

Contract Let For New Water Bridge

Contract was let August 11th for construction of a 200 foot bridge across Coldwater creek on the highway between Gruver and Stratford. Captain Boland Is Honored At Military Rites

Mrs. Tom Rosson, Virgil Rosson and D. C. Boland of Spearman returned here Monday from Palomar, Calif., where they were called last week when the death of their brother Capt. Thomas Boland occurred at the Escondido, California hospital. Captain Boland, retired army officer, with distinguished service in the air corps of the army, had many honors conferred on him prior to his retirement from the service just 3 years before his death. He was perhaps the 3rd army official of the nation to fly in the service. He had devoted his life and talent in the study and improvement of the new field of service of the army. He is credited with having established one of the early, and now truly representative flying fields of the nation, the March Field of Calif. Many Hansford county citizens will remember Capt. Boland who has flown to this county in his plane several times in the past. He has visited with his brother D. C. Boland and Mrs. Rosson on several occasions, and made many friends who join the Reporter in extending sympathy to the bereaved families.

Death came unexpectedly. Capt. Boland, owner and operator of a small estate and store on the mountainside near Palomar was in normal health the first part of last week, but when he became ill Tuesday he left his home and drove to the nearest hospital. Physicians discovered he had suffered a burst appendix. An operation proved ineffective, and due to heart ailments and complications, Capt. Boland lived only a few hours after the operation.

Military officials of Calif. honored their departed comrade with full military rites. During the military ceremony dozens of airplanes swooped down over the burial grounds dropping a veritable shower of beautiful flowers. The notice of Capt. Boland's death and funeral rites as carried in the Escondido County paper is printed below:

Funeral services for Captain Thomas Boland, Palomar store owner who succumbed to illness here last Thursday were held Monday morning at 10 o'clock at the Alhiser Mortuary, Rev. H. B. Lee of Trinity Episcopal church officiated.

John M. Anderson, national chaplain of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, was in charge of military ritualistic services. Pallbearers and members of the firing squad at Oak Hill Memorial Park where interment took place, were members of the John R. Simpson post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Members of the Clarence C. Jenkins post of the V. F. W. at Oceanside also took part.

Capt. Boland, 55, was a native of Gainesville, Texas. He retired from the army air corps about 3 years ago, after being in the service for 30 years. Following retirement, he established a store at Palomar. He was a member of the V. F. W.

The deceased leaves two brothers H. A. Boland, of Dalhart, Texas and D. C. Boland of Spearman, Texas; a sister Mrs. Laura Rosson of Spearman, Texas and a nephew W. H. Evans of Palomar.

WHEAT LOANS NOW AVAILABLE

Wheat producers who have grain stored in graineries on their farms and who desire to make a government loan, are instructed to come to the county agent's office for instructions on completing loans.

Wheat producers who have stored their grain in terminal elevators and desire loans, are instructed to consult their local elevator and ask for storage receipt from the terminal elevators where the grain is stored. The receipt must be secured before negotiations for loans are made at the county agents office.

Little Outlines Pension Work Of Texas

More than 112,000 Texans now are receiving old age pensions, State Pension Director Jack Little announced last week. This is a decrease from the peak load of 136,000 which was reached in 1936—a peak load which brought about the now famous "deliberation law"—so bitterly assailed by political figures.

Texas now occupies fifth place among the states of the Union in percentage of needy old people receiving pensions, Little said. Out of every 1,000 Texans over the age of 65, 394 are now receiving pensions, he said.

Since July 1936, when the first pensions were paid in Texas, the Federal and State Governments have spent more than 38,000,000 for old age pensions, he declared.

Little defended his interpretation of the "need" provisions of the Texas law. "The administrative officials have no choice in this matter," he said, "for the law plainly states that if, after careful investigation of all circumstances, the applicant does not appear to be in a needy and necessitous condition, assistance shall be denied."

The average grant per pension in Texas is now \$13.74, which is lower than the average of \$19.29 which prevails over the nation. However, among southern states, Texas pays a larger average grant than all save Florida.

Honest Bill Miller In Trouble Near Claude Last Saturday Eve.

Honest Bill Miller, his good lady and son Bill, Jr., of the Spearman Reporter at Spearman, Texas passed thru Claude Saturday afternoon enroute to Tioga and Pilot Point, to visit with relatives for several days.

As they motored east toward their destination, just a few miles out of town, some drunk driver ran over on Bill's side of the road after he had left the pavement to the right, and struck his back fender, smashing it. Mr. and Mrs. Miller returned to Claude and put sheriff J. A. Best on the track of the drunken drivers who went toward either Amarillo or Panhandle.

While his car was receiving repairs at the Brunson-Chevrolet Garage, he visited the Claude News Office for a short time. Bill said he did not mind so much the price of a new fender as he did to see a drunken driver damage another car, by driving over on the left side of the pavement, and then get away without paying the penalty. Bill did not tell us "what brand the driver was drinking" but the fact that he drove into the ditch on his side of the road is proof that he was a darn good driver, and no doubt saved the lives of his wife and son, Bill, Jr. by taking to the ditch, instead of allowing it to be a "head-on."

Midnight Aug. 31 Is Wheat Insurance Deadline

Midnight, August 31, is the deadline. At that hour will close for this season, the opportunity to obtain the new, all-risk insurance on wheat to be harvested in 1939.

Because seeding (especially in localities which use wheat partly for winter pasture) will be starting soon and the policies of this new insurance become effective as soon as the seed is in the ground, this limit seemed necessary to give the service office at Kansas City time to send out the premium notices, get back the payments and put out the policies before seeding begins. Accordingly, August 31 was fixed as the last day on which County Crop Insurance Supervisors may receive these applications. The announcement was made August 9, by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, which administers this service.

A. E. Ferguson, the Crop Insurance Supervisor for our county, in giving the foregoing information to this paper, tells us that he will keep his office open until midnight, Wednesday Aug. 31 if necessary, at the Court House. His telephone number is 59. Mr. Ferguson tells us that up to August 11, "about 75,000 applications had reached the County Supervisors in the Winter Wheat states. How fast applications have come in since then, I do not know he added, "but the gain in ratio has been quite rapid."

"While this new, all-risk crop insurance is, in a way, a part of the general program in which the farmers of this county are co-operating, through the services of our ACP Committee of farmers. This is not, in any sense, mutual insurance. The full cost of a policy is definitely figured beforehand and there can be no additional charges or assessments. When an applicant gets his premium notice, it tells the exact amount of Ordinary No. 2 Hard Winter Wheat necessary to pay for his policy. It also gives the equivalent in two other grades and in cash, so that he has four options—can pay cash, or in his choice of three grades of wheat. He can even pay now, in wheat, his premium for insurance on the 1940 crop.

"A number of large insurance companies, to which the plan of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation was submitted, approved it as sound and an improvement over other service. These companies own many farms and are financially able to carry their own insurance, but several of them are buying Federal Crop Insurance Corporation policies on their 1939 wheat and are urging their tenants to do the same."

Lake Projects In Joint Meeting Held at Pekoe

Representative citizens of Borger coming from every civic or-
ganization of the city and the en-
tire Commissioners' court of Hut-
chinson county were emphatic in
their endorsement of the Hans-
ford county proposed large lake
project, when they met with
Hansford commissioners' court
and other citizens of the county
in a joint luncheon and inspec-
tion trip to the lake site Friday
noon.

Headed by Judge Norman Col-
fee and Judge Aynesworth of Bor-
ger, every visitor made a talk
and endorsed Hansford county's
lake project. Bob Lindsay, pre-
sident of the Borger Independent
School Board, stated that he
would be the first to place a boat
on the large lake, and added it
would cost money to bring the
Hansford project to the attention
of proper officials and asked that
Borger be included in the con-
tributors for expenses.

Judge Coffey made an excellent
talk bringing out many details of
the program that had not been
understood by Hansford people.
Following his explanation of the
working out of the program Col-
fee stated that Hutchinson county
did not have natural advan-
tages that would qualify the
county to enter the program and
expressed his opinion that the
court and the people of Hutchin-
son county would join their next
door neighbors in asking for a
REAL major project for this
county.

Homer Pruett, secretary of the
Borger Chamber of Commerce,
expressed his personal approval
of the Hansford lake projects
and said he believed that most of
Borger citizens would give their
time, influence and moral sup-
port to the Hansford county lake
project.

Perry Powell, city commis-
sioner of Borger expressed his per-
sonal approval of a lake near
Borger, and was of the opinion
that Hansford county would only
have to call on their neighbors
for all the help and support
needed to gain the approval of
a Federal project that would en-
able the location of a real lake in
this county.

Judge Aynesworth, prominent
attorney and influential political
leader of Hutchinson county was
perhaps the most enthusiastic vi-
sitor from Borger. Judge came
to the meeting with the under-
standing that a lake 200 feet
deep and 70 miles long could be
built at the Hansford site and he
was for making Borger and
Hansford county interior sea-
ports. After he looked at the
lake site the Judge said he would
have to give up the idea of an
interior port, but he did believe a
dam 125 feet high could be built
at the lake site. Judge Aynes-
worth asked for an expression of
the Hansford delegation as to
just what was wanted, and when
told we wanted Hutchinson to
join us and make this project
their project, he expressed the op-
inion that it would be done.

C. G. Goldsmith, president
of the Borger Rotary Club at Bor-
ger, gave out the idea at the
meeting that Borger citizens
would work harder for a lake an
hour's drive from home than they
would for one at their door steps.
He was enthusiastic about the na-
tural advantages of the Hansford
site and expressed his opinion
that Borger would do all in their
power to secure the Hansford
lake for themselves and their
neighbors.

Commissioner Fritz Thompson,
representing the Borger precinct
of the county, an ardent fisher-
man, was perhaps the most en-
thusiastic of the visitors. He flatly
denied the allegation that Bob
Lindsay would be the first to put

Approximately one hundred Hansford citizens were present Thursday evening at the court house in Spearman to organize a county-wide Commercial organization.

After nearly two hours of discussion the club was placed on a firm basis when 5 directors representing Spearman were elected to start the official club. Directors from Gruver, Morse and Oslo will be elected within ten days and a constitution and by-laws adopted at the next meeting of the organization.

The purpose of the organization is to boost any and all projects that will be beneficial to Hansford county.

Full plans for future operations have not been completed, but directors and members have decided that a part time secretary will be employed. It is the plans at the present for each community to function separately and govern locally on any question that pertains to their respective communities, but when and where a problem or question arises that concerns the county as a whole, the government of the Hansford county Chamber of Commerce will have to decide. Directors for the county as a whole will be decided upon by members at a later date.

Childs Food Habits Important To Health

In any program of health building the importance of diet cannot be emphasized too strongly. From the very first the expectant mother must see to it that her diet is well fortified by protective foods. For a diet is some important nutrient can cause distressing results both to the mother and to the developing babe.

The first food for a child will furnish material for good bones, sound teeth and a strong, sturdy body. In addition it will provide sufficient reserves for growth and safety.

In planning the diet of a child milk is a good starting point. It is a well known as an economical source of valuable food elements. A child should have at least a pint of milk a day, preferably a quart.

Vegetables and fruits are especially important for their minerals and vitamins. They also add color and flavor. An adequate vegetable allowance includes at least two servings of vegetables each day in addition to potatoes.

Children need a good variety of fruits, both raw and cooked. If possible, have one of these either a citrus fruit or tomatoes.

Eggs and meat are good building foods. The yolk of an egg is one of the first foods given to a young child. Young children should have either eggs or meat each day. Older children may have both more frequently.

For energy serve a cereal dish each day. Cereals are the source of fuel; before the source of energy, liver oil, and some fish oils also of important vitamins. A diet for children would be complete without a few simple fats. But use with discretion, the end of the meal. That in general is the pattern for a child's diet. And a home maker who sees that her child is getting these basic foods is starting well on his way to health.

To see that the child eats then the next important thing. In general the less talk about food at the table the better. Adopt the usual attitude of expecting the child to enjoy what is set before him. A regular schedule for meals, exercise, and sleep will help to keep the appetite normal. When a child has been guided from the first to eat the right foods, he has formed a habit that will be the foundation of good nutrition for him throughout

When fuses blow out when the washing machine or oil burner is started, it's because electric motors take a momentary surge of a relatively large amount of electricity to set them in motion. Don't attempt to solve this problem by using fuses too large for safety. You can get regular 15-ampere household fuses with a "time-tag" that takes care of this starting current without impairing their safety value.

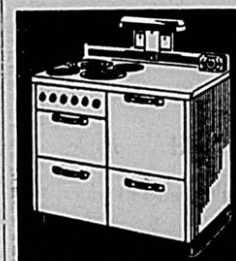

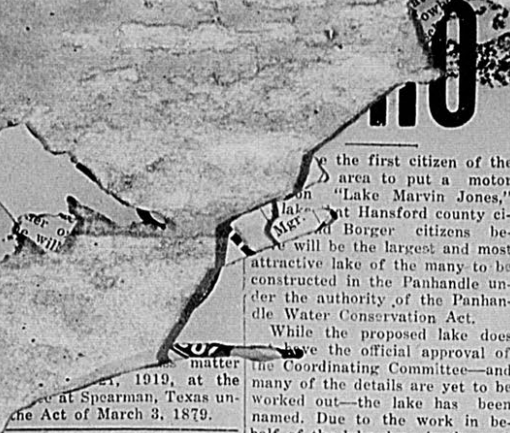
