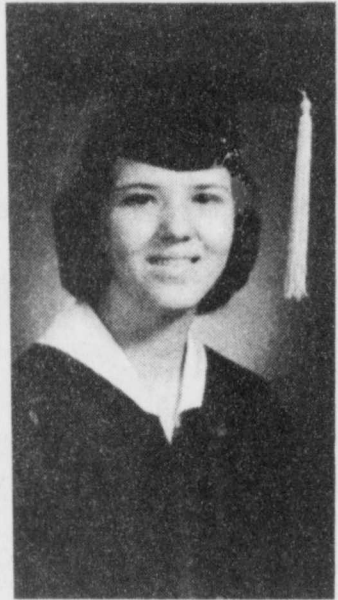
They will be among the 36 Talco students who will be graduated in commencement exercises at Rivercrest school at 8:00 p.m. Monday, May 31.

Vinyard Is Chairman Of CF Bike-A-Thon

Mike Vinyard has been named chairman in Bogata for a Bike-a-Thon of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, by William B. Henley Jr., president of the North-East Texas Chapter.

As chairman, Vinyard will be responsible for recruiting volunteers for a public education program and door-to-door drive.

The Cystic Fibrosis Foundation supports over 100 CF Centers across the nation, five of which are in Texas.

Cystic fibrosis is the number one genetic killer of children. It affects one out of every 1,500 babies born each year and occurs when a child inherits one carrier gene from each parent. The parents do not have cystic fibrosis, but they are among the 10 million carriers of the gene in the United States. One goal of the Foundation-supported research is a test to detect these carriers.

"We don't need more reasons than these to actively support the Bike-a-Thon for the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation," says Miss Peters.

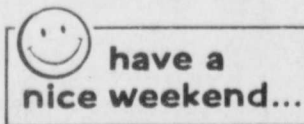
Bogata And Talco Residents Graduate

Milford Groves Named Head Coach At Rivercrest

Milford Groves, now with Holliday Schools, was named head coach and athletic director at Rivercrest at a special meeting of the Talco-Bogata School Board May 18.

Coach Groves is 40 years of age and a graduate of North Texas State University where he attended on an athletic scholarship. He has a total of 10 years of experience as a head coach in the schools of Beckville, Lake Worth, and Holliday. While with the Class A Holliday Schools for four years, his football teams were bi-district champions for two years, district champions one year, and co-district champions the other year. Groves is married and he and his wife have a pre-school age daughter. Mrs. Groves has taught business and English for a number of years but does not plan to teach at this time.

In other matters, the board approved plans for a 24 by 64 portable classroom for the Bogata Campus. Plans and specifications for the building can be secured at the office of superintendent Talmadge Morgan at Rivercrest for contractors interested in making a bid on this construction. Bids will be opened at the next regular meeting of the board which will be on Monday, June 7, 1976, at 7:30 p.m. at Rivercrest. The regular board meeting which would normally be on Tuesday, June 1st has been changed to Monday, June 7th due to a conflict with the Rivercrest commencement exercises.

The resignation of Elizabeth Griffin as art teacher on the Bogata Campus was accepted. Mrs. Griffin has been part of a team-teaching project on the Bogata Campus this year teaching art for three days each week with Neva Jean Oats teaching music the other two days of the week. Mrs. Oats has been reemployed as music teacher on a two-day per week basis contingent on finding another certified teacher who can teach art and or some related subject as may be approved by the administration for the other three days of the week.

Board approval was given to

participate in a federal program in Titus County whereby a certified teacher can be employed during the summer months to tutor students and or work in other summer school programs as may be approved by the administration. Approval was also given to take part in other federal programs of this nature that may be available to the school district. These programs are at little or no cost to the local school district.

In final action, the board approved the election of cheerleaders for the junior varsity sports at Rivercrest, made an adjustment in the salary of Walter Rich, band director at Rivercrest, in keeping with an agreement at the time of his employment, and tabled action on a decision as to whether vocational agriculture teachers would continue to be placed on a two-year contract basis or revert to one-year contracts.

The next regular meeting of the board will be on Monday, June 7, 1976 at 7:30 p.m. at Rivercrest with the public cordially invited to attend.

Lesa Massey and Ronny Lee Hill have selected Friday, June 4, 1976 for their wedding date.

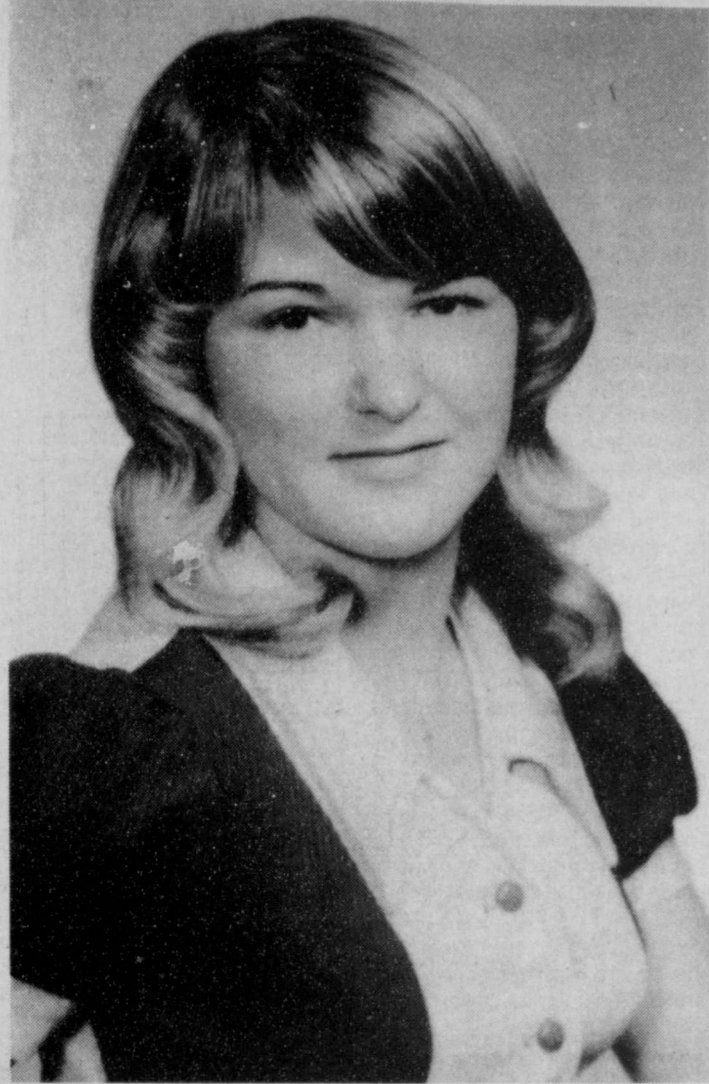
The father of the bridegroom will perform the ceremony in his home at 6:00 p.m.

CONSUMER GUIDELINES

Your house is probably your most expensive and important possession. Careful inspection before you buy is important. When you inspect a new or older home, check the following:

- The age of the house and if it has been reroofed.
- The average roof lasts about 15 years.
- Make sure gutters and downspouts are intact.
- If there's wood siding, check for curls and loose ends.



Also, look for peeling or flaking paint.

- Make sure that wood porches and steps are level.
- Check all windows and doors, the amount of storage space and the number of electric outlets and their locations.
- Insulation should be examined. The house should have adequate electrical wiring and reliable heating. Water supply and sewage disposal systems are other musts.
