

Claim West Texas Directly Affected By Foreign Trade

Department Of Commerce In Move For Representation Of Lubbock In Convention In Houston

West Texas and the Panhandle are as much concerned with foreign trade as the ports handling the traffic. Sherwood H. Avery, of Dallas, district manager of the United States department of commerce, bureau of foreign and domestic commerce states in a letter to the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, urging that Lubbock be represented at the annual foreign trade convention which meets at Houston, April 24 and 25.

Foreign exportation from our Texas ports, amounted to more than \$600,000,000 and valued at approximately \$800,000,000, is going out annually, the letter states.

Exports to the Latin American countries have increased over 500 per cent since 1914.

"At the convention there will be practical experts of long experience on the program and available for conference work," the letter states. There will be speakers of international note and reputation, bankers and business men of known ability, as well as trade advisers and technical experts well versed in practically every phase of foreign trade.

Contact Object. "While the facilities offered for entertainment seem ample, that phase is not to be stressed. The object of the convention is the value in dollars and cents it will be worth to the business firms attending. The worth-while contacts made in a business way, and the knowledge gained to be applied in a practical way are the real objects of the convention."

PROPOSAL OKEHED

Modification Of Tariff Amendment Approved

WASHINGTON, March 17. (AP)—The senate today approved a proposed modification of the Oddie hide, leather and shoe tariff amendment to cut from 17 1/2 to 10 per cent the rate carried in the amendment on goat and kid leather.

The vote was 42 to 33 for the 10 per cent rate suggested by Senator Walsh, democratic, Massachusetts.

This was the first of nine attempts to modify the Oddie proposal to prove successful.

The Oddie amendment itself has yet to be voted upon.

Prompt Attention Asked In Census

Director Writes Local C.-C. For Aid In Obtaining Of Manufacturers Schedules In Census Count

The importance of manufacturers giving prompt and careful attention to schedules in the census of manufacturers is stressed in a letter just received by the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce from W. M. Stewart, director of the census.

Stewart points out that it is important that the manufacturer understand that:

1. Delay of the reports hinders and slows up the compiling of the information for this section.

2. The reports will be held strictly confidential and the information contained there in will be used only in the issuing of the report.

3. The Census Bureau has called to its assistance a special advisory committee of business executives who have given unsparingly of their time and ability to make this census of manufacturers a business men's census. They have advised the bureau in regard to the questions that should be asked and those that should not be asked, in order that the filling out of the questionnaire will be as easy as possible for business men, and at the same time will develop the information of which business is most in need.

RESOLUTION OFFERED

Love Seeks Committee For Lobby Investigation

AUSTIN, March 17. (AP)—Senator Thomas B. Love of Dallas today reintroduced his resolution proposing an amendment to the rules of the senate to create a standing committee on legislative representation.

The new committee would have the powers and duties now being exercised by the lobby committee of the United States senate.

The group would be empowered to conduct an investigation for the purpose of ascertaining and informing the senate of the facts pertinent to the employment of compensation or service or methods or conduct of any legislative representative, agent or attorney, or firm, person or corporation, to influence legislation, including any contributions made to campaign funds.

Three-Way Fight Seen in Election

PITTSBURGH, March 17. (AP)—An intense three-way fight for control of Pennsylvania republican politics at the May primaries was in prospect today with the formal entry of Secretary of Labor James J. Davis into the race of the United States senatorial nomination.

Davis, assured of the backing of William S. Vare and the Philadelphia republican organization, announced his intention here last night of making the race.

Opposing him will be United States Senator Joseph R. Grundy, supported by Governor John S. Fisher who appointed him to the seat made vacant by the senate's refusal to seat Vare.

The third side of the fight for state control will be furnished through the race of Former Governor Gifford Pinchot for the republican gubernatorial nomination.

Pinchot will be opposed by Francis Shunk Brown, Philadelphia, aligned with Davis, and by Samuel S. Lewis, former state treasurer, popularly supposed to be coupled with Senator Grundy.

Seek Extradition Of Two Suspects

SAN ANTONIO, March 17. (AP)—District Attorney Lamar Seelgon today announced he would seek extradition through the state department of two men arrested at Mexico City and wanted here for swindling E. Miller, Minneapolis visitor, out of \$4,500. Indictments were returned here in February against William Henry, alias James Gray, George Livingston and John Sherman. The two men arrested in Mexico gave their names as Earl Franklin Lane and Henry Burke, but these were believed to be aliases.

Miller claimed two men approached him here on December 26, last and asked him to take a flyer in the stock market. Later, he claimed, he met them in Atlanta and advanced \$4,500. That was the last he heard of the men until their arrest in Mexico City. Miller claimed there was a third man in on the deal.

Predict Increase Of Construction

WASHINGTON, March 17. (AP)—Secretary Lamont said today that the lower interest rates on money throughout the country should permit an important speeding up during the next few months in new construction, which he said already had been stimulated by the "remarkable cooperation" from the various states.

The commerce secretary asserted the high interest rates during the

past year had been one of the major factors in slowing down construction, and added that while the rate had dropped in New York, easier money conditions have not yet reached throughout the country.

This condition could not be worked out in 24 hours, Mr. Lamont said, but the situation was gradually loosening and construction during the spring should be greatly aided by the easier money.

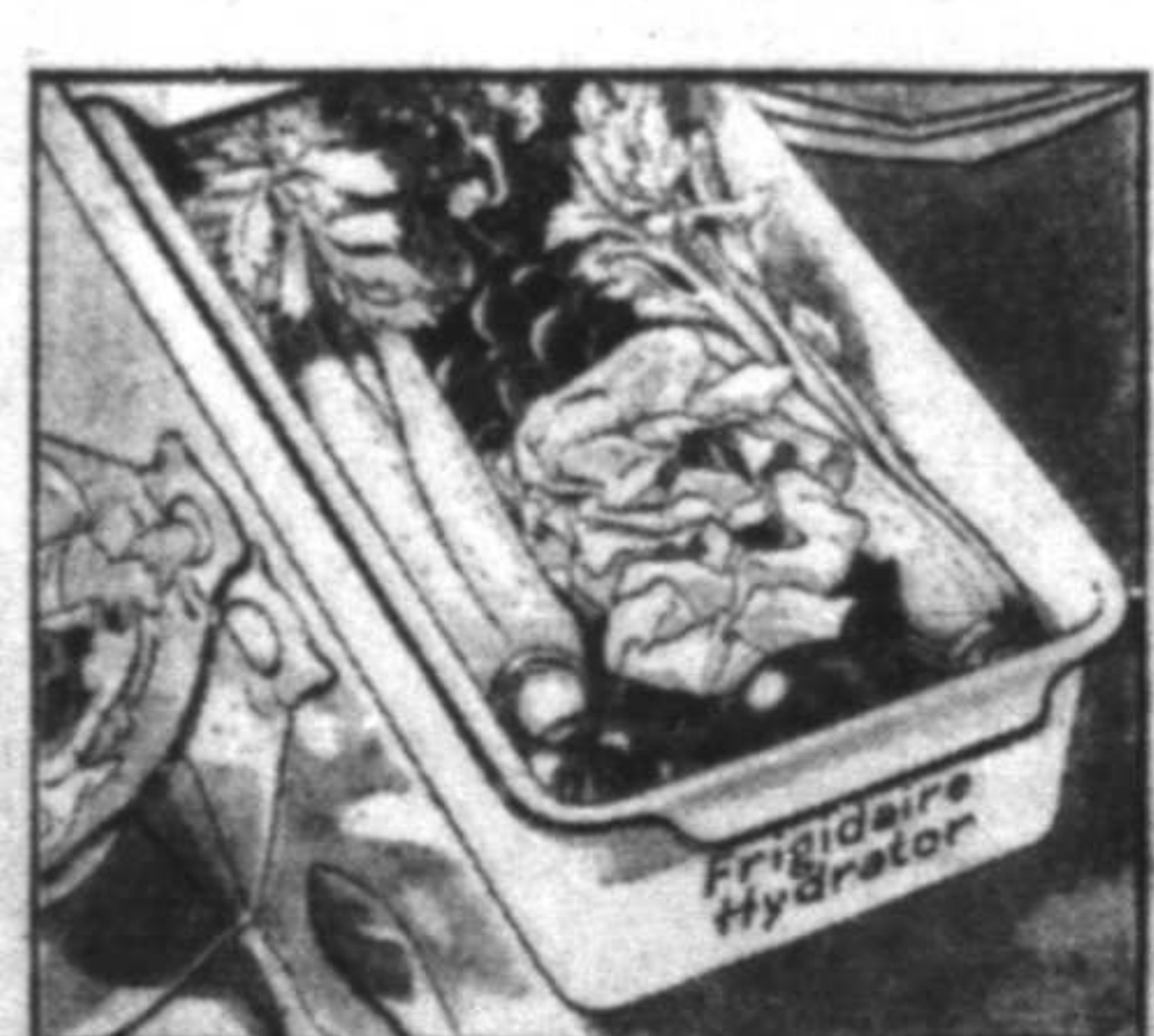

seed oil mill operators, cotton com-
press managers, bankers, business
men and farmers of the South
Plains territory around Plainview,
including Hale, Lamb, Swisher,
Floyd and Castro counties for the
purpose of discussing the cotton sit-
uation in this territory this year.
D. L. Jones, superintendent of the
state experiment station, at Lub-
bock, will be the principal speaker.
The meeting is being called and
sponsored by the Plainview Cham-
ber of Commerce and Agriculture.
A large attendance is expected as
there is considerable interest in the
cotton outlook for the Plains coun-
try this year.

both dairy animals and other stock.
The meeting will be held in the
Plainview municipal auditorium.

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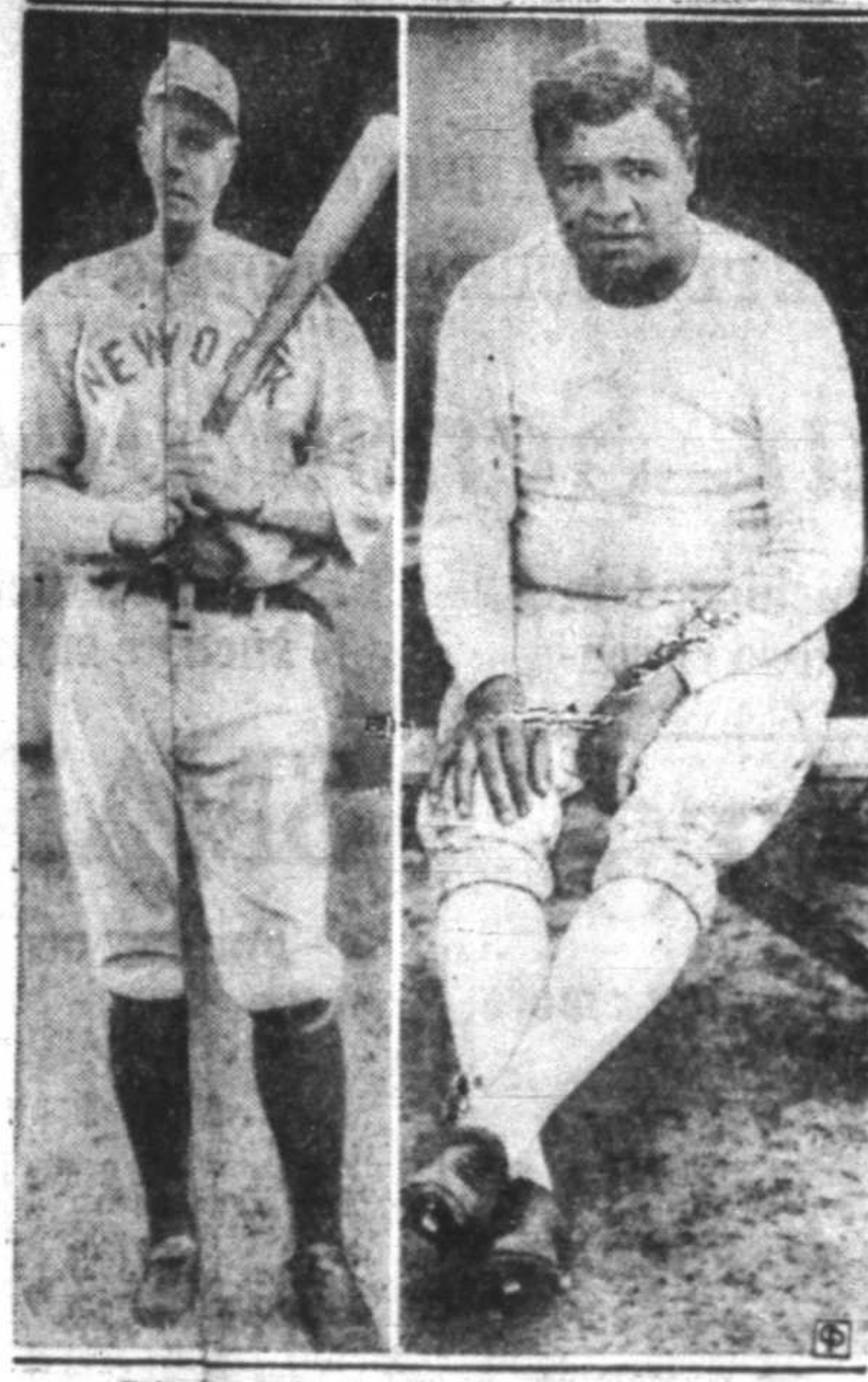

When high schools throw away mitts and sliding pads the action is more or less a farce. There are not to call "town baseball," as well as professional baseball in the larger, more closely populated sections.

If a boy is robbed of diamond training in early years he is not likely to become proficient in it in later years. He doesn't become baseball-minded, if you please, and if he doesn't become a participant he is not likely to become a fan.

The demand for baseball wanes with the number of players. All in all, the situation, as far as baseball men and enthusiasts are concerned, is becoming increasingly desperate.

Somewhere or another, The Morning Avalanche can hardly repress a tear at the apparent passing of a great game. Track, the other major spring sport, falls "way short of filling the bill as far as we are concerned.

As we intimated further up the column, it's a sad state of affairs—but there doesn't seem to be anything we can do about it.

RUTHLESS VON TIRPITZ

Admiral Von Tirpitz, master German naval strategist, is dead at the age of 80. He was a type of ruthless German militarist whose policies brought world-wide condemnation to his own head and all Germany.

Strict militarists everywhere hail him as a great man and so he was in the strict militaristic sense. It was he, who was responsible for the unfeeling submarine policy of Germany, a policy that came nearer to ending the war in Allied defeat than any persons knew. His objective was to break the blockade against his country and break it with submarines regardless of humanity or the so-called rules of refined warfare.

That policy more than any other thing brought the United States into the conflict and fastened Germany's defeat. He is credited with the order to sink ships without a trace, one of the extreme horrors of the naval phases of the World War.

Still like Von Hindenburg, he played his part as a German citizen of the republic, serving in the Reichstag, defending the government and living an orderly life. His ferocity was just a part of the huge military machine which eventually ground itself to pieces.

SIGNIFICANT INDUSTRIAL CHANGE

British industry is waking up at the call of necessity. Cotton, iron and steel, shipbuilding, coal—these industries are talking about what they call "rationalization," which, it appears, is nothing more than combination to absorb the inefficient small producers, to buy in larger quantities and therefore at lower prices, to manufacture in larger quantities at lower costs, and thus to be better able to compete in the markets of the world.

Evidently the British do not like the word "trust," as that term is commonly known in America; and of course the American "trust" is nothing more than a combination of the cotton and steel industries very similar to those under which the United States Corporation was formed. The most efficient plants are being picked out and asked to combine. The banks are being urged to lend credit for the purpose, and if they decline, then the government may be invited to aid the movement. Economists like Sir Joseph Stamp are backing it; manufacturers like W. L. Hichens, chairman of Cammell, Laird & Co., shipbuilders and steel makers.

If the plans go through, there is likely to be a real reorganization of several of Great Britain's most important industries and a big attempt to rationalize the markets which the country is in danger of losing or has already lost.

THIRD PARTY TALK WORRIES POLITICIANS
BUT THEY BELITTLE ANY POSSIBILITYBy CHARLES F. STEWART

WASHINGTON, March 17. — Third party talk worries politicians somewhat, but does not really scare them into convulsions, because they do not consider a permanent third party of much importance possible in this country.

They do realize that an independent ticket, with sufficient strength to carry a state (like the LaFollette ticket in 1924) or even to throw an election (like the Roosevelt ticket in 1912), is a possibility of almost any campaign.

The political gentry do not deny their dislike of such a bolt as LaFollette's, not to mention Roosevelt's—or, on the other side, such as the gold and silver Democratic split in 1896.

Still, these earthquakes only shook the two-party system's superstructure. Perhaps they only demonstrated the solidity of its foundation.

There are politicians who can imagine a party realignment.

A few of them sense a tendency now toward a new classification into groups of conservatives and liberals rather than Republicans and Democrats.

However, not many of them think it can progress far or assume permanency—there are too many kinds of conservatives and liberals; it may be that a number of blocs of them would like to cut loose from their old affiliations, but, among themselves, they cannot stick, together.

Indeed, the LaFollette movement's result did seem to bear out this theory.

The presidential and vice presidential candidacies of the previously Republican Senator Robert M. LaFollette, the elder, and of the previously Democratic Senator Burton K. Wheeler, offered the liberals of both the old-line groups an opportunity to desert the latter's standards and join the ranks of progressive-ism.

If enough of them had done it to amount even to a formidable showing (let alone winning the election), the Republican and Democratic organizations would probably have merged, as conservatives and there would have been two new parties.

The third party would have been in the field to stay, anyway.

Instead, election-day proved that Senators LaFollette and Wheeler were not the right brand of liberals for a lot of other liberals, or their platform failed to embody the right variety of liberal principles to suit everyone—or something.

Nothing like all the liberal voters voted the liberal ticket: that much is certain.

Plenty of liberals evidently preferred conservatism to the LaFollette-Wheeler exposition of liberalism—or, at best, they stayed at home, not sufficiently enthusiastic to cast their ballots for any one.

This is why the politicians are so confident of their ability to keep things in their own hands—as they can do under the two-party system.

They could not do it with three parties.

That has been proved of late in the senate.

There are not three parties there, but the senate is cut up a good deal as if there were, and as everyone must have noted, the politicians have been in an utter state of disorganization.

It has been fine for the rank and file of the people, but terrible for the politicians and big interests—as witness how they howl about it.

Nevertheless, the politicians do not believe a regularly-established third party can break into the situation—and put this state of affairs upon, maybe, an everlasting basis.

They cite the LaFollette fiasco, and it sounds convincing.

What it seems to me the politicians forget is that the bloc, concerning which they complain so bitterly, are liable to crystallize virtually into a whole cluster of little parties—not merely three parties, but six or eight or a dozen.

They show signs of doing so—of developing a bloc system in the house of representatives, as well as in the senate.

For instance, William J. Granfield was elected to congress a short time ago from Calvin Coolidge's district in Massachusetts—a Democrat, for the first time in that district's history. Needless to say, he was not elected as a Democrat; he was elected to the wet bloc.

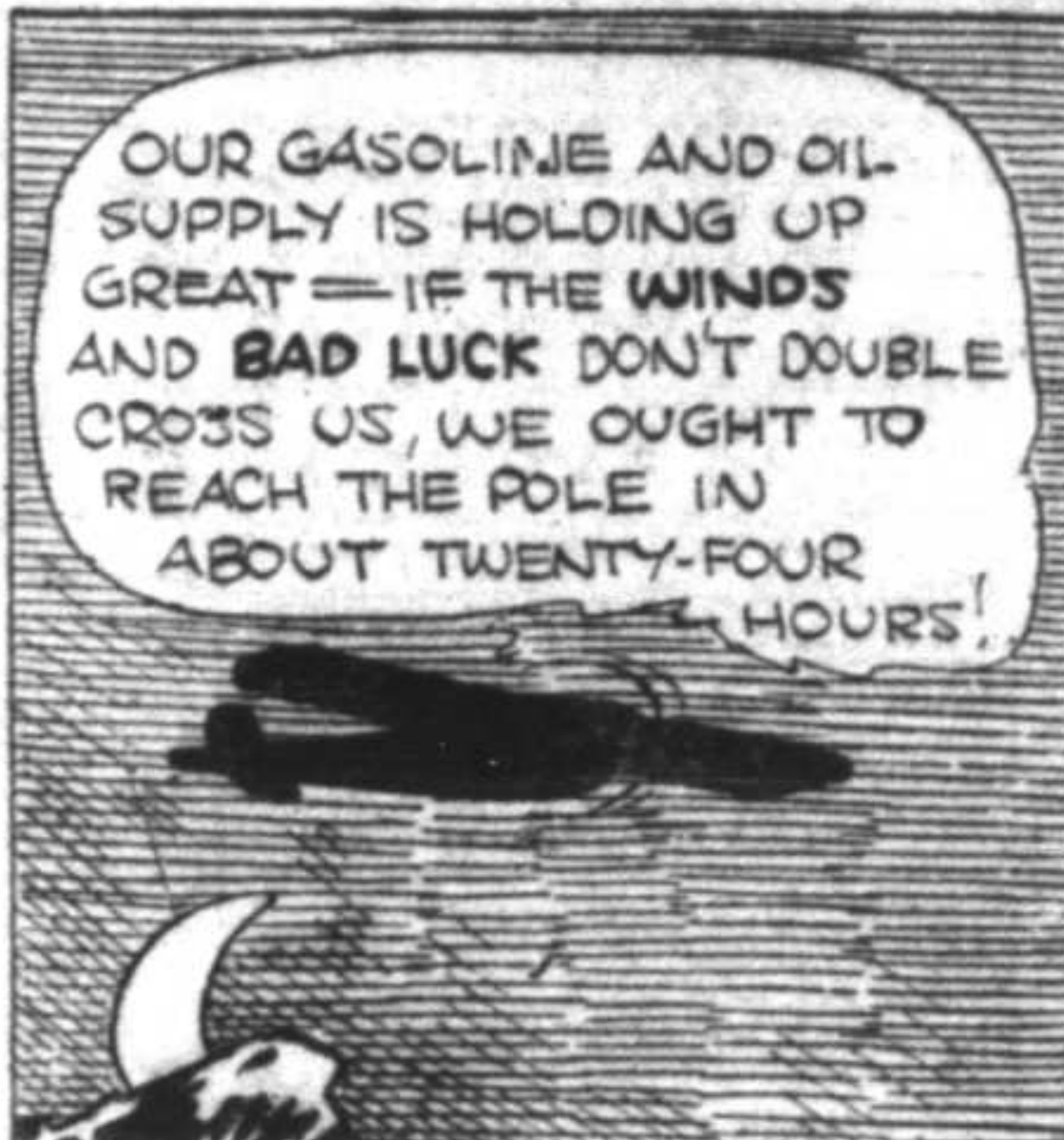
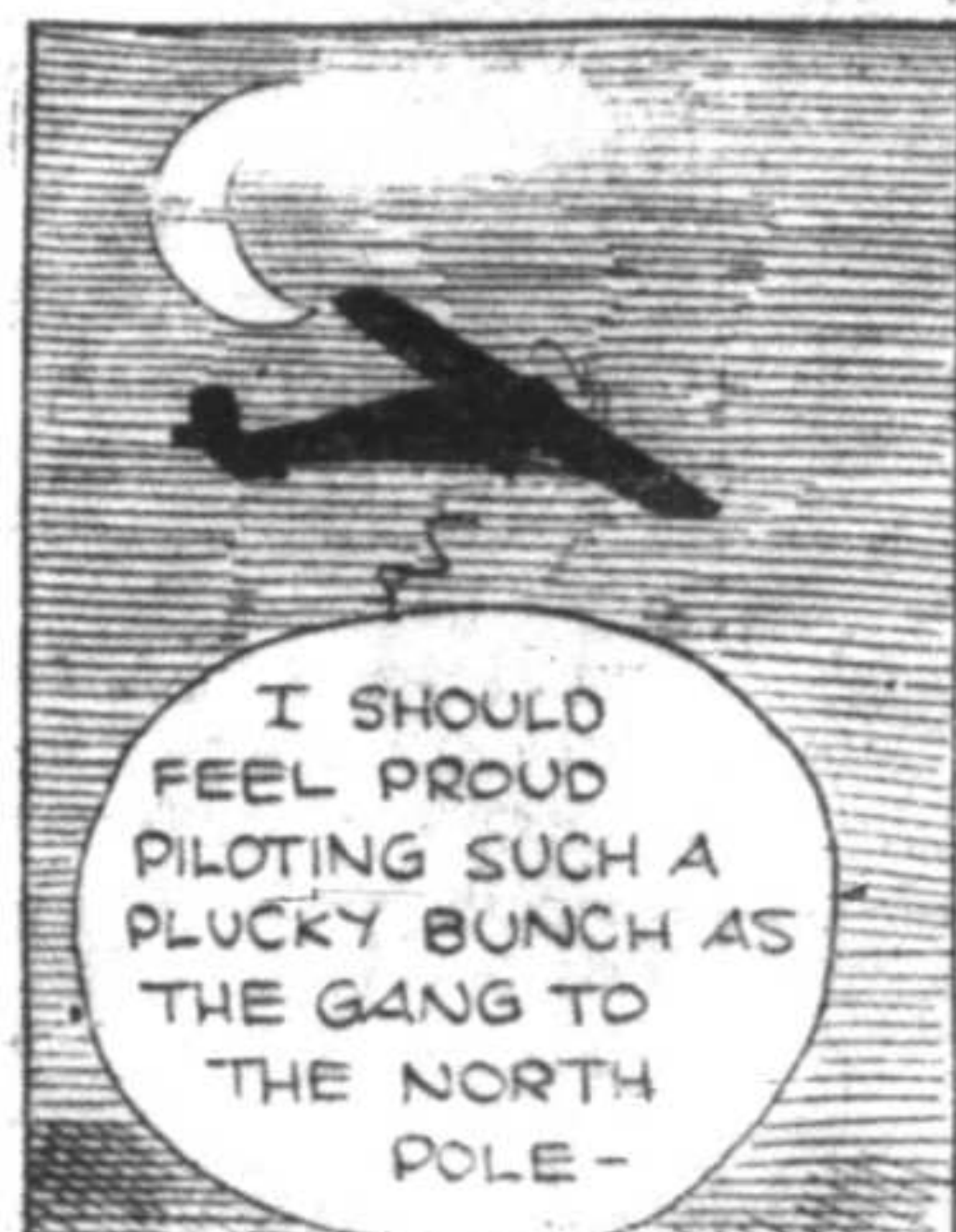

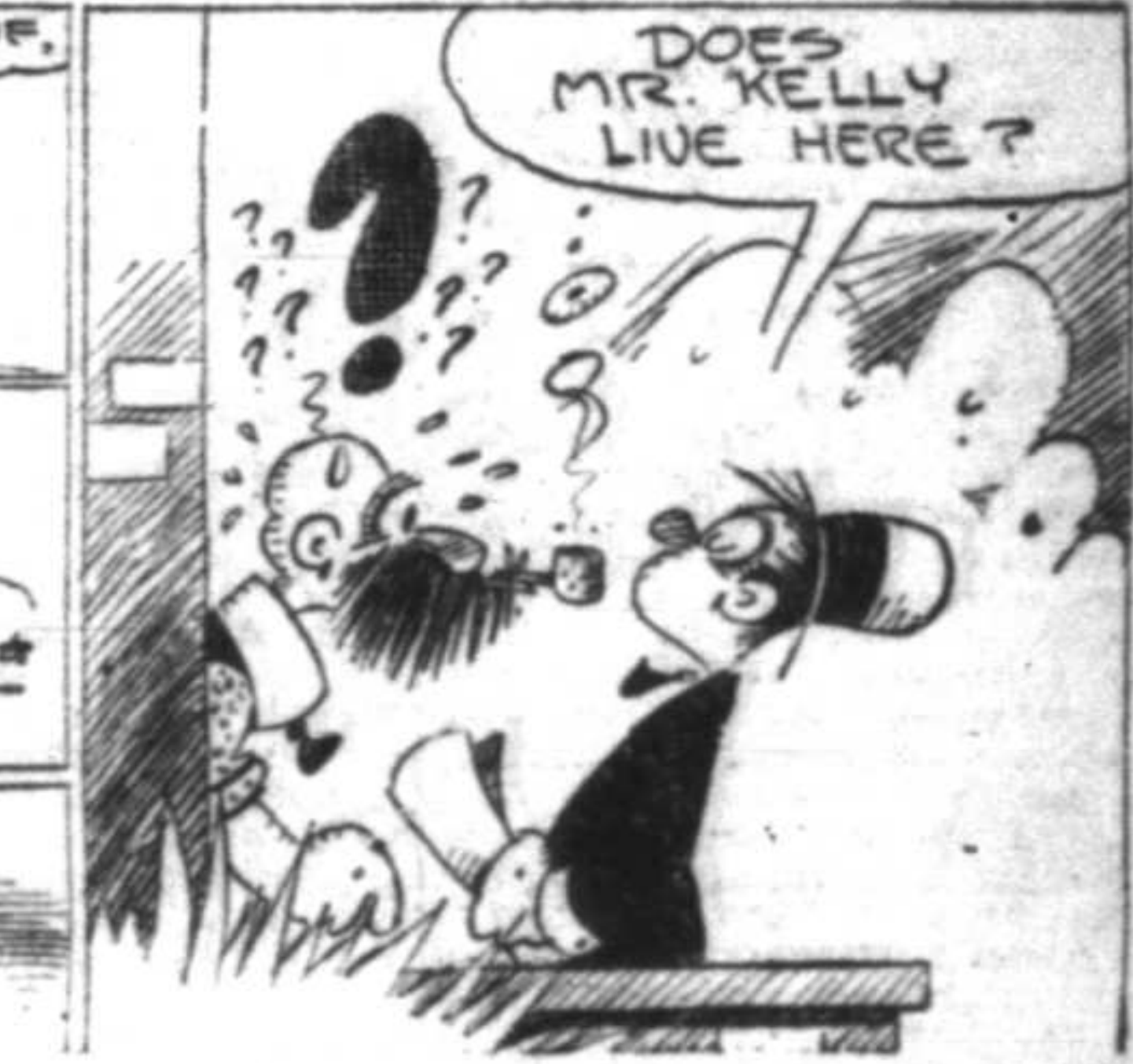

Cotton Active; Stock Prices Advance

Prices Fluctuate Over Wide Range In Monday's Mart

Values Rally Sharply On Good Trade Buying After Declining In First Part Of Morning

NEW ORLEANS, March 17. (AP)—Cotton was moderately active today with prices fluctuating broadly. After declining in the first part of the morning on poor Liverpool cables and selling by ring traders prices rallied sharply on good trade buying of the old crop months and shorts covering. October was relatively easy and gained 30 points against 37 to 38 points on old crop positions.

The market eased during the late trading on realizing, but old crop months remained relatively steady. Final prices were 12 to 15 points under the high. May opened at 14.50, closed at 14.50, rallied to 14.50, then closed at 14.50, down 12 points from the top and showing a net gain for the day of eight points. The general market closed steady eight points net up to seven down.

At one time October traded one point under July. Prices eased during late trading but old crop months showed a smaller decline than the new crop positions. July closed at 15.01, or 14 points below the high and four points above the previous close. October finished at 15.01, or 16 points down from the high and seven points below yesterday's close.

Cotton Advances From Early Decline

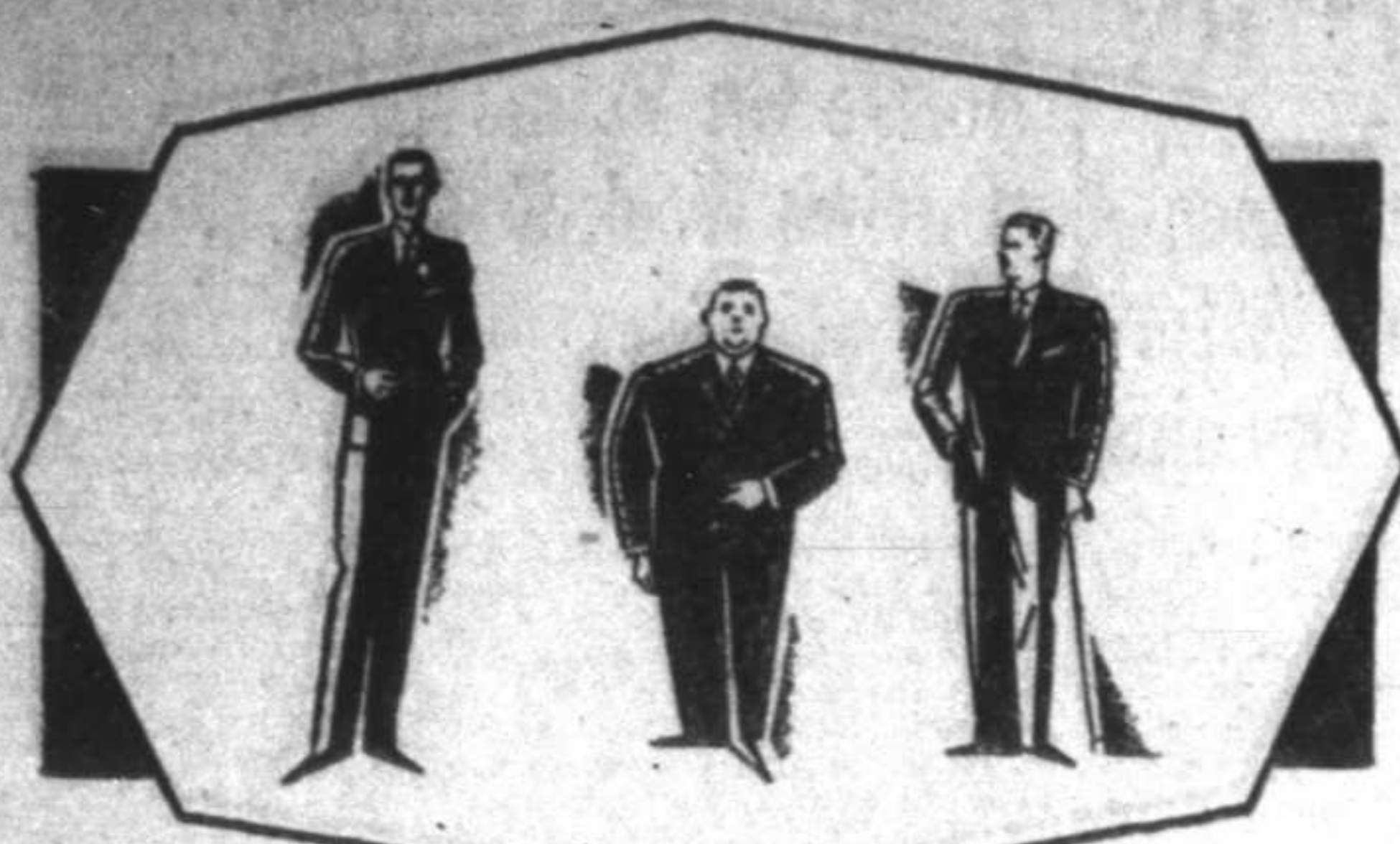
NEW YORK, March 17. (AP)—The feature in cotton today was the relative strength of the old crop positions on trade buying and covering. This was reflected in advances from an opening decline, carrying prices into new high ground for the present movement with May selling up from 14.50 to 15.25 and closing at 15.01. The general market closed steady at net advances of 11 to 19 points on the old crop position, while later deliveries were 1 point higher to 2 points lower as compared with Saturday's close.

The opening was steady at a decline of 15 to 14 points under the high, but later trading was lively. Selling by relatively easy Liverpool cables. Offerings were sufficient to send July off to 15.05 and the new October contract to 14.85, or about 9 to 15 points net lower on the new active position. This decline attracted an increased trade demand.

Wheat Advances Sharply Monday

CHICAGO, March 17. (AP)—Wheat moved sharply upward today and held stubbornly to gains despite downpour over Kansas and other states where moisture has been needed. Advances were associated with reduction of Liverpool stocks and curtailment of arrivals at all British ports, withdrawal of Argentine offerings abroad, and cleaning up of holdings at Winnipeg. The United States wheat visible supply total today showed 2,189,000 bushels decrease.
