GRAND JURY FILES REPORT

Wichita Mechanic Indicted In Soldier's Death

Donald Jones, 25, auto mechanic, was indicted Tuesday afternoon by the July grand jury for failure to stop and render aid in connection with the death of Pfc. Ira Cavender, 21, of Shepard Field late Monday night. Bond was fixed at \$1,000.

An automobile allegedly driven by Jones Monday night was taken to the police department garage, its left headlight and fender damaged. Jones was arrested by highway patrolmen and military police at a bus station in Wichita Falls about three hours after Cavender's body had been found on the Henrietta highway near the railroad underpass.

24 True Bills

A statement was taken from Jones by W. T. Locke, assistant district attorney. Officers indicated that the death car had been parked about three miles from the scene of the accident and left there while Jones returned to his place of employment on foot. Police department officials said fingerprints were taken from the abandoned automobile before it was brought to police headquarters.

The indictment of Jones was one of 24 true bills voted by the grand jurors in their last scheduled sessions for the year. Twelve indictments were voted against Cecil Morgan, eight of them for forgery and passing, four for forgery. Checks were drawn against the account of a Holliday woman who was in California at the time, Locke said.

Other indictments were as follows: Benjamin Wallace Tate, assault with intent to murder upon Christine Lamb (with an ice pick); George Eoff Jr., forgery and passing (defendant already under five-year suspended sentence); Jack Langford, forgery and passing; Harold Eakin, one count for embezzlement, one for theft over \$50; Louis T. Bethel, forgery and passing; Paul Isaacs, theft over \$50 (a truck); Paul Isaacs, theft over \$50 (an automobile); G. P. Kirk, theft over \$50; and three defendants, not yet under arrest, charged separately with child desertion.

Report Filed

The report was submitted to Judge H. W. Fillmore in 30th district court, in which the July grand jury was impaneled last summer for a six-month tour of duty, meeting in alternate months. The court named Howard Doores, Electra; Roy Magers, Burk Burnett; W. E. Huff, Wichita Falls, and T. J. Pace, Iowa Park, as a commission to draw a panel for a new grand jury to be impaneled in January.

The grand jury, through Foreman E. M. Crump, reported to the court the examination of 150

NATIONAL WAR CHEST DRIVE GETS UNDER WAY

Let's Wear A Poppy Saturday, November 6th.

Poppies in tribute to America's battle dead of two wars will be worn in Burk Burnett on Saturday, Nov. 6, Mrs. Fred Brookman, president of 264 Unit of the American Legion Auxiliary announced today.

The poppies this year will honor the men who have given their lives in the present conflict, as well as those who fell among the poppies of France and Belgium twenty-five years ago, she said. The money contributed for the flowers will be used for the welfare of victims of both wars and their families.

The Burk Burnett Unit of the Auxiliary is making extensive preparations for the observance of poppy day here, under the leadership of Mrs. Brookman, president, and Mrs. M. W. Majors, Unit Poppy Chairman. The little red flowers of remembrance will be available to everyone in the city, offered by volunteer workers from the Auxiliary who will be on the streets throughout the day.

The flowers, made of crepe paper in replica of the wild Flanders poppy, have been ordered from Legion, Texas, where disabled veterans manufactured them under direction of the State Department of the Auxiliary. Poppy making has kept the hands of hundreds of these unfortunate men usefully employed during the winter and spring, helping them pass the long hospital hours and aiding in their rehabilitation. More Americans than ever before are expected to wear poppies this year as personal tribute to those who have been killed, and to aid the disabled, their families and the families of the dead.

Ginnings In Area 130,448 Bales

Cotton production amounting to 53 per cent of the 1942 crop was recorded in 24 Texas counties of the Wichita area October 18, government figures on ginnings revealed Monday.

The new crop accounted for 130,448 bales against 246,298 bales Oct. 18, 1942.

The census report from the Bureau of Census, Washington, shows that 5,294 bales of cotton were ginned in Wichita County from the crop of 1943 prior to October 18, as compared with 11,557 bales for the crop of 1942.

The two local gins have ginned 3,048 bales to date. The managers estimate the crop is a good three-fourths gathered.

Seed is selling for \$55 per ton.

Turn Loose The Wildcats

The people of the United States are being constantly told by Washington officials that they must get along with less and less gasoline, fuel oil, etc. For months experts in the oil industry have shown official Washington that our known oil reserves are being used much more rapidly than new reserves are being discovered, because official Washington, in the face of rising costs of production, refuses to grant crude oil price increases sufficient to encourage wildcatting for new oil supplies to replace dwindling reserves.

Commenting on the seriousness of the situation, the National Petroleum News says: "The need for oil is so critical that there should be a crusading campaign to discover and produce fresh supplies. The administration is calling upon the people to crusade for rubber, to save their fats, to bring in scrap iron, to provide blood for transfusions. All these are futile if there isn't enough oil to carry on the war. A supply barely sufficient for military needs is of no value if essential civilian needs are not taken care of, and there is a serious question whether we are not already cutting too far into essential civilian needs. It isn't a question of how much it costs to produce oil, it is a question of how to get a maximum number of wildcaters to risk the great amount of money in even the most fool places in the country to find oil."

An that is horse sense for the regulators to consider. What good are regulators and price-fixers if their policies leave us nothing to regulate or nothing to buy?

Something To Chew On

A Burk Burnett reader remarks that in spite of all of the talk of our national policy after the war, that leaders, both political and official, have offered certain programs but still they do not commit themselves to definite programs. They speak of justice to nations, economic freedom, international co-operation, all of which voices the sentiments of most of us, but yet it does not come out as a statement of actual facts of exactly HOW we intend to keep the peace, of HOW we expect to have freedom economically, of precise steps that would be taken for joining other nations in a plan for co-operation. What of an international police force, of appointments of governments, of alliances with Allies, of pledges that follow, our reader asks. Some men who are fearless of disapproval have made certain proposals. What our people want, it seems, is something on which to bite!

For Education

The Senate brings up a bill that has to do with federal grants to the public schools and which authorizes \$300,000,000 a year to the states for raising teachers salaries to combat increased living costs. Also, the grant would take care of emergency school needs and build up as well, the unequal educational disadvantages that are now found all over the country. For instance, the states that are least able to support the schools have the most children to educate. Southern Senators are especially enthused over the bill since the southern states are slated for more aid due to a more backward educational set-up. But in accepting such aid, it behooves all states to look into the strings attached, whether it means loss of states rights, of governmental dictating as to how and where the money must be spent. The loss of rights long fought for, must not be hastily voted aside. We must study well the issue before we spend the money.

Knowing The Answers

The question used to go in Burk Burnett, "Where do people get so much money to spend on autos, big homes, clothes, radios, entertainment? As a rule we know today where people are getting so much money to spend. They used to say: "it will have to come to an end before long". That remark holds true perhaps today. With every one working, getting higher wages and generally spending it as it comes, the matter of "when the end" can well arise. Being well-paid and frequently, as war jobs go, being over-paid, the home market flourisheth. Banks notice rising accounts, but stores notice the steady buying too. But through all of this walks the man who knows the answer. He is saving as much as possible, is buying War Bonds as often as he can. He knows of no finer investment, that saves his neighbor's boy, his government and his home and family. That man probably knows all the answers.

Will They Last?

Are they going to last forever, these critical materials that we are exhausting as we keep on with war, supplying the needs of Allies as well as ourselves, with those important raw materials as oil, steel, minerals and timber? America has been named as a country having the "most". If we keep drawing so heavily on our wealth for say four or five

years more of war, we will lose this rating. Bauxite, which is the chief source of aluminum, is not able to withstand more than five years of the present rate of consumption. High-grade copper reserves are hoped to last up to 15 years and this is spoken of good grades of coal. There can be a bottom to even a "most", and if we dig unceasingly into our stores, we rob our future of security. Let us plan wisely, use sparingly, utilize substitutes if necessary, but let us use foresight in place of hindsight while we can.

We are still working hard on our reading and will soon finish our first book. Most of our boys and girls are coming to school every day, and that is the way to do good school work and not get behind.

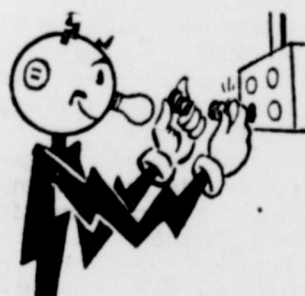
We have now bought a \$25 bond and Gad Garland, Jerry Goble, Monte Ray Ferrell, and Milton Sauls bought stamps this week.

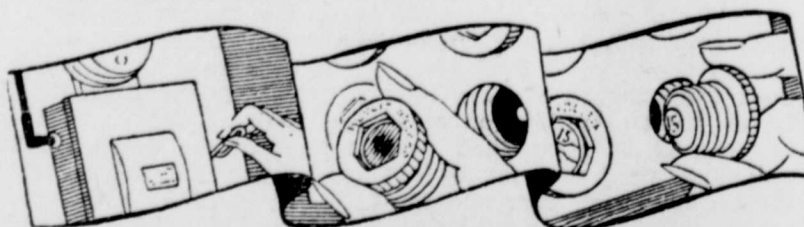
HOW TO CHANGE A BLOWN OUT FUSE

"LIKE CHANGING A LAMP BULB"



save yourself inconvenience and get your lights back on quicker.

The first thing to do is to disconnect the lamp or appliance that caused the fuse to blow. Then, take a new fuse of the right size, go to the fuse box and carefully follow the three steps outlined below.



STEP ONE—Locate the main cut-off switch near your meter box, and standing on a dry surface, turn off the electricity.

STEP TWO—Unscrew the "blown out" fuse, touching only its top. You can tell it by the burned patch in the window on top of the fuse.

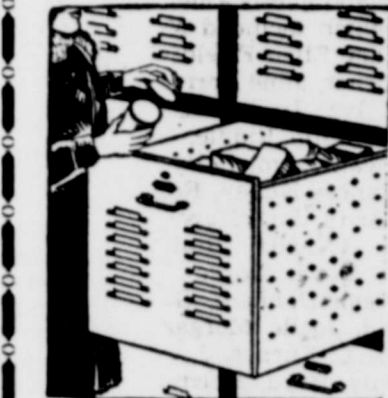

The Washington Merry-Go-Round

MAGNETIC TORPEDO:

Here is one reason why we needed the Azores so badly as an anti-submarine base. The U-boats not only have new devices but also a new strategy and may converge around the bottleneck to the Mediterranean between the Azores and Gibraltar.

DEVICES:

Latest Nazi torpedoes are superior to the former type which exploded only on contact. New torpedoes are exploded (1) on contact; (2) by magnetic attraction on coming close to the steel hull; (3) by the vibration of the engines of the ship under attack. This makes it possible for the submarine to succeed in its mission much more frequently than before. A torpedo is much less likely to miss, since missing actual contact with the target does not now mean, as previously, that it misses the target.

STRATEGY:

Convoys have now discovered that Nazi subs are hunting in packs of sufficient number to employ the same sort of naval strategy which large units of naval vessels are able to use. A group of submarines will surface on one side of the convoy, and thus decoy the escort vessels in that direction. Meantime, another group of submarines on the other side of the convoy will approach within easy firing range and discharge their torpedoes.

Observers believe, however, that the main artery of commerce from the United States to the European theater of war—the North Atlantic run—is still so well guarded that the submarine menace is licked so far as that run is concerned. It is feared, however, that the Nazis will now strike at another vulnerable point, namely, the Straits of Gibraltar. Since these straits must be passed by all Allied merchant shipping supplying the Mediterranean theater of war, including North Africa, Sicily, Sardinia, Corsica, Italy and the Adriatic—not to mention all the shipping now passing through the Mediterranean bound for the Straits of Suez and India—this area is due for a concentrated submarine attack.

A VISIT WITH STALIN

Secretary Hull might have got some interesting pointers for his Moscow trip from Cuban Ambassador Conchoso, only Latin American diplomat who has met Stalin.

Brilliant Senor Conchoso is both Cuban ambassador to the U.S.A. and Cuban minister to Soviet Russia. Recently he came back from a visit to the Soviet capital during which he presented his credentials to Foreign Minister Molotov, and expressed the polite hope that he might also call upon Stalin. Knowing that Stalin was one of the busiest men in the world, however, Conchoso did not press the point and actually did not expect to see him.

So he almost fell out of his ballet seat one night when someone tapped him on the shoulder and told him that Stalin would see him in 20 minutes. How Stalin knew the Cuban diplomat was enjoying the famous Moscow Ballet, Conchoso did not know.

However, he was told that a motor would call for him at the theater in 15 minutes, and he should be ready. Conchoso consulted a British diplomat, also present at the ballet, who told him that the man who had tapped him on the shoulder was the Russian chief of protocol, so he had better be ready.

It was May, but zero weather in Moscow. However, Ambassador Conchoso did not find it cold in the Kremlin. Churchill wore a zipper-suit when he called on Stalin, and Mrs. Hull has been worrying on behalf of her husband about the cold in the Kremlin. Only two officers guarded Stalin. One officer met the Cuban at the entrance of the building and escorted him to Stalin's office. There he was met by another officer who took him the rest of the way. There was no pomp or ceremony.

GENIAL JOSEPH

Stalin himself was not fierce, but kindly and genial. His eyes, according to Ambassador Conchoso, are deep and penetrating, but with wrinkles of humor in the corners.

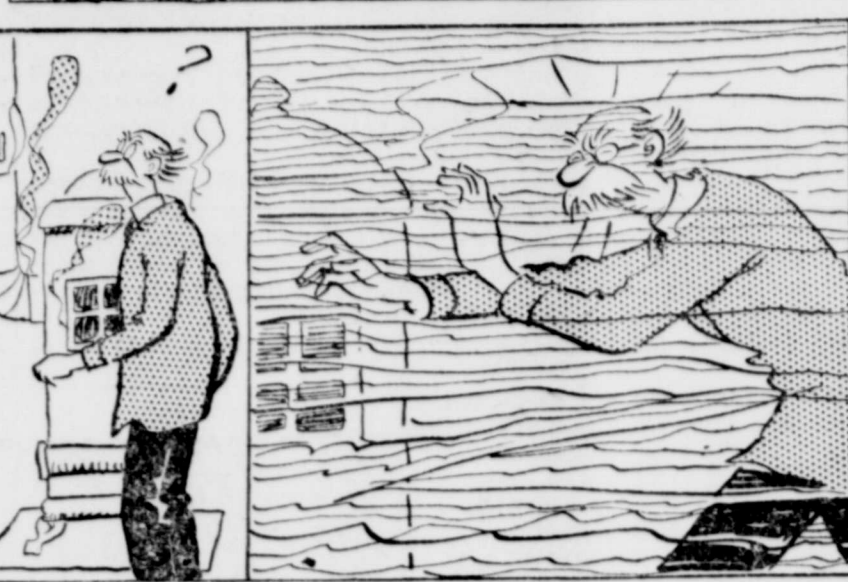
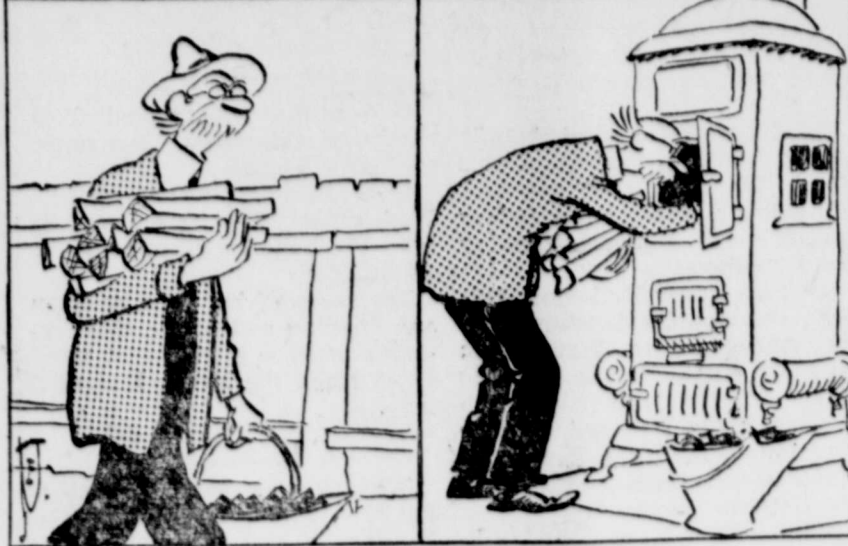
The Soviet premier seemed surprisingly well-posted on Cuban problems, knew something about its labor laws and its economic questions. However, he was not familiar with Cuban-U.S. relations and seemed to think that Cuba was still politically dependent on the U.S.A. The ambassador explained that the Platt amendment had been abrogated and Cuba now enjoyed complete freedom.

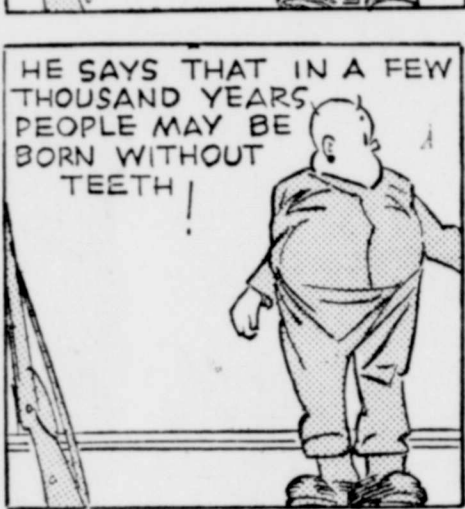
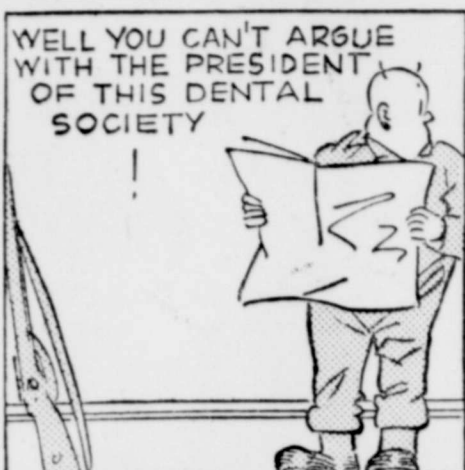

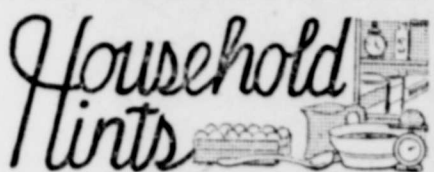

The bull session nodded wisely and Corporal Ussery went on. "Now, this young Corporal Joe Gantt, for instance. Now, this Corporal Gantt, when he first came in, was one of the greenest rookies in the bunch. But he snapped out of it and made corporal in four months."

"Was that soldiering," a voice broke in, "or handshaking—as the Latins used to say, mittus fopopus?"

"Much as I can't stand Gantt, I'll have to admit it was soldiering. That's the way it is. You sweat your head off hammering the drills and the calisthenics and the military courtesy and guard duty and the physical hygiene and the manual of arms into them. They're all clumsy and awkward as a bear in an egg crate at first, but then you can see them, after a while, snapping into it and getting better and better. By the time we've had them thirteen weeks, and they're ready to be assigned to their posts, they're as keen and alert as a bunch of West Point cadets. They're extra good cooks and better soldiers."

"Isn't a good soldier a specialist at griping and growling?" somebody asked him.

"Griping is an art, just like gold-bricking is an art. Before you leave here, you learn that you don't enjoy griping a bit when you spread your energy all over everywhere, griping about everything. You learn to choose one thing and specialize in griping about that."

"If you want to be a specialist at griping, you have to get on your toes. You get to where your clothes are comfortable. Where you used to think the food was terrible, now you pretend that you don't get enough of it. You like the beds and by nine o'clock you're sleepy. So you have to find something special to gripe about. If you haven't got any originality at all, pick you out one special noncom and gripe about him."

"Now, you take Private Hargrove, for instance. First came here, he gripped about me telling him he was carrying his rifle wrong. Now he grips when I tell him he's carrying it right. He might have something there. He still carries it like it was a 75-millimeter gun. He's getting so shiftless, even at griping, that he can't find anything to beef about except not getting any mail. I'm going to write all his creditors, so he won't even be able to gripe about the mail."

Somewhere on the wild coast of South Carolina, the battalion in which I cook is being treated to a weekend to combine business with pleasure. We can romp in the Atlantic while we get a "taste of the field." With the wind blowing the sand into kitchens and pup tents alike, it will be nice to get back to

Fort Bragg for a taste of the food we eat. A vexed soldier here doesn't grate his teeth. He crunches them.

We made the trip here in lorries, which are the mechanical age's nearest approach in appearance to covered wagons. You've probably seen them rolling noisily but smoothly through town—large canvas-topped trucks with a folding bench down each side inside. You'd expect to be hauled out of one of them, beaten to death, at the end of a 130-mile trip. They give a tolerably bumpy ride, just tolerably.

When we started pitching camp, about a quarter of a mile back from the beach, we found the place already inhabited — by cannibals. These creatures, which masquerade as harmless flies and even camouflage by the harmless sounding name of sand flies, must have vampire blood back in the line somewhere.

I don't bear any grudge against the easygoing, good-natured house fly—in fact, I feel rather cruel when I squash one for tickling me—but it arouses my pioneer fighting spirit to see a stunted horsey light on my bare leg, make himself sassily comfortable and start draining off my life's blood. But what can you do? Slapping one only serves to make him mad at you.

At night we sleep, or at least we simulate sleep, in pup tents made by our own hands with loving care, blood, sweat, tears, two pieces of waterproof cloth, two lengths of rope, and a handful of turned lumber.

I share my little duplex with Private Warren, the new student cook who told me the story about the man at the boarding house. When I stumbled home last night, primed to the gills with a blend of sand and salt water, I discovered that we had an overnight guest! The chief cook on our shift, in the task of packing the field kitchen, had neglected to put his own field pack (tent, half, blankets, etc.) on the truck, so he decided to drop over and have us put him up for the night.

A pup tent, as you probably don't need to be told, will accommodate two men, provided neither of them walks in his sleep. If three men are to sleep in one tent, at least two of them must be midgets or babes in arms. Cooks should never sleep two to a tent, because of their tendency toward plumpness.

We arranged ourselves in the tent by wrapping knees around the tent poles, putting all feet outside for the night and raising one side of the tent high enough to make a rustic sleeping porch of the whole affair.

The guest proved to be one of those loathsome creatures who pull all the covers to their side of the bed. We had quite a lot of trouble with him, since he slept in the middle and rolled up in both our blankets. We remedied this by waiting until he started snoring, then recovered our blankets, rolling ourselves in them and throwing a raincoat over him.

The three-man arrangement was very uncomfortable for a while. When I finished opening my eyes by scooping the sand from them, I found that I had rolled through the opened side of the tent and spent the night under a myrtle bush ten yards down the slope.

During my first off hour, I succeeded in getting a tan which must have darkened the very marrow of my bones. My chest, back, and legs looked the color of a faded danger flag and smelled like the roast pork that the cook forgot to watch. After that, the surf and the sun went their ways and I went mine. Improved Uniform International SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

THE SACREDNESS OF HUMAN LIFE

LESSON TEXT—Exodus 20:13; Matthew 5:21-28, 38-43.
GOLDEN TEXT—Whosoever hateth his brother is a murderer.—1 John 3:15.

Human life is sacred—and there is a very important reason why that is true. It is not because of any law of man, but finds its foundation in the fact that God created man in His own likeness and image. Because that is true, no man has any right to take the life of another for any cause except at the direct command of God. Only by the orderly process of law for the protection of society and in accordance with the Word of God may there be any such action by man toward man.

Both of these truths are declared in Scripture in God's covenant with Noah (Gen. 9:5, 6), which was made possibly a thousand years before the Ten Commandments were given to Moses.

One cannot deny that human life is held rather cheaply in many places today. War helps to create that attitude on the part of nations which makes them count boys and girls, yes, mere babies, as "war material."

But not only in war is life carelessly destroyed. We decry the "slaughter of innocents" on the highway, unnecessary death in industry, yes, even in the home.

I. The Prohibition of Murder (Exod. 20:13).

The word "kill" in this commandment is one which means a violent and unauthorized taking of life, and is therefore more properly translated "murder."

Not all killing is murder. A man may kill another entirely accidentally, or he may be the duly constituted legal officer carrying out the law of the land in taking the life of one who has forfeited his right to live because he has slain another.

There is also the right of self-defense, be it individual or collective as in war. But these are the only exceptions; let us not attempt to justify any other.

Murder is more prevalent than most of us suppose. Some years ago we were told that there was a murder every forty minutes in our land. With the general increase of crime, and of drunkenness (which so often incites murder), the current figures would probably show an increase.

Do not forget the deaths, the destruction of life, by avoidable automobile accidents. Some of these were really murder because the one responsible drove with defective brakes, dangerous tires, or while he was intoxicated. Add to these the deaths in industry caused by failure to provide proper safeguards or healthy working conditions, and by the exploitation of child labor, and we say that we should cry aloud, "Thou shalt do no murder."

II. The Provocation to Murder (Matt. 5:21, 22).

Murder finds its provoking cause in the heart of man. Our Lord was concerned about correcting the desires rather than to apprehend the offender after the act had been committed. It is the better way, and the more effective one.

In this matter of murder, Jesus cut right through the outward aspects of the matter and pointed out that an angry hatred in the heart is the root of all murder. If we hate, we have murder in our hearts. Circumstances may hinder its fulfillment, but the danger is always there until we remove the cause.

Just being angry—calling our brother "raca" (the modern equivalent of which is "nobody there"), and calling him "thou fool," which classifies him as "morally worthless"—these are the three dreadful downward steps to murder. And they begin in anger.

May God help those of us who have strong feelings that we may not yield them to the devil in such anger against our brother!

III. The Prevention of Murder (Matt. 5:23-26, 38-45).

Prevention with God means more than putting up a barrier to keep us from killing. He deals with the heart, and thus puts the whole life right. It is not even a question of how we may feel against our brother. If he has sinned against us we are to do all we can to win him. He may be unreasonable, grasping, and unfair. However, the spirit that will win him is not that of retaliation or sullen submission to the inevitable, but rather a free and willing going even beyond what is required.

It is clear from other scriptures that our Lord does not mean that wicked and unscrupulous men are to be permitted to defraud and destroy God's people. At the same time, we must be careful not to explain away the heart of our Lord's interpretation of this great commandment.

We who believe in Christ are to be in deed as well as word the sons of our heavenly Father (v. 45), loving not only those who are kind to us, but even our enemies.

Second Test for
Army-Navy V-12
Program Nov. 9

Dallas, October 12.—The second nationwide test for candidates who wish to be considered for the Army Specialized Training Program and the Navy College Program V-12 will be held on Tuesday, November 9.

The test will be given at any high school, preparatory school, or college in the United States attended by students who wish to take it. Any student interested and eligible should notify a school principal or college official. Students who did not qualify on the test of April 2, 1943, and are still eligible to apply for the college program, must take the November 9th test if they wish to be considered again.

Students who take the qualifying test will be required to indicate on the day of the test their preference for the Army program or that of the Navy. Taking the test does not constitute enlistment in either branch of the armed service; that is, having taken the test, a student is not obligated to enter the program if he is accepted.

However, no candidate who expresses a preference for the Army will be considered by the Navy or vice-versa; in other words, the branch of the service marked as preferred on the day of the test will be the only branch to which the test score will be reported. No change in preference may be made after the day of the test.

Therefore, anyone who expects to take the qualifying test should consider carefully in advance (a) if eligible for both programs, which one is preferred. No instructions have been issued to local Selection Boards to defer students on the grounds that they may be chosen for participation in the ASTP or the Navy V-12 Program.
