Cross Plains Carrier Is Transferred To McAdoo

Ollie Bailey, for nearly a quarter-century a citizen of McAdoo, and for about 19 years carrying rural people their mail out of that place, has traded his post for a similar place at Cross Plains. He and Mrs. Bailey left Saturday for their new home.

Ollie began carrying the mail out at McAdoo soon after the close of the World War, and has been at it since. The trade of routes was with M. C. Baum, who transfers to McAdoo.

28 Years Service

The Cross Plains Review says that "More than 28 years of carrying the mail on Cross Plains route two will end for M. C. Baum Saturday. He will take over similar duties at McAdoo Monday, replacing Ollie B. Bailey, who is coming here to succeed him on the local route."

Mr. Baum started carrying the mail here June 1, 1911. Except for a short time spent in the army during the World War, his span of service has been uninterrupted. Only two patrons to whom Mr. Baum delivered mail that first day are still on his route. They: Noah Johnson and J. H. Rone.

"I am deeply thankful to the patrons of route two for the fine cooperation they have accorded me throughout the years, and I would feel ungrateful should I fail to make this expression before surrendering my duties in Cross Plains. I hope that my successor may likewise be favored with your continued kindness and friendship," Mr. Baum told the Review Wednesday afternoon.

M. C. Baum is a brother of Mrs. Ann McClure of The Texas Spur, and has visited in Spur a number of times during the past 28 years that he has been serving the Cross Plains people.

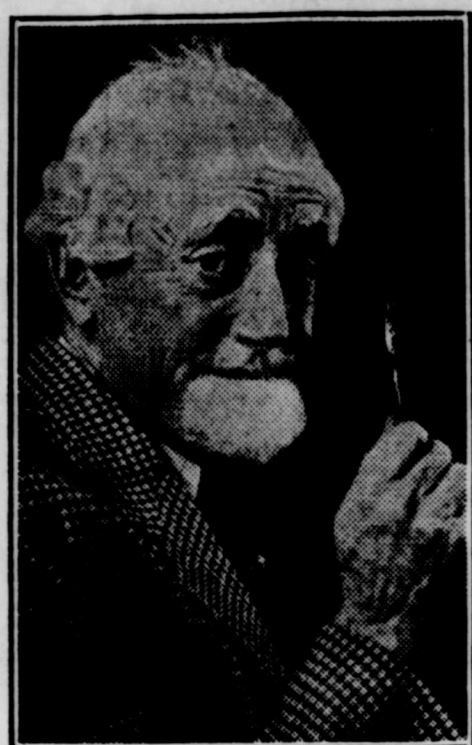

Drivers' Licenses To Be Stamped Oct. 12 - 13

Sheriff Johnnie Koonsman announced here yesterday that he would establish temporary offices at the City Hall in Spur on Thursday and Friday of next week, October 12 and 13, to stamp drivers' licenses, making them valid for use on Texas Highways for the coming two years.

The impression with some people, Koonsman stated, was that licenses would not have to be stamped unless a driver was leaving the state, but he stated that there was no material difference. If you are going to drive a car anywhere the requirement would be the same. In other words, licenses must be stamped to designate renewal—and it might not prove especially profitable if caught on the highways by a motor-cop without renewal after a given period.

If you drive a motor vehicle and don't have a driver's license issued to you that reads "expires in 1942," and it would have been issued to you the past few weeks to read that way, it is advisable to get your license stamped for protection.

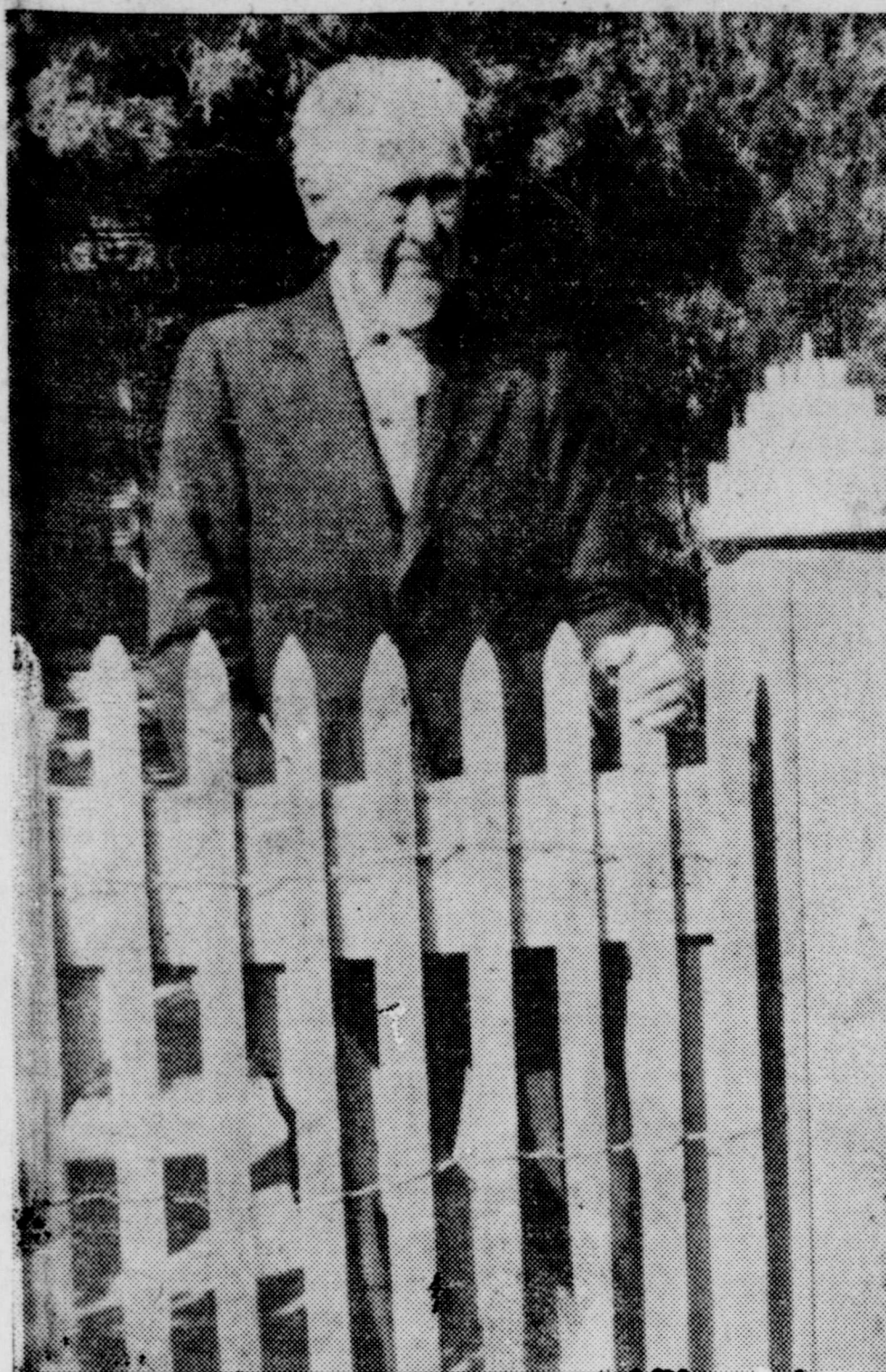

Varied Career Of Plantation Son, Civil War Vet, Buffalo Hunter Recounted

Perhaps there are exceptions to the scientists' time evaluation that a human life as compared to the ages is but ten seconds. Maybe there is an occasional eleven- or twelve-second existence that dodges the general average.

On this October 5th, 1939, J. W. Blackwell can glance backward over 105 pages of history, each representing a year, and in most instances rather accurately—of course to that point when a child is ordained to appoint the memory with records.

To most of us a century plus five years reaches back into a far-flung day that only history books "know about," outside the realm of realities, memories that exist only in bookshelves. The 5th of October, 1834, is a distant era. Arkansas, land of Mr. Blackwell's birth, was then a territory. Texas was yet the subject of Mexico, and Andrew Jackson, seventh president of the United States, was in office. The stars "fell" the year previous, and time has already begun the process of tinting the last vestige of its reality with the paler hues of myth.

Longevity has marched with the Blackwell family; and there has been also for this member a life in the open. When but a boy, son of a plantation owner, he fostered the task of keeping the family and numerous slaves supplied with venison—using one of those flintlocks so common in that day. At the age of 27 years, a marksman of well known quality, he was drawn into the ranks of the Southern Army of the Civil War, serving on the Texas and Louisiana coasts. City Bonds Sold To A Dallas Firm

Officials of the City of Spur announced here yesterday that the bonds recently voted to finance the proposed butane gas system for Spur have been sold to Crummer & Company, a Dallas firm. The issue was for \$20,000.

Construction of the gas system, it was estimated, will begin about the 10th of October, or as soon thereafter as the material arrives if the above date could not be met. Nearly two months will be required to complete the installation of the plant for the City, which would throw the completion date, if schedule is made, around the last of November.

Until the system is ready for use, officials stated, the City of Spur intends to furnish small drums of gas for those who want to use gas and who have their homes piped for tie-in to the city line. The customer will not have to pay for the drums, the report stated; they will be furnished by the City.

In commenting on construction of the plant, officials stated that the project will provide work for about 75 men, or would total \$8,500.00 in salaries during construction.

Mrs. J. N. Carson Dies Saturday In Abilene

Mrs. J. N. Carson, 77, mother of J. P. Carson of Spur, died Saturday morning, September 30, at her home in Abilene, death caused by double pneumonia that physicians stated developed after an injury received about three weeks ago.

In an accidental fall Mrs. Carson suffered a broken leg, and although for some time had shown some improvement, pneumonia was described as direct result of the injury.

Funeral services were conducted at the family home in Abilene Sunday afternoon, 5:00 o'clock, with Rev. Long, pastor of St. Paul's Methodist Church, officiating. Interment was made in an Abilene cemetery.

Just prior to Mrs. Carson's fall, the same morning her daughter, Miss Eunice Carson, had left on a vacation trip for Alaska, and contact could not be made with her until she arrived at her destination. When the message was delivered, however, Miss Carson took a plane for home, arriving in Abilene on Wednesday before her mother's death on Saturday.

Surviving are the husband, two sons, J. P. Carson, of Spur, and E. O. Carson, of Merkel; three daughters, Mrs. Fred King, Odessa; Mrs. J. L. Heathly, Houston, and Miss Eunice Carson.

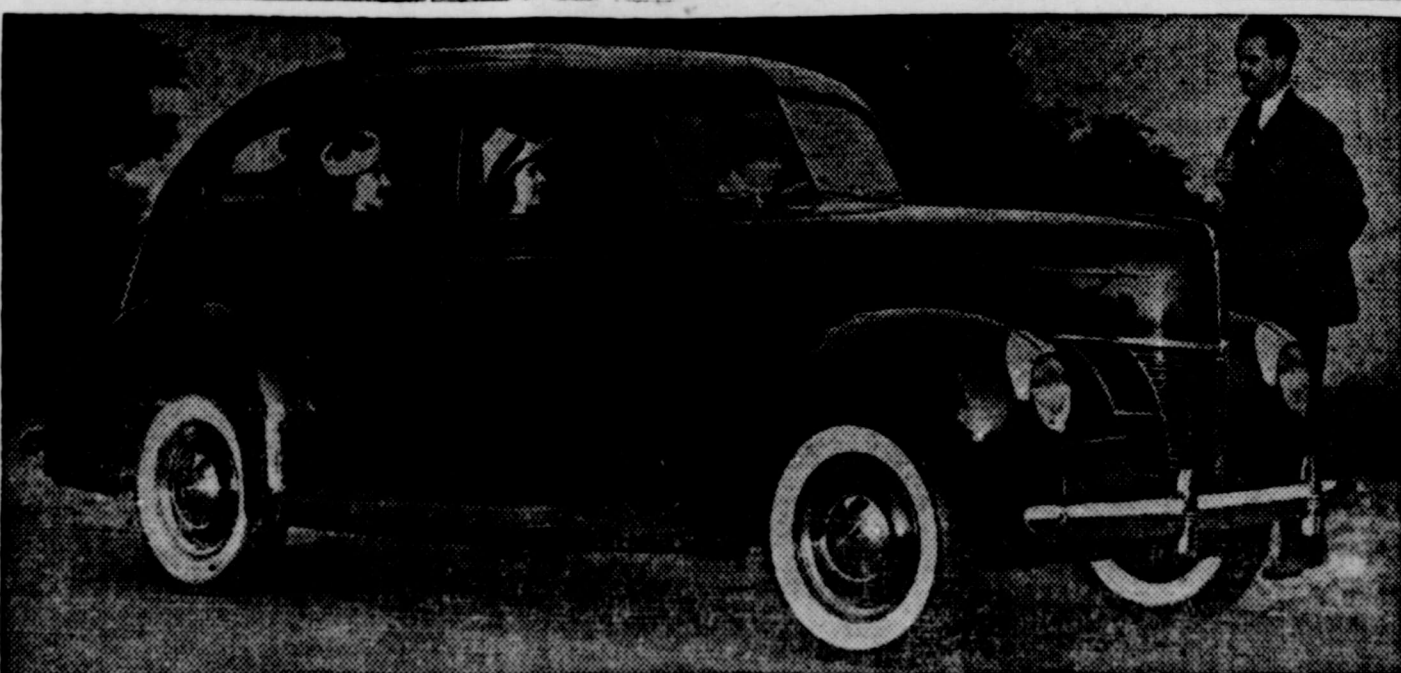
