Proposal To Observe Invasion Day In Prayer Is Made By Lions' Club

New Selective Service Ruling Is Explained

A letter from State Selective Service headquarters was received by the local board this week and related a part of a telegram received by the State Office as follows:

"... and these postponements are authorized only so long as required to finish the pressing of registrants under 26."

The letter continued: "Many local boards have taken this to mean that they will proceed to induct all men over 26 when they have exhausted their pool of registrants under 26. State release No. 476 stipulates that the processing and induction of registrants over 26 who are making contribution to essential agriculture, war production or war-supporting activities will be postponed until otherwise directed either by the Director or by the State Director of Selective Service."

"Regardless of the fact that your local board has exhausted your pool of available men under 26 postponements of induction and/or pre-induction physical examination of all men within the 26 through 37 age group who are making contributions to essential agriculture, war production or war supporting activities will be continued until further instructions are available."

"All volunteers who have been properly released from their essential employment will be forwarded for pre-induction physical examination and/or inducted."

The letter was signed by a State Selective Service Official and is somewhat clarifying to those who have been in the dark on their draft status.

Schleicher Sheep Top Fort Worth Market

Two hundred and 83 head of lambs shipped to Fort Worth this week topped the market there this week at \$13.25. The lambs were shipped by F. B. Gunn and a letter from a commission company informed them they averaged 89 pounds upon arrival. They were out of the fleece and topped the market out of a possible 36,000 head that day.

Canning Center To Be Operated At High School Three Months

Eldorado citizens and anyone in Schleicher County will have at their disposal this year, the use of a Community Canning Center. The Home Demonstration Council has been active in formulating plans for this project, but the Commissioners' Court, Eldorado Lions' Club and the P. T. A. have voted to share in the expenses.

The canning center will operate in the school cafeteria on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday at the beginning of the season. A supervisor will be on duty at all times to help with organization of work, give out information, check canners and sealers, and assist in any other way that she is needed. The individuals canning will prepare their own products for canning. This can be done at the center or at home provided individuals live close enough that food will not lose value during the time it is being transported, prepared and being brought into cans.

The public is invited by these civic organizations to use this equipment. In return a small toll of canned goods will be collected to be left for the school cafeteria.

Rules and regulations concerning the use of the center will appear in the Success at a very early date.

Bitterweeds Are Prevalent In Town

Yes, sir, the valuation of a lot of land now free of bitterweed, the West Texas ranchman's plague, can be lowered a considerable amount of money per acre, due to neglect to eradicate bitterweeds that are prevalent on city street shoulders and vacant lots over town.

A Success representative was conducted over a small section of the city one morning this week by E. B. Keng, conscientious employee of the Soil Conservation Office, who pointed out the weeds in surprisingly large numbers.

Seeds from these plants are near the maturing and ripening stages, and if allowed to mature may be easily transmitted to ranches heretofore free of the troublesome weed that invariably causes a great loss in stock and what can affect local property more is the lowering of the valuation if the weed is allowed to get a start on lands. "Spreading and transmitting of the seed can be by waters flowing through town and on to lower ranch lands and side-roads or the seed may be carried on automobile and other vehicle tires," Keng said.

At this time the weeds may be easily identified by their bloom and property owners would do a good deed to have their property cleared of them by pulling and cautiously burning the weeds; being careful to destroy the seeds.

A man has been employed to pull some of the weeds on right-of-ways, but co-operation of others would be a great benefit to the county in the eradication measures being stressed at present over the entire section of the state.

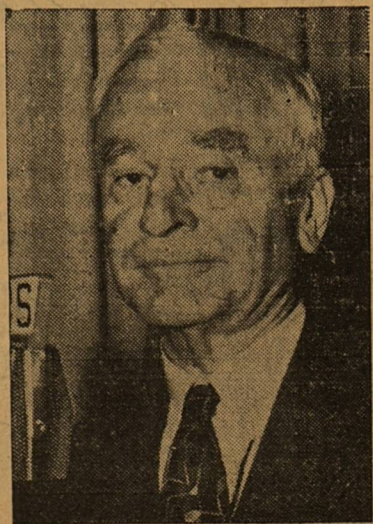

Sellers Announces For Attorney General



Grover Sellers, Attorney General of Texas, has announced he will be a candidate for a second term in that office in the 1944 primary election.

In announcing his candidacy, Mr. Sellers declared:

"I am grateful to Gov. Coko Stevenson for appointing me attorney general, following the resignation of Gerald C. Mann, with whom I had served four years as first assistant."

"To the people of Texas I now submit my candidacy. When elected my one effort will be fair and impartial administration of all laws and the constitution as written by the people. I shall continue to work in complete harmony with other officials and state departments in the efficient operation of our state government."

"All Texans have one common thought today—winning the war as quickly as possible. This department, as in the past, shall continue full cooperation with military authorities in prosecution of the war. During the absence of our men in uniform, their welfare affairs shall be my first concern. In fact, I am the first ever to hold that Texans in uniform can vote."

"I base my candidacy on a background of experience gained as your Attorney General, first assistant Attorney General, judge of the Eighth Judicial District and as an associate justice of the Court of Civil Appeals."

Coming before the regular business meeting of the Eldorado Lions' Club this week was a proposal for the club to sponsor a movement for citizens to observe a period of prayer on Invasion Day. The observance was proposed in accordance with a proclamation issued by Governor Coke Stevenson recently, urging the move.

Many other towns and cities have announced intentions of such an observance, with business houses closing for a period of time, and all citizens going to a local church dressed just as they are at the time of the signal.

A committee from the local club are to present a petition to all local business houses as an agreement to close at the signal of the beginning of invasion by the Allied Forces and all citizens are asked to proceed immediately to the Methodist church for prayer at the sounding of the fire siren of six (6) blasts. The Methodist church was selected because of its location on an all-weather street should it be raining or muddy at the time the news is flashed to Eldorado, either by wire, radio or telephone.

This is to be strictly a community worship and all citizens are invited to congregate at the local church during the day. Doors to the sanctuary are to remain open all day so that prayers of local persons may be joined with those of our fighting men.

Other business coming before the club was voting in of new officers of the club named recently by a nominating committee. The vote of acceptance was unanimous. Installation will be early in June. C. A. Reynolds, Jerry Pennington and L. M. Hoover were named on a committee to present awards to school students making the highest average in both high and grade schools. War Stamps will be issued again this year.

FORMER ELDORADO MAN DECORATED FOR BRAVERY

Marvin L. McLeod, formerly of Eldorado and husband of Mrs. Margaret McLeod, who was, until recently employed by Wm. Cameron & Co., here, has received a citation for the Soldier's Medal for heroism displayed in trying to rescue a comrade from drowning and assisting another Coast Guardsman to safety.

The Devil's River News of Sonora carried the following article last week concerning McLeod:

"McLeod, with utter disregard for personal safety, rushed down an 85-foot cliff at Rocky Point, North Palos Verdes, Calif., dived into rough seas in attempt to rescue a soldier clinging to a capsized boat. . . He succeeded in swimming to about 15 feet from the soldier in distress and was driven back by heavy waves. . . Time and again he tried and was thrown back. . . Although practically exhausted, he managed to swim out and bring to shore a Coast Guardsman whose boat had overturned and who was suffering from shock and a head injury."

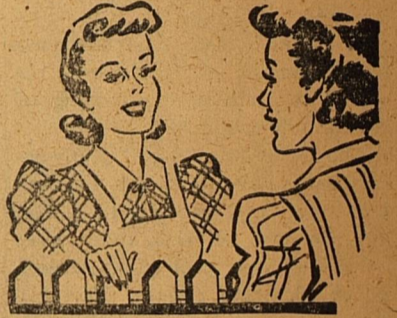

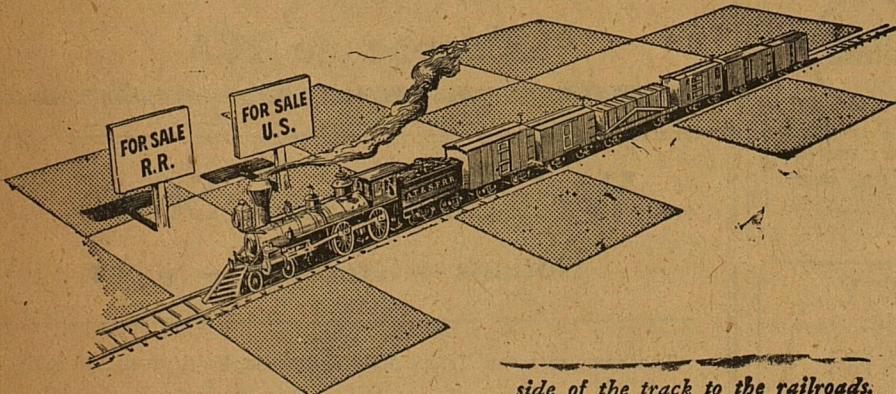

The Railroad LAND GRANT



★ To speed the settling of the West, our nation wanted railroads pushed across great unsettled areas to develop rich but distant regions and to bind the country together for military and other reasons.

In the 1850's and 1860's, to encourage railroads to push their tracks into the undeveloped territory, Congress granted the odd sections on each

side of the track to the railroads, with certain "strings" attached, and these grants varied in depth up to several miles.

The even sections retained by the government were for the most part sold to settlers at a substantial increase in price.

The Land Grant policy was very helpful in getting the railroads started in those early days. BUT...

Isn't it out of date today?

In return for their Land Grants, the railroads originally were required, and are still required to do so in respect of military and naval property and personnel, to haul government passengers, freight, and mail at rates far below those applicable to ordinary traffic.

Since the Land Grants were made, railroads have paid out in reduced rates on government traffic many times the amount they have received from these Land Grants.

In the case of the Santa Fe, here are the figures: In more than 80 years which have elapsed since the

Land Grants were made, Santa Fe's net realization from these lands has been about \$23,000,000. In 1943 alone, the government received from Santa Fe, in the form of rate reductions, approximately \$40,000,000.

Many governmental agencies as well as private shipper groups are convinced that the time has arrived for the entire repeal of these burdensome Land Grant requirements.
