Rally To Small

An Editorial Urging Attendance At Great Political Caucus Here Saturday Night

What should be the greatest political rally ever held in Lubbock or on the South Plains is scheduled here tomorrow night when Senator Clint C. Small, of Wellington, candidate for the Democratic nomination as governor, brings his campaign to this section.

At the zenith of a whirlwind drive throughout the far-flung expanses of Texas, Senator Small comes home, one of the favored aspirants to the office of chief executive. From every corner of the South Plains will come serious-minded citizens to hear his address, to learn of his plans to fill the office and to once again establish order in the party which has long been a prime factor in the development of the state.

Upon West Texas and this part of West Texas there lies the responsibility of returning a great majority to the Panhandle leader. With this area enrolled under his banner in the home stretch, it should be, Senator Small will coast into the second primary and will defeat any opponent in the state-wide run-off.

Skeptical people, who earlier in the race predicted that a West Texan "cannot be elected governor," have seen the Small zephyr grow to a whirlwind of strength until political straws have been blown aside and the Wellington man stands in a position of power as the candidates for governor swing into the home stretch.

CHARGES WILL ECHO RIOTING

TWENTY-THREE ARE TO BE NAMED IN ERICK DISTURBANCES

(By Associated Press)

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 18.—Deputy United States Marshal were preparing today to leave for Erick where they will serve warrants on 23 Beckham county citizens charged with driving negroes from their homes in a complaint signed by Roy Lewis, United States district attorney. Some of those charged were said to be Beckham county deputy sheriffs.

Lewis' complaint resulted from a conference held in his office yesterday in which 12 Erick citizens alleged laxity on the part of local officials and applied for federal protection from the terrorism in and about their city.

300 Driven Away

Rioting during which approximately 300 negroes were driven from the community under threat, following the arrest of Jesse Lee Washington, negro, for the slaying of Mrs. Henry Vaughan, who formerly lived at Erick.

Lewis said he had information that the negroes not only had been driven from their homes, but some of their property had been confiscated.

NEGRO PLEADS NOT GUILTY TO CHARGE

WHEELER, July 18.—In the Gray county jail today, Jesse Lee Washington, negro, awaited trial in Judge W. R. Ewing's district court at Miami on July 28, on charges of murder in the slaying of Mrs. Henry Vaughan, farm wife beaten to death last Friday near Shamrock.

Four state rangers and seven peace officers yesterday brought the negro to the station with quiet dispatch, for arraignment before Judge Ewing. He pleaded not guilty and Judge Ewing appointed E. S. Ritchey, Miami attorney, to defend the negro. The negro was hurriedly returned to Pampa, before it became known that he had been in Wheeler.

Grand Saline Woman Suffers Loss Of Leg

GRAND SALINE, July 18.—A woman who was injured by a moving excursion train yesterday, coming from the railroad opening celebration at Van, Miss Dee Herron, 33, of Grand Saline, suffered the loss of a portion of her right leg and faced a possible loss of her right arm. The leg was amputated about four inches above the ankle.

DEATH CUTS AXE STROKE SHORT

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., July 18.—Walter Garbarczyk, 33, dropped dead today as he swung an ax at the head of his stepson, John Jarosik, whom he had cornered in the rear yard of a neighbor.

Police said Garbarczyk attacked the boy in a drunken fury. He had struck several blows during a chase which started in their home.

Small Rally Here Expected To Be Largest

GATHERING TO BE ATTENDED BY HUNDREDS

PROGRAM IS SLATED TO OPEN AT 7:30 WITH BAND CONCERT

With word being received daily from surrounding cities and towns of growing interest in the South Plains Clint Small rally, to be held in this city tomorrow night, officials in charge of the event today expressed opinions that the affair will be the largest attended political demonstration ever staged in this section of Texas.

Mr. Small will arrive in the city late Saturday afternoon while his wife will arrive earlier in the day and is scheduled as honor guest at several social functions during the afternoon and evening.

High School Band to Play

The program will start with a band concert at 7:30 o'clock by the Lubbock High school Western band which will last for one hour. The band will play from the balcony of Hotel Lubbock and seats will be arranged for listeners on Avenue K, between Main and Broadway.

City Attorney E. L. Klett will introduce Mr. Small from a platform to be erected on Avenue K. The speaking will start at 8:30 o'clock and immediately following, a dinner is to be given Senator and Mrs. Small.

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HIGHWAY MAY BE EXTENDED

SINGLETARY IS MAKING LOG TO CHIHUAHUA, MEXICO

Indicating that proposed plans of Carlsbad Cavern Highway officials to make of the cavern route an international connecting link, will be rushed to completion, R. A. Singletary, manager, Good Roads division of the Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce, was in Lubbock last night en route to El Paso where he will start logging the route from that city to Chihuahua, Mexico.

Route of the highway, which recently was designated as U. S. Highway No. 62, from Mayville, Kentucky, to El Paso already has been logged and maps are being prepared for distribution. With completion of the log into Mexico the maps will be printed.

Talks With Hankins

Mr. Singletary, who has been connected with the Carlsbad route since its establishment, last night discussed plans for additional improvement to the road with J. H. Hankins, president, and A. B. Davis, secretary, of the highway association.

From Mayville, Ky. to Oklahoma City, a distance of 1,071 miles all of the road is either paved or grave with exception of 42 miles of dirt. Work is going forward on various portions of the road from Oklahoma City to El Paso, a distance of 777 miles. The new addition to the route into Mexico will be a distance of about 150 miles.

Fifty Are Believed Killed In Tremors

RANGOON, Burma, July 18.—Fifty persons were believed today to have been killed or severely injured in severe earthquake 60 miles north of Rangoon, in the Tharavaddy district of Burma. Many houses collapsed. The village of Letpadan was badly shaken.

RUSSIA PLANNING DEFENSE PROGRAM

MOSCOW, July 18.—Soviet Russia expects to have 17,000,000 of its citizens engaged in some form of military and aviation activity by October 1, 1933, under a new five year plan for aerial and chemical defense announced today by the volunteer defense society.

About 4,500,000 persons, the announcement continues, will receive military preparation and 2,000,000 will be given rifle drill. In all 6,000,000 persons will be instructed in aerial and chemical defense.

There will be 25,000 scientists engaged in every branch of aerial and chemical warfare. Women will not be forgotten, and 5,500,000 laboring women will be given courses in elementary military science, gas warfare and Red Cross nursing.

HEAT RAGING IN CALIFORNIA

SEVEN DEATHS BLAMED ON HEAT; DESERT HAS BLASTS

(By Associated Press)

LOS ANGELES, July 18.—Southern California today faced the prospect of hot blasts sweeping in from the Mojave desert to intensify the heat responsible for seven deaths in five days and the first death by sunstroke recorded here in twenty-three years.

Weather bureau officials said an area of low pressure over Arizona and lower California would reach this vicinity today, taking the place of a breeze which somewhat alleviated the discomfort here yesterday.

Oil Worker Dies

The death of Lloyd Eldridge, 28, oil field worker, prostrated while on a derrick at Monte Bello was announced by the Los Angeles county coroner's office as the first death from sunstroke recorded here in 23 years.

Three of the deaths attributed to heat were in Imperial Valley, below sea level. The mercury hovered at 110 throughout the Imperial Valley and reached 103 at Ontario, Cal. Riverside sweltered under a 100 degree temperature and Pomona experienced 98 degrees.

In the Coachella valley, southeast of here 106 degrees was registered at Indio, but the humidity was low.

FERGUSONS TO INVADE LOVE'S HOME TONIGHT

STERLING AND BONDS ISSUE PLAN STILL STORM CENTER

(By Associated Press)

Former Governors Miriam A. and James E. Ferguson planned a speaking rally Friday night in Dallas, stronghold of Hoover-Democratic sentiment, and home city of Thomas B. Love and Lieut. Gov. Barry Miller.

The engagement would be for the second invasion of the North Texas city by a gubernatorial candidate. Ross S. Sterling of Houston having spoken there Wednesday night. That Dallas would be one of the hardest-fought battle grounds was the prediction of many political observers.

Sterling Is Attacked

In an address last night at Abilene for his wife's candidacy former Governor Ferguson centered his attack on Sterling and the proposed \$350,000,000 highway bond issue. He mentioned Senator Love and Governor Dan Moody in occasional jibes but held that other gubernatorial candidates were "not worth discussing."

He outlined his own plan to build cheaper roads under a gasoline tax plan giving "3.000 miles of road and no debt."

Love, speaking at Waco, devoted most of his remarks to denial of charges which he said had been made by Jim Young that he was a "carpet bagger" to a defense and outline of his World War service record, and to denial that he had

MAYOR OF RALLS DIES EARLY TODAY

RALLS, July 18.—J. M. Debolt, 71, former mayor and prominent citizen of Ralls, died early today in Alamosa, Colorado, according to information received in this city at noon.

Mr. Debolt with his wife was on an annual vacation trip when he became ill, suffering of appendicitis. He was taken to an Alamosa hospital but efforts to save his life were of no avail.

Engaged in the lumber and building material business, Mr. Debolt also operated a gin and had considerable farm holdings near here. He served on the city commission for seven years, four of which he was mayor, from 1926 to 1929. He was president of the Ralls Chamber of Commerce during 1926.

Survivors are the widow and two children, Albert C. Debolt and Mrs. Grace Sams, both of Oklahoma City. No funeral arrangements have been made.

HALF INTEREST IN LANDRETH'S HOLDINGS SELL

TOTAL OF 2,411 ACRES INCLUDED IN DEAL; HALF IS CASH

(By Associated Press)

SAN ANGELO, July 18.—The Landreth Production Corporation of Fort Worth has sold to the Texas-United Oil company, a subsidiary of the Warner-Quinlan company, refiners, an undivided one half interest in leases on 2,415 acres in the Hobbs district of Lea county, New Mexico. The consideration was announced as \$1,250,000, one-half cash, the balance to be paid out of the purchasers' half of the first oil produced.

The deal was announced by Ed A. Landreth, president of the Landreth Production corporation of Fort Worth, in a long distance telephone message to the San Angelo Standard. The deal involves leases on 30 separate tracts and 17 pieces of royalty, totaling 822 royalty acres. Landreth will retain operation of the property.

It was said the oil would be moved by pipe line to the Texas Gulf coast, thence by boat to the Warner-Quinlan company refinery at Wabers, N. J. The line has a capacity of 25,000 barrels daily. Landreth will retain leases on approximately 17,000 acres in New Mexico.

The company has around 3,200 barrels daily production in the Permian pool in Ector county and a total daily average production of about 3,000 barrels. The bulk of its production outside Ector county is in Taylor-Link field in Pecos county.

VETS TO GET WAR BENEFITS

ARMY OF INFIRM HAS BEGUN MARCH TO BUREAU

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, July 18.—An army of infirm men has begun a march on government headquarters in 54 cities of the United States, seeking to share additional benefits provided for World War veterans in the closing hours of the last congress.

Colonel George E. Injams, assistant director of the veterans' bureau, said today that thousands already have "hoisted regional headquarters" throughout the country to apply for disability compensation under the new law.

So thoroughly prepared was Uncle Sam that the government machinery will begin grinding out benefits before another month passes.

Additional claim for war scars provided in the new act will amount to about \$25,251,000 by the end of the next year, it is estimated and it will increase yearly, reaching about \$50,000,000 by 1935. These sums are in addition to the half billion dollars now being spent by the veterans bureau.

About 156,000 former soldiers made eligible for relief for the first time since the war ended will share the new bounty by the end of 1931. They will increase in number annually, reaching about 380,000 in five years.

The new act provides that any honorably discharged veterans now disabled shall receive an allowance from Uncle Sam. Previously, he had to demonstrate his infirmity was the result of war service. The only conditions for receiving the relief is that the disability be permanent, and not the result of wilful misconduct.

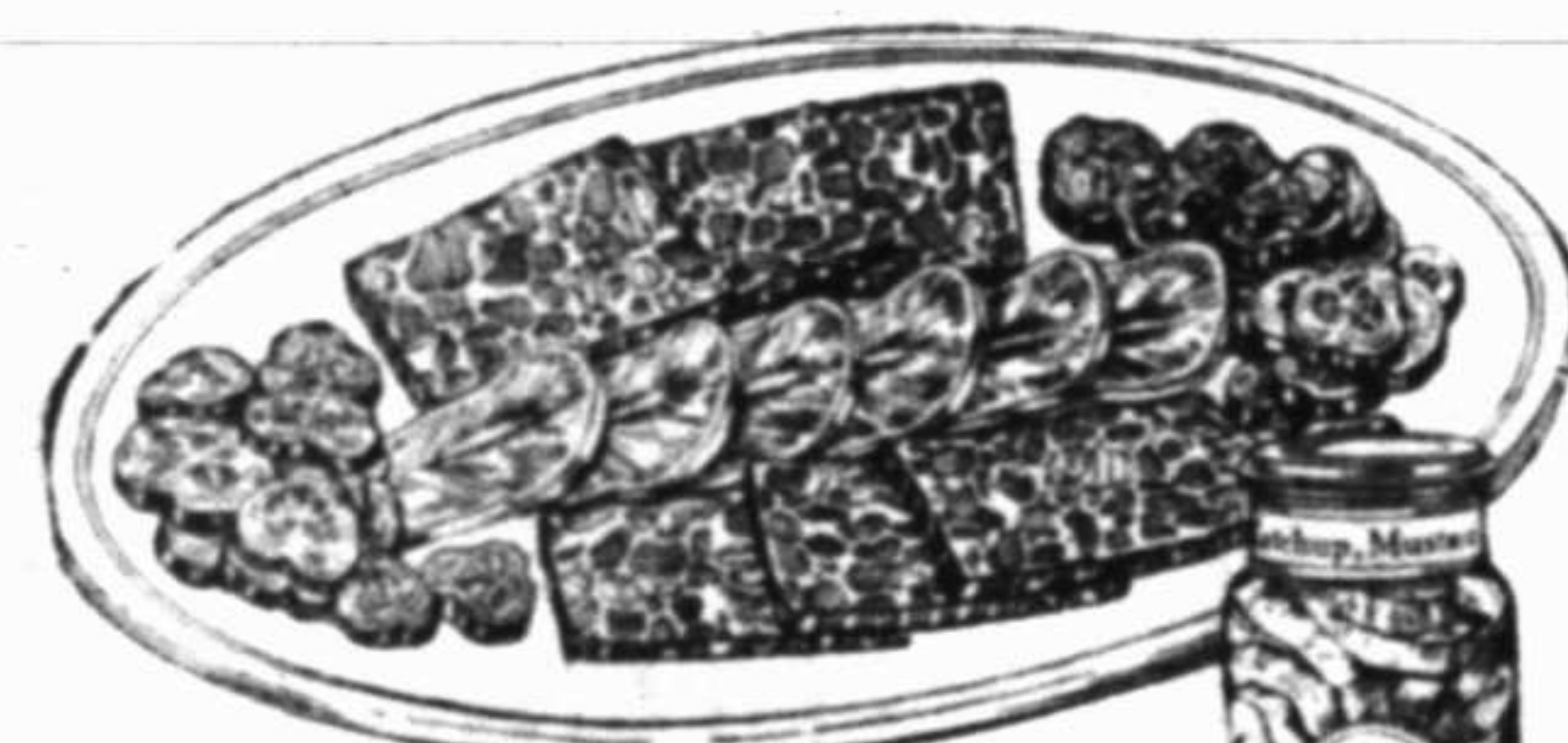

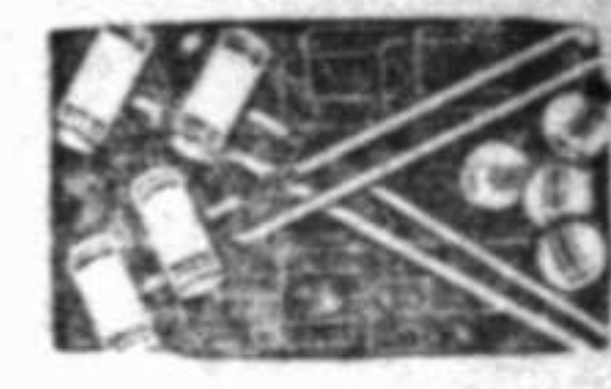

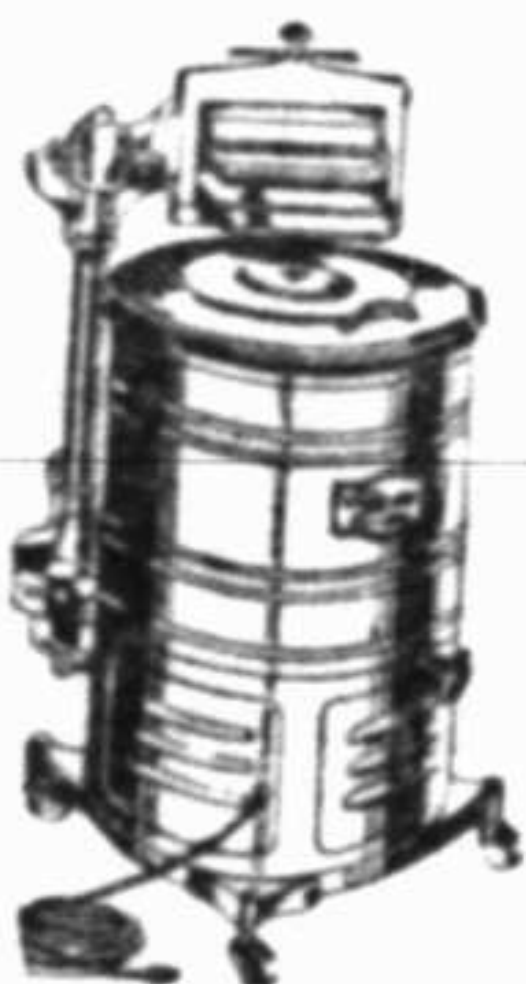

The current western trip of the eastern clubs of the American league is proving rather painful to the Washington Senators but profitable to the rest. The Senators started a losing streak when they started west and the result has dropped them clear out of first place and into a somewhat precarious second.

The Senators left home as league leaders and now are 31-2 games behind first place and only four ahead of the third place New York Yankees. They split a series with Detroit and so far have dropped two out of three to Cleveland while their rivals have been sweeping through a steady stream of victories. Washington dropped another close encounter yesterday, going down 4 to 3 before the Indians.

The champions and leaders, the Philadelphia Athletics, made it seven straight wins, six in the west, by plugging out another victory over the Chicago White Sox, 12 to 8. The Sox again had a bit of the better of the hitting, getting 15 blows to Philadelphia's 14, but made few serious threats until the ninth, when they scored five runs. The Yankees aided themselves and the Boston Red Sox as well by hammering the St. Louis Browns for 21 hits and a 16 to 7 victory, making it four straight wins for the Yanks and seven successive defeats for the Browns.

Besides improving their position, the Yankees shoved St. Louis into last place as Boston trounced the Detroit Tigers, 12 to 2. Hod Lisenbee pitched a fine game to earn the honor of moving Boston out of the cellar and his mates backed him with 18 hits, five by Earl Webb. The Sox now are a full game ahead of St. Louis and only a half game behind Chicago.

Chicago and Brooklyn again were the leading lions in the National league's arena and they tore at each other for 13 innings before the Cubs finally gained a 6 to 3 decision that reduced Brooklyn's lead from three to two games. The final blowoff came when Dazzy Vance, easing the relief hurling role in a great battle gave four singles, three of them of the scratch variety, and the Cubs converted them into three runs. Guy Bush did a great finishing job, giving the Robins only three hits in 5-2-3 innings after home runs by Phelps and Finn had enabled Brooklyn to make it an overtime game.

New York and St. Louis staging their own crucial series with third

place at stake, played second division baseball, committing nine errors between them. Clarence Mitchell held the Cards more or less in check through the early innings and the Giants won out, 12 to 9, although they were out-hit, 20 to 15. The victory gave New York a margin of two games.

The first three clubs of the second division drew a bit closer together in their private race as Pittsburgh gained a 6 to 3 decision over the Boston Braves and the Cincinnati Reds played havoc with Philadelphia pitching for a 14 to 9 victory. The Pirates now are only a half game behind the fifth place Braves with the Reds another game back.

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MANDELL IS KNOCKED OUT BY YOUNG AL

YOUTHFUL CHALLENGER SWARMS ALL OVER CHAMPION EARLY

NEW YORK, July 18.—The crown of the lightweights today adorns the thick black thatch of 21-year-old Al Slinger, whose sensational one round knockout of Sammy Mandell last night brought back the 135-pound championship to New York for the first time since Benny Leonard retired.

The boy from the Bronx and protégé of Leonard, making his title bid at the Yankee Stadium, crushed Mandell, champion for four years, in one minute and 46 seconds. A crowd of 25,000 witnessed the match.

Floored 4 Times
Slinger floored Mandell four times for successive counts of two, seven, four and ten, and the champion took the final count flat on his back.

Mandell did not land a solid punch and was punched into a state of helplessness before he had time to make even a gesture. He bore no resemblance to the fighter who two years ago beat so dangerous a puncher as Jimmy McLarnin. He won applause from the crowd only for his gameness.

Texas Conference games, getting their practice with Southwestern Conference teams. The time is ripe for a good coach to step in at Tech and build up a team that will not be refused admittance to any conference that might be organized in this section. But it will take a good coach; one who is not afraid, and one who can stand the criticism that will naturally come to whoever undertakes the Texas Tech job. That coach has been found, in the opinion of this humble one, in Fete Cawthon, who comes with every good recommendation that is possible for a coach to have under the circumstances. Having been more or less closely associated with Cawthon as an official for the past three seasons, and having studied his activity as a coach, we are here to say that Tech officials would have to go a far piece to select a man with a greater knowledge of the game and how to teach it than Mr. Cawthon.

This far in advance little can be said about the strength or weak-

ness of the teams in the two state loops, since the rosters are subject to change even before school starts. The Southwest Conference, however, among whose teams the Lubbock gridsters face their keenest competition, is fairly settled, and few changes will be made ere the beginning of the season. A tight race will be on among teams of that loop, with nearly every team conceding a chance to win the rag. Intersectional games will pay a large part in the schedules of the Southwest loop teams, with Southern Methodist University, Baylor University, and Texas A. and M. holding the limelight in foreign fields. Every team in the conference with the exception of Arkansas, who loses many of their veterans, and Rice, who is never in the thick of the contest, will be battling on fairly even territory for the championship.

Texas Christian University, winner of the 1929 pennant, hopes to repeat their performance of last fall and have good chances of so doing. At on time or another nearly every

team in the Southwest loop have had the same chances, but not one time has a team won the championship twice in succession since the conference was organized in 1913. The field this fall will be stronger and more evenly matched than ever before. In the opinion of state scribes, and fans of the section will be entertained with the greatest display of college football in recent years. Aside from the regular conference schedule, three of the games will hold the spot in big intersectional games. October 4 will be the big day, with the S. M. U. Mustangs meeting the Notre Dame Micks at South Bend, Baylor's Bears charging into the camp of Pest Welch at Purdue University, Lafayette, and the Aggies advancing to meet the Nebraska Cornhuskers at Lincoln. There will be other games with intersectional twangs. S. M. U. plays the Navy and the University of Indiana; the Aggies meet Tulane; Rice meets Sewanee, Iowa State, and Arizona; the Baylor Bears play Iowa State and Oklahoma Baptists; and Texas Univer-

sity meets the University of Oklahoma. To the casual observer Lubbock's entry in the South Plains baseball league is merely an entry; an outfit to give the other teams some practice, considering their present rating and running in the loop. However, there is more to consider than the fact that the Hubbers are helping other teams to the top. Manager Dutch Luenberger has had a world of hard luck with his team, through no fault of his own. Lubbock, by far the largest city in the loop, offers less support to its team than any town in the circuit. As a result, members of the team have a more or less indifferent attitude, and the club has suffered frequent shakeups in the lineup. At the first of the season Lubbock had the strongest team in the loop, but the city apparently did not realize it or is not a natural baseball center. With his original club, Luenberger could have been pressing the top of the ladder. It has long since been learned that comparative scores are

no criterion of the strength or weakness of a team, invert the first six games, defeated Lamesa Wednesday following the victory of the latter over Lubbock last Sunday. An interesting feature of the games Sunday and Wednesday at the local park was the mere handful of spectators. FOREST FIRE FIGHT BEGUN

NATION'S TIMBER IS ENDANGERED TO BIG LOSS

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, July 17.—With smoke from score of forest fires still hovering over parts of the east and west, United States forest service officials said today this summer's fight to save the nation's forests had just begun.

Telegrams by the forest service from its various outposts during the past week, but not yet made public, showed the cost of fighting the approximately 8,000 fires breaking out in the national forests during the last fiscal year to be more than \$3,200,000.

Some idea of the spread and frequency of the fires which constitute one of the major problems of the forest service was disclosed in telegrams received yesterday.

Others are ignited while more than 700 men were fighting fires in three national forests in Washington and Oregon, a dispatch from the Portland forest service said, approximately 200 additional fires were ignited by lightning in national preserves in the same state.

At the same time, officials in charge of the eastern forests reported smoke still hovered over the Unaka and Monongahela forest preserves in Virginia and West Virginia from fires just brought under control there.

Other telegrams just received showed that since July 1 the California forest service has combated more than 300 national forest fires, of which 244 were caused intentionally or carelessly by man. During the present week, the telegram said seven incendiary fires were brought under control in the Klamath forest only after 300 acres

had been burned over. Other recent fires were reported from the Medicine Bow National forest in Wyoming, which required more than 400 men to subdue it, and from the Tanager forest in Alaska.

Probe Of Hidalgo Poll Taxes Asked

AUSTIN, July 17.—Investigation of poll taxes in Hidalgo county by the attorney general was asked today by a group of McAllen citizens headed by Gordon Griffin, one time candidate of the Good Government League there.

The assistants to the attorney general with whom Griffin's party conferred in two sessions refused to give any indication of what was asked or whether the attorney general would enter the county as he did recently in Bexar county.

Griffin described conditions in Hidalgo as "worse than Bexar county." It was presumed that no action would be taken without conferences with Robert L. Bobbitt, attorney general who is now on a campaign tour which will not be ended until election day.

Lindy And Tunney Named In Will

NEW YORK, July 18.—Charles A. Lindbergh and Gen. Tunney, former heavyweight champion, were named in the will of Wylie P. Jameson, filed here today for probate, but the \$20,000 which they were to have divided under certain conditions will go to another beneficiary.

The testament provided that if Mr. Jameson's son, Wylie B. M. Jameson, of Memphis, Tenn., should die before his father, the \$20,000 should go to Lindbergh and Tunney, but the boy who is now nine, survives his father and therefore will receive the money.

Andrew Johnson has been the only ex-president of the United States to sit as a member of the American Senate.

PHILADELPHIA CENSUS SHORT

BROTHERLY LOVE CITY LESS THAN TWO MILLION

PHILADELPHIA, July 18.—Hopes that Philadelphia's population would reach the 2,000,000 mark were shattered today when the final figures were announced.

The complete tabulation showed a population of 1,991,456, an increase of 137,679, or 7.54 per cent, over 1920. A steady drift to the suburbs and to nearby New Jersey communities was held responsible for the small increase. The city, however, continues to hold third position in the cities of the country, being surpassed in population only by New York and Chicago.

Would Have Been
Harry J. Imber, chairman of the local board of census supervisors, said he agreed with Mayor Harry A. Mackey that the census figures within the city limits had been

enumerated the population would be substantially over the 2,000,000 mark. He said he felt that thousands of persons had been missed by the enumerators.

Mr. Imber obtained permission from Washington to get 20,000 personal schedules of census to assist the mayor in re-checking the city. About 7,000 schedules remaining in the local census office also will be placed at the disposal of the city authorities. Mayor Mackey has ordered police to make a special canvass of four wards in west Philadelphia.

Hannicutt Given Support On Stand

SAN ANTONIO, July 18.—(P)—Hearty approval of the stand taken by Captain Lee V. Hannicutt, Alamo Post American Legion commander, in severely criticizing the actions of the state committee while it was engaged in conducting an investigation into the 1928 national convention of the American Legion in San Antonio was registered by the 25 Alamo Post officials attending a luncheon here.

Captain Hannicutt, in an informal talk, made clear his stand, and 25 officers, consisting of past post commanders and members of the executive committee passed a reso-

lution to protest the actions of the state investigating committee while in San Antonio.

At the meeting Captain Hannicutt told the officers present that State Commander Ernest Cox speaking for the investigating committee, had promised to investigate on the state department's liability in the case and that it would not enter into personalities and would give absolutely no publicity to the investigation.

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PROGRESS IN BOARD'S PLAN POINTED OUT

MEMBERS RELUCTANT ON WHETHER GAIN OF LOSS MADE

BY FRANK L. WELLER

Associated Press Farm Editor

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—The farm board looked back over the last 12 months of its existence today, frankly reluctant to say whether it had gained or lost the initial encounter with the accumulated ills of agriculture.

The time has been entirely too short, members said, to determine success or failure of the multitudinous projects launched under

the agricultural marketing act and which, to spell victory or defeat, must be viewed in the aggregate. Particularly is the time too short, they said, considering their program deals with the readjustment of 141 years of agricultural practices for which it took congress eight years to agree on a formula.

Express Satisfaction
Individually, members expressed satisfaction with the progress they had made in eliminating competition between cooperatives, with emergency stabilization of wheat and cotton, operation of nationally-controlled marketing units and with the system of financing the farmers' efforts to rehabilitate their bargaining power.

The year, they felt, has proven above everything else that in all the board does its actions are circumscribed by the requirements of a two-way program. It contemplates emergency operations—the handling of things to obtain immediate results—and long time operations, or the focusing of innumerable projects into an economic advantage under which the farmer can control the distribution of his own projects.

The two-way program is reflected in both loans and stabilization measures. Supplemental commodity loans—those made to enable operators to finance the immediate marketing of their products—usually are seasonal and to be repaid within the year, while the facility loans extend over a long period of time and are designed to finance the acquisition of physical properties for which the principal need is still to develop.

Stabilization embraces such emergency action as that taken to remove from the market depressing quantities of wheat and cotton and on the other hand the natural stabilization that results from coordination of cooperative marketing.

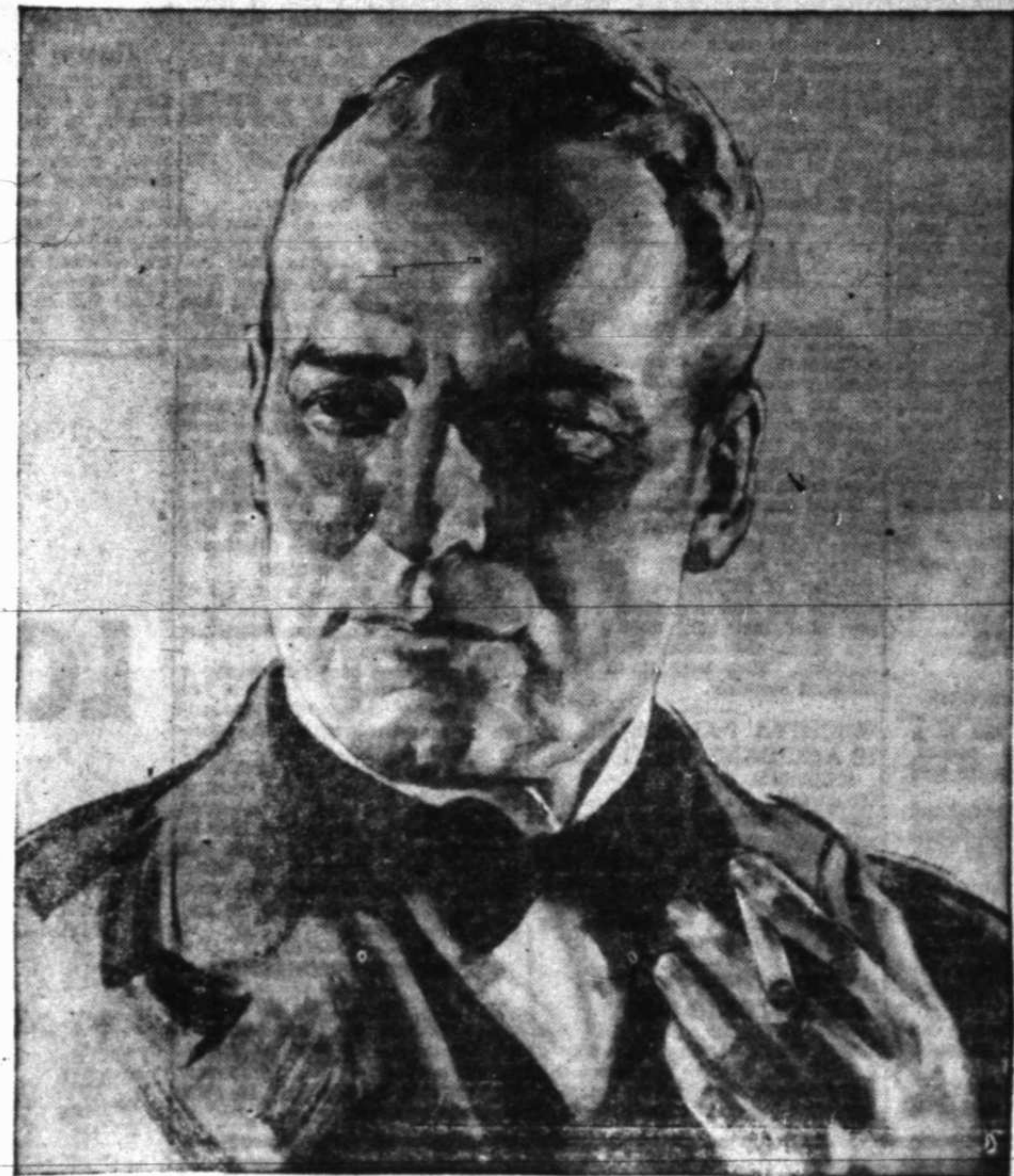

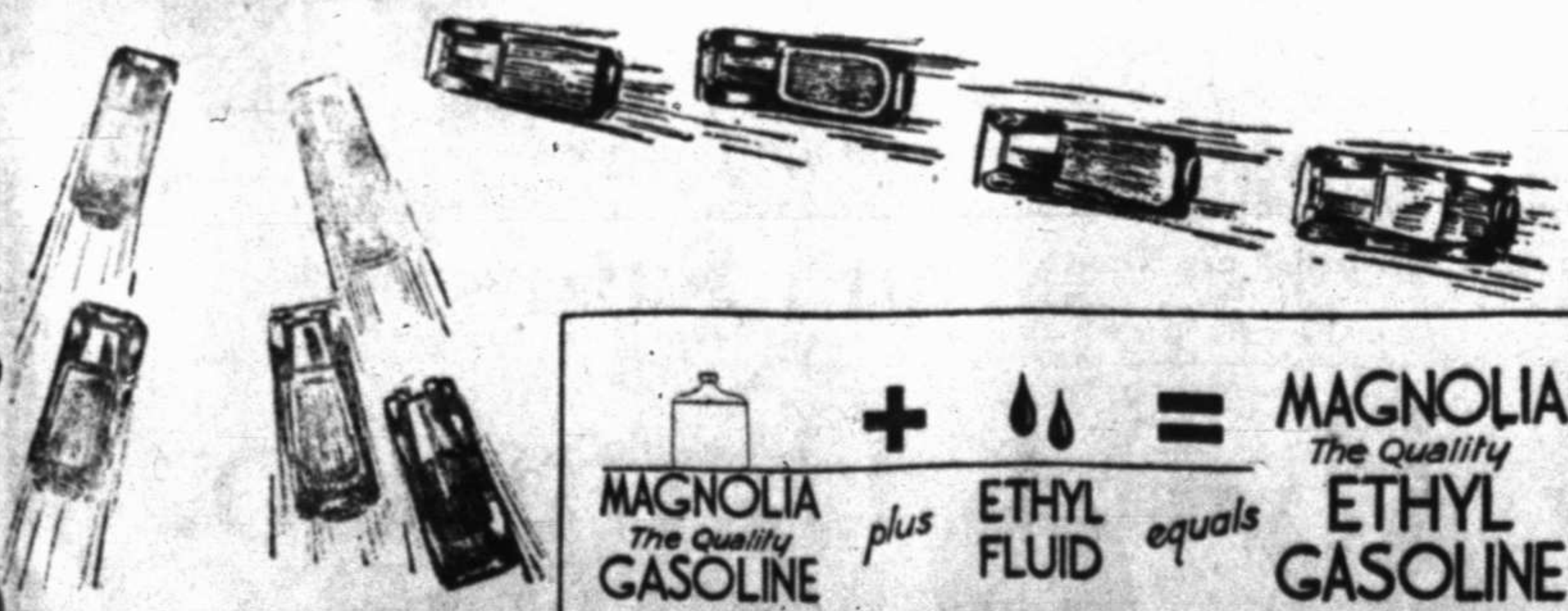

Barry Miller again argued against the road bond issue in a talk at Bryan. "The people of Texas are not going to be stampeded into mortgaging their homes and farms to build highways, no matter how much is spent in advertising this \$350,000,000 issue," he said. This afternoon he expected to speak at Groesbeck.

Clint C. Small spoke at Rock Springs, saying that if elected governor he would work to obtain legislation to assist the federal farm board in its co-operative marketing efforts. His program called for an address tonight at Pampa.

Taking his campaign offensive into Harrison and the Rio Grande valley, Jim Young last night assailed Thomas B. Love for the asserted statement that "negro votes in East Texas helped the Democratic victory in 1928." He declared that in Kaufman county, which polled 8,000 Democratic votes, only four negroes voted and all were Republicans.

TAXATION OF RESOURCES IS MOODY'S PLAN

GOVERNOR IS HEARD IN TALK WEDNESDAY TO SCHOOL MEN

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, July 18.—Taxation of the state's natural resources for the perfection and continued support of Texas' educational system was urged by Governor Moody Wednesday in an address to members of the state board and president and administrators of state colleges.

The address was at a meeting called to discuss what steps could be taken toward coordinating the work of state colleges with the state board of education.

Duty in Requests

The governor declared it was the duty of all school boards of regents or directors to state in their requests for funds, from where that money should come, and added that in his opinion men who are depleting the state of its natural riches should be called upon the support the schools.

In the present gubernatorial campaign he said, some candidates have said that if elected they would reduce the expenses of the state. This is a foolish notion, he declared, because state expenses are mounting and will continue to mount, so long as the state's population increases.

Goes To New York

Much of the profits taken out of natural resources he declared "goes to build brown stone mansions along Fifth Avenue."

The governor also advocated a unified educational program in which the county would be responsible for all schools within the county with the state aiding. While some of the larger cities have some of the finest schools in the country, just outside the city in the same county with the fine school may be found a one-room school with one teacher and students in seven grades, he said, declaring it should be the city's responsibility to improve these schools.

NEW YORK REPORT

NEW YORK, July 18 (AP)—Cotton opened steady at an advance of 5 to 9 points today on reports of continued dry weather in the central and western belts. There may have been a little selling on the relatively easy showing of Liverpool, but offerings were comparatively light and the market showed increasing steadiness after the publication of the weather map which, according to local map readers, held out no promise of a break in the central and western drought.

At the end of the first half hour, this market was about 5 to 16

points net higher, with the more active new crop positions showing net advances of 8 to 16 points.

NEW ORLEANS REPORT

NEW ORLEANS, July 18 (AP)—The cotton market had an easy opening, July started 9 points down, owing to the issue here of additional July notices for 2,100 bales. Later months showed initial trades of one point down to one up. The market became more active after the start and advanced in sympathy with New York, owing to fears of increasing damage by drought.

Shorts covered freely and found contracts scarce. July traded up to 12.50, October to 13.50 and December to 13.20, or 13 to 15 points above yesterday's close. At the end of the first hour the market was steady and near the highs.

Santa Fe To Aid In Paying For Project

Announcement was made yesterday that formal request on the Santa Fe railroad has been made by the City of Lubbock that it pay for its share of construction of a 78-inch storm sewer underneath the company's right-of-way across Avenue K.

Cost of the railroad's share of the work is estimated at \$3,350.26. The storm sewer, 3,700 feet in length, extends from block 15 of Acuff Heights northwest to Avenue K, north of the Santa Fe, thence

north to Eighth street where it joins a present sewer. All of the sewer with exception of two blocks, or about 600 feet, will be 78 inches in diameter.

Original estimated cost was \$62,000. Several changes in the first planned specifications brought this cost in the neighborhood of \$37,000.
