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Baylor Homecoming To Honor Bill Coffey

Bill Coffey will receive special recognition during Homecoming ceremonies and celebrations planned at Baylor University this weekend, from October 24 through next Sunday. Coffey was quarterback of the famed Baylor Bears team that won the Southwest Conference Championship in 1924.

Coaching the 142-pound quarterback during the conference championship season, which by the way, was the last one won by the Bears, was Frank Bridges. Coffey was only a sophomore when he aided the Baylor effort for the crown and he also has the distinction of scoring the first two touchdowns ever scored against the University of Texas in their Memorial Stadium.

The way that happened, Coffey remembers, was that the stadium was new that year, Texas thought they had a chance to upset the hard-charging Bears, and set a dedication ceremony in their new stadium during a halftime ceremony. Baylor upset the Texas appecart when Coffey scored the first T.J. went on to score another, and Baylor took the win.

The Bears went undefeated during that season, the only one to win a tie with SMU.

In this season of football that has seen Baylor defeat a tough Arkansas team and with hopes for another Southwest conference crown, the Homecoming will have special significance for the 13 members of the '24 team, who will be special guests of honor during the weekend.

Coffey was born in Farmersville in 1903 but played his high school football at Childress before gaining the attention of Bridges's renowned scouting network of spotters.

The now 71-year old Coffey attended Baylor for two years before his marriage to the former Ruth Clark, well-known in Colorado City for her "Conversation Corner" column in the Record for so many years. He and Ruth attended Baylor classes for a year after their 1925 marriage, then they went to Electra where his father had given him a Piggly Wiggly store.

Coffey operated the store until 1936 when the depths of the Depression forced them to leave Electra, and they came to Colorado City.

Coffey worked for Bill Randle in his Piggly Wiggly grocery until 1946, when he went to work for Raymond Fuller at Fuller Foods, where he has worked ever since.

Homecoming activities planned on the Waco campus include three performances of Pigskin Revue, a variety show featuring winning acts from last spring's All-University Sing. The Revue will be presented at 7 p.m. Oct. 24 and at 7 and 10 p.m. Oct. 25 in Waco Hall.

A reunion dinner will be held October 25 in Baylor's Student Union Building and Coffey will attend, along with his 12 teammates, as they celebrate the 50th anniversary of the big win.

Cabaret, a Broadway-style, late evening entertainment show designed for Baylor exes, will be staged at 7:30 and 10:30 p.m. October 25 in Baylor's Weston Theatre.

Homecoming activities on Saturday will begin at 10 a.m. with the annual homecoming parade, featuring floats designed and built by campus organizations. A barbeque luncheon will follow in Morris McLean Gymnasium.

From 2 until 4:30 that afternoon, a special reception for Baylor faculty and ex-students will be held in the Barfield Drawing Room of Union building.

Highlighting the weekend's festivities will be the homecoming football clash between the Baylor Bears and Texas A&M Aggies, beginning at 7:30 p.m. in Baylor Stadium.

You can bet that the 1924 team members in attendance will be one of the loudest fan groups at the Bear-Aggie game.

County Waiting For The Harvest

Some defoliation in the county's cotton fields will aid Mother Nature in hastening the cotton stripping process.

Although drying conditions suffered a setback last weekend when rains started Sunday afternoon and continued through Monday night, some fields had already received an acid bath and will be ready for stripping when the ground dries out.

Loraine Co-op Gin is the only county gin that has ginned any cotton. They had turned out 25 bales by late Friday afternoon and Dual Elair, who works at the gin, said that they were expecting a few hard pulled bales in the next few days. Of the 25 bales, 24 were of defoliated and stripped cotton and one was hand-pulled.

Buford Gin has not ginned any cotton yet, but is expecting some in the next few days, as is the China Grove Co-op.

Two defoliating planes were at work Friday afternoon in the Longfellow community, spraying the killing acid over cotton fields of James Chester Hart and James Cox's fields.

Others who have defoliated include Russell Cope on the Junior Furrow farm, Kenneth Merket and Robert Martinez, all in Loraine, and in the Buford area, Joe Elackard and Kurt Shaw.

Some of the gin personnel said that others in the county might have defoliated but they were not aware of it.

R. J. Hoback, who owns and operates Colorado Feed and Seed here, said that the acid costs about \$2 per acre and cost of air application is from \$1.75 to \$2 per acre.

With the heavy top growth of cotton plants caused by recent rains, some producers are seriously considering applying the chemicals to hasten harvest, Hoback said.

However, some of the county's oldtimers say that we'll see an early frost and freeze this year and are just waiting for nature to take its course.

Colorado City Garden Club will hold the Fall Flower Show in the Civic Center Thursday.

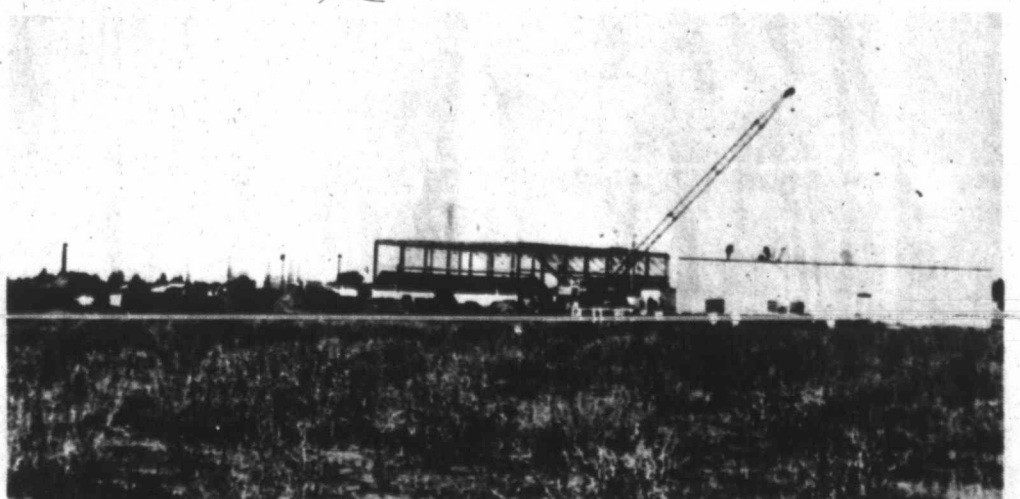
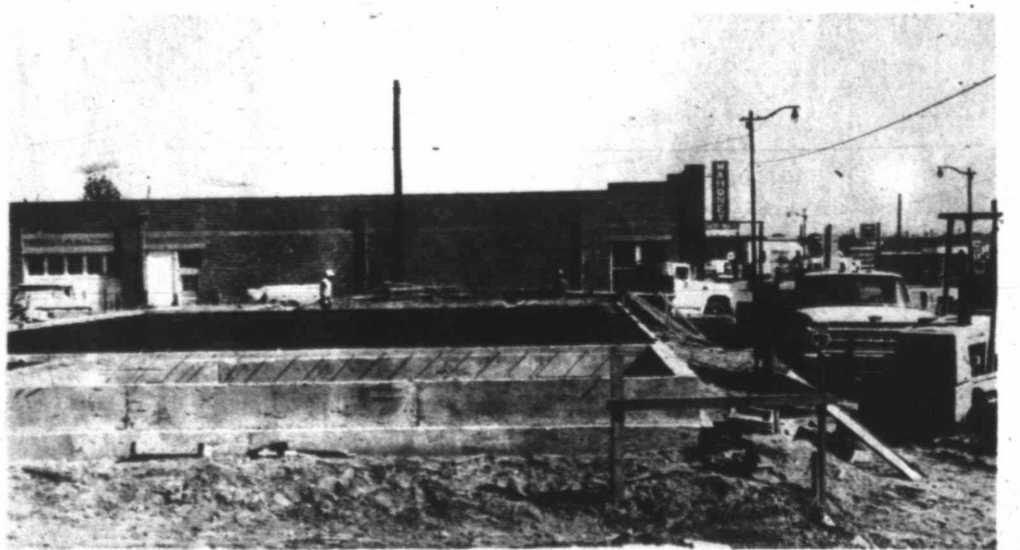
Members will enter arrangements in the morning, judging will be completed and the public is invited to attend the public showing and hospitality tea from 4 to 7 p.m.

Bulldogs Lose To Buffaloes

Forsan Buffaloes scored on every possession of the first half and were held scoreless in the second half as they defeated the Loraine Bulldogs at Johnson Field in Loraine Friday night 32-8 in a District 3B game.

In the first quarter, Forsan scored on a 3-yard run ending a 70-yard drive. In the second quarter, Forsan scored on a 12 yard run after Forsan got the ball on the Loraine 24 following a short Bulldog punt, again on a 13 yard pass after Forsan recovered a Loraine fumble on the Loraine 35, on a 22-yard pass ending a 52 yard drive and on a 16 yard run after a Loraine pass was intercepted on the Loraine 20. Only two tries for points after touchdowns were good, making the score at halftime 32-0.

The third quarter was scoreless. Midway through the fourth quarter, Loraine recovered a Forsan fumble on the Forsan 13 and on the first play after that, Ralph Chavez ran 13 yards around right end for six points. 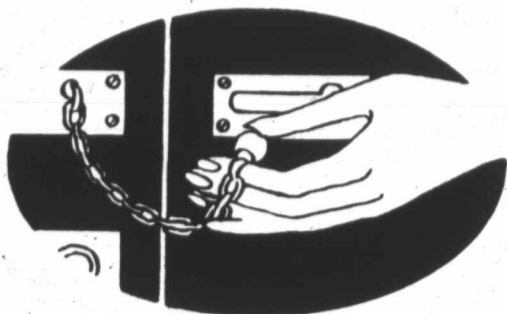

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Spotlight On Business & Professional Women Of Colorado City

National Business Women's Week October 20 - 26

History Of Colorado City Chapter Of B&PW

Thirteen proved to be a lucky number for Colorado City Business & Professional Women's Club when that many working women met for the first time April, 1929, to plan their organization. One week later, on April 18, 1929, five B&PW members from San Angelo met with that group to perfect the organization. The original 13 were Mrs. Elizabeth McCleary, Mrs. Mayme Taylor, Mrs. Thelma McSpadden, Mrs. Carolyn Turner, Mrs. Myrtle Crowder, Mrs. Laura Root, Mrs. Elizabeth Doss and the Misses Elizabeth Kirkpatrick, Pearl Hemby, Joe Key, Stattie Rice, Louise Hardison and Ruby McGill. Although four of those ladies did not join the club at that time, the others were joined by Mrs. Anna Ferguson, Mrs. Josie Ree Randle, Mrs. Mary Jones, Mrs. Frances Armstrong, Mrs. Billie Baugher, Mrs. Cecile Meskimen, Mrs. Van Crosthwaite, Mrs. Zephia Morrison, Misses Lillian Pond, Eloise Pond, Jewell McDonald, Kanna Yater, Rubells Smartt, Neta Mae Davis, Jewel Collier, Hazel Key and Ruth Dorn to become charter members. Only one, Mrs. Elizabeth Kirkpatrick Jones remains an active member of the club. During that first year, club programs included "Colorado City and her Citizens voting for prohibition," and "Health Preservation in Texas." The club project for the year was financing a girl through high school.

Over the years programs and projects for the club have been pertinent to the times. During the depression members worked for drought relief and cooperated with United Charities. They distributed clothing to people in hard-hit rural communities, provided layettes for expectant mothers, and even placed one baby for adoption. In 1932, a petition was signed by members to be presented to the World Disarmament Conference. Club dues were also suited to the times, originally set at \$1.00 per month, in 1931 they were discontinued for 10 months. In July of 1932 they were reinstated at 50 cents per month, and that is the present local rate. However, State and National dues have been added to this amount to finance bigger and broader projects.

B&PW Women were petitioning as early as 1932 for shorter working hours for all. They recommended closing all businesses at 6 p.m. week days and 9 p.m. Saturdays. Colorado merchants complied. In 1933 the fifth district 7 Conference was held in Colorado. Guest speaker for the conference was Hon. George H. Mahon, congressman. The club built a stone table and seating for 30 people, and set out a dozen trees in Ruddick Park. Earlier, they had contributed to the band shell to be built in the park. Goal was set and reached in 1934 for club members to be 100% poll tax payers, 100% Red Cross members, 100% health examinations. Programs that year included "Plans for Relief Work" and "Security Through Better Government." In 1935, hot lunches were provided for a school boy, a lecture was sponsored at the High School on vocational guidance and members took part in a study course on Better English.

Finishing out the 1930's the club had programs such as "Education for Business, Good Life, and Service," "What about Social Service," "Present Status of the League of Nations," "Are Child Labor and the Employment of Married Women Restricted?" and a skit "Not Guilty" written by Federal Judge Sarah T. Hughes.

Judge Hughes honored the club by being their guest speaker at an invitation tea in October 1939. Her subject was "The Obligation of Women as Citizens in a Democracy." "More Spanish should be taught in our schools" was the B&PW idea in 1940. Today we have bilingual classes in our public schools. A radio was purchased that year to be passed around to shut-ins. The Food Stamp Plan was introduced to the club in 1941. In early 1942, after declaration of war, such programs as "Mobilize for Democracy" were popular and two members of the club, Sallie Miller (now Rogers) and Iona Jones "joined up." Members entertained service men, bought bonds, studied first aid and reported on Black Market practices and inflation.

After World War II, the club joined in programs for overseas relief and continued programs for local needy families. They also started managing concessions for the Colorado City Frontier Round-up and Rodeo. That continued as their main fund-raising campaign until those rodeos were discontinued. Equal Rights Amendment was brought to the club for study in 1947. Texas House and Senate approved the amendment in 1972, but it has not yet been made national law. During the 40's members took part in the well-remembered Friday night programs at Ruddick Park Amphitheatre.

Colorado City members extended and organized a club in Snyder in 1950. In 1951, Addie V. Payne was supported for State Vice President. Jaycees project "Civic House" was started in the 50's and B&PW members contributed a water fountain and helped finance a piano. They also began the civic participation project of serving for banquets at the Civic House, which over the years became a major finance project. Programs during these years included "The Communist Purpose to Conquer the World," and "Communism, America's Mortal Enemy." Tumbleweeds were very big in Colorado City those years and the club sponsored candidates for Queen of the Tumbleweed Festival.

Women for jury service was the goal set for the 1954 Club year, and two members, Lulline Minshew, and Mrs. Ramelle Parsons were the first women jurors in Mitchell County.

In 1958, the ladies started action state-wide to take the word "legitimate" off birth certificates. During the 60's B&PW members continued their work on "Better Business Women for a Better Business World" by assisting graduating seniors with scholarships for the college of their choice. They also contributed to a fund for financing a Foreign Exchange Student, Suraiya Akhtar, who attended school here and lived with Dr. and Mrs. W. S. Rh-

ode during 1962-63. The club's outstanding local contribution in 1965 was made to the Mitchell County Library in the amount of \$2,000.00 for purchase of the check-out desk which bears the B&PW Emblem.

Woman of the Year award was presented for the first time at the Chamber of Commerce banquet to Mrs. Witt Hines, for outstanding service to the community. Other winners of the award have been, Mrs. B. W. Scott, Mrs. B. A. Jackson, Mrs. Bob Shamburger, Mrs. J. C. Womack, Mrs. Don DeLaney, Mrs. E. B. Carlock and Miss Nelda Garrett.

Colorado City B&PW members have always been active in the Texas Federation of Clubs. One member, Addie V. Payne, served as first, second and third vice-president of the state organization. District Directors from Colorado City were Mrs. Payne, Elizabeth K. Jones, Iona Jones, Lena Porter and Nelda Garrett. Many who have served the club since its organization are:

- PS. Parents: Have your children seen this message? If not, you may want to call it to their attention. Cut it out and use it to remind your children that they can help you and all of us conserve energy in many ways.
- ☐ Don't keep the refrigerator or freezer door open any longer than necessary.
 - ☐ Turn off the lights when you leave a room.
 - ☐ Turn off the TV set when no one is watching it.
 - ☐ Turn off the radio or record player when no one is listening.
 - ☐ Be sure the hot water is turned off after you've used it. Remind your mom or dad when a faucet leaks and needs repairing.
 - ☐ Don't turn on more lights than you really need.
 - ☐ If the furnace or air-conditioner is running, keep the doors closed. And don't make unnecessary trips in and out of the house.
 - ☐ Ride the bus whenever you can, rather than asking your parents to drive you.
 - ☐ Ride your bike or walk to the store for your parents. If they don't run the car, they will save gasoline.

- ☐ Help plan family errands that require the car so they can all be done at one time.
- ☐ If you're a little cool, don't ask your parents to turn up the thermostat. A sweater will warm you up.
- ☐ Tell your parents if heating or cooling ducts are blocked by furniture or draperies.
- ☐ If no one uses a particular room, close the heat registers and keep the door shut.
- ☐ If you're helping with cooking, use an element that is about the same size as the pan. And don't be an oven peeper.

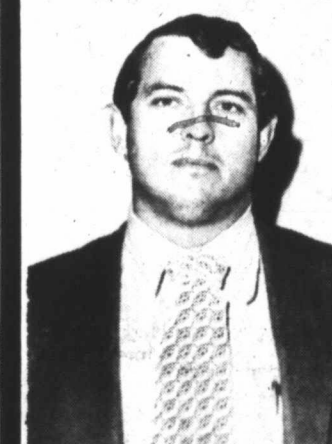

Who Do We Think We Are Kidding?

(based on Matthew 15:8,9)

This text is a summation of what Jesus had to say about the worship that the Scribes and Pharisees were presenting forth to God.

"This people draweth nigh unto me with their mouth and honoreth me with their lips, but their heart is far from me. But in vain they do worship me, teaching for doctrine the commandments of men." If you will read Matthew 15: 1-6, you will find the setting in which Jesus made this accusation against the Scribes and Pharisees. Jesus accused them of making the commandments of God of no effect by their traditions (verse 6).

God for some 3,000 years had dealt with his people in a specific manner as to their relationship with Him and to Him. He had spoken through Prophets and had given His commandments for His people to live by. The Scribes and Pharisees were the most strict sect in so far as obeying the commandments of God. But we find Jesus accusing them of instituting their traditions over and above the commandments of God (verse 9). Jesus says, "In vain they do worship me, teaching for doctrine the commandments of men." For all these many generations, the Jews thought they had been giving reasonable service and worship unto God.

The commandments had become irrelevant and outdated over this 3,000-year period and they needed revising and modernizing.

The Scribes were those men who most zealously updated the commandments of God to fit the modern generation. In that day, only to have Jesus charge them with taking the doctrines of men for the commandments of God.

We to brothers and sisters in our generation and modern living are guilty before God of honoring God with our lips but our hearts are far from Him. The very thing that God places the most emphasis on, we neglect to do the most.

God places more emphasis on witnessing to His power through Jesus Christ and soul winning than anything else and this is what His church neglects the most. We attend church week after week and never share with others about the power of God that is being manifested through Jesus and His Holy Spirit. While the world travels on a collision course to Hell, we have taken tradition and church doctrine and have let these replace the Holy Scriptures. St. Paul states in 2 Timothy 3:5, about people in the last days who have a form of Godliness but deny the power thereof.

I'm going to be bold enough to say that this fits the majority of the people who profess to make up the church of Jesus Christ or the Body of Christ. We have a form of Godliness, we act like Christians, talk like Christians and try to convince other Christians that we are Christians, but we deny the power of God. We say that God no longer divinely heals, that God only heals through medical

science. I declare to you that God does both. We say that God no longer operates in his church like he did in the early church. There is no longer any need for the gifts of the spirit to operate in the church. We only need the fruits. You can't have one without the other. Our very lives speak to the fact that we no longer believe that there is power in the blood because we who call ourselves Christians have stated that we believe that people can harden their hearts to the point that God can't save them. I declare unto you that a person can live for a hundred years damning God's Holy name and then turn to Him in repentance and still find that there is power in the blood. I walk the halls of our hospitals and talk to Christians who have taken the word of their physician as being final, who do not believe in the power of prayer nor the intercession of the Saints on their behalf.

God works wonderfully through medical science to get his people healed, but He also can place His healing upon a person whom the doctors have pronounced as incurable and make that person every bit whole. We need to stop dividing medical science and God's power and bring both together in unity in order to bring healing to God's people.

We live in a country that is sick in every way and I declare to you that judgment must begin at the house of God, which is our local church. Healing, repentance, confession and a straightening out of our own lives until they conform to the word of God's commandment, must take place, then it can move out to our state and national levels and bring a healing to our nation.

Yes, we are a people who honor God with our lips but our hearts are far from Him. We are teaching for doctrine the commandments of men.

Yes, we are a people who have a form of Godliness but deny the power thereof. May God have mercy on our sons.

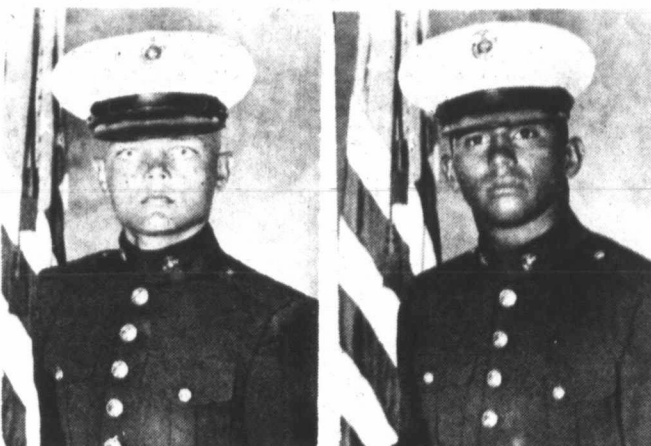

PFC Bradbury is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James O. Bradbury of 833 Chestnut, Colorado City.

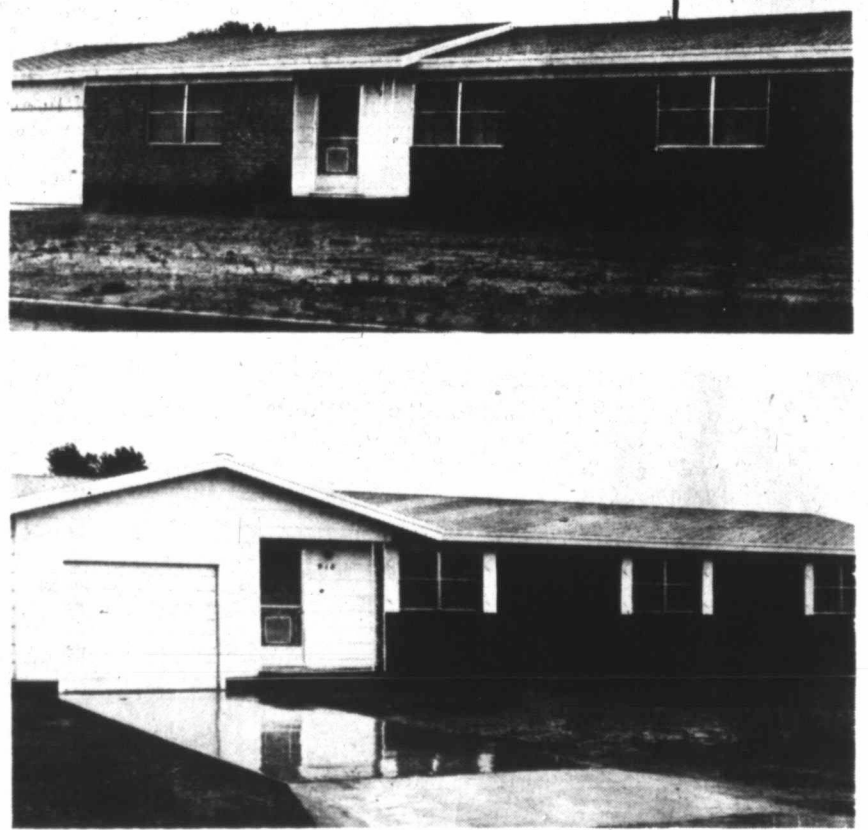
PFC Garcia is the son of Mrs. Beatrice S. Garcia of 204 Manuel Street, Colorado City.

Range Tour SCS Report

Travis Branch, Francis Wynn, Vann Mills, Guy McIlhenny and Mark Moseley, representing Mitchell County's Soil Conservation Service, recently attended a Field Day at Barnhart Experiment Station along with about 125 other area ranchmen and soil conservationists.

The Barnhart station threw open their grazing systems for inspection by the groups. Special attention was given the High Intensity, Low Frequency (HILF) system, consisting of six pastures about equal in carrying capacity.

All cattle in this system were put in one pasture, where they grazed for 25 days before they were rotated to the next pasture. Each pasture was given 125 days of rest before it was intensively grazed again. Gross carrying section was \$3024.

The four pasture system was compared with this six-pasture HILF system. The four pasture system showed gross return of \$3059 per section and an increase of 10 animal units per section in five years.

A comparison of the two rotation systems with a continuous grazing system notes that only \$2569 is the gross return per section in the continuous system.

The Junior FHA girls will be going from door to door to ask for pledges for each mile they walk.

"You can help the girls by giving your support to this effort in helping needy children around the world," said Leslie Moore, reporter for the group.

Sheriff Investigates Break-Ins

Three break-ins in Loraine are being investigated by Mitchell County Sheriff's Department.

Friday night, break-ins occurred at Green's Grocery and Henderson Cafe. Nothing was taken from the cafe but about \$100 was taken from the grocery.

Truck driver Garland Hogue of Sulphur, Oklahoma, was arrested after being treated and released from Root Memorial Hospital for minor injuries. The truck he was driving for Bray's Trucking Company was loaded with frozen French fries and hash brown potatoes and ran through a protective railing, stripping the underside of the truck and spilling diesel fuel over the highway.

Hogue was released on \$500 bond.

The four, three boys and a girl, were released to South Carolina juvenile authorities. Also under investigation by the department is a break-in at Westbrook Truck Stop and at Cattlemen's Truck Stop. The juke box at Westbrook was broken open and Cattlemen's had been burglarized.

Loraine Trustees Meet

Loraine Independent School Board met in regular session Monday night, granting permission for four faculty members to take night courses for college credit during the fall semester at Western Texas College in Snyder.

What happens now to the proposed new state constitution?—Gay Houston.

The Constitution which was presented and not ratified is dead; the money wasted, the time gone.

There are now several proposals which would hope to pick up some of the costs of the failed constitutional convention. One idea, proposed by Dr. John Bebout of Houston, a national authority on constitutional revision, is that a resolution calling for a citizens convention could be accomplished without first passing a constitutional amendment. Lt. Governor Bill Hobby has said that approach might prove desirable since it would avoid the two-thirds approval which doomed the 1974 convention.

New Jersey, in somewhat similar circumstances, after a convention-prepared constitution failed at the polls, passed a bill authorizing a citizens convention. The bill passed public referendum, a convention was called and that convention's document was adopted.

Members of the Texas Constitutional Revision Commission met recently on their own time in Austin. These are the people who put together a new charter used as the starting point for the work of the legislature when it met this year as a constitutional convention. They favor a citizens convention to be created by a legislative resolution and authorized by a vote of the people.

Work on a new Texas Constitution is at a standstill until there is enough interest in revision to try again through constitutional amendment or a resolution, both of which must come up in the new legislature.

If this were 1776, our Founding Fathers would just go home and drink a little less tea.
