(By Associated Press) BUENOS AIRES, May 30.—Twenty persons were reported killed and half of the village of Villafra de la Cruz today destroyed by an earthquake today. Many houses were burned and a bridge in the city collapsed.

The number of injured could not be estimated. Schools have been closing owing to danger of their collapsing.

Many injured were reported in the town of Las Malvinas where numerous homes were destroyed. Aid was rushed to the stricken areas.

Two Killed When Race Car Skids

NEW YORK, May 30.—(P)—A skidding racing car today killed two spectators and injured three others in the middle of the track, at the Metropolitan Heights fair grounds track, Manassas, Long Island.

The dead were Damasus McKenna, 48, of Flushing, Long Island, and an unidentified boy about 15 years old.

The driver, Bernie Katz, 25, of Brooklyn, suffered a fractured skull. Jacob Ansel, 27, of Elmhurst, Long Island, and an unidentified man suffered less serious injuries.

Katz lost control of his car while it was traveling at 60 miles an hour.

Results Of Election Are To Be Announced Friday; 1931 Convention To Be Held In Foreign Land

(By Associated Press) DALLAS, May 30.—Notaries were named here for their 20th annual international convention today. The officers and disposed of most of the routine and controversial business on their program.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., May 30.—(P)—William F. O'Neil, superintendent of police, today laid the blame for last night's pitched battle between Brown University students and the authorities to "the lawless rabble outside of the college walls who urged on a minority of roving students."

University officials were non-committal concerning the outbreak, in which 21 persons were injured by rocks or police riot sticks and two were shot; one, a sophomore, and the other, a student.

Twelve years ago the two, together with another sister, were placed in a children's home at St. Louis after being orphaned by the death of their parents.

Louise Agnes was adopted by the late S. D. Strother, wealthy Tennessee oil magnate, who left her \$600,000. Her brother was adopted by a family of farmers here.

Leon recently discovered that his sister was attending Ward Beumont school at Nashville, Tenn. They communicated and made plans for the reunion after Leon's graduation from high school this spring.

Floods Continue Assault On East And South Texas

Damage To Crops Is Estimated At Millions Of Dollars; Traffic Is Still Halted By High Waters

(By Associated Press) DALLAS, May 30.—Floods that for three days had held sections of south and east Texas water-bound, taken at least seven lives, caused several million dollars damage to crops, halted highway traffic and crippled train and telegraph service today were making their deadliest assault on regions of southeast Texas.

A number of towns near Beaumont were surrounded by flood waters from numerous streams taking on unprecedented May rains in their upper watersheds.

Highways Under Water Cleveland was surrounded by water, highways being under six feet of water at a number of places. A number of residents evacuated their homes. Railroad service also was interrupted. The Santa Fe railroad company's tracks over Menard creek at Fugate, north of Cleveland, were torn up for 400 feet.

In south Haden county, several hundred acres of fertile farm lands were inundated, and about 100 head of livestock drowned.

At Houston, the situation seemed improved, although intermittent showers still were falling. Automobile traffic continued crippled.

Parachute Jumper Is Killed In Fall

DENVER, May 30.—(P)—Norman J. Lee, Colorado Springs parachute jumper, died tonight from injuries received two hours earlier when his parachute failed to function in a 1,500 foot drop over the Colorado Springs field here.

A holiday crowd of several thousand saw Lee fall, but did not realize that he was fatally injured.

The parachute opened, witnesses said, and immediately folded up again, staying sufficiently expanded, however, to partially break Lee's fall. Examination of the parachute after the accident disclosed that it had ripped from edge to center, probably from the force of the wind.

Speaking In Resting Place Of Dead, Hoover Delivers Memorial Day Talk

(By Associated Press) ARLINGTON NATIONAL CEMETERY, Va., May 30.—President Hoover, speaking today for the first time as chief executive in this resting place of the Nation's dead, pledged renewed effort "that these sacrifices shall not be claimed in vain."

As "a great hope" that there may be avoided "those frightful fruits of men's failures, that have blotted with blood so many chapters of the world's history," Mr. Hoover pointed to the Kellogg-Briand treaty to outlaw war as one springing from the aspirations

and the hearts of men and women throughout the world.

"But, if this agreement is to fulfill its high purpose, we and other nations must accept its consequences," he warned. "We must, clothe faith and idealism with action. That action must march with the inexorable tread of common sense and realism to accomplishment."

Labor Triumphant In Parliamentary General Election

Conservative Government Of Stanley Baldwin Is Facing Disaster, Early Vote Returns Indicate

Three Unseated

Sir Austen Chamberlain Retains Post By Scant Margin Of Fifty Votes; Laborites Gain 31

(By Associated Press) LONDON, May 30.—A great triumph for the labor party and a consequent disaster to the conservative government of Stanley Baldwin was indicated by early returns from today's general parliamentary elections. At midnight three members of the government had lost their seats in the House of Commons to laborites and Sir Austen Chamberlain, secretary of state for foreign affairs, had retained his seat by the scant margin of 50 votes.

Sir Austen demanded a recount but it logged seven votes off his total, leaving him a 43 plurality.

At midnight, with returns from 145 constituencies, labor had 83 victories. The conservatives had won 49 seats, the liberals 9 and the independents 4. This represented a gain of 31 for labor and 7 for the liberals. The losses were conservative 24; labor 1, liberal 4, communists 1.

JURY DEADLOCKED Body Is Dismissed After Failing To Agree

AUSTIN, May 30.—The jury which heard testimony in the trial of Ed Swearingen, Lockhart, charged with fatally stabbing Carter Flowers, a companion of wartime days, was discharged today after having been unable to reach a verdict in 41 hours. The 12 men were reported voting 8 to 4 for acquittal.

Believe Killings Were Pre-Planned

PORT WORTH, May 30.—(P)—Arthur Sayers, 32, Houston, who shot his estranged wife to death and then killed himself here early today, evidently planned the death before he left Houston in an effort to reach a reconciliation with his wife.

Justice Walter Prichard returned an inquest verdict today to the effect that Sayers shot his wife and then died himself of self-inflicted pistol wounds.

Before leaving Houston a few days ago, Sayers left a handbag with his cousin, T. J. Jeans of Houston, according to Jeans' telephone report today to Roger Q. Williams, brother of Mrs. Sayers, at whose home the tragedy occurred.

When Jeans read of the tragedy this morning he opened the bag and found a note in which Sayers asked that Jeans take care of his body.

Set Mad Pace In Speedway Classic

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, May 30.—Two gangsters were killed and a gambler was believed held for \$20,000 ransom in three flareups of Chicago's gangland today. One of the gangsters, recently acquitted of murder, was found in a desecrated saloon within shouting distance of the Central police station.

The other, identified as Dominick Costa, was found in a Prairie in Hinsdale, suburb.

Victim Is "Kid" Austin The reported kidnap victim was "Kid" Austin, seen being hustled into an automobile by three men on the northwest side. An anonymous telephone call to police said he was being held for \$20,000.

Thomas McElligott, whose body was found in the saloon known as Staley's Grill, was implicated in a \$8,000 robbery last winter and also was named by Russell Thompson, gun salesman quizzed in the Moran gang massacre as purchaser of a machine gun.

Costa had no police record but was known as an associate of hoodlums. Police believe gangsters considered him a potential "stool-pigeon" and disposed of him.

King George Is Suffering From Attack Of Fever

Gravity Of Ruler's Malady Causes Shock Throughout Nation; Unexpected Relapse Halts Fete Plans

(By Associated Press) LONDON, May 30.—Reassuring news as to the condition of King George, again confined and suffering from an attack of fever, was obtained tonight from Windsor Castle.

No further communications as to his majesty's illness. It was stated, are considered necessary until tomorrow.

Shock Is Two Fold The shock caused by news that his majesty had suffered a relapse was twofold—the first from its unexpectedness and the second from the gravity of the King's malady. The fever is considered dangerous, apt to strike a sudden mortal blow.

No information could be obtained tonight as to the precise nature of the king's sickness nor as to the time at which the feverish condition first was observed. The nation had been looking forward to a celebration June 16 on his majesty's recovery from a previous illness. Only today programs for the event, bearing thanks to "Almighty God for His providence" in the king's first sickness, were issued.

Colorful Spectacle Is Viewed By Record-Smashing Crowd Of 160,000; Louis Meyer, '28 Winner, Second

Twelve Finish

Winner Enriched \$40,000 In Prizes; Averages More Than 97 Miles Per Hour For 500 Mile Event

(By Associated Press) INDIANAPOLIS, May 30.—(P)—Death and destruction were strewn in the wreckage of that scorching torch called the 500 mile automobile sweepstakes at the Indianapolis motor speedway today.

A record smashing crowd of 160,000 viewing the spectacle, Ray Keech, 28, Philadelphia, bounced his tiny eight cylinder racer a winner in 5:07:25.42. Louis Meyer, Los Angeles, winner of the 1928 race, finished second, nearly six minutes behind Keech, with Jimmy Gleason, Philadelphia, pulling up in third.

Twelve of the 33 drivers who wheeled their cars out for the start survived the terrific test of speed. Keech averaged 97.585 miles an hour, not even threatening speed records for the race.

The race resulted in the death of William Spence, 24, Los Angeles, and the miraculous escape of five other drivers. Spence was killed on his fortieth mile. His car turned over.

The car struck a retaining wall on a slide, threw Spence into the air in the middle of the track, turned completely over, righted itself and then came to a stop far down the track.

There was no suspension of the race. The other drivers shook their heads and continued their battle to win their share of the \$100,000 prize.

Keech, by his victory, was champion.

West Texas Chamber Commerce Asks Aid Of Three Railroads In Helping Panhandle Wheat Men

STAMFORD, May 30.—Officials of three railroads doing extensive business in West Texas have been petitioned to aid in solving the most important problem confronting the wheat growers of West Texas and the Panhandle at this time.

These officials, T. B. Gallaher, general freight and passenger agent of the Panhandle & Santa Fe railroad, L. M. Hogsett, general freight agent of the Fort Worth and Denver, and T. H. Wilhelm, general freight agent of the Rock Island and Gulf, are being sought by Mr. Pawkett, traffic manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to assist in assembling of equipment for the handling of the current year's grain crop.

The situation seems to have reached a point where, barring some unforeseen occurrence, the 1929 crop will be the greatest in the history of Texas grain production. Bonds Voted For Last Gap On Houston-Dallas Road

ORAPELAND, May 30.—An all-paved route from Houston to Dallas has been assured by the voting of \$300,000 worth of bonds by Crockett county for the paving of a 10-mile stretch of state highway 19 near here.

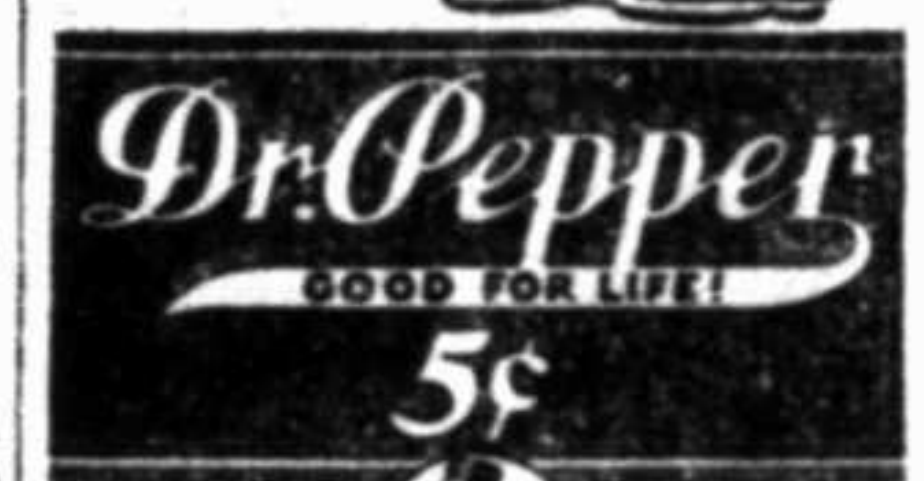

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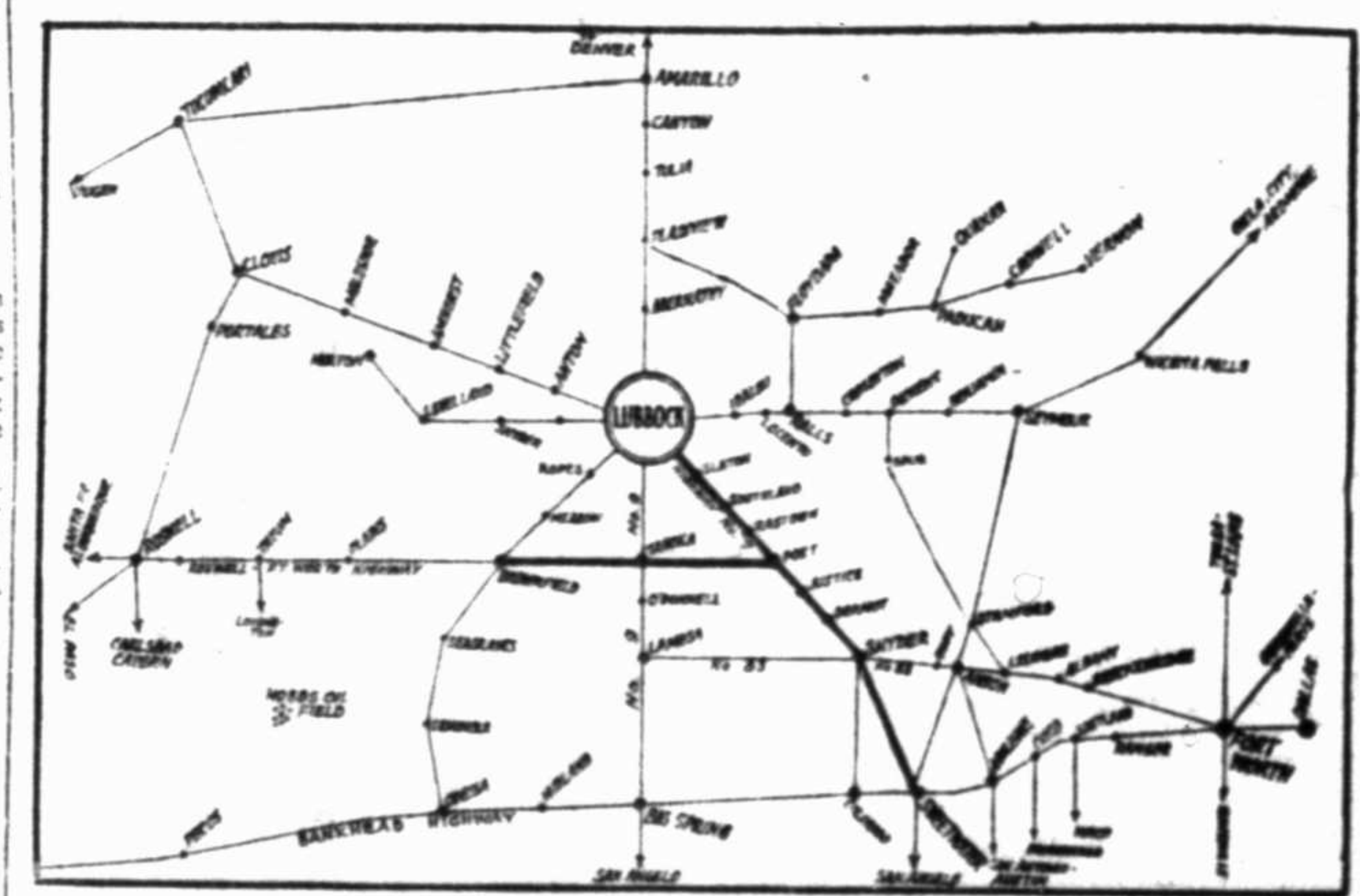

How to Achieve Beauty

It is an unpleasant, deplorable, but none the less true fact that hands of the most fastidious women do perspire. This is to be expected when you are exercising. Tennis and golf and all strenuous exercise stimulate to healthy activity the tiny perspiration glands that are so very plentiful in the palms of the hands and the soles of the feet. But often this perspiration persists at times when it is less excusable.

When the system is run down or when some unexpected excitement occurs, the hands perspire freely. The condition is objectionable, especially at times of social contact. Perspiring palms make would-be cordial handshaking a clumsy, most embarrassing procedure.

The truly fastidious woman is careful to prevent this condition as she is to keep her armpits dry and dainty. She either sponges her hands at the time of her morning or evening toilet with the same preparation she uses on her armpits or with a special lotion prepared to check hand perspiration and to deodorize.

Women who are not troubled with excessive perspiration may use simply a skin-toning lotion or facial astringent on their hands and most women do to shake a little toilet water or sprinkle a drop of perfume over their hands before any dress-up occasion. Sent applied in this way is delicately pleasant and unobtrusive.

The manicure is such a perfumery and usual part of any hand care that it scarcely seems necessary to describe it in detail here. It is best if possible to go to a manicurist weekly to keep the nails in their loveliest condition. But if you like to do them yourself, you easily may. A thorough manicure once a week means that only a moment's attention every day is needed.

Begin by filing your nails, and unless your fingers are very short and you wish to make them seem longer and tapering, do not file your nails into points. And never let them protrude very far beyond your fingertips. Too long nails are clumsy and affected looking. Make them follow the natural curve of your fingers. Then soften the cuticle by soaking the hands in warm, soapy water. Push it down with an orange stick covered with cotton, or if the cuticle is very stubborn, use a chemical remover. Afterward cover the cuticle with cream. If nails and cuticle are stained, apply peroxide or a similar bleach, and touch a little of the bleach or a white, bleaching cream under the tips of the nails. Lastly use your favorite polish, in a not too bright pink shade. For most wear the natural shell-pink color is preferred, although with the exotic sun-tan make-up you may use a deeper tint. Powder polish that must be buffed is the choice of most discriminating women, although the liquid polishes are a quick, convenient and practical substitute. And some people like to combine them.

Always before you leave your room take a last glance at your hands and nails. A second's care, a quick application of hand lotion or a final touch of the buffer may make a great difference to the delightful daintiness of your appearance.

Standerfer Speaks To Canyon Grads

West Texas State Teachers College Graduates Largest Class In History Of Institution

(Special To The Avalanche)

CANYON, May 30.—All the dignity and ceremony which is traditionally attached to college commencements everywhere was felt yesterday morning at the West Texas Teachers college when the largest class in the history of the institution received their degrees from the hands of the president, J. A. Hill.

Dr. J. D. Standerfer, president of Simmons University, delivered the commencement address to 110 graduates and nearly 1500 of their friends.

Dr. Standerfer placed his emphasis upon the need of the world for simple virtues and staunch character and called the attention of the assembly to the fact that freedom can only be granted safely to those who have already accepted full responsibility for their acts.

Too Many In College

He said, "There are too many people going to college. Only those who find and develop themselves in college should be there. College is a place for persons seeking only social position and a life of ease. Education, in the true sense, never brings ease—rather it brings harder work and greater problems and responsibilities."

The speaker used President Herbert Hoover as his example of the highest type of Christian American citizen and analyzed his character to show his fundamental virtues.

Visitors from all parts of Texas were present to attend the commencement exercises. Among them were parents from forty-six communities of Texas and from New Mexico and Oklahoma.

Hear the pathetic tale of Madame Berthelot Jaubert and her poor daughter Marie, who left a fortune a few days ago, broke into loud wailing and meaning and a prayer that life might be as it was before they were rich.

This legacy was the very last straw, for it seems that their woes began about a year ago when another tragically rich relative left them a fortune of some \$10,000,000. Maybe it was francs, but anyway the sum total is a right smart sum.

So here they are, two harmless, simple women, burdened with a fortune of \$22,000,000 and complaining that life can never again be the same.

They tell of the thousands of begging letters they receive of the demands made upon their time by real estate men wanting to sell them winter and summer homes, by people wanting to sell them yachts and champagne and jewels and automobiles.

Life has become an intolerable burden, they complain, almost cursing the relatives who left them the white elephants of the two fortunes.

IT ISN'T UNUSUAL

Now this reaction is quite in accordance with tradition. We have a popular belief that wealth means unhappiness. We love our husbands to the effect that the rich man is the man of many troubles, and that the simple cottager who goes to his brown loaf and drink of cold water from the old oaken bucket, is the man to be envied of all others.

We say that the man who must work for his daily bread does not know how fortunate he is till that necessity is snatched from him.

Now there is no little truth in all these bromides. But the real truth is that we have formulated these phrases largely as "booby prizes," to console us for our own humble estates.

For that many a rich man is as happy as a poor man is as true as our formula that poverty, at least comparative poverty, means peace and happiness.

There is no denial, either, that to be happy with wealth calls for as much manhood or womanhood as to be happy in poverty.

Therefore, my own reaction to the bleat and wails of Madame Berthelot Jaubert and her daughter Marie is not one of pity and respect for their philosophical choice of poverty rather than wealth, but a bit of disdain that they were not ready for their wealth, and have no resources within them which will enable them to use it wisely and happily.

IT'S A WEAKNESS

After all, the inability to stand money symbolizes constitutional fault as much as the physical inability to endure food or sunlight or air.

Our civilization has been advanced as much by men and women of wealth who made that wealth their job as by scientists concentrating their lives to laboratory test tubes in order that other human beings might live longer and more happily.

Complains at wealth is an admission of personal inadequacy and wasted use of previous years. To be sure, we must grant that poverty sometimes lashes us to her helm that we have no time to build up a personality ready for better things.

But if these two women have average health and intelligence they might better devote their energies to using their wealth wisely and usefully and happily than in complaining that things can't go on as they always have.

At present they are more deserving of scorn than praise, even though we do like clinging to our tradition that we are happiest in poverty, just because we know our chances of having any other state are not very fat and juicy.

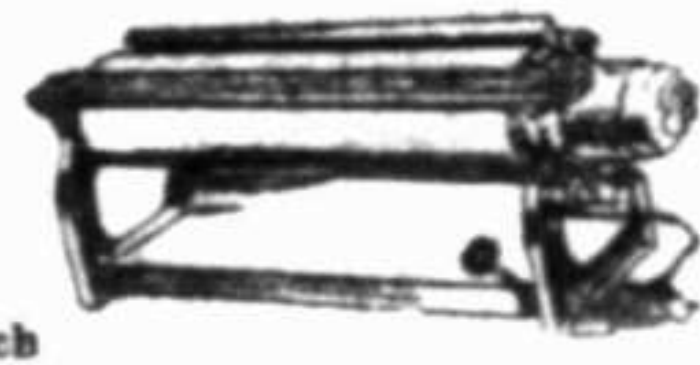

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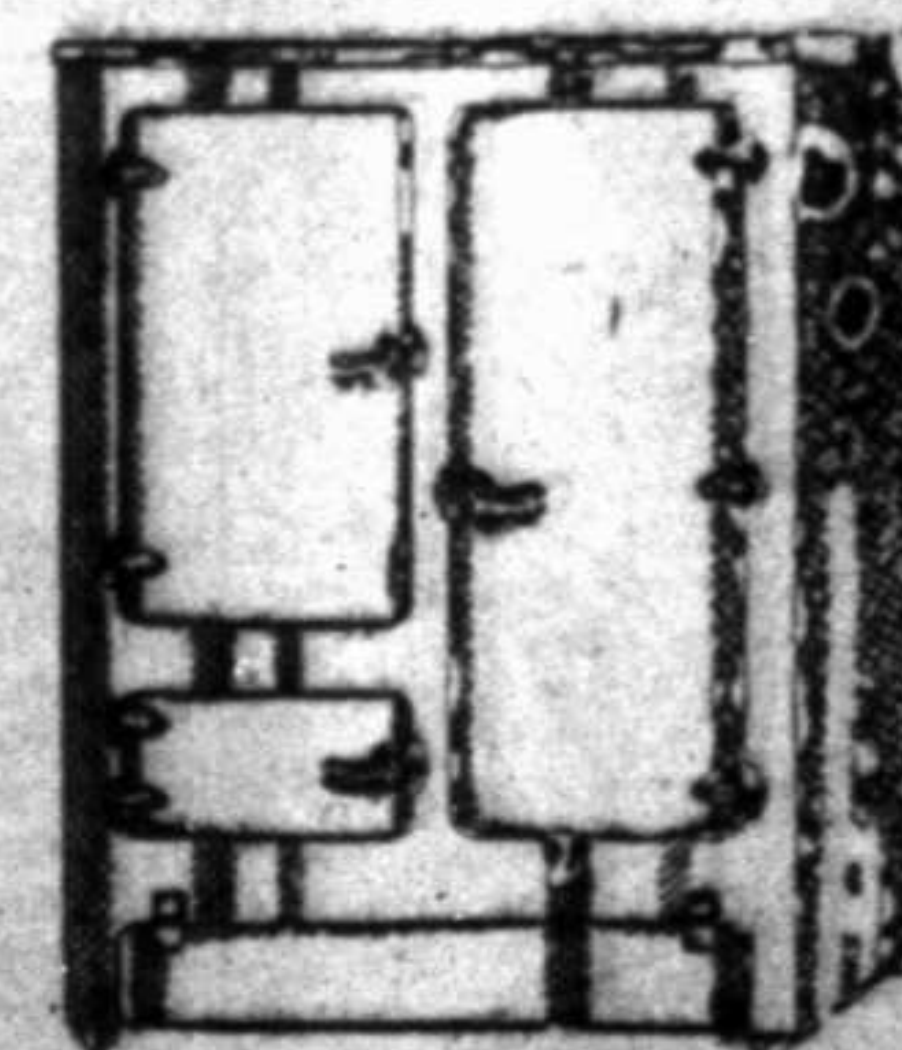

Brownfield in other words, has given the rest of the Plains country a new mark at which to shoot. The Terry country seat has proven that what has been done can be done—and further has done it along typical South Plains lines.

We repeat, without fear of contradiction, that Brownfield's record is worthy of commendation and take this opportunity to say:

"Brownfield steps out—and more power to her!"

IDEALISM IN ADVERTISING

The International Advertising Association, in session at Chicago, has adopted an ethical code, which, in broad principle, is a splendid commentary on the standards which now prevail in this important segment of American business. The association stresses the following aims:

1. To conduct our business on the principle of truth, honesty and integrity in every transaction.
 2. To seek lasting success and efficient service to our customers and the public by thorough and unceasing study of our business and field of endeavor.
- In proposing these central principles of guidance, the association appends an outline of practical ethical standards by means of which they can be carried out. It is a credit to the advertising leaders of the world that so meritorious a statement of standards should be widely distributed as a sound basis for business conduct.

REAPPORTIONMENT REVIVED

It is to be hoped that the proposed congressional recess for the purpose of studying the tariff bill will not result in further delay with respect to one special legislative matter—that of reapportionment.

In spite of the fact that congress was called primarily to deal with farm relief and the tariff, immediate reapportionment of the house of representatives on the basis of population has the support of President Hoover as well as the backing of the American people.

No less than 11 states are being deprived of their rightful representation as a result of failure to act on this important measure. In the last session of congress, the house gave its approval, but a senate filibuster during the closing days resulted in defeat.

All possible pressure should be brought to bear to secure favorable action at the earliest possible moment. If law obedience is to be something more than a pious hope, congress itself must set the pace by conforming to the constitutional requirements regarding representation.

MILLIONS OF AUTOMOBILES

The bureau of public roads, federal department of agriculture, reports that for the year 1928 there were registered in the United States 24,493,124 motor vehicles—including automobiles, taxicabs, autobuses, motor trucks and road tractors. This was an increase of 1,359,383 over the year 1927.

Estimating the population at 120,013,000, there is now a motor vehicle for every five persons in the country—one for every family. No doubt the great increase in the number of automobiles and the growing popularity of the race are largely responsible for the noticeable depression in the moving picture and theatrical business.

There was collected last year in this country, in license and registration fees, fines and other charges, the great sum of \$222,650,025, which was an increase of more than \$21,500,000 over 1927.

New York heads the list, with 3,083,942 registered vehicles, and California was second with 1,799,890. Nevada is at the foot of the list, with 27,376.

CURBING FAKERS AND QUACKS

Quack doctors and other exponents of questionable healing arts will find it extremely difficult to deceive the public under a law now effective in the District of Columbia. Hereafter the charlatan and the faker will have to be unusually resourceful if they expect to extract easy dollars from the purses of unsuspecting people who happen to reside in or near the national capital.

The upshot of the new statute is that all applicants for licenses must pass the same examinations in anatomy, physiology, chemistry, bacteriology and pathology. And, after passing the tests, each applicant must go before a board for detailed questioning as to the special healing methods which he intends to use.

There is no intention to discriminate against the various branches of drugless healing. On the contrary, examining boards will be created for the purpose of dealing with all special cults. Fitness and ability, however, are to be insisted upon, and every practitioner must show a degree of knowledge commensurate with the social responsibility he would assume.

In general, the District of Columbia plan seems to present an intelligent way of handling a public health problem of the utmost importance. Unqualified and ill-trained men and women who make their money by means of popular credulity can be kept out only by the creation of such formidable barriers.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

REACTION TO OUR PROSPERITY IS FORESEEN BY CONGRESSMAN

WASHINGTON, May 30.—"A period when the bulk of a nation's wealth is passing rapidly from one class' possession, into the possession of another class, usually goes down in history as a period of wonderful prosperity. 'Naturally so,' comments Congressman Ralph F. Loxley of Missouri, one of the foremost economists in the house of representatives, where all American financial legislation originates, 'because the class at the receiving end of such a period's transactions invariably writes its history. For the historian's own class it is, indeed, a prosperous period. 'A period of this sort continues—with more and more wealth steadily piling up in fewer and fewer hands, and the opposite class growing steadily larger and poorer—until it becomes intolerable to the overwhelming majority.'"

"Then," said the congressman, "comes reaction. Sooner or later, it is inevitable."

"The able men, among the beneficiaries of our present protective-tariff-built structure of special privilege, foresee it already. However, the snobish tendency on their part is to say: 'It will last our time. Let's get what we can while the getting's good, and leave the next decade or the next generation to worry over the future.'"

"After me the deluge," as the last French king before the revolution expressed it."

Representative Loxley does not profess free trade principles. On the contrary, he has said explicitly in congress, that Democrats of today are protectionists—which is queer, for free trade once was sound Jeffersonian doctrine.

"I believe," replied the Missourian, "that our country's founders never supposed unadulterated protection would be recognized as constitutional in the United States. They did regard tariffs as legitimate for revenue raising purposes, and probably saw no reason for objecting if, incidentally, they afforded a measure of aid to young, struggling industries."

"Thus protection slipped in unnoticed—consequently escaped challenge on constitutional grounds—presently became so essential a part of our economic structure that it can not be roughly tampered with, without endangering the entire edifice."

Nevertheless, Congressman Loxley does predict a coming reaction.

"Special privilege threatens to kill the goose that lays the golden eggs," as he puts it.

And then what? "That depends," says the Missourian, "on the especially privileged interests' cupidity—on how fast and how far they overdo matters. And that is why I assert that those interests' best friends, in the long run, are those of us who counsel moderation. It will not prevent a reaction, but it may prevent a violent one."

A sudden tearing down of the whole tariff framework as the Missouri representative has intimated, certainly would be violent—a plenty—practically amounting to a revolution.

Does he prophesy anything so drastic? "The American people," answered the congressman, "are essentially conservative. Their preference assuredly will be for a gradual readjustment."

"No, there need not be a dislocation of business in the process."

"Where two groups which should divide 50-50 actually have been dividing 75-25, the former group will be cut down to 50 per cent, but the latter will be advanced to the same figure. The total will remain 100 per cent."

"Otherwise the change may be abrupt—which is painful."

Your Health

MANY WEIRD BELIEFS CENTER ON THE HEALTH OF MUSICIANS

There is not, of course, any reason to believe that the blowing of any musical instrument will injure the lungs; in fact, it is more reasonable to assume that such performance will exercise the lungs and thereby make them more healthful. Some of the superstitions associated with the playing of musical instruments constitute in themselves remarkable notions.

Many people think that all violin players have long hair and there is hardly a bald-headed violin virtuoso who does not spend at least five per cent of his income on hair tonics trying to justify this superstition.

It is argued that all players of the base horn are obese. It is said not only the trombone but also the cornet and particularly the oboe interfere with the condition of the lungs. Presumably the statement about the trombone and the oboe arises from the fact that the former has a great long tube and the latter the smallest outlet for the breath of any of the wind instruments and therefore strong efforts are required to blow either of these musical devices.

An orchestra leader who has had opportunity for many years to observe musicians reports that he knows no basis for either of these superstitions. Trombone and oboe players are just as healthy and live just as long as do players of any other type of musical instruments.

There is no reason therefore to suppose that the playing of an oboe or trombone in any way injures the health. It is not certain, of course, as to just how much practicing and playing on these instruments shortens life. No doubt the statistics for this point depend on the irritability and homicidal tendencies of the neighbors.

FOG

Evidence of the fact that man has not completely mastered all of the elements is given at frequent intervals when shipping is paralyzed by heavy fog banks. Ships are damaged and thousands of lives endangered.

All of the accepted weapons of mankind to fight unfavorable atmospheric conditions break down at these times. Shipping must blunder along blindly and run the risk of collision or drop anchor and wait for the mists to clear. The largest liners, which think nothing of plowing through an Atlantic gale, are as powerless as the tiny tug.

Shipping experts predict that the day is not so far off when even such adverse conditions will be conquered. Practical results already have been obtained by the use of radio direction. Men blindfolded on the bridge of a ship have steered into harbors by the use of this device. However, the use of radio for navigation requires that every vessel, whether large or small, must be equipped for sending and receiving, for one ship blinded in a fog would be a potential menace to the others. There is also hope of solving the problem through fog dispersal.

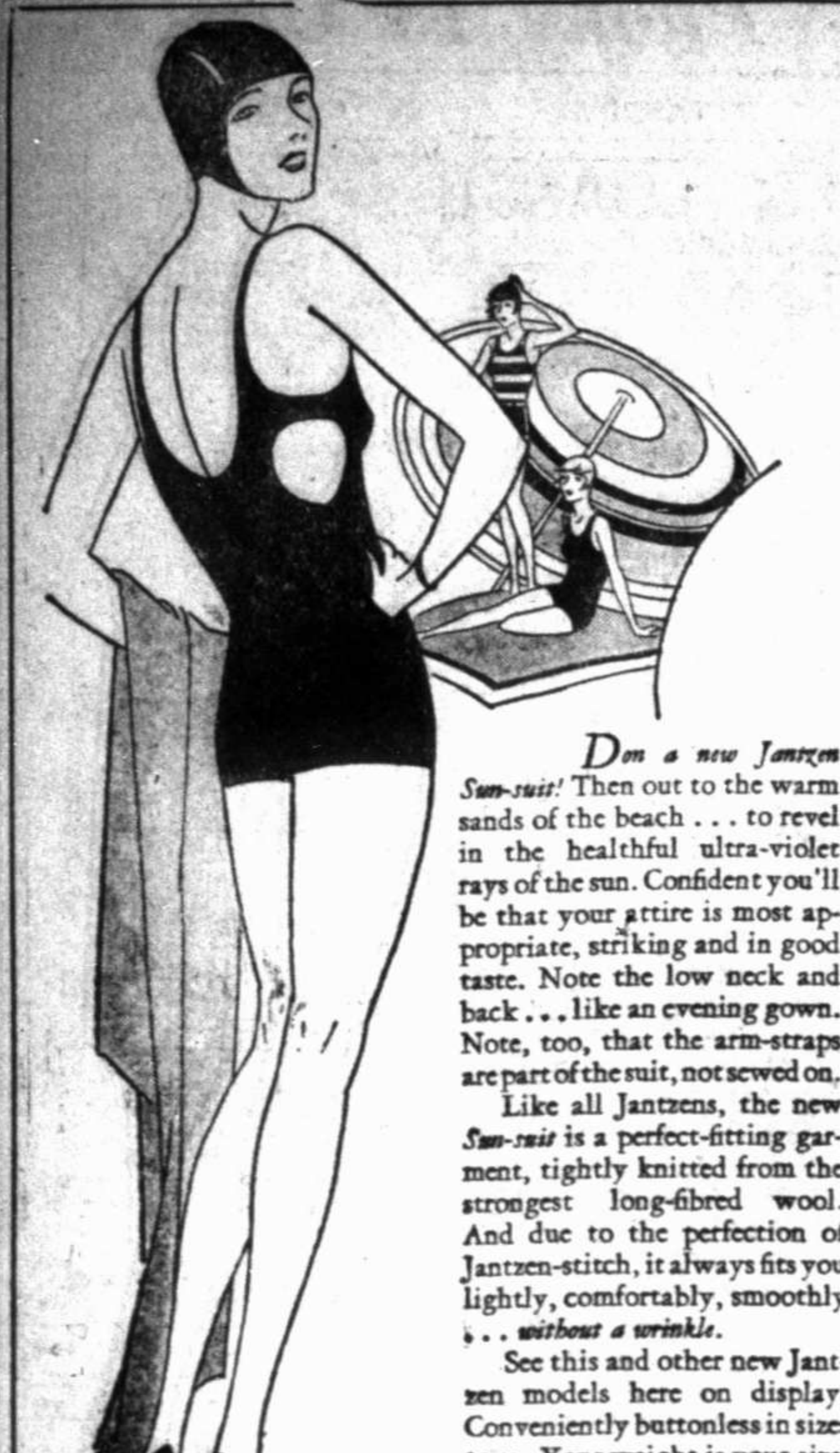

Peters and Jackson on the return.

Visit Oklahoma Cities
Making additional inspections, Messrs. Peters and Jackson visited in Oklahoma City and Tulsa. Action will be taken probably as to the kind of high school building that will be proposed for this city at the next meeting of the school board, member announced. An election will be called shortly after final plans are agreed upon, it was indicated.

Expressions of the committee members indicate that Woodrow Wilson high school, Dallas, impressed the Lubbock men as a structure best suited to the needs of this city.

Central high school, Tulsa, a \$3,000,000 building, was inspected by Messrs. Jackson and Peters. "In point of beauty and size the Tulsa high school building excels any school structure I've ever seen," said Mr. Jackson. "Of course, the expense of such a building is beyond anything the Lubbock board can plan."

Bells Ringing Out Lay Of Last Swiss Minstrel; Emil Closs Is Last Of Kind

NEW YORK, May 30.—The lay of the last minstrel, the swan song of the last of the old-time Swiss bell ringers is being sung.

Emil Closs rings the bells. He has been ringing them for 19 years. He is the master of 27 bells that range in tone over 2 1-2 octaves. When he first began with seven bells there were always then a thousand people eager to listen.

But now—ah, times have changed! The bells, they are abused. The public ear has been ruined by discordant noises, orchestras of locomotive whistles, the screech of automobile horns, saxophones, banjos. There is little place for the clear notes of the bells any more.

The National Broadcasting Company wanted a Swiss bell ringer for its "Dutch Masters Minstrel," a weekly radio program. A search was instituted. The first booking agency said it was impossible, that the Swiss bell ringer was extinct. But perseverance led to Brooklyn, to the home of Emil Closs, the last survivor in the metropolitan area and one of the few left in the country.

A Swiss bell ringer has pride in the broadcasting studio a table carefully covered with felt. The

bells came out of their soft bags of flannel. They were carefully marshaled in neat rows.

The Dutch Masters Minstrels are on the air. The announcer says into the microphone: "Emil Closs, world famous master of the Swiss bells."

Gravely Closs rises to his feet and approaches his beloved bells. The other musicians cover their mouths to prevent their snickers being audible. Closs glowers at them, then delicately he rings his bells, picking one up from the table and discarding another in almost the same movement.

He is playing Old Black Joe. The lay of the last minstrel.

Closs is wistful when he talks of his bells. He bemoans the passing of the golden day when every lyceum circuit and every chautauqua had its bell ringers. Yet he would never admit that he, one of the last and one of the best, finds it hard to ring his bells. No indeed, all the engagements he can take care of. Entertainments in New Jersey and Long Island towns. Church musicals every Sunday.

"Why only last Sunday I played in a Methodist church at the morning services and at a Baptist church in the evening."

Fish For Liquor Several Sacks Are Caught In Bay

he expressed regret that in spite of the Kellogg-Briand pact to renounce war as an instrument of national policy and the lessons of the great war the nations are engaged in strengthening their naval arms.

If the Kellogg-Briand covenant of national policy, Mr. Hoover said this means at once an abandonment of the aggressive use of arms by every nation signatory to the pact and "becomes a sincere declaration that all armaments hereafter shall be used only for defense."

After twice emphasizing that adequate preparedness "for the protection of our own people" is the only assurance against aggression, the president called attention that the United States has undertaken to approach the problem of naval disarmament with a new program calling for actual reductions in existing commitments in place of a building up to specific limitations.

The president's address was delivered during impressive ceremonies in the white marble amphitheatre at which thousands paid tribute to the sacrifices of the men who have died that the republic might live. They were conducted by veterans of the civil war.
