Speeding Tab Races Into Dollars

Jury Lesson For Student

It was Justice of Peace Leonard Henderson's first jury case.

The defendant was a student at Southern Methodist University in Dallas, handed a ticket Jan. 11 on Interstate 20 by State Highway Patrolman Danny Williams.

Williams claimed the boy was traveling 80 miles an hour and had a prior traffic record that included speeding, running stop signs and accidents.

Judge Henderson had answered the student's inquiry by letter, informing him he could plead guilty and pay a \$15 fine.

But the defendant wanted a jury trial and there he was in the Colorado City court room Friday afternoon.

with his jury. Two college buddies were with him and so was a young flyer who had piloted all four of them from Dallas for the trial.

Cost of the plane and pilot was \$135, the defendant said, but he quickly added that it was principle, not cost he was interested in.

He had hired a lawyer, too, and the fee wasn't below union prices.

Taxi fare from City-County Airport to the Courthouse was \$6.

"By the way, have you seen that taxi lately?" one of the buddies asked a Court house employee. "We asked if the \$6 was round trip, but it's one way."

The trial took a little more

time than Judge Henderson had expected. But it was all over about 4:10 p.m.

The jury's verdict? Guilty, with a fine of \$62.

"You could have had a summer cruise in the Bahamas," said one buddy to his chagrined friend, "for what all this is costing you."

Two long distance phone calls back to Dallas had upped the tab a little more — up toward the \$300 mark.

There was a brief parley after court adjourned, when the defendant asked about paying the fine by installments.

"You'll get your money," he said. "I've got a job."

The judge said he preferred cash.

So, the student reached into his pocket and peeled off enough twenty dollar bills to pay the tab.

Then, he yelled a parting salutation to Patrolman Williams and headed with his buddies for a place to eat before riding the taxi back to the plane.

"We're looking for a hamburger place," one of 'em laughed, "we'll be eating them for a month after this."

"And to think I cut physics class just for this," the guilty speeder muttered. Like he said, though, it wasn't the cost, but the principle of it all.

C-City Lone Leader For 5-AA Basketball

No. 2 Anson Here For Tuesday Test

Colorado High Wolves were undisputed leaders of District 5-AA basketball Saturday.

Coach Caddo Matthews wasn't taking any chances of 'em resting on their laurels, though, and he had his squad in the gym Saturday morning.

He was happy, all right, about the Wolves' 62 to 10 triumph against Winters a win that left his team all alone at top of the district.

But the coach thought his district leaders could have been sharper against the winless Blizzards.

And, to be truthful, he

didn't want to take any chances with two tough encounters coming up on this week's schedule. Anson Tigers here in Colorado City Tuesday night and Stamford Bulldogs in Stamford Friday night.

The important Colorado Anson clash here Tuesday will follow the 6:30 p.m. 12 team clash.

Colorado became undisputed leaders of District 5-AA with their Winters triumph as Hamlin's First Papers came from behind Friday night to dump Stamford, 56-33.

Until Friday, the Wolves and Stamford were tied at the top with one loss each. But now the Wolves have a 5-1 district record with Stamford, Hamlin and Anson bunched together in a second place tie with 4 wins and 2 defeats each.

While Hamlin's club, the Wolves, defeated only Tig day by a thin 35-31 margin, was beating Stamford, 56-33. Anson was trouncing Haskell 94 to 33, a loss which kept the Indians skidding with a 1-5 district record.

Although they weren't exactly razor sharp, the Wolves had little trouble with winless Winters Friday night as they led in every quarter and substituted liberally enroute to their 62 to 10 decision.

Only one of C-City's 11 players failed to score in the game.

Robert Brown and Riley Tilley led the Wolves with 11 points each, followed closely behind by Jerry Franks with 10 and Jimmy White with 8.

The Wolves moved out in front 12 to 6 in the first quarter with Tilley, Franks and Wayne Russell doing the scoring.

By end of the second period, the advantage was 33 to 20. Big guns in that quarter were Brown and Franks.

Tilley, Gary Parker and Kerry Campbell hogged scoring honors for C-City in the third, shoving the Wolves out in front 47 to 33.

Still outscoring Winters in the fourth, 15 to 10, the Wolves had White hitting for four field goals.

In the B-P team game, Colorado City scored a convincing 58 to 31 triumph with 16 players getting into the game.

4 Hurt in C-City Area Car Wrecks

A one vehicle highway accident 16 miles south of Colorado City Friday night injured Keith Negg, local trucking firm owner.

Negg, 27, was found in his wrecked pickup about 1:30 p.m. by State Highway Patrolman Danny Williams.

He was in Root Memorial Hospital Saturday with neck injuries severe head cut.

The trucker, who lives at 979 E. 15th St. and is the son-in-law of Sheriff Lewis Claxton, was the fourth person injured in auto accidents in Colorado City area within last few days.

NEFF WAS returning from San Angelo in his pickup when the mishap happened, apparently as he tried to avoid hitting two deer.

Passersby noticed the wrecked pickup on State Highway 163 (to Sterling City), but did not observe Neff. When they arrived in Colorado City, they reported the vehicle to police who notified highway patrol.

When Patrolman Williams went to the scene, he discovered Neff and radioed for a Kiker & Son ambulance.

Negg, in his hospital bed, recalled nothing about the accident.

The last he remembered was two deer — a buck and

a doe — on the highway.

ALSO IN ROOT Memorial Hospital Saturday was Bennie E. Black of Colorado City, Route 2, an employee of Robinson Drilling Company and foreman of Bob Robinson's Wild Horse Ranch.

He was taken to the hospital after complaining of neck and head pains following a collision at intersection of E. Sixth St. and Hickory.

Police said Black, driving a pickup, was traveling east on Sixth St. when he stopped at the Hickory intersection. A 1965 Mustang, driven by Diana Womack Haynes of Big Spring, also east on Sixth, was in collision with the rear of Black's pickup.

Mrs. Sharon Walls, whose Colorado City address is listed as 313 East Sixth St., re-

mained gravely injured Saturday in Big Spring's Cowper Clinic and Hospital.

She was injured and her brother, Gerald Dunlap, 5, was slightly hurt Thursday when the pickup truck Mrs. Walls was driving overturned between Westbrook and Big Spring near East Howard Field overpass.

Mrs. Walls, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Dunlap of Big Spring, received severe skull fractures, fractured pelvis and broken ankle. She has been unconscious since the accident.

County Gets Producer, New Drilling

Mitchell County has gained a new oil producer and another drilling site.

In addition, a wildcat test is scheduled to 5,900 feet near the county's southeast corner in Coke County.

Scheduled is a 3,500 foot project in late East Howard Field, seven miles southwest of Westbrook, is A. L. Holley and other of Big Spring No. 1-D T. L. McKenney.

Drill site is 330 feet from north and west lines, Section 26, Block 29, T-1N, T-6P Survey.

New Mitchell County producer is Mobil Oil Corporation No. 87 Mary Foster in late East Howard Field, nine miles southwest of Westbrook.

Initial pumping potential was 166 barrels of 28.2 gravity oil with 83 barrels of water daily.

Production was from perforations between 2,669 and 3,281 feet, total depth, with 4 1/2-inch casing set at 3,315 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 85-1 after fracturing with 60,000 gallons.

Tucker Drilling Company Inc. of San Angelo and Peter Henderson of New York will drill No. 1 Foster S. Price on a 320 acre lease in the Silver area of Coke County as a 5,900 foot rotary-wildcat to test Canyon pay.

Drill site will be 1,980 feet from north and 660 feet from east lines of Section 305, Block 1-A, H-2C Survey.

Voter Registration Rush

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However, there must be a hurry-up in registration Monday and Tuesday or the number of qualified voters in Mitchell County will not be heavy this year when citizens go to the polls to decide whether or not there will be a Colorado City Hospital District.

Hardegree said his office will remain open Tuesday, last day for voter registration, "as long as the people keep coming."

In other words, his office

will remain open after 5 p.m. if there are citizens waiting to register.

Last year, when poll taxes were still required, 2,211 persons paid the tax before Hardegree's office closed Jan. 31.

In 1965 the total number of poll taxes were only 1,788. So this year, the first for registration, the number is sure to be more than '65 and may go higher than 1966.

Registration certificate — just as a poll tax was required in the past — is necessary

for a citizen to vote in any election in 1967 whether it be city, county, school district, hospital district or state.

Only persons not requiring a registration certificate are persons 60 years of age before Jan. 1, 1967. These 60 year-olds and over are exempt and do not have to register for exemption when they are residents of cities under 10,000 population.

This is the same as for previous poll tax exemptions.

Members of Mitchell County Heart Association will meet Tuesday night to provide for the association's fund drive during February, National Heart Month.

Bob Barman, president of the association, said the campaign meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. in City National Bank's community room.

He urged attendance of all Heart Association members and all other interested persons.

"Our proper role," Barman said Saturday, "is to recruit volunteers to take the heart message to the public and this can be accomplished only through your help."

"The message is that heart and circulatory diseases are our number one enemy — outranking all other diseases and accidents two to one."

Barman stated that only through the assistance of volunteers can the Heart Association obtain funds for research, education, community service and advance with improvements.

The association president said it was this kind of public interest which enabled the Association to raise \$2,

000 as a volunteer agency last year in Mitchell County.

This was an increase of \$1,800 over what the association previously had obtained as a member of Mitchell County United Fund in 1965.

Goal for this 1967 campaign will be to at least match the \$2,100 raised in 1966.

"We wish to express our appreciation for this fine support each individual has and will continue to give us," he said.

Last year the Salvation Army's Mitchell County service unit provided aid to 503 needy persons.

This assistance included groceries, meals, medicine, clothing, lodging and transportation.

In addition, the unit sent six Mitchell County boys to the Salvation Army Camp last summer near Midlothian.

The Mitchell unit also co-operated in the Salvation Army's statewide welfare program for disaster relief, rehabilitation centers, homes and hospitals for unwed mothers, aid to prison parolees and their families, and other services.

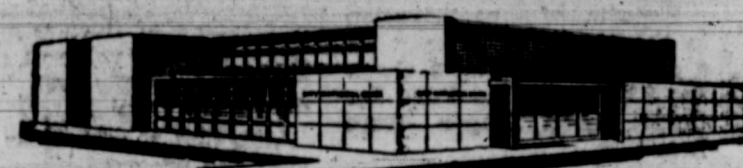
COW POKES
