The Morning Avalanche Menu for the Day

BREAKFAST—Raspberries, cereal, cream, plain omelet, oven toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Potatoes on surprise, lettuce sandwich, lead chocolate.

DINNER—Casserole of chicken and vegetables, fresh peach salad, blueberry pie, milk, coffee.

Perfectly ripe fruit should be chosen for the peach salad in the dinner menu. One whole peach is allowed for each serving. Whipped cream, chopped nuts and finely cut marshmallows are added to mayonnaise which is poured over the halved and stoned peaches. A cube of bright jelly or maraschino jelly is used to garnish the salad.

Potatoes are prepared as follows: Four smooth good sized potatoes, 4 eggs, 1 tablespoon butter, white of 1 egg, salt and pepper.

Wash potatoes and rub over with butter. Bake until done. Cut a slice lengthwise about two-thirds up on each potato. Scoop out enough potato from the large section to make a cavity large enough to hold an egg. Rub inside of potato with butter, sprinkle with salt and pepper and drop an egg into each cavity. Chop potato from top and add to that removed from other sections. Run through ricer and beat in butter, salt and pepper and white of egg beaten stiff. Bake potatoes covered with eggs in a moderate oven until eggs are barely set. Then cover with mashed potato, piling the mixture roughly over the eggs and return to the oven a few minutes longer to brown the top. Garnish with a sprig of parsley and serve.

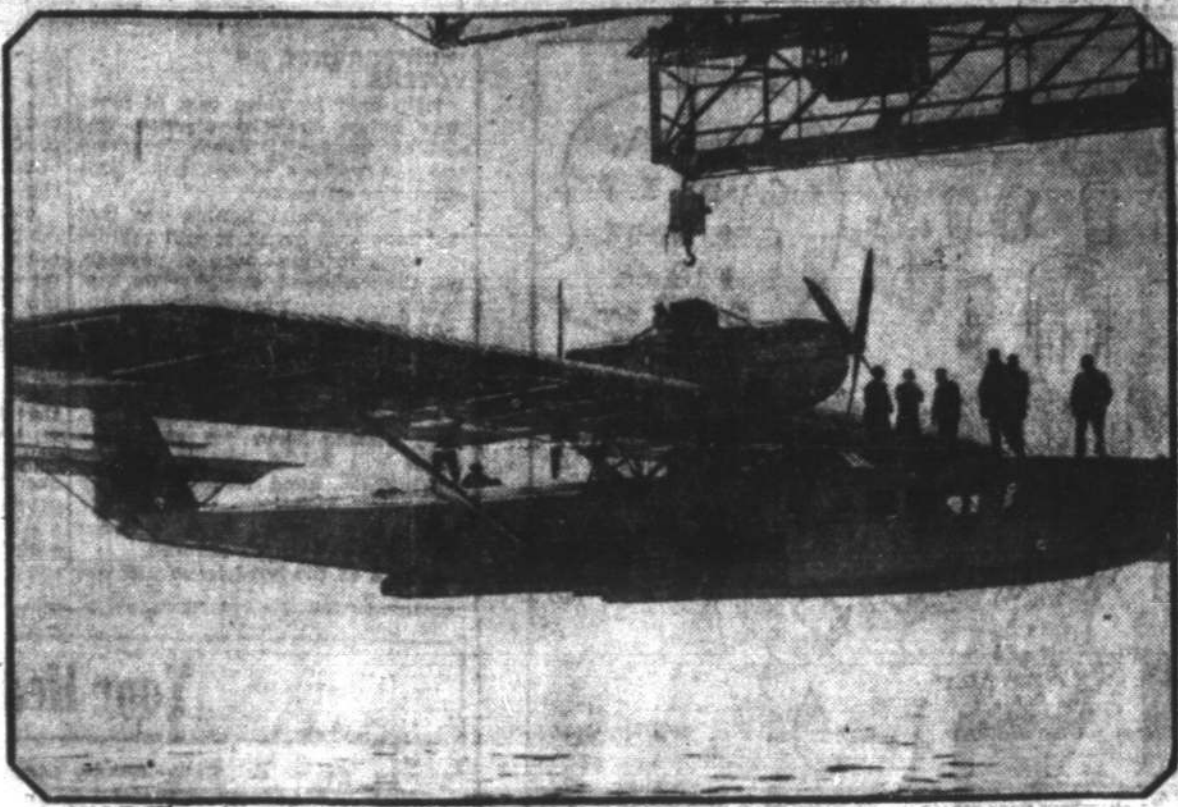

Now Comes the 60-Passenger Flying Boat



The huge new all-metal Dornier "Super-Wal" flying boat, with capacity for 60 passengers, is pictured above. The plane was tested recently at Friedrichshafen, Germany. It is capable of maintaining a speed of 150 kilometers an hour, and is equipped with two 500-horsepower Rolls Royce motor engines in tandem. A plane similar to this will be used by Captain F. T. Courtney, British flyer, in his trans-Atlantic flight scheduled for the near future.

INFANT NAVAL ARM ACQUIRES RANK WITH FLYING ADMIRALS IN VOGUE

WASHINGTON, July 20.—Although it is relatively an infant in the service, naval aviation is acquiring rank and stature.

For some years the thousands of flying evoked a picture of youth, daring and a bit reckless. But now the aviator is being taken more seriously, the number of senior officers who are qualified pilots or observers is increasing rapidly, and steps are being taken to add many more to the list.

Until President Coolidge approved the June recommendations of the navy selection board for promotion, only two aviation officers, W. A. Moffett and N. E. Felt, held the rank of rear admiral. When Congress confirms the selection board's recommendations, there will be six. Captain Frank H. E. Tamm, Joseph M. Reeves, Henry V. Butler and J. J. Faby have been chosen for promotion to that rank.

Admiral Moffett, who is chief of the Bureau of Aeronautics, is qualified as a naval aviation observer and admiral level is an aviation captain. Upon his return to instruction in aviation at the Pensacola air station, of which he is commandant, he will be an observer. Butler is an observer, and Captain Faby is an aviator. Faby at present is commander of the aircraft squadrons of the aviation fleet.

Further is supervising construction of the aircraft carrier Saratoga and Reeves is commander of the aircraft squadrons of the battle fleet with the U. S. S. Langley as his flagship. Capt. Butler has been selected to command the Saratoga, but his promotion is expected to lead to his assignment to other duties.

In addition to these high ranking officers, naval aviation can claim Captain E. J. King, the only officer in the service who holds the Navy Cross and the Distinguished Service Medal, who has just completed his course at Pensacola; Captain A. W. Marshall, designated as both aviator and observer, and Captain R. W. Steele, Jr., aviator. Orders also have been issued for examination of all line officers of the Naval Academy classes of 1927 to 1929 to determine their fitness for training, if desired by them, in heavier than air craft at Pensacola.

WASHINGTON, July 20.—Up—Five contracts for 334 new airplanes of improved types and 45 air cooled engines at a total cost of \$1,647,478 were awarded today by the navy department.

Big Spring Man Builds 10 Houses

BIG SPRING, July 20.—Plans are being made for the erection of ten or more new residences on Goliad Street in Big Spring. Fox Building of this city is having lots graded and leveled. Ten teams with scrapers are being used in the work of grading the lots. The hill north of the Big Spring sanitarium is being pulled down which adds to the attractiveness of this street. When this string of houses are completed it will partially relieve the increasing demand for housing facilities.

OIL FLOOD LOWERING THE VALUE OF SHARES

Oil shares are on the bargain counter, says Forbes magazine for the current issue.

In other comments in this digest on business, it intimates that while the oil business is now suffering from over-production, that the stocks of the major companies are not suffering as in some other industries.

The commodity price of crude oil for the 31st Continent is placed at 97 cents a barrel, a new low level. A year ago the commodity price was \$2.95 for the province.

Retail prices of gasoline for the nation averaged 19 cents a gallon, it sums up, compared to a general average of 23 cents a year ago.

WEST TEXAS OIL NEWS

CROWELL WILCOAT MAKING 100 BARRELS OF OIL

The Roxana and Paul McComb Oil Corporation's No. 1 Matthews, 12 miles south of Crowell, in Ford county, is making around 100 barrels of oil a day from a depth of 7,474 feet.

This well also had a showing of gas estimated at 13 million feet from 1,385, which burned the gas down.

MARLAND BEGINS DRILLING UPON THE FISHER WELL

BIG SPRING, July 20.—The 15th K. Fisher well, being drilled by the Marland company eight miles south of Big Spring has resumed drilling after having completed a fishing job for tools. The Donkey, on the Marland ranch about 12 miles north of Big Spring on section 41, block 33, 2 North, drilling past 2,000 feet are changing from Rotary to standard tools. This is the only location of this depth in the north part of Howard county.

Southwell on section 6, block 29, are rigging up with rotary.

East On Settles Ranch

Coke Contractor is rigging up a drill in northwest quarter of section 58, on the Settles ranch on half mile north of Settles No. 1.

The California test on the W. B. Corrie ranch is drilling around 1,000 feet.

Marland Oil company drilling on Quinn No. 1, spudding in, this test is on section 26, block 34, 1 South.

MCINTYRE TEST MAKING SLOW PROGRESS NOW

ALPINE, July 20.—The McIntyre No. 1, south of Paisano is drilling at between 200 and 400 feet. They are finding the rock very hard at present, but look for a change in the formation when they reach a greater depth. The rig has been placed at the new well on the Gage ranch near Lenox and will soon be ready to spud in. This proposition is being watched with great interest by oil men, and citizens alike, as there is a general belief that it is not to turn out a producer. It is stated that a new well will soon be started in the Green Valley, near where the former drilling was done and it is believed that the new location will prove more satisfactory than the former did. Quite a number of leases have been taken during the past month. In Jeff Davis

MAGNOLIA TO DRILL SIX WELLS IN CHALK AREA

products, including the coke from the coal, actually suffice to pay the cost of the gas.

All kinds of big businesses have their by-products, their little odds and ends that pay well. In Mr. Armour's enormous meat-factory, for instance, there are endless by-products, from pigtails which are dried and sold as a delicacy, to the hair of animals made into a powerful, valuable kind of rope.

If Mr. Armour neglected making the hair rope, or selling the pigtails, it would make a big difference in his dividends. The point for the reader is this: The individual man does not manufacture, as a rule. But we are, all of us, dealers in time.

Time is the one thing we possess. Our success depends upon the use of our time, and its by-products, the odd moments.

Each of us has a regular day's work that he does in a routine, more or less mechanical way. He does his clerking, his writing, his typewriting, or whatever it may be, so many hours per day. And that ends it.

But what about the by-product, the odd moments? Do you know that the men that have made great successes in this world are the men that have used wisely those odd moments?

Thomas A. Edison, for instance, was hammering away at a telegraph-key when he was telegraph-operator on a small salary. He didn't neglect the by-product, the odd moments. He thought, and planned, and tried between messages. And he worked out, as a by-product of his telegraph job, all the inventions that have given him millions, and given to the inhabitants of the world thousands of millions' worth of dollars in new ideas.

Benjamin Franklin in his story of his life shows an endless number of such efforts along the lines using the odd moments. In a hundred different ways he managed to make the extra hours useful and productive.

What a man does in his odd moments is not only apt to bring him profit; it is apt also to increase his mental activity.

The mind craves a change, and it often does well the unusual thing, out of the routine.

"Letting well enough alone" is a foolish motto in the life of a man who wants to get ahead. In the first place, nothing is "well enough," if you can do better. No matter how well you are doing, do better. There is an old Spanish proverb which says, "Enjoy the little you have while the fool is hunting for more."

The way to hunt for more is to utilize your odd moments. Every minute that you save by making it useful, more profitable, is so much added to your life and its possibilities. Every minute lost is a neglected by-product—once gone, you will never get it back.

Think of the odd quarter of an hour in the morning before breakfast, the odd half-hour after breakfast, remember the chance to read or figure, or think with concentration on your own career, that comes now and again in the day. All of these opportunities are the by-products of your daily experience. Use them, and you may find what many of the greatest concerns have found, that the real profit is in the utilization of the by-products.

Among the aimless, unsuccessful or worthless, you often hear talk about "killing time." The man who is always killing time is really killing his own chances in life; while the man who is destined to success is the man who makes time live by making it useful.

SOMETHING FOR NOTHING

To many people spend all their efforts trying to get something for nothing, when they know, if they have even common reasoning powers, that this can not be done. Of course a thief may rob a bank and gain a wealth of gold, but he paid for it—he risked his life and future freedom for it. A gambler may win at cards and win money, but he ventured his own money to gain it.

It is against the laws of nature for us to get something for nothing. Occasionally you will read advertisements where article in question will be free to you if you will do so and so for the giver. You pay whether it is by selling soap or bluing, or by buying a new car.

When we quit trying to get something for nothing, we will have some chance to make a little honest money.

PAYING THE PRICE

Ordinarily we get the necessities of life—the things we should have, at a very reasonable figure, but when we go to buying luxuries we pay for them. Bread is cheap, but diamond rings cost money.

The same may be said with reference to our living modes. If we live as we live as we should we find we can keep in perfect health at a minimum cost; if we dissipate we must pay the price. The Creator knew just the things we would need to make it possible for us to enjoy health and happiness, and when we try to substitute or enlarge His program we always pay the price.

If we will live a little slower we will live a great deal longer, and our bodies will not be filled with pain while we are living.

Votes For Lower Taxes For Farmers

The passage of the proposed tax amendment to the Texas Constitution, which will be voted upon August 1, is vital to the interests of the farmers of the state. By voting for the proposed amendment, farmers will take the first step in the reduction of a tax system that is unfair to them.

Joey Dabson says that the average farmer in the United States pays about 60 per cent of his net income in state taxes. No one else pays anything like that part of his income. Possibly, Texas farmers are not quite so hard hit as this, but we know that compared to other folks, they are paying out too much tax money. The question is: "Are you content to pay out a third of a \$300 income in taxes, while certain other folks pay only a fifth of a \$10,000 income? Doesn't \$100 in taxes bear heavier on a \$300 a year man than a \$3,000 tax on a man with a \$10,000 a year salary?" Only a very small part of a small income should be taken for taxes. The larger the income, the larger the tax one can bear without inconvenience. Here in Texas we have been reversing the schedule by taxing the farmer, who has a small income, all out of proportion to his ability to pay.

Land and buildings are not the only source of wealth here in Texas. They should not be imposed upon. Why should you pay \$100 in taxes on your farm, when it is possible for some city fellow living

in a rented house to pay the State of Texas nothing at all?

In 1926, Texas land paid \$8.35 per cent of the total ad valorem tax of the state, whereas the ratio in 1922 was 31.92 per cent. Town lots paid 23.95 per cent of the total ad valorem taxes in 1926. In other words, land is bearing more of the burden now than was the case four or five years ago, and it was bad enough then. If the farmers and the property owners of the towns and cities don't take advantage of this opportunity on August 1 to start the tax revision ball to rolling, it's no one's fault but their own. Farmers seem to have the idea that their folks will look after their interests and that there is no occasion to become interested in legislative matters. They have been listening to those false leaders who say, "Oh, legislation can't help the farmer," while other classes have been busy passing laws to help themselves and in many cases hurt farmers.

If the proposed tax amendment is passed on August 1, the State of Texas will soon do away with its property tax. That means less taxes for the farmers because the property tax is about the only tax that bears heavily upon him. Without a property tax, the State of Texas must have still more money from other sources. From whom will they come? Those people who are not paying taxes at all or not paying their just share will be asked to make up the deficit caused by the repeal of the state property tax. Possibly, a portion of this money will be raised by means of an income tax. A state income tax would be just the thing. It would take care of a certain class of high-salaried, house-renting city people who contribute little or nothing to the support of the state. But in no case does a man pay an income tax unless he is able to pay it. That's the beauty of the income tax. You pay according to your ability to pay. If there is no income, there is no tax to be paid. Only the wealthiest farmers would have to pay a state income tax. In 1926, only one farmer in Texas out of every 221 paid the Federal Government an income tax, and if Texas passed a state income tax, about the same ratio of farmers would be reached. Farmers have nothing to fear from an income tax. In fact, they should be only too happy to reach that degree of prosperity that would place them in the income-tax-paying class.

Remember that on August 1 you will have the opportunity to vote for a proposed amendment that is an effort to give you farmers a fair and square deal in state tax matters.—Progressive Farmer.

Your Health

Common Sense on Bald Heads, Bobbing and Scalp Diseases

There are all sorts of views as to whether or not baldness is the result of exposure of the hair to sunlight, or the opposite—that sunlight is good for the growth of hair. There are also a variety of views on the statement that "baldness occurs because civilization man has kept his head covered for several hundreds of years and that the tightness of the hat band has interfered with the circulation of the scalp."

Some specialists in diseases of the skin are convinced that extreme exposure of the hair and scalp to sunlight is bad for the hair, others believe that it is good for the hair. Apparently one man's opinion is as good as that of another.

Certain persons who are promoting the use of devices for the giving of artificial sun rays, or so-called "artificial sun," state that the use of such machines will cause a new growth of hair even on a scalp as shiny and as smooth as a billiard ball, but they have not yet furnished convincing evidence in any considerable number of cases that a new growth of hair is produced under such conditions. Indeed, it seems likely that the death of the cell which houses the root of the hair is sufficient to make impossible the growth of new hair.

The evidence that a poor blood supply to the scalp will cause fall-out of hair growth is more convincing. For this reason specialists in diseases of the skin recommend persistent massage done by the individual himself as a means in controlling premature baldness. They suggest that the scalp be rubbed back and forth with the finger until it feels a little bit tender twice each day. The scalp should, of course, be kept clean by washing as often as necessary with good soap and water, and it should be greased lightly perhaps once each week with liquid petroleum or with vasoline, provided it is unusually dry.

Another question which agitates the modern woman particularly is the effect of bobbing on the growth of the hair. It is the conviction of many skin disease specialists who have been giving attention to this matter since bobbing became popular, that this procedure does not have any permanent effect on the hair growth. It does not make the hair fall out, nor does it cause a new growth of hair. Mechanical damage to the hair may occur during artificial curling and permanent waving, but will not have a permanent effect on the growth of the hair.

At the present time seven of the nine provinces are wet whereas 10 years ago all of them were dry.

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TAYLOR COUNTY FARMERS JUBILANT AS WARM PROSPECTS FOR YEAR ARE GOOD

ABILENE, July 20.—Facing a more flattering prospect for a good crop than for several years Taylor county farmers are at this time jubilant in better shape than they have been collectively speaking since 1918.

Exceptionally good rains during the winter and early spring put the ground in highly favorable condition for starting this year's crop. Despite unusually dry weather during May and June, growing crops held up remarkably well and heavy and widespread rains during the middle of July put enough moisture in the ground to practically insure maturing of crops in good shape.

Little Rain Needed
Various people in close touch with agricultural conditions in this section say a very small amount of rainfall will be required during the remainder of the growing season to insure one of the biggest crops ever produced.

Cotton is growing rapidly and fruiting heavily. So far the crop has not been bothered by insects and indications are that little, if any damage will come from leaf worms, grass hoppers and cotton flies this season. While cotton acreage in Taylor county is considerably less than last year, it now appears that the county production will exceed the total of 1924.

Good Feed Crops
Grain sorghum crops planted during March were saved by the timely rains which came this month and young feedstuff will

make bountiful yields, for there is plenty of moisture to carry it through the hot days and by early fall it will be matured.

Sweet clover and ribbon cane have been grown extensively this year by the farmers of Taylor county. These crops will not only give new sources of revenue but will also help to enrich the soil. Thorough effort at the agricultural department of the Abilene Chamber of Commerce hundreds of landowners of this section have been led to see the importance of keeping their land continually built up and if the present tendency to over-reduce the fields and grow nitrogen gathering plants is continued there will not be any worn-out farms in Taylor county fifty years from now and the demand for commercial fertilizer will never be heavy.

Maize Crop Increased
Special attention has been given to pure-bred milo maize in this county. The local Chamber of Commerce distributed to farmers of this county during the spring over 15,000 pounds of pure-bred maize seed. This was done in order to get a better quality of maize in the county and also to give the farmers a new way in which to realize from their farms. They will be able in many instances to get fancy prices for this year's maize crop by selling it as seed for next year.

It has been estimated that the value of the 1927 maize crop in Taylor county will be more than double the crop of last year on ac-

count of the pure-bred seed. **More Ribbon Cane**
Several hundred acres were planted to ribbon cane this year and that crop will be converted into syrup. Mills for making the syrup will be made available in different rural communities of this county and this crop will bring in quite a bit of money for the farmers.

Scores of farm families who have bought all their meat and meat products from grocery stores will have their own pork and lamb this fall. The hog population of this county has been greatly increased as has the number of good dairy cows.

Folk who last year had to go without many things they needed because the money had to go for foods which could have been raised at home will be able this year to buy new automobiles and other needed conveniences for they have lived at home and are now in better shape than ever before.

Banks of this county report loans to farmers are considerably less than at this time last year, despite the low price of cotton last season.

Work Progresses On Alpine Hotel

ALPINE, July 20.—Work has started on the big addition to the Alpine Hotel, and is being pushed as rapidly as possible. J. T. Pansford, of El Paso, contractor, has a big force of men working on the foundation and is getting ready to begin the construction at once. The contract calls for a three-story structure containing 40 rooms and will be built in such a manner that an extension upward of three more stories may be added at any time when it is required. The architecture will be of the Spanish type somewhat like the New Orndorff at El Paso, and the furnishings will be the modern Simmons Steel throughout. This building is to cost \$100,000 and when completed will be the finest of any between San Antonio and El Paso.

Big Spring Band Has New Director

BIG SPRING, July 20.—The Big Spring municipal band is to have a new director in the person of C. V. Johnson, lately of Baird and formerly of Wichita Falls. The former director, G. R. Hartman, has resigned and moved to San Angelo, where he will open up a private studio, teaching wind, wood and string instruments.

Mr. Johnson will move his family immediately to Big Spring and begin his work with the Big Spring organization. Regular concerts both in town and in the rural sections will be given, says Mr. Johnson.

Victorian Girls Led A Gay Life

LONDON, (AP)—Girls of the Victorian era were just as frivolous as the flapper of today, believes Dowager Lady Bagin, descendant of Charles II through her Spanish ancestry. Lady Bagin is 90.

Lady Bagin was a member of the Victorian society in its most exclusive period. She discredits the prevailing idea that the Victorian girl was strictly chaste, and never received a proposal unless her suitor had first asked permission from the sidewalked father of fiction.

The truth is in those days men proposed direct to the girl of their choice, Lady Bagin said. "In some ways the girls of that period had far more opportunity of knowing men than is the case nowadays. The London season started directly after Easter and ended in July, after which young people met at country house parties. Here they were given plenty of opportunity to know each other."

True, debutantes were chaperoned at balls. But that fact did not prevent them from dancing as frequently as they chose with their favorite partners.

The idea that girls in the Victorian era spent their days in sewing seams and practicing needle is another fallacy. On the contrary, things who came to London for the season spent their days in a whirl of social engagements.

"Dress, not sex, was the great topic of conversation in those days. Another popular delusion is that the Victorian girl never indulged in sport. Lawn tennis was a most popular game which was played extensively. Another favorite pas-

sion was water parties. Camps and were dispensed with, and the girls and young men used to go down the river Thames in barges and picnic on the river banks.

"DEMPSEY NOT MAN-KILLER OF OLD," SAYS WILLIAM MULDOON; EX-CHAMP HAS LOST HIS FORM, VET BELIEVES

Lost, Strayed or Stolen—An assassin named Jack (The Giant Killer) Dempsey. Known as a bobbing, weaving man-mauler with a murderous shift, a poisonous left and a T. N. T. right. Last seen at Boyle's Thirty Acres. Kindly communicate with Leo P. Flynn.

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N. Y., July 20—Eight years ago a tigerish youngster of 24, lashed by ambition and bristling with wolfish viciousness, sprang out of his corner at Jess Willard in the famous massacre of Maumee Bay.

Indelibly stamped on the mental screen of every fight fan from coast to coast are vivid etchings of that picture. Memory of it is going to be worth exactly \$250,000 to Jack Dempsey when he faces Jack Sharkey tonight for the Dempsey title. Today is a middle-aged, affable athlete, prosperity softened, ring rusty, lured out of virtual retirement by the call of the game or the clink of gold.

This writer was sent up to Dempsey's training camp. Now this writer does not profess to be an expert. This writer is a reporter.

William Muldoon, for instance, is an expert. He is undoubtedly the greatest judge of condition, particularly of pugilists, that the sport has ever seen. So this writer took this expert's opinion and is here with reporting it.

"Dempsey has lost his fighting spark," says Muldoon.

An athlete, particularly a pugilist, explains Mr. Muldoon, "can care for his body as studiously as he desires. But all the strictness in diet and thoroughness in training will not keep alive the motor that will turn this excellently conditioned body into a perfect fighting unit. The fighting spark must be there or the human machine will not function properly."

"Condition will not bring back the fighting spark. A good series of fights is the only thing that will revive it and keep it alive."

The question now is being asked—will it be a better or a worse Dempsey that Jack Sharkey will meet than the one who lost the title to Gene Tunney?

To which the answer might na-

turally be that he couldn't be worse.

The Dempsey of today radiates health and good spirits. It shows in the flush of his skin, the flash of his eye, the springiness of his step, even in the tone of his voice. But it does not take an ounce of common sense to see that the Dempsey of 1927 can never be the Dempsey of 1919.

Under the green trees by the silvery waters of Saratoga the expert's gift and ponder. They see many things and sometimes confuse fiery aggressiveness with viciousness.

That stand-up, rolling, lurching charge Dempsey now employs is utterly foreign to the old crouching, weaving Dempsey advance when Jack used to come plunging in, eyes spitting venom, working from one shift into another with every punch cocking him for a follow-up blow.

You saw the last of the old Dempsey when he fought Carpenter at Boyle's Thirty Acres. The Dempsey who fought Piro didn't crouch or weave or bob. He just stood up and slugged toe-to-toe. Neither did you see Jack bob or weave or shift against Tunney. And we doubt, despite his studied attempts, that you will not see him bob nor weave nor shift against Sharkey.

Jack Dempsey is going to be in good physical form when he meets Jack Sharkey. But there is a world of difference between PHYSICAL form and FIGHTING form.

One look at Dempsey with the gloves on showed wise old Leo Flynn what was the matter with him.

"Shorten your punches and stop swinging," were Flynn's orders. "Never mind if the sparring partner knock your block off. Don't hit till you get in close and put everything in the punch and try to break 'em in two."

"Have you forgotten how to bob and weave?" was Flynn's next caustic query. "What are you standing up straight for? That isn't your style. Get your head down. Crouch, away, keep blazing away, etc."

And so it goes. Dempsey is trying to find his old self. Maybe he'll find it. We don't think he will.

the comptroller's report, amount to \$21,738,695.40, leaving a balance of \$315,497.74.

The comptroller's report estimates that the general revenue fund will have to its credit, September 1, the sum of \$601,687.92.

Hatch said he thought the latter sum will be half a million dollars greater, but that "concerning the comptroller's figures to be correct, there still would be a balance in the treasury to the credit of the general revenue, on September 1, the sum of \$417,188.66."

The statute providing that 20 percent be added for collection and delinquencies is directory and not mandatory," he said.

He declared that the comptroller's estimate of \$1,600,000 in round figures, based on last year's income, "cannot be used as a guide for this year's income because of crop failure and the low price of cotton last year in contrast to good crop this year, with prospects of cotton bringing more than double the price it brought last year."

Instead, he estimated that pentennial revenues this year will be about \$3,000,000. He also called attention to the comptroller's announced intention of attempting to collect nearly \$1,600,000 alleged delinquent sulphur tax.

"With these additions," Hatch said, "the general revenue fund would have to its credit \$4,877,188, enough to more than take care of delinquencies and cost of collection, and the 65 cent rate would not have put the state on deficiency."
