MENARD-JUNCTION ROAD DISCUSSED THURSDAY.

At a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Monday morning the invitation extended by Menard for a discussion of the road situation, was taken up. Menard County Commissioners Court and the Menard Chamber of Commerce had asked that the Kimble County Commissioners' Court and Chamber of Commerce meet them at the County line Thursday a. m., to see what can be done to shorten and improve the road between Junction and Menard.

Tuesday morning the Eagle communicated with Attorney Frank Hargraves at Menard and got the tentative plan of the meeting. A delegation from Menard will come out to the County line and are preparing to furnish a barbecue dinner for Junction people who meet them to discuss the road situation.

It is contemplated that some plan can be worked out that will shorten the road between here and Menard, and it is stated by those who have investigated the matter that the distance can be cut some ten miles. If such a change as contemplated is made, the road will not follow Bear Creek, but will go to the right, thus keeping out of the overflow lands and bad crossings that are now on the road along Bear Creek.

An account of this meeting will have to be delayed until next week, as the Eagle goes to press on the day of the meeting.

Last Thursday and Friday were busy days in Junction. The Legion Barbecue and Picnic was on in full sway and the town was filled to overflowing with local and visiting people.

On account of the early date and the very busy season, it was thought by a good many that the crowd would be light, but the weather was exceptionally favorable and everybody that didn't come the first day, was here for the second.

The largest dance platform ever constructed in the town, was used by those enjoying dancing. The music, furnished by the St. Anthony Hotel Orchestra, was enjoyed by those who were on the grounds, as well as those who danced. Good order was maintained, and only for the fact that those in charge had to ask some visiting ladies to change their manner of dancing or leave the floor, objectionable features were lacking.

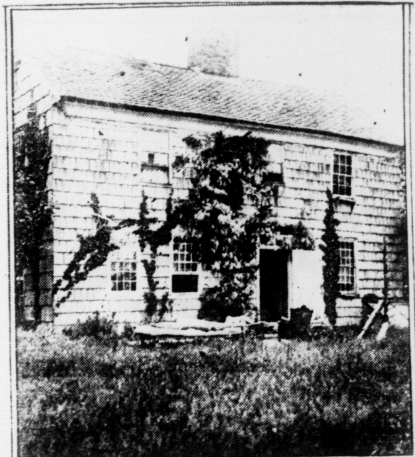

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BILLS TO GOVERNOR APPROPRIATE \$3,000,000

The rural school aid bill, appropriating \$3 million dollars for the next two years, has been sent to the Governor for his signature after the House, without a Senate vote, adopted a conference report.

The conference report on the emergency school appropriation bill, passing the sum at 1 million dollars instead of \$3 million, as passed by the last session, was adopted by both branches of the Legislature after unsuccessful opposition in the House.

The House disposed of another bill when it adopted a conference report on the \$363,000 reclamation and flood control appropriation.

The general education bill, carrying a total of approximately \$11 million dollars, was disposed of in the Senate when it adopted a conference report. The Senate held a brief flag ceremony.

A resolution by Senator Wirtz urging the teaching of the State and Federal Constitutions in public and private schools, and stressing the principles of free speech and religious freedom, was adopted unanimously.

The reclamation bill as adopted showed a reduction of \$925,000 under the measure passed at the regular session. The general educational bill was defunct.

The last week of the third called special session has seen completion of practically all work that has been accomplished in the 30-day period. Appropriation measures have been the center of work during the past week. This was made necessary by the killing of practically all of the revenue bills which were offered.

The Cowan substitute gasoline bill, intended to correct the bill passed by the last session to avoid unconstitutionality, was passed as was the Quinn corrective sulphur tax, which includes penalties left out of the statute now in force. Both of these measures are effective as soon as signed by the Governor, which will avoid any long delay in collecting the taxes. These are the only two revenue measures which succeeded in obtaining final passage during the week.

With the failure of the revenue bills, it became apparent reductions toward making the revenues and appropriations must come on appropriation bills. Accordingly, the Senate passed the emergency school appropriation bill at \$1,000,000, a reduction of \$2,000,000 from the figure adopted in the House and that passed last session. The rural aid bill was set at \$2,000,000, the same as passed last term.

Departmental and eleemosynary appropriation bills were passed on passage in the House, with material reductions. The former was reduced approximately \$750,000 in the lower branch and the latter \$700,000. The fate of these measures, however, was left to conference committees and the eleemosynary bill was increased so that reductions amounted to \$350,000.

The judiciary bill was passed with reductions of approximately \$50,000 and the emergency departmental with the same amount.

Although Governor Neff submitted a list of ten additional non-revenue or appropriation subjects last week, prospects are for passage of only a few of these. Lateness of the session and failure of the Houses to suspend their rules were causes for failure of a number of these.

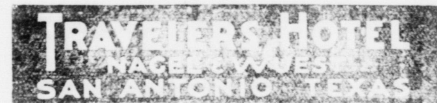

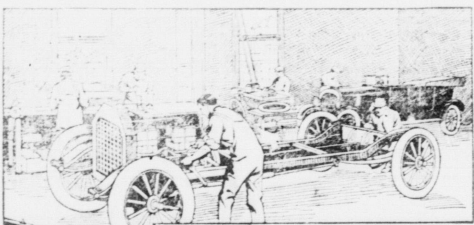

DYEING SILK SIMPLE FOR ANY HOUSEWIFE.

The housewife who will follow directions carefully need have no difficulty in dyeing silks, says specialists at the State College at Ithaca. Dyeing, further, it is pointed out, means an inexpensive and practical means of giving variety to the wardrobe.

Since different dyes require different amounts of water, the proportions on the package must be followed carefully, and no general rule can be followed.

A sample of the material should be first dipped in sea water, the dye is the right color. This should be a piece of the same material to be colored, as different materials take colors differently. The article to be dyed

should first be washed thoroughly, and then the soap entirely rinsed out. Put the garment in the dye bath while it is still moist, keeping it in motion with the hands, and opening the folds to allow the tint to reach all parts evenly.

The shade is determined by the amount of dye used and the length of time it is dyed. The garment will appear darker when it is wet than after it is dry. If more dye should be desired, the garment must be removed from the dye bath until the previously dissolved dye is added. When the garment is the shade desired, lift it from the water, rinse it in clear water, roll it in a towel, and iron on the wrong side while still moist.

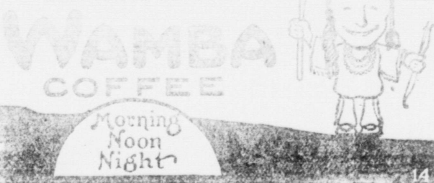

Washington dispatches re-

tion of Old Glory.

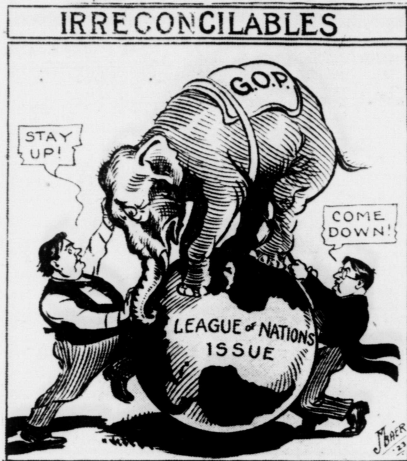
THE STREETS OF JUNCTION.

It is doubtful if half the peo-
ple in Junction know the names
of the principal streets of the
town. We profess much igno-
rance in this matter, as little at-
tention is given to the names of
the streets in towns the size of
this, and we did not know the
name of the street we lived on.
However, here they are, but we
don't vouch for the authority of
the names, but they were taken
from a recent map of the town.

Beginning at the main busi-
ness street running north of the
court house (east and west) the
streets running parallel to this
and lying north are: Exline,
Gregory and North Llano; those
lying south are: Williamson,
(commonly referred to as Col-
lege street) Allen, Mesholson,
and Patterson.

The street running west of
the court house is Caplin and
the other streets to the west are,
Flake Blum, Walnut, Elm and
Oak; those east of the court
house are, Sealey, Denison and
Boyle. The road over which a
part of the highway passes, ly-
ing one block west of the Parks,
has been designated as a street,
but we were unable to learn the
name.

ated town, the street names are
somewhat of a misnomer, as all
the so-called streets are in real-
ity roads, designated by the Com-
missioners Court, and the names
are given more for convenience

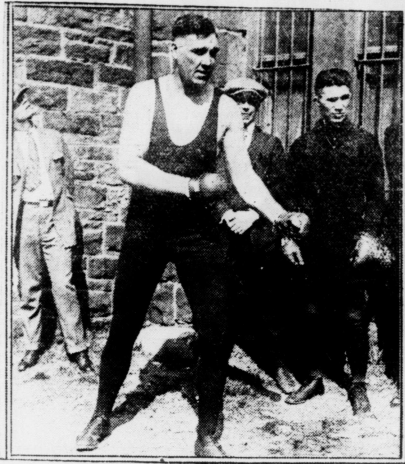

STATE MAY BE MADE RICH BY OIL PROPERTY

A change in the State laws to allow the disposition of oil permits on State University lands in west Texas on a competitive basis, is contemplated by a group of legislators who conferred today with Land Commissioner Robison. Their action was planned in view of the reported gusher on State lands in Reagan County.

It would net the State much larger returns if oil is discovered in paying quantities, it was said. The permits now held on State lands would be allowed to expire, under the proposed bill, but hereafter, all permits would be sold on a competitive basis.

Big Lake, June 11.—The Santa Rita well on the Texon tract, owned by the University of Texas, made good all expectations Sunday afternoon before a thousand persons who came by special train and automobiles from every corner of Texas. The well shot oil over the derrick for eight minutes.

A strong wind carried the oil far to the west of the rig and the sun turned the stream into a rainbow of colors. Sunday's flow was the seventeenth which the well has made since the bit touched the sand on May 28th. The intervals between the flows seem to be increasing to about twenty-six hours, but the duration of the flow, which at first was but six minutes, has now increased to a total of 42 minutes. The flow Sunday was for 42 minutes. Oil men who have watched the action of the well for a week believe that even if the well is not drilled any deeper it will blow in itself.

PLAN MORE GOOD ROADS FOR SUTTON COUNTY.

Sonora, June 16.—Sonora's road building program is being extended with Sutton County expecting to build new roads over the county, practically forming a network over this section.

The continuation of the Del Rio-Canadian highway No. 4, is being contemplated. Work is nearing completion on the northern portion of this highway, from Sonora to the Schleicher County line, towards San Angelo, the remainder of the work to be from Sonora towards Del Rio, to the Edwards County line.

The gravel road to the Schleicher County line being done by Smith Brothers, Dallas County contractors, is rapidly being finished. F. V. Standifer, who is in charge of the work for the company, has made the statement that the work will be finished within four weeks, in time for the July 4-7, inclusive, celebration at Sonora.

LEGISLATURE IS SIX MONTHS IN SESSION

Austin, June 14.—The third called session of the Thirty-Eighth Legislature came to an end Thursday, by adjournment, having used the thirty days allowed under the Constitution.

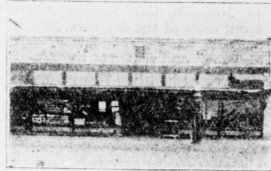
With Thursday's final session the Thirty-Eighth Legislature and its activities have covered six months in some way or other. There were 123 days of session, and the remainder of the time was given over to other work. The regular session lasted sixty-five days; the first called session one day and the second and third sessions thirty days each.

It was in early December that the advocates of a constitutional convention began holding conferences and caucuses to lay plans to have this session call such a convention. The race for speaker started in December when headquarters were opened in Austin. Thus from the middle of that month until the middle of June there has been a legislative program under way.

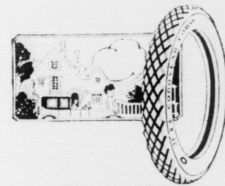
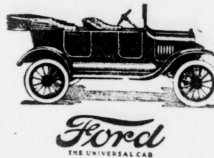
By the time the Governor had disposed of the bills passed at the regular session the finance committee had met for the second called session to build the appropriation measures and the interval between sessions saw no cessation of legislative activities. 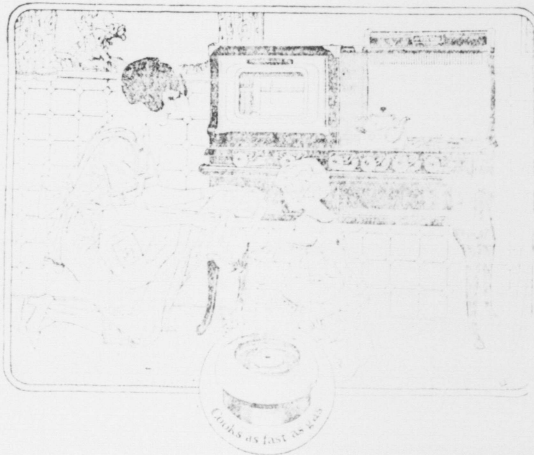
