GOP candidate says opponent 'out of touch'

Tim Weatherby, 26, Republican candidate for state representative from this district, told a group of Mitchell County Republicans Thursday that "we need someone willing work for this district."

Weatherby said his opponent, Dick Burnett of San Angelo, is "out of touch with the people", adding that Burnett "has not done much for this district" during his six terms in office.

Weatherby, also of San Angelo and a realtor, said "I have the energy to go down there (Austin) and represent the people of this district."

He said that Texas is faced with a sagging economy and questioned why it takes four times more in spending today than it did 12 years ago to serve a population that's only grown by a third.

"We can't depend on the oil industry year after year," he said. He said the state will have to look at budget cuts, increase revenue sources and raise taxes

in order to get out of the financial jam.

He said the most fair solution to a tax increase is to "increase the sales tax." He told the audience that he is opposed to a state income tax which would ultimately force businesses and industry to locate to states without such a tax.

"If the companies leave, the jobless rate goes up," he said. He further said incentives should be offered to companies and industries to locate in Texas.

Suspect caught after struggle with officer

A Colorado City man was charged with driving under the influence of drugs and resisting arrest following an early-morning struggle with a police officer.

Police Chief Bobby Sparks said that Officer Randy Roberts stopped a vehicle Tuesday at 2:30 a.m. driven by Sammy Gomez, 25, for suspicion of driving while intoxicated near Gas and Grub on east Highway 80.

Sparks said that when Roberts approached the vehicle driven by Gomez, Gomez ran on foot toward Ruddick Park. A scuffle ensued with the suspect managing to get the officer's gun from its holster. The two struggled for control of the weapon said Sparks, but the gun was never fired. However, both received minor injuries and both were treated and released for minor injuries at Mitchell County Hospital.

Gomez was subdued by Roberts before officers arrived, said Sparks.

Gomez, who is free while appealing a stabbing conviction, was taken to Mitchell County Jail where he was released after posting bond.

Attempted murder charges have been filed against a Colorado City woman following a stabbing incident Wednesday morning.

Police Chief Bobby Sparks

said Doris Tryon, 23, was charged after Sandra Larez, 23, was stabbed once in the left chest area early Wednesday morning at Larez's home, 422 East Ninth.

Officer Jerry Rutherford responded to a disturbance call at that location at 2 a.m. Wednesday.

Five people were arrested Tuesday morning by Colorado City police following raids at two motels.

Police Chief Bobby Sparks said that narcotics, paraphernalia and chemicals believed to be methamphetamines were seized during the raids.

Police arrested Maria Nall Ranck, 31, and Ernesto Diaz, Jr., 25, both of Colorado City; and Linda Luncford, 25, of Stamford; about 7 a.m. at the Great Western Motel on Highway 208. Police found a prohibited substance in their room, said Sparks.

At the Western Motel on Highway 80 at 8 a.m., police arrested Teri Louise Nall, 28, of Colorado City, the sister of Maria Nall Ranck, and Hubert Glen Mitchell, 34, of Post. Three sets of scales, a box of syringes and prohibited substance were recovered there, said Sparks.

All five were charged with possession of a prohibited substance and paraphernalia and were released from Mitchell County Jail after posting bonds.

Residents invited to economic forum

Economic development will be focal during a forum scheduled Monday in San Angelo and open to residents of Mitchell County.

Governor Mark White is crisscrossing the state during the last two weeks of July in a series of strategy sessions aimed at finding ways to give small Texas cities and towns the economic development tools to attract new business and industry. In community meetings throughout Texas, White and commissioners from state agencies are talking about the tools to attract new business and industry.

Monday's meeting will be from 1-3 p.m. at the Convention Center, 500 Rio Concho Dr., in San Angelo and is open to

residents from Tom Green, Jones, Taylor, Nolan, Menard, McCulloch, Runnels, Brown, Sterling, Coke, Mitchell, Coleman, Concho, Crockett, Irion, Sutton, Schleicher, Reagan, Kimble and Mason counties.

"Our communities are sufficiently varied to require that we set our goals based on a region's needs," said White. "But at the same time, there are five key elements that can create a strong and healthy environment for business expansion. These include a quality school system, a well-maintained transportation network, the quality and quantity of the water system, public safety, and last, but not

'Christmas in July' benefits tornado victims

The tragedy of the Sweetwater tornado on April 19 continues to take its toll on its victims, especially for one woman still hospitalized from injuries received when her home was destroyed by the twister.

Maria Castro, a former employee of the Colorado City Post Office, was home with her one-year-old daughter when the tornado struck without warning. Her husband, Eddie, and son John, 4, were not at home.

Maria was holding Amanda when the tornado struck, destroying their mobile home and thrusting Amanda from Maria's arms.

Both were injured, but Amanda has since recovered. Maria is in Parkland Hospital in Dallas, paralyzed from the chest down. Doctors say she will never walk again. In the near future, she will be moving to the Baylor Rehabilitation Center in Dallas for therapy on an in-patient basis.

Maria was employed by the Department of Human Services in Sweetwater at the time of the tragedy and her fellow employees have planned a "Christmas in July."

Amelia Garcia of the Colorado City office of Department of Human Services, said the family lost everything they owned in the tornado and each office in the region is setting up a Christmas tree and will collect household items, clothes and toys for the family throughout the month.

At the end of July, the Regional Wellness Committee of the agency will pick up and

deliver the gifts to the Castros. The family is in need of household items, including furniture, clothing, appliances and toys.

Mrs. Garcia, who is heading up the local drive, said "anything the community wants to give will be appreciated." Anyone with items to donate should call her at 728-2618 or go by 136 East Third.

In the area of education, Weatherby described House Bill 72 as "political football", adding that "nobody's happy with it." He said he is not against

teacher testing but is opposed to the way it was done. "The test was not a good means of finding out if teachers are qualified," he said. He further noted that more

discipline is needed in schools. He said the biggest issue in the race is the indigent health care bill which requires each county to pay 10 percent of its budget for such care.

"The people to benefit the most from this are illegal aliens," he said. He said it is not uncommon for Mexicans to cross the border into Texas to have their children born in American hospitals so their children can automatically become American citizens.

"They have free medical care and the baby will become an American citizen eligible for welfare payments," he said.

He said his opponent was one of two West Texans to vote in favor of the indigent health care bill.

Weatherby was introduced by Mitchell County Republican Chairman Austin Helm. Helm said that the Republican party of Texas has "come of age" and that the GOP platform stresses the importance of God, home and country. Helm said the GOP platform "believes in the basic rights of individuals" as well as prayer in school and that it opposes pornography and homosexuality.

Helm said it is true that Texas is facing a number of problems, but "with God's help, we can solve those problems."

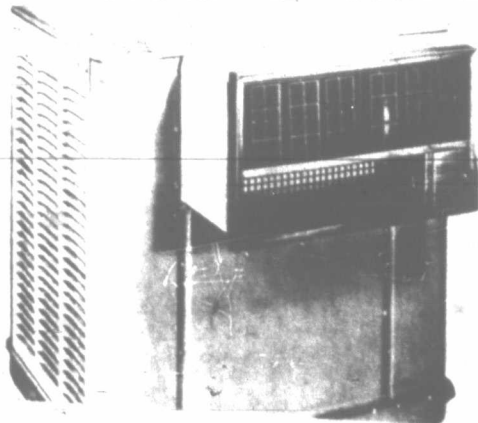

Somebody has stolen the flag of the United States right off the Mason County courthouse lawn.

If that somebody is apprehended any time in the near future he (or she) may wind up being attached to the same pole.

Toes first.

Glenn Marshall was so incensed by what he saw as "un-American" behavior he wrote the editor of the *Mason County News*. He hoped the thief might be literate enough to read his words. But Glenn had his doubts.

The thief, you would figure, could not be much of a reader - or classroom listener. To him, the name Jefferson would mean the family on a television sitcom. Washington would be a place where the Redskins play football. King would be a rock singer who drugged himself to death.

"Someone (or several), decided their personal gain was worth more than the respect and admiration the community has shown to the flag. So they stole the American Flag and the banner below it," wrote Marshall.

He holds little hope the criminal will ever be apprehended, fearing instead the flag will wind up as a curtain in a decrepit van.

He wants to believe the theft was committed by a transient who will never pass through the county again. "We certainly do not need that type of demented person in our county again," he says.

I don't blame Marshall for being angry. Americans have seen too many flags that were sewn into the crotches of Levis, or torched during acts of social defiance.

But rather than hanging the culprit by the toes - in the unlikely event he is ever apprehended - it might be better to educate him. Better yet, give him (or her) a choice. Jail, or history class.

Since it doesn't seem likely the flag was stolen as an expression of social or political protest, (kids aren't that political these days) we can probably assume the thief just liked the colors. Rather than a willful act of treason, we are probably dealing with an act of hard-earned ignorance.

Take up a community collection. Then find a local historian to escort the villain on a journey. Depending on the amount of money raised, it might be possible to lead him through the Civil War battlefields in Virginia. Or maybe just through the top museums in the country, or in Texas. If it's a rebel he aspires to be, introduce him to Robert E. Lee. He'll be impressed. If it's a macho man he admires, expose him to U.S. Grant.

When it's all over, have him write a paper. Have him include the number of U.S. war dead in each of those battles. Ask him to explain why anyone would be willing to chance a bullet piercing his heart for an intangible goal like freedom. Not the freedom to steal flags, but the freedom to work toward a democracy.

Let him know it didn't just happen, too.

Tell him we've been fighting wars - often with ourselves - while trying to define it. Sometimes the flag is the only thing united about us.

Let him know, though, when the squabbling stops, and we're all in agreement, we won't be interested enough to continue with the goal of democracy any longer.

He may want to mull that over for a while. But don't let him off with a shrug.

In the end, take him back to the courthouse square. Have him hoist the flag back to the top, if he hasn't already destroyed it. Otherwise, have him work until he can pay for a new one.

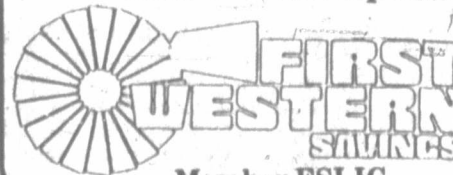
If, while he looks up at the flag, the people of Mason County see goose bumps where there ought to be goose bumps, I say spare him.

If the bumps aren't there, give him a cigarette and blindfold.

Some people you just have to shoot.

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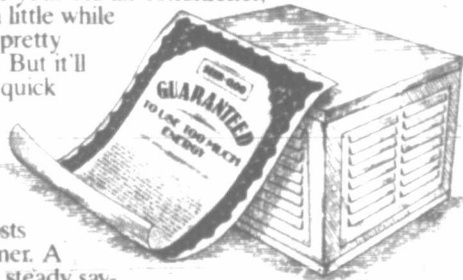

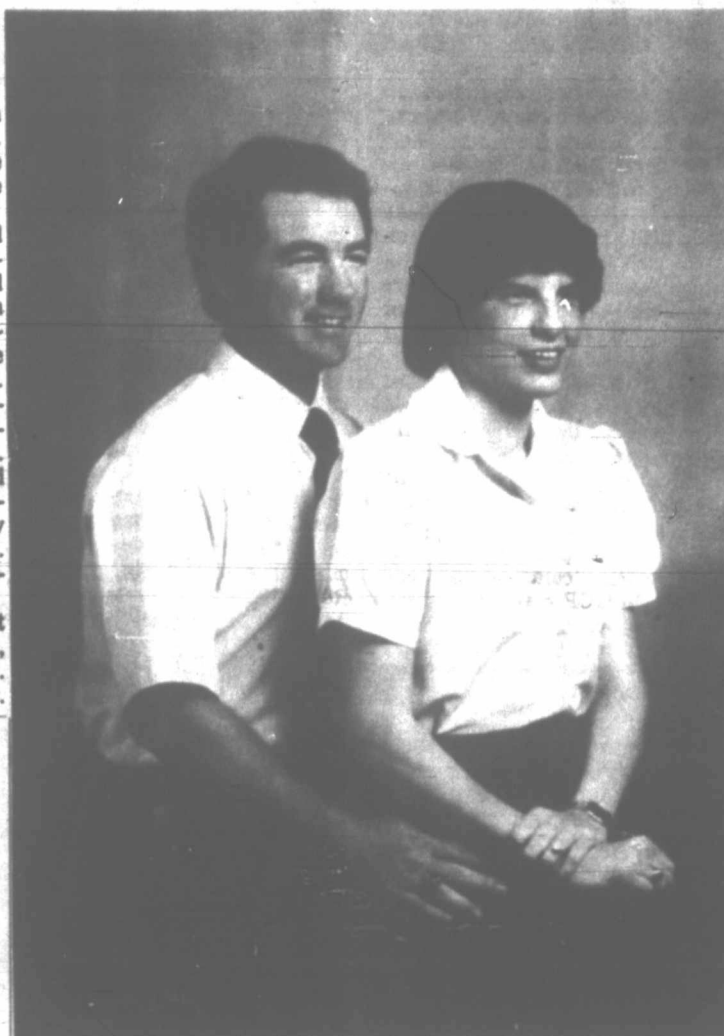

PERCENTS

CHANGING A PERCENT TO A DECIMAL

Percent means per hundred. The sign, %, is read "percent." Any percent can be written as a decimal. Any decimal can be written as a percent. To write a percent as a decimal:

1. Drop the percent sign
2. Move the decimal point two places to the left. Add zeros if necessary.

$$75\% = 75 \div 100 = .75 \quad 125\% = 125 \div 100 = 1.25$$

PROBLEM 1

Change 540% to a decimal.

PROBLEM 2

Change 100% to a decimal.

CHANGING A DECIMAL TO A PERCENT

1. Move the decimal point two places to the right. Add zeros if necessary.
2. Place the percent sign to the right of the number.

$$23 = 23\% \quad .4 = 40\% \quad 125 = 12.5\%$$

PROBLEM 1

Change 75 to a percent.

PROBLEM 2

Change .0625 to a percent.

CHANGING A FRACTION TO A PERCENT

1. Change the fraction to a decimal by dividing the denominator into the numerator.
2. Move the decimal point two places to the right.
3. Place the percent sign to the right of the number.

$$\frac{3}{5} = 6 = 60 = 60\%$$

$$\frac{1}{20} = .05 = 5 = 5\%$$

CHANGING A PERCENT TO A FRACTION

1. Drop the percent sign
2. Place the number over 100 as a fraction.
3. Reduce when possible.

$$45\% = \frac{45}{100} = \frac{9}{20}$$

FINDING PERCENT OF A NUMBER

One hundred percent means the whole amount. A score of 100% on a test means that all the answers were correct. Less than 100% means that all answers were not correct. To find the percent of a number, change the percent to a decimal and multiply. Remember that "of" means multiply.

Example:
80% of 45 is?
 $80 \times 45 = 36$

Example:
40% of 1 is?
 $40 \times 5 = 20$

PROBLEM 1

What is 50% of 1?

PROBLEM 2

There is a 5% sales tax on furniture. You buy \$355 worth of furniture. How much sales tax must you pay?

PROBLEM 3

A 3 pound jar of mixed nuts is 60% peanuts. How many pounds of mixed nuts are peanuts?

DISCOUNT

Rather than paying the original price for an item, a discount would reduce the original price. To figure a discount, change the percent to a decimal and multiply.

An appliance store advertises 15% off all refrigerators. The price of the refrigerator you want is \$375. 1. How much will you save? 2. How much will you have to pay after the discount has been taken away?

$$1. 15\% \text{ of } \$375 = .15 \times \$375 = \$56.25 \text{ (saved)}$$

$$2. \$375 - \$56.25 = \$318.75 \text{ (paid after dis.)}$$

PROBLEM 1

Many stores sell cooked hams. A cook will tell you that a ham shrinks while cooking. If a 16 pound ham loses 12% while cooking, how many pounds will it lose? What will the ham weigh after cooking?

FINDING PERCENT OF INCREASE OR DECREASE

When finding percent change (increase or decrease), follow these steps:

1. Divide the original amount into the amount of change.
2. Change the decimal quotient to a percent.

Example:
What is the percent of decrease of a \$500 item on sale for \$400?
The change is \$500 - \$400 or \$100.

$$\frac{100}{500} = .2 = 20\% \text{ (answer)}$$

PROBLEM 1

Last year, we had a total rainfall of 9.6 inches. This year we had a total of 7.2 inches. What is the percent of decrease in rainfall?

FIGURING SIMPLE INTEREST

Interest is an amount paid for the use of money. It can be either money earned for you or money paid by you.

PRINCIPAL (p). The amount of money that is borrowed or deposited.

RATE (r). The % of interest earned per year.

TIME (t). The length of time interest is earned in years.

To find interest (i), multiply the principal and the rate and the time together (i = p r t). For example, What is the interest of \$400.00 at 5% interest for 2 years and 6 months? (2 years and 6 months is 2 1/2 or 2.5 years).

THINK:

$$i = p r t$$

$$i = 400 \times 5\% \times 2.5$$

$$i = 400 \times .05 \times 2.5$$

$$i = \$50.00 \text{ (answer)}$$

PROBLEM 1

Find the interest on \$300 at 5.5% for 2 years and 3 months

FIGURING COMPOUND INTEREST

Compound interest means that the computation is done more than once. Most interest today is compounded. This means that the computer figures the amount of interest today at a specific time and then adds that interest to the principal. The larger principal now draws interest for another specific time. For example, Julia has \$300 in a bank earning 4% which is compounded semiannually (twice a year or every 6 months). How much money will she have at the end of one year?

THINK: If the bank will compound (figure) the interest twice a year and the money will be in the bank for one year, compute twice.

1. For the first 6 months:

$$i = p r t$$

$$i = 300 \times 4\% \times 6 \text{ months}$$

$$i = 300 \times .04 \times .5$$

$$i = \$6.00$$

2. Add \$6.00 to the old principal.

$$(\$300 + \$6 = \$306.00)$$

3. For the second 6 months:

$$i = p r t$$

$$i = 306 \times 4\% \times 6 \text{ months}$$

$$i = 306 \times .04 \times .5$$

$$i = \$6.12$$

4. Add the interest (\$6.12) to the principal. (\$306 + \$6.12 = \$312.12)

5. answer \$312.12

A pronoun is a word that can take the place of a noun and should be used in the same way as the noun it replaces.

1. When a pronoun is the subject of a sentence, use only a nominative pronoun. All pronouns other than those for subjects are objective or possessive.
2. With the phrases "it is" and "it was", use nominative pronouns. This applies to any other form of these pronouns. (It was he who was late.)

Hobby turns into money for Pevehouse

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article which appeared in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal concerns the brother of a Colorado City resident, Mrs. Lcu Williams. Her brother, Charlie Pevehouse, lives in Lubbock.

Charlie Pevehouse's favorite food is Purina Dog Chow. It has to be. He feeds it to a greyhound that's earned him \$190,000 during the past three years.

Homspun Rowdy is the canine that best defines the axiom about man's best friend, suddenly evolving a 20-year-old hobby for Pevehouse into a darn-near self-supporting income. The almost four-year-old dog is one of about 200 owned by Pevehouse (100 of them in Lubbock) and is by far the pick of the litter.

"He's just one of those that comes along once in a lifetime," Pevehouse said of the spotted red and white greyhound. "I don't know what's really special about him. He's just faster than all the rest of them."

All the rest of them in the United States, practically.

At the present time, Homspun Rowdy is the winningest active dog in the nation. One more major victory, and he'll be the winningest racing dog ever. His last major purse came in the Connecticut Derby, winning the June 1 race and bringing home \$30,000.

"I guess where I've really been fortunate is that the dog's been healthy. He's never been injured. In a lot of cases, you'll get dogs that sprain an ankle or break a leg. He's never had any problems," Pevehouse said. "I think that's because he breaks fast, gets away from the pack early and doesn't get bumped around."

The dog is presently in Rhode Island, one of several states where Pevehouse keeps what is rapidly becoming a franchise. He also has greyhounds in Florida, New Hampshire, Connecticut, Massachusetts and Mexico.

Homspun Rowdy's best distance is three-eighths of a mile. The dog usually covers that length between 38 and 39 seconds—and also usually wins.

Pevehouse and former co-owner John Bugner purchased the dog two years ago for \$1,200 in Abilene, Kansas. However, Bugner became indebted to Pevehouse, who wanted controlling interest, and bought out Bugner for \$11,500.

"He owed me some back commissions and he needed the money," Pevehouse said of Bugner. "He's a good, honest man and he takes care of the dog for me."

But isn't Bugner probably kicking himself for forfeiting half-ownership of the dog?

"Probably," says Pevehouse. The dog's earnings—approximately \$190,000 according to Pevehouse—ranks Homspun Rowdy third on the all-time list. The dog is likely to become the winningest dog ever, but Homspun Rowdy's value will hardly take a drastic nosedive when he's required to retire at the age of five.

"He'll be an awful good stud dog," Pevehouse said. "I could probably breed him 120 times a year—and it only takes 15 minutes each time. I'd like to start out charging about \$750 to \$1,000. The all-time winningest dog (now 7-years-old) gets about \$2,000 for breeding."

Dog racing was just a hobby 20 years ago when a friend of Pevehouse, Roy Pate, gave Pevehouse his first greyhound. The hobby has since grown, but hardly flourished. It wasn't until about five years ago, Pevehouse said, that he began making a profit from dog racing.

Homspun Rowdy has since greatly supplemented Pevehouse's income, the majority of which used to come from the Pevehouse Ceramic Tile Co.

"It's an awfully good living right now," says Pevehouse. "I didn't think anything this big would ever come of it."

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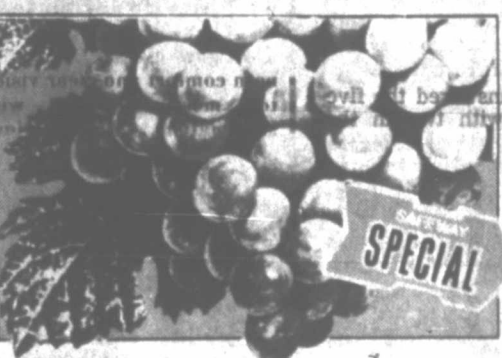


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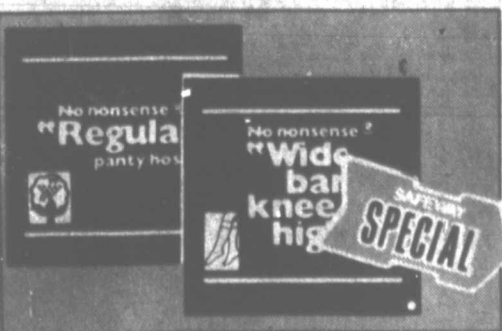

Problems shared by Mexico, U.S.

Mexico, our neighbor to the South, has cause to be plenty confused by our foreign policy. Mexico is attacked one day by a high Administration official, who is contradicted the next day by another Administration official.

It's good to hear that the Administration has decided to coordinate its policy toward Mexico, because Mexico is incredibly important to us now. And it will probably be even more important in the future.

Today, Mexico is our third largest trading partner. With almost 80 million people, it is an incredible natural market for U.S. manufactured goods. An increase in trade between our two countries can only work to our mutual advantage, and we ought to work for an increase.

One type of trade we do not need more of, though, is the trade in illegal drugs that are flowing across our border with Mexico like water through a sieve. Mexican authorities must accept a good share of the blame for this illegal drug trade, but so must we.

All these drugs would not be coming into the United States if there were not such a demand for them here. And they wouldn't be coming in such vast quantities if we were doing a better job of patrolling our borders and enforcing our drug laws.

For six years straight the Administration has proposed

cuts—which I fought—in the U.S. Customs Service. Now, at last, the Administration says it is willing to beef up border drug enforcement. The President has accepted a recommendation by several Senators, including me, to create a drug enforcement task force along the border.

The United States and Mexico face many common problems besides the battle to control illegal drugs. We both have huge trade deficits and international debts. The U.S., in fact, passed Mexico and Brazil at the first of this year to become the world's biggest debtor nation. We both need fiscal austerity at home. We are both suffering from the collapse in oil prices.

These common problems are especially evident and acute along our border. As one who was born and reared in the Rio Grande Valley, I know how a problem on one side of the border hits people on the other side as well, whether it is a sudden change in currency values or the lingering depression in rural areas.

Unemployment on the border, for example, is a staggering 27.6 percent in the Eagle Pass area,

compared to 20 percent in Mexico and 7 percent in the U.S. at large.

As neighbors, the United States and Mexico ought to be working together to solve our common problems. But in recent weeks, officials from both countries have fired such salvos of criticism back and forth across our border that one would expect imminent warfare.

When neighbors get to feuding, it is always regrettable. It is especially unfortunate when they spend their time pointing fingers at each other instead of rolling up their sleeves and working together.

This spring I traveled to Mexico for meetings with President de la Madrid and several cabinet officials, as well as with business people from both countries. I know from those encounters that the will exists to work together.

If we are to resolve the serious problems facing both our countries, we must have more cooperation and less confrontation between our two countries in the months and years ahead.

The time has come for a truce.
