TAOS, New Mexico. — The best thing about this city in the northern part of "the land of enchantment" is the delightfully cool weather. It is comfortably cool in mid-day unless you are out in the sun. At night you need a coat. And it seems to rain a bit each afternoon.

The drive into Taos was especially scenic. We came in from the east through Springer and the Cimarron Canyon. The canyon drive is through tall mountains with a stream of cold water beside the road. We stopped to let the children wade. Once, we saw a deer and stopped to watch it for a time.

THE FIRST night in Taos, we drove out for a look at the Indian Pueblo. You can pay two bucks per person and ride a sight-seeing bus out to the pueblo, or you can go in your car and pay the chief 25 cents. The Indians stand around in their blankets ready to pose for pictures if you will pay them to do so. The Indians like folded money best — seem to be allergic to silver, particularly nickels and dimes.

GUESS THIS IS a pretty small world. When we registered at a tourist court, our next cabin neighbors turned out to be Mr. and Mrs. Marshall Jones and daughter, Lynn, who live next door to us in Cisco.

The Joneses are "old-timers" here, having arrived three days before we got to Taos. So they immediately gave us the word as to what to see and where to go.

TOOK IN AN Indian dance at the plaza. There, eight men and boys danced to the music of a tom-tom, giving their interpretation of several dances, including the horse-tail and the humming bird strut. It was colorful and interesting.

Taos is full of Indians — the Taos Indians. The men folks all wear blankets wrapped around their heads and shoulders constantly. We kind of suspect that the blankets are store bought cottons.

TAOS IS THE third oldest white settlement in the United States, being out-ranked in this respect by San Augustine, Florida, and Santa Fe, New Mexico. This city was founded in 1540 by the Spanish explorers who built a settlement near the Indian Pueblo, which is much older.

A lot of people famous in the nation's history have lived here. Taos was the home of Kit Carson, who settled in 1826, and there's a Kit Carson museum here now.

WED JUDGE TAOS to be a normal city of about 3,000 people. The principle source of income is the tourist industry. The place is full of tourist camps, dude ranches and hotels. The business firms are mostly of the souvenir shop and cafe-bar variety. Prices are about 50% higher than they are in Cisco.

THEY MAKE MUCH out of the art colony in Taos. A lot of big name painters live here, and there's one street where their work is displayed and offered for sale. The artists seem to be most numerous after frost in autumn, for the trees are said to be highly colorful at that time of the year. The city is 7,000 feet above sea level.

AN INTERESTING feature of Taos is the style of architecture. All buildings are of the Spanish and adobe type, and this includes churches, schools, business buildings and homes. We have not seen even one conventional home such as you see in Cisco. They must have some form of city ordinance that requires this type of construction work.

The town is rather attractive, although there are many rundown buildings and shacks. Guess you couldn't expect a city as old as Taos to be modern and attractive and clean looking.

The people here seem to be sold on New Mexico — as sold as Texans are on Texas. But the best we have seen in this area is the cool climate. Bet their winters are as unpleasantly cold

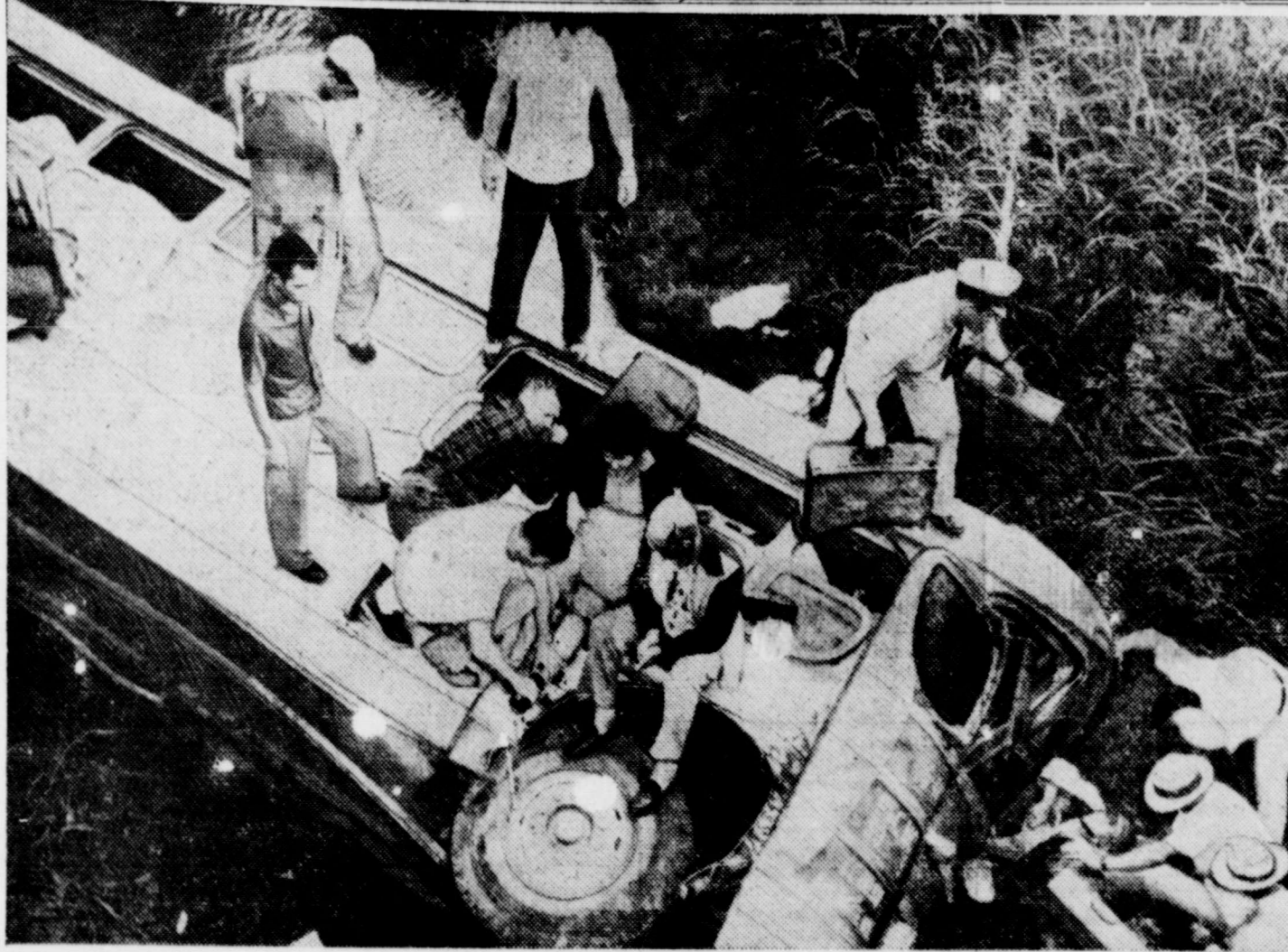

Cluck Resigns As Head Of Ranger Junior College

R. N. Cluck, Cisco educator who had served as president of Ranger Junior College for the past several months, announced Wednesday that he had resigned his post as head of the school and that he would remain in Cisco.

In his letter of resignation to the board of regents of the school, Mr. Cluck said: "Because of the many, many tremendous problems confronting Ranger Junior College at this time, and in the solving of these problems there will spring from them a tremendous amount of pressure on the administrator, and because I have not recovered physically enough to successfully stand up under so much tremendous pressure, I deem it advisable and to the best interest of Ranger Junior College and its preplexing problems to tender to you, the Board of Regents, my resignation to take effect on or before August 1, 1953."

In this letter Mr. Cluck praised the board and the five year financial plan set up by the board for the operation of the school.

The board announced that Dr. Price Ashton had been named president of the school to serve in the post vacated by the resignation of Mr. Cluck. Mr. Cluck was superintendent of the Cisco schools for some 17 years, and was Cisco Junior College's first president before an automobile accident forced his retirement several years ago.

Mrs. George Fee To Attend Gift Show

Mrs. George P. Fee of the Gift House plans to attend the 26th Allied Gift and Jewelry Show to be held in Dallas the week of September 6-10, it was announced by officials of the show this week.

Mrs. Fee had sent in for reservations for the annual affair.

Some 247 separate displays will be set up at the Hotel Adolphus for the showing, and more than 2,500 manufacturers will be represented.

Soil Conservation Supervisors Vote To Buy Vetch Seed For Distribution

Local Soil Conservation District Supervisors, in a meeting held August 21 stated that the Districts would buy Hairy vetch seed for resale in the Rising Star area.

B. B. Hickman, member of the Board of Supervisors, Upper Leona, in expressing concern over a vetch seed shortage in the area said that the Upper Leona SCD would buy 25,000 pounds of seed if available to be resold to farmers in the Rising Star area.

G. G. Goss, Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, Brown Mills SCD shared Hickman's concern and said that his District would buy 15,000 lbs. of seed for resale in the May area.

Hearing Being Held On Closing Of Putnam Depot

A hearing on the closing of the T&P depot at Putnam was being held in the Callahan County town Wednesday as the railway company officials and Putnam citizens met before representatives of the Rail Road Commission to present their cases.

The rail company contends that the depot has operated spasmodically in recent years with the profit figure claimed by Putnam residents due to pipe line construction in the area in the past few years. Putnam residents claim that the station has shown a profit of \$8,000 annually for the past three years.

Company officials said that if the station is closed the business will be handled out of the Cisco or Baird office.

Between 50 and 100 persons were expected at the hearing on the proposal to close the station which was established by the rail firm in 1881. Randall Jackson, Baird attorney, is representing the Putnam group.

Car Inspection Law Is Changed

AUSTIN, Aug. 26 (Spl)—The old Texas Motor Vehicle Inspection Law died last night at midnight after a somewhat turbulent existence.

The measure, which saw heated debate in the last session of the Legislature, has been replaced by a modified version which calls only for the inspection of auto brakes, lighting equipment, horns, rear view mirrors and windshield wipers. It becomes effective today, but Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has announced that the State Public Safety Commission has officially set the new inspection period for September 15, 1953, through April 15, 1954.

George Busby, Chief of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Division of the Department of Public Safety, has said that there will be about 3,000 inspection stations ready to operate on the opening date.

"Trained mechanics who are well versed in the new law and its requirements will be set to go, and they will have an adequate supply of stickers and other materials on hand," Busby stated.

Garrison added that he could see no possibility of a "log jam" of motorists at the official inspection stations at any time unless too many people put off getting their autos checked until the last few days of the seven-month period.

"Lack of sufficient inspection stations plus last-minute waiting contributed to the long lines and lengthy delays under the old law in the Spring of 1952," Garrison said.

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Area Now Aided By New Electric Plant

West Texas Utilities Company's Paint Creek generating station is now a "working unit" of the Company's generating system. Following a series of "shake-down runs" in June and July, the 33,000 KW turbo-generating unit at the new power station at Paint Creek reservoir is now operating on a 24 hour schedule. The addition of this new unit has increased the Company's total generating capability to 212, 470 KW.

The unit at Paint Creek is the second major generating unit which the Company has placed in operation this year. In June, a 33,000 KW unit was put in service at the Company's Concho Power Plant in San Angelo. At the present time West Texas Utilities Company has 5 major steam generating stations, 1 gas turbine plant and fourteen stand-by oil engine plants. The Concho station at San Angelo has a capacity of 65,000 KW; the Abilene station, 32,000 KW; the Pauline station near Quanah, 49,000 KW; the Rio Pecos station near McCombs, 18,000 KW; and the new Paint Creek station, 33,000 KW. The Fort Stockton gas turbine plant has a capacity of 5,000 KW; and the fourteen stand-by oil engine plants can generate 10,470 KW.

Located on a 120 acre site on the north shore of the Paint Creek Reservoir, the Paint Creek generating plant is fourteen miles southeast of Haskell and sixteen miles northeast of Stamford.

While construction on the new area is now classed as a working unit, actually a great deal of construction and other types of work remain to be done. The plant personnel estimate that it will require many weeks "putting on the finishing touches." The building is of structural steel, masonry and brick, 100 feet by 76 feet, and is equivalent to a four-story structure in height. The entrance to the plant is double-doors into a small lobby.

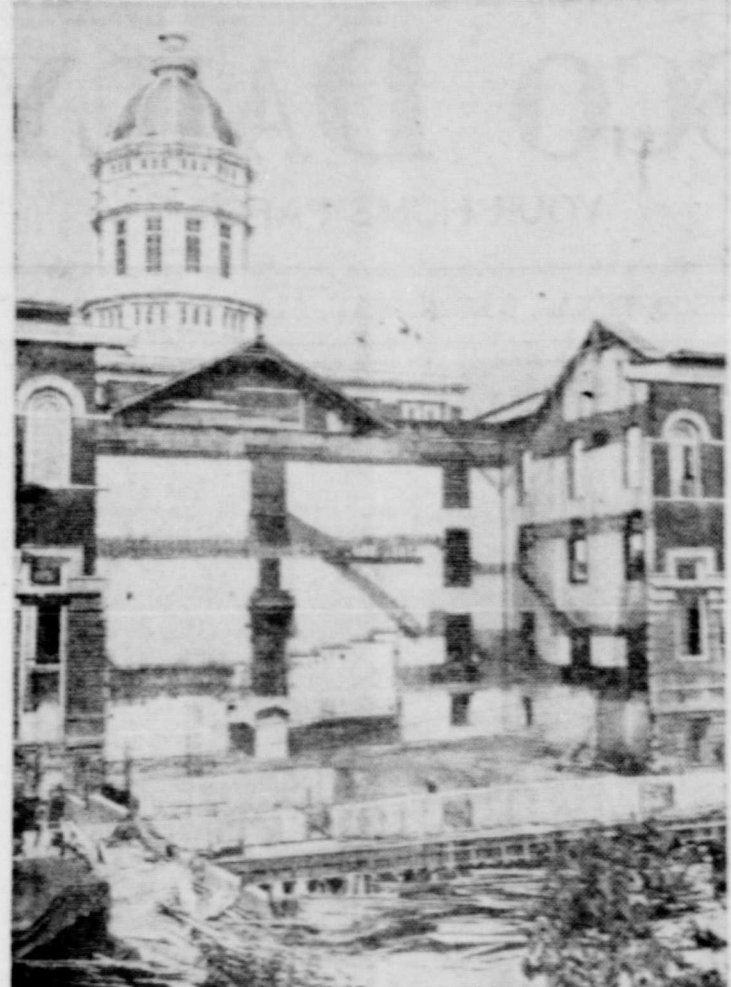
Directly in front is a door leading into the locker room, showers, wash room and rest rooms. On the right is the stairway to the second story. At the top of the stairway is another small lobby with doors leading into the offices of the assistant chief engineer, plant clerk and records room. Joining on the west is the office of the chief engineer. On the east of the lobby is the entrance to the employees' meeting room; and on the north is the entrance to the turbine room.

On the south end of the turbine room, adjoining the meeting room is the plant laboratory, and on the opposite side are the rest rooms and kitchenette. The small kitchen is equipped with a double sink, a Frigidaire refrigerator and a three plate electric range. This has been included so that the employees can warm up their lunch, prepare coffee and serve light snacks.

Looking north toward the temporary wall of the plant building, on the right is the 33,000 KW General Electric steam turbine generator. On the left are the switchboards and control panels and to the left of these are the controls of the Babcock & Wilcox semi-out-door type steam boiler. It has a capacity of 300,000 pounds of steam per hour, operating at 875 pounds per square inch of pressure at a temperature of 900 F degrees. It is fired with natural gas, and is also equipped for fuel oil operation.

The substation is located east of the plant building; the big boiler and stack are on the west side a short distance from the cribhouse over the inlet canal. A steel stairway leads from the turbine room to the basement in which are located the machine shop, pumping equipment and other gear necessary in the operation of a modern steam generating plant. On the east side of the basement is the big Allis-Chalmers condenser. There are two entrances to the basement on the west side, and one on the east side. Double doors open on the north side into the excavation which has been made for the installation of a second generating unit at the plant. Installation of the second unit is scheduled to begin in 1934.

Just east of the substation is a landing field which will accommodate small aircraft. North of the plant grounds two modern homes have been built which are occupied by the assistant chief engineer and the plant maintenance foreman. A caliche-topped road from the plant intersects a farm-to-market road to Haskell where the majority of the employees and their families are now living.

Alta and Ky. 31 Fescues Adapted Over Wide Area

No grasses have spread over such a wide area in recent years as the tall fescues—Alta and Ky 31. Their popularity is not because of fine texture and palatability but their adaptability to various soil and moisture conditions, outstanding is their ability to make growth during late fall and early spring, thus extending the pasture season.

Distant and independent origins—Alta in Oregon and Ky 31 in Kentucky—have not prevented either being used in place of the other wherever tall fescue is grown. Each, however, has been outstanding in its own range of development.

Under careful grazing management where the lush young forage is utilized instead of allowing it to become coarse and unpalatable with age, tall fescues afford excellent grazing either alone or with compatible legumes, but especially with the latter. Their strong growth has usually prevented the strong legumes from dominating the mixture and giving a blot hazard to the pasture.

Many do not realize how fast these fescues grow and thus allow them to get out of hand before pasturing or cutting for hay or silage. Close watch should be kept, so as to use them in prime condition. Most complaints of their coarseness are because they have been allowed to develop too far before pasturing. Tall fescues will survive in relatively low fertility but good pasture requires adequate feeding with phosphates and potash when grown with legumes, or nitrogen if legumes are not present.

Use of tall fescues for forage has largely over-shadowed their good traits for other uses, according to Harry Schoth of Oregon who developed Alta fescue. They are also valuable as soil conditioners because of their extensive root system, which supply quantities of organic matter and serve to open up hard undrained soil layers. They are excellent along roadsides, on steep banks subject to erosion and in waterways.

Complaints have been made that some commercial seed of Alta and Ky 31 is mixed with other grasses, particularly common ryegrass. The two seeds are so similar they cannot be separated by cleaning. This mixture is not prevalent and can be avoided by buying certified seed from your supplier. Most of the Alta fescue produced in Oregon and over half the Kentucky production of Ky 31 are certified seed.

The 1932 crop of over 50,000,000 pounds, more than half of which was produced in Kentucky and Oregon, is more than double the production of 1931 and considerably over four times the average of the three preceding years, 1948-50, so the supply for sowing in 1951 will probably be fully adequate.

HEALTH TALKS

The medical profession is cautious in recommending "sandpaper surgery."

This new treatment, which consists of using sandpaper to remove the upper-most layers of the skin and plane its surface, gives good results only in carefully selected cases. If scars from acne go through the full thickness of the skin, for example, not too much improvement can be expected. The method has been recommended for the removal of tattoo marks, but is successful only if tattooing was not done correctly in the first place, that is, if the tattoo dyes were not put into the deepest layers of the skin, as they usually are.

Doctors who have had the most experience with this type of treatment usually can predict the amount of improvement which can be expected with sandpaper surgery. It has yielded anywhere from about 20 to 70 per cent improvement, depending on the character of the skin and nature of the scars, according to one doctor who helped to develop the method. He usually does not recommend treatment if the maximum improvement to be expected is less than 50 per cent.

Under certain circumstances the work may be done in a hospital under general anesthesia,

but if done in stages, it can be performed in the doctor's office under a local anesthetic. Before treating a large region, a test is done on an area about the size of a dime to see if scars are likely to be improved by treatment, also to be sure that the patient doesn't tend to have keloids (exaggerated scar formation).

After the surgeon removes the right amount of skin, he applies with a certain degree of pressure gauze bandages saturated with petroleum jelly. The dressings are left on for about ten days. Sometimes the procedure must be

repeated, but it may be advised against in certain circumstances. For instance, if the patient has had a great deal of x-ray treatment, he may not be able to stand as much of the sandpaper therapy as he would otherwise.

The sandpaper technique is an extension of a type of treatment known as "abrasive surgery." In some cases sandpaper surgery is an improvement on other types. In others, the physician may advise against any kind of abrasion.

as Cisco's summers are sometimes unpleasantly warm.

RED RIVER, New Mexico. — We've just spent a day being a typical summer tourist. Arising early, we breakfasted in Taos, filled up the thermos jug with water, and headed out for Red River. The trip up was via Questa, a little mining town, and a very scenic canyon drive.

Red River seems to be the ideal vacation city for a family. The city is 8,000 feet high and is in a valley full of attractive pine and spruce trees. Trout streams

are numerous, and it's cool enough for a light jacket even in daytime.

The city is small but very attractive. All the buildings are of the pine log type and very handsome indeed. They all look new, too, and very clean. The town is strictly for the tourist. There are a dozen or so tourist lodges with eating places, curio shops and gas stations.

BET THE WINTER population of Red River isn't over 200 or so. The winter weather is doubtless very cold. They have a handful of tourists for the deer hunting season and possibly for other hunting.

As for local industry, there's a bit of mining, some timber sawing and cattle ranching.

THE CHILDREN were delighted that Red River has a number of stables where you can rent gentle horses for \$1 per hour. The horses seem to be old timers in the tourist business and it takes a first class horseman to get one of them in a trot or even in a walk if you're going away from the stable. Nonetheless, we spent a couple of bucks that were enjoyed very thoroughly.

THE DRIVE OUT of Red River toward Eagle's Nest is especially scenic. In the space of a couple of miles or so of horse-shoe curves you climb to 9,825 feet. It was raining all the way, and this cut down the view somewhat and made driving fairly hazardous. Looking down 2,000 feet is kind of breath-taking. The Joneses went with us on this trip.

EAGLE'S NEST is kind of disappointing after what you hear about it. It has a half-dozen stores, a few tourist courts, and some gas stations. They have a lake, which is supposed to be well stocked with trout, but it's like Lake Cisco — it's very low. They're doing a lot of road work between Red River and Eagle's Nest, and driving is pretty slow.

WE STOPPED IN the canyon beside the highway and let the children play in the stream of cold water. Also, they climbed a small mountain and thoroughly enjoyed same. Our young son announced that "when I get big I'm going to come up here and go into the lumber jacking business." And with trees so numerous and big, it doesn't sound like a bad idea.

THE RED RIVER country is probably the best fishing part of northern New Mexico. We saw a lot of fishermen and some of them were catching trout. But most of them weren't. Guess New Mexico is kind of like Texas — there are more fishermen than fish.

We've enjoyed a couple of trout dinners at the cafe. The best and cheapest fish you can find in this country are at the cafe. If you want to fish, you have to have a New Mexico license which costs \$3 per person. And it takes special equipment to fish for trout.

IF YOU GET up in this country, you'll want to make a ten-cent investment like we did today. For ten cents, you can buy three Mexican jumping beans. The beans are the size of a choco-

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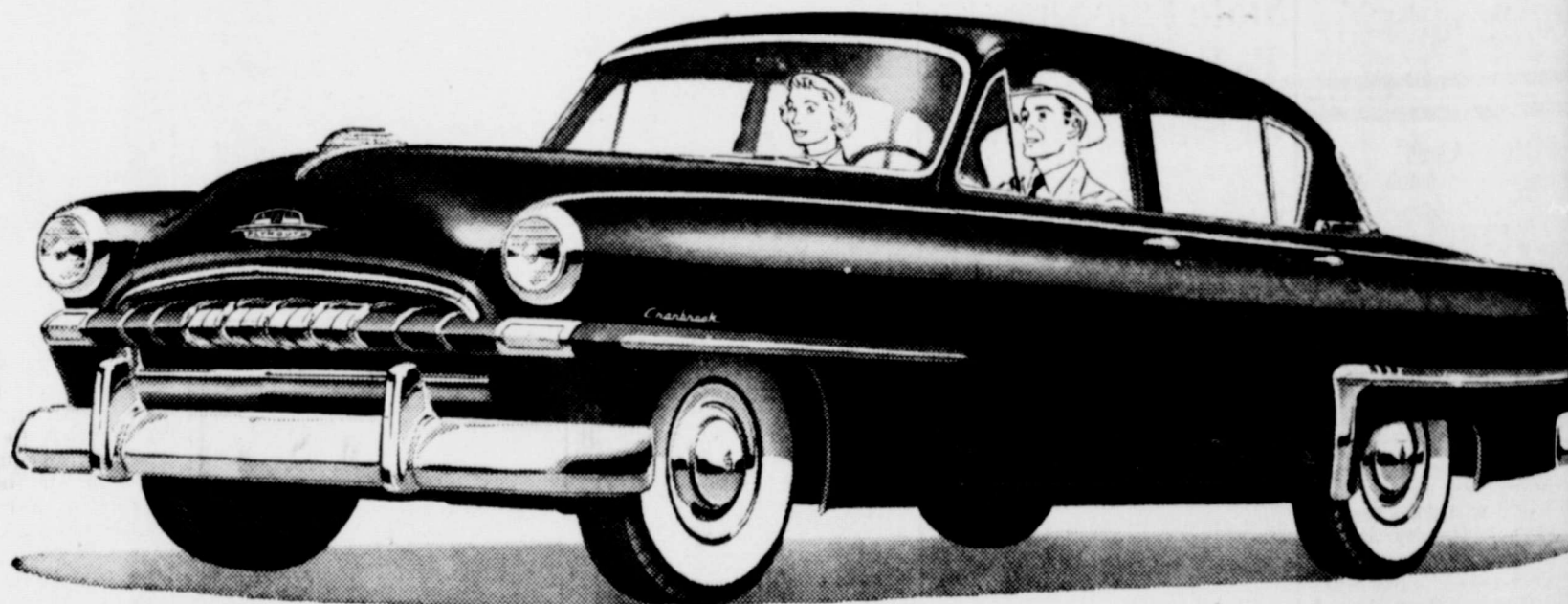
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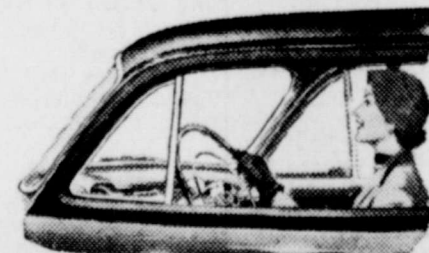
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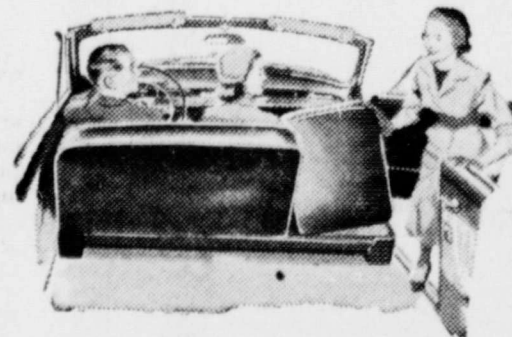
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
