

Blast Rocks Coal Mine Tipple In New Attack

A dynamite blast rocked a coal company tippie today in a fresh outburst of violence in the nation's coal fields.

John L. Lewis' United Mine Workers were to resume negotiations today with two big branches of the coal industry amid a stormy background of blasting, gunfire and stone hurling.

The mine workers' wrath against non-union men working the pits in defiance of the union brought this fast-breaking chain of events:

1. A blast at a tippie of the Jundale Coal Co. at Grass Flat, Pa., ripped off the roof, tore off part of one side and damaged generators and motors in the building.

2. A gunfire flareup at Jasper, Ala., reportedly resulted in the

death of one miner and the serious wounding of another. The sheriff there said he could not confirm the death, however.

3. Gov. William M. Tucker declared a state of emergency in Virginia.

4. The Kanawha County, West Va., school board ordered its school buses off the highways in face of battling between pickets and non-union workers.

It was with this background that Lewis' union was to confer with leaders of the southern coal operators and of the northern and western men.

The walkout of 480,000 miners entered its 11th day today. Lewis, who was expected to attend either meeting, said it was a spontaneous demonstration by the union men, that it was not a strike.

Coal stocks were dwindling rapidly. Thousands of men had been laid off because of the coal stoppage.

The Grass Flat episode came this morning. State police already bulwarked by extra details, said they were investigating the dynamite blast, but had made no arrests.

Robert M. Smith, president of the company which employs 45 men, said it'll take a week before he can resume operations. The tippie is valued at \$10,000.

Some 140 non-union miners were at work in Pennsylvania pits.

Gov. Tucker in his state-of-emergency directive, recognized the Virginia council of defense and directed it to secure "every possible pound of coal" for Virginia's use.

Howard County Cotton Ginning Takes Big Leap

3,970 Bales Are Processed As Bracceros Tarry

Speculation on Howard county's 1949 cotton crop presented a changeable picture today, as ginning figures made their greatest leap since the start of the harvest.

County gins had processed 3,970 bales by the first of the week, according to the Texas Employment Commission's weekly tabulation.

The latest ginning figures represent a gain of 2,146 bales over the report of a week ago.

Gin operators still were estimating the county's yield at 37,000 bales, but some other observers seemed to feel that the ginners were conservative in their forecasts.

A composite of estimates from those who would hazard a guess this morning indicated a yield of 40,000 to 42,000 bales.

Meanwhile, farmers were more interested in locating harvest laborers than in predicting their crop yields.

The Farm Bureau office had received no communications this morning from El Paso, where Bureau representatives are seeking laborers from Mexico. At last reports, the local delegation in El Paso had expressed hope of clearing 300 workers through the processing center Wednesday.

The TEC office here listed 2,781 unfilled orders on its Thursday cotton labor report. Eleven crews, averaging 17 laborers per crew, arrived here during the past week.

In Martin county, 2,584 bales had been ginned, while Mitchell county ginners had processed 2,225 bales.

The TEC reported the 1,366 laborers were needed in Martin county and 1,011 in Mitchell.

Both Howard and Martin cotton crops are believed to be 30 percent open, while an estimated 20 percent of the Mitchell county cotton is ready for harvest.

Ford Strike Averted By Pension Accord

Company-Financed Plan Makes History

DETROIT, Sept. 29. (AP)—The Ford Motor Co. and the CIO United Auto Workers reached agreement early today on a history-making pension plan to be financed by the company.

It will pay \$100 monthly—including social security—to Ford workers over 65.

The agreement, based on a 10-cent an hour package recently recommended by a presidential fact-finding board in the steel industry, averted a strike of 115,000 Ford production workers.

The marathon negotiations ran nearly 35 hours without recess and set an endurance record for the auto industry. As late as midnight, when the old contract expired, UAW President Walter P. Reuther said there was still a 50-50 chance a walkout might be called.

The new pact runs two and a half years, giving hope of long peace in the industry.

Effective Oct. 1, providing it is ratified by rank and file Ford workers, the new contract is unique in the auto industry's history in at least three respects:

1—It calls for the first major pension plan, and the company agreed for the first time to shoulder the entire financial responsibility for pensions.

2—For the first time, the union let its demand for an hourly wage increase go by the board in favor of security provisions. The present wage rate of \$1.65 an hour will be continued.

3—The 30-month duration, a record in the auto industry.

The pact may well affect millions of workers in the nation's other heavy industry—particularly the steel workers.

Ford Vice President John S. Bugas said his firm's pension agreement was based on the expenditure of the 10-cent an hour limit recommended by a presidential fact-finding board in the steel industry.

FORD PACT SPURS HOPES

Pressure For Steel Settlement Boosted

PITTSBURGH, Sept. 29. (AP)—Two major steel producers broke off negotiations with the CIO United Steelworkers today and the industry started shutting down as the Friday midnight strike deadline approached.

Bethlehem and Republic, the Nation's second and third largest producers respectively, stopped bargaining. But industry leader United States Steel and Union President Philip Murray arranged another session (2 p. m. EST).

PITTSBURGH, Sept. 29. (AP)—Agreement of Ford Motor Co. to finance pensions for aged CIO United Auto Workers today has increased pressure on steel negotiators for a settlement.

Neither the United States Steel Corp., biggest producer and industry leader, nor the CIO United Steelworkers would comment on the Ford settlement as bargaining teams gathered here for new contract talks.

They are working against a Friday midnight strike deadline.

Ford's willingness to pay for a 10-cent hourly pension and insurance package places a new weapon in the union's hands.

The auto pact conforms to the recommendations of the steel industry fact finding board and leaves steel companies standing firm on their refusal to go along on the recommendation that employers bear all expenses.

U. S. Steel and other big producers want employees to share in the costs. The union says that all companies which don't switch over will be struck at 12:01 o'clock Saturday morning.

Determined Philip Murray, president of both the CIO and the Steelworkers, went ahead with plans to flash the strike signal to about 500,000 unionists in the basic steel industry. Some plants already have begun to curtail operations in preparation for a possible strike.

He gave no sign of giving up his fight to force the steel industry to pay the entire cost of a pension-insurance program.

Murray had nothing but scorn for a big steel offer of 10 cents an hour per employee to help finance pensions and insurance for the men who make steel. After the offer yesterday, the veteran labor leader declared:

"It must be plain to all that the corporation is deliberately seeking to force a steel strike."

RATE FIXED AT \$1.50

City School Tax Roll Is Approved

Tax roll for the Big Spring Independent School district was approved and the rate fixed at \$1.50 at a called meeting of the board of trustees Wednesday afternoon.

The board approved the roll amounting to \$20,038,782, which reflects a total levy of \$315,581.88, based on the rate for \$100 of assessed valuation. Of the rate, most goes to maintenance, or \$1.35. The remaining 15 cents is marked for bond requirements.

The board acknowledged that problems had arisen out of annexation of the Moore and part of the Fairview districts to the Big Spring district. Because of lack of time, the rate of assessment was pegged at \$20 an acre this year.

Wednesday the board went on record to secure the services of competent evaluators to survey all properties in the new annexed territories so that the board of equalization next year will have detailed information on which to effect equalization of taxes.

Mrs. Jane J. Kraker was elected as an elementary teacher and Mrs. Louise Horton, formerly with the city-county health unit, was employed a school nurse.

Regular discounts on early payments of taxes have been approved—three per cent for October, two for November one for December. January payments on current taxes carry no discount and after Jan. 31 payments carry interest and penalty.

Next meeting has been postponed until 7:30 p. m. Oct. 10 to avoid conflict with Centennial Week activities.

1949 POLIO CASES ALREADY MORE THAN IN ANY FULL YEAR ON RECORD

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29. (U.P.) — More polio cases have been reported in the first nine months of 1949 than in any full year on record.

The Public Health Service announced yesterday that the total through last Saturday was 31,289 compared with 27,658 for all of 1948—second worst year on record—and about 30,000 in 1916, the previous peak.

The totals do not necessarily mean that this is the worst year for poliomyelitis epidemics, the health service said. In earlier years reporting was far less complete.

In the week ended Sept. 24 there were 2,192 new cases, compared with 2,612 during the previous week.

It was the fifth consecutive week of polio decline. However, 11 states showed increases. Texas had the largest, from 52 cases a week earlier to 90 last week.

Cooler Weather Of Fall Hits Midwest

CHICAGO, Sept. 29. (U.P.) — The coolest weather of the autumn hit parts of the Midwest today.

The cold air extended from the Dakotas into northern Indiana and northern Missouri. It was expected to move eastward and southward during the day.

The mercury slid below freezing over areas in Iowa, Wisconsin, Michigan, Illinois, Indiana and Minnesota. It dropped to 20 above at Land O'Lakes, Wis., 23 at Atlantic, Ia., 24 at Green Bay, Wis., and 28 at Rockford, Ill.

Skies generally were clear over the cool belt. But there was rain along the East Coast from Miami, Fla., into New England.

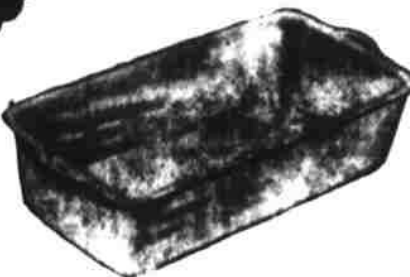
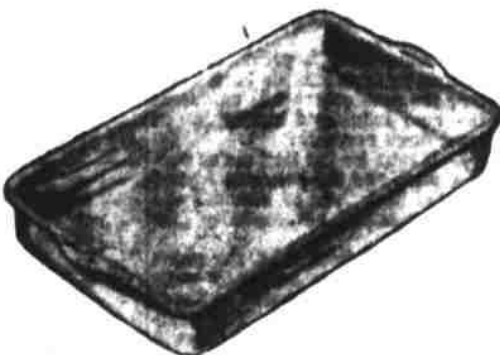

Truman Sounds Keynote For 1950 Campaign

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 29 (AP) — President Truman led a Democratic invasion of Missouri today to sound the keynote for the 1950 congressional campaign.

He laid his political mission aside temporarily this morning to join with fellow Democrats in a secret ceremony installing new officers of the Missouri Grand Lodge.

He moves on to Kansas City by plane this afternoon for an off-the-cuff talk at a testimonial dinner for the new Democratic National Chairman William M. Boyle. The speech will spark the Democrats' 1950 election campaign, associates of the President said.

The Kansas City event will be the biggest gathering of prominent Democrats since the inauguration program in Washington.

Cabinet members, heads of departments and agencies and party leaders will be on hand to celebrate Boyle's elevation to the key Democratic position.

Vice President Barkley also is scheduled to attend. He arrived in St. Louis yesterday by commercial airline.

HANDS OFF POLICY — While Mr. Truman has indicated he will play "hands-off" on the Democratic primary races for the Senate and the House, he has said he intends to maintain an active role in the campaign to elect members of the party to Congress.

Mr. Truman came to St. Louis primarily as a 23rd Degree Mason and a former grand master of the Missouri Lodge, however.

He brought along an historic gavel to present to James Bradford of St. Louis, the new grand master.

Arms Aid Bill Sent To Truman

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29 (AP) — Final and authoritative congressional approval of the arms aid bill today gave the administration authority today to start big stocks of war equipment on the way to America's allies against communism.

Congress sent the \$1,440,000,000 war aid bill to the White House yesterday by a top-heavy margin.

The measure makes immediately available \$250 million in cash from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation to throw the arms plan into gear.

Senate leaders say these funds can be used to procure and ship \$450 million worth of surplus American equipment to the nations which have stood with the United States in the cold war with Russia.

The House passed the bill by a two-to-one vote — 225 to 109. A short time later the Senate shouted its approval.

There was only a flurry of oratory in both houses to delay the passage. "Gentlemen called the bill a wasteful misappropriation of funds," but friends of the program defended it as a strong peace measure.

The \$450 million worth of surplus arms provided in the bill in addition to the cash and contract authority.

Most of the cash and contract rights must yet be approved by congressional appropriations committees. But the \$250 million from RFC is enough to get the program rolling.

Walters Released By Cincinnati Reds

CINCINNATI, Sept. 29 (AP) — Bucky Walters was released as manager of the Cincinnati Reds today. Walters, Reds' general manager, said no successor has been chosen to succeed him.

Walters, for many years a star pitcher for the Cincinnati club, became manager on Aug. 6, 1948.

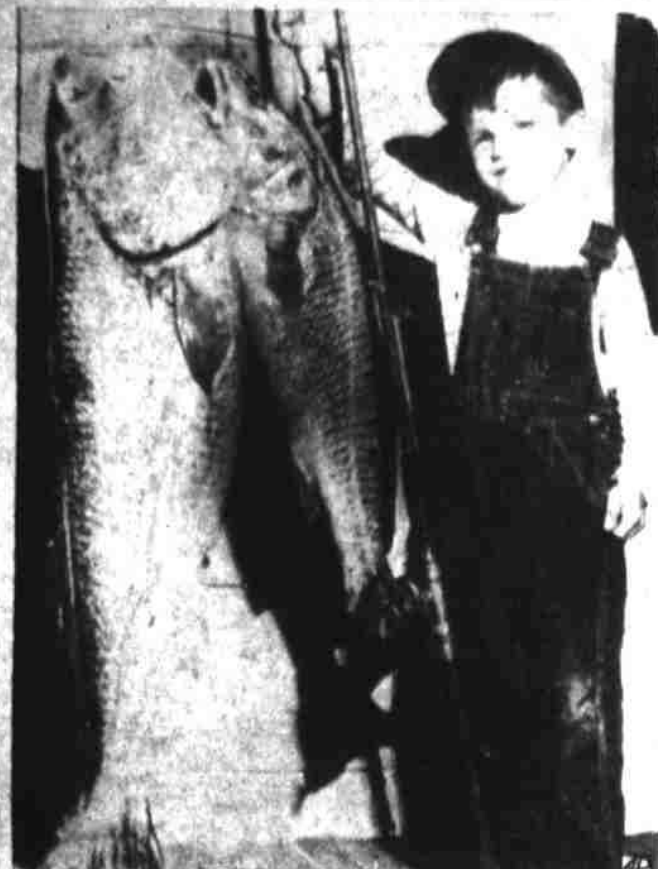

WINTER BEATING NEARS

Plan Now To Cut Roof Repair Bills

By BOB SCHARFF

STIRS
Your roof will take a beating this winter and give you plenty of trouble. A little preparation and a small expenditure right now can mean substantial saving in repair bills later on.

First inspect the roof thoroughly. Perhaps it needs only a cleaning or a few minor repairs to make it invulnerable to wind, rain, snow and ice. But if a major fault exists, call in an expert for advice.

Check gutters first. Make sure that nothing blocks the free passage of water. Repair any open joints or breaks to prevent water from seeping through and causing leaks inside the house. Next, look over the gutters for bends or sags.

Where the gutters are secured to the roof or the cornice with hangers, be sure the hangers are firmly attached to the building. You can get new hangers at your hardware store.

A gutter set too high in relation to the edge of the roof may cause every snowfall to be blocked. It should be set just below a line continued from the roof slope so sliding snow will jump the gutter.

The leaders must be cleaned thoroughly, too, and the ground inspected where the leaders enter. If their connection to the drain is plugged up, trouble will result. The drain will then back up the water and when this freezes the leaders will burst.

Roofs of all types should be inspected for loose or broken roofing. New pieces or underpatches should be inserted promptly. Curled, dried-out or split shingles may be perfectly tight during heavy rains, but may not prove weather-tight in a blizzard. The time to reshingle is before the snow starts.

Metal roofs and flashing of copper or lead may crack or open up because of the frequent strains of expansion and contraction. If flashing is pointed at masonry joints with a mastic or caulking compound (a putty-like water-proofing material), repaint where this has dried out, run out or cracked.

One small device for a roof, the snow-guard, is perhaps the most useful in preventing damage to leaders and gutters. Snow-guard may be installed on roofs without great expense.

Their fraternal group, Brothers of the Bush, have cultivated lush growths of whiskers as they got into the spirit of the Centennial. Chief Bush Ray Griffin issued an appeal yesterday for members of the hirsute group not to shave until the close of the Big Spring celebration.

Alien Station To Be Opened At Crystal City

SAN ANTONIO, Sept. 29, (AP)—A farm labor processing station for aliens at Crystal City will be opened Oct. 3. William A. Whalen, director of immigration service here, announced today.

The new station will process 250 laborers daily and will be able to relieve an acute labor shortage in the border district, he said.

Application from 5,000 workers have already been received.

He urged farmers who have alien laborers in their employ to legalize their presence in the United States or have them deported.

He explained that a farmer may use alien service only under contract with the Immigration Service's approval and after posting bond.

Bond is set at \$15 per worker, Whalen explained. The minimum bond is \$500.

Whalen said that under an agreement between the immigration service and Mexico the employer must forfeit \$25 for each alien who violates provisions of admission.

ONE COMPROMISE ACCEPTED

Administration's Pay Raise Bill May Pass Senate Today

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29, (AP)—After swallowing one compromise, administration leaders hoped to push a pay raise bill for top government officials through the Senate today without retreating further.

At a sparsely attended session that lasted until midnight, senators voted to trim salary boosts already approved by the House and strongly urged by President Truman for cabinet members and other upper-bracket executives.

The vote in favor of that was 36 to 16. Administration leaders escaped another setback with the defeat of an amendment that would have tied the pay raises to the balancing of the federal budget.

The bill as revised is expected to cost \$700 million a year. A much bigger sum was approved quickly by the House yesterday for civil service workers, who would get \$85,000 government employees a raise costing \$95,000,000 a year—averaging \$113 per worker. It now goes to the Senate.

The civil service raise was the third such measure the House passed within a span of 24 hours. Tuesday the members voted \$300 million a year more in military pay and \$180 million more for postal employees.

Still pending in the Senate when the weary, temper-frayed members went home early today were 16 amendments to the cabinet-officials pay raise bill. Democratic Leader Lucas, of Illinois, said he was confident all would be beaten.

He told a reporter, however, that he might accept an amendment that would direct President Truman to submit a balanced budget to Congress next January for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1951.

Sen. McClellan (D-Ark.), a leader of the Senate economy bloc, has offered the amendment as a means of forcing the President to show how federal spending could be kept within revenues. The President still would be free to submit his regular budget recommendations.

Another economy amendment which Sen. Ferguson (R-Mich.) is trying to tack onto the bill would direct the President to trim government expenditures by 5 to 10 per cent. Lucas predicted it would be rejected.

In scaling down the salary increases asked by Mr. Truman for his top executives, the Senate adopted a complete substitute for the House-passed bill.

The compromise was offered by 19 Democrats and 14 Republicans. Lucas had conceded in advance it would be adopted.

It would raise the pay of cabinet members to \$22,500 instead of the \$20,000 provided in the House bill. They now get \$15,000.

and such officials as the director of the budget, the chairman of the National Security Resources Board, the federal security administrator and the veterans administrator would be raised to \$15,000 instead of the \$20,000 the House had voted.

The Senate substitute in general would limit raises to 50 per cent and not increase salaries above \$15,000. Exceptions were made for cabinet members and a few White House aides.

The President would be allowed to pay two of his assistants \$20,000, three others \$18,000 and seven more \$15,000.

Lucas said the Senate's action did not give him what he wanted but he added "It is an increase in salary and does give some help."

The amendment which would have made the proposed pay raises effective only when the President declared, on the basis of estimated revenues and expenditures, that he expected the budget for the fiscal year to be balanced was proposed by Sen. Williams (R-Del.). He said it would "dangle salary increases before these boys as something they can get if they balance the budget" and thus induce them to clamp down on spending.

The Williams amendment was rejected, 39 to 17. Lucas shouted that it was an attempt "to kill the bill by indirection."

The bill as it passed the House, would have added \$1,200,000 to the salaries of federal officials. The substitute would cut the cost to \$700,000 a year.

By voice vote, the Senate adopted an amendment of Sen. Douglas (D-Ill.) to require that the raises be paid out of money already appropriated. This can be done by not filling some job vacancies, he said.

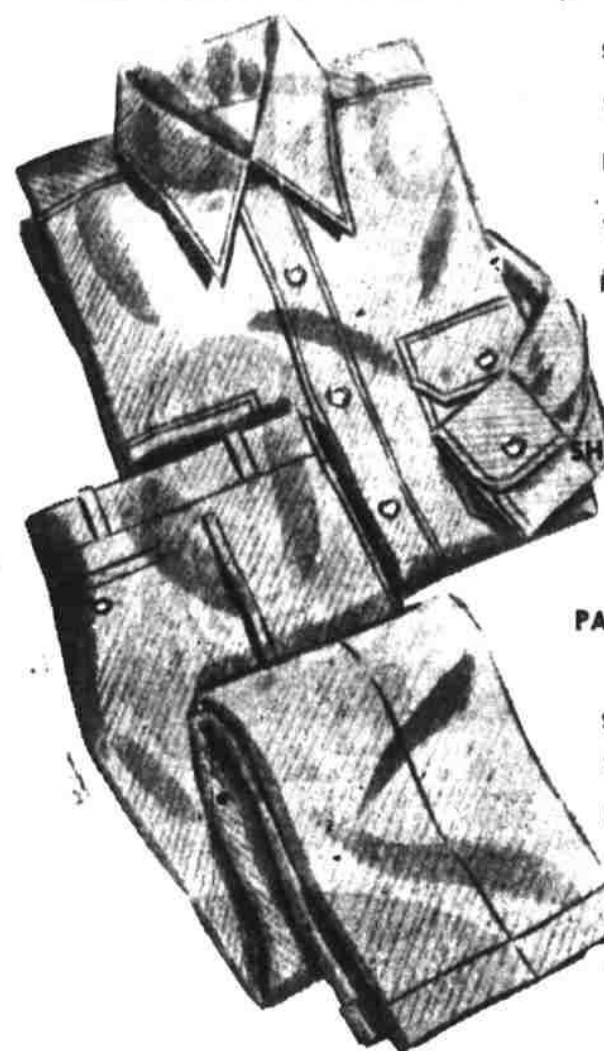

"Jeffy," as he was called by FDR, managed the President's 1932 campaign in California and became controller of the currency when Roosevelt took office the next year.

The Most Rev. J. Francis A. McIntyre, Roman Catholic archbishop of Los Angeles, will preside over the requiem mass. Burial will be in Grand Forks, N. D., near his birthplace. He was the law partner of the late Sen. William Gibbs McAdoo, famous Democratic figure.

In North Dakota, Judge O'Connor was a member of the state legislature and unsuccessful candidate for governor and U. S. senator. In 1933 he ran for governor of California on the Democratic ticket, but was defeated by Culbert Olson, later elected.

Unmarried, Judge O'Connor received many honorary law degrees and wrote a book, "Banks Under Roosevelt."

He had a hand in organizing many of the early New Deal banking reforms, chiefly the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp.

Emperor's Latest Book Proves Dud

TOKYO, Sept. 29. (AP)—Emperor Hirohito's latest literary effort hit the bookstands today. But he'll get books back instead of a royalty.

It did not make the best seller list as do most of the emperor's poems.

Its title is Sea Cows of Sagami Bay. The book is based on a 20-year study of marine life by the emperor.

The official bookeller reported only a "fair sale," and added that he was sending the emperor 300 copies instead of a royalty check.

GOODRICH STRIKE NEGOTIATORS IN AGREEMENT ON 'NO-STRIKE' CLAUSE

DAYTON, O., Sept. 29. (AP)—Negotiators in the month-old strike at the B. F. Goodrich Co. reached tentative agreement on a "no strike" clause today.

A union spokesman said "it looks like we're not too far apart on the remaining six issues."

J. W. Keener, Goodrich vice president, announced the no-strike agreement during a recess in the weeks-old negotiations.

"The union has promised to put into the proposed contract a clause barring strikes during the life of the contract," Keener said.

He described the no-strike pledge as one of the major barriers to agreement.

Asa Tiller, international representative of the CIO United Rubber Workers, confirmed Keener's announcement. He said the tentative agreement was reached late yesterday.

Kent, 67, underwent the operation last night. His home is at Ausable Forks, near here.

Judges Disagree Over Legality Of Dock Seizure Law

HONOLULU, Sept. 29. (AP)—Disagreement of Hawaii's two federal judges over legality of the territory's dock seizure law today enabled the government to continue its stevedoring operations.

This split in U. S. district court was on a request of the striking CIO International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union for an injunction against the law.

Judge J. Frank McLaughlin upheld the seizure act, passed by the territorial legislature Aug. 4, as a valid exercise of police power under an emergency involving public welfare.

Judge Delbert E. Metzger ruled it unconstitutional. He said it destroyed collective bargaining and conflicted with federal rights.

The dissent denied the union a temporary restraining order against the law which bans picketing.

The ILWU, whose 2,000 stevedores struck 152 days ago to boost their \$1.40 hourly pay by 32 cents, said it would appeal to the U. S. Ninth Circuit Court in San Francisco.

West Germany Devalues Mark

BONN, Germany, Sept. 29 (AP)—The western German federal government announced today a devaluation of the deutschemark exchange rate from 30 cents American to 23.8905 cents.

The federal chancellor announced that "the allied high commission has stated that it had no objection to this state of exchange." The announcement said the government fixed the rate at the request of the central banking council of the Bank Deutscher Laender (German States Bank).

Earlier Chancellor Konrad Adenauer had conferred for four hours with the U. S. British and French high commissioners for Germany. He had asked the meeting chiefly to protest German coal price regulations which the allies had proposed yesterday along with the new exchange rate.

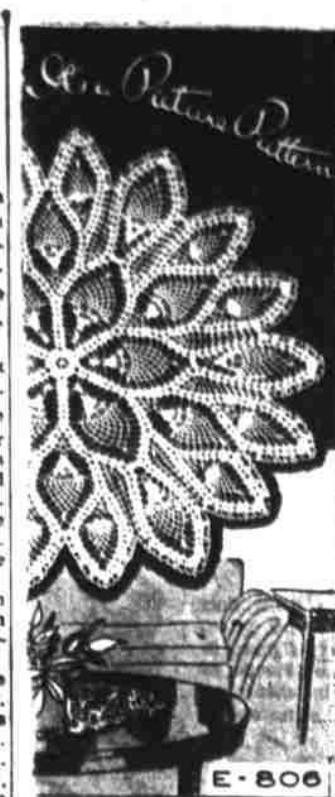

A Whiff Of Brimstone Can Make A Man Change His Mind

Understatement of the week was made by Senator Tom Connally, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, when he remarked that the news that Russia had achieved the A-bomb had "given the arms program new strength."

The House had slashed about fifty percent from the foreign arms bill only a few weeks ago. The Senate adopted last week the approximate full sum asked by the administration. There were fears that in the Senate-House conference to iron out differences, House sentiment might prevail, and the arms aid bill be reduced to the point of ineffectiveness.

Then came news of the Russian A-bomb, and when the Senate-House conference got together, they agreed quickly to the more costly program as voted by the Senate. That was when Senator Connally said his comment in which two Republicans—Bridges of New Hampshire and Knowland of California—concurred.

This just happened to be the first instance in which the news from Russia changed congressional sentiment. Before many weeks have passed it may alter other views in other issues, pending in Congress, as well as force a revision of Department of Defense programming and policies.

Only a few days ago any suggestion that the U. S. share atomic development, its co-partners in atomic development, Great Britain and Canada, brought belated rage from some congressmen. The news from Russia put a different face on the issue. Now some who opposed cooperation with our atomic co-partners will be only too glad to swap information with them. They have suddenly realized a fact they wanted to forget, to wit: that British scientists in particular made indispensable contribution to the development of the bomb that fell on Hiroshima.

The news from Russia almost certainly influenced passage of the armed forces pay raise bill, though it was figured to pass anyhow. It will influence passage, or defeat, of several other pending measures.

Ranks Of Civil War Veterans Thinning Down To A Very Few

One of O. Henry's wisecracks was to the effect that it was hog and hominy that enabled one and two-thirds Confederates to stand off six Federals for four long years. He added that a diet like that would cause any man to fight the nearest object from a buzzsaw to a catamount, or words to that effect.

Actually, of course, hog and hominy would have been considered a luxury to many of the men who followed the Stars and Bars. Even parched corn sustained them for long periods when the going really got rough.

All of which may help to explain why there are more surviving Confederates than Federals, although there were three men who wore the blue for every man who wore the grey in that great conflict. The GAR at its last reunion not long ago could muster only six; the Confederates went down two better at Little Rock this week.

There are more survivors on both sides than these figures indicate, but not many more; but from all accounts the surviving Southerners outnumber their Northern

opposite numbers by about two to one. Just why the Confederates should compile a better longevity record than the Federals is a matter of dispute. Some say that it was a matter of the draft. The South started drafting 'em almost from the start, and took in 17-year-olds. The Union go into the draft business much later, and started with 21-year-olds. Actually, thousands of Southern boys did not wait for the draft; they took up arms at anywhere from 12 to 16.

Undoubtedly the Southern boys endured more hardships, were poorly fed, clothed and housed, than their opposite numbers. Maybe this toughening process caused more of them to live longer, but this is a theory contrary to those held by most medical authorities, and by social welfare workers. We imagine an old wearer of the blue, with a twinkle in his eye, might remark it was because the Johnny Rebs were "just too ornery to die."

In any case, the ranks of both are thinned almost to the vanishing point. Texas, as befits its fame, has almost as many surviving Rebels as all the other Southern states combined.

U. S. S. Arizona, Coffin Ship, May Be Pearl Harbor Memorial

PEARL HARBOR, (AP) — A day of infamy . . . and Sunday morning Japanese warplanes treacherously attacked our fleet in Pearl Harbor . . . Japanese envoys at the same time were in Washington talking peace with the American Secretary of State . . . Heavy damage has been inflicted.

These echoes from Dec. 7, 1941 sound only faintly now from the quiet anchorage in Oahu which was once the scene of so much horror and anguish, such violent shock and incredible confusion.

For two hours the surprised garrison, so long the polished pride and complacent boast of America, endured sudden death and ferocious hurt. Then the Japanese planes mission accomplished, turned back to the rising sun which was to set on global war.

Today only a few streaks of rust, the decks of the battleship Arizona and the half-over hull of the old target ship Utah—mark the spot. All the rest—eight battleships, many destroyers and lesser craft, sunk or damaged have been repaired, scrapped or used in the Bikini bomb tests, in any case, removed from the area.

For long, the great wartime Armada which armed and supplied the Pacific area from Pearl kept the harbor in an even more furious state of activity, furnishing a backdrop against which Dec. 7, 1941 might easily be visualized. But now a victorious America has advanced its Pacific front line to Saipan, Okinawa, Japan itself. Steel Pension Dispute Is Interesting To Loyal Followers Of Dr. Townsend

WASHINGTON — The battle over old-age pensions in the steel industry is being watched by several million people not only in other industries but especially in Southern California and Florida where Dr. Townsend's old-age pension movement and the ham-and-eggs have been so strong.

Regardless of how the steel dispute comes out, more and more demands for old-age pensions will follow.

One little-known fact in the steel dispute is that, during the President's fact-finding board hearings, CIO Chief Phil Murray appealed to the steel industry to settle the old-age pension issue by supporting the social security bill now before Congress. He said: "Look here, you fellows, there's a bill before Congress right now calling for increased old-age pensions for everyone. Will you join me in supporting it?"

Murray's remark was addressed to Enderbrough and John Stephens, executives of U. S. Steel, to C. M. White of Bethlehem, Ben Moreell of Jones-Laughlin and several others. However, he got no response. None offered to support the congressional bill old-age pension.

Murray's inference was that if Congress had handled the pension matter for everyone his union would not need to threaten a strike. As it is, however, the unions with sufficient strike power, such as the coal miners, auto workers, steelworkers et al., can get pensions. But on killed labor, farm labor, white-collar workers and old-timers who never belonged to unions will get no old-age pensions, or none.

Discrimination Against Mexican Workers Based Upon Ignorance

"Let's go to Mexico," said my friend. "Do you feel that bad?" I asked him. This conversation took place in Dallas some years ago, when the memory of Villa's raids and Pershing's punitive expedition still was fresh in the public mind. The general impression then was that no American in his right senses would cross the Rio Grande without a bodyguard of Yankee doughboys. Despite all the water that has flowed under the bridge since those days, this idea remains the fixed opinion of a surprising number of people.

My friend laughed at my reply, and soon thereafter headed south of the border. The last I heard of him he was a student at the University of Mexico, and apparently was not obliged to battle for his life every day.

"Mexico," said another of my friends. "Look here, boy, I know that country, and you'd better stay away from there."

As a matter of fact, I had no intention of going to Mexico just then, as I already had enough to do in the United States. However, it is hardly to be wondered at that I regarded our sister republic as a land of bandits and cutthroats, when those gentry formed the stock in trade of every popular novelist. The mysterious disappearance of Ambrose Bierce in Mexico also was played up for all it was worth. Mexicans were pictured as a "cruel, barbarous and treacherous" race whose very environment prompted them to deeds of violence, and since I myself knew no Mexicans at the time, I accepted this judgment at its face value.

But later, when I had acquired a reading knowledge of the Spanish language, I was astonished to discover how many

Mexican authors had made an enduring place for themselves in literature. Was it possible, I asked myself, that a nation of barbarians could have produced such charming tales and lovely poems? Gradually, as I read on, I realized that the grand old tongue of Cervantes, Calderon and Lope de Vega, far from sinking into corruption, had come to a fresh flowering in the New World. Accordingly, I found it necessary to revise all my conceptions of the Mexican national character.

Since then, I have made the acquaintance of not a few Mexicans, and can testify that they are a delightful people. What impresses me most is their unflinching courtesy, which is common to all classes. The humblest bracer may have manners which put to shame the average American. This is but natural, for every Mexican, no matter how poor, knows himself to be a partaker in a glorious heritage. Incidentally, Americans are prone to forget that a very old civilization existed in Mexico when North America still was a howling wilderness.

It is regrettable that discrimination against Mexicans has not yet entirely been stamped out in Texas. Notwithstanding all the fine work of the Good Neighbor Commission, several state counties now are under a cloud for their alleged unfair dealings with braceros. The only bright spot in this sorry business is the promptitude with which the people down at Austin acted to see that the incidents complained of were not repeated. Such incidents, it seems to me, would be impossible were they not based upon an abysmal ignorance of the language, history and people of Mexico.—H. H. MACREADY.

Not All U. S. Executive Branch Workers Slated For Pay Hikes

WASHINGTON, (AP) — CONGRESS HAS approved a pay raise for most of the people in the armed services. Now it's in the midst of voting on a wage raise for government employees.

Not all people getting government pay. Just those in the executive branch of the government. And not all of them. Just these:

1. Postal employees. The House Tuesday voted to raise them by as much as \$150 to \$450 a year, depending on grade and years of service. But they get no raise unless the Senate also approves.
2. White collar civil service workers making under \$10,000 a year, such as clerks, stenographers, scientists, professional people, and so on. Average pay for people in this group is \$3,352.

WEDNESDAY THE HOUSE TOOK UP a bill giving them an average raise of \$130 a year. But they'll get no raise unless the Senate also approves.

3. The executives who make \$10,000 a year or more but less than \$25,000. This group includes most of the top people in the government, such as cabinet members who are department heads, like the secretary of state, and the heads of various agencies and bureaus.

The House has passed a bill to give them raises ranging up to a top salary of \$25,000 a year.

President Truman has been pressing Congress to boost this group. Pay for the various jobs they hold has not been increased since 1925. On the other hand, Congress raised for the postal and white collar civil service workers in 1945, 1946, and again in 1948.

ONLY FOUR PEOPLE IN THE EXECUTIVE branch make \$25,000 a year or more. The ambassador to Britain and the ambassador to France, each of whom gets \$25,000 a year, and the President and Vice President.

In January of 1949 Congress raised the President from \$75,000 a year to \$100,000 and boosted his tax-free expense allowance from \$40,000 to \$90,000. At the same time it increased the Vice President's pay from \$20,000 a year to \$30,000 a year, a tax-free expense allowance of \$10,000 a year.

Next highest paid man in the executive branch is Paul Hoffman, head of the Econ-

omic Co-Operation Administration (Marshall Plan). He gets \$20,000.

Congress is not considering raising pay in the other two branches—legislative and judiciary—this year.

IN THE LEGISLATIVE BRANCH — members of the House and Senate—Congress raised its own pay in 1946 from \$10,900 a year to \$12,500, plus a tax-free expense allowance of \$2,500 a year.

In the judicial branch—the judges of the federal courts—Congress raised all the judges' salaries \$5,000 each in 1946. This was:

- Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, from \$20,500 to \$25,500; eight associate justices of the Supreme Court, from \$20,000 to \$25,000; judges of the Circuit Court of Appeals, from \$12,500 to \$17,500; and judges of the U. S. district courts, from \$10,000 to \$15,000.

Speaker of the House Sam Rayburn got his pay boosted to \$30,000, plus a \$10,000 tax-free expense allowance. In January of this year when Congress was voting Vice-President Barkley the same pay.

THE HIGHEST PAID MEN IN GOVERNMENT, therefore, are President Truman, Vice President Barkley, and Speaker Rayburn, although Rayburn is in the legislative branch.

Besides ECA's Hoffman, with his \$20,000 a year, the pay scales for the other top executives runs like this, although the list is not complete here:

- \$17,500—David Lilienthal, chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission.
- \$15,000—the nine cabinet members, as secretaries of state, secretary of defense, the three members of the President's Council of Economic Advisors.
- \$14,000—J. Edgar Hoover, head of the FBI.
- \$12,500—four members of the Reconstruction Finance Corp. board.
- \$12,000, eleven members of the Interstate Commerce Commission.
- \$10,500—some undersecretaries and assistant secretaries, who are chief assistants to the top department heads, like the secretary of state.
- \$10,000—most heads of independent agencies and commissions, like the five members of the Federal Trade Commission; three members of the Civil Service Commission.

British Socialist Government Asked To Justify Existence

BRITAIN'S SOCIALIST GOVERNMENT is facing its greatest political crisis in the debate now waging in the House of Commons over the recent controversial devaluation of the pound sterling.

Actual the question of devaluation is incidental. It has been seized upon as a symbol of the devastating economic slough of despond in which England is struggling.

The real point at issue is whether Britain's first experiment in Socialist government has measured up to its stewardship in handling the crisis.

IN SHORT PRIME MINISTER ATTLEE's regime is called upon to justify its existence. And the outcome of the examination is a matter of moment far beyond the confines of Britain; for this government represents the world's most important test of moderate socialism as distinct from communism and bolshevism.

The main attack on the government comes from the Conservatives led by Winston Churchill. There is weight in this assault, for Churchill is generally regarded as the savior of his country in the world conflict, and his views are received with respect.

Attlee lacks the colorful personality of his opponent. However, the premier himself has achieved powerful leadership

through team work and his reputation for sincerity. I had a long conversation with him in London just after he came to power in 1945 and sized him up as being a straightforward man.

Polio Threat Forces Yale To Quit Grid

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Sept. 29. (AP) — Doctors kept the Yale football squad under close scrutiny today because one player has developed infantile paralysis. The Fordham game, scheduled for Saturday in the Yale Bowl, has been cancelled.

Whether other games on the variety schedule, particularly that against Columbia in New York, will be called off remained uncertain. One university official, declining to permit use of his name, said that would depend on whether additional cases of polio develop among players exposed to the disease.

The university announced the cancellation of the Fordham game late yesterday. It was the first time since the bowl was opened in 1914 that a game had been called off. Athletic association officials estimated 18,000 tickets already had been sold for the contest, which would have marked the first appearance of a Fordham team in Connecticut.

Also cancelled were Saturday's Yale-Elihu College Academy game and all intramural football games for the next ten days.

No restrictions were placed on general student activities, and the university's announcement said: "No other precautionary measures are contemplated at this time."

The stricken player, Richard D. Leach, a 22-year-old back from Lake Geneva, Wis., is one of three Yale seniors to be afflicted by polio in recent days. The others are William C. Butler of Winnetka, Ill., and Salvatore Miano of New Britain, Conn.

The university described all three cases as "mild." None is paralyzed, but the university said one of Leach's legs was becoming weak and Butler has complained of "stiff stiffness."

Leach entered the Yale infirmary immediately after last Saturday's game against the University of Connecticut, in which he played. He was at first thought to have suffered a back strain, but symptoms indicating polio soon appeared.

Both the cases of Leach and Butler struck about the same time were reported definitely as polio yesterday after they had been transferred to New Haven hospital. Miano was taken ill last week and while visiting his home and is now in Hartford. Hospital Yale health officials said there was no apparent relation between the three cases.

News of their teammates' illness caused the Yale squad and Coach Herman Hickman, shortly before the close of yesterday's practice session. There was no comment, but the players appeared depressed as they filed into the dressing room.

The ban on football was lifted at ten days because Yale doctors estimated that amount of time remained of the standard incubation period of two weeks for the appearance of polio.

The football team will be permitted to start practice on Monday, but will not play until after a constant medical inspection and the experts' announcement. The players will be given a physical examination before Monday.

Yale's football team was scheduled to play at the University of Connecticut today, but the game was cancelled due to the polio outbreak.

B-36's Moving To Bases In Alaska

FORT WORTH, Sept. 29 (AP)—Movement of long-range B-36s to bases in Alaska, manned by crews trained to deliver the atomic bomb, began last week almost at the same time President Truman gave the world the startling news that Russia had the secret of atomic fission, the Star-Telgram learned today.

Although headquarters here of the 8th Air Force at Carswell Air Base described the B-36 flights as "routine training missions," it was known that one of the first planes

carried Brig. Gen. John William P. Fisher, commander of Carswell and of its 7th Bombardment Wing—the only wing in the Air Force operating B-36s.

Maj. Gen. Robert Ramey, the 8th's commander and one of the top experts in the Air Force on atomic warfare, was scheduled to return to his headquarters here today after more than a week of conferences in Washington.

Col. Cecil Combs, Ramey's deputy commander, left Carswell Tuesday on one of the B-36 flights to join Montgomery and Fisher at Eielson Air Base near Fairbanks.

Combs was accompanied by Maj. Gen. Earl Barnes, member of Secretary of Defense Johnson's special weapons evaluation board.

Previous test flights from Carswell to Alaska bases were made during the summer, to test operational characteristics of the big planes in weather conditions of the Far North and to survey facilities available there for crewmen and for servicing the planes.

The ships are the Flying Trader, en route from Hongkong to Shanghai, and the Flying Independent, and the Flying Clipper out-bound from Shanghai. All are operated by the Isbrandtsen Co., New York.

The report of the incident came from the American consulate general at Shanghai. It said the three ships were intercepted by Chinese naval craft off the mouth of the Yangtze river and "requested" to anchor.

Government Of Texas Hit By City Regimes

AUSTIN, Sept. 29 (AP)—City governments of Texas are very unhappy about the state government, and especially the legislature.

The feeling that was somewhat soft-pedaled during the 51st regular session—while the cities were begging, a little financial relief—flared out in black type in the last issue of "Texas Municipalities," official publication of the League of Texas Municipalities.

In an article headed "Cities Suffered at this term of Legislature," Mayor George D. Barber of Mineral Wells, let fly with his opening statement:

"The rights of home rule cities were encroached upon still further by the recent sessions of the Legislature. Especially noteworthy was the encroachment by the firemen's and policemen's minimum wage bill passed by both houses and signed by the governor."

"If this type of legislation continues, it is the opinion of many of us that the jurisdictional rights of municipalities and one of these days city officials will only be rubber stamps for the centralized government in Austin."

Texas city officials through their organization, came before the last Legislature with several propositions aimed at increasing their revenues. The legislature listened politely, but that's all.

Barber, vice-president of the league, had his tart comment: "But will the members of the Legislature, in their wild scramble to tell municipalities what they can and can not do, provide the necessary revenue to meet requirements of some of these unenacted laws?"

The answer is no. The boys who supported the firemen's and policemen's minimum wage bill do not care where the money comes from.

Barber said much of the blame rests with the cities themselves. "Far too many municipal officials assumed the 'let George do it' attitude and failed to register opposition with their representatives in the legislature, and with the governor. It's high time municipal officials throughout Texas combine their efforts (through the league) to make their influence felt in Austin. If not, the appellation of home rule cities will be a misnomer and a joke."

The league meets in annual sessions at Galveston Oct. 24-26 and more talks of that nature is expected.

The league's executive committee has sent a questionnaire to each city government to find out what they want to talk about at the convention. With local demands for government services continually mounting, and revenue sources practically static, changes are good that it will be money, money, money.

German Princess Due In Amarillo

AMARILLO, Sept. 29 (AP)—The German princess who married a Texas man on her way to her new home in Amarillo.

Clyde Harris, Amarillo interior decorator, was en route to New York today to meet his wife, Princess Cecilie, hazel-eyed daughter of Crown Prince Wilhelm of Prussia.

They were married at Hechingen, Germany, last June 21, and Harris came back to Amarillo to make a home for his bride.

Today a friend divulged that the Texan left Amarillo Monday to meet his wife in New York. Harris stopped in Oklahoma City on business and left there, by car, for New York today.

The Amarillo friend said Princess Cecilie, a granddaughter of Germany's late Kaiser Wilhelm, was to arrive on the Queen Elizabeth. The arrival time was not learned here immediately.

Harris has been living in an Amarillo apartment. It was assumed that the apartment will be the princess' new home.

The couple were married in the bleak ancestral fortress home of the Hohenzollerns—Prussia's ruling family for hundreds of years. It is situated in the French zone of Germany.

Harris met the princess in the summer of 1945, not long after the end of hostilities.

Then a captain in the Army, Harris had a job with the U. S. Military Government in Darmstadt, tracing and restoring historic fine arts collections scattered by the war.

His job took him to Schloss Wolfsgarten, a picturesque hunting lodge of Prince Ludwig of Hesse, in the heart of a forest not far from Langen.

There, the two met. "We knew each other for a year," Harris later related. "Then I went home to Amarillo in 1946."

For three years the couple corresponded.

Last May, Harris returned to Germany. He apparently proposed then, for he said, "We made our plans after I got back to Germany."

The princess was quite excited—at the time of the marriage—about going to the United States to live.

"People tell me all sorts of stories about Texas. Many Germans think it is full of cowboys and Indians and they can't imagine the princess going to live there. But from what Clyde tells me, I think I will like it."

SUGGESTION MADE BY SEN. CONNALLY

Lubbock Air Force Base May Receive Name Of Texas Hero

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29 (AP)—A suggestion that the Lubbock Air Force base be named the Ellis Air Force base, in honor of a young Texas who gave his life to help win World War Two, has come to Senator Connally (D-Tex.) from W. H. Cooke, Jr., of Clarendon.

In a letter Cooke wrote that Leut. Lewis Calvin Ellis, Jr. formerly a student at Texas Tech at Germany when his son was only 6 weeks old.

"The Ellis family is one of the real pioneer families of West Texas," he wrote.

"They have been well known out of here for many years and have been among our leading citizens. They are prominent in banking circles."

"I have known this young man's family for 35 years and there are no finer people, so I think it would be altogether fitting if the Lubbock air force base were named in his honor."

Legislation formally authorizing agricultural aircraft experimental work, already started in Texas A. and M. college, has been introduced in the Senate by Senator Thomas (D-Okla.) and in the House by Rep. Olin (Tiger) Teague of College Station, a former Aggie.

Resolutions offered by the lawmakers point out that present aircraft used in dusting, spraying and seeding and fertilizing farm lands mostly are converted military planes or obsolete biplanes, none originally designed for agricultural use.

The measures then state it to be the sense of Congress that a project for the development of special aircraft for agricultural purposes be undertaken by the civil aeronautics administration and the agriculture department at Texas A. and M.

CAA Administrator Del Rentsch, himself a former Texas Aggie, and representative of the National Flying Farmers association and Agriculture Department officials recently discussed the pending resolutions.

An official blessing of the work already begun at A. and M. will place it in a more advantageous position if and when a request is made for appropriations to expand the project.

Two Texans were among 80 prominent business and industrial leaders participating in the defense department's recent "orientation" tour.

They were vice president Charles Beard of Braniff Airways, Dallas, and Robert Willford, formerly of Longview and Abilene, now a hotel chain executive residing in Los Angeles. The group visited Army Air Force, and Navy installations up and down the eastern seaboard.

Stopping here while on a tour of big packing plants over the country were Frank Roddie of Brady, second vice president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, and Robert N. Hunt of College Station.

WOMAN UNCONSCIOUS IN HOSPITAL AFTER HUSBAND COMMITS SUICIDE

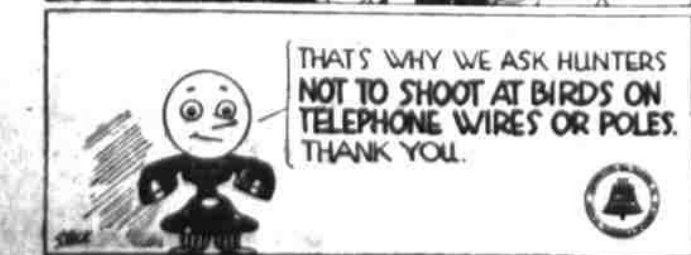

Bell Official Addresses Clubs Of Big Spring

More than 200 service club members Wednesday witnessed demonstrations of electrical miracles in telephone communication. Mysterious "micro-waves" which can shoot a telephone voice through space in a straight line, and other new wonders, were explained by George Brown of the Southwestern Bell Telephone company's information department.

His "Austin to Boston" long distance was used as vehicle for his explanatory talk interspersed with demonstrations of scientific apparatus. Brown reflected four waves with a mirror and showed how volume could be controlled by a magnifying glass.

He also showed a section of coaxial cable which could accommodate 500 channels in each of its eight tubes, let alone the load carried by the center section.

In processes of transmission, vibrations of the voice are stepped up from 2,000 per second at the telephone mouthpiece to as much as four billion on the trip through space from New York to Boston. Voice strength is multiplied 900 times in the process to maintain volume and fidelity at point of destination.

The transistor, newest marvel in telephone research and destined to replace the vacuum tube, was shown as a tiny affair no bigger than the end of a pencil. It was made to "play" a tune by producing different tones. John B. Moore, manager here for the company, introduced the speaker. Avery Falkner, president of the host Lions club, recognized heads of the Rotary American Business and Kiwanis clubs.

Dawson Jailed For Passing Drinks To County Prisoners

Clifford Dawson wound up in the county jail Wednesday for, as authorities termed it, passing in toxicants to prisoners in confinement.

Dawson's brother, Perry, had entered a plea of guilty in justice court to drunkenness charges, a short time previously. His fine was set at \$1 plus costs. When he failed to pay it, he was returned to the pokes.

George Stone and Douglass Stutts were similarly charged in justice court Wednesday and each was fined \$1 and expenses. Stutts paid his penalty and was released but Stone was kept in confinement when he said he couldn't pay the money.

JURY RECOMMENDS MERCY

Mother, Son Found Guilty In Lonely Hearts Murder Trial

DOVER, Del., Sept. 29 (AP)—A year-old carpenter from Stone Mountain, Va., and his 16-year-old son were found "guilty as charged" in Delaware's lonely hearts murder trial but a recommendation of mercy may save both from the gallows.

A jury of 10 men and two women, after deliberating five hours last night returned a verdict of first degree murder with reason Robert Brennan in the shotgun slaying of Wade N. Woodbridge, 67.

'Big Spring' Set For Celebration

The jury also found Mrs. Inez Brennan, 40, guilty as an accomplice. A recommendation of mercy was made in the case of Robert but not for his mother.

Under Delaware law, the maximum penalty for a principal or an accomplice in a capital case is death by hanging. An accomplice, may not receive a more severe sentence than the principal and the mercy plea for Robert may result in life imprisonment for both mother and son.

The three trial judges are not bound by the jury's recommendation, however, and could sentence Robert and Mrs. Brennan to hang immediately after the verdict was returned. Deferre Counsel Benjamin R. CLAIM CURSE DESTROYED DICTATORS

Voodoo Hold On New Orleans Gradually Is Being Broken

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 29.—Voodoo still slinks in the dark corners of ancient New Orleans, but it's a dying business.

There are those who claim voodoo's curse rid the world of Hitler and Mussolini.

On a certain night back in 1941, the story goes, a hoodoo hothead and nine black garbed assistants filed into a graveyard. They buried pictures of the two dictators. As the yellow moon rose, tall black candles were lit on the grave. The leader raised his arms to the moon. His aides tossed nerve-taut cats into the candle flames, and as their screams filled the night the curse was pronounced—death to Hitler by a bullet, Mussolini by hanging.

The latest flurry to reach local headlines involved a young white war widow. She found a black voodoo cross on her doorstep. It symbolized death or separation from friends.

The wax cross had the young widow's name on it and 43 deep thrust pins. At the top was a piece of string, knotted nine times. The maker of the cross was never traced.

Police thought it was an attempt to extort money. Older residents in the neighborhood, wise to voodoo ways, said it was an attempt to turn the young, attractive woman against a boy friend.

There was a time when black voodoo queens ruled a realm of their own in this city of shoulder wide streets and fancy grillwork balconies.

But the busy days of Melane and Marie Leveau, king and queen of ante-bellum voodooism have faded into history.

The dregs that crop up today are nothing more than petty rackets capitalizing on superstition. Voodoo clings to life now by hawking "luck" to Negroes who play the ponies and numbers.

Gypsies too are muscling in on this old voodoo power of commanding luck. They became so active recently that police had to chase

them out of town. Detective Captain Harry O. Gregson said.

Voodoo basically is a smirking little god of evil who promises anything for a fee. It is organized superstition, twisted and fanatical.

But education dug around the dark corners and finally kicked the stuffing out of weird voodoo fetishes.

Voodoo lost its lethal punch before the turn of the century. Here's what the Times-Picayune of June 24, 1894, said:

"The days of voodooism are irretrievably gone. People are just too busy or thrifty to spend time and money on such jugglery."

In New Orleans today you can still find Negroes crowded in smoky rooms, sweat rolling from their faces as they surge through a frenzy of rhythm.

Young Scholar's Lunchbox Should Contain Elements Of Full Meal

Parents of the young scholars are reminded by nutritionists that the lunch box should contain a complete meal — not a between-meal snack.

Some suggestions for school lunches are offered by extension service specialists of Texas A. & M. College:

You can "do things" with butter to give a subtle lift to sandwich filling. Cream into softened butter a little lemon juice, onion salt or juice, grated cheddar cheese, honey, grated orange rind, or chopped parsley.

Children love a surprise tidbit in the lunch box, such as a stuffed date, a few lemon drops, fancy shaped cookies.

Here are hints on school lunch:

Tomato Cheese Sandwiches
2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons flour
1 cup canned tomatoes, mashed
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1 tablespoon chopped onion
1 tablespoon chopped celery
1 to 3 cups grated cheese
• slices whole wheat bread
Melt butter and add flour. Mix well, add seasonings and tomatoes. Cook slowly, stirring constantly until mixture thickens. Remove from fire and add grated cheese. Blend and spread on bread.

*Molasses Raisin Bread:
Ingredients: 3 cups sifted all-purpose flour, 3 teaspoons double-acting baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon baking soda, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 2 1/2 cups sugar, 1 egg (well beaten), 1 cup milk, 1/4 cup molasses, 1/4 cup butter or margarine (melted), 1 cup raisins (washed, drained and chopped).
Method: Mix and sift flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt and sugar. Mix the egg, milk and molasses together. Add to dry ingredients with shortening and mix just enough to blend. Add raisins and mix in lightly. Turn into 9x5x3-inch loaf pan. Bake in a moderate oven (350 F.) for about 1 hour, or until done. Turn out on cake rack, cool, and store overnight before slicing.

Method: Put the sugar and water in a medium-size saucepan, or use a 10-inch skillet. Add the cinnamon candies. Place over low heat and stir until sugar is dissolved, allow to stand over low heat, stirring frequently, so candies will dissolve. In the meantime core apples, peel, and quarter; add to the

syrup, cover, and cook over moderate heat until the apples are very soft. Mash with a fork and cook about 5 minutes longer over low heat or until thick enough. Serve hot or cold. Makes 4 to 5 servings.

Sprinkle with salt, using the smaller amount for 8 chops, the larger for 10. Turn the sauerkraut over the chops and sprinkle with the sugar and the caraway seed. Cover tightly and cook slowly for about 1/2 hour longer, or until the chops are very tender. Makes 4 to 5 servings.

2 cups (1 pint) sour cream
Chicory

Blueberry Cream Dressing
Set refrigerator control at coldest point. Let cream cheese soften at room temperature. Gradually stir in lemon juice, salt and sugar.

Add peaches and blueberries, stirring until well blended. Fold in sour cream. Pour into freezing tray lined with waxed paper or aluminum foil. Fold ends of waxed paper or aluminum foil over top of fruit salad. Freeze until firm, about 1 1/2 to 2 hours. Unmold on chilled platter on bed of chicory. If desired, garnish with additional peaches and blueberries and serve with Blueberry Cream Dressing.

NOTE: For twelve servings, double the quantity of each ingredient and freeze in a 9 1/2" x 5 1/2" x 3" loaf pan.

Gelatin Dishes Add To Autumn Meals

The coolness and freshness a autumn meal needs is in molded gelatin dishes, whether the gelatin is used in jellied soups, salads, fish molds, chiffon pies or to glamorize leftovers.

These dishes may be prepared in the early morning.

Since a gelatin dish is what you make it, it should be as cool as a refrigerator and as crisp and fine-flavored as the fresh fruits and vegetables of summer.

Colorful shreds of carrot and crisp green cabbage and rings of flavored gelatin make the Layer Perfection Molds, pictured, a popular inexpensive salad to serve with fall suppers.

Layer Perfection Molds
1 household sized package lemon flavor gelatin
1 teaspoon salt
2 cups hot water

1-3 cup pitted ripe olives
1 cup shredded carrot
2 cups shredded cabbage
Salad greens
Mayonnaise

Dissolve gelatin and salt in hot water and cool thoroughly. Slice olives into rings. Arrange a layer of olives, carrot and cabbage in bottom of 8 individual molds. Pour gelatin mixture over all. Chill until firm. Unmold onto garnished salad plates. Top with mayonnaise.

Molded Egg Loaf
1 envelope unflavored gelatin
1/4 cup cold water
1 teaspoon salt

2 tablespoons lemon juice
1/4 teaspoon Tabasco
1/4 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing

1 1/2 teaspoons grated onion
1/4 cup finely diced celery
1/4 cup finely diced green pepper
1/4 cup chopped pimiento

4 hard-cooked eggs, chopped
Soften gelatin in cold water. Place over boiling water and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Add salt, lemon juice and Tabasco. Cool. Add mayonnaise; mix in remaining ingredients. Turn into large or individual molds and chill until firm. Unmold on crisp greens.

Well flavored homemade jellied soups make ideal first courses for summer meals. They look cool and inviting and perk up appetites. Apricot jellied soup is a delicate idea borrowed from Scandinavian cuisine.

Apricot Jellied Soup
1 12-ounce can apricot nectar
1 envelope unflavored gelatin
4 tablespoons lime juice

Soften gelatin in 1/4 cup of the apricot nectar. Add water to remaining apricot nectar to make 2 cups. Heat liquid; add to softened gelatin; stir until gelatin is dissolved. Add lime juice. Pour into pan; chill until firm.

To serve, break up lightly with a fork or cut into cubes. Pile into bouillon cups and garnish with finely chopped mint leaves.

Herbs and other seasonings make very special dishes of more familiar tomato and bouillon jellied soups. In these two recipes, liquid from canned or home-cooked vegetables can replace part of the tomato juice or the water.

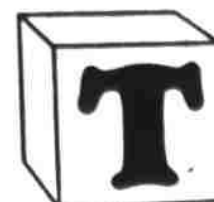

New York Man's Business Is Clocks, Especially Big Ones

NEW YORK, Sept. 29. —Among other things Rudolph Lamm has been called the country's greatest clock watcher, a man who is serving time, a minute man, a man with time on his hands, and, inevitably, Father Time.

Lamm's business, which you'd never guess, is clocks, mostly big clocks. He sells and services the tower clocks you see over banks, in church steeples, over courthouses. There are about 50,000 such clocks around the country and Lamm says he's responsible for most of them.

This week end, in the New York area, he and his staff of six will turn back about 350 clocks to mark the end of daylight savings time at 2 a.m. Sunday.

In 30 years in the business, he's never forgotten to turn one back or ahead. He can't understand why people forget to change their own clocks.

Lamm is president of a clock sales and service company, which is an agency of the firm Howard Clock Products, Inc., at Waltham, Mass., which since 1942, has turned out more than 42,000 of the big clocks. They range in weight from five to 2,000 pounds, in face diameter from six to 22 feet.

Lamm and his boy couldn't possibly turn back all the firm's clocks in the country at the end of daylight time so they confine this operation to New York. But four times a year, they do make a grand tour.

This includes checking such well-known timepieces as those on the Customs House in Boston, City Hall in Denver, Wrigley Building in Chicago, Firestone Building in Los Angeles, St. Peter's Cathedral in Erie, Pa., and the Memorial Tower at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill.

In New York, Lamm's best known responsibility is the clock high up on old Trinity Church, which thousands of bankers, brokers and office workers depend on in making trains and keeping business dates.

Elsewhere, Lamm's responsibility is equally great. One city was threatened with legal action after bids on a big construction job were opened too soon because the city hall clock was running a minute fast. Since then the city has signed a maintenance contract with Lamm to stay out of trouble.

It takes a lot, though, to stop or slow down a big tower clock. Lamm says, it took a 45-mile-an-hour wind to make the Trinity clock one minute slow — an event which brought angry complaints from commuters. Usually old Trinity is within 10 seconds of perfect accuracy every month. This Lamm notes, is 10 seconds better than the standard set for railroad clocks and minutes better than your wrist watch.

"Our biggest trouble," the veteran clock man says, "comes from the amateurs who try to fix clocks themselves. Invariably they make a major problem out of a minor one."

Years ago, suicides were a problem. People would climb up to a tower and hang themselves from the clock works. Since then, however, clock towers have been locked up.

For reasons known only to them, some people like to test their hunting rifles on tower clocks. Quite a few clocks in New York, Lamm reports, are full of 22-caliber bullet holes. One in Brooklyn has been punctured by steel jacket bullets. Many, here and elsewhere, have been hit with buckshot.

Lamm has been called to fix clocks in Congress, especially when the legislators turn them back to complete their business before a

scheduled adjournment time.

Weather doesn't bother the big clocks as much as you think. Most of the hands are built to give or take from one-half to three-quarters of a minute in a strong wind.

New York's last hurricane slowed up old Trinity two and a half minutes after a whole day of the big glow.

Lamm is especially proud of the 12-foot job he installed in the Atlantic City High School in 1923. In 26 years, he says, that clock has never stopped although it faces the surf and ocean winds only a quarter of a block away.

If enough ice collects on a clock's hands, it might slow it up. But this takes a lot of ice. Some of the tower clocks have bronze hands weighing as much as 500 pounds each. If lightning strikes in the right place, it can stop a clock but most of the big ones now have lightning arrestors.

If enough pigeons or other birds ride the hand of a clock, they can make time stand still.

"But we're discouraging this sport nowadays," Lamm says. "We put sharp pins on the hands."

The company has built movements to operate 40-foot dials but so far there have been no customers. They cost at least \$75,000 and require special construction.

The biggest clock Lamm cares for is the one on the Aver Mills in Lawrence, Mass. It has four faces, each 22 feet, six inches across. It would cost about \$25,000 to put up today. The clock in the Erie Cathedral, which has an elaborate bell and chime arrangement, cost about \$75,000.

At home, Lamm has a clock in every room, including the bath room.

"All our clocks are hand wound," he says. "There's something about

the old trick, the restful rhythm, like watching a rider going on and on . . ."

Advice On Painting Care Is Offered

NEW YORK, Sept. 29. — A painting whose surface has become dull can frequently be brightened by using a good quality prepared wax-emulsion cream furniture polish, the Metropolitan Museum of Art advises.

Superficial dust and dirt can be removed by light brushing with absorbent cotton. But they should never be treated with soap, water, bread crumbs, erasers, raw potatoes or sliced onion. Any of these may improve the appearance but all can be harmful in inexperienced hands, the museum cautioned.

Air-Cooled Pig Pens May Be Next Thing

DAVIS, Calif., Sept. 29. — Air conditioned pig pens may become the latest thing in scientific farming. Scientists at the University of California have been working for three years to find out under what weather conditions swine thrive best.

They don't promise that air conditioned hogs pens will be practical. But they have found that pigs kept at certain temperatures eat less food and produce more meat.

"We can't tell yet whether it will be worth while for a farmer to install expensive air conditioning equipment to get may be 15 percent more efficiency in raising hogs," Dr. Elmer H. Hughes said.

Dr. Hughes and Dr. Hubert Heitman, both members of the University's College of Agriculture, are studying the effects of different temperature and humidity conditions on swine.

They watched pigs in an air conditioned, insulated room, and discovered that small hogs—from 70 to 144 pounds—seem to thrive best at temperatures of about 60 degrees (F); larger hogs—from 16 to 260 pounds—seem to thrive at about 75 degrees.

At those temperatures if took less

food to produce 100 pounds of meat. When the temperature was increased or decreased the rate of gain declined and utilization of food was lowered.

"That doesn't mean those would necessarily be the best conditions for raising hogs on the farm," Dr. Heitman said. "You've got to remember this work is experimental. It's being done indoors."

Dr. Heitman said university and U. S. Department of Agriculture engineers are building experimental pig pens. Some are insulated against heat. Others are water-cooled.

Dr. Hughes and Dr. Heitman killed one animal—a 228-pounder—purposefully. The hog was kept in a dry room, warmed to 100 degrees in five days. It lost 18 pounds. And on the fifth day the hog died.

Yugoslavia Ousts Hungary Officials

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, Sept. 29. — Yugoslavia slapped back at a one-time Communist partner Wednesday by ordering nine Hungarian diplomats to get out of the country.

The action, widening the Iron Curtain rift between Premier Marshal Tito and the Russian bloc, followed by 24 hours Hungary's action in giving warning to 10 Yugoslav legation officials in Budapest.

Tanjug, the official Yugoslav news agency, said Hungary obviously intended to "bring about severance of diplomatic relations between Yugoslavia and Hungary."

Meanwhile Marshal Tito, in an address accused Russia and her Cominform Communist International Information Bureau satellites of "rattling their arms" along the Yugoslav border. "The Cominform countries," said Tito, "are doing

giving trenches in Hungary and Romania."

Just before Tito's speech, Yugoslav Foreign Minister Edvard Kardelj told the United Nations Assembly in New York that Russia is using all sorts of pressure—from economic blockade to "imperialistic" aims against his country.

A Tanjug broadcast heard in London said Yugoslavia had protested to the United States, Britain and Russia that Hungary has broken long years treaty by cutting off the delivery.

PRAGUE, Sept. 29. — Alcoholics won't remain anonymous at Brno, capital of Moravia. The council of the Communist-controlled national committee there has announced it will post publicly the names of "notorious alcoholics," especially if they are also work shirkers.

DESIGNED FOR INTERNAL PURPOSES

Tito Reported Ready His Own Communist International

ROME — Marshall Tito of Yugoslavia is now preparing to launch his own Communist International in opposition to the present Soviet-dominated Cominform.

It is designed primarily for internal purposes—to avoid the impression that Yugoslavia's sole allies in her conflict with Moscow are the "western imperialists."

The first congress of the new

Cominform is scheduled to meet in Belgrade some time in November.

At the same time, the Yugoslav foreign office, according to diplomatic sources here, is drafting a note for the Security Council of the United Nations to charge Romania, Hungary, Bulgaria and Albania with acts of armed aggression against Yugoslavia.

In preparation for the congress of Tito's Cominform the Yugoslavs have already organized their own "Lenin school," where picked exiles from behind the Iron Curtain, trained in the latest methods of sabotage and partisan warfare, are taught the Communist "gospel" according to Tito. Moshe Pijade, chief ideologist of Yugoslavia's brand of Communism, is sending out feelers in all directions for adherents to the new international.

The dream of the late Leon Trotsky may thus be realized by Tito, who originally rose to power because of his ruthless opposition to Trotsky, assassinated leader of the Russian revolution.

Despite official optimism in Belgrade, there is little doubt that the Yugoslav government is faced with ever-growing internal political difficulties. While the secret police already has spotted its opponents within the party ranks and is prepared to strike at the first subversive attempt, a hard and determined core of pro-Soviet followers remains active within the country.

Within the past weeks Tito has had to exterminate ruthlessly practically the entire party leadership of Belopojle in Montenegro, while thousands of Communists have been expelled from the party or arrested in Croatia and Zajechar, near the Bulgarian border.

The situation is further complicated by the revival of nationalist rivalries. Tito seeks to gain favor with the numerically superior Serbs—even to the extent of inviting former Chetnik followers of Draza Mihailovich to join the Communist Party.

Tito, himself a Croat, is rapidly losing the support of the Croats, hitherto his chief supporters. At

the same time, the Macedonians are looking longingly toward Moscow, which has promised to fulfill their age-long dream—the creation of an independent Macedonia.

Despite the sharp exchanges between Moscow and Belgrade, there is no reason to believe that the Balkan powder keg is about to explode again.

Stalin, Cominform circles here believe, is not yet ready to take the decisive step toward war for the simple reason, as indicated by this correspondent some months ago, that his grip on the satellite countries has been sharply shaken by his row with Tito.

The meeting of the Cominform which took place in Sofia at the end of August was as much concerned with the rapidly deteriorating situation in Bulgaria and Albania as with the defection of Tito.

The aged and ailing Premier of Bulgaria, Vassily Kolarov, has lost complete control of the Party which is rent by strife and dissension. Anton Yugov, young and ruthless Minister of Interior, who once hoped to inherit Georgi Dimitrov's mantle, is in disgrace and on his way out, while followers of Traicho Kostov, recently-purged ex-Vice Premier, have now emerged as a powerful underground force.

Similarly in Albania, Premier Ever Hoxha seems to have been placed on the inactive list with all power now concentrated in the hands of two Moscow-trained Communists, Tuk Jakova and Maj Gen Mehmet Shehu, and a group of high ranking Soviet MVD officers.

The feverish movement of satellite troops on Yugoslavia's border may therefore be designed to discourage revolts behind the Iron Curtain rather than as preparatory moves for an armed attack on Yugoslavia.

Confederate Vets Meet Ends Today

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Sept. 29. — A parade today brings the 50th annual reunion of Confederate veterans to a close.

The four old soldiers attending the meeting will ride in automobiles over the same route that President Truman marched here last June.

As the aged comrades-in-arms prepared to say their farewells for another year, one big question remained unanswered. Where will the 1950 reunion be held?

Two cities have made a strong bid for the meeting—Charleston, S. C., and Biloxi, Miss. The veterans' commander-in-chief, Gen. James W. Moore, has announced through his adjutant that Confederate reunions will be held as long as there are two veterans living.

A Belmont Dennis, newspaper publisher and radio station operator of Covington, Ga., was elected commander-in-chief of the Sons of Confederate Veterans yesterday. Mrs. Roscoe Gerard Rackley of Charleston, S. C., was named president general of the Confederate Southern Memorial Assn. Both organizations met in conjunction with the reunion.

Cupid Outdoing Himself In Gay Hollywood

HOLLYWOOD, Sept. 29. (AP) — Wedding bells are ringing loudly in the film capital, with but one discordant note.

The score: Two marriages, two announcements of wedding plans—and one separation.

Tennis Star Beverly Baker and Actor Scott H. (Scotty) Beckett, each 19, were wed in Las Vegas, Nev. In the same city the sixth marriage of Actress Helen Gilbert, 33, was disclosed. No. six is James E. Durant, 45, a hotel casino manager.

However, Miss Gilbert returned here yesterday without the bridegroom and refused to discuss her marriage.

Actress Judy Clark, 24, and George Myers, 31, Hollywood insurance man, obtained a license and plan to wed Saturday. Parents of Jane Powell, 20, actress-singer, announced she and Geary Steffen, 24, ex-ice skating partner of Sonja Henie, will marry Nov. 5 in Beverly Hills.

The only sour note in this romantic symphony is the disclosure by Actor Cornel Wilde, 33, and his wife, Actress Patricia (Pat) Knight, that they have separated. Friends said a divorce is likely. The Wildes were married in 1937 at Elkton, Md., and have a daughter, Wendy, age six.

ATTACK BEATEN OFF

Man Wounded In Mine Gun Battle

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Sept. 29. — A small, non-union coal mine was shut down today in the wake of a furious gun battle in which one man was wounded seriously.

Officers said eight defenders yesterday beat off an attack during which hundreds of shots were fired from rifles, shotguns, and pistols.

Sheriff G. B. Baggett said his office at Jasper received a telephone report that one man was killed in the exchange at the isolated mine about 20 miles north of Birmingham. He added, however, that his deputies were not able to confirm the report.

Episcopalians Seek To Abolish 'Jim Crow' Curbs

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 29 (UP) — A proposal to abolish so-called "Jim Crow" restrictions within the church was before the 56th general convention of the Episcopal Church in America today.

A resolution introduced by Dr. Clifford P. Morehouse, of New York, a lay member, in the house of deputies proposed:

"Every communicant or baptized member of the church shall be entitled to equal rights and status in any parish or mission church thereof.

"He shall not be excluded from the worship or sacraments of the church, nor from parochial membership because of race, color or nationality."

There was no indication when the resolution would be acted upon.

More liberal interpretation of the Episcopal marriage laws was recommended by a special committee of the house of bishops. No change will be made for at least three years, however.

The committee recommended appointment of a joint commission on Holy Matrimony. It would consist of three bishops, three presbyters and three laymen. They would study the matter three years and report to the next general convention on possible amendment of existing canons.

Coleman Murder Trial Venire Is Exhausted

KOUNTZE, Sept. 29 (UP) — A special venire of 200 was exhausted last night with two jurors for the murder trial of Darius Goleman still to be decided.

Additional veniremen were to be examined today.

Goleman is charged with slaying Mrs. Cloyce Eloise Twitchell in the big thicket of Hardin County Sept. 28, 1948.

Alex Leviness was given the death penalty by a Hardin County jury on July 26, 1949, in the same slaying.

The state claims Goleman and Leviness planned to rob the Hull State Bank when they were given a lift out of Beaumont by Mrs. Twitchell.

Hunters found her body a week later.

Jurors selected yesterday were: Kelsey Chance, Silsbee Farmer; Ira Flowers, Saratoga oil field worker; J. B. Faggard, Silsbee truck driver; J. W. Kirkendall, Silsbee farmer; A. M. Bradshaw, Silsbee barber; P. D. Delk, Sour Lake painter; P. S. Herrington, Sour Lake oil field worker; R. E. Fee, Silsbee oil field worker; D. B. Pattillo, Silsbee oil refinery worker, and J. M. Craft, Kountze Oil Co. employee.

C. M. Battle, Silsbee dry goods clerk previously accepted by the state, was challenged by the defense and had to be excused.

Totally Deaf Motorist Rated As One Of America's Safest Drivers

AMES, Iowa (UP) — Leonard Lau, 43-year-old, deaf motorist, is one of the nation's safest drivers, although he's been deaf since infancy.

The industrial arts instructor just completed the driver training course at Iowa State College in Ames. Now he hopes to become an instructor in driver training for other deaf persons.

During classroom lectures, Lau copied the legible and full notes made by a student who sat next to him. When he had a question to ask, he would write it on the blackboard.

Tom Hannum, psychology instructor under whom Lau took most of his driver training work, knows a little sign language and "talked" to Lau with his hands. Hannum says his deaf pupil easily mastered correct driving procedure and now it is a fully-qualified driver.

Dr. A. R. Lauer, professor of psychology and head of the Iowa State driver training program, has this to say:

"Deaf persons can become equally as good drivers as those with full hearing capacities. The deaf are often better drivers because of their handicap. They are not to stay more alert at the wheel and to use their other senses to more than compensate for their lack of hearing."

Lau uses mainly his eyes to make up for his loss of hearing. He watches the road more carefully, of course, and makes a lot of use of rear-view mirrors on both the inside and outside of the car.

The 1949 State Fair will present Honor Awards to the girls and boys for outstanding achievements during the year. They will be introduced to Texas business leaders attending the State Fair of Texas, annual banquet in the Crystal Ballroom.

Approximately 75,000 farm girls and boys from every corner of the state will attend the Fair on Oct. 15, Rural Youth Day.

The purpose of the day is to help citizens. Fair officials feel this can be achieved by increasing their knowledge of the latest trends in agriculture and by encouraging them to profit through the experiences of others.
