Italian Seamen Trapped As Submarine Sinks 'Butcherboy' Affair Of Society Matron At Tragic End

Woman's Body Is Found Following Quarrel In Home

Blow from Beer Bottle Cut Gash That Ended Fatally For Mrs. Myrtle Mellus, Wealthy Social Leader.

ACCUSED MAN DENIES GUILT DURING PROBE

Admits Party and Quarrel But Denies He Killed Her; Was Found Hidden In House.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 6.—Behind the closed doors of the police murder squad bureau today a man and woman, "both prominent," told officers what they knew of the "butcherboy" romance of Mrs. Myrtle Mellus, a wealthy society matron, who was brutally slain yesterday in her home.

While the identity of the couple was guarded, Leo P. Kelly, 29, was held in a cell nearby charged with the murder. Frank Mellus, prominent club man, sportsman, and manufacturer, husband of the wealthy society matron, said Kelly long had been their "meal market man."

His brain still fogged officers said with liquor drunk before and after Sunday's tragedy, Kelly repeated his denial of guilt. He had come to Mrs. Mellus' home while her husband was on a fishing excursion. Breakfast over the negro maid permitted to leave, they drank, he said, and a quarrel ensued. He beat her, Kelly related, but said he did not kill her.

Mrs. Mellus' body was found on her bed by Mellus when he returned home. A heavy blow from an empty bottle had caused death. Her body was covered with welts and bruises.

An hour after police had been called into the residence Kelly was found in a ditch near the house.

Out of the bureau trickled a story from investigators of an alleged illicit romance that started five years ago between the "handsome butcherboy" and the woman of wealth. Mellus, when informed of it by police, collapsed and was placed under care of a physician.

'NOTHER WILD PARTY FOR FATTY ARBUCKLE

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 6 (P).—A story of another "wild party" in which Roscoe "Fatty" Arbuckle figured has called the once famous film funster into court—this time as a result of divorce suit filed here today by his wife, Doris Dean, screen actress.

Arbuckle's appearance on the screen closed after he was accused of being responsible for the death of Virginia Rappe, a film actress, at an alleged hotel party in San Francisco more than seven years ago. He was acquitted after two trials, the jury disagreeing the first time.

The divorce suit today declared the "wild party" which said the Arbuckle marital bark on the rocks occurred at the home of a "prominent resident" of Hollywood and that the comedian made ardent love to a woman whom he was rescued from the round-lunch-maker by others at the party.

Herbert Hoover Wins In Straw Vote; Final Count 268 To 151, Judge Finds

Unless a 'straw vote' is as unreliable as a 'straw in the wind,' which it may or may not be, the individual sees it. Herbert C. Hoover, of California, Republican candidate for the presidency of the United States, is liable to upset some traditions in Lubbock county when the voters go to the polls on November 4th.

For, in the four day presidential straw vote, conducted by the Avalanche-Journal, Hoover was accorded 268 votes to 151 for his Democratic rival, Governor Alfred E. Smith, of New York. After the tabulation at the close of the first day's balloting Governor Smith slumped badly and the backers of the Californian, evidently sensing victory, dropped vote after vote into the ballot box and there was little question concerning the final outcome.

Goodman Counts Votes. For thirty minutes before James H. Goodman, Lubbock county's delegate to the recent Democratic convention at Houston, completed his official tabulation last night it was apparent that Hoover would be the victor. The final check, Hoover 268, Smith 151, was the result. The Avalanche-Journal makes no effort to decide whether or not a straw vote affords an accurate basis upon which to figure political strength. It only says that the vote was held merely for the entertainment of the public and the result was as announced.

The first day of the vote was last Friday, and the tabulation at the close of voting was Smith 46; Hoover 38. The check-up Saturday night gave Hoover 146, and Smith 78. The final count, made last night, was reached by recounting all of the ballots cast and ended in the 268 to 151 verdict.

DAVIS REPORT Says Farmers Interested In Inland Waterways

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Aug. 6 (P).—Inland waterway development is of more interest to the farmers of the west than other phases of farm aid, Herbert Hoover was told today by Dwight Davis, secretary of war, who gave the republican nominee a reassuring report of conditions as he found them during his journey across the continent.

The war secretary expressed the opinion there would not be much definition from the republican majorities in the farm states. He also predicted a republican victory in Missouri.

TO ASK DEATH Comanche Man Faces Trial For Criminal Assault

COMMANCHE, Texas, Aug. 6 (P).—State's attorneys announced that they would ask the death penalty for Dick Haskard, 27, of De Leon, who went to trial today on a charge of criminal assault.

Haskard was indicted with J. D. Pierce, 23, and Harley Holland, 24, by the Comanche county grand jury. They were charged with attacking Miss Velma Bankhead, of the De Leon community, while in company with Miss Christine Gammon.

The state dismissed its case against Miss Gammon, indicted separately, and she was held under \$2,500 attachment bond.

FLOOD VICTIMS Two Boys Drowned At Salina, Kansas

SALINA, Kan., Aug. 6 (P).—Flood waters of the Smoky Hill river claimed their first victims late today when Junior Keithline, 10, and Harry Clark, 11, fell from a raft on which they were paddling about in the flooded southeast section of this city and were drowned.

The raft, which was loaded with food, was being used to transport a load of hay to the city and was not yet reached the city. The water tonight was receding slowly.

ABSOLVE CLERGY Declare Mexican Church Is Innocent

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 6 (P).—A statement declaring the Mexican clergy completely innocent of the assassination of President-Elect Obregon was issued in Mexico City today in behalf of the Episcopal synod of the city. The statement was sent out in the name of Archbishop Miguel De La Mora of San Luis Potosi.

No information was given out regarding whereabouts of Archbishop De La Mora.

Slays Family To Save Them Worry

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 6.—Positive identification of the body of Barbara Mauer, found recently in a canyon north of Hollywood, caused police to announce they had completed their case against Russell St. Clair Beitzel, charged with the young woman's murder.

Identification was made by Mrs. F. A. Allen, who lives in the house where Miss Mauer formerly lived with Beitzel as his common law wife. Previously police said they were not certain the body found in the canyon was that of Miss Mauer.

Believed a Mother. The young woman, who police say was found in a canyon north of Hollywood, was found dead by boys playing in the canyon. Investigators believe Miss Mauer, a mother of a few days, they believe she died a slow and painful death.

A taxicab driver told of driving a man answering Beitzel's description to a point where the body was found. The driver said the man told him he wanted to see about a still. This was after the shooting.

Beitzel denies all knowledge of the killing.

Police today received from Phoenix, Ariz., the clothing which they say was stripped from Miss Mauer's body after she was shot. It was shipped, allegedly by Beitzel, to a fictitious address in Phoenix.

Man Killed When Hit By Car, As On Highway, Sleeping

Richard Grey of Goree, Texas, Dies Instantly; Accident Occurs On Road Near Floydada.

FLOYDADA, Aug. 6.—Richard Grey, 28, of Goree, Texas, was killed at 3:30 Monday morning when struck by an automobile on the Floydada-Plainview highway, as he slept on the road. Grey was accompanied by Floyd Smith, 21, of Munday, Texas, who told this story to Sheriff P. G. Staggall of Floyd county.

Grey's shoulder was broken and his ribs crushed into his chest. The body was taken to Lockney to an undertaker and the relatives notified. Grey is survived by his wife and three small children.

Grey was on the car that struck Grey passed on without stopping. Floyd Smith, 21, of Munday, Texas, was a companion of Grey, and he said that the two had started walking from Floydada to Plainview, to visit Grey's parents.

"We had stopped by the side of the road to rest and dropped off to sleep," Smith added. "I was awakened by a scream from Smith and when I got to him he was dying."

GUARD SLAYER'S HOME Threats Made On Family Of Confessed Killer

OMAHA, Neb., Aug. 6.—The home of Clarence Lukehart, 31-year-old confessed slayer of Harvey Boyd, 4, was under guard of police today after a mysterious visit of two automobile loads of men last night.

Courtney, Back In New York, Tells How Plane Caught Fire and Plunged Into the Mid-Atlantic

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—Capt. Frank E. Courtney, one of the three men who beat death after their airplane had crashed in flames in mid-ocean, reached New York today on the liner which picked them off the floating wreck.

It was a nonchalant crew which slipped off a tug, shook hands with Mayor Walker, and drove up Broadway through hurrying crowds to the hotel where they will stay while here. Courtney did the talking for his companions and it was a graphic story of the forced landing, hours of drifting, fire in the engine room of the plane and the final rescue by the liner Minnesota.

"When the fire broke out," he said, "it took us only 30 seconds to drop to the water while Fred Pierce (mechanic) stopped engine and fed coals. We were over and came down smack on the incline of an ocean swell with the aid of the flare made by our own flaming ship."

Courageous to Last. The men thought there was a slim chance for any of them, he said, but they carried on even though Courtney had to stand up in a seat as the ship landed to protect his glasses, without which he is virtually blind.

"The flight itself was a failure," he said, "but the results were not. It was necessary to tell to demonstrate that a plane like ours, forced down in mid-

BLACKS SHOOT WHITE MEN FROM BEHIND

VICTORIA, Aug. 6.—Dudley Jordan, 25, Victoria, and Sanford Shofner, 26, Port Leveson, young cotton buyers, are in a hospital here with gunshot wounds received after a collision between their automobile and one driven by a party of negroes last night 12 miles from Canada.

Fullon Brooks, 40, negro farmer, is in jail at Edna and another negro is being sought by the sheriff of Jackson county. Brooks is alleged to have been driving the automobile which collided with that of the two young white men.

Both Jordan and Shofner are expected to recover. They said they were shot from behind after they had gotten out of their automobile to see the extent of damage to Brooks' machine. Everything had been settled amicably, they added, and they were returning to their own car when one of the negroes fired on them with a shot gun loaded with buck shot.

Some Candidates Lose, Others Gain Through Recheck

One Change Shown. Brashers Winning Commissioner's Post Without Run-off Primary.

Official re-check of the ballots cast by Lubbock county citizens in the democratic primary on July 28 by the county democratic executive committee yesterday showed only one exception, failed to show any important changes in the standing of the candidates in their respective races.

The change came in the race for Commissioner of Precinct Three. The count, and re-count of the votes in the house yesterday showed that W. L. Brashers, present incumbent, won over his other two opponents by a majority of 34 votes. In the count as given out last week Brashers failed to receive a majority by approximately 100 votes.

Although the count yesterday showed losses and gains by the various candidates ranging from 56 votes lost to 26 gained, their standing were in no way affected.

Wesley Loss 61 Votes. In the race for the district representative J. E. Wesley, Lubbock candidate, received the same number of votes as announced last week. In the re-check over the district, however, he lost 61 votes.

PLAN NEW RAILROAD Trunk Line From New Orleans To Northwest

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 6 (P).—The second step in formation of a new trunk line railroad from New Orleans to the northwest was made today when application was made to the interstate commerce commission for permission to merge the Louisiana railway and navigation company with the Louisiana and Arkansas railway company, the latter road recently was purchased by a syndicate headed by Harvey C. Couch, of Pine Bluff, Ark., utilities magnate.

The combined railroads would be 600 miles long, extending from New Orleans to McKinney, Texas, twenty miles from Dallas and north to Hope, Arkansas.

Several Parties Announced Yesterday for Night Clubs of City; Bridge Clubs Meeting.

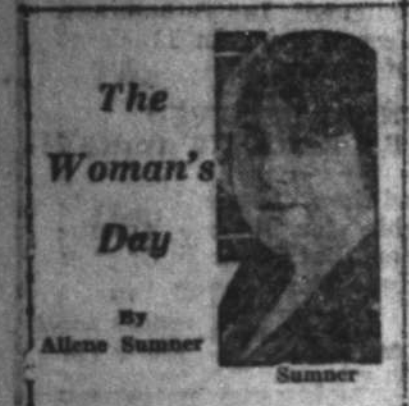

1—Dummy holding—clubs A Q 6 5 4 3 2. Dealer—clubs 7 2. Six cards in the club suit are missing. Duck the first time. Finest the Queen on the second round. Four tricks may be made in this manner.

2—Dummy holding—spades A K 9 7 2. Dealer—spades 5 4 3. Five cards in the spade suit are missing. Duck the first time and you may make four tricks. Duck on the second round.

3—Dummy holding—hearts A 9 7 6 2. Dealer—hearts 5 4 3. Five cards in the heart suit are missing. Duck twice and you may make three tricks; otherwise you may make only one trick.

4—Dummy holding—diamonds A 10 5 4. Dealer—diamonds 10 9 8 7 6 5. Six cards in the diamond suit are missing. Play the Queen and if West covers with the King refuse to take with the Ace! Duck! On the next round, finesse the 10. Take with the Ace on the third round and you may make three tricks.

5—Dummy holding—clubs A 10 6 5 4. Dealer—clubs K 8 2. Five cards in the club suit are missing. By ducking, four tricks may be made. Play the King on the first round, duck on the second round. Play the Ace on the third round. Unless the cards are divided five and nothing against you, and that is not probable, you will be sure to win four club tricks.

Two eggs, 2 cups pastry flour, 1 teaspoon ginger, 1-2 teaspoon cloves, 1-2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1 cup molasses, 1-2 cup sugar, 1-3 cup butter, 1-2-3 teaspoons soda, 1-2 cup sour milk. Mix and sift flour, spices, salt and sugar. Heat molasses and butter to the boiling point. Remove from heat and beat in soda. Add milk and yolks of eggs well beaten. Add dry ingredients and mix thoroughly. Fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry. RECIPE FOR CUCUMBERS.

Recipe for making cucumber pickles was announced yesterday by Miss Louise Baird, county home demonstration agent.

Miss Baird gives two different recipes, the first being used preferably for exhibition purposes, although either may be suitable for exhibition, she says.

The recipe follows: Use small cucumbers. Pour boiling water over them (about half cup salt to one gallon of water). Let stand 24 hours and repeat twice more with fresh brine. The fourth morning cover with fresh boiling water and let stand until the next morning. To one gallon of vinegar add two cups or more sugar, two teaspoon whole cloves, two of cinnamon and two of allspice for many of the spices as you like. Let boil, set aside and drop pickles into the brine. Dissolve the dry ingredients in the vinegar and use to cover up the cucumbers. One cup horse radish may be added if desired. Seal. If desired, small cucumbers as gathered may be washed and added.

DEPOSITS INCREASE

\$14,000,000 More In Texas Banks Than Formerly

AUSTIN, Aug. 6 (AP).—Despite a decrease in the number of state banks from 767 to 724, during the year ending June 30, deposits increased \$14,000,000 and loans more than \$2,000,000. It was disclosed today in a recapitulation of the last call by the state banking department.

Bonds Missed In Firm Securities Are Traced Down

By NEA Service. BUFFALO, N. Y., Aug. 4.—Jeremiah J. Morrissey of Buffalo is taking a great deal of interest in the presidential campaign. It's really only natural; for Morrissey is the man who got Gov. Alfred E. Smith his first job.

It was away back in 1890, Mr. Morrissey, then living in New York, knew the downy-chinned Smith youngster, and when Al came to him and asked his help in finding work Morrissey agreed to do what he could. He took young Al to the Fulton Fish Market, introduced him to George Barker, proprietor, and saw him installed as assistant bookkeeper for better highways and roads. "I had to talk to Mr. Barker quite a while," says Morrissey. "He was inclined to think Al was too young for the job."

Rivalling Morrissey in his enthusiasm for the democratic nominee is James How, Buffalo merchant. As a boy in his early teens, How was office boy in the Clarkson and Ford warehouse in New York in 1892 while Al was an 18-year-old clerk there.

"When I went to work there," says How, "I found an older boy named Al Smith was the billing and shipping clerk. It was a tough place to work—we were always in contact with truckmen, longshoremen and regular roughnecks. But Al seemed to have power over them. He knew everybody in the neighborhood. "It was a different environment from what I was used to. Al seemed to sense it and did everything to protect and help me."

"There was a drastic rule against smoking in the plant, but Al liked a cigarette at lunch time, and he'd open the door about six inches and blow the smoke right in the boss's face. But the boss was a good sport, and he recognized Al's influence for good over the tough longshoremen. Tropical Storm Rages In Nassau

Disturbance Re-curves To North-east, Leaving Bahama Island Damaged But Little.

(By Associated Press) MIAMI, Fla., Aug. 6.—A tropical storm which raged about Nassau, in the Bahamas, today, was believed to have re-curved to the north or northeast, leaving Nassau damaged but little and precluding danger of heavy gales on the lower east Florida coast.

The center of the storm was reported by the weather bureau to be moving west-northwest toward Florida with gale warnings out along the whole coast from Key West to West Palm Beach, but radio reports from the Bahamas indicated late today the disturbance was passing up the Atlantic slightly west of Nassau, which is located on the island of New Providence.

The weather bureau expressed the belief the storm center passed to the southwest of the island about night fall. Heavy rains drenched the Bahamas.

Radio from Nassau described how the storm broke. At about 2 o'clock this afternoon following a lull from an earlier disturbance, which had raged since 4 o'clock this morning, the barometer began falling there at noon and at one o'clock was 29.91. Three hours later it went down to 29.86.

Slightly falling barometers were noted along the coast from here to West Palm Beach.

MONARCHY AGAIN

Albanian Republic to Be Short-Lived, Prospect

LONDON, Aug. 6 (AP).—Albania, which emerged as a republic after anarchy following the short reign of Prince William of Wied, may soon become a monarchy again.

Authoritative sources in Tirana state that parliament has dissolved itself to make place for a constituent assembly, adding this will meet August 25, to revise the constitution and a monarchy will be proclaimed, with President Ahmed Bey Zogu a king.

After the present constitution was framed in 1925 with Ahmed Zogu as president he was reported to have tried to win the consent of Yugoslav and Italian diplomats for the conversion of Albania into a monarchy. The Yugoslavs refused, but the Italians consented in principle.

Since that time Ahmed Zogu is stated to have worked successfully.

"PERJURY" PUZZLES

Interpretation of Word Is Factor, Blackmer Case

PARIS, Aug. 6 (AP).—Whether the "perjury" charged against Henry M. Blackmer, missing Teapot Dome witness, is of the French or American variety, is the question in a determining question in settling the request of the United States for his extradition.

Blackmer was indicted in federal district of Colorado on charges of making false income tax returns. Untrue income declarations are punishable by heavy fines in France but perjury, as such has been generally interpreted here to apply only to bearing false witness in court and under oath.

ATTACKS CONNALLY

Mayfield Charges Misrepresentation In Speech

FORT WORTH, Aug. 6 (AP).—

Charging Congressman Tom Connally of Marlin, his opponent in the senatorial run off, with deceit and misrepresentation in reference to the senate record, U. S. Senator Earl B. Mayfield, in a radio speech here tonight formally began the run off senatorial campaign.

Mayfield offered to withdraw from the race if the Congressional Record did not show he, and not Congressman Marvin Jones of Amarillo, was author of the so called cotton classification bill. Mayfield said Connally charged Jones wrote the measure.

Menjou asked damages of \$25,000 from Max Goldman, George M. Wassel and others, alleging their neckties of inferior make and style and texture bearing his name for advertising purposes, had been sold by the defendants.

FURTHER PROBE

JACKSON, Miss., Aug. 6 (AP).—A federal grand jury will be called upon to investigate additional charges of patronage when it meets at Biloxi on September 4, United States district attorney, announced here today.

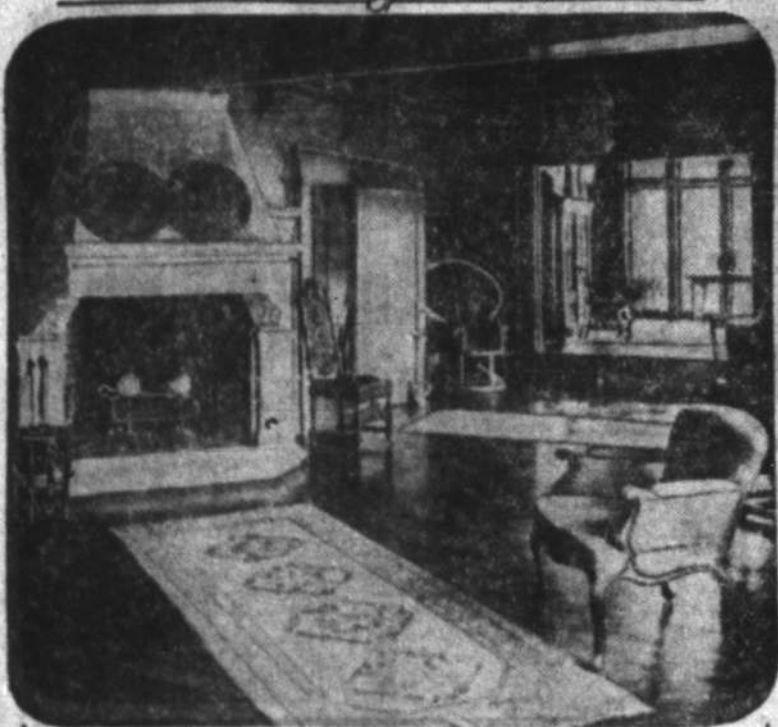
"Why, I don't know," Rod hesitated. "I want to be where Bertie Lou can reach me by wire."
