## Devorce's Request Denied Campbell Says Council Not Involved In Firing

Dismissed Assistant Police Chief L. C. Devorce Friday requested a spot on the agenda at the next session of the City Council to discuss a letter he received from the city manager concerning reasons for his dismissal from the force.

Devorce was told by City Secretary Brenda Tarter that he would be given a spot on the agenda to talk to the council but then informed the Record that he had received a call from City Manager James Campbell stating that Campbell would not grant the request.

Campbell confirmed that he had turned down Devorce's request to appear before the council, stating that he has control over personnel matters.

"The council has nothing to do with his dismissal and if he has any questions or comments, he should direct them to me," Campbell said. "Now if he wants to talk to the members of the council individually, that's another

matter and of course, he's entirely free to do so," Campbell added.

Devorce, in a personal interview with the Record, said that he wants to make public the reasons for his dismissal from the force.

He had a letter from Campbell dated Sept. 1 outlining three reasons for his firing from the police force he has been a part of for the past six years, the last two years as Assistant Chief.

Those three reasons appear here, along with Devorce's point by point rebuttal:

"Neglect of Duty-To Wit: Conducting personal business during working hours. Spending extended periods of time during breaks."

Devorce said, "I don't have any business other than my job as police officer. I had been working some off-duty time at Truck Town but that was with clear understanding with the

Chief and it was my off-duty time."

"Conduct Unbecoming a Police Officer-To Wit: Harsh and uncourteous language to hospital personnel during an emergency situation."

Devorce said, "The only incident I can think of about this is one time when I answered an ambulance call and took a man to the emergency room of the hospital, suffering from chest pains and pains down the side. He was a relative of Mr. Curt Shaw's and we stayed in the emergency room for 43 minutes without anyone coming to give him treatment. I stayed there with him and Mr. Shaw, trying to comfort him and then I went out in the hall and tried to get someone to

It was about 3 p.m. when the shift changes and everyone I talked to said they were either getting off duty or just coming on and finally, I told some of them that if they didn't do something, I was going to take it to the Ambulance Board. We're always getting complaints about the ambulance service and then when we answer and get someone to the hospital, they don't do anything. Finally, they did come to take care of the patient and I told the Chief about it and he said he would discuss it with the Ambulance Board. I guess he did, because after that, they put a buzzer at the back door to ring when coming in with an emergency patient and there's always an emergency room nurse there

now. Anyway, that was a long time ago, and it doesn't seem right to bring it up now."

"Poor Public Relations-To Wit: Failure to communicate with the public properly."

Devorce said, "I know what those words mean, but I don't know what they mean about me. As far as visiting, I don't do much visiting when I'm on duty but when I'm not, then I talk and laugh just as much as any man."

Devorce further stated his belief that the reason he was fired was because he had made application for the position of Police Chief which was to have become vacant at the end of September when Jesse Browning retired.

Subsequent to Devorce's firing, Browning submitted his letter of resignation effective at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday, the day Devorce was fired. Campbell had discussed the matter with Browning at 11:30 Tuesday and Browning submitted his letter of resignation at 1 p.m. Devorce was fired by Campbell with Browning present, about 1:30 p.m. Tuesday.

Devorce said also that when Campbell began telling him about his dismissal

from the force that Campbell stated that the council was unanimously in favor of it, 7-0. Browning confirmed that statement.

Campbell said that the decision to fire Devorce was his and not a decision of the council.

This point was one of the reasons Devorce gave for wanting to talk to the council.

Campbell explained that he has the prerogative over personnel matters but that

the matter could be placed on the agenda at the request of one of the council members.

### Called Session

A special meeting of the City Council has been called for 7 p.m. Tuesday in City Hall.

City Manager James Campbell said that the council will go into executive session in order to consider the selection of a Chief of Police.

## Wolves Lose 21-0 To Slaton Rivals

A strong Slaton Tiger team won over Colorado City's Wolves 21-0 in the first game of the season for both AA teams Friday night at Wolf Field.

Both teams are favored to win their districts, District 6-AA for the Wolves and District 5-AA for Slaton. Should both teams do as predicted, they will meet again in bi-district.

The game had been billed as a hard hitting contest to be decided by mistakes. It happened exactly that way and in the process, both teams lost valuable members of the team because of injuries in the hard fought contest.

Slaton scored late in the first quarter on a drive helped along by a 15-yard penalty. The touchdown came on a 9-yard run by Brad Eblen who proved a problem for the Wolves all night as he had 119 yards on 19 carries. The extra point kick by Mike Bednarz was good.

Then in the second quarter, the Wolves had several chances to score, getting to the Slaton 2-yardline but that drive was set back on a clipping penalty. Yet another drive was stopped on a backfield in motion penalty. The score remained 7-0 at halftime.

The Wolves seemed to be in control in the third quarter until Eblen grabbed a Wolves punt on his own 22 and raced 78 yards, twice twisting out of arm tackles by Wolves, to score. Bednarz again kicked the extra point.

Then in the final stanza with 7:07 left in the game, a 56-yard drive by Slaton was concluded with an 8-yard run by Slaton reserve back Rocky Smith. Greg Basinger kicked the extra point, to end the scoring for the night.

The Wolves never seriously threatened to score in the final half, running only five offensive plays in the fourth quarter, one of which was a punt.

On defense, the Wolves secondary shut off the Tigers highly touted passing game but Eblen's running took up the slack for Slaton. On three occasions, the Wolves picked off Slaton passes, one interception by Wayne McKee, one by Frank Sanchez and one by Craig Carter.

Wolves Quarterback Ray Torrez was leading ground gainer for the Wolves with 60 yards while Sanchez had 45 yards.

The Wolves completed only one pass for three yards, that reception by

Tight End Jackie Ellis. One other pass was completed to Sanchez for 10 yards but was called back due to an ineligible receiver being downfield.

Wolves punter Wayne McKee punted seven times for a 33 yard average, despite having to punt into a gusty wind several times.

In addition the Wolves lost two fumbles, while Slaton lost only one.

It was in the fourth quarter that the Wolves and Tigers each lost a valuable player. The Wolves Center Jim Jordan suffered a dislocated elbow and a possible fracture and Slaton's highly regarded defensive nose guard Artie Limmer was sent to Lubbock with a bleeding kidney, both injuries indicators of how hard the hitting was in the contest.

## Bulldogs Give Up 5 Fumbles

Turnovers were the difference in the game between the Loraine Bulldogs and Dawson Friday night in Welch as the Bulldogs lost their season opener 14-8.

Bulldogs Coach Ken Lightfoot said the team gave up five fumbles, each time when the Loraine team had mounted drives, and were close to the Dawson goal line. Loraine also lost four passes to interceptions in the game.

Lightfoot said the team moved the ball well on the ground as they had 239 total yards rushing. Jeff Merket was leading ground gainer with 154 yards rushing. Merket carried the ball over for Loraine with 3 1/2 minutes to go in the game, tying the score at 6-6.

Ball carrier Mike Vallejo then took the ball over for the two extra points, giving Loraine the lead.

On the ensuing kickoff, Loraine was successful on capturing an on-sides kick,

but had to give up the ball on downs.

Lightfoot said the defense, which had held Dawson bottled up except for the lone TD in the second quarter, broke down in the final minutes of the game and allowed the Dawson score, ending the game at 14-8.

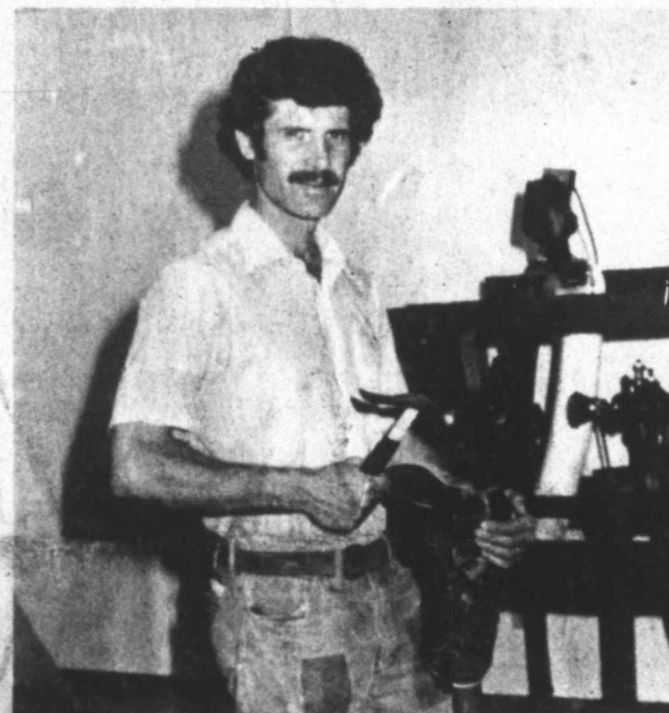
Loraine led in first downs with 14 to 10 for their opponents.

Two trials were held in Colorado City during the past week, one going to the jury late Wednesday and the other ending Friday morning with a plea of guilty on a reduced charge.

Trials were heard before 32nd District Judge Weldon E. Kirk in the District courtroom, Mitchell County courthouse.

### Grandsons In Game

Three of his grandsons were contestants in the battle with two on the Colorado City team and one on Slaton's side.

Hulme's children Wayne and Bonnie each have boys on the Colorado City team and another son, Sam, has a player on Slaton's team.

Gary Hulme, sophomore running back, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Hulme of 1708 Oak in Colorado City and his cousin, Blake Hammond, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Hammond of Lake Colorado, are both on the Wolves squad.

Facing them on the Slaton Tiger team was 16-year old Mark Hulme, the son of Sam Hulme of Slaton, the body shop foreman of Smith Ford there. Gary's dad, Wayne, is the owner of Dement Body Shop in Colorado City.

The first trial, with a 9-woman, 3-man jury selected Monday, ended in a guilty verdict for Lupe Galvan Jr. of Loraine. Galvan was found guilty of possession of more than four ounces of marijuana and the jury recommended sentence of 15 years. Judge Kirk set the date for sentencing for Sept. 17.

Galvan was represented by Attorney Aubrey Roberts of Sweetwater and District Attorney Frank Ginzel was prosecutor for the state.

The trial of Alfredo Carrizales resulted in a 5-year probated sentence on the charge of aggravated assault. Carrizales, 21 of Colorado City, had been arrested on a charge of murder following the death of his first cousin, Jose Aguilar of Lamesa, about 1:30 a.m. Dec. 26. Aguilar bled to death from a stab wound in the leg which cut through the femoral artery.

Defense Attorney was Dan Barber.

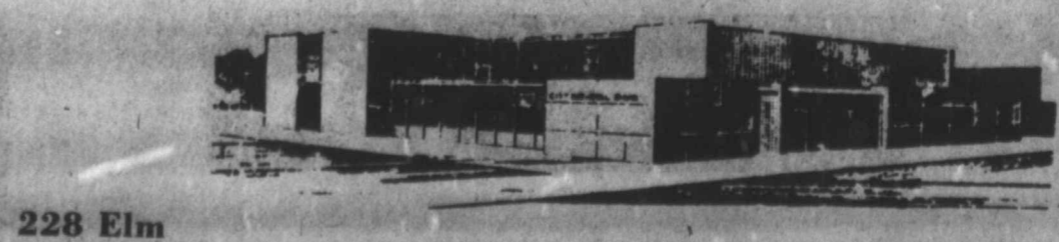

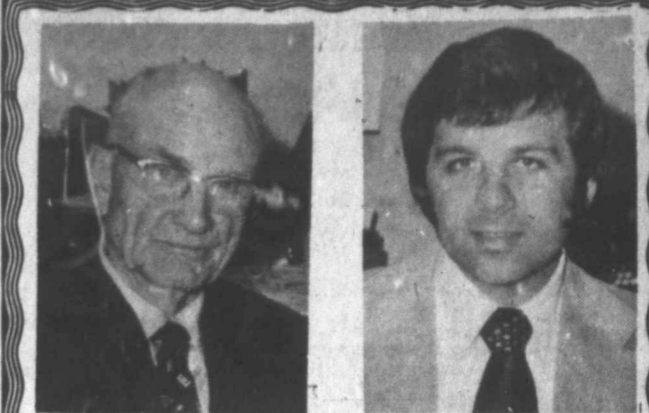
Services were at 10 a.m. Thursday with the Rev. Ken Cartwright of Abilene officiating.

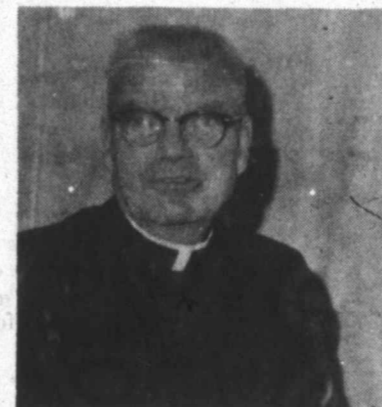

## The Ultimatum

When we hear the word "ultimatum" used nowadays we instinctively picture one nation dangling a hydrogen bomb in a cruise missile over the capitol of another nation and making certain demands that must be met immediately or else...And it frightens us—we don't like it one bit!

And yet, a few weeks ago, as I was preparing a Sunday sermon, I realized that we have biblical precedents for ultimatums (or, if you prefer, ultimate). Being strong willed individuals, we may not like them either, but we would do well to think about them carefully before deciding to ignore them, for they come from God! In the 24th chapter of the book of Joshua we see God's prophet assemble the people who had not always acted faithfully according to God's laws and lay it on the line for them: "If you will not serve Jahweh, choose today whom you wish to serve." And in the 6th chapter of the gospel according to John we read: "Many of the disciples of Jesus remarked: 'This is intolerable language. How could anyone accept it?'... After this many of His disciples left Him and stopped going with Him." And then comes Our Lord's ultimatum! Turning to His twelve Apostles He said to them: "What about you, do you want to go away too?"

The theme uniting these two texts is that of Faith, which is the acceptance of a truth revealed by God because it is God who is telling us, and we know that He can neither deceive us nor be deceived Himself. But faith is not just an intellectual acceptance of some truth, but a practical acceptance of it. By this I mean that if I believe in something, then I must live according to that belief, I must regulate all my actions and my entire life according to that belief.

Now those people to whom Joshua was speaking all claimed to believe in the One, True God, but they had not been acting like it, they hadn't been keeping His commandments. Now Joshua calls them to account—he tells them to "shape up or ship out." If you believe in God, then serve Him, obey Him. If you don't want to serve the Lord, then decide today whom you will serve! And Jesus found the same inconsistency among so many of those who were following Him. They "believed" in Him when He cured the sick, raised the dead, fed thousands of them with a few loaves of bread, but when it got down to the nitty-gritty of His doctrine, His teachings—they wouldn't go for that. And then it was that Jesus decided that it was time to call for a definite commitment even from His Apostles. Either they accepted Him completely, or they could have nothing to do with Him... "What about you, do you want to go away too?"

And Jesus demands the same commitment from us. Of course it is easy to say: "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life." Yes, it is easy to say. Lip-service is the easiest kind of service—but God dispises it! And Jesus was very good at picking out the "phonies"... "Hypocrites...these people honor me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me." We have to do better than that! He puts it squarely up to us. We must follow Him, or leave Him. "He that is not with Me, is against Me." We can't be neutral. He won't accept mere lip service. And if we love Him, we could never be content with it either.

Peter, in the name of the Apostles, answered Our Lord's question by stating: "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life" He meant it and laid down his life for his belief, as did the other Apostles—except the one who betrayed Him. Do we love Him enough to live our lives for Him—or shall we, like Judas, betray Him?
