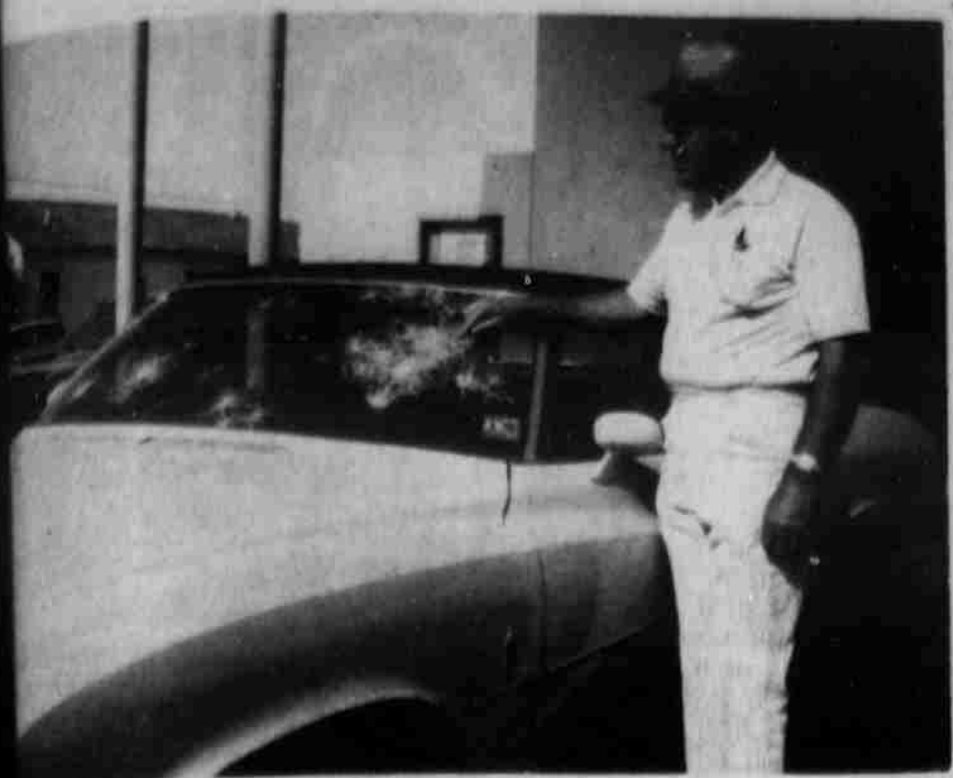

Hail cuts wide and destructive swath Friday in southern Garza

Homes, crops and vehicles all hard hit

Jagged chunks of ice, ranging up to baseball and grapefruit size, cut a swath across southern Garza County from Grassland in Lynn County to southeast of Justiceburg Friday night doing an estimated \$75,000 damage to rural homes and vehicles.

Several thousand acres of "just up" cotton were wiped out. No immediate estimate on crop damage is available. County Agent Syd Conner said farmers who had dry land cotton wiped out by the hail do not have enough moisture to replant.

Farmers with irrigated cotton in eastern Lynn and western Garza counties were busy in the fields this week with replanting. Miraculously, no one was reported injured.

Only a few calves were known to have been killed by the ice, but some cattlemen reported the hide on the backs of cows bloodied where the jagged ice had cut.

All traffic on highways through the area was brought to a complete standstill during the storm, which reportedly swirled ice from one direction and then back from another.

It was the worst hail storm to hit in the county since a similar one struck about the same area in 1968, although this time the chunks of ice were bigger.

The hail was so heavy in some areas that it not only stripped the leaves from the mesquite but the bark as well. Jackrabbits, birds, and even rattlesnakes were killed by the hail in the ranch country.

Stockmen found when they went out to check cattle after the clouds had passed. The hail riddled roofs of rural homes in the storm area and broke out many windows. Cars and pickup trucks had their windshields smashed by the hail and vehicle bodies dented from front to rear by the falling ice.

One local insurance man said his clients' losses were averaging from \$500 to \$1,200 on dwellings and from \$500 up on vehicles.

The storm area was four to five miles wide in the western part of the county but narrowed considerably by the time it reached Justiceburg.

County Judge Giles W. Dalby, spokesman for the County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas, has spent most of the last two weeks in Austin in an effort to work out an acceptable judiciary article at the Constitution Convention.

As of yesterday, efforts were being made to reach a compromise on the article which originally would have given over the trial presiding work of county judges to circuit judges who are lawyers.

Last week Dalby took on Price Daniel Jr., president of the convention who was attempting to ramrod the circuit-riding judges through the convention.

The effort was defeated by an 81-74 vote. Dalby labeled Daniels' tactics "a bulldozer approach" and added that "the people where I come from resent it."

In some spots the hailstorm, which began about 8:30 p. m., was entirely a rain of dry chunks of ice. At other points, it was mixed with rain ranging from a half to a third of an inch.

The county agent estimated crop damage ranged across 20 to 25 sections of farmland. He said some farmers were covered by federal crop insurance and others weren't.

He said it will take a week or two to determine the full extent of the crop losses, which included "a little bit of feed."

Conner said some cotton fields were completely wiped out by the hail while only a third or fourth of the cotton in other fields were destroyed.

Ginners at Graham and Grassland said not a lot of cotton was up in those areas but what cotton was above ground was practically all destroyed.

Ted Aten said 19 windows were broken out of the Graham gin. The Grassland Co-op Gin had all roofs on its buildings damaged and many windows broken out.

"It's just unbelievable" was the phrase many used to describe the destruction to roofs and vehicles.

Insurance man Bryan J. Williams, after a day of adjusting work in the storm

area Tuesday, told The Dispatch that vehicles parked facing south, facing east and facing north all had their windshields smashed by the ice.

He said one farmer drove his pickup into a metal shed to escape the hail only to have a chunk of ice crash through the metal roof of the shed and break out the windshield of the truck.

JERRY TYLER IN CRITICAL CONDITION

Youth's neck broken in dune buggy flip

Jerry Tyler, 18, the highest ranking boy and fourth highest ranking student in this year's Post High School graduating class, is in traction in the intensive care unit at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock after receiving a broken neck about 3:30 o'clock Monday afternoon in a dune buggy accident at White River Lake.

Four other youths, three of them also members of the high school graduating class, received injuries ranging from minor to serious when the dune buggy driven by Mark Bevers overturned in a ditch after striking a rut on the golf course road at the lake.

Mark suffered a cut on the leg, which required the tying up of severed arteries and six stitches. Steve Sawyers received a broken collarbone, Craig Simpson, bruises and abrasions, and Joe Moore a bruised leg. Joe was a high school junior; the other four were seniors.

After the accident, the boys went swimming before starting the more than 30-mile trip back to town where Tyler, Bevers, Sawyers and Simpson were scheduled to receive their diplomas in graduation exercises at 8 p. m. in Antelope Stadium.

En route to town, Tyler complained of his neck hurting, and the group drove to the hospital, where x-rays showed Jerry's neck to be broken. He was transferred by ambulance to the Lubbock hospital.

Sawyers also was treated at the hospital here for his broken collarbone, and Bevers' leg was treated at a doctor's office. Neither Simpson nor Moore required emergency treatment.

All three of the four injured seniors except Tyler attended the commencement exercises and received their diplomas.

Tyler, the son of Mr. and Mrs. David Tyler, is a three-year football letterman with all-district honors. Bevers, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Hershel D. Bevers, was a track star and recently signed a letter of intent to attend Baylor University on a track scholarship. Parents of

the other youths involved in the accident are Mr. and Mrs. Ed Sawyers, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Simpson and Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Moore.

Young Tyler's condition was reported "somewhat improved" Wednesday. He is scheduled to undergo surgery within a few days. The Dispatch was told.

FOR EMPLOYMENT TRAINING

Tentative allotment of \$25,535 goes to Garza

Garza County has a tentative allotment of \$25,535 to spend during the fiscal year beginning July 1 under the new Comprehensive Employment Training Act, Howard Maddera of

Levelland told directors of the Garza Community Action Committee here May 21.

The executive head of South Plains Community Action, Inc., who was recently designated by SPAG as contractor for the administration of the new manpower program in the South Plains area, said decisions on how the money will be used in the county will be up to the Garza County Commissioners Court.

He said he will visit with County Judge Giles W. Dalby and commissioners on the matter in the near future.

Congress has promised funding of the new program by July 1, but as yet funding is not available.

Maddera told directors he has funds available for the June portion of the promised \$800 summer recreation program, but the remainder also is waiting federal funding.

Jack Alexander, president of the board, appointed a committee composed of the Rev. Larry Hambrick, chairman, Sue Shylles, and Pat Cruse to plan the summer program which should get under way here next week at the Lorenzo Alexander Community Center.

A survey also is being conducted to determine the need to re-establish a day care center here. Those interested are asked to contact the Rev. Hambrick or Marcy Lee Demming.

Mrs. Ann Tubbs submitted a written report on the Meals on Wheels program.

Jury 'still out' on revision

For most people it's too early to reach any verdict on the Constitutional Revision Convention, which has returned to work after taking a month "break."

Before taking the break, delegates voted temporary approval to about two-thirds of a new document. After reconvening, one of the things the convention "caught heck" on was the judiciary article in the proposed constitution.

Some 60 West Texas officials battled the idea of circuit judges taking the place of county judges in rural counties, and the spokesman for the group was Garza County Judge Giles W. Dalby.

As Robert Heard of the Associated Press wrote in a story in Sunday's papers, "Most of Texas' county judges are not lawyers . . . but they turned out to be plenty smart enough to defeat the judiciary article in the proposed constitution." The Texas delegates rejected the judiciary article by a vote of 81 to 74. They were offered a "compromise" that narrowed the right of state appeal in criminal cases but made no substantive changes on county judges. And, after all, that is the main point Judge Dalby and his group were battling for.

There are other questions that many of us might raise about the present status of the proposed new document. They include:

—Is creating more "home rule" and law-making authority for local governments good or bad? So far the convention has shown inclination to let more counties and small towns run their own business with less interference from the state.

—Is establishing one tax assessing unit per county good or bad? The convention has voted to let property values be set only by the county,

with schools, cities, and others using the same status.

—How much governmental spending could result from the new constitution as so far completed? Some say the agreed-to wording on equal educational opportunity could prove very costly to taxpayers. Others point to increases in spending that will result from a new higher education fund delegates agreed to create in order not to break up the UT-Texas A&M Permanent Fund. Removing the welfare ceiling by the delegates is cited by some critics as another action likely to increase spending.

—How much (if any) of the lid on local taxes would be removed by a new constitutional concept of paying off longterm local debts? This has been argued both ways.

—What will the delegates ultimately decide relative to right-to-work? Some didn't want to vote on this until after May elections, but it still looms as an explosive issue.

—What will the delegates ultimately decide about putting a provision in the new constitution guaranteeing a clean environment?

—Finally, what will the final version of the new constitution say relative to taxes — personal and corporate income taxes, sales taxes, property taxes, fair and equal tax treatment, exemptions from taxes. All taxpayers will be extremely interested in these decisions.

It should be pointed out that some issues which seem "approved" by the delegates at this writing may not necessarily be included in the final document. Some of them, including that on the judiciary system, were approved only by a majority vote, whereas the final version must be approved by a two-thirds vote. — CD

Metric system . . . maybe no go?

The conversion of the United States to the metric system of measurements may not be as inevitable as it once seemed.

A bill designed to transform our way of measuring from inches-miles to centimeters-kilometers has become snarled in the House of Representatives, and at least one very influential congressman says it may be held up "forever."

That solon, Rep. Olin E. Teague of Texas is the chairman of the House Science and Astronautics Committee, which recommended passage of the bill to set up a federal agency to supervise and coordinate volunteer conversion to the metric system within 10 years. One of the bill's chief sponsors, Rep. Teague apparently underwent a conversion of his own about the proposed legislation. Says he now, "As far as I'm concerned, we aren't ever going to pass a (conversion) bill. It may be held up forever. I don't care whether it passes or not."

It just may be that there are many Garza counties and other Texans who see things Rep. Teague's way.

Triggering the Texas congressman's

exasperation about the whole affair was the controversial question involving compensation for individual workers who would have to buy new tools calibrated in centimeters rather than inches. Rep. Teague accused congressmen representing labor union strongholds of blocking the metric bill until they could get the federal government to pay for any new tools workingmen may have to buy. The issue froze pro and con solons into such rigid positions that the bill is being held in limbo by House Speaker Carl Albert.

Opponents of the bill seem quite satisfied with the status quo. Commented one foe of the metric system, "It is not what you'd call an emergency, is it? For 200 years, we've gotten along without it."

With Rep. Teague's "I give up" statement, it has become apparent that those Americans who were worried about adjusting to the "new math" were a bit premature in their concern. As long as there is a roadblock in Congress, with both sides seemingly agreeing not to pursue the matter one way or another, it is not likely we will be seeing any changes in the near future, figuratively speaking. — CD

WHAT'S IN IT?

FOX

As a surname, Fox came from an inn, tavern or shop sign or as a nickname for a man who had some of the qualities of a fox, such as shrewdness or craftiness. Both shop signs and animal names were important sources of many of today's surnames.

In England, Fox is chiefly a north midlands and northern surname, and some authorities say it may sometimes represent a later spelling of Powkes or Fawkes. In most cases, however, it may be considered as having originated from a shop sign or a nickname.

Not only England, but other countries used Fox as a surname. In modern German, it is Fuchs; in Dutch and Low German, Voss or Vos, and in Italian, Volpe.

The name Hugo le Fox appeared in 1297 in the Ministers' Account of the Earl of Cornwall. The name appeared much later in Scotland, a William Fox being tenant in lands of the Abbey of Kelso in 1567.

The Irish Foxes got their name as a sobriquet. In the 11th century, a Tadhg O Cathar-nagh, which anglicized became O'Caheeny and later Kearney or Kearney, was Chief of Teffia, County Meath. He was called Sionnach, which meant "The Fox," and in due course this branch acquired the name Fox as a distinct surname.

George Fox, born in 1624, was the founder of the Society of Friends or Quakers. Charles James Fox (1749-1806) was a British statesman and orator who favored American independence.

The first spiritualist in America was John D. Fox of Hydeville, N. Y., whose house in 1848 was the mecca of the

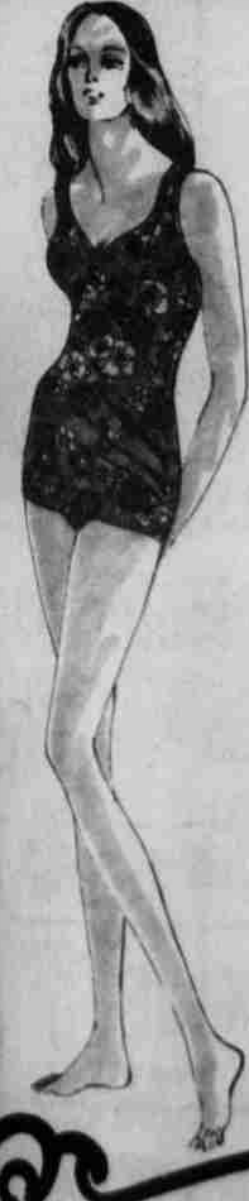

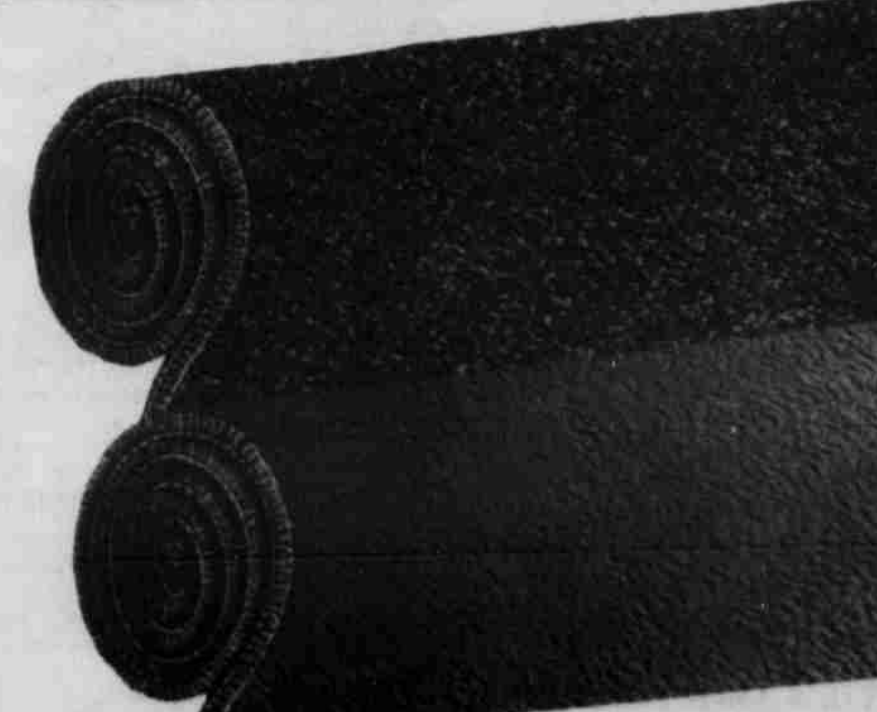
