AN EVANGELIST was once asked how he had managed his life that he could still be young at three score and ten. His answer was "I've behaved myself."

As Mr. S. H. Nance, long-time resident and civil leader, reached the age of 70 today he could answer the same question with the same answer, for you'd guess him to be 10 or 15 years younger.

IT WAS ON June 1, 1931, that Steve Nance moved his family to Cisco and became manager of the Ford dealership. A year later, he acquired the property and, with his partner, Charles Graham, he is still very active in the Ford business.

Mr. Nance came here from Winters where he had operated a Ford agency for six years. To begin at the beginning, Mr. Nance was born in Arkansas. As a lad of 13, he moved with his family to De Leon to live on a farm.

At the age of 22 years, he and Mrs. Nance were married at De Leon. After several years of farm life, they moved to Rising Star where Mr. Nance went into the grocery and produce business. He spent 15 years at Rising Star, moving from there to Winters.

MR. NANCE recalls that his father died when he was 18 years old, and he became a steward in the Methodist church that year. He has been a Steward in the church ever since — 52 years. He has been an active Lions Club member since 1925 — 28 years — and has served as president of clubs in Winters and Cisco.

Mr. Nance has served as a member of the City Commission in each of the three cities where he has lived — Rising Star, Winters and Cisco. He has been active in the Chamber of Commerce and other civic organizations, always assuming every responsibility of good citizenship.

AN HONOR WAS extended to Mr. Nance this week when the Ford dealers of this West Texas region named him as their chairman to represent them at Dallas regional conferences.

When we ran into Mr. Nance late yesterday, we inquired if he was going to have a birthday party. He didn't know of any plans for one, but you never can tell. Let's all wish for him a happy birthday.

LEGION AUXILIARY POPPY SALE PLANNED HERE FOR SATURDAY

Cisco area residents will be given an opportunity Saturday to help needy veterans of wars and their dependents in the annual Poppy Day sale, according to Mrs. Fleming Waters, chairman of the American Legion Auxiliary Poppy committee.

Girls Scouts of Troop Seven, sponsored by the Legion Auxiliary, will help sell poppies in the downtown section. The Legion Hall will be open during the day as headquarters for the sale.

Contributions made for the little red flowers of remembrance will be divided between the Auxiliary's child welfare and rehabilitation funds to serve both the disabled veterans and veterans' children, Mrs. Waters said. Because of the poppy, aid from the Legion Auxiliary will be available to children of veterans found in this area during the coming year.

"Disability and death of war veterans, as well as their causes which break up veterans' homes, often leave children in distresses," Mrs. Waters said. "Our Auxiliary Unit must have funds constantly available to meet the emergency needs of such children until permanent arrangements for their support can be made. The poppy is our biggest aid in this endeavor."

Gas Companies Should Merge, Clark States In Open Letter

On the basis that neither system is operating at a profit, the Cisco Gas Corporation should be allowed by a vote of the people either to buy out the Lone Star Gas System here or to sell out its system to Lone Star Gas, President Lester Clark of Cisco Gas Corporation said in an open letter published as an advertisement in today's Press. The letter appears elsewhere in this edition.

"It is better to have one healthy and prospering business in Cisco, capable of spending the time and energies required to try to bring Cisco industries and outlets for its products, than to have two floundering and sick businesses whose lack of profit will

not permit it to be the kind of real citizen it should be," Mr. Clark said in the letter.

"One sound business should be better able to pay more taxes to support the community, schools and county. One healthy business should be better able to give to worthwhile programs within the community life. It all continues to add up — we should be allowed by a vote of the people to either buy out Lone Star's gas system or they should be allowed to buy ours. For the good of Cisco as well as the investors, Cisco should have one strong, healthy and prospering gas company."

Pete Nance Talks At Rotary Lunch Meeting Thursday

A classification talk on public accounting was given by Rotarian Pete Nance at the weekly meeting of the Rotary Club at the Hotel Victor Coffee Shop Thursday.

Rotarian Nance first told of the history of accounting and of the organization of accounting societies from the origin many years ago.

He then told of the qualifications, requirements and obligations of accountants, both public and certified, and described accounting as the analyzing and interpreting of records of business.

He described some of the laws regulating the practice of accounting — laws for the protection of both clients and accountants. He told of the change in accounting from the time when the work was done with quill and ink to the present time when machines are used in the majority of firms.

The meeting was in charge of Vice-President Bill Wright who served in the absence of President W. H. McAnally.

Loboes Conclude Home Season In Weatherford Game Tonight

McMURRY INDIANS DEFEAT CJC TEAM 19-13 IN FOOTBALL GAME

The Wranglers of Cisco Junior College lost a 19-to-13 decision to the McMurry College "B" team in a football game Thursday night at Chesley Field. It was a hard-fought contest on a muddy field in cold weather.

The game was a defensive battle most of the way, both teams putting on most of their offensive show in the final period.

E. E. Reid, 155-pound Wrangler halfback, was probably the game's top ground gainer in running plays. A hard runner, Reid broke loose frequently for long gains. Bob Hayworth, Fred Bilbo and Kenneth Scott were the top offensive hands for McMurry.

The first quarter was a defensive fight with neither team offering a serious threat. One McMurry drive opened on their 25 and pushed to the Cisco 30 before the strong Wrangler forward wall held, enabling Cisco End Bud Miller to punt out of danger.

The Wranglers offered a threat in the second period after taking a short punt on their 41 yard line. After being penalized 15 yards, Miller punted and Reid recovered a fumble on the McMurry 32. On first down, Reid took a hand-off from Field General Bob Lynch and got 16 yards. Cisco fumbled away the ball on the 15-yard line to end the threat.

McMurry's Bilbo got loose to midfield, and a pass carried to the Cisco 40. The visitors then drove to the Cisco 8-yard line where the Wranglers held and took over on downs.

After taking a punt in midfield, McMurry came back to score. A pass carried to the Cisco 17 and on last down, Hayworth passed to End Ezra Corley for a touchdown.

The third period was scoreless. The Wranglers threatened as the quarter opened, taking a short punt on the McMurry 30. Reid broke through for 14 yards. Four plays then failed to gain and the ball went over.

Late in the period, the McMurry team opening another scoring drive from their 23-yard line. Bilbo carried to the 38 in three bucks, and a pass went to midfield. Scott got through to the Cisco 34, and Corley took a pass on the 21. As the final period opened Bilbo broke through for a touchdown, and the try for extra point was good.

The Wranglers took the kickoff and opening a touchdown drive from their 23. Reid got a first down on the 35, and Lynch passed to Miller on the McMurry 40. Lynch then hit Harold Cheeves with a 15-yard pass, and Vernon Franklin took a last down pass for a touchdown. Glen Hutson's try for extra point was wide.

McMurry took the kickoff and worked to the Cisco 22 where the Wranglers took over on downs. Three plays produced only six yards and the Cisco punt was blocked, McMurry taking over on

the Wrangler 12. The Indians drove to the Cisco 3, where the Wranglers took over on downs. Walter Matthews intercepted a pass and ran for a touchdown.

Cisco took the kickoff on their 23. Lynch hit Don Carman with a pass that carried 77 yards for a touchdown. Glen Hutson converted.

The Cisco Lobo "B" team showed "A" team form in Eastland Thursday night when they downed the Eastland "B" team by an impressive 32-0 score.

The Loboes got an early start and at the end of the second period the score stood at 20-0. With the subs in most of the last half the Cisco team scored two additional touchdowns.

Jim Gilmore scored two of the Cisco touchdowns, one on a 45 yard sprint and the other on a 20 yard run. Howard Hamilton scored on a keeper play that went for 55 yards. Clyde Butler and David Ewell made the other two touchdowns on short plunges through the line. Hamilton and Paul Ford plunged over for the extra points. Other backs showing up well were Leland Davis and Ace Lucas.

The entire line, both starters and substitutes, played top quality ball. The starters were Johnny Trigg and Jim Branton at ends, Don Gray and Donald Meier at tackles, Billy Duke and Buz Johnson at guards and Robert Fletcher at center. Le Vere Adams and J. Frank Walton alternated with the starters.

The second string line was made up of Jimmy Sublett and Jim Branton at ends, Orval Durham and Jackie Reynolds at guards. Bobby Cluck was the center. Durham was probably the most outstanding lineman of that group.

Every player who made the trip played in the game to gain playing experience and in an attempt to keep the score down.

Miss Bobbie Reynolds, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. I. D. Reynolds, was expected in Cisco tonight to attend the Cisco-Weatherford game. She is a student at Abilene Christian College.

Special Train To Bring Big Crowd

The Cisco High School Loboes will conclude the home schedule for the 1953 season tonight when they meet the classy Weatherford Kangaroos at Chesley Field at 8 o'clock in a District 9-AA contest.

Two other games remain on the Lobo schedule for the season and both games are played in enemy territory.

The Loboes will be in good condition for the game tonight, but will go into the game decided underdogs. The Kangaroos will have an 18 pound advantage per man over the light weight Loboes, and in addition, the Loboes will be giving away several years of playing experience. The Kangaroos are mostly veterans in high school competition while many of the Loboes are first and second year players.

The Kangaroo attack is led by 193 pound Fullback Willard Deweall, candidate for all-state honors. He can pass or run with equal dexterity, and will be hard for the light Lobo defenders to handle.

The visitors combine the T-formation and some spreads in their attack, and have been effective all season except against Comanche, who handed them a 26-0 setback last week.

Between 500 and 1,000 Weatherford fans were expected to accompany the Kangaroos to Cisco for the game tonight. Between 300 and 400 will make the trip by special train while many others will come by private cars.

In half-time activities the football and band sweethearts will be presented. The two were chosen this week by secret ballot and their identity will be kept a secret until their presentation tonight. Captains Bob Qualls and Monte Ingram will present the football sweetheart and Leon McCrary will present the band sweetheart.

The Boosters Club will formally present the new electric scoreboard tonight and will dedicate it to Cisco High School and to Cisco Junior College. The Boosters adopted the scoreboard project as one of its major undertakings for the year and it was used for the first time Thursday night. A special membership booth will be in use at the game by the membership committee in an effort to sign up new members to help with the work of promoting a better athletic program for all Cisco schools.

A pep rally was held at the high school at 11:30 a. m. and the pre-game enthusiasm was high.

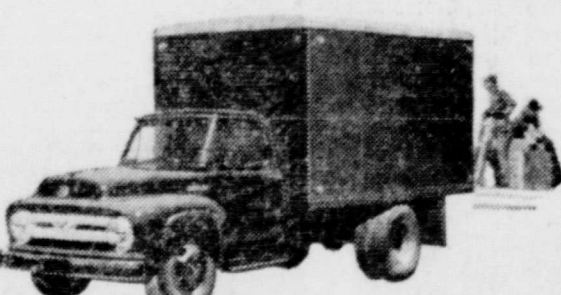

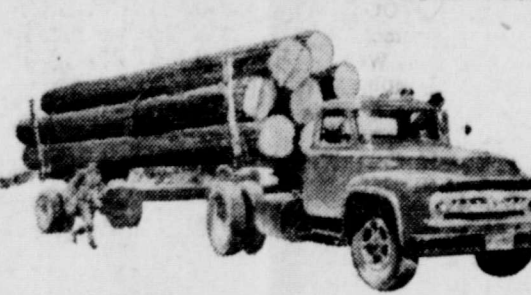

An Open Letter

TO OUR FRIENDS AND CUSTOMERS:

Now that the smoke has cleared away after the election called by the city for the purpose of allowing the City of Cisco to buy the gas distribution system owned by the Cisco Gas Corporation and the Lone Star Gas Company it might be well to clear up a few misunderstandings which have prevailed and explain the position of our company on matters pertaining to our operations in Cisco. In doing so we are dedicated to laying all of our cards face up so that all may know our problems and may understand our way of thinking.

First of all, those of us whose active interest is in the operations of the Cisco Gas Corporation are tied by choice to the economic life of Cisco and Eastland County. The stock of the Cisco Gas Corporation is owned by the partners in an Oil, Gas and Gasoline producing company operated as The Ixex Company. Many of our employees are citizens of Cisco and whether we own the distribution system in Cisco or not does not in any way affect the status of these people. We are proud to have them working for us, and we believe they are just as happy to be a part of our growing organization. We are a part of Cisco for years to come, whether in operations or in distribution, and we feel a real sense of pride in Cisco and its future.

And now — that brings us to the question which is in your mind and of which you are due and deserving an answer. And that question "Why were we willing to sell (in dissolution of the Cisco Gas Corporation) our distribution system to the City of Cisco or to anyone else for that matter?" The answer is simple, but we would like to break it down into the following two parts:

1. We felt that it was a distinct advantage to the citizenship of Cisco to be assured of a reasonably priced supply of gas for years to come. The Ixex Company could afford to find the necessary reserves to supply this market because of an assured outlet for the gas. We were mistaken in what we honestly thought to be the desires of the citizenship.

2. The Cisco Gas Corporation was organized, built and operated by capable and efficient business men. Mr. Ponsler, Mr. Nance, and the other people, who for years ran this company, did an efficient and fine job and yet, due to that competitive situation in Cisco, have in recent years been unable to make a reasonable profit on the investment in the system. No home or no business can long keep going when the "out go" is more than the "income." That is one reason why we not only were willing but wanted to sell. With one system a reasonable profit is possible. With two systems competing in Cisco the only possible chance for a reasonable return on the investments involved is a higher gas rate for both companies.

The sum total of the above adds up to one real answer. It is better to have one healthy and prospering business in Cisco, capable of spending the time and the energies required to try to bring to Cisco industries and outlets for its products, than to have two floundering and sick businesses whose lack of profit will not permit it to be the kind of real citizen it should be. One sound business should be better able to pay more taxes to support the community, schools, and county. One healthy business should be better able to give to worth-while programs within the community life. It all continues to add up — we should be allowed by a vote of the people to either buy out Lone Star's gas system or they should be allowed to buy ours. For the good of Cisco as well as the investors — Cisco should have one strong, healthy and prospering gas company.

We are willing to take either course. If we continue to be of real service to Cisco we should be able to be a strong part of this fine community. We sincerely hope that the foregoing presents a problem which is properly our mutual problem. Your earnest consideration would be appreciated.

24 buildings, but there is no luxury there, and this orphanage is maintained by free-will gifts, as they have no endowment. He told of their joy in work and play, of discipline necessary, all amid Christian surroundings.
