GERMANY MAY GET BIG LOAN

(By Associated Press)
BERLIN, Nov. 20.—With regard to reports of the impending conclusion of an Anglo-American loan to Germany, the *Berlin Courier* says today that negotiations are in progress between a well known Berlin bank, and a group of American, British and Dutch financiers for credit to Germany of a billion and four hundred million gold marks.

The granting of this credit, the newspaper says, is dependent upon the condition that there be no change in the internal political situation in Germany, and the offer of financial aid will be made only to the Stresemann government.

GRID SQUAD TO SHOW NEW TYPE OF PLAY FRIDAY
Coach Virgil Smith is giving his grid squad a bunch of new plays to spring on Menard Friday at Nicholson Field. Shift formations and forward passes will be used a great deal in Friday's clash, according to the coach.

THREE DIE IN SEWERAGE GIT

MILWAUKEE, Nov. 20.—Three men working on a sewerage line were suffocated today. The men were working twenty feet underground when the wall gave way and tons of earth fell upon them, snuffing out their lives without a chance of escape.

The dead are James Casher, Stanley Bartkovich and John Kanarek, all of this city.

MORE MONEY UP FOR LIQUOR FIGHT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—An appropriation of more than ten million dollars for the work of the prohibition enforcement bureau during the next fiscal year, was said by prohibition officials today to have been included in the treasury estimate which was submitted to the director as a budget.

The estimates included one million two hundred and fifty thousand dollars, which is an increase of \$500,000 over last year's allotment, for the enforcement of the Harrison Act, which is administered by the narcotic division of the prohibition unit.

NEW MAIL ROUTE SERVING MANY

The star mail route from Ballinger to Bronte which began on the 16th of this month, is filling a long felt want and serving many patrons with daily mail.

The carrier leaves Bronte in the morning, making the trip to Ballinger by Norton, Marie and Maverick, and returns in the afternoon. The new route gives the patrons of the three post-offices named above daily and direct mail with Ballinger, and also serves many citizens along the route with daily mail, the star route taking the place of a rural route.

Subscribers to *The Ledger* living on the new star route, and who wish their paper changed from either Ballinger, Norton, Maverick or Marie, to the star route should notify this office.

At the home of Ross Black on Broadway, the thieves got everything which could be removed from the car, including the steering wheel, and would no doubt get away with the car if it had not been locked.

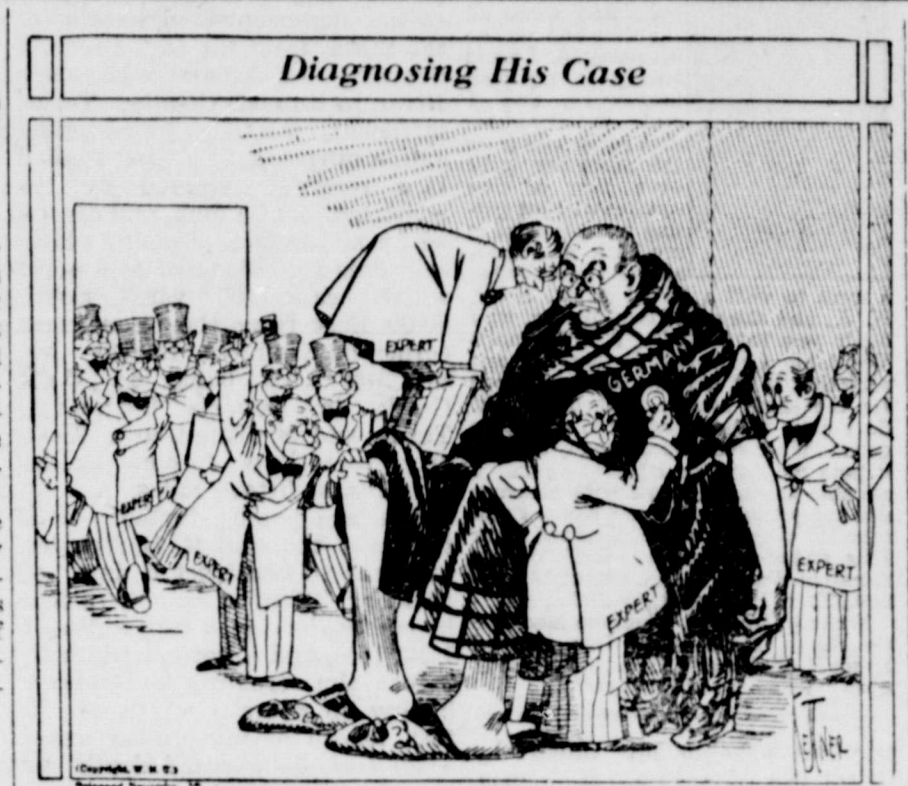
After robbing Mr. Black's car the thieves made a raid on his clothes line and got away with an armful of clothing. The week's washing had just been put on the line.

JONES COUNTY FOR GOOD ROADS

ANSON, Tex., Nov. 20.—The Anson Luncheon Club is perfecting plans to originate a movement for a \$1,500,000 good roads bond election in Jones county.

Recently representatives of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce after having been in touch with the commercial organizations in Hamlin and Stamford presented plans to this city for a county-wide bond election. Now under the proposed plan a brick or concrete road will be built from the Taylor county line to the Haskell county line, and also a paved highway will be constructed East and West across Jones county. The plan further contemplated connecting Haskell, Stamford, Anson and Abilene with a continuous brick or concrete road. Haskell county is expected to call an election the same date as Jones county. The Abilene Chamber of Commerce is co-operating in the move.

MUNDAY, Tex., Nov. 20.—The Munday Luncheon Club will discuss at their next weekly luncheon plans for a good roads bond election in Eastern Knox county. The Munday people are anxious to connect up with the plans of Jones and Haskell counties for a paved highway from Abilene Northward to Wichita Falls. Local sentiment favors only a permanent, high class road.

COLORADO, Tex., Nov. 20.—Plans here for the carrying of the \$1,000,000 good roads bond issue for Mitchell county have been worked out by the Chamber of Commerce and the Lions Club thru W. S. Cooper, Secretary.

The plans provide for a concrete paved highway, \$700,000 of the cost of the system is to be voted and the remaining \$300,000 is state and federal aid. The local committee is composed of J. H. Green, R. P. Price, A. B. Blanks, W. S. Cooper and H. P. Ragan. The Lorraine unit of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce is co-operating.

BOOK COMPANY PUTS UP FIGHT

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Nov. 20.—Further effort by the American Book Company to compel the use of its books in the public schools of Texas, was made here today when E. F. Smith, of Houston, attorney for the company, filed in the supreme court an application to present a motion for a writ of mandamus against State Superintendent of Public Instruction S. M. N. Marrs.

This step follows the recent action of the State Board of Education which set aside \$1,500,000 for the purchase of new text books, and ordered Marrs to comply with the contract previously made with the American Book Company.

ROAD PLANS PASSED UP TO ENGINEERS

J. E. Pirie went to Austin Monday afternoon, where he will appear before the State Highway Commission with the plans for the new Ballinger-Hatchel road, and expects to get the commission's approval of the plans.

As soon as the commission approves the plans the Commissioners' Court will advertise for bids, and work on the road should begin by January first, and probably before that time.

This will bring the travel from the North into the city through West End, instead of over the road crossing Elm Creek in two places, and across the A. & S. and Santa Fe railroads. The old road, however, will be maintained for the travel from Crews, Token and country lying East of Elm Creek.

Work was started this week on the concrete bridges between Ballinger and Miles and between Ballinger and Paint Rock, for which contracts were let several days ago.

PRESIDENT OF REICHS BANK DIED TODAY

BERLIN, Nov. 20.—Doctor Rudolf Havenstein, president of the Reichsbank, died this morning.

MAN HELD HERE FOR FORGERY

Sheriff Jim Flynt placed C. R. McDonald in jail Monday afternoon and a charge of forgery is on the docket against the man. The case is one in which the Winters Mercantile Co., of Winters, got hold of a bad check for the sum of \$40 about two months ago.

Sheriff Flynt was in Winters Monday, and H. O. Jones, manager of the Winters Mercantile Co., asked the sheriff to help him locate a man by the name of Ray Brown, stating that he held a check which Brown had given and which had been turned down. Mr. Jones also informed the sheriff that he had not been able to locate C. R. McDonald, who passed the check. The officer informed Mr. Jones that he would have McDonald for him in a short time, and returning to Ballinger the sheriff placed McDonald under arrest and carried him to Winters, where the person who accepted the check in payment of merchandise, identified McDonald as the man who passed the check.

The outlaw check was drawn on the First National Bank of Winters, made payable to "C. R. McDonald," signed "Ray Brown," and endorsed by "C. R. McDonald." No such person as Ray Brown has been located, and the bank has no such customer on its books.

McDonald was arrested in a moonshine raid in Coleman county a short time ago, and it is alleged that he was implicated in running a still. He was released on bond for the liquor charge in Coleman county.

WALTON SAYS HE WILL FIGHT ON

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 20.—A statement reiterating his determination to continue to fight, was issued today by J. C. Walton, who was removed from the office of governor of Oklahoma by a unanimous vote of the Senate court of impeachment last night.

"Only rats leave a ship in distress," the deposed executive asserted. "A few of my friends have deserted me in this fight, but the ship is not sinking; it is only a shadow they see in the water."

The Senate voted as high as 41 to 0 in convicting the governor on some of the charges, while other charges were upheld by a vote of 38 to 3, 39 to 1, 23 to 18, 37 to 4, 40 to 1, etc. Verdicts of guilty were voted on eleven charges.

When notified of the Senate's action, and informed that he had been removed from office by impeachment, Mr. Walton stated that he would file a motion for a new trial.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 20.—One of the first announcements to come from the governor's office today after M. E. Trapp, who automatically became governor as the result of the impeachment of J. C. Walton, was to the effect that Gov. Trapp would ask the state legislature to recess at once until the second week in January.

DANGER ALLIED SPLIT PASSES

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, Nov. 20.—The British government officials considered today that all danger of a disagreement with France on the question of the former crown prince's return to Germany, and the resumption of inter-allied military control in Germany, had passed. It is expected that the council of ambassadors will reach a compromise, unless unforeseen obstacles are interposed at the last moment.

PARIS, Nov. 20.—A meeting of the council of ambassadors which was called for this afternoon, will not be held. This was announced after Lord Crewe, British ambassador, notified the secretary that his government, owing to the stress of business, was unable to communicate his instructions in time for today's meeting. The instructions are expected to arrive in time for the meeting tomorrow.

With the High School Classics

"But life, being weary of these worldly bars, Never lacks power to dismiss itself." —Julius Caesar.

"Why is suicide held not to be right?" was one of the questions put to Socrates during that last long talk he had with his friends while he waited for his jailer to bring him the cup of poison.

According to Plato's account, Socrates answered: "I suppose you wonder why . . . when a man is better than he is not permitted to be his own benefactor, but must wait for the hand of another. . . I admit the appearance of inconsistency, but there may not be any real inconsistency, after all, in this. There is a doctrine uttered in secret that man is a prisoner who has no right to open the door of his prison and run away; this is a great mystery which I do not quite understand."

Our western laws and churches hold suicide to be wrong, and there is a general feeling that when a man commits suicide, he breaks the rules by which the game of life is played. We know that in a race, for example, a man is expected to finish the course, even though all the other runners have crossed the line an hour before him. To the bystanders there seems no sense in this. To them it seems that after enough men have crossed the line to score all the points that can be scored, the other runners should be allowed to step over the side lines and quit the race. They cannot see any reason for making a man run after all chances of scoring seem over; but the trainer sees reason in the proceedings. Life is frequently likened to a race.

Some people hold that the two cases are not analogous because the player enters a race voluntarily and we human beings are born into life without our consent. Others hold that we do enter life voluntarily. The latter believe, with Socrates and the Buddhists, in the transmigration of the soul. They insist that the soul that does not wish for life is not reincarnated.

This is, of course, a subject about which nobody knows, though many may speculate, trying to twist texts this way and that to suit their own beliefs.
