R. H. SEWELL DIES SATURDAY AFTER WRECK

Car Overturns after Blowout on
Perryton-Spearman Highway
Late Friday Night

Had Been to Perryton

Was Prominent Panhandle Lawyer
And Son of Judge W. H. Sewell
of Follett, Texas

Richard H. Sewell, county attorney of Hansford county, died in the Perryton hospital following injuries received a few minutes after midnight Saturday, January 1, in an automobile accident ten miles west of Perryton near Farnsworth.

Sewell had been to Perryton during the afternoon and night and was returning to his home in Spearman when the accident occurred. He was alone at the time the car overturned several times and it was believed that a blowout caused him to lose control of the car. He was rushed back to the hospital here by friends, where he failed to regain consciousness before his death late Saturday afternoon.

The young attorney, was only 25 years of age, received a B. A. degree and B. L. degree at the same time in 1934 at Baylor University and was an outstanding lawyer in the Panhandle with a great future. He was a lay leader in the First Baptist Church in Spearman.

Funeral rites were conducted at Follett Monday afternoon, with Reverend Loftin of Spearman, Baptist pastor, officiating. Burial was made in Follett.

He is survived by his parents, Judge and Mrs. W. H. Sewell of Follett, two sisters, Miss Evelyn Sewell instructor of music in a public school at Corpus Christi, and Miss Lola Sewell instructor of music in the Canadian schools, and one brother who is a student at Oklahoma University at Norman. Judge Sewell is a pioneer lawyer of Lipscomb county and is a former county judge. Mrs. Sewell is an instructor of Latin and English in the Follett High School.

PIONEER MERCHANT IS DEAD

GEORGE GERLACH, CANADIAN
DIES AFTER LONG ILLNESS
IN HIS HOME THERE
DECEMBER 26

George Gerlach, 74, pioneer merchant, died Wednesday morning, December 29, at his home in Canadian, following a long illness.

Mr. Gerlach was born at Verdun, Ill., February 8, 1863. He came to Texas in 1895, and settled on Horse Creek, 7 miles from Canadian where he followed the farming and merchandising business for about two years, after which he took up the freighting business, popular at that time. Later he opened a small store on Clear Creek.

In 1897, he and his brother John moved to Canadian and formed a partnership with J. A. Chambers and Loss Hayes which was later dissolved.

He established the Gerlach Mercantile Co. in Canadian which grew to such proportions that everything

PERRYTON POSTAL RECEIPTS UP

AIR MAIL OUT OF PERRYTON INCREASES FIVE HUNDRED PER CENT IN FIVE YEAR PERIOD

That Perryton and the surrounding community is gradually emerging from "hard times" resulting from drouth conditions is indicated by the substantial increase in receipts at the Perryton postoffice. Receipts for 1937 were \$12,667.60, against \$11,983.67 in 1936. This figure does not include money order fees. It represents the total of all stamp sales and money received from material mailed under permits, and newspapers.

Postmaster M. R. Coffee states that every year since he has been in office, the receipts have shown a gain. It is also interesting to note the great increase in the use of the air mail by patrons of the Perryton office. The year 1937 showed better than a 500 per cent increase over 1933. 1934 was slightly less than in 1933; 1935 doubled 1934; 1936 was almost double 1935; and 1937 showed better than a fifty per cent gain over 1936.

RAINFALL BELOW NORMAL AGAIN DURING PAST YEAR

For the eighth successive year, the rainfall in Ochiltree county during 1937 was below normal, according to the annual report prepared by Attorney Jack R. Allen. The total precipitation in 1937 was 15.88 inches distributed as follows:

Rainfall for the seven previous years was: 1930, 16.45; 1931, 17.35; 1932, 19.31; 1933, 16.00; 1934, 14.23; 1935, 13.40; 1936, 16.37. According to official government statistics, the average rainfall for Ochiltree county starting in 1890 and including 1930, was 19.88. It will be noted by the above figures that in only one year, 1932, did the precipitation near the average, and this year could not be taken as an average year for 6.78 inches fell in one month, June.

In The Spotlight

We've had a number of people comment on the reduced size of the Herald, only four pages last week. It's just a part of the policy of the Herald for the future.

County Agent Makes Annual Report on Work in County

County Agent E. W. Thomas' annual report to the Texas Extension Service for 1937 discloses that during the year 110,000 acres of land in the county have been listed on the contour and 1,285 acres have been terraced. Five trench silos have been dug and 2 additional old silos were filled and two demonstrations were held. This work comparatively new is proving to be successful.

The Boy's 4-H club was enlarged during 1937 for the 1938 period with Waka and Perryton schools having a drive for members.

Total loss in the county from grasshopper pests was estimated at \$38,800 with a savings of \$104,300. About 44 tons of poison was distributed to 400 farmers under the Community Agricultural Association.

oil was inaugurated in the county

The county agent's office have great plans for this work during 1938.

Six county meetings were held for discussing plans with an attendance of 267 persons.

In the Farm Program during the year 925 work sheets were signed and 80 per cent of the applications for payment were completed and submitted to the State Office by the end of the year. An estimate of 72 per cent of the cultivated land had been sown to wheat during the fall.

The range program included 22 stockmen building dams containing 25,000 yards of dirt to impound 45 acres of water. 22 stockmen cut cactus on grazing land and 16 practiced deferred grazing. 10 contour furrowed pasture land.

WARNS COMMERCIAL DRIVERS

EXAMINER STATES THAT NEW LAW TO BE RIGIDLY ENFORCED; GET YOUR LICENSE NOW

Rigid enforcement of the new commercial drivers license law is to be started very soon, according to T. R. Lovelace, Examiner of the Drivers License Division of the Department of Public Safety. "Few people realize that they are subject to a fine of a maximum of \$200.00 for driving a commercial vehicle before they have a permit," Mr. Lovelace said upon his visit to Perryton, Tuesday.

Examiner Lovelace further stated, "Though we have issued many licenses in Perryton, everyone, that is required by law to have a permit, has not secured it."

Among the many drivers required by the new law to have licenses are: ambulance drivers, wrecker drivers, delivermen of any kind, whether they own the truck or pick-up or not, any kind of a truck driver, even though employed by the state, county or city; plumbers, painters, electricians or any person hauling their tools; dairymen and their employees, in fact, nearly anyone that is employed in whole or part time driving a commercial vehicle for any purpose.

Mr. Lovelace is in Perryton every Tuesday from 8:00 a. m. to 10:00 a. m. for the purpose of issuing drivers licenses. Any person desiring information concerning the laws for drivers licenses, should get in touch with him at the Sheriff's office.

He further stated in regard to the work that the final budget of expenses for the administrative department amounted to \$4,047 has been submitted and will be deducted from the total payment. This amount will be divided by ratio between the individual farmers receiving payments.

Railroads Refused Injunction In Reduced Freight Rate Case

In a decision rendered December 31, a number of Texas railroads failed in efforts to enjoin orders of the railroad commission reducing freight rates on livestock feed in 39 Texas counties.

District Judge Roy C. Archer, Austin, refused the railroads' application for a temporary restraining order, overruling their contentions the law authorizing reductions in emergencies was invalid.

Assistant Attorney General Harry Pollard said the ruling, in effect, held the legislature had the power to reduce freight rates in emergencies and the power was lawfully delegated to the Railroad Commission.

Who's Hinton? Where Are You?

Many have asked and are asking, "What about the dam program that was to be Panhandle wide?"

The writer makes no pretense of being satisfied with what is being done under the program which is generally referred to as the "dam program," meaning thereby the program that we have been led to believe would be more or less Panhandle wide, in so far as the Texas Panhandle was concerned. The Panhandle Authority, created by the Texas Legislature, has one director from each county included. The Board of Directors have met several times and the achievement for the average county, even in the form of a hot promise, has been exactly nothing.

The Board was informed that Mr. Carl Hinton, our manager, (Secretary of the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce) "knew the ropes" in Washington and could be of more value to us than any other person. But despite the fact that the Manager knew just how to run things to get our program over, he let things get "messed up" so that he got into a jam to the extent he was forced to have at least two projects designated and started out in order to keep the program alive, yet this was just such a circumstance as was employed, to see that it did not happen. Does that sound like sense? And so when some project just had to be named our Manager (Secretary of the Amarillo C. of C.) seemingly could not think of anything but the Terra Blanca project, the one that Amarillo has been wanting for so long. A project that we have been reliably informed will cost something over three hundred seventy-five thousand dollars to say nothing of the land that we are informed will cost an additional sixty or seventy thousand dollars.

Although most all interested would like to know what is happening to benefit the counties constituting the Authority, but, so far as I know, and the average director knows, is, "I don't know." I do know that I think we are being "taken for a ride" by Amarillo Terra Blanca Boosters.

The only project that has had the money authorized is Terra Blanca. Why didn't they get the money set aside for the Hemphill county project before or at the same time position was made for Amarillo's Baby (Terra Blanca)? Hemphill County owned the land. Terra Blanca did not own any land.

And we are told that these projects were named because they owned the land or had options, yet Ochiltree County's site has been bought and paid for more than two years and the authorities well knew it. However, Ochiltree County had no more right to be first than any other county but had it been chosen as one to keep the program alive it could have been done for \$4,000.00 according to the Texas engineer's estimate, the only reason for reserving over four hundred thousand dollars, that could well be distributed among other counties of the Panhandle with some in Oklahoma and New Mexico for like projects. But Amarillo has to be first, while the rest wait. And I ask you is it right? Are you going to sit quiet and say nothing?

Isn't the President and those down the line all indicate that at most any program is likely to be held up? Do not all of us know that anything is apt to happen to any sort of a program to keep it from being started or even finished?

Is it right or fair to make practically the whole Panhandle wait until the Amarillo Baby Giant (Terra Blanca) is fully cared for and then if anything is left the rest of the Panhandle can have it? Is this program to Amarillo or the entire Panhandle?

Just why was it that an Amarillo real estate dealer had to have a "drag" out of our treasury to get something for Amarillo? Is there anything to the report that the owners of the land were told to hold out for more money? Didn't the local government appraiser, Pennington, appraise the land at \$1.00 per acre? Just who was responsible for a man coming out from Washington to appraise the land at \$7.00 per acre and have the authorities approve such appraisal for purchase, while others wait? Just why is it that the government has to buy much more land than needed for the Terra Blanca project at an inflated price—and the average county waiting? What for?

And just where are you, Mr. Average County? And you, Mr. Average County Judge? And you, Mister Average County Commissioner? And you, Mister Average Chamber of Commerce of the Texas Panhandle, Oklahoma and Eastern New Mexico? And you, Mr. Executive Council?

Has Congressman Marvin Jones turned his Panhandle Business over to Amarillo and Carl Hinton? Are we only to deal with him by proxy? Can we yet expect first hand consideration? Does he know that the people of the Average Panhandle County are by no means willing to let Terra Blanca "hog" large sums of money and the rest of us take a chance on being snafu at all?

Can Congressman Jones be for placing Terra Blanca first as a result of Amarillo keeping Carl Hinton (its secretary of C. of C.) in Washington as much of the time, apparently for that purpose? Is Jones aware that too much land at inflated value for Terra Blanca is soaking up money that should properly be distributed over more territory and to other counties? Who is our Congressman any way, Hinton or Jones?

Let us not cuss Marvin too quick. Let us give him time to help us. He is a busy man and has lots of things to do, but would he get too busy to look after his own district? After all we are the guys that send him to Congress, aren't we? He can do without Amarillo but not without the balance of the Panhandle, and yet remain in Congress. But we don't want him to do without Amarillo nor the rest of us. He is and ought to be congressman for all of us and I think wants to be, but something has gone wrong.

As an average county, what we want is only to be treated right and fair. If we are to have a program that covers the Panhandle then let us start that way. If it is to be a "one big dam affair," then o. k. It had as well be Terra Blanca as any place, but we all know that was not the understanding of the people of the Panhandle as a whole.

It is not to late to stop Terra Blanca and get something for the whole Panhandle. If every county judge, every county commissioner, every civic organization, every private citizen that feels that it should be a Panhandle program instead of an Amarillo program will get busy and express their displeasure of the way things are going in this connection, you will get results. Let us not be afraid to write or wire to Congressman Jones and the Farm Security Administration at Washington.

A copy of this goes to Congressman Marvin Jones and you are at liberty to refer to this article in communicating if you so desire.

Let us have an All Panhandle Program instead of just an Amarillo Program! I hope that you will act and act at once. "And I do mean YOU!"

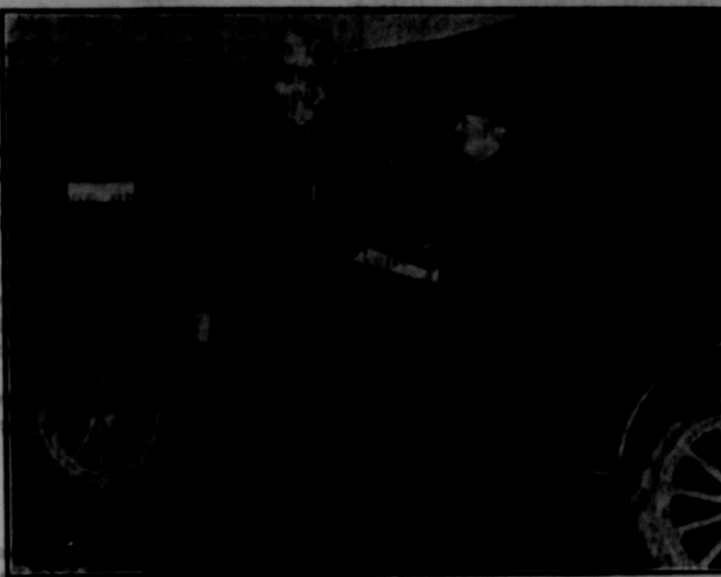

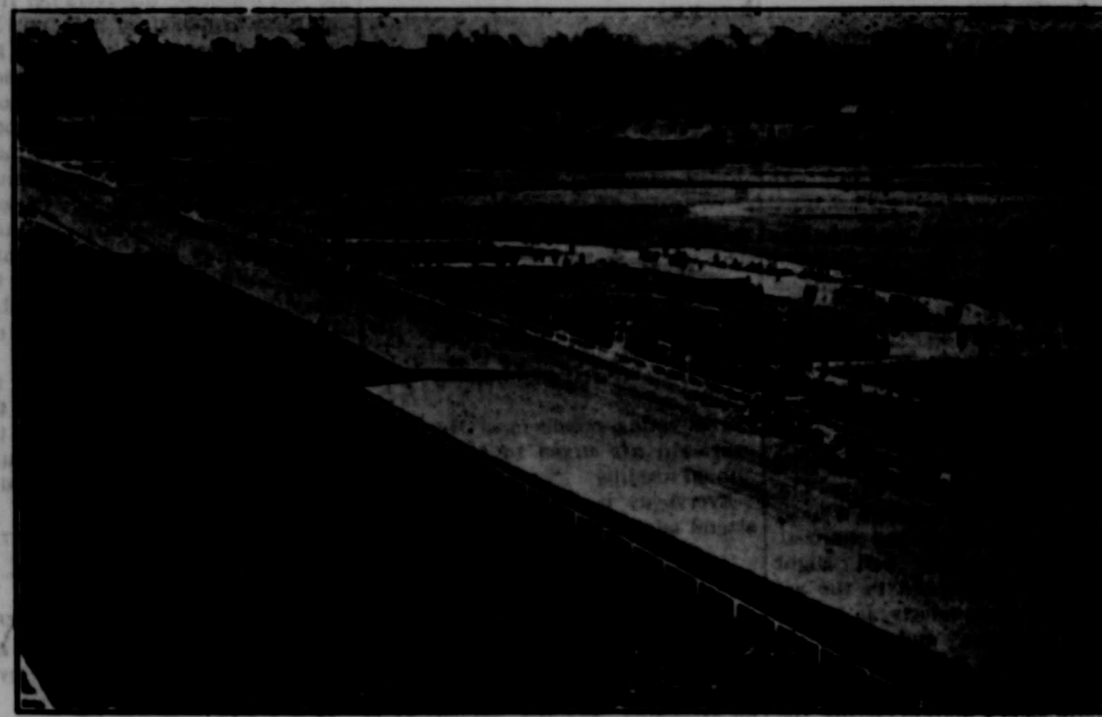

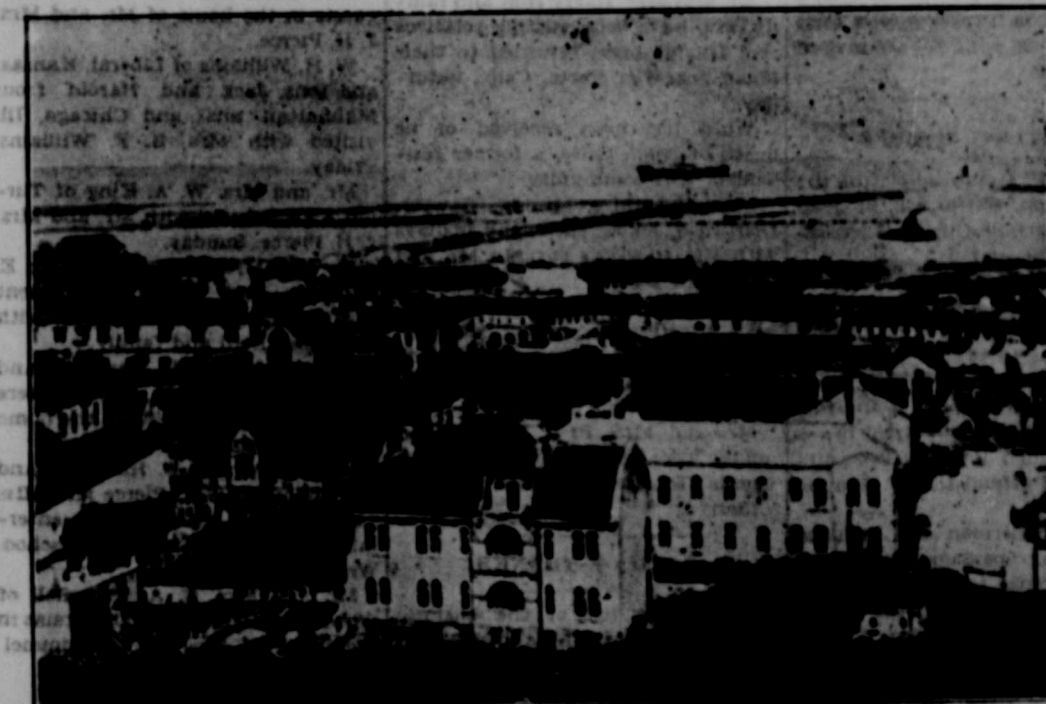

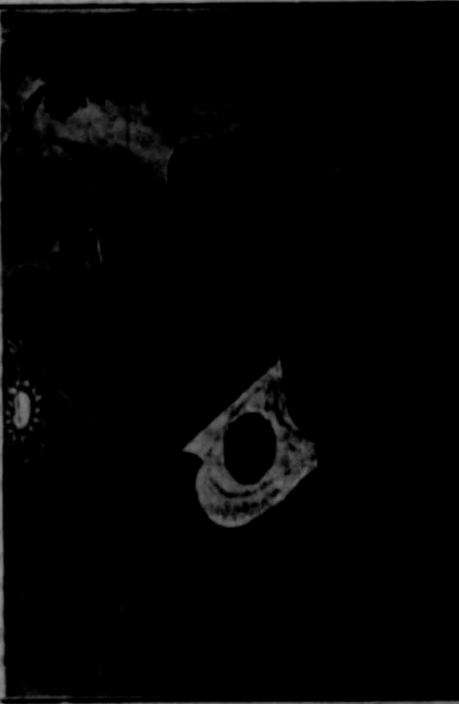

Posters scattered in crowded territories in China read, "Peace follows the Japanese dream."



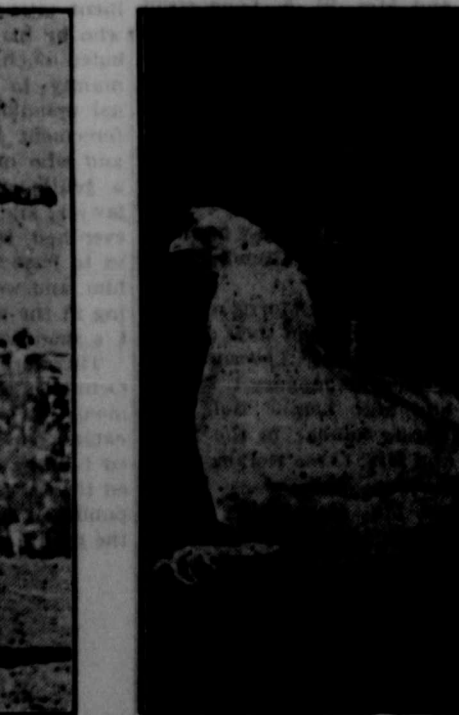
