Olton Rescue Hero Gets National Medal

Carnegie Honors To Upton

The Carnegie Hero Fund Commission Monday cited an Amarillo school teacher, Ronnie Upton, for saving the lives of two Latin American boys in Olton.

The near tragedy for which Upton was cited occurred last July 22.

Arturo and Abel DeLeon, 4 and 2 respectively at the time, were rescued from an open cesspool adjacent to Marshall's Grocery on Highway 70.

The Amarillo man jumped into the cesspool, into which the two small boys had fallen, and dragged them to safety. Both boys were unconscious, having been in the water-filled pit for several minutes, but were revived by artificial respiration.

The two boys are sons of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest DeLeon. Upton is a teacher at Fannin Junior High in Amarillo, and was in Olton calling on grocery stores for National Biscuit Company during the summer, relieving another salesman on vacation.

Upton gave this account of the rescue at the time:

"I was in front of the store when two women ran up screaming. One of them told a manher boys had fallen into a cesspool. I ran around behind the house and saw one of the boys bobbing up and going under. I couldn't see the other one.

"A man was trying to reach one with a stick, but it wasn't any use."

Upton stripped to the waist and jumped into the 15-foot deep cesspool, diving down about nine feet before locating one of the boys.

He said he groped in the dark for the second lad and found him about four feet from the top.

"Neither was breathing when I got them out," said Upton, "so I gave them artificial respiration until they revived."

By that time a doctor and ambulance were on hand to continue respiratory measures.

The Olton Lions club awarded Upton a plaque for his deed. The club also presented him a new suit of clothes and nominated him for the Carnegie award.

The Monday announcement by the Carnegie commission was in response to the club nomination.

The Carnegie recommendation calls for the award of a bronze medal and \$750 to Upton.

Olton school trustees have accepted bids on several phases of their expansion program and will call for bids on the rest of the plans at a regular meeting Tuesday night.

In connection with remodeling work at the high school and junior high, the board accepted these low bids at a meeting last Thursday:

Electrical work—\$11,275, by Hodges Electric, Plainview.

Acoustical ceilings—\$9,587, by Hamilton Acoustical Co., Lubbock.

Flooring—\$7,849, by Brick and Tile Co., Lubbock.

In connection with lighting the football field, the board accepted a low bid from J.J. Montgomery, Hale Center, in the amount of \$15,829.11.

"Our field will be exactly like the Hereford field, in regard to lighting," Supt. Johnny Clark Jr. said. This will include steel poles, underground wire, 32 quartz lights and 12 mercury vapor lamps.

Clark said that bids for an all-steel bus maintenance garage will be opened Tuesday night and that, if possible, the board will call for bids on the rest of the construction program at that time.

Enterprise Wins Top NEA Award

The Olton Enterprise received the National Editorial Association's top award last weekend at NEA's 79th Annual Convention in New York City.

Contest judges rated the Enterprise at the top of its class in general excellence of the national newspaper contest.

A large copper plaque was presented to Mr. and Mrs. Bill Turner, publishers of the Enterprise, at an awards night dinner at the Commodore Hotel, New York.

It was the first place award for general excellence, weekly division, circulation under 2,000.

The Enterprise also won a third place plaque in NEA's best news story contest, for papers of circulation under 3,000.

Four other newspapers were presented first place general excellence plaques in their respective divisions.

They were the Pontiac (Mich.) Press, daily division; Birmingham (Mich.) Eccentric, weeklies over 6,000 circulation; Paramus (N.J.) Sunday Post, weeklies from 4,000 to 6,000; and Oberlin (Ohio) News-Tribune, weeklies from 2,000 to 4,000.

In the best news story contest the Enterprise placed third behind the Omak (Wash.)

Chronicle and the Nashville (N. C.) Graphic.

Judges had this to say about the Enterprise in the general excellence contest: "We liked the photo-offset Olton Enterprise for its sprightly make-up, variety of coverage, excellent picture quality and clean appearance."

In their comments on the news story contest, the judges said: "The third place entry by the Olton Enterprise caught the judges' eye with its attractive heads and page positioning and with its treatment of a highly controversial and colorful city election 'the town will be talking about for years'."

Almost 2,500 entries were scanned by a panel of judges from across the country in the 1964 NEA contests.

In all, newspapers from 37 states won awards in the NEA national contests.

Texas had one first-place winner, one second place award and three third-place winners.

2,000 Out For Co-Op's Annual Meet

Almost 2,000 people turned out for Olton Co-Op's annual barbecue and stockholders meeting.

Winston Eley, president of the Co-Op, reported that 1962 people were present for the meal.

Dividend checks totaling \$301,501.80 were passed out at the meeting.

New directors were also elected to three-year terms. Willie Gene Green and Joe Edd Carson will replace Cloys Fancher and Drexel Lawson on the board of directors.

Eley also reported that the dividend from the 1963-64 ginning season would total \$18.26 per bale. He pointed out that this will be the largest profit shown by any co-op in the area.

The 11-year average for Olton Co-Op Gin dividends has been 13.89 per bale of ginned cotton.

During the course of the Saturday men, five speakers addressed the gathering. Speakers were Dick McClung, Plains Co-Op Oil Mill in Lubbock; John McQueen, Plainview Co-Op Compress; Jack Brown, Texas Planting Seed Assoc. in Lubbock; Dan Davis, Co-Op Marketing Assoc. in Lubbock; and Lowell Richardson, National Cotton Council.

Mahon Pushes Weevil Fight

Congressman George Mahon appeared Monday before the Senate Committee on Appropriations to urge the inclusion in a Senate money bill of \$1,000,000 to be used to combat the advance of the boll weevil into the High Plains area.

The President last week sent the \$1 million budget request to Congress for the boll weevil program. Mahon, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, had asked the President and the Secretary of Agriculture several weeks ago to approve the request for the necessary funds. The funds would be available only if matched by a similar sum from area farmers, and High Plains farm groups have made such commitments.

The House of Representatives on May 20, despite the absence of a budget request, approved for the same purpose a sum of \$200,000 in its Agriculture Appropriation bill. If the Senate approves the increase of \$800,000 above the House bill, it will then be sent back to the House for further consideration.

Actions taking place in Washington are an outgrowth of the discovery last spring that the boll weevil had wintered on the fringes of the High Plains. Farmers became concerned and formed a boll weevil committee to push for action. Last April Mahon joined an area farm group, backed by the Plains Cotton Growers, and appeared with them before the House Appropriations Committee to ask support for a cooperative program between farmers and the Department of Agriculture to combat the weevil threat.

Services, for Lee Sherman, 75, were conducted at 3 p.m. Wednesday at First Baptist Church with the Rev. John E. Lewis, pastor, officiating, assisted by the Rev. Glen Godsey of Plainview.

Burial was in Olton Cemetery under direction of Parsons Funeral Home.

Sherman died about 7 p.m. Monday at a rest home in Odessa. He had been in ill health for almost four months.

Born in Langley, Arkansas, Sherman moved to Olton in 1952 from Port Arthur. He was a retired building contractor.

Survivors include his wife; five sons, A. E., Port Arthur, Hugh, Victoria, Leon, Odessa, Earl, Tampa, Florida; and Basil, Olton; a daughter, Mrs. Gerald Simpson, Nederland; three brothers, Sam, Big Fork; Homer, Shreveport, Louisiana; and Paul, Dierks, Arkansas; 17 grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren.

One of the first things on the schedule was a walk from the Commodore Hotel to Rockefeller Center.

At supper time, we learned a lot about New York City food—and the prices that go with it.

We tried the Cafe Francais at Rockefeller Center, and found roast beef going for \$4.95 a plate, with steaks on up to \$12.50. We stayed pretty close to the minimum of \$3.00 per person.

Later, we got a night view of Manhattan from the top of the RCA building, and then took a walk to Times Square.

The next day, we took in the Empire State Building, Macy's, Gimbel's and a few other spots.

I went on a spending binge and bought a roll of film at Macy's and Amy cut loose and bought some coloring books for the kids at Gimbel's.

OUR FIRST TASTE of subway-riding came Friday, when we struck out for the World's Fair.

Amy and I came to the conclusion that the subway is the best way to go in New York. It gets you there faster, and cheaper.

The Fair was a city by itself. Friday night, a fireworks display at the fountain area lighted up the sky with every color imaginable.

We had quite a break on getting into exhibits. The World's Fair people called Friday National Press Day and we were able to duck some of the long lines into some exhibits.

General Electric's show was one of the best, along with General Motors' Futurama. One of the highlights of our trip to the Fair was a dinner sponsored by General Motors at the "Rathskeller", the restaurant in the Belgian area.

That pavilion is still to be completed, and it promises to be one of the best.

We also enjoyed the Texas show, "To Broadway With Love," which is drawing praise even from critics.

It was late when the last show was over, and as we got on a bus to go back to the main gate, we noticed several members of the cast getting on, too.

I turned to a Negro boy who had danced himself weary, and said, "Real good show."

Then I asked him how many members of the 150 or so in the cast were Texans.

"Three," he grinned.

I found out that many of the people working at the Texas Pavilion are Texans, but they hold down more important jobs like souvenir sellers, hot-dog makers, etc.

We met an usher at the Texas show who knew Linda Thompson of Olton when both were at Abilene Christian College.

Another girl working at the Texas Pavilion was Jean Morse of Lewisville, a friend of the Rex Chitwoods of Olton.

Jean showed us around the Fair quite a bit, and also tipped us off on the fireworks display.

We saw a fine Broadway play, "Mary, Mary," at the Helen Hays Theatre, and Amy thought she liked it well enough to sit through it again.

She's the same girl who wouldn't see a movie a second time, no matter how good it was the first go-round. She doesn't like television either, but she loves that Broadway!

Amy had to sacrifice a little and sit through two New York Yankee ball games Sunday.

I got a bang out of both games. The Yanks' Tom Tresh poked one in the seats with the bases full to win the first game.

We caught a subway from Yankee Stadium back to Manhattan after the doubleheader.

I sat down beside a fellow I thought looked familiar, and then I finally remembered him. It was Roger Maris.

We talked a minute and then I reached for my baseball program and asked, "You are Roger Maris, aren't you?"

He shook his head negatively and I stuck my program back in my pocket.

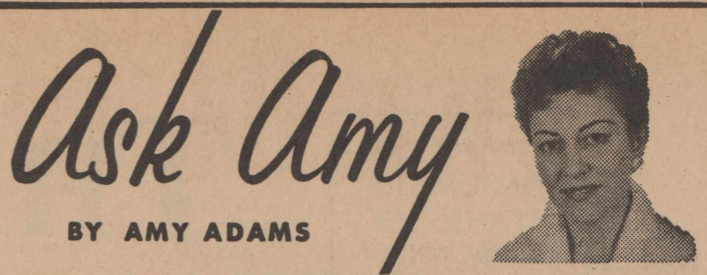

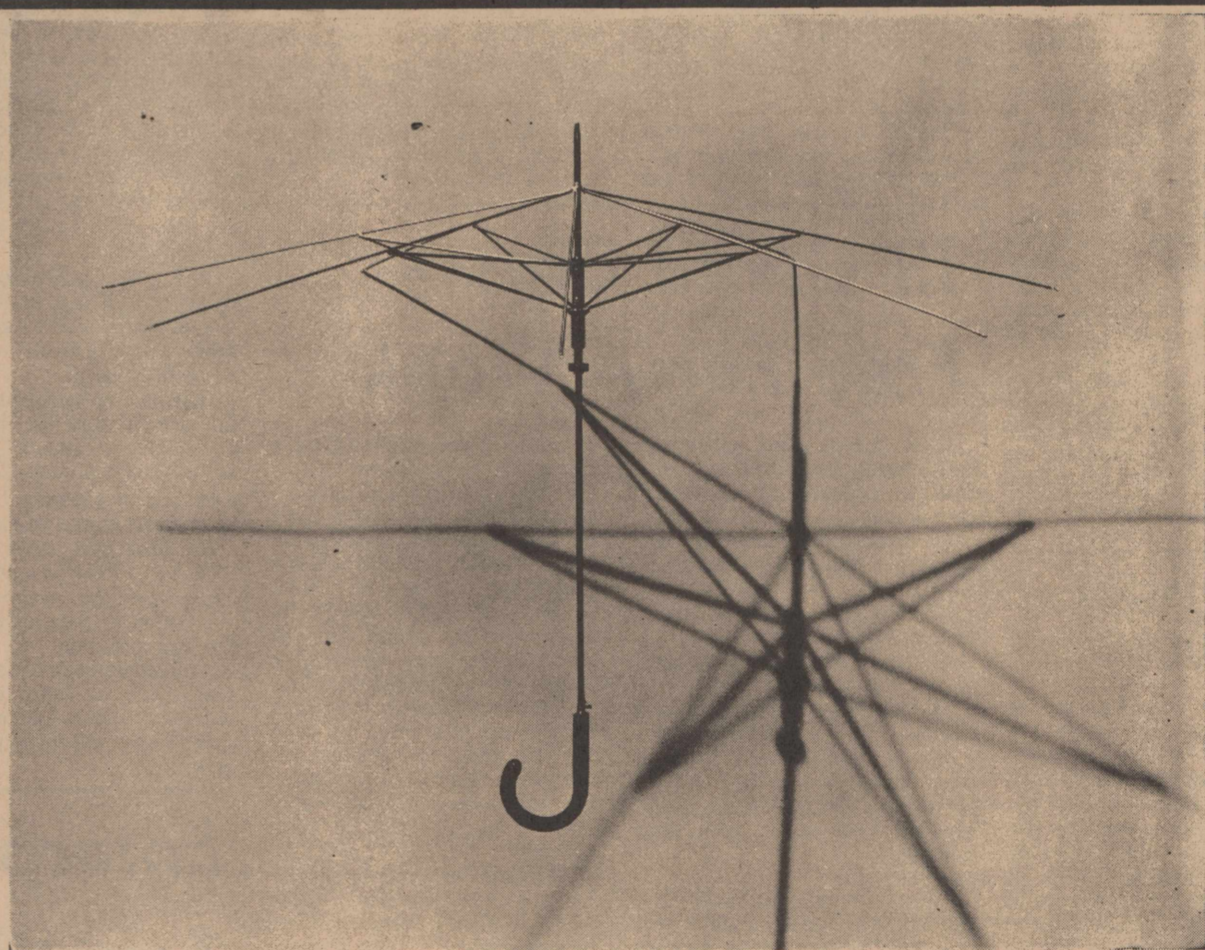

1 tsp. cinnamon

2 c. warm water
1 tbs. sugar
1 tsp. salt
1/4 lb. butter or oleo
Dissolve yeast in water and add sugar, salt, butter or oleo, and use enough flour to make a stiff dough.
Roll out dough thin and put liquid over the dough and roll up in a roll.
Slice pieces 1/2 inch thick and put in a pan and let rise about 30 minutes. Then bake at 400 degrees, until brown.
