Tourist Figures For South West Trail Astonish

The question of the value of through highways is constantly discussed over the country but it is seldom that real figures are obtainable on actual car traffic through any given town. W. D. Kelleher of the Magnolia Filling station keeps a record of most of the cars served at his place of business. Sometimes the registration is neglected or overlooked, but he gets most of them.

This book furnishes some interesting data to those interested in highway development work. For instance it shows that for the month of March, 71 through carloads of people stopped at this one station alone. Each car was loaded to capacity. The cars came from nineteen states, as follows: Missouri, Kansas, California, New Mexico, Oregon, Texas, Wyoming, Ohio, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Nevada, Washington, Arizona, Colorado, Wisconsin, Illinois, Indiana, Michigan and Nebraska.

The traffic jumped perceptibly in April, 132 cars being registered. Seventeen states were represented in this number, being Oklahoma, Kansas, California, New Mexico, Arizona, Canada, Michigan, Missouri, Texas, Colorado, Nebraska, Arkansas, Virginia, Iowa, Montana, Indiana and Pennsylvania.

Nearly every state in the union, and one foreign country, Canada, are represented in these lists, and the summer is just starting. And this is only one of the several stations here and a portion of the traffic through Hereford on the South West Trail. It would appear that any reasonable assessment made against the city and county for proper maintenance of this road and the comfort of the tourists is certainly justified by the returns.

School Exhibits At Fair Caused Pleased Comment

The Bible and Domestic Art exhibits of the Hereford schools at the All-Panhandle Fair last week were handled by Miss Marion F. Livingstone and Miss Mabel Faulkner, the teachers of these two classes here. They went up Thursday and came home Saturday. The two exhibits were unique and caused much favorable comment from the crowds.

The Domestic Art display was judged according to neatness, arrangement and quality, and captured first and second on aprons, second on hemstitching, third on dresses and fourth for general display of the two booths. The Memphis schools was the only other exhibitor with a complete line of samples on display.

The Bible booth consisted of maps, posters, compositions, sets of examination papers, Bible memory verse booklets, etc. It was unique as Hereford is the pioneer on the Plains in teaching Bible in the schools and drew close attention. The exhibit drew first prize on intermediate poster work.

The work of the classes of Miss Mary Lou Roberson and Mrs. James Black attracted the attention of Miss Laura V. Hamner, superintendent of the Fair, who requested them for her office, as well as composition from the seventh grade on Elijah. Both teachers were requested to bring their exhibits back to the All-Panhandle Fair at Amarillo in the fall, and will endeavor to do so.

The Domestic Art exhibit will be on display all day at the High School on next Friday and the public is invited to inspect it.

Real Tournament to Begin for Golf This Week

Qualifying Rounds Will
Occupy Attention of
Enthusiasts

With the practice Stroke Contest practically completed the first big tournament of the new Hereford Golf Club begins this week. This tournament will be conducted under the regular rules of the United States Golf Association, by holes instead of strokes, with a qualifying round to fix the playing score of each member. The qualifying round will last through Sunday afternoon and members who do not qualify in that time will not participate in the tournament.

The qualifying round will be for eighteen holes. The player strives to make as low a score as possible and after the results are all in the men will be matched in different classes according to this score. Three classes have been decided upon. Those who shoot the eighteen holes in 98 or less will compose Class A; those who make 99 to 108, inclusive, will compose class B; those who shoot 109 and up will go into Class C. This will group the men where they belong at this time. They will then be matched in each class, the two lowest being put together, then the next two lowest together, etc. When the three classes have determined their champions the Class B and C champions will receive a handicap in playing it off with the Class A man.

These games will begin next week, following the qualifying round. State Convention at Fredericksburg

The Texas Staatsverband will meet in its annual convention this year at Fredericksburg, Texas and will celebrate the twenty-fifth anniversary of this society of the Catholic Church. Mr. Frank J. Woolfe, president of the local society at Nazareth, has just received notice that the convention will most probably be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday of the last week in July.

This will be one of the largest church gatherings in Texas this year, with approximately 750 to 1,000 delegates and visitors attending from the forty-five local societies of the state.

During their stay in Fredericksburg all delegates and visitors will be entertained by the Fredericksburg society and church congregation.

Mr. Woolfe has been advised that special entertainment is being planned to escort the visitors on a sight seeing motor excursion to many points of interest in the wonderfully scenic "hill country" around Fredericksburg that is visited by thousands of tourists each year. The "Enchanted Rock," which is a single solid rock covers 640 acres and is the largest rock in the world, is one point that will be visited.
