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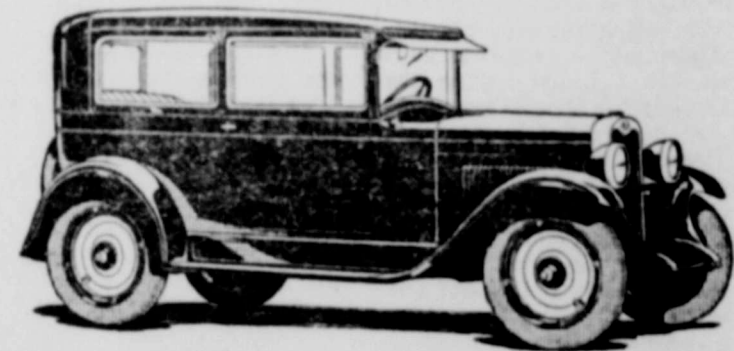

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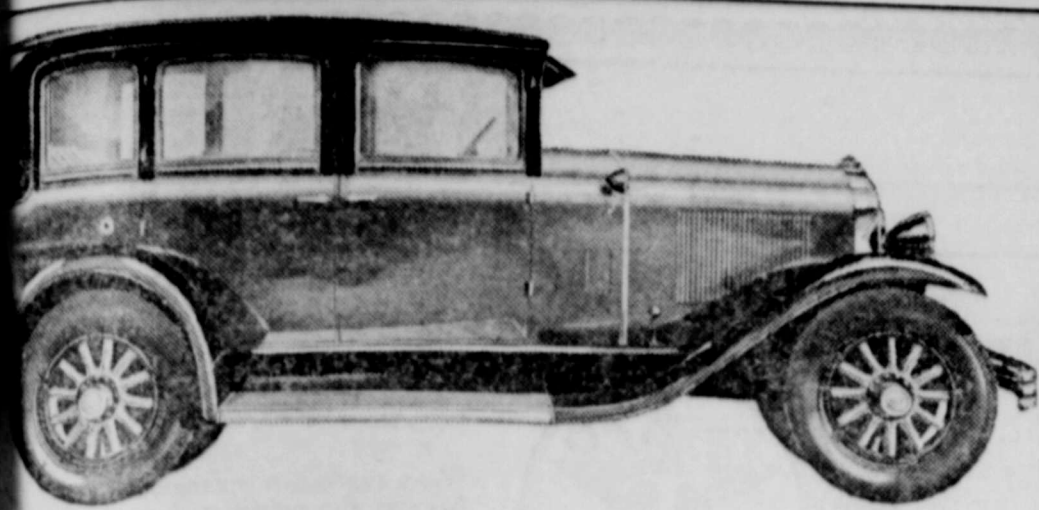

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The car's appearance factor is
still further enhanced by smaller
wheels and large-section tires, which
makes the new Buick seem lower,
though its road clearance is actually
unchanged. Large new hubs, new
easy-on radiator cap, and re-locat-
tion of the Buick trademark—in a
new and distinctive monogram—on
the radiator honeycombing instead
of the shell, lend additional touches
of beauty. The new head and park-
ing lamps, on their chromium-plat-
ed brackets, also are noteworthy
features.

Interior refinements making for
beauty, as well as for riding and
driving ease, are numerous. Not
only the steering column, but the
entire front seat of closed models,
is now adjustable to the require-
ments of any driver. A small hand
knob just under the edge of the
seat cushion accomplishes adjust-
ment, without inconveniencing driv-
er or passenger. The seat locks au-
tomatically in any of the seven po-
sitions within its 3 1/2-inch range.
The gearshift lever is longer, and
is inclined toward the driver at its
upper end, making for easier control
of the gears. The accelerator ped-
al and rest are new, and were de-
signed to permit movement of the
foot without affecting the car's speed.
Ventilators are provided in the cowl,
at foot level, to be operated by the
foot. Electric windshield wiper
with tandem blades which clear the
entire width of the windshield are
standard on all closed models.

The instrument panel is entirely
new. Its 90-mile speedometer is
mounted directly before the driver,
and a new hydrostatic gasoline
gauge, the most accurate type, is
provided. Body hardware, including

door handles of the theft-resisting
design, is entirely new. A thief may
force a door handle, but this will
neither open the door nor break
the lock mechanism so that the
owner cannot operate it with his
key.

The chassis improvements are
sweeping, and represent, in the ag-
gregate, a tremendous advance in
power and in the factor of safety.
In the first place, wheelbase lengths
have all been extended, the 114-1/2-
inch wheelbase becoming 116-inch,
the 120-inch becoming 121-inch, and
the 128-inch, 129. Horsepower of

the two Buick engines has been step-
up from 63 to 74, and from 77 to
90 1/2. Buick stresses the fact that
increased piston displacement ac-
counts for only part of the power
increase, the remainder being due
to new design of camshaft, valve,
mechanism, carburetor, intake mani-
fold, and exhaust. In other words,
the power increase is out of propor-
tion to the increase in weight, a

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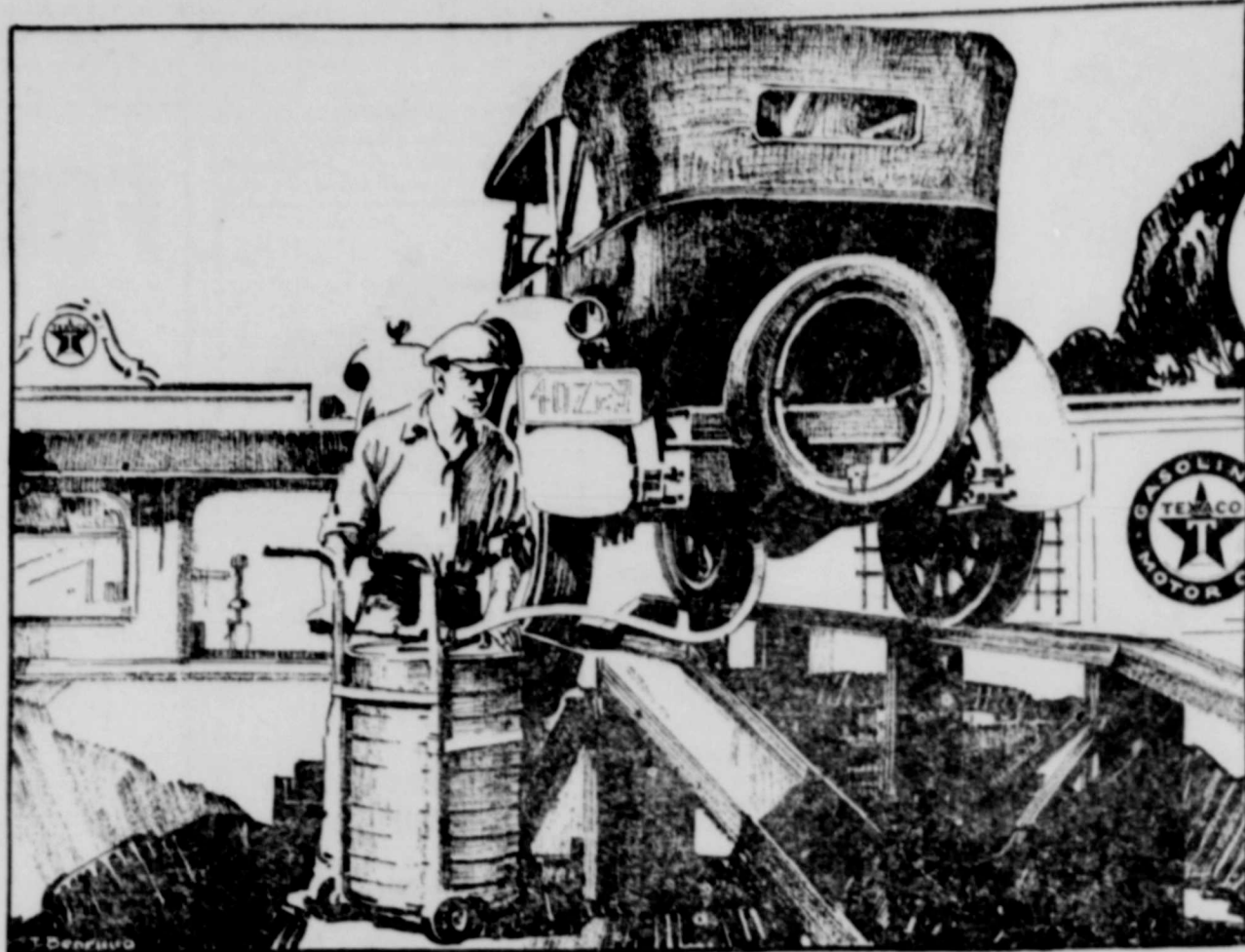

BOY SCOUT NEWS



"The Boy Scouts Movement is not merely for the purpose of providing pleasurable recreation for the boys," declares the chairman of the local Boy scout committee, which is working in cooperation with similar committees at Spearman and Guymon, and other committees over this section of the country toward the organization of a first class Council of the Boy Scouts of America to promote and supervise Scouting in the counties of Cimarron, Texas, and Beaver in Oklahoma and Dallas, Sherman, Hansford Ochiltree Lipscomb, Hartley and Moore in Texas.

The movement is one of America's greatest assets, in that it is helping to train her most valuable possessions, her boys, her citizens of tomorrow and while this program which holds all that the average boy wants in the way of adventure and romance, so much is included to promote the health, both physical and mental growth of the boy, so that he may grow into manhood fresh of mind and strong in body. It also very definitely impresses him with his responsibilities to his home, his school, his church and his country.

Boys are more serious minded than we give them credit for being. A duly sworn witness in a court of law feels not more obligated than does the little lad who stands at attention before his Scoutmaster, with his hand raised at the sign of a Scout, and repeats the "Scouts Oath", the words that make him a Scout: "On my honor I will do my best to do my duty to God and my Country and to obey the Scout Law; to help other people at all times; to keep myself physically strong, mentally awake and morally straight."

Scouting is positive. There are no "Donts" in Scouting. Scouting is not learned through lectures. It is learned by doing. The Scout does not preach kindness; he is kind. He does not preach reverence; he is reverent, faithful in his religious

duties, and he respects the convictions of others in matters of custom and religion. The Scout does not preach helpfulness—he is helpful. He pledges himself upon the honor of a Boy Scout to do at least one good turn for somebody every day, without pay; and the full meaning of this Scout Honor is best explained in the following true story:

A small unlettered Mexican boy, who only with difficulty could speak the English language, chanced one evening to drop into the meeting of a Boy Scout troop in one of our Texas border towns, and he heard the Scoutmaster stress the sacredness of the Scout Oath, and explain the full meaning of "Scout Honor". Afterwards in some manner he came into possession of a "Handbook for Boy Scouts" and possibly from the illustrations in that book he learned something more of what Scouts do and what Scouting means to boys. But there is no record of his having any further connections with Scouting. Time passed and one day he appeared in court as the "tool" of some men on trial. It was believed that the boy knew some facts that would result in the conviction of these men, but this he steadfastly denied. In vain was he put through the "third degree"; and the most rigid examination conducted by trained investigators failed to shake him. The officials were on the verge of giving up when an idea occurred to one of the state's attorneys. "My boy," he asked, "are you a Scout?" The lad shook his head negatively. "Have you ever been a Scout?" was the next question, to which the boy replied that he had attended troop meetings and that he knew "a lot" about the Scouts. "Then," continued the lawyer, growing more serious, "you must know what the Scout's honor is; you must know that a scout is pledged to do his best for his country, and that means he must do what he can to bring men who have wronged their country by breaking its laws to justice, for the protection of others. These men are guilty we know; and you can tell us what we will need to know to convict them. Isn't this true? I want you to answer on your Scout's honor." It was too much for the little fellow. For a moment he hesitated, but then proudly raising his head he said, "Yes", and followed with a full confession.

Scouting is a game, but all of life is likewise a game. But men are needed in this great game of Scouting. Red-blooded men, outstanding, forward-looking men of character. There is no greater service a man

can render than in training and helping the boys and girls of today so that the average child today can become a better-than-average citizen of tomorrow."
