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Sunday-School Lesson

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON FOR JUNE 30, 1929

General Topic: Quarterly Review. General Lesson Title: Prophets and Kings of Judah's Decline.

Introduction

The scripture lesson is composed of the twelve Golden Texts that have been used this quarter. Much additional interest and pleasure may be obtained by turning back to the lesson represented by each verse and refreshing the memory in regard to the setting of each lesson.

Scripture Lesson.

1. Then I said, Here am I; send me.—Isaiah 6:8.
2. Jehovah your God is gracious and merciful.—2 Chron. 30:9.
3. As one whom his mother comforteth, so will I comfort you.—Isaiah 66:13.
4. With his stripes we are healed.—Isaiah 53:5.
5. Thy word is a lamp unto my feet, and light unto my path.—Psalm 119:105.
6. We must obey God rather than men.—Acts 5:29.

7. Hearken unto my voice, and I will be your God, and ye shall be my people.—Jeremiah 7:23.
8. Thy words have I laid up in my heart, that I might not sin against thee.—Psalm 119:11.

9. Blessed are ye when men shall reproach you, and persecute you, and say all manner of evil against you falsely, for my sake.—Matthew 5:11.

10. We will drink no wine.—Jeremiah 35:6.

11. Righteousness exalteth a nation. But sin is a reproach to any people.—Proverbs 14:34.

12. Bless Jehovah, O my soul.—Psalm 103:1.

Golden Text: I have loved thee with an everlasting love; therefore with loving kindness have I drawn thee.—Jer 31:3.

Time and Principal Characters

The period of time covered by the twelve lessons of this last quarter is about 170 years. The first lesson told of the great Old Testament prophet, Isaiah, in the year that king Uzziah died, 758 B. C. The last lesson is the tragic story of the destruction of Jerusalem, 586 B. C. after its capture by the army of Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon.

The two principal characters of this period are the two great prophets, Isaiah and Jeremiah. The

first prophesied during the first forty years of the period, and the second during the last forty years, leaving an interval of about sixty or seventy years between the death of Isaiah and the beginning of Jeremiah's ministry. The two best kings during this time were Hezekiah and Josiah. Probably the two worst kings were Manasseh and Amon, the son and grandson of Hezekiah, and also the father and the grandfather of Josiah.

Isaiah

Isaiah received his call to be a prophet the year King Uzziah died, 758 B. C. (2 Kings 15:2 and Isaiah 6:1-8). He was contemporary with the prophet Micah in Judah, but unlike his contemporary, spent most of his life in the city of Jerusalem. His ministry of about forty years extended through the reigns of Jotham and Ahaz and going on for more than twenty-five years into

the reign of Hezekiah.

Hezekiah.

The reign of Hezekiah was one of the most important in the history of the chosen people. It was while he was king of Judah, that Samaria, the capital of the northern kingdom of Israel, fell into the hands of the Assyrians under Sargon and the kingdom of Israel became defunct. Ten years later, Sargon invaded Judah, exacting heavy tribute from Hezekiah. After he had reigned for fourteen years he was taken seriously sick, but his life was miraculously extended fifteen years longer.

Jeremiah.

After the death of Isaiah during the latter half of Hezekiah's reign, there was no prophet in Judah until the coming of Jeremiah more than fifty years later at the close of the reign of Manasseh, Hezekiah's unworthy son.

Jehovah called this quiet, timid, shrinking son of the priest of Anathoth to be a prophet for him in one of the worst periods of the nation's history. Jehovah assured him in the beginning that he would give to him his strength to uphold him and his message to preach. During those dark days of the decline and fall of

the kingdom he kept that promise. When the end came in 586 B. C., Jeremiah was still preaching the word of God even though opposed by king and priest and people. It is a remarkable career. Jeremiah kept alive the little spark of real religion in the hearts of the people through these years.

King Josiah.

After the evil kings, Manasseh and Amon, it is refreshing to have a boy king come to the throne and begin his reign by "seeking after God." We are certain at once that better days are in store. He spends some time seeking God and his will. He becomes convinced that the evil and idolatry in the land do not please God and so he begins one of the biggest reform movements of Israel's history. He is an iconoclast of the real type and continues his devastating work until idols and high places and images are all cleared away.

During the reign of Josiah, the prophet Jeremiah began his active ministry with the prophets Zephaniah and Nahum as his contemporaries. It was in the days of Josiah and the book of the law (Deuteronomy) was found in the Temple

and many subsequent reforms followed.

The Last Four Kings of Judah.

After Josiah, came King Jehoiach, his son, who, after three months on the throne, was captured by Pharaoh and deported to Egypt. Following Jehoiach, Jehoiakim succeeded to the throne of Judah and reigned for eleven years. In the second year of his reign, Judah was made tributary to Babylon when Nebuchadnezzar subjugated the land for his father, Nabopolassar.

At this time appeared the prophet Habakkuk, both Nahum and Zephaniah having died, so that Habakkuk and Jeremiah were for the time contemporary prophets in Judah, though it seems Habakkuk began his ministry late in life and prophesied for only a few years. After the great battle of Carchemish, the power of Egypt in Western Asia was overthrown by the Chaldeans.

Following the reign of Jehoiakim, Jehoiachin came to the throne in Judah, but after three months was sent into exile in Babylon, and Zedekiah was enthroned by the Chaldeans.

Jeremiah continues his ministry

in Judah and Ezekiel begins his work in Babylon, he having gone with the captivity with Jehoiachin. But Zedekiah revolts against Babylon, and Jerusalem is besieged and the prophet Jeremiah all the time pleading with king and people to make the best terms possible with the enemy lest the entire city and people should be destroyed. Besides a continued ministry of Jeremiah up to and after the exile until he was carried away to Egypt, the prophet Obadiah wrote his book after national disaster had befallen the

Jews.

1. God's messengers to the people are their true leaders, though they are not always in positions of influence or leadership. It is the voice of warning instead of flattery that renders a genuine public service.

2. Preachers can serve their day and generation better in unofficial positions than in official ones, because their power consists in persuasion instead of force.

3. The morals of a people are no higher than the degree to which their spiritual life is developed.

4. In preaching a spiritual religion, ministers never build up a self-seeking religious system but institute a leadership of the spirit by whom the people are to be governed and taught.

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Desire For Candy Is Robbery Cause

Three Youths Confess To Series Of Local Store Robberies; Arrested At Amarillo

"We were hungry for candy," was the statement of one of the three boys who were arrested in Amarillo Wednesday night in connection with the burglary of the O. C. Roberts grocery store, 1009 Avenue O, about 10 days ago. The trio, two of them of Lubbock and one of Levelland, were returned to this city Thursday by Chief of Police John Lemond and Sheriff Wade Hardy.

The boys gave their names as Preston and Bennie Carver, of Lubbock and Leslie Allen, of Levelland.

Officers at Amarillo were able to capture the youths after the interception of a letter by their landlady which warned them that officers were on their trail and for them to "lay low". It was said that a newspaper account of the burglary, read by friends or relatives of the boys, was cause for writing of the letter.

Boxes of candy, chewing gum, tobacco, eight dozen eggs and canned goods were included in the loot taken from the store.

Their gin at Taihoka is being rebuilt and new machinery installed throughout.

Service Line Is Near Brownfield

(Special To The Avalanche) BROWNFIELD, June 28.—Three shifts of eight hours each are now being worked by the West Texas Gas company in laying the service line between Taihoka and Brownfield and they are now within eight miles of the city.

Engineers of the company are now busy locating the lines within the corporate limits and expect to complete their work within the next few days and it is expected that the entire system will be completed and ready to serve its commodity before August 1, which is the time limit set in an agreement between the company and city officials and which is covered by a bond in the sum of \$25,000.

Lubbock Grain and Coal Is Bankrupt

Bankruptcy proceedings have been filed in the Lubbock division of federal court by The Lubbock Grain and Coal company, according to public announcement made yesterday.

The company has real estate valued at \$22,000, while there are 90 unsecured creditors, and debts of the company total \$22,183.43. Secured claims total \$30,628.49. The company was operated by J. D. Quick with W. K. Dickinson as president. Other stockholders of the company are: S. C. Arnett, D. R. Crouch, B. C. Dickinson and T. F. West.

Boy Scout Camp To Open July 1

Every accommodation is now ready for the encampment of Boy Scouts of the South Plains Area council, the first term of which is to open on Monday July 1, according to H. B. Yates, executive. "We can easily take care of an enrollment of 150 scouts," said Mr. Yates. "George Eaton, of this city, recently spent several days at the scout camp getting everything in shape for the encampment. There are 25 army tents sufficient to accommodate the expected attendance."

(Special To The Avalanche) BROWNFIELD, June 28.—Work in connection with the paving of several blocks of the streets of Brownfield has been completed by engineers and bids will be received for the actual construction within the next few days. An effort will be made to complete the work before crops mature and fall business begins.

Miller Rules On Gas, Fee Bills

AUSTIN, June 28.—(AP)—Lieut. Gov. Barry Miller held today that gasoline and automobile registration taxation could be embodied in a single bill, paying the way for consideration by the senate of a substitute measure by Senator W. A. Williamson, San Antonio, proposing a fifty per cent reduction in passenger car fee and a four cent gasoline tax. When Senator Williamson yesterday presented his substitute to the Richardson-Hubbard house bill calling for a 30 per cent slash in registration fees, Senator A. J. Wirtz, Seguin, contended two taxation subjects could not be contained in one revenue-raising bill. Miller's opinion today is the same as that made by Attorney General Claude Pollard.

Search, Seizure Act Is Revamped

AUSTIN, June 28.—(AP)—One of the two bills revamping the search and seizure act to conform to court decisions bearing on it was passed finally by the house today, and the other failed to muster enough votes to suspend the rules and go to final passage after having been engrossed.

Both bills had passed the senate under an agreement between Senators A. J. Wirtz of Seguin, author of the original act, and Thomas B. Love of Dallas, who has long sought repeal of the entire law.

Senator Wirtz contends the amendments will make no revolutionary changes in the present law, merely taking out portions which the court of criminal appeals had construed adversely.

NEW STORE TO OPEN

Clothing Firm To Start In Taihoka In Near Future

(Special To The Avalanche) TAIHOKA, June 28.—J. Wilonsky of Dallas has announced that he will, in a few days, open a new clothing store in Taihoka. The Wilonsky building, on the west side of the square is being remodeled for the use of the new firm. Mr. Wilonsky has been in business in Dallas for many years.

Sliding Scale On Sugar Is Opposed

WASHINGTON, June 28.—(AP)—Opposition to the proposed sliding scale duties on sugar was voiced today by D. W. Pipes, Jr., of Houma, La., before a senate sub-committee considering the "sugar" schedules in the house tariff bill.

Pipes was one of a list of 75 witnesses who appeared to plead for higher or lower rates on sugar and in connection with the proposed transfer of hides, leather and shoes, from the free to the dutiable list. Pipes, who is president of the American sugar cane league in answer to a question by Senator Har-

rison, democrat, Mississippi, said he did not favor the sliding scale proposition where we do not want to experiment."

WASHINGTON, June 28. (AP) — President Hoover has placed his personal stamp of disapproval on any program by which the federal government would foster a prohibition propaganda campaign in the public schools.

This was disclosed today at the White House with the additional information that on reading that a pamphlet outlining a course of prohibition study in the schools had been prepared in the prohibition bureau, Mr. Hoover conferred with a responsible treasury official. This official disclaimed any intention of the treasury to sanction

such a program and the chief executive thereupon suggested that in the light of the newspaper publication on the subject the position of the treasury should be made clear to the country.

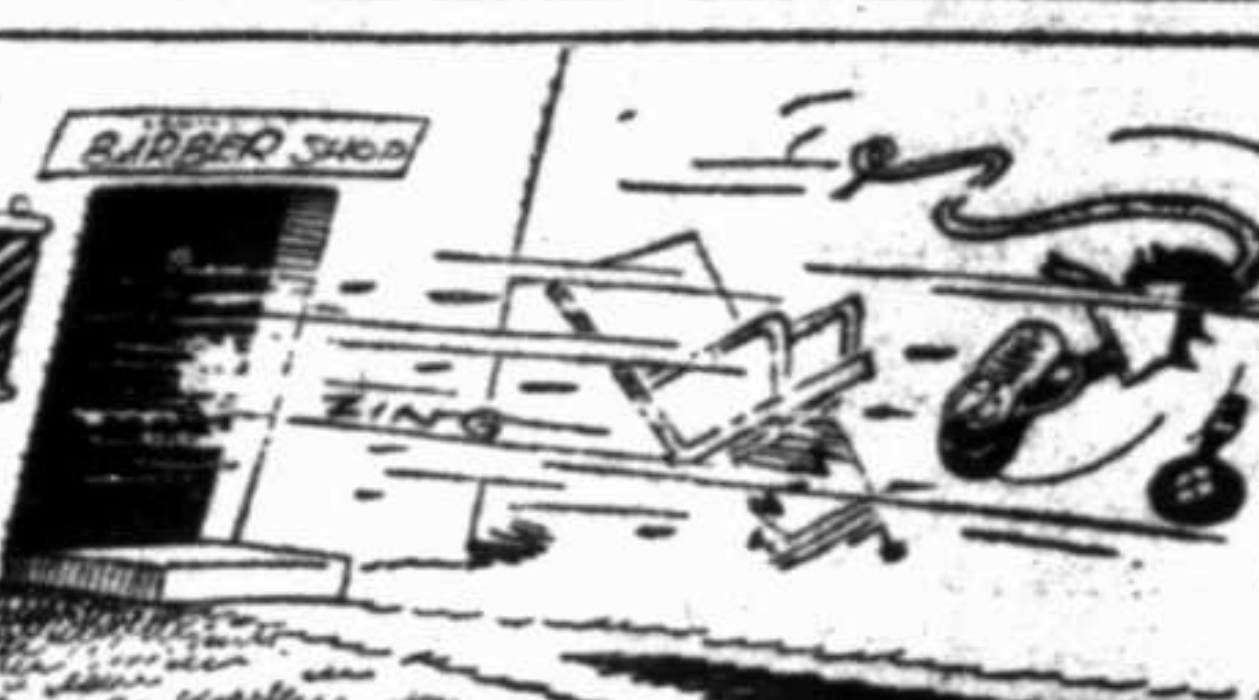

Planes Will Have American Engines

Giant German Trans-Atlantic Flying Boat Plans To Set Out On Proposed Journey This Summer

NEW YORK, June 27. (AP)—The giant Rorbach flying boat Rorbach is being equipped with American engines when it makes its first commercial trans-Atlantic flight from Lisbon, Portugal, to New York, set for this summer.

word from Dr. Adolf Rorbach to the American agents of the flight here, said the two European engines had proved unsatisfactory and that they were being replaced by Pratt and Whitney Hornet engines of 375 horsepower each.

In test flights, Pilot Herman Stender has flown the ship with a load of 9,000 pounds to an altitude of 9,500 feet and attained a speed of 133 miles an hour. On its trans-Atlantic hop the Rorbach is expected to maintain a cruising speed of 125 miles an hour.

At that speed the plane would require three days to complete the flight over the southern route with stops at the Cape Verde Islands, Fernando Noronha, off the Brazilian coast, and at the West Indies. The ship's speed is expected to be increased to 140 miles an hour by flying directly from the Cape Verde Islands to Barbados and then to New York under consideration.

The stop at Fernando Noronha was selected originally to test fuel consumption and to study weather conditions over the route, which the German Luft Hansa plans to use later in the spring for regular passenger and freight service to South America.

Every precaution is being taken to insure safety on the Rorbach, on its flight to New York. It has been tested flying on one engine with full load and for weathering heavy seas. A jury mast and sail, with auxiliary rudder, converts the all-metal flying boat into a small schooner when it is on the water without power.

The cabin is equipped with watertight bulkheads, and several compartments may be filled completely with water without the hull sinking. The large all-metal cantilever wing also is water-tight and will float.

A special "office" has been fitted in the rear of the hull for Miss Mildred Johnson, American girl, who will make the flight as custodian of cargo.

BELLO HORIZONTE, Brazil, June 28. (AP)—For the first time in Brazil a real secret ballot was used in the elections here recently to choose a member for the municipal council. The government candidate was defeated by Dr. Naghales Drummond, professor of law at the university and the candidate of the students.

This state of Minas Geraes is the first to change its constitution to legalize the secret ballot. In the past it has been the custom for a voter to write the name of his choice in the presence of the election officials, then place it in an envelope and deposit it in the ballot box.

GALVESTON, June 28. (AP)—Whether the storm beaten four-masted schooner, Mabel Gale, which has been tied up at Houston since the middle of May, ever will sail the seas again is a question which waterfront men are now discussing. The schooner was towed into this port on May 18 by the coast guard cutter Comanche in a leaky condition after encountering a series of gales and other mishaps in the Gulf during last winter. The day following she was taken up the ship channel to Houston where she has since remained.

The schooner, owned by E. H. Stewart of Houston, left Houston on Nov. 2, 1928, with 200 tons of cargo for a fishing village at Soto La Marina, Mexico. The cargo included a refrigerating ice plant, portable houses, boats and other equipment.

Textbook Contract Validity Attacked

AUSTIN, June 28. (AP)—Validity of textbook contracts recently signed are attacked by Senator A. J. Wirtz of Seguin, in a petition for injunction to restrain carrying out the contracts, filed in Travis county district court today.

Senator Wirtz attacked the validity of the contracts on grounds that they were made in contravention to the statute which provides the state shall not purchase books from publishers at a price in excess of that paid for the same texts by other states.

He charged that Texas is paying more for certain readers and geographicals than the states of Arkansas, Mississippi and Louisiana.

And now an expensive problem is being solved. The only drawback is injury to trees by enthusiastic fishermen as they gather the bait. Hereafter the caterpillars have been burned out of the trees, a more or less expensive proposition where hundreds of trees were concerned.
