never married. Charlie good-naturedly takes the brunt of Norman's sharp tongue, but nonetheless delights at eating Ethel's biscuits and spreading the gossip of other Golden Pond residents.

Tom Kelly as Bill Ray, Billy's father and Chelsea's boy friend, provides some good comic moments himself, especially when he thinks he sees a bear. An awkward moment between Bill

and Norman when Bill tries to settle the "sleeping arrangements" proves to be a laughter-filled moment for the audience.

Hurt's portrayal of Billy is a realistic one, especially near the beginning of the play when the California-wise Billy explains to Norman about "cruising the chicks" and "sucking face".

"On Golden Pond" was made into a very popular movie of the same name several years ago and it's difficult not to try to compare the local stage production with the film version. True, the story line is the same, but

there are scenes in the stage production not seen in the movie which makes the stage version much different from the film version.

All in all, the play is a winner and one not to be missed by local theater patrons.

"On Golden Pond" continues Thursday, Friday and Saturday with performances at 8 p.m. nightly. Tickets are \$5 each and may be reserved by calling the box office each afternoon at 728-3491. Thursday night, senior citizens will be admitted half price.

I have lived here in Colorado City with my children for seven years. My home town is Chester, Nebraska where my father still lives and I still keep in touch by taking the local paper.

I read in the Chester Herald that on Christmas Eve, a little boy's body (about 9 years old) was found in a pasture wearing pajamas. He was laid out face up. I have followed the story carefully. I thought what if this child so callously abandoned were one of mine. A pastor

wrote in and suggested they call him Matthew for gift of God. The people of the little town cared, so money came in to bury little "Matthew" with a Christian burial with a headstone and all.

Media people from all over the country came including "People Magazine" and CBS news out of Chicago. It is hoped that all this media attention might lead to some one who knows the child's identity.

As I have read the poignant story, I thought how lucky I was to still live in a caring town. In

recent months, a caring mission has been built by a loving lady, Midge Gagneau. It is in J. O. Dockrey's building on the corner of Third and Elm streets and the mission really ministers. The "Come as You Are Mission" ministers to the down and out of all races, sexes and with only the person coming to the mission for help. It provides the homeless a place to sleep in a clean bed to rest their weary bones after having a bath. A hot meal cooked by Midge and her right hand helper, Georgia May Austin, restores the body. Religious services restore the soul. When they go on their way they go with a happy, grateful heart and a good word to say about Colorado City and Mitchell County Christians.

Perhaps you have helped by an offering of food, clothes, money or donated time to do this caring work. If you haven't helped yet, I know you will want to. If you need help, go to our mission and you will not be turned away. I love this town. Donna Dowty

Dulaney seeks position on legislature

Paul S. Dulaney of Clyde has announced his candidacy for the first Texas Silver Haired Legislature, District 1, which covers 12 counties, including Mitchell County.

Registered voters age 60 or over are eligible to vote. Balloting will be held in the local senior citizens center on May 30. Absentee ballots will also be made available, according to the West Central Texas Council of Governments, which is handling ballot details in 19 counties.

Their recommendations will then be presented to the 70th Texas Legislature for consideration when it convenes in January, 1967.

According to the American Association of Retired Persons, SHLs have been active in 22 other states. Their recommendations have resulted in passage of legislation of benefit to the elderly, according to AARP.

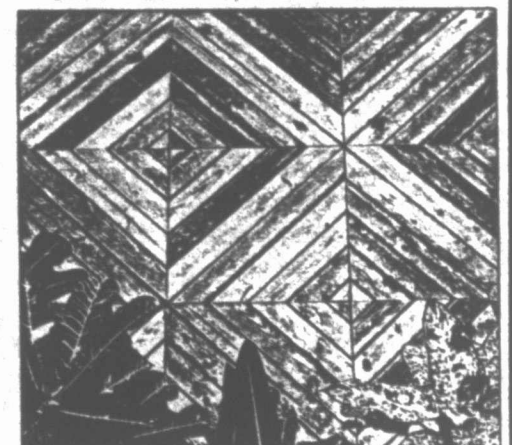

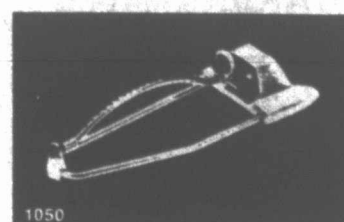

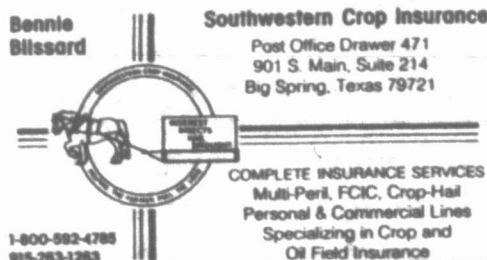

From 1983 to 1985, TDA was successful in aiding 33 local communities with farmers markets. TDA expects to work with 6 to 10 Texas communities on new markets in 1986. The Sweetwater area market is a part of this emphasis.

FTC enacts laws to protect consumer

The task of arranging a funeral for a loved one is not a typical consumer transaction, but it is an area in which consumers need protection. A grieving widow or child is often pushed into buying services the deceased would not have wanted and the survivors can ill afford. For this reason, both the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) and the Texas legislature have enacted laws to protect consumers buying funeral services.

In many instances, funeral homes have sold "package deals" to consumers without explaining the cost of each item. Under FTC regulations funeral providers must disclose the specific price for each of these services: embalming, transportation of remains, use of facilities, caskets, outer burial containers, immediate burials and direct cremations. State law requires many of the same disclosures. Funeral directors must present consumers inquiring about funeral costs with an itemized retail price list for most services.

In some cases, funeral homes have failed to disclose to consumers that embalming is not generally required by state law. My consumer protection attorneys have sued funeral homes failing to make this disclosure, and failing to inform consumers about lower-priced caskets.

Federal law requires disclosure of retail prices of all outer burial containers offered. In addition, funeral directors must make the following disclosure concerning cremations: "If you want to arrange a direct cremation, you can use an unfinished wood box or an alternative container. Alternative containers can be made of materials like heavy cardboard or composition materials (with or without an outside covering) or pouches of canvas."

Sealer caskets, which are designed, when used properly, to

prevent rapid deterioration of the body, present another area of concern. Texas consumers have complained that they were sold sealer caskets but not informed that the particular cemetery or mausoleum would not provide an opportunity for sealing. It is a deceptive trade practice for the funeral provider to fail to disclose that the sealer will not be used, if he knows that fact, before the sale.

One of my employees who has

investigated the funeral home industry has this advice for those faced with arranging a funeral: "Don't go alone. Take along a friend who is not so emotionally involved with your deceased loved one. He or she will be able to help you make decisions. If you know that a loved one is terminally ill, ask him what type of funeral he would like to have. Chances are, he won't want you to spend a lot of money on the funeral."

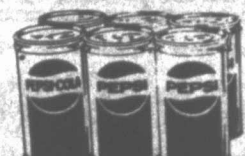

(Q) Rabbits keep eating my young flower plants. What can I do to keep them out?
(A) There are four things, all about equally effective. Sprinkle mothballs in flower bed, but not touching plants. Traffic deaths decrease

AUSTIN—Traffic deaths in Texas declined by 5.9 percent in 1985 compared to 1984, according to DPS Director Colonel Jim Adams.

Adams said 3,682 persons died in traffic accidents across the state in 1985, compared to 3,913 deaths the year before. The 1985 death toll is the lowest since 1978, he said.

Another indicator of the level of traffic safety, the number of deaths per 100 million vehicle miles traveled, also has continued to drop since 1981. Five years ago, the rate was 3.9 deaths per 100 million miles; in 1985, the rate was 2.6 deaths per 100 million miles, the lowest death rate ever recorded in Texas, Adams said.

"We are very pleased with this decline in deaths," Adams said. "The most significant thing is that despite Texas' rate of growth, the death toll in 1985 was more than 1,000 beneath Texas' all-time record traffic death count of 4,701 in 1981."

"I see two principal reasons for this saving of lives," Adams said. "When the safety belt law went into effect on September 1, 1985, we began noticing a monthly drop in fatalities."

"The four-month average decrease in front seat fatalities

was 14 percent. Secondly, I think the continuing—and growing—emphasis on the dangers of drunken driving, coupled with strict enforcement of DWI laws by police agencies, has had a definite impact on the number of traffic deaths."

In 1985, the number of reported DWI-related traffic deaths in Texas dropped by 6 percent, with 980 fatalities compared to 1,046 deaths the year before, Adams said.

While overall the number of traffic deaths decreased, the number of motorcycle riders killed in accidents rose by one percent to 304, Adams said.

"Of those motorcyclists killed, 78 percent were not wearing protective headgear," the director continued.

Texas law provides that helmets be worn by motorcyclists younger than 18, but there is no requirement that older motorcyclists wear the lifesaving headgear.

"While we are delighted with the decline in traffic deaths, the reality is that 3,682 people died on Texas' streets and highways," Adams said. "We know we will never be completely free of traffic tragedy, but we will keep doing everything we can to insure that the death toll continues to drop."

Titles required for homestead exemptions

AUSTIN—Beginning this year, a taxpayer applying for a homestead exemption on a mobile home must also submit a copy of the title to the home. "This is one of several new property tax laws that affect mobile home owners," said Ron Patterson, executive director of the State Property Tax Board (SPTB).

Patterson said the new laws also provide both tax collectors and lenders with a means for ensuring payment of property taxes on mobile homes.

He explained that county appraisal districts require title documents in two instances. "If you haven't had a homestead exemption on your mobile home before now, you must provide a copy of the title to your home with the exemption application," Patterson said. "If you already receive an exemption on a mobile home, the appraisal

district may ask you to show a title or other proof of ownership," he added, "but the district must have sent you written notice of the requirement before February 1."

Patterson pointed out that mobile home owners must meet the same qualifications for homestead exemptions as other homeowners. They must own the home on January 1 and use it as their primary residence on January 1. "The title shows the appraisal district that the applicant does in fact own the mobile home," he said.

Homeowners who don't currently receive a homestead exemption have until April 30 to apply with their county appraisal districts.

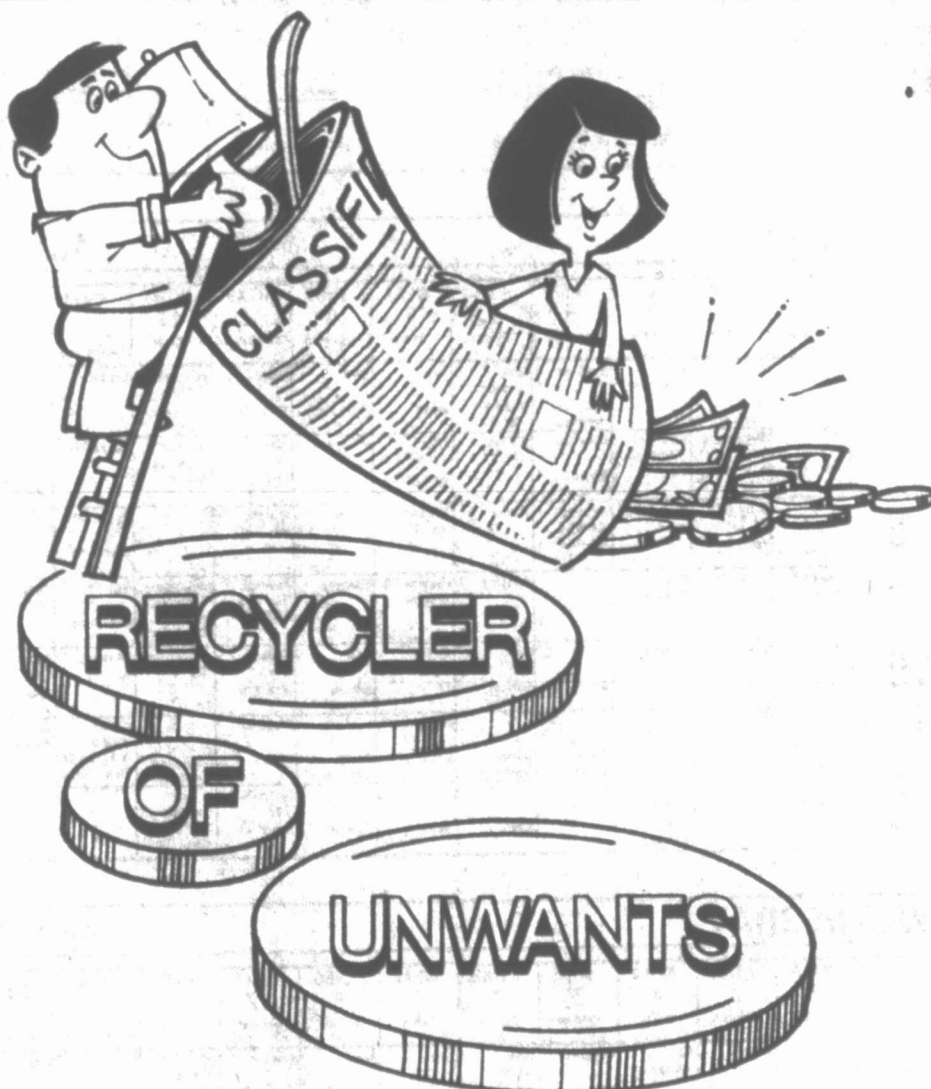

The battle at San Jacinto

By the time Sam Houston rode into Gonzales, Texas on March 11, 1836, the signal cannon from the Alamo had not been heard for five days, causing concern in Gonzales. Houston sent Erastus "Deaf" Smith toward San Antonio to learn what had happened. The news he brought back confirmed everyone's worst fears—the Alamo had fallen to Mexican troops.

Houston realized that his small force of 374 men, no matter how determined, was no match for Santa Anna's army. He ordered Gonzales to be burned and moved his force east to the Colorado River, where he intended to drill the men and make a stand. But news of the massacre at Goliad caught up with the Texans and Houston knew that even more troops would be joining Santa Anna. He moved again, this time to the Brazos River.

The defeats at the Alamo and Goliad and Houston's retreat in March and April produced panic—the muddy spring roads were soon clogged with Texans moving east. Meals were left on tables, corn abandoned in cribs, heavy furniture cast on the roadside in the hurry. Although the government fled with the people, this "Runaway Scrape" infuriated Ad Interim President David Burnet and Secretary of War Thomas J. Rusk, who asked Houston to halt his retreat and take a stand.

"You must fight... The salvation of the country depends on you doing so," Burnet admonished Houston. But Houston responded, "I consulted none—I held no councils-of-war. If I err, the blame is mine."

In April, the Mexican troops followed Houston across the Brazos at San Felipe, about 60 miles west of Fort Houston. Santa Anna thought that Sam Houston would escape to the safety of the United States, but that it still might be possible to capture President Burnet and the Texas government, which had been moved to Harrisburg. But he arrived there too late and decided to have Harrisburg burned.

As historian Archie P. McDonald tells it, when Sam Houston learned that Santa Anna had burned Harrisburg, he moved his men due east without conferring with anyone. Many felt they were being led away from battle, but he wrote to his friend Henry Raquet two days before the final confrontation. "We go to conquer. It is wisdom growing out of necessity to meet the enemy now; every consideration enforces it. No previous occasion would justify it."

On April 20, McDonald recounts, the Texans reached a field east of Fort Houston and a Mexican force faced them a mile away across a rolling prairie. An indecisive skirmish occurred that afternoon. Then sometime during the night, General Martin Perfecto de Cos arrived with 500 men, making Santa Anna's force the larger army—"upwards of 1,500 men" in Houston's words. On the morning of April 21, the armies faced each other, the Texans anxious while their leaders argued with Houston about when or if they should fight, and the Mexicans drowsy after a sleepless night spent positioning Cos's men.

Late in the afternoon, Houston led about 700 men across the San Jacinto grassland, the rolling terrain and surrounding trees hiding their advance from the Mexicans' view. Houston shouted for his men to hold their fire while a life played "Will You Come to the Bower I Have Shaded for

You?" a popular song of the time, to provide a marching cadence. His artillery—the "Twin Sisters," gifts from Cincinnati—opened a hole in the Mexican line and the Texans poured through. They had caught the Mexicans by surprise.

The battle lasted only eighteen minutes, McDonald says, but the carnage lasted for hours. The Texans lost two men in the action and seven of their thirty-some wounded later died. The Mexicans lost about 600 men and more than 700 were captured, including Santa Anna, who was discovered trying to escape the next day.

Houston's leg had been shattered during the battle and he lay under an oak tree when Santa Anna was brought to him. He soon left for New Orleans for medical treatment, leaving the task of negotiating with Santa Anna to Burnet. Santa Anna ordered all his

troops to return to Mexico, which, surprisingly, they did. He conceded Texan independence in return for his safety. His government later repudiated these concessions.

From the Battle of San Jacinto, the new republic of Texas emerged, permanently changing and separating its fate from Mexico's.
