WELL, the final chapter to the primary elections was written last Saturday. This scribbler, outside of two or three candidates, got all he shot at, and those that were not our choice and were elected, are just as much our official as yours. Now, let's all get behind the officials that were elected and give them our best co-operation, that you and I may have the very best government possible.

The Reporter has "kept the hands off" policy in the support of any candidate in the race, be he either an aspirant to state, county or precinct. Tough as we were to back a favorite candidate because of his intimacy of friendship and his ample qualifications to discharge the duties of the office, we held our tongue and allowed the "chips to fall where they may." Our reason for this is that the Reporter is a small community newspaper—it depends upon the support of the individual citizen from the boot-black to the capitalist, and to fling its support to any individual candidate would be to use the newspaper as a cudgel to "slam over the head of local persons who hold a different view as to our choice candidate.

One of the bandits emptied a shotgun into the radiator of the sheriff's car, causing it to leak water so badly that he had to drive into Seymour to get another. Securing his deputy the sheriff resumed the chase with the result the robbers were captured as well as all of the loot. Upon the heels of the capture the Baylor county sheriff was notified he had been appointed deputy U. S. Marshall, to serve in the Fort Worth district.

Dick McCarty who was escorted to Newcastle, Young county, by two of the prettiest young ladies in Albany. The occasion was the old settlers reunion and Col. that lined the street and obscured the view of the motorist as he approached the intersection. Jack suggested that for the sake of safety to motorists, the trees be cut down. Our visit to Pecos revealed these salt cedars added much to the beauty of the street and they presented about the only greenery growing around about. We would suggest that the street be moved and the motorist travel be put on another street before allowing the trees to be destroyed, or that safety signals be placed at the intersection. The mesquite and the salt cedar retain their green foliage no matter the severity of a drought.

Stanton has suffered the "woodman's ax" through the destruction of mesquite trees on vacant lots—the very tree that by nature was placed in this country to withstand the severest drought and at the same time bear an innumerable amount of food to provide food for livestock when the grass was dried out. The drier the year more prolific grows the mesquite bean. While not a shade tree in the general sense, yet the meager shade they offer on hot days is sought by cattle and sheep on the ranges, which is evident they derive benefit

"Mesquite trees on the roadside furnish honey for the bees, a toothpick for the man who has eaten and leaves with a content almost like alfalfa for sheep and cattle that are hungry."

Stolen. Yet there are towns in West Texas that are so short-sighted they allow the natural growth of mesquite to be cut down instead of cultivating and conserving it; the vacant lots in Stanton were covered with a growth of mesquite which by their greenness rested the eyes if they had been of no other good; these were chopped down to reveal the unsightly holes from which they were taken and all the old tin cans, bed springs and whatnot that had been dumped there.

Glance to your right on the road to Midland or to the left on the road to Big Spring and you find your eyes rested by a vista of green, nothing more than little scrubby mesquite, but being the natural growth of this country certainly deserve their place in the sun.

There has always been something quite human about the mesquite—they have sense enough to wait until winter is truly over before putting out their leaves.

Bureau Gives Final Report For Primary

The Texas Election bureau's final tabulation of the returns from last Saturday's democratic run-off primary, announced, showed that James V. Allred led Tom F. Hunter by 44,346 votes for the gubernatorial nomination, on the face of returns from 252 out of the state's 254 counties with 211 complete.

The final count represented a total vote of 943,746 and the bureau estimated that approximately 12,000 votes remained untallied in the unofficial count.

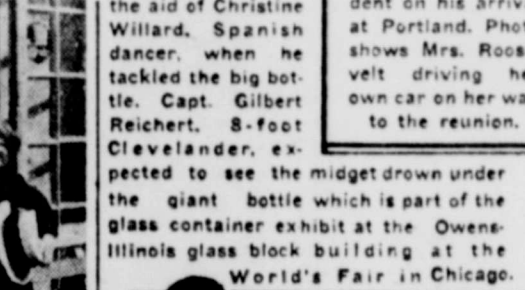

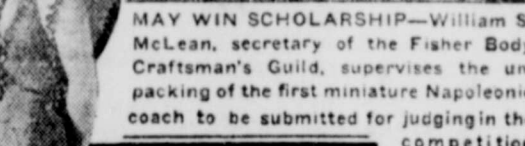

DOVE AND CHICKEN SEASON OPENS HERE FIRST OF SEPT.

Doves are more plentiful in the sandhills region south and west of here than in any other part of this country, while the prairie chickens are to be found in the counties north of here. Many hunters come annually from great distances for the four-and-a-half day season. The season for shooting mourning doves begins Sept. 1 and closes Oct. 31.

The open season on prairie chickens or pinnated grouse for both zones is Sept. 1 to Sept. 4, both days inclusive. The bag limit is 10 a day.

The quail and chachalacas season for both zones is Dec. 1 to Jan. 16, both days inclusive. The bag limit is 12 a day and not more than 36 week. Midland county is closed until 1938, as are Gaines and Andrews counties; Glasscock, Borden and Archer counties until 1936.

The open season on white tail deer Nov. 16 to Dec. 31; black tail deer, east of Pecos River, Nov. 16 to Nov. 30. The bag limit is two bucks a season, except black tail or mule deer; west of Pecos only one a season.—Odessa News-Times.
