G. H. (Garrett) Bley, a 40-year resident of Olton, was named Citizen of the Year before a crowd of approximately 200 persons at the annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet here Monday night.

Speaker for the banquet, held in the school cafeteria, was Dr. Leon Hill of Amarillo, Baptist evangelist. He was introduced by Percy Parsons, West Texas CC director.

Rex Chitwood, vice-president of C-CA, presented the Citizen of the Year plaque and told of the community and church activities Bley has been active in.

He went into business here in 1934, is a former mayor of Olton and has been active in chamber of commerce work, having served as secretary.

Resignation Told At Meeting Today

Johnny Clark Jr., superintendent of schools here since 1961, resigned this morning to accept a position as superintendent of Hereford schools.

The resignation came at a special meeting of school trustees during which they were to meet with Architect Herbert Brasher and Contractor Dean Slavons to approve and accept the \$300,000 school building program now being completed here.

The resignation will be effective July 1, 1965, when a

new three-year contract here was to have begun.

The move to Hereford will represent not only an advancement from a Class AA to a Class AAA school but also to a school district which is expected to become 4A shortly.

Average attendance at Hereford High School has been 940 daily this year, and schools become AAAA when they have attendance of 1,000 daily in high school.

Clark told the Enterprise his tenure here "couldn't have been anymore pleasant, not only in my relations with the board of trustees, but also with the community as a whole."

The 37-year-old superintendent came here in June, 1961, from Wilson, where he had served as superintendent three years.

Prior to that, he had been superintendent at Ackerly three years and a junior high principal at Ozona four years.

Clark succeeded Joe Harper when he came here, Harper leaving for a superintendent's post at McKinney.

He holds a BA degree from Harding College, Searcy, Ark., (1949), and an MA from Sul Ross College, Alpine (1951).

Clark and his wife, Tommie, have three children, Johnny, 15, Jimmy, 13, and Joy, 11. The family attends the Main Street Church of Christ.

During his tenure here, Clark has been active in the Lions Club and the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. He now is a member of the C-CA board of directors.

City OK's Plan To Hire Tax Attorney

Olton city council Tuesday night approved plans to employ a tax attorney to clear up delinquent taxes prior to the year 1962.

In doing so, the council authorized filing of suits, if necessary, to collect the back taxes.

The city plans to sign a two-year contract with the law firm of McCleary and Huey, Austin, for the work. The same firm is now employed by Olton School District, along with other cities and school districts in this area.

In other activity, the council held a drawing for places on the ballot of the April 6 city election.

Three candidates for the two council vacancies were on hand to draw their own places, with the names coming up in this order: L. H. Adams, Lester Thompson and Parley Myers.

The three are running for posts being vacated by Bill Kemp and Russell Rucker.

The drawing for order of names in the mayor's race resulted in incumbent Mayor Bill Thomas being listed first, with challenger Elvin Hatley, second. Mayor Thomas drew for himself while Mrs. Billie Hall drew for Hatley, who had instructed her to do so because he could not be present.

Mayor Thomas announced that he had appointed Marshall Stone to fill a vacancy on the local housing authority board, retroactive to March 3.

20th Stock Show Under Way Here

Olton's 20th annual stock show got underway here today with weigh-in deadline set at 6 p.m.

Approximately 117 entries, including 30 head of sheep, 65 head of swine and 22 head of steer, were expected for the show.

Grand opening is set tomorrow, Friday at 12:30 p.m. with swine judging scheduled for 1 p.m. and sheep to be judged at 4 p.m.

Livestock judging contest will be held at 8 a.m. Saturday morning followed by FHA awards at 11 a.m.

Steers will be judged at 1 p.m. Saturday and the FHA cake sale will be held at 2 p.m.

One of the highlights of the show, the auction sale is set 2:30 p.m. Saturday.

Bub Holt will serve as master of ceremonies for the show. President is Leslie Kennedy Jr. with W. T. Hall Jr as general superintendent.

Swine superintendents are C. M. Moss, Elvin Berry, Johnny Clark Jr. and John Moses. Sheep superintendents are R. V. Allcorn, Willie Gene Green and Dan Gregory.

Beef superintendents are Jack Burkhalter and Cloys Fancher.

Junior superintendents are Dennis Givens and Neal Burrow, general superintendents; Curtis Schaeffer and Doyle Meadows, swine; Steve Moss and Danny Roberson, lambs; Joe Castillo and Ronald Oursbourn, steers.

In the sheep division, classes will be set up for Southdown, Hampshire, Finewool, Crossbred, Shropshire, Suffolk, Dorsett, and other breeds.

All first place lambs will compete for grand champion. Second place to grand champion will compete for reserve grand champion.

Premiums in each class will be:

First, \$3 and ribbon; second, \$2 and ribbon; third through fifth \$1 each and ribbons.

Last Rites Slated Friday For Pioneer Resident

Funeral services for L.S. Kennedy, 90, a resident of Olton for the past 48 years, are scheduled for 2 p.m. Friday at the First Presbyterian Church.

The Rev. J.R. Jennings and the Rev. R.H. Campbell will officiate.

Kennedy died Monday night in the Lubbock hospital.

Kennedy, a former justice of peace, was a retired real estate dealer and held farming interests in the area.

He moved to Floyd County in 1899, married Mary Ethel McGehee on Jan. 19, 1902. They moved to Olton in 1917. He was a charter member of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

Survivors include his wife; three daughters, Mrs. Bill Yates, Olton; Miss Laura Kennedy, Corpus Christi; Mrs. Ruth Gaudier, Lubbock; two sons, Joe Kennedy, Heavner, Okla., Jim Kennedy, Calexico, Calif. six grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

Hatley's Hat In Mayor Race

One new hat went in the political ring before the Saturday filing deadline in the city election set April 6.

Elvis Hatley, in the bracer and insurance business here, has filed as a candidate for mayor.

Only other candidate for the position is Mayor Bill Thomas, who will seek re-election.

No new candidates filed for councilman leaving the race for the two seats to be filled to Parley Myers, Lester Thompson and L. H. Adams.

Hatley moved to Olton in 1936 and farmed until 1939. He then

More Honor For Scholars

We recently ran across an idea in one of our exchange papers that seems to us to be a good idea, deserving of some consideration here.

The idea is that we should give the same recognition to scholars and teachers in our schools as we accord to outstanding athletes and coaches.

We could, for example, annually sponsor a gathering similar to the football banquet and present awards to outstanding students from various departments.

The formality of a banquet would perhaps, within itself, emphasize the importance of the awards more than an assembly presentation.

Sincere and interested teachers from the departments could also be recognized and presented worthwhile and appropriate awards.

Perhaps a "scholastic booster" club of local citizens might not be a bad consideration and, to steal the athletic idea a bit further, we might even present scholarship jackets or sweaters in the same school colors to leaders in the freshman, sophomore, junior and senior classes.

The sweater and jacket idea for scholars is now being used successfully in some schools in the area.

Formal recognition, along with resulting publicity, pictures and general fanfare could go a long way toward placing scholarship where it belongs, namely at the top of the list in our schools.

As things now stand, we definitely emphasize the secondary item of athletics over the primary purpose of education--though all of us recognize the fact that our school system was not designed and is not operated for the sole purpose of training athletes.

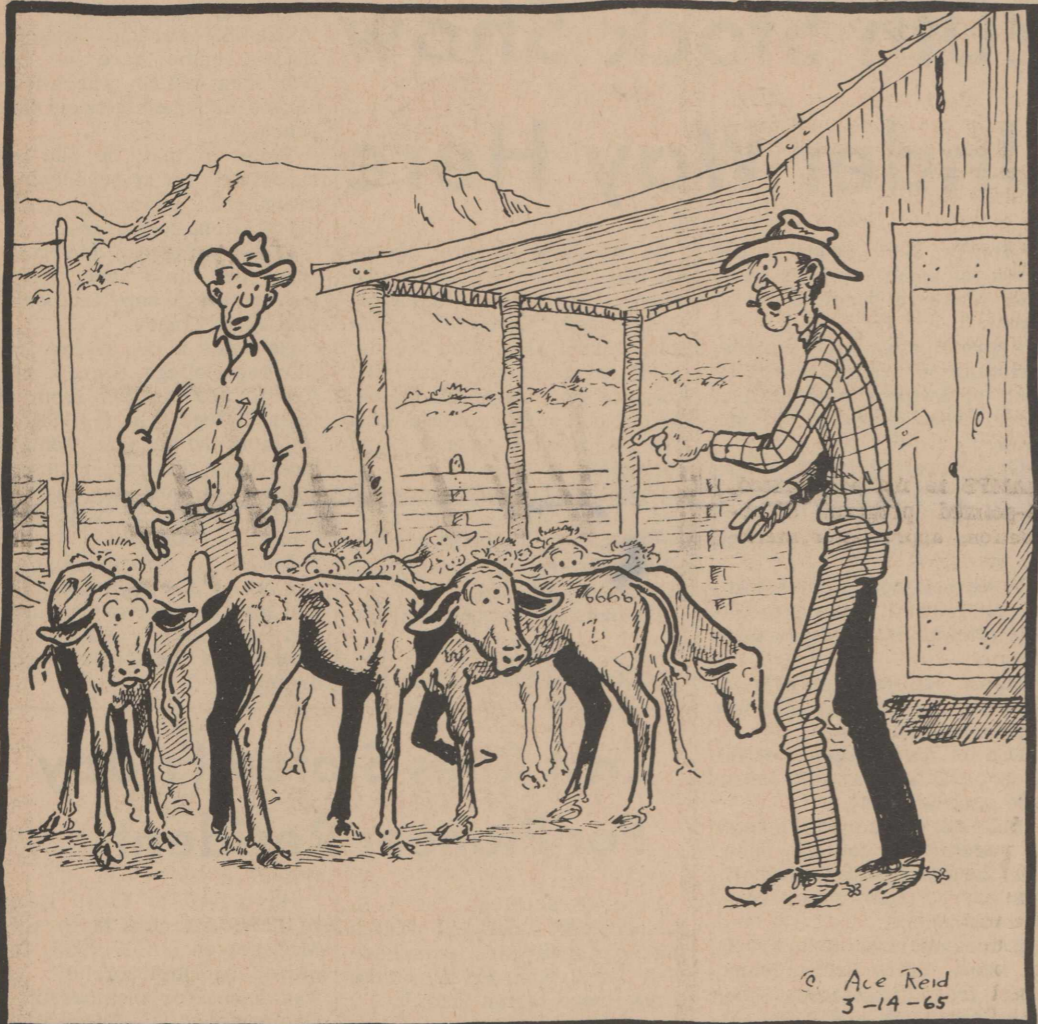
Putting the good scholar at least on a par with the outstanding athlete seems to make a lot of sense--and it might even develop a trend which would revolutionize the outlook of our standards toward an emphasis of studies in all categories.

We now recognize the valedictorian, salutatorian and students at an awards assembly held during the school day.

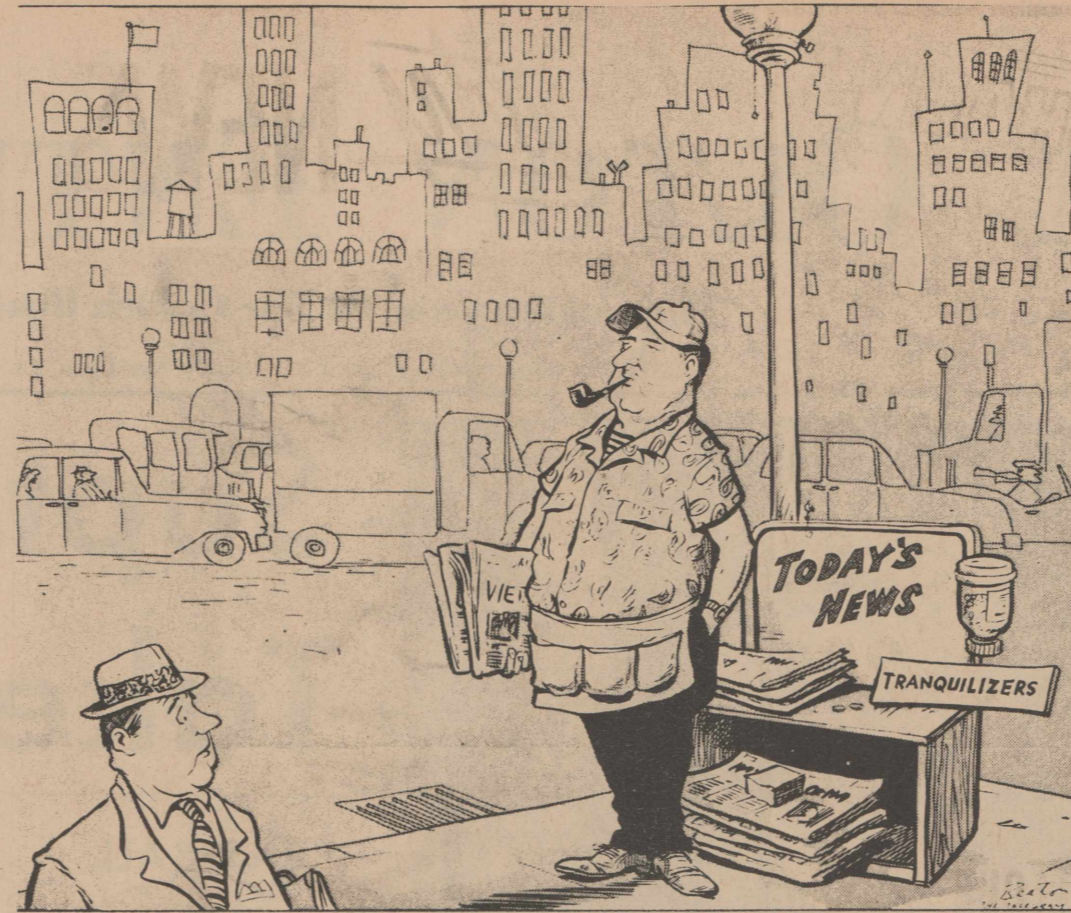
We wonder if we don't have many scholastic heroes each year who must take a definite back seat to our athletes and whose efforts are often repaid with the term "egghead."

Olton FFA boys brought home banners, beef and bulging billfolds from the Houston Stock Show. Top in money was Gerry George, with his reserve champion.

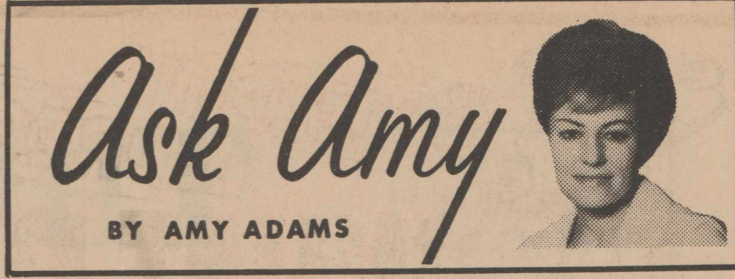
Business men, musicians, educators, journalists, agronomists, lawyers, scientists and representatives from many other professions were guests in Olton High School Thursday for annual career day.

'The Gathering Storm' Is Chosen Best Essay

(Editor's note: Reprinted below is an essay by Cindy Cross which took first place in the American Heritage contests here.)

Today, we live each minute in extreme danger of atomic warfare, and the world will remain in danger until the Communists abandon their ambitions for their kind of world revolution, until armaments, especially the atomic weapons, are brought under control, and until critical political problems are solved, such as the division of Germany and Berlin; the aggression against South Viet-Nam, and the use of Cuba as a base for undermining the independent nations of Latin America.

We view communism as a system incapable of satisfying basic human needs, as a system which will ultimately be totally discredited, and, yet, the Communist "strategy of demoralization" of America continues. Can one idly stand by and just "hope" that the conditions will improve?

How long can this absurd nonsense of "America has always been like this" continue? We must realize that we can be destroyed; we have no guarantee for the future.

It has been stated that the youth of today are "angry for tomorrow, but they are also sick of yesterday, and impatient with today." It seems as though a great "mess" has been made of the world, and soon it will be our turn to see what we can do with it. Today's youth are ready to see words like "disarmament" be made into working principles, and "peace" not mean a state of "cold war", but a condition of hope.

Too often young people's ideals are thought of as "impossible goals", by a dull society which may be suffocating the only hopes for a better reality for tomorrow.

What is really important in this world? Not, who finds the solution to a world problem, but that individuals get along with each other, try to understand and help each other as best they can. The only thing that can save this dream of the human race, is world peace and world organization. These can not be regarded as an unattainable Utopia, but must be regarded as a necessity, a condition for the survival of the human race.

The Communist have said they will demoralize America; it is up to us to prove we are a Christian nation that will not be demoralized. However, this can not be done if we continue to be unconcerned about world events.

If the average American realized what is going on in South Viet Nam, surely, he would help put an end to useless killing of Americans. We are not aiding these people, and they do not want our help. In fact, we have not given them any real help.

Young people are more aware of the fact that something must be done than most adults. They are more informed of world events, and they have the energy and enthusiasm to carry into action sound plans that just might work. Young people do not want to live in the past, they are not satisfied with the present, but they have hope for tomorrow.

Let us hope that unconcerned adults will not extinguish all the enthusiasm of youth, and that youth's enthusiasm will last long enough to prevent Communist aggression, and long enough for some action to be taken. We can not allow this generation to become as uninterested in world affairs as those before them.

America's only hope is based on her Christian principles. Are they strong enough to see her through the attacks of Communism?

We must become concerned about our young people's morals. Are they high enough to withstand Communism, or are we going to just "idly" hope for some miracle?

'The Communist Threat' Is First Place Speech

(Editor's note: Reprinted below is a copy of the speech by Lindy Ray which took first place in the American Heritage contests here.)

BY LINDY RAY

"First, we shall take eastern Europe; next the masses of Asia; then we shall encircle that last bastion of Capitalism, the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA. We shall not have to attack, it will fall like an overripe fruit into our hands." So say the Communists.

The Communist plan for victory is being carried out today with accurate precision. WE HAVE AN ENEMY---remorseless, crude, brutal and Godless. No matter how much the leaders of the Communist conspiracy may lie to their subjects about our motives, about conditions of prosperity, and about our policies and aims, one thing they believe themselves and that is we are in an advance state of moral decay.

With infiltration, control of propaganda outlets, and cunning maneuvering while our nation looked on with only mild interest---the Communists gobbled up eastern Europe; then most of the masses of Asia, including China's seven hundred million. And now we witness Cuba ninety miles from Florida, being converted in a Communist stronghold and the bases for widespread Latin American activities. The United States of America is being encircled, and within our borders the Communist are undermining our will to resist.

The Communists program requires the breakdown of existing government, destruction of law and order, and the creation of chaos. Riots are a tool of Communist take over, assassination is another. Communists glorify violence, it is their most persuasive weapon and we the American people are seeing violent practices in our own country.

Communist work for the gradual but complete destruction of three great human loyalties---to family---to country---to God. The Communist can not and will not permit any lasting loyalty to anyone or anything except to themselves.

What do you think of the steady gain of Communism---of millions killed, tortured and enslaved by this criminal conspiracy? Do you still laugh at Khrushchev's claim that our children will live under Communism? Do you shrug off Cuba as just one of those things---and will you shrug off Mexico?

Therefore, WE should take a close look at our own country, for much that we should see should disturb us. We are a great people, we have a noble tradition, we have much to teach the world. But one thing is certain and that is we shall not be given centuries for a leisurely and comfortable decay. Most of us take freedom for granted as something that has always been here and will continue forever without any effort on our part. And most Americans know very little about Communism and its tactics and strategy and cunning clever ways. That it is something unpleasant to think about and if we can't think about it maybe it will go away---but that is not the way it is. Communism will not be stopped by a half-hearted or left-handed effort. If we are to conquer the Communists we must have a unity of spirit; a unity of effort; and a unity of purpose. With the faith in the inherited dignity and the worth of the individual we can achieve this unity. Now's the day and now's the hour. For the Communists leave us no choice.

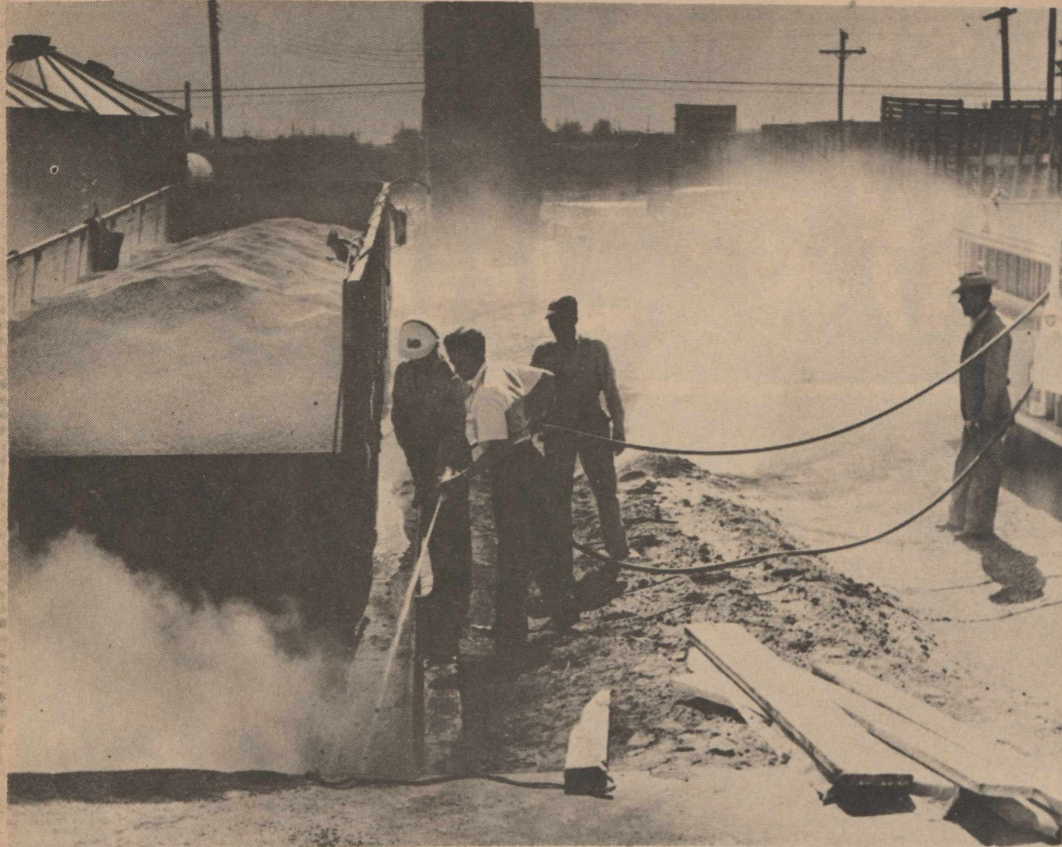

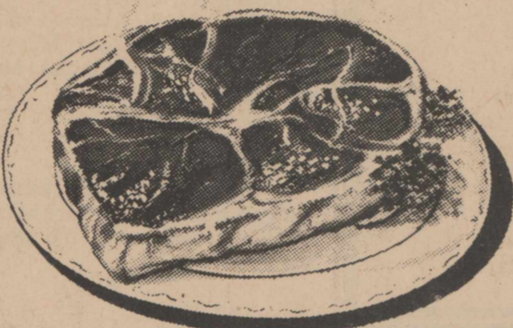
ber of our staff. The Department of Water here at the Foundation is the most important single department that we have and we are looking forward to Dean's assistance in finding some better ways to save water."

Dean, his wife Loma Faye, and their three boys live on their farm in the Finney Switch Community.

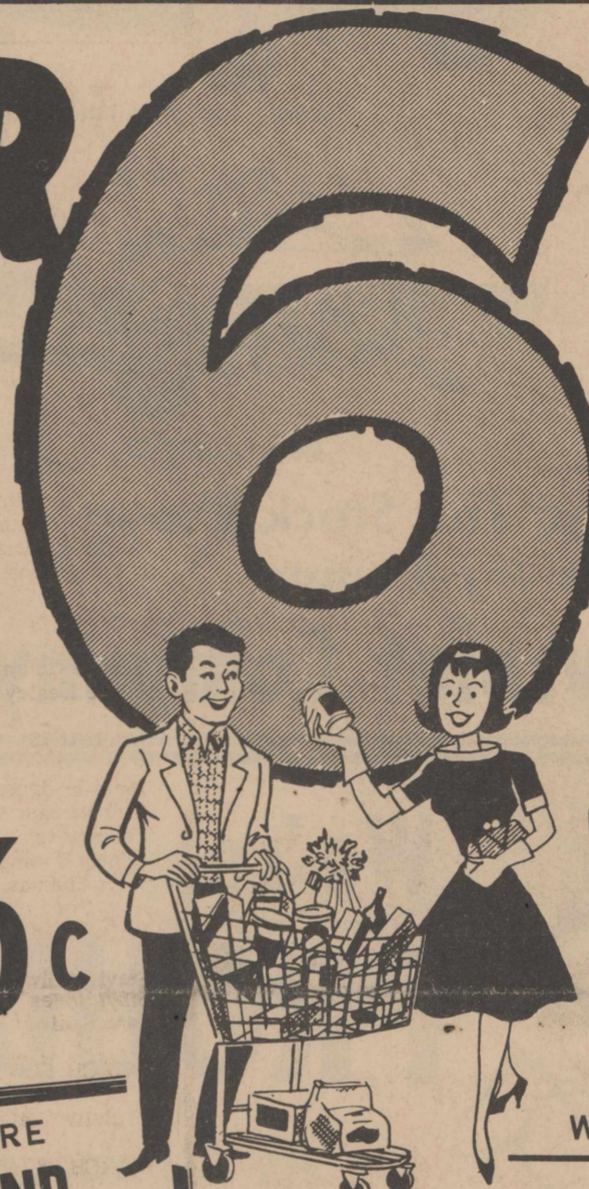

The Wittens told about meeting friends of the Homer Wor-

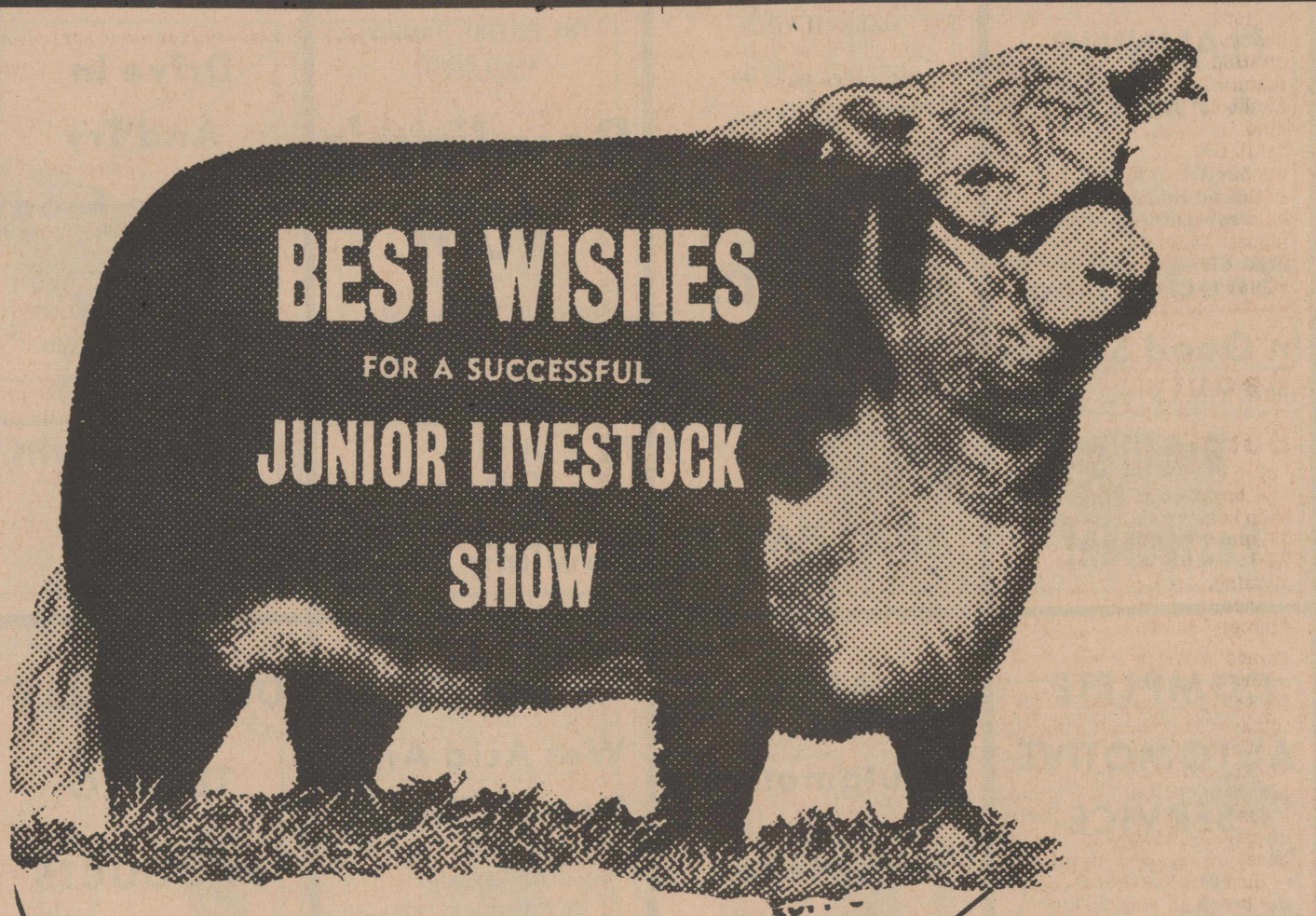
