July Rebates Total \$104.2 Million

State Comptroller John Sharp today sent a total of \$104.2 million in July sales tax payments to 960 Texas cities and 106 counties, a 5.5 percent increase over the rebates of one year ago.

Texas cities received \$93.1 million, up 5.9% over the \$87.8 million they received last July. Counties received a total of \$11 million in July

rebates, a 5.5% increase over July 1991 rebates totaling \$10.5 million.

Locally, Bogata received \$1,008.37 for a 16.44% increase while Clarksville received \$15,882.98 for a 0.85% decrease.

Detroit received \$678.85 for a 4.03% decrease.

Blossom received \$1,303.80 for a

2.28% decrease.

Deport received \$565.68 for a 10.76% increase.

Paris received \$169,019.35 for a 5.17% decrease.

Talco received \$1,026.71 for a 10.80% decrease while Mt. Pleasant

received \$105,076.22 for a 3.77% decrease.

The Community Says Good-Bye To Mary Lassiter

Miss Mary Kate Lassiter is going to be missed dearly in the community. The things Mary has done for this community are too numerous to count. For an ordinary person she accomplished so much...and yet she was severely handicapped.

Mary was born in Bogata on October 28, 1907. She was the youngest of six children born to Lemuel and Willie Colfield Lassiter. At the age of ten, Mary was stricken with polio. After a time she was fitted with braces and crutches which she used until she became bedridden.

In 1926, Mary graduated from Bogata High School. She attended Paris Junior College and Texas Women's University. In 1940, Mary graduated from East Texas State University with a B.A. in Music and Education. She taught school for a time and later taught private piano lessons for many years.

Mary was a wonderful musician who gave of her talent freely. The late Reviah Howison taught her the piano. She was a lifelong member of the Bogata United Methodist Church where she was the church pianist for many years, playing for Sunday services, choir practice, weddings, funerals, graduations and many other occasions. Sometimes she would play background music for traveling shows that would come to Bogata during the twenties and would play for silent movies that would play in Bogata. Mary was even a member of the Bogata Community Orchestra in the late 1920's.

Mary has always been an active community member. She did some

bookkeeping work for a time. For many years Mary was in charge of blowing the fire siren to summon the firemen and received ambulance calls for the city of Bogata. She was a contributing reporter to the Bogata News as well as a notary. She spent time collecting donations for numerous charities.

Mary was a happy, cheerful, giving person who made the most of her life. She made a meaningful contribution to her family, friends, church and community. Her life was well lived and a shining example of making the most of one's talents. She will be long remembered by those who knew and loved her.

Mary died at the age of 84 in McCuiston Medical Center in Paris. She is survived by her sister, Iva Hooker of Bogata, three nieces, Robbie Jean McCrury of Las Vegas, Patsy Lipscomb of Dallas and Narca Duncan of El Paso and one nephew, Fred Wilkerson of Tyler. Her sisters Fauna and Hontas and her brothers Britt and Truman preceded her in death.

Funeral services were 2:00 pm Tuesday, July 21 in Bogata United Methodist Church with Rev. Randy Newkirk officiating. Burial was in Bogata Cemetery under the direction of Bogata Funeral Home.

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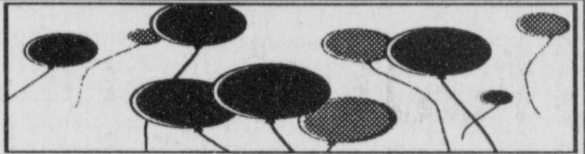

Layered Pecan Pie

1 - 8 oz. package cream cheese, softened
1/3 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 egg
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 unbaked 9" pastry shell
1 1/4 cups chopped pecans
3 eggs
1 cup light corn syrup
1/4 cup sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Combine first three ingredients; beat until smooth. Add 1 egg and 1 teaspoon vanilla, beating until combined; spoon into pastry shell. Sprinkle with pecans. Combine 3 eggs, corn syrup, 1/4 cup sugar and 1 teaspoon vanilla; beat well and pour over pecans. Bake at 375 for 35-40 minutes or until set. This will be a large pie. Small bought crust not recommended.

Checkerboard Cake

2 1/2 cups all purpose flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
3/4 cups shortening
2 cups sugar
1 tablespoon vanilla
5 egg whites, at room temperature
1 1/3 cups buttermilk
1/3 cup unsweetened cocoa powder
1 tablespoon milk

Grease and flour three 8x1 1/2" round baking pans. In a bowl combine flour, baking powder, soda, and 1/2 teaspoon salt. In a very large bowl beat shortening with an electric mixer on medium speed for 30 seconds. Add 1 2/3 cups of sugar and vanilla, beat til combined. Alternately add flour, mixture and buttermilk, beating after each addition just till combined.

Wash beaters. Beat egg whites on medium till soft peaks form. Gradually add remaining sugar, beating on medium to high till stiff peaks form. Gently fold half of egg white mixture into beaten mixture. Fold in remaining egg white mixture. Spoon half of batter (about 3 1/4 cups) into a bowl. Sift cocoa powder over remaining batter. Stir in 1 tablespoon milk.

Set 3/4 cup of white batter aside. Spoon 1 1/4 cups of remaining white batter around the outer edge of each of 2 of the prepared pans. Spoon 3/4 cup of chocolate batter into a ring right next to the inner edge of white batter in each of the pans. Spoon half of remaining white batter into center of each pan. In the third pan, using 1 1/4 cups of chocolate batter, make outer ring. Using the reserved 3/4 cup of white batter, make inner ring. Fill center with remaining chocolate batter.

Bake in a 350 oven about 25 minutes or til cakes test done. Cool in pans for 10 minutes. Remove and cool. Place a cake layer with a white outer ring on serving plate. Frost top with 1/2 cup frosting. Place cake layer with chocolate outer ring on top. Frost top with 1/2 cup frosting. Top with remaining layer. Frost sides and top with remaining frosting. Serves 16.

Chocolate Frosting

1/4 cup margarine
about 5 cups powdered sugar
3 squares unsweetened chocolate
1/2 cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla

Beat margarine and 2 cups powdered sugar together. Melt the chocolate squares and cool, beat those in. Stir in the milk and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Beat in about 3 cups powdered sugar. Makes 4 cups.

Since most injuries such as sprains, bruises and pulled muscles cause localized bleeding, ice is the treatment of choice immediately following the injury. Application of ice to an area effectively slows blood flow, resulting in less bleeding and swelling of the area. By controlling bleeding and swelling, an individual's recovery time is decreased significantly. In addition, ice is an effective way of decreasing pain, without the use of medication. If symptoms of pain, swelling or loss of function persist, you should contact your physician promptly.

Clyde Bankhead was there when Henry won the car. He was seventeen at the time.

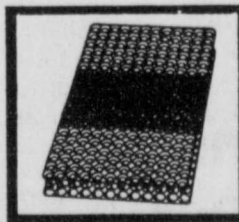
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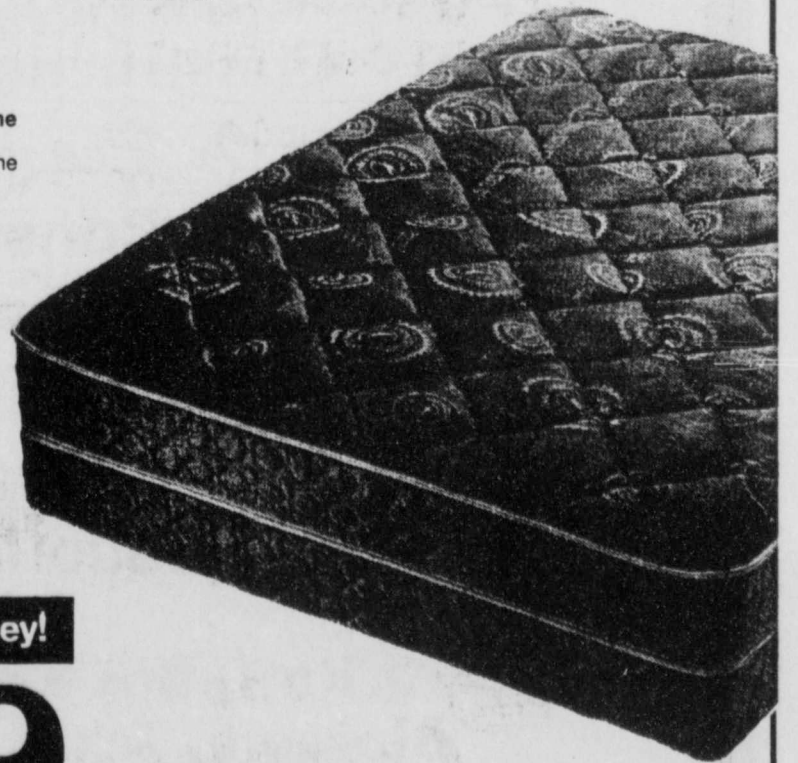


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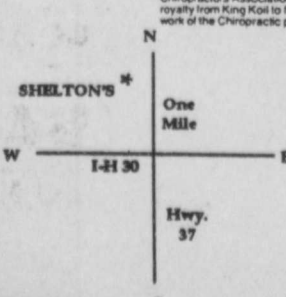
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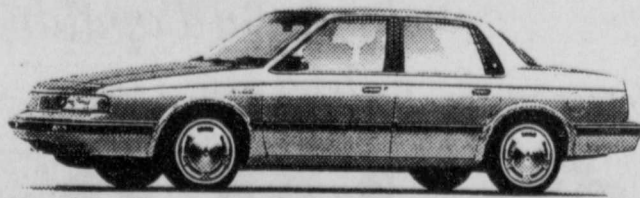
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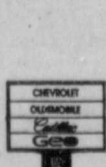
