On October the 2nd, 1935, I was appointed to the office of district attorney by Governor Allred to fill the office left vacant by the election of G. H. Nelson to the State Senate. This judicial district included Yoakum, Terry, Lynn, Garza, Dawson and Gaines counties.

Since assuming the duties of district attorney on the above mentioned date, I have tried to conduct the affairs of this office in a fair and impartial manner as between State and the defendants. I take this position that it is the duty of a district attorney to prosecute those brought before our courts to the limit of his ability, but that it is not his duty, and he should never, use his position to persecute any one.

When court convenes in Terry county the 20th day of this month I will have made a complete circuit of this district since my appointment.

Since I have not had the privilege of meeting all of you, permit me to say a few things relative to my qualifications for this office. I am 30 years of age. I live in the town of Tahoka. I have lived in Lynn county 29 years. My parents still reside in Lynn county on the same farm that we moved on 29 years ago. I received my college training in Wayland College in Plainview and the Texas Technological College in Lubbock. When 22 years of age and while a student in Tech college I made the race for and was elected to the office of county and district clerk of Lynn county, in which office I served for two terms. During the time I clerked I studied law and was admitted to the bar in February, 1932.

1932 I was elected county attorney for Lynn county in which office I served one term and part of a second term, when I was appointed district attorney as above stated. During the time I was in the county attorneys office I prosecuted all criminal cases in the justice courts, the county court and worked with the grand jury and assisted the district attorney in the trial of all felony cases in the district court of Lynn county. The record I have made thus far, as a man and as an officer, is before you out here on the Plains where I have lived practically all my life. Whether it is good or bad is a matter for you to determine.

I hope that you will not hold it against me, as a young man, to have an ambition to better my station in life. The office of district attorney is one that will provide a good living for my family; one that will advance me materially in my profession; and one that will give me an opportunity to render a greater service to the people among whom I have been reared. These are the reasons why I make this race. If you elect me to this office I pledge you my very best efforts. I will not betray the trust and confidence you impose in me.

Nina Elwanda Parks
Killed In Accident
Monday Near Welch

An automobile accident which occurred about 5:30 o'clock last Monday afternoon on a county road three miles east of Welch proved fatal for one, Nina Elwanda Parks, and injured three others less seriously.

Five members of the Parks family were traveling in an open topped Ford which was being driven by Mrs. J. B. Ethredge, sister of the Parks girl. The wind was blowing strongly and caused Mrs. Ethredges hat to blow down over her eyes, she then lost control of the machine and it hit a sand bar and turned a complete flip landing back on the wheels. The injured were rushed to a Lamesa hospital and given medical aid.

Nina was found to have a crushed chest and other internal injuries. Mrs. T. L. Parks, mother, sustained severe skin abrasions, the other occupants, Oral Parks, T. I. Parks, jr., and the driver, Mrs. Ethredge received only minor injuries.

Nina Elwanda lived almost 5 hours, dying at 10:45 P. M. in a local hospital. Funeral services were conducted Tuesday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock at the Draw church in Lynn county with Rev. J. P. Aslin officiating. Interment was also in the Draw cemetery.

Nina Elwanda attended school at Lou and was in the sixth grade. She was active in Sunday school work and led singing.

Survivors are the parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. I. Parks, three brothers, Vernon, T. I. jr., Oral Eugene, and one sister, Mrs. J. B. Etheridge, all of Dawson county.

MRS. ANNIE CROW SEEKS RE-ELECTION COUNTY TREASURER

The report would not be complete without some statement as to the benefits the farmers of the county have received from the A. A. A. although it has been ruled as unconstitutional by the Supreme Court of the land.

To get the comparisons we will take the prices of the cotton beginning in 1932:

Bales produced: 1932, 51,986; 1933, 8538; 1934, 5775; 1935, 22,000.

Value of lint and seed: 1932, \$1,559,580; 1933, \$426,900; 1934, \$288,750; 1935, \$1,320,000.

Benefit payments: 1932, none; 1933, \$33,000; 1934, \$325,277; 1935, \$426,058.

Sale of Tags: 1932, none; 1933, \$268,675; 1934, \$226,675; 1935, \$46,047.

Total cotton income: 1932, \$1,559,986; 1933, \$738,575; 1934, \$862,702; 1935, \$1,792,105.

Total income from cotton including the benefit payments for the four years \$4,674,493.

The above figures were taken as follows: 1932 bale of cotton and seed, \$30, 1933, \$50; 1934, \$55; 1935, \$60.

Total benefit payments and the sale of certificates amounted to \$1,099,157.

The above statement speaks for itself as to the most important work of the year, which required quite a lot of the agents time. However the entire program could not have been successfully put over without the assistance of the local and county committees. The corn hog program was handled in a very efficient manner by the committee and R. W. Herndon the secretary of the association. There were in the program over one hundred men who helped to put the program over. Without the assistance of these men the program could not have been handled. To these men go the credit for the great work that was accomplished.

Cattle Buying Program

The cattle buying program which carried into the year 1935 was worth the money in that the farmers were permitted to realize something for the cattle that would have starved to death had they not been sold to the government. And too, the cattle that were suitable for human consumption were canned by the various relief agencies over the state and later distributed to the local relief agencies who in turn distributed it to those persons who were on the relief rolls.

Over ten thousand head of cattle were bought from farmers in the county that would not as a rule have paid the freight bill had they been shipped to the markets and sold in the usual manner. These cattle were bought from 1252 producers in the county. The total payments from the government to farmers amounted to over \$120,000.

Soil Erosion

Soil erosion being one of the major problems of the county, was given considerable time by the agent in getting the farmers to agree to cooperate with the government. Over forty-six thousand acres were signed up by the officials of the C. C. C. Camp for terracing and contouring as well as setting of trees. This work represents 118 farmers and ranchers. This was accomplished by the cooperation of the farmers and business men mentioned above county committees who aided wonderfully in getting the cooperation of the land and also the various community and farmers.

Our hats should be taken off to the community committee at Munger who have signed practically one hundred per cent of the farmers in that school district. Mr. Warren R. Landrum states that this committee went with him and helped to get the neighbors to agree to cooperate. This is the best record of any community in the county. Those who have signed up to cooperate with the program agree to strip crop their farms with some well rooted sorghum along with the cotton and the rows to be run on water level, with the thought of trying to prevent soil erosion by wind.

Prairie Dog Extermination

Today over 10,000 acres of dogs have been practically eradicated by the use of poison grain, this work being done in cooperation with the agent, U. S. Biological Survey, farmers, ranchers, and the C. C. C. camp officials and enrollees. The Biological Survey supervised the work and the CCC boys doing the labor, while the commissioners court helped in getting the work done as the court is standing good for the cost of the grain, which will be added to the taxes of those who do not cooperate with the dog eradication work. According to one of the prominent ranchers of the county the land will support more than two times the number of cattle for grazing purposes after the dogs have been exterminated.

Over 12,000 pounds of grain have been used in this work.

The above are some of the major parts of the work of the agent during the year in addition to the regular extension work that has been done in the county.

INCREASE IN MENINGITIS IS NOTED IN TEXAS

Austin, Jan. 7.—A definite increase in the number of cases of epidemic cerebro-spinal meningitis has been noted in Texas, according to Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer. While the number of these cases is not alarming as yet, preventative measures should be followed.

The best method of escaping this disease is the prevention of overcrowding either at home or in public. Overcrowded conditions in camps, barracks, jails, or other institutions where men are brought in close contact are most favorable for outbreaks. Children and old people are more susceptible than those of middle age, and negroes contract meningitis more frequently than whites.

Persons with colds and coughs should stay indoors if possible, should practice personal hygiene and cough into their handkerchiefs.

The early symptoms of meningitis are those of a cold or influenza. If one has headache, backache, fever and chilly sensations, he should consult his family doctor at once. Healthy carriers spread the disease from their nose and throat to those who are more susceptible. Most adults are not susceptible to the disease. The earlier the diagnosis is made, the better are the chances of recovery. All suspicious cases must be isolated.

RECORD CHEVROLET SALES CONTINUED IN DECEMBER

Retail sales of Chevrolet cars and trucks in the second 10 days of December continued at a record breaking rate according to figures released today by Chevrolet Motor Company. They totaled 31,797 units, an increase of nearly 200 per cent over the same period last year, and 31 per cent over the high figures established in the preceding 10 days. These figures brought the total for the first 20 days of the month to 55,915 units, as compared with 22,792 in the first 20 days of December 1934.

Used car sales also showed an upward trend. The second 10 days sales were 42,854 units, as compared with 26,274 in 1934, and 36,911 in the second 10 days in November. The first 20 days used car sales were 77,889 units, an increase of 54 per cent over the same period last year.

Present new car schedules for January, it was announced, are 110,000 units which will require peak production throughout the month. In light of the fact that orders are still arriving from dealers in large volume, heavy output is indicated through February and probably well into Spring.

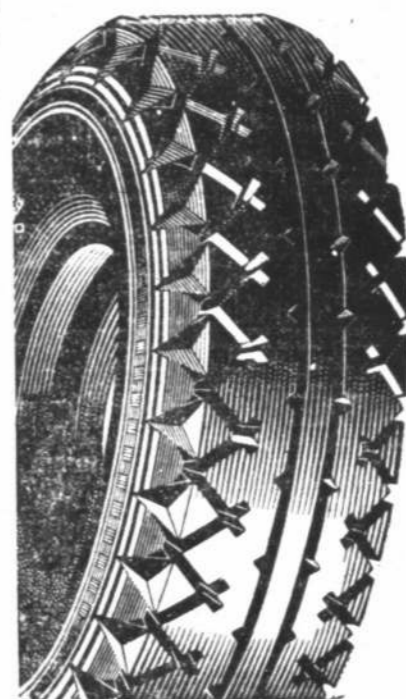

Soil Conservation Officials Visit County

On Tuesday, December 31, Lamesa and Dawson county were visited by Mr. H. H. Fennell, Regional Conservator of the ECW-SCS together with several Engineers, Agronomists and others connected with the work in West Texas, New Mexico, Colorado, Oklahoma, and Kansas districts.

The purpose of their visit was one of inspection covering the Lamesa District gaining first hand information relative to the different types of erosion and discussing ways and means of controlling same.

A field trip of approximately 100 miles was taken. The work already done was inspected and discussed, and the work contemplated was covered.

A conference was held on the night of December 31 and was attended by all of the visiting as well as all of the ECW-SCS personnel located at the local camp. Mr. Fennell was in charge of this meeting. He gave valuable information relative to general conservation work employing in particular the problems to do with this district. A general roundtable discussion was then held lasting for several hours.

The men spent the night in Lamesa and left early the following morning for the camp in Littlefield.

Mr. Fennell and his staff will visit each of the Soil Conservation camps in this district and in so doing gather information in regards to the different types of soil erosion problems in each area. At the close of this trip, which will last about three weeks, these gentlemen will return to the headquarters office in Amarillo, and compile a report of all of the information gathered. This report will be sent to each of the camps in order that they may profit by the information.

Connel, Range Examiner; J. C. Wilcox, Engineering Department; C. W. Humble, Education and Information; C. Luker, Conservationist; M. S. McMurtrey, Assoc. Biologist; Eugene C. Buie, Assoc. Agricultural Engineer; Ray Grace, Sr. Engineering Department.
