Yeager, Martin Cited For Outstanding Duty

Plaudits for outstanding devotion to duty were heaped Wednesday upon City Police Chief Leon Yeager and County Judge Elmer Martin. "In great appreciation for outstanding devotion to duty as a vital part of Texas' law enforcement team," the certificates stated. Yeager was cited by Worley for his leadership and efficient police work during the five years he has served as chief of the police department. His

work in apprehending local law violators and others from across the nation was specifically praised. Martin, who is serving his first year as county judge, was commended for his understanding and effort in regard to all local problems and his special concern and work in the field of juvenile delinquency.

The certificates of appreciation were presented to the two officials following a talk by Jaycee Don Benson, who outlined the purpose of Texas Law Enforcement Foundation and Law Enforcement Appreciation Week.

"The object," Benson declared, "is simply the enlistment of good citizens in support of good law enforcement. Somewhere between the baby crib and the crime, law violators develop an indifference, more often a hostile attitude toward the interests of law enforcement and justice."

"It is our duty as citizens of this community to help correct this attitude," Benson emphasized that the local community's law enforcement team is found in a combination of offices and departments — city police, constable, sheriff, highway patrol, game warden, liquor control board, justice of the peace, city attorney, city judge, county attorney, district attorney, county judge and district judge.

4TH QUARTER IS DECISIVE

Andrews' Speed, Manpower Overcome Wolves, 48 to 14

Colorado City High Wolves rolled out the best ammunition they had Friday night — surprise and precision — to shock District 2-A-A-A champion Andrews to the bone.

But Andrews' superior manpower, weight and speed finally took its toll.

And the Mustangs — with the swiftest backs in Texas schoolboy football — sprinted in the final period to a 48 to 14 advantage over the rebuilding Wolves.

Coach Otis Holladay's Wolves surprised a homecoming crowd — and the Mustangs, too — by quickly romping to a 5 to 0 lead.

They came back in the third quarter, after trailing at the half, 6 to 16, to rattle their opponents with a daring touch-

down drive and extra points. It was 14 to 16, then, and the Wolves worked an onside kick to their advantage, taking over the offensive immediately after the second touchdown.

Then Andrews, who moved undefeated through their district last fall and didn't stumble until facing Breckenridge in regional play, braced itself and finally began to move decisively just before the fourth quarter.

An 85-yard touchdown sprint by Tom Walker signalled the forthcoming doom. And three more quickly followed before the final whistle.

The score didn't tell the real story of the contest — sparkling and exciting through three quarters — as the spirited

Wolves hustled hopefully for their first victory in six starts. In fact, Holladay's team almost had the favorites hanging on in the opening quarters. Three times the Wolves gave away the ball on fumbles — setting up the Mustang's first score with a fumble on the C City 30 yard line.

Right where it hurt the most, too, the Wolves contributed a 15-yard penalty that kept an Andrews march alive and helped 'em along to a score.

Colorado City took the opening kickoff, ran twice for a first down, then three plays later handed the ball to Andrews on a fumble.

Andrews couldn't gain though and punted to Danny See WOLVES Pg. 7

AT DISTRICT PTA WORKSHOP

Education Is Job of Entire Community, Executive States

The whole community shares in the responsibility of providing education for its young people.

And to accomplish the job right, the citizenship must be informed.

Community's role in education was emphasized here Thursday by Dan Krausse of Big Spring, vice president of Cosden Petroleum Corporation.

Krausse was one of scores of business and industrial leaders, Parent-Teacher Association members, educators and clergy who met here for a 12-county West Texas workshop in education.

Sponsoring the event was the 16th District PTA with Mrs. Chesley McDonald of Sterling City as president and Supt. Frank Wilson of Colorado City as school education chairman.

The workshop participants came from Mitchell, Howard, Martin, Sterling, Glasscock, Andrews, Dawson, Borden, Coke, Runnels and Nolan counties.

Theme for the all-day program was "Education — Whose Responsibility?"

Krausse, the Cosden executive who also serves on Big Spring's school board, said that education is the responsibility of all the community as well as the board of education.

And it is imperative that we develop citizens as well informed on problems and aims of education as the board members.

At the same time, Krausse said the problem of communications must be overcome. This must be accomplished, he said, so that the citizens can inform the board as to what they want and what they will support in their local public school education program.

The industrialist informed the workshop that approximately 400 citizens will conduct conferences in Big Spring in an effort to improve communications between the school board and the general public. These conferences are planned as an effort to channel ideas of citizens to the board.

Krausse said the idea for better communications between the school board and citizenship is not just that of Big Spring. Instead, it is a nationwide trend.

"But the average citizen must inform himself . . . he must know more about the school program so that he can express himself to the board," he emphasized.

LOW RENT PROJECT

Housing Site Option Near

Negotiations may be completed this week for two building sites for a federal low rent housing project in Colorado City.

Colorado City Housing Authority already has obtained option for one site — approximately 5 acres of city owned property fronting on 17th St. near the municipal water well field.

The 5 acres would be location of masonry duplex type housing facilities for white and Latin American families. Option is being sought for a second site — 6 large lots out of 11 acres owned by the Sam Jordan Estate on E. College near State Highway 208 (to Robert Lee).

Leonard Henderson, chairman of the housing authority, said abstract was being checked and option agreement may be signed this week.

City Council paved the way for the Jordan Estate option Monday when it agreed to convey option for the municipal owned acreage north of 17th St. at a price of \$4,593.

The price is \$500 less than the appraised value of the land. But the council agreed to the slightly lower figure in order that the housing authority could have sufficient funds for a \$3,500 sale price.

on the Jordan Estate property, which incidentally is \$500 above appraisal price.

Henderson told the council that the housing authority is limited in funds it can spend for building site and that it would lack sufficient funds to acquire the two sites without the special council action.

Public Housing Administration already has approved a reservation for Colorado City's low rent housing units. And the two prospective building sites also have received pre-See HOUSING Pg. 2

J. W. Heath Named in Complaint

Arson charges were filed here Saturday morning against a 64-year-old man in connection with a pre-dawn fire Wednesday.

Named in the complaint filed in Peace Justice T. E. Arnold's Court was Jewel W. Heath.

A short time later in the same Precinct 1 Justice of Peace Court, Heath waived examining trial with these words:

"I don't know much about courts, but I guess it's all right to waive the hearing." By declining examining trial, the defendant sends the charge before Mitchell County grand jury.

Heath is charged with arson in the 3:35 a. m. fire Wednesday at a vacant house in 1000 block of West Point (Highway 80 East) owned by his sister, Mrs. Ora Thompson.

The fire caused about \$2,000 damage to the house before it was extinguished by city firemen.

Heath, who was staying that night in a house also owned by his sister and located one door west of his sister's residence and two doors west of the fire, was taken into custody late Friday.

His arrest followed a speedy and concentrated investigation conducted by City Fire Marshal J. A. Sadler Jr., Arson Investigator Clark Rice of State Fire Underwriters and District Attorney Eldon Mahon.

The district attorney filed the charge Saturday with Sadler as complainant after Heath signed a written statement.

Bond was set by Peace Justice Arnold at \$2,500.

Firemen became suspicious of arson in the Wednesday fire immediately when it was observed that two blazes — each in separate areas of the house and apparently unrelated to the other — were burning simultaneously when they arrived.

Sadler remained at the scene until after daybreak and began his investigation then with the district attorney, Rice, the Fire Underwriters Investigator, was called in from Abilene.

One of the blazes had caused damage to a middle bedroom on the east side of the house and burned through the ceiling there. The other had burned the inside of a kitchen cabinet on northwest side of the house.

Sadler and Mahon reported their investigation revealed an iron on top of chenille See CHARGE Pg. 7

DUAL PRODUCER

Field Designation Sought for Oiler

Two oil well completions — one a dual producer with newly developed pay in the San Andres — highlighted Mitchell County oil activities for the week.

Finished as a producer in Sharon Ridge 1700 Field was Carter — Mandel and Simons No. 5-B J. H. Humphreys, 330 feet from north and east lines of Section 10, Block 27, T&P Survey.

Operators reported a daily pumping potential of 58.66 barrels of 30 gravity oil, plus 2 per cent water, after treatment with 1,000 barrels of oil and 100,000 pounds of sand.

Production was from perforations between 1,530 and 1,562 feet over total depth of 1,676 feet, elevation 2,104 feet. Casing extended to 1,668 feet.

R. F. Anderson & Manor No. 1-A Elliott was completed for 51 barrels of 27 gravity oil in San Andres pay area. New field designation as

Turner-Gregory (San Andres) Field has been asked by operators.

The NO. 1-A Elliott is a dual completion. Originally last July it was finished in the Clear Fork with daily production of 17.7 barrels of oil plus 16.6 barrels of water.

The new San Andres production of 51 barrels of oil was from three sets of perforations between 1,786 and 1,907 feet with 46 per cent water. Pay area was treated with 10,500 gallons of fluid and 65,000 pounds of sand.

Site of the dual oiler is 1,650 feet from north and 330 feet from east lines of Section 25, Block 29, T-1-N, T&P Survey. Scheduled as a 3,200 foot rotary test 5 miles northeast of Intran is Granger Oil Corporation No. 3 F. A. Langley.

It will drill at a site 1,650 feet from north and 2,310 feet from east lines of Section 23, Block 29, T&P Survey.
