

Lawmakers Fear Armament Race From Soviet Stand

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—The threat of a United Nations deadlock over atomic energy control followed by a global atomic arms race stirred congress today as the result of Russia's blunt "do-it-our-way" approach to the problem.

Leading lawmakers declared emphatically that this country is not going to surrender its A-bomb secrets until tested international controls are set up — something which the Soviet plan does not appear to guarantee.

A charge by the Communist newspaper Pravda that the American plan for international control of weapon "reflects evident striving for world rule" provoked sharp counter criticism from members of the senate's special atomic committee.

Calling the charge "ridiculous," Senator Russell (D-Ga.), a committee member, told a reporter he thinks "the Russians should stop judging all other nations motives by their own selfish attitudes."

The Georgia senator said he hears Russian insistence on the veto, renewed in the Pravda outburst, may deadlock UN atomic negotiations, a view shared by Senator Edwin C. Johnson (D-Colo.), another committee member.

"Both said the result of ultimate failure to agree on international controls is liable to be a new armaments contest."

Senator Huffman (D-Ohio), said the Russians, as well as everybody else, ought to know from the American record in two world wars that this country wants no new boundaries nor reparations.

"Having refused to take for ourselves more of the world when it was at our feet, no one can seriously accuse us of attempting to dictate to the world now," he declared.

Congress Party Rejects Interim Government

NEW DELHI, June 25 (AP)—Maulana Abul Kalam Azad, president of the all-India congress party, announced today that the party's working committee had rejected British plans for an interim government for India pending adoption of a constitution for an independent India.

Azad declared, however, that the committee had accepted the British cabinet mission's long term proposals looking toward Indian independence.

The decision, he said, was conveyed to Viceroy Lord Wavell and the cabinet mission by telephone this morning. A written statement will be forwarded to the mission later, Azad added.

Asked whether the acceptance of the long-term British proposals was conditional, Azad replied: "There are no conditions, but our interpretation of the proposals has its place and we stand by it."

In response to a question as to whether any new approach had been made to the working committee by the cabinet mission, Azad declared: "I cannot say anything at the moment about that."

He said the resolution embodying the working committee's decisions might be released later today.

Soldier Justifiable Called Lying

MOUNT IDA, Ark., June 25 (AP)—A coroner's jury has decreed that Montgomery County Sheriff G. A. Bate's action in fatally shooting a Fort Sam Houston soldier, tentatively identified as a Texan, was justifiable homicide.

Bates said he fired at the youth, who disregarded orders to halt, after the sheriff sought to question him in connection with an automobile he was driving.

Russia And US Frown On French Trieste Plan

Internationalizing Cities In Past Never Successful

PARIS, June 25 (AP)—Russian and US opposition to a French proposal for internationalization of the disputed city of Trieste dimmed today the prospects for an early compromise solution to this key issue blocking peace treaties for Italy and the Balkans.

As the foreign ministers of the Big Four assembled for another try at examining the remaining differences preventing completion of peace pacts for Romania, Hungary and Bulgaria, American sources voiced doubt that the French plan for Trieste — claimed by both the Italians and the Yugoslavs — would work.

They said the plan, under which the strategic Adriatic port city would be internationalized under the United Nations for 10 years with its final sovereignty to be decided by plebiscite at the end of that time was under study, but commented that similar plans in the past never had worked very well. This apparently was a reference to Danzig and Fiume.

The sentiment of the Russians, who have adamantly demanded that the city be given to Yugoslavia, was reflected in a dispatch from Moscow which quoted the official Russian news agency, Tass, as saying the Soviet Union could not accept internationalization because it would be contrary to Yugoslav national aspirations.

The deadlocked questions of the French-Italian frontier, free navigation of the Danube and disposition of Italian naval units all were discussed yesterday by the Big Four, but without any agreement.

House Agrees To Hike Army Pay

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—The house agreed today to compromise legislation boosting army pay. It then faced the reluctant decision of yielding on its stand against drafting of all teenagers.

The pay raises range from a maximum of 50 per cent for buy-outs and apprentices to 10 per cent for five-star generals and admirals. A voice vote sent this bill to the senate.

Prompt senate acceptance is expected, since that body already had agreed to its general provisions.

The house was called to work two hours early today to get on a draft extension compromise providing for the induction of 18-year-olds but prohibiting the drafting of 18-year-olds.

Only token opposition was expected to the measure worked out by senate-house conferees after the two branches split on (1) how long to extend the draft law which expires Sunday, and (2) just who should be inducted under the act.

Draft Passes

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—Compromise legislation extending the draft law until next March 31 but prohibiting the induction of 18-year-olds was passed today by the House and sent to the Senate.

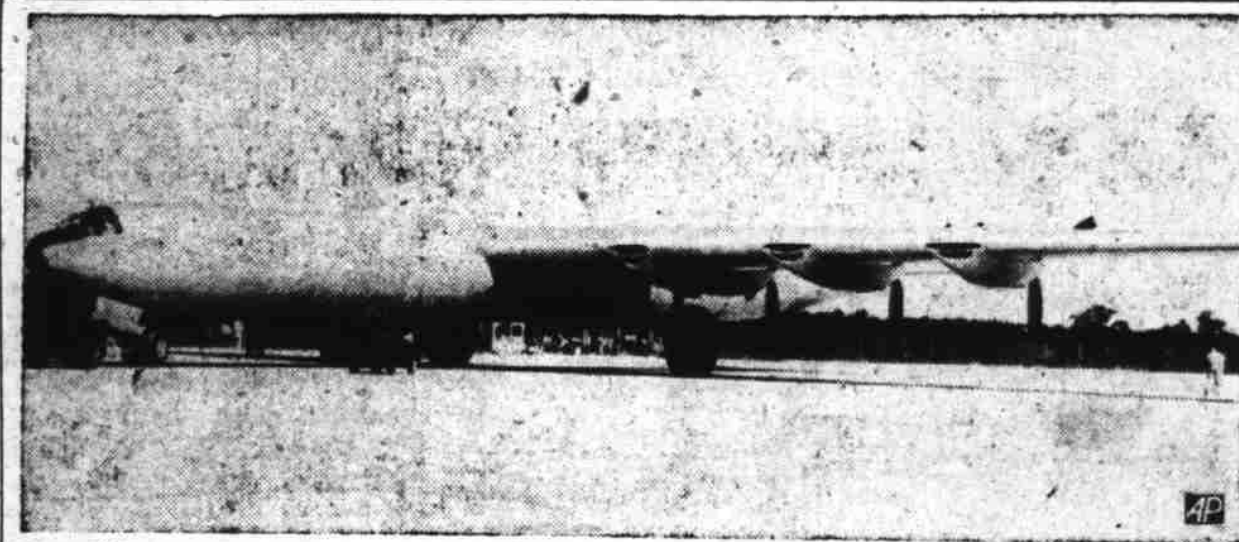

Congress Ready To Ban UNRRA Funds To Soviet

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—A "none-for-Russia" tag on this country's \$465,000,000 final contribution to UNRRA became a definite possibility today.

President Truman's disclosure that Moscow has balked at letting American correspondents report on the relief agencies activities in two Soviet Republics sent influential House members into an angry huddle.

They tried before but failed to ban the use of United States funds in nations which refused to give American press and radio representatives free access to UNRRA news.

Finally they settled for a provision requiring the President to seek through "appropriate channels" to obtain admission of American correspondents to recipient countries.

"Apparently we did not go far enough and will now have to get tougher," Rep. Clarence Brown (R-Ohio) told a reporter. "It may be that the House now will be willing to insist that no UNRRA funds be used in countries which won't allow our reporters to go inside and find out how the money is being used."

Russians Reject US Protest Against News Suppressions

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—Acting Secretary of State Acheson said today Russia had flatly rejected a strong United States protest against suppression of news freedom in Romania, and has forced Reuben Markham of the Christian Science Monitor to leave that country.

Acheson told a news conference the United States had registered its objections to the treatment of Markham in both Moscow and Bucharest a month ago and that it had been turned down in both places.

Word had just been received from the Soviet ministry of foreign affairs, he said, contending that the American argument furnished no foundation for rescinding the Soviet action against the American newsmen.

Seven Killed As Spokane Baseball Team Bus Plunges Down Mountain

SEATTLE, June 25 (AP)—Seven members of Spokane's Western International league baseball club met death last night in the flaming plunge of their chartered cross-state bus from the Snoqualmie Pass highway four miles west of its summit in the Cascade mountains.

The driver and eight other players were injured, several critically.

One survivor described the victims as being "scattered all over the hill."

The identified dead were: First baseman Vic Piccetti, of San Francisco, who formerly played with Oakland and was described as "the most promising young player on the Pacific coast last season." He died en route to a Seattle hospital.

George C. Risk, 27, infielder from Hillsboro, Ore.

Frederick T. Martinez, an infielder from San Diego.

A coroner said four others were "more or less positively identified" as:

Manager Mel Cole of Wenatchee, Wash.; Bob Kinnaman, former Washington State college pitcher from Brooklyn, Wash.; outfielder Bob James of Tempe, Ariz.; outfielder Bob Patterson of San Francisco.

Three of the casualties were survivors of the bus wreck said today an unidentified "wrong side" driver caused their chartered bus to leave the highway and plunge down a precipitous hill.

"I saw the headlights coming toward us on the wrong side of the road," Levi McCormack, 33-year-old Spokane outfielder, said. "The road was slippery. Our driver applied his brakes. We swerved across the road into the guardrail. We went through. We went down. I've never heard such hell. I don't know why we didn't smash the other driver. It might have been better."

Accidents Increase In Area

Summer time has become a slaughter-time, according to State Highway Patrolman Bill Beeson, who said that motorists are going to have to cooperate to the ultimate with the nation-wide safety campaign if the accident rate were to be cut.

"We have had more highway accidents since June 1 than in any month of 1946," Beeson said.

"Our department is doing all it can to correct the situation, but our hands are tied unless the people practice safe driving rules."

Investigation proved that many of the persons involved in the mishaps in the area the past month had been drinking, the patrolman said.

The death of Juan Vega, Jr., who was killed in a Sunday crash west of town, was the first highway fatality reported here since Beeson and John Strother assumed their duties Feb. 22.

Since the first of the month, the highway patrol has investigated seven automobile mishaps that have happened in this vicinity. In addition to Vega's death, nine persons suffered injuries.

Most Cars Have Defective Lights

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—A group of Texas have outlined to war assets administration officials a plan to convert the abandoned cavalry post of Fort Clark at Bracketville, Tex., into a military institute.

Directors of the "Fort Clark Military Institute" include former vice president John Nance Garner of Uvalde and Amon G. Carter, Fort Worth Star Telegram publisher.

Incorporated under Texas state law as a non-profit educational enterprise, the institute would have a purchase priority classification for acquisition of Fort Clark.

The Washington delegation was headed by Kinney county Judge Joe K. York of Bracketville.

The WAA last week disclosed that the Texas Railway Equipment company of Houston has offered a high bid of \$411,250 for Fort Clark. No action has been taken beyond opening of the bids.

Home Building Seriously Cut By Commercial

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—More than \$1,370,000,000 worth of non-home building has been okayed since the government's construction controls went into effect in March.

A Civilian Production Administration report disclosed today. It showed that in the first 11 weeks of the order designed to curb building in order to make more materials available for new homes there were 31,457 approvals for store, factory, office and other non-housing construction and 14,971 rejections.

However, CPA Administrator John D. Small said that ratio has been reversed this month. A cut-down in non-residential approvals was ordered May 29 when it developed that materials were being used up faster than they were being produced.

The cutdown resulted too, other officials have said, from complaints by Housing Expediter Wilson W. Wyatt that the volume of non-residential building was jeopardizing the homes-for-veterans program.

Small's statement declared, however, that "inquiries and applications" for non-housing construction totaled more than 500,000, and that CPA turned back some 450,000 of these "before they reached the formal application stage."

Both House And Senate Due To Act On Measure Written On Compromise

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—Chairman Spence (D-Ky) of the house banking committee today expressed belief that President Truman will sign the compromise OPA bill worked out last night by a senate-house conference committee.

In his opinion, Spence said, the bill "is workable."

The Kentuckian, who has battled for months for continuation of a strong price control law, made this statement to newsmen as the house convened two hours earlier than its usual noon meeting time for a session which probably will see a showdown vote on the OPA compromise.

Spence voiced confidence the house will approve the compromise. The measure's renewal of OPA powers is far short of what the administration had asked for. But at the same time its curtailment of OPA powers is a good deal less drastic than the administration had expected in view of separate actions taken by the two chambers when the renewal legislation was first taken up.

With other legislation scheduled for prior consideration, a final vote on OPA was not expected before mid-afternoon.

Left intact were price controls over meat, butter, cigarettes and gasoline, but the one-year extension of the war-born agency yanked away many of OPA's powers over the national economy.

The house, then the senate, and finally President Truman must approve the measure if it is to keep all price ceilings from expiring next Sunday night.

Although a last minute decision knocked out sections which would have ended controls over livestock, poultry, dairy products, tobacco and petroleum at the end of this month, many of the bill's provisions were written specifically to force a raise in prices.

Advocates contended that such a course would spur production and put the nation on the highway to prosperity. But stabilization director Chester Bowles damned them in advance as "booby trap" breeders of inflation.

Among them:

1. An end of OPA's controversial program calling for specific quantities of lower-cost clothing.
2. A halt to so-called cost-absorption on such things as autos, refrigerators and radios.
3. A requirement that average unit cost increases since 1941 must be reflected in all price ceilings.

Last night's session was forced by widely varying extension bills passed separately by the house and senate.

Military Institute Planned From Post

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22 Plead Guilty In Over-Ceiling Car Sales Game

DETROIT, June 25 (AP)—Twenty-two of 31 defendants pleaded guilty today to taking part in what the federal government described as a three-million dollar conspiracy to buy and sell used automobiles above ceiling prices.

Seven other defendants entered not guilty pleas and federal Judge Arthur Koscinski began their trial immediately. Action on the case of the remaining two defendants was held in abeyance by the government.

The OPA, following a lengthy investigation, charged that the defendants had taken part in a conspiracy to buy used cars at over ceiling prices in Detroit lots. The automobiles were then channeled through Murray, Ky., and Cairo, Ill., and resold at over-ceiling prices in southern and southwest states, according to the OPA.

A federal grand jury indicated the 31 men, a majority of whom are from Kentucky, several weeks ago.

Judge Koscinski set no date for sentencing of the 23 defendants who pleaded guilty. Instead, he ordered bonds of \$1,000 each continued pending a probation investigation.

Rent Rackets Run Rampant, Director Warns

Continued acute housing shortages are providing rental "rackets" in some instances, and Robert L. Richey, Big Spring area rent director, has advised tenants to be on the watch for these.

Although such cases are definitely in the minority, Richey warned that a few landlords have resorted to subterfuge in order to gain rentals above OPA ceilings.

Among the ruses are these:

Requirement of a large deposit against breakage, a deposit which invariably has been consumed by vague "breakage" when time for repayment comes.

Bonus required by superintendent or janitor of apartment houses to get apartments for tenants.

Requirement to purchase furniture at inflated prices. In some cases tenant furniture purchase is permissible, but with area rent director approval.

Requirement that tenant rent garden or vacant lot in order to get an apartment or house at its ceiling rent.

Payment of dues for privilege of living at a club, which in reality is a rooming house. In some instances a silent understanding that tenant will take chances on all sorts of raffles.

Bonus payments to mysterious "friends" who furnish tips on apartments, etc.

Extra charges for janitor, services, parking rights, piano, etc. and other services formerly included in rental fees.

Double rate payment for single hotel rooms but registering as "Mr. and Mrs." a practice which, in some places, has produced near divorces over the fictitious "Mrs.," Richey observed.

A report of these and similar practices should be reported to his office in the Petroleum building, said Richey, as a means of preventing a breakdown in rent control. He also urged tenants to insist on seeing the OPA rent charges, reduction in service, etc. Prompt action will be helpful, he said, because the area staff is so small it must schedule its time most expeditiously.

Most Cars Have Defective Lights

Defective lights headed the list of mechanical deficiencies listed at the traffic safety lane operated by Big Spring police Monday afternoon, when a total of 88 drivers voluntarily carried their automobiles through for inspection by officers.

Fifty-six of the vehicles either had no lights or defective lights, three had defective windshield wipers, two defective tires, two defective brakes and one defective horn.

Twenty-two were found to be in good over-all mechanical condition.

The safety lane was to be open again today from 2 p. m. to 4 p. m. on a voluntary basis. Today's activities will conclude a full week's safety campaign carried on by the police department.

Kidnapped Officers Are Still Missing

JERUSALEM, June 25 (AP)—Military and police authorities said today they were "absolutely without a hint" as to the whereabouts of three British officers still missing after being kidnapped June 16 by Irgun Zvai Leumi, Jewish underground military organization.

Extensive checks failed to confirm reports that the kidnapers had broadcast a threat to kill the three officers unless two Irgun members now under sentence of death have their sentences commuted to life imprisonment. The reports circulated widely throughout Jerusalem, but there was no evidence that such a broadcast had been made.

One military officer remarked, however: "It can be assumed they meant business or they wouldn't have kidnapped officers in the first place."

A high ranking official said negotiations with the underground had been attempted through intermediaries, but that none was in progress now.

Proposed Repair In House Chamber Delayed Until 1947

WASHINGTON, June 25—(P)—It looks as if members of the house will have to wait at least another year before they'll be free from the steel spider web that has been keeping the roof off their heads.

In a report today, the special committee on the proposed reconstruction of the house chamber approved the architects' plans but also agreed that the work should be put off until July, 1947, because of labor and materials shortages.

Members will have two weeks to look over the plans and voice their views.

The report disclosed that the long-pending construction, which will include improved seating, flooring, lighting, air conditioning and acoustics, will—like so many other things—cost a lot more than when first considered. David Lynn, architect of the capitol, told the committee that the original authorization to do over both the house and senate will have to be substantially increased above the present \$1,446,000.

Plans for the senate chamber have been approved by a senate committee, which also recommended that the work be postponed.

The house plans envisage a chamber reflecting an early American atmosphere but with numerous modern conveniences. Representatives can console themselves with that thought when they raise their eyes and contemplate the present unattractive network of steel girders above their heads, sharing up the chamber's ceiling.

Navy Wants Men Who Pass Eddy Test

Men who previously passed the Eddy test and were not taken for electronic training are being urged to investigate opportunities offered by the navy now.

Ex-army, marine corps and coast guard personnel who can pass the Eddy test will be entered in elementary electrician and radio material school for a 20-week course. Those completing successfully will be sent to a 28-week advanced radio material school.

Those with previous military experience are enlisted as seamen first class with probable advancement to first class petty officer on completion of training.

Men without previous military experience are enlisted as apprentice seamen with chance for rapid advancement. Enlistments vary from two to six years, at the option of the man concerned. (More details can be had from the navy recruiting office in Dallas.)

Officer Specialists May Now Reenlist

Certain officer specialists who were discharged from the army now may request recall to active duty with the army air forces, it has been announced.

Vacancies exist in 88 different military occupational specialties, including such general fields as engineer, medical department, finance, legal, weather, communications, radar, statistical control, ordnance, armament, aircraft warning, food service, photo mapping and photo interpretation, transportation, automotive maintenance and repair, chemical and other technical fields.

Reserve and national guard officers possessing these skills can request return to active duty by writing the adjutant general, Washington 25, D. C., for WD AGO form 01066, application for extended active duty. Those not in the reserve must first apply for and accept a reserve commission before requesting a recall to active duty.

Ex-GI's Entering Salvation Army

Nineteen former combat soldiers are among those who will be commissioned as Salvation Army officers this month.

The former GIs who exchanged their guns for Bibles, represent 14 per cent of the 136 new SA officers. Commissioners of the four territories of the United States anticipate a much larger per cent in the classes enrolling in the autumn. Among those graduating, it was a frequent observation that their war experience would be helpful, "because, at the start of our career, we know there are many people who worship God in many different ways."

Track Gets Acid Test In San Antonio This Week As NAAU Meet Is Unreel

DALLAS, June 25. (AP)—Track, a sport that has to depend upon friends and relatives of the participants for whatever patronage it may receive in Texas, gets the acid test this week.

Friday and Saturday at San Antonio they stage the National AAU meet. It's the greatest show of the year for the boys in the spiked shoes and skimp pants. If this cinder path carnival doesn't attract a paying crowd, those who have continued to predict in the face of a few hundred in the stands that track eventually will occupy a high place might as well forget the whole thing.

There are several reasons why track has never caught on in Texas. Too much of a meet goes on away from the crowd; folks don't know what they're doing down in the corner of the field where the boys heave the shot and discus; they can't see what the jumpers are aiming at; half the time they don't know who's running. Track needs a hallyhoo man as football and baseball. It also needs to be tighter-knit; that is, it shouldn't be a seven-ring circus but a one-event-at-a-time affair with the crowd in on it—told who's going to do what.

On the other hand, track is one of the oldest of sports, is conceded to be one of the finest physical developments of all athletics, is inexpensive and is a sport in which the individual is on his own. He gets no help and what he wins is a matter of personal sacrifice in training rigidly and living right.

Veteran baseball men fear their game has run into a Frankenstein. They are worried about beer. Beer has been a booster to baseball attendance but it now is becoming too much of a booster to beer attendance alone, they say. For some reason they always have this brew at the ball park no matter how scarce it may be in other parts of town. So the beer drinkers hie themselves out to the diamond orchard and tank up on their favorite beverage, with baseball incidental.

Too much beer on a hot afternoon or night makes some folks cantankerous. They annoy people thereabouts and they heap insults on players and umpires. Texas league officials are concerned. They fear incidents that will hurt baseball. There has been the suggestion that the parks ban selling beer after the fifth inning of a game. A fellow can't drink too much of it in that time, it is pointed out.

Beer Price Hiked A Cent A Bottle

WASHINGTON, June 25. (AP) — The high cost of living hit beer today. OPA approved a retail price hike of a cent a bottle for the brew.

The increase amounts to 24 cents per case of 12 ounce bottles—if you can coax a dealer into selling a case.

Draught beer prices are unchanged, however, OPA said, because "the increase per glass is too small to reflect 1 cent."

But for brewers the agency granted an interim increase of \$1.27 a barrel.

The action is intended to cover price increases on grains and malts, ordered as part of the 'a-mine emergency program to stimulate grain production, and also to compensate for the reduced volume of brewing which results from the 30 per cent cut in malt beverages ordered by the agriculture department.

OPA announced it was surveying the actual cost increases in the 155 major breweries concerned. Today's increase will protect the industry from hardship pending completion of the survey and the final price determination, the agency said.

Sino-Peace Unit Near Agreement

NANKING, June 25. (AP) — China's peace committee, reportedly in agreement on two of three all-important issues, tackled the difficult question today of mending government and Communist troops into one army.

An informed Chinese source said that General Marshall, Gen. Hsu Yung-Chang and Gen. Chou En-Lai — the US, the Chinese government and the Communist negotiators — had reached agreement on means of ending hostilities and restoring shattered communications.

Still unsettled was the Army reorganization question, toughest of the lot, and the committee was expected to exchange views on the matter today before resuming formal discussions tomorrow.

The Chinese source said the Communists were ready to sign papers now for ending hostilities and restoring communications but the government wanted everything wrapped up in a single pact. The current truce ends June 30.

Blount Campaigns In Home County

R. E. (Peppy) Blount, Big Spring, is bringing his campaign for representative of the 91st legislative district to his home county this week.

For most of the past month Blount has been in the south end of the district, making contacts at San Angelo, Meridian, Big Lake, Sterling City, and Garden City.

He has been campaigning actively only since June 1, when he left his studies at the University of Texas, for the summer months. Blount, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph E. Blount, Sr., is widely known here, having been a popular athlete and student before he entered the army and became a combat pilot.

Russian Sought For Shooting GI's

VIENNA, June 25. (AP) — Russian and American investigators, working in close cooperation, were near to a solution today of the shooting of two American military policemen Saturday night.

The Americans, both recovering in an army hospital, were shot when they attempted to stop a stolen American jeep in which three Russian soldiers were riding.

Russian police and investigators have worked with the American provost marshal on the case from the beginning. A number of Russians were still under questioning today and one of the occupants of the stolen jeep was in custody.

A Russian lieutenant was shot while resisting arrest by American military policemen ordered to pick up suspects in the case. He was in serious condition with a bullet wound in the stomach. The two Americans were shot when they pulled their jeep beside the stolen jeep. A Russian reached out and fired at close range, hitting both soldiers in the face.

Giant Tarpon Taken

GALVESTON, June 25. (AP) — Largest entrant in the Greater Galveston Beach Association fishing contest so far is a six foot, three inch tarpon, weighing 125 pounds.

The fish was taken Sunday by E. E. Dillen of Houston after a battle of one hour and 15 minutes.

Mihailovic Accuses Witnesses Of Selling Prisoners To Nazis

BELGRADE, June 25. (AP) — Gen. Draza Mihailovic, on trial for his life on charges of treason and collaboration, dramatically accused today of selling captured Partisans to the Germans.

The witness—a husky, 50-year-old Chetnik named Yovan Skavonic—had testified that the bearded Chetnik leader ordered him in 1941 to hand over 365 captured Partisan fighters to the Germans. "You didn't hand them over," Mihailovic shouted. "You sold them!"

Skavonic's testimony to the military court hearing the case was that his orders to hand over the captured Partisans had come, through his immediate superior, from "the supreme commander, Draza Mihailovic."

He said the group of 365 Partisans was delivered to the Nazis in November, 1941.

"And what happened to these Partisans?" the court president asked.

"I heard later they all were shot," Skavonic replied.

Listening To Dog After Rugs Gone

WASHINGTON, June 25. (AP) — The next time GI Joe, a Boston bull terrier, barks in the middle of the night, his owner will get out of bed and see what the trouble is. Several months ago, GI Joe barked a warning but Earl Goodwin, living in a downtown residential district, sleepily threw a shoe at him. The next morning Goodwin discovered that thieves had stolen two mattresses and two small rugs.

The same thing happened last night. This time Goodwin's living room rug was taken.

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Revision Suggested

COLUMBUS, Ohio, June 25. (AP) — Assistant Secretary of War Howard C. Petersen said today the whole basis of German occupation plans will have to be revised radically unless the allied powers end their haggling at Berlin.

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Warning Rather Than A Trend

Various interpretations are being placed on the victory by Sen. Hugh Butler over Gov. Dwight Griswold for the republican senatorial nomination from Nebraska.

Sen. Butler has an extensive isolationist record, whereas Gov. Griswold carried the blessing of Harold E. Stassen, a liberal, internationalist GOP presidential prospect. Thus, one of the immediate meanings written into Sen. Butler's nomination is that isolationism is rising again, particularly in the agricultural mid-west. This may be true, although some observers count the development as a warning rather than a trend.

There are some other factors, too, which might have entered into the victory. For one thing Sen. Butler enjoyed some advantage from being in the saddle. He also was asking for a second term nomination, which has certain psychological advantages in this

country where there is occasionally a feeling about the second term. Further, Sen. Butler enjoys a good degree of personal popularity, whereas Gov. Griswold had offended several groups in matters not pertaining to the senatorial race but an alienation nevertheless.

A warning has been sounded that the old guard GOP would try to capitalize upon the Butler victory. If this should happen, it would prejudice the Republican party on a national scale, for although there undoubtedly is localized and scattered isolationism sentiment, it is in the minority. At the moment the Republican party faces the brightest prospects in many years, but if it should let its old guard leadership seize control and tout a nationalistic horn, chances of the party in 1916 elections and the 1948 presidential campaign could be dealt a sharp blow.

Nobody Gains During Inflation

Granting of a six per cent rate increase to the railroads is one of those compromises which really settles nothing. The increase was made on the basis of increased operating costs, but the least of which is represented in rising labor rates.

Thus, we have a picture of the cycle in a complete revolution. Costs go up including wages. Then prices go up to make possible funds for meeting these costs.

But while this is happening on the railroads, it also is happening in the automotive, electrical steel, coal and many other basic industries. In this way, wage increases become fictitious. It is the same old story, in an inflationary spiral, they never keep up with costs and prices.

Apparently, nobody is gaining ground. You just don't gain in inflation.

Hobbs Bill Has Chance To Be Law

WASHINGTON, (AP) — Of all the legislation battered around by Congress this year to restrict certain union activities, the Hobbs bill has the best chance of becoming law.

This bill — called an anti-racketeering bill — has had a strange history. It is an amendment to an old law.

The Supreme Court several years ago pointed out a loophole in that old law and now Congress has decided to plug the hole.

The bill now is on President Truman's desk for him to sign into law or to veto.

(The Hobbs bill doesn't apply only to racketeering attempts by unions but to anyone making such a try.)

There's talk that Mr. Truman will let the Hobbs bill become law. But this is not certain.

In 1934 Congress passed an anti-racketeering law making it a crime for anyone to obtain money from anyone by robbery or extortion, that is, through threats of force or violence.

This applied only to goods in interstate commerce. For example: Jones, a New Jersey farmer, used to drive his truckload of vegetables to the New York market across the state line, that put him in interstate commerce.

But a group of New York union truck drivers stopped Jones. They told him: "All the New York truck drivers belong to our union. If you want to drive into

New York with your truck, you'll have to do this:

"Give us \$10 every time you come in. One of our drivers will drive your truck into New York to the market and drive it out again. Or, if you want to drive it yourself, you can, if you give us the \$10 anyway."

If Jones didn't come across with his \$10, he might be beaten up or his truck might be dumped into the river. Eventually, something like that happened. And a number of New York union truck drivers were arrested.

They were convicted in federal court of violating the 1934 Anti-Racketeering Act. When the men appealed to the Supreme Court in 1942 that court freed them because of a technicality in the law.

In 1943 Rep. Sam Hobbs, Alabama Democrat, got the House to pass a bill to tighten up the 1934 law.

But the bill went to the Senate which let it die without voting on it.

A few weeks ago, only because of the strikes, Congress passed the Case bill. The Hobbs amendment to the 1934 anti-racketeering law was made part of the Case bill.

Few Solons Follow Atomic Meet

WASHINGTON—Atomic energy will probably affect the nation more than any other modern development, yet when the House Military Affairs committee debated its control, many Democratic members did not even bother to be present. Furthermore, the committee debate was held in strict secrecy. The American people, whose lives will be affected, had no chance to know what was going on.

However, the column is able to publish a few of the details of what happened behind closed doors.

Congressmen who led the drive to reinstate brass hats on the atomic energy control board were: Republicans Charles H. Eason of Cincinnati, O., Parnell Thomas of northern New Jersey, Forest A. Harness of Kokomo, Ind., Leslie C. Arends of the Illinois Corn Belt, with some support from Democratic militarist Robert R. Sykes of West Florida.

The Senate, after weeks of debate and careful scrutiny, had barred military men from the atomic control board. The White House and the war department agreed. But the above gentlemen (with sub rosa encouragement from the army) ruled that at least two army men be on the board which will rule on the future fate of atomic energy.

Barking Congressman Thomas of New Jersey did most of the talking. He would not even consent to the reading of the senate atom bill without constantly heckling Democratic Representative Chet Holifield of California, who tried to read the bill out loud to the committee. Finally, Holifield stopped altogether.

"I refuse to continue in view of the lack of courtesy shown by some of the members of the other side," he said, referring to the GOP members of the committee.

When the committee convened next day, however, Thomas had changed his tactics somewhat and asked Holifield to continue reading the senate bill.

One Republican, who did not seem to agree with his colleagues, was representative Thomas E. Martin of Iowa City, Ia. He introduced an amendment limiting the number of military men on the atomic commission to two. This, he explained, was to make certain that no more than two were appointed.

Another Republican, J. Leroy Johnson of Stockton, Cal., ended by voting against his colleagues, while house minority whip Arends was careful to record the proxies of Clare Boothe Luce of Connecticut and Walter G. Andrews of New York as being against military control of the atom.

NOTE — Chairman Andrew J. May of Kentucky, great friend of the brass hats, voted the proxies of three absent Democrats in favor of the army: Arthur Winstead of Mississippi, Carl T. Durham of North Carolina, and Paul Stewart of Oklahoma.

made by the Louisville Courier Journal's Mark Ethridge, is still marked "strictly confidential." One section which has leaked out, however, tells of the refusal of Balkan printers to set type for newspaper editorials with which they disagreed. Ethridge cited this as a new type of labor censorship of freedom of the press.

Meanwhile, in the USA, the Indianapolis Star informed the St. Petersburg Times that it was unable to get its printers to set up an advertisement recruiting printers for St. Petersburg. The St. Pete Times was involved in a printers' strike and Indianapolis printers balked at setting up an ad which might help break the strike.

The St. Petersburg case has many ramifications, and the hearings on it, now taking place in Florida, may make it one of the most significant labor cases in the country.

The St. Petersburg Times is published by one of the most pro-labor men in the country, Nelson Poynter, who fought for labor's right to bargain even in the days before Roosevelt, and who has vigorously opposed the Florida anti-closed shop amendment. On the other side of the picket line is Woodruff Randolph, head of the International Typographical Union, sometimes called the Petrillo of the printing trades.

The issue is not wages but so-called "made-work." In the same way Petrillo has demanded that the small Chicago radio station WAAF hire three additional music librarians at \$60 a week when it only needs one, so Randolph demands that newspapers set up the type for afternoon newspaper ads, even though the same ads already have run in the morning paper. The extra ad, after being set up, is then thrown into the melting pot.

This duplication of work in order to increase printers' payrolls is one reason why small independent newspapers have difficulty staying in business. Only way they can compete with big city papers is to adopt streamlined methods, and the Petrillo of the printing trade blocks the way.

Picket Line Ignored

Publisher Poynter ran into this road block last November when he wanted an arbitration clause in a new contract permitting the discussion of "made-work." Czar Randolph replied that such things were not arbitrable. A strike followed.

Publisher Poynter, however,

continued to publish. He used photoengraving instead of linotypes and struggled along without printers. More than seven months have now passed and his printers are still on strike, though A. F. of L. pressmen and stereotypers have not only worked but crossed picket lines under instruction from their international unions.

Poynter, however, made one mistake which now has brought the national labor relations board—an organization which he enthusiastically supported—on his neck.

During the strike, the St. Petersburg Times merged its mechanical work with the St. Petersburg Independent, forming a new company. And during a talk with the striking printers in January, two months after the strike started, Poynter remarked that he was under no obligation to bargain with them because the new company had replaced the old.

Because of this remark the NLRB has cracked down on the St. Petersburg Times, charging that Poynter has refused to bargain. The NLRB regional head in Atlanta who ordered the crack-down is Paul Styles, a former member of the International Typographers union and a close friend of printer czar Randolph.

Hearings are now being held in Florida. Outcome of the case will influence the future of "made-work" in the printing industry and, most important of all, whether small independent newspapers can stay in business.

Prussian Junkers Lose Land

Robert Murphy, political adviser to General McNarney in Berlin and the man who played ball with the Vichies, has secretly sent a bitter complaint to the state department because the Russians have redistributed the estates of the Prussian Junkers in the Soviet zone of Germany. The Russians have broken up some 10,000 large estates among about 275,000 peasants. Despite the fact that the Potsdam agreement specifically called for breaking up large estates, Murphy has warned Washington that this land reform in the Russian zone is endangering the western type of democracy we want to see in Germany. Personal Claims May Be Paid Prisoners Of Japs

WASHINGTON, June 25. (AP)—Former prisoners of war who want personal reparations from the Japanese or German governments were told by the Navy today to get in line. But when and how they might be paid is admittedly hazy.

All Navy or former Navy personnel or relatives of dead prisoners desiring to file claims against enemy governments for "personal injuries or death due to mistreatment or other violation" of the Geneva convention were instructed to send detailed affidavits to the claims section (POW claims), office of the Judge Advocate General, Navy Department, Washington, D. C.

There is no law at present under which claims could be presented or paid, but the State Department is studying the legal angles, the Navy added.

American Girls Making Debuts At Wimbledon

LONDON, June 25.—(AP)—Pauline Betz of Los Angeles makes her debut in the Wimbledon lawn tennis championships today as the international tennis tourney swings into its second day of play with 80 matches on the program.

For the men, however, this was a partial day off. Only a dozen singles matches, rained out on opening day, were scheduled to be played. All eight seeded stars, among them Jack Kramer of Los Angeles, the top US hope, meanwhile were safely in the second round, and today's card called for them to engage only in doubles.

Miss Betz, seeded No. 1 in the women's field after leading the American team to its successful and sweeping defense of the Wimbledon cup, is a heavy favorite to win the title in what shapes up as an all-American final. Her first opponent is a Belgian woman who had a considerable reputation in European competition a dozen years ago, Mrs. Josane de Meulemeester-Zigart, who shared

in the Wimbledon doubles crown in 1932.

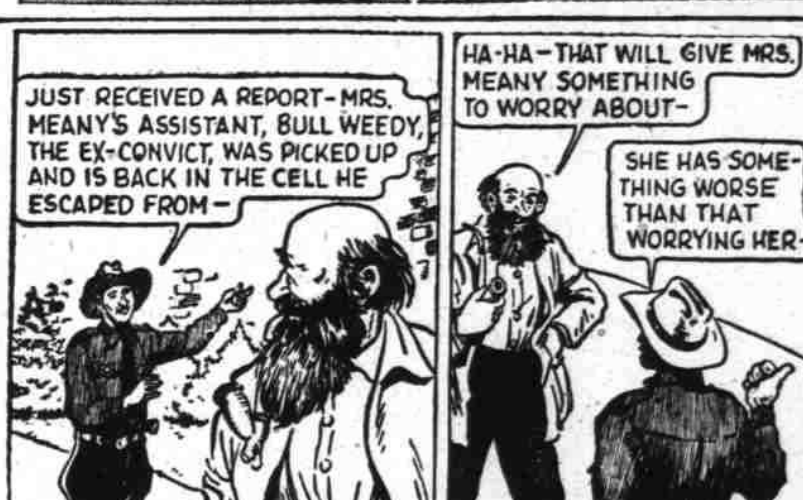

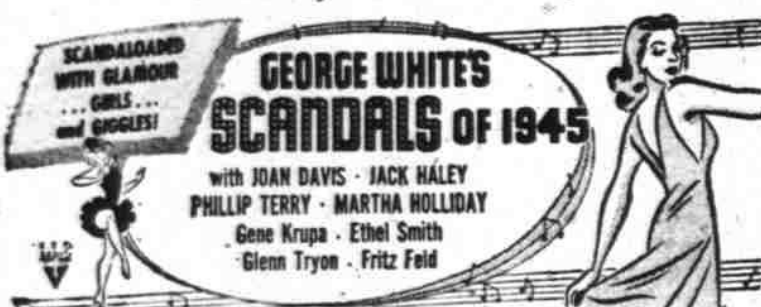

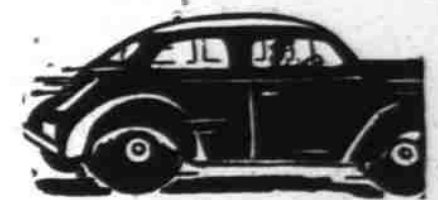
