Lebanese minister criticizes U.S. peacekeeping efforts

Lebanese Prime Minister Shafik Wazzan publicly accused U.S. presidential envoy Philip Habib today of backtracking on when to deploy peacekeepers in west Beirut and said this threatened "every other aspect" of talks on the evacuation of the PLO from the battered city.

At the same time, Soviet President Leonid I. Brezhnev warned President Reagan that if U.S. Marines were sent into west Beirut "the Soviet Union would build its policy with due consideration of this fact." He did not elaborate, but the Kremlin supports PLO chief Yasser Arafat, who publicly has spurned Reagan's offer to send in the Marines as part of a multinational force to evacuate the guerrillas.

Wazzan said the force, which also would include French paratroopers, should deploy "before or simultaneously with the start" of the evacuation of Arafat's Palestine Liberation Organization. "But I have been surprised by a non-Lebanese insistence that the deployment of these international forces should take place after the departure of the Palestinians, which negates much of the need for and the usefulness of these forces."

"ALL THROUGH the talks with Mr. Philip Habib I have been determined to keep the details from official publicity pending the arrival at a final agreement," Wazzan said. "But this new position came as a shock, which I am afraid, would reflect on every other aspect of the talks."

The Wazzan statement was issued by his office and broadcast on the state radio and published in all Beirut newspapers. There was no immediate comment from Habib, who has been trying for three weeks to put together a peacekeeping agreement that would stave off a ground assault on west Beirut by Israeli forces who invaded Lebanon June 6 to crush the PLO.

Wazzan believes the U.S. and French force is needed to shield the estimated 8,000 withdrawing guerrillas and their 12,000 leftist Moslem Lebanese compatriots left behind in west Beirut from reprisals by rightist Lebanese Christian militiamen allied with Israel in mostly Christian east Beirut, said a source close to Wazzan who requested anonymity.

The source said Habib's surprise position was behind the conference Wazzan called Wednesday evening with the PLO leadership, the leaders of leftist Moslem groups and other Moslem elder statesmen and religious dignitaries.

"The Moslems are united behind Wazzan," said the independent Beirut daily An-Nahar. "Wazzan will convey this position to Habib today with a notice that Islamic leaders are not prepared to bring more pressure on the PLO or compromise on the role of the international force."

In Washington, a Defense Department spokesman said "time is of the essence" in Habib's peace effort. Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger said Israel had given Habib a Sunday deadline, but Israel's Washington Embassy and Weinberger's own spokesman, Henry Catto, later said there was no firm time limit.

THE ISRAELIS KEPT up the military pressure, pounding PLO strongholds in two west Beirut neighborhoods for two hours starting at sunset Wednesday. The Palestinian news agency Wafa said Israeli ground troops made three attempts to advance from their positions near the paralyzed Beirut airport, but were stopped by PLO forces.

Meanwhile, Israel Wednesday eased its blockade of west Beirut, allowing drinking water and electricity into the predominantly Moslem district. The Israelis, who imposed the blockade last weekend, continued to bar food and fuel to the guerrillas and the estimated 500,000 civilians in west Beirut.

Israeli officials said their government was giving Habib additional time, and there was an optimistic mood among ministers at an Israeli Cabinet meeting in Jerusalem Wednesday. The ministers discussed "the political arrangements which will bring about the total evacuation of all the terrorists from Beirut and Lebanon," a Cabinet communique said.

Prime Minister Menachem Begin's spokesman, Uri Porat, said the Cabinet reiterated its refusal to allow the Palestinians to leave a political bureau in Beirut or station two small fighting units with the Lebanese army.

However, Israeli officials, who asked not to be named, said that once the PLO leaves and a strong Lebanese central government is established, Israel could not prevent the Palestinians from applying for permission to open offices on Lebanese soil.

Israel radio said a nine-point plan suggested by Habib and Lebanese negotiators provided for French forces and the U.S. Marines offered by Reagan to supervise evacuation of the Palestinians to Latakia, a Syrian port north of Lebanon, on boats flying the International Red Cross flag.

The radio said that if disagreements were ironed out, a sea evacuation could begin Friday.

HOWEVER, FORMER Lebanese Prime Minister Saeb Salam, a key intermediary between Habib and Arafat, said problems remained over how many Palestinians would leave west Beirut, where they would go, and how they would get there.

Salam told reporters the PLO wants "to go by land to the Bekaa Valley. To the Americans, this is like staying in Beirut."

The valley in eastern Lebanon is where most of Syria's 30,000-man Lebanese force has regrouped after fighting Israel in the early stages of the invasion.

Elevator safety not local concern

An absence of local, state and federal regulations governing elevator safety and maintenance in Texas has created what some state occupational safety officials consider a "window of vulnerability" in elevator safety.

But several elevator company representatives and building managers in Midland insist that their present system of service contracts and regular maintenance provides sufficient safeguards and precludes a need for government intervention.

Robert Lusk, Midland branch manager for Dover Elevator Co., said his company follows a national elevator safety code established by the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) and maintains service contracts with its customers.

"Personally, I think it's a very good system," said Lusk, whose company services about 100 elevators in the Midland-Odessa area.

UNDER A maintenance agreement with a customer, Dover employees regularly examine elevator systems, providing routine inspection, lubrication and adjustments or repairs when needed.

Lusk said complex, high-rise building systems are usually inspected weekly, while less elaborate systems are scrutinized semi-monthly.

"With any electrical or mechanical-type system, periodic problems will arise," Lusk said. "But all in all, with proper maintenance, the equipment is virtually trouble free" and "100 percent safe."

Service contracts are a must, according to Paula Nodwell, property manager for the Building of the Southwest and the C&K Petroleum Building in Midland.

"If you do not have a service contract, you are not going to get good service," she said.

Nodwell said government elevator regulation seems unnecessary if elevator owners and service companies tend to safety procedures.

"WE KNOW WE'RE doing everything that can possibly be done. I don't think you're going to find any safer elevators," she said.

Lusk said all major elevator companies comply with the safety code established by ANSI, a standard-setting organization for several industries.

Although the code is not equivalent to government law, "it's law as far as we're concerned," Lusk said. "It covers, I'd say, every component relative to an elevator system."

Robert Young, local representative for Otis Elevator Co., which maintains about 135 elevators in 65 area buildings, echoed Lusk's view.

"As far as I'm concerned, the ones that are under contract are safe," he said. Young said Otis maintains service contracts with all but a few customers. He declined to specify those customers without service contracts, but said Otis employees, armed with inspection checklists, regularly examine elevators owned by contract customers.

"So, it's not a hit and miss proposition," Young said.

BUT "HIT AND miss" is exactly (See LOCAL, Page 2A)

CIA arrangement lets Casey buy stock

WASHINGTON (AP) — The CIA has set up a "screening arrangement" aimed at preventing CIA director William J. Casey from taking official actions for personal gain, but the new system still allows Casey to buy and sell stock at his discretion. The new system was established in May, after Casey reported selling more than \$600,000 in oil stock in 1981, a year when oil stock prices fell amid a worldwide glut. Also in 1981, the CIA reversed itself and predicted the Soviet Union would not be importing oil in the 1980s.

Government ethics chief J. Jackson Walter called the new plan a "good and thorough system" for policing possible conflicts of interest. But some senators and a Carter administration ethics adviser contend it offers little new protection against the CIA director's misusing information in his stock dealings.

The CIA director is one of a handful of top officials with broad access to U.S. intelligence information, including secret government estimates of world oil supplies. Casey is the only senior Reagan official with such access who neither set up a blind trust nor divested some of holdings before taking office.

Under the screening arrangement, the deputy director John McMahon and other senior CIA officials are to be furnished regularly with a list of Casey's stock transactions.

If an official spots a potential conflict, he is to bring the matter to McMahon, who, in consultation with CIA general counsel Stanley Sporkin and his staff, will decide if Casey should be excluded from making a decision.

Or, McMahon and Sporkin can tell Casey that one of his holdings will be affected by an upcoming decision and let him decide whether to divest the holding or to excuse himself from the matter.

In an interview, Sporkin said he and McMahon would exclude Casey from any

decisions involving major holdings and offer him the choice only when the holdings were very small. "I'm not going to let him get himself into trouble," Sporkin said.

One Democrat on the Senate Intelligence Committee, who asked not to be identified, called the new screening system a "fig leaf" that would do little except waste the time of the CIA professionals, who would monitor Casey's stock dealings.

Casey's two predecessors at the CIA — Stansfield Turner and George Bush — put their investments in blind trusts, which prevent an official from trading stock while in office.

Sporkin described the new screening system "as good or better than a blind trust under the circumstances."

The CIA general counsel said Casey would be deterred from misusing government information for gain, because he must disclose annually each of his stock trades and because his investment adviser has discretion to buy or sell stock without consulting Casey.

But Bernard K. Wruble, a Washington attorney who headed the federal ethics office during the Carter administration, said he saw "some holes" in the screening agreement. Without written definitions of a conflict of interest, "it is just mush," he said.

He added the system would help avoid favoritism in awarding contracts. But he questioned whether it would solve conflict questions about CIA covert actions to influence foreign events even though these might substantially affect Casey's investment in firms that operate abroad.

Thornberry says only he is qualified

Calling his Democratic opponent an "urban cowboy" who donned a hat, jeans and belt buckle for the state agriculture commissioner campaign, Fred Thornberry contended Wednesday during a news conference here that he is the only qualified candidate for the position.

Speaking at the Midland County Republican Headquarters, Thornberry, 45, pointed out he is employed by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and has served as consultant to foreign and U.S. producers.

Jim Hightower, his opponent, beat incumbent Reagan Brown in the Democratic primary and will face Thornberry in the Nov. 2 general election.

Thornberry centered his comments on what he called the liberalism of Hightower. "When my opponent was busy raising Cain with other student radicals during the '60s while getting a

government degree, I had already earned a degree in vocational agriculture and was working as an agricultural research scientist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station," he said.

Thornberry was placed on the ballot after the May 1 primary by the Republican Party. He said he had expected Brown, being an incumbent, would be selected for a second term by the Democrats and later by Texas voters in the general election. On that assumption, he didn't go after the post.

"I'm a working man and can't afford to be unemployed for a year as some of these politicians do. I was going to run for the position in four years," Thornberry said.

He criticized a plan by Hightower to get rid of the middle man in the agriculture business. In cutting out the middle man, Thornberry says it means eliminating 40 percent of the jobs in Texas, which rely "directly or indirectly on agriculture."

Customer takes matters into own hands

ODESSA — An apparently disgruntled Enbridge Gas Co. customer took matters into his own hands here Wednesday and forced a company employee at gunpoint to turn his gas service back on.

The employee told police he was working in an alley behind 410 Bunche about 4 p.m. when a man approached, stuck a gun to his neck and said, "You gonna turn my gas on right now. They

cut it off."

The employee said he was taken to a house at 401 Carver, where he complied with the man's wishes. He was then ordered to light the water heater and told: "Now get the hell out of here."

Police indicated that it shouldn't be hard to locate the suspect, who was also armed with a knife.

Man said he was robbed, forced to strip

Police responding to citizen complaints about a nude man running near the downtown area Wednesday found a 52-year-old man who told him he had been robbed and forced to disrobe by a hitchhiker he had picked up earlier.

The man told officers he picked up the hitchhiker near 2nd and Kelly streets. The hitchhiker said he was going to the unemployment office, but threatened the man and took \$1.17 from him before getting behind the

wheel in an alley and ordering him to strip.

They drove around for a while before the man was able to leap from the car at a red light at the intersection of 6th and Muskingum. He ran into the nearby Women and Children's Hospital, but not before police began receiving calls about a man running the streets naked.

The man said the hitchhiker also took his 1976 Pontiac.

Threat of rain remains in local forecast

Bankers call for firing of archbishop

ROME (AP) — Italian banking officials have asked Pope John Paul II to fire American Archbishop Paul Marcinkus as head of the Vatican bank because of his alleged involvement in a banking scandal, the Daily American reported today.

The burly 60-year-old archbishop from Cicero, Ill., is considered the most powerful American at the Vatican and is also the pope's bodyguard and trusted adviser.

The English-language newspaper quoted unidentified Vatican and government sources as saying the request to dismiss Marcinkus came to the pope in a memo from three Bank of Italy commissioners appointed to run Banco Ambrosiano, Italy's largest private bank.

The paper quoted the memo as saying Marcinkus should be fired "to avert further embarrassment for the state investigators who are forced to carry out their duties. It is in the best interests of the Holy See that the archbishop not remain in a position of suspicion."

Marcinkus could not be reached immediately for comment, but has denied earlier press accounts he may be removed. The Vatican and banking officials have consistently refused to comment on the case.

The archbishop, president of the Vatican bank since 1971, also heads the Vatican City administration, which runs the 108-acre city-state's day-to-day affairs. He also coordinates security on papal trips abroad.

The Vatican bank, founded in 1942, provides banking services for an estimated 7,000 customers, mostly clergy, ambassadors accredited to the Holy See and Roman Catholic institutions.

Marcinkus has come under public scrutiny recently for dealings with Banco Ambrosiano and the bank's pres-

ident, the late Roberto Calvi. The Vatican bank owns 1.58 percent of Banco Ambrosiano.

Calvi, who was appealing a 1981 con-

viction for illegally exporting \$26.4 million out of Italy, was found hanging from a London bridge June 18. It has not been determined whether his

death was suicide or murder.

At the time of his death, the 61-year-old financier was under investigation by the Bank of Italy for "questionable" high-risk loans of \$1.4 billion to three Latin American subsidiaries of Banco Ambrosiano.

Italian-language papers and the Daily American have quoted the banking commissioners as saying Marcinkus signed a letter of patronage to Calvi for the loans, meaning the Vatican bank could be held liable if they are illegal or in default. The exact nature of the loans and their legality has not been determined.

There have also been reports that Marcinkus has another letter from Calvi releasing the Vatican bank from all but \$250 million of the debt.

Vatican sources say Marcinkus resigned last week from the board of directors of a Bahamas subsidiary of Banco Ambrosiano that received part of the loan.

Italian papers have said several cardinals have been pressuring John Paul to dismiss Marcinkus to insulate the Vatican from the Calvi scandal.

Marcinkus has denied any wrongdoing as president of the Vatican bank, officially known as the Institute for Religious Works. He told the Chicago Tribune on Wednesday that he would not quit.

"I don't resign under these circumstances," he was quoted as saying. "I have not been involved with anything that could be considered fraud. I am completely unaware of any move by the Holy Father to get rid of me."

Italian papers have speculated John Paul would not fire Marcinkus but promote him to head of the Chicago archdiocese. The post became vacant when Cardinal John P. Cody died of a heart attack April 25.

Britain still holds Argentine prisoners

LONDON (AP) — Britain has scaled down its demands for the release of 600 Argentine war prisoners still held following the Falkland Islands conflict.

The Defense Ministry said the prisoners, including Brig. Gen. Mario Benjamin Menendez, commander of Argentina's vanquished Falkland Islands invasion force, were being held aboard British ships moored off the Falklands capital of Stanley.

A spokesman said the ministry has not yet decided the destination of the prisoners. A government source said they might be brought 8,000 miles to Britain.

The British have returned 11,200 Argentines captured when the Argentines surrendered after the fall of the Stanley garrison June 14. Argentina invaded the Falklands April 2 to assert its claim of sovereignty over the British colony 250 miles east of the Argentine mainland.

At first, Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher's government said it would keep the other 600 prisoners — mostly officers and military specialists — until it received an "authoritative" Argentine statement that hostilities were over in the Falklands and their dependencies, and in the air-and-sea corridor between the islands and the Argentine mainland.

But Mrs. Thatcher's government has now watered this demand down to "positive indications" that the new Buenos Aires government considers the fighting over.

IT WAS NOT clear what this might entail, but one official close to Mrs. Thatcher said:

"We need something stronger than a cease-fire. We realize that Argentina may not renounce its claim to the Falklands, but we need to know that Argentina will not excoet our ships again."

The official was referring to the sinking of two British ships by Excoet missiles during the 74-day undeclared war, and to Argentina's long-standing claim of sovereignty over the islands.

Argentine President Leopoldo Galtieri, who led his nation into the conflict, was ousted by his military colleagues after the fall of the Stanley garrison because he refused to accept defeat.

Nonetheless, reports from Argentina indicate the new military government is in no hurry to give Britain the assurances it wants, hoping the British will agree to negotiate the future of the islands. Mrs. Thatcher ruled out such talks following the British victory.

British officials admit they can't keep the prisoners aboard ships indefinitely and world opinion may soon start to turn against London.

ALTHOUGH THERE never was a formal declaration of war between Britain and Argentina, the British said they would abide by the Geneva Convention on prisoners of war, and holding the captives is raising some questions about Britain's interpretation of the accord.

Article 118 of the 1949 Geneva Convention says prisoners "shall be released and repatriated without delay after the cessation of active hostilities."

British officials say that, technically, they have not violated this provision because they are not certain if Argentina considers "active hostilities" at an end.

But there has been no fighting on the islands since June 14, and the London Daily Mirror said holding the prisoners "appears to be in breach of the Geneva Convention."

Stamp to hold at 20 cents

SAN BRUNO, Calif. (AP) — The price of a first-class stamp should stay at 20 cents through early 1984, says the head of the U.S. Postal Service, which also gets good marks from an outside panel for cutting costs and improving productivity.

The National Academy of Public Administration released a year-long evaluation, financed by the postal service, at a monthly meeting Wednesday of the postal Board of Governors.

The academy began the \$500,000 study in July 1981, the 10th anniversary of the creation of the service as an independent federal agency. Its predecessor, the Post Office Department, had been a cabinet department.

Before his agency was praised by the chairman of the study panel, Postmaster General William F. Bolger told fellow governors that the postal service was \$24 million in the black for the 28-day period ending June 11. An \$84 million deficit had been anticipated.

The unexpected surplus, largely due to a lower-than-projected increase in consumer prices which held down pay increases, means the 20-cent stamp will stick around a few months longer than expected, Bolger said in an interview.

He predicted no hike in the stamp price "through early 1984." Before the latest fiscal month, the Postal Service was about \$600 million in the black, a spokesman said.

The panel found that United Parcel Service, a private company, pays higher wages than the Postal Service, does a bigger volume of parcel delivery, and could teach the Postal Service about efficiency.

Local officials feel secure about safety of elevators

what some occupational safety officials fear describes elevator safety and maintenance in Texas.

Walter G. Martin, state director of occupational safety, called elevator safety "a subject that has always worried me."

Martin said the state made progress in developing elevator regulations in 1972, but funding for the program was dropped in 1974.

Texas opted to curtail state safety programs in favor of broad standards and enforcement provided by the federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA).

OSHA rules are designed specifically for employer-employee situations — freight elevators, for instance. The same regulations don't apply for the myriad number of elevators used by the public in high-rise office and apartment buildings across the state.

While local government units may adopt elevator regulations, Houston remains the only Texas city to adopt its own elevator inspection program.

DESPITE APPARENT efforts by some elevator companies and owners to ensure safe operation, Martin expressed concern about a lack of additional safeguards obtainable through government regulation.

"Everybody hates government control," Martin conceded. "But without the threat of enforcement, you do not see complete voluntary compliance."

Martin estimated that some elevators

in the state have operated for 50 years without a safety inspection.

"There is no code that says they have to perform the way they should," he said. "If there's nobody to check up on them, how do you know they're doing what they're supposed to?"

Jerry Bailey, area director of occupational safety, said elevator safety is "definitely a problem area." In some cases, he said, "some of this preventive maintenance just doesn't get done."

James Brown, Midland city manager, says the city has never considered elevator regulations because "the question has never been raised before."

According to Al Baze, a Midland building inspector, city inspectors examine building plans to ensure that elevators meet fire code specifications. But once construction is complete and elevators begin operation, inspection and maintenance is left to the building's management and the elevator company.

John Bigelow, building manager for Midland's Summit Building, said that building owners will maintain safe elevators out of enlightened self-interest.

"I really don't think any more restrictions or regulations should be required," Bigelow said.

But Martin remains concerned that, while many buildings maintain their elevators properly, some less conscientious elevator owners may neglect safety while operating under what amounts to an elevator safety "honor system."

Sihanouk returns to Cambodia for visit

ARANYAPRATHET, Thailand (AP) — Cambodian Prince Norodom Sihanouk, head of a new rebel coalition fighting the Vietnamese in Cambodia, today visited a part of Cambodia controlled by his communist Khmer Rouge guerrilla allies, Thai army officers said.

It was the second time in two days Sihanouk slipped into his homeland since he fled when Vietnam invaded in late 1978.

The Khmer Rouge is part of the coalition formed June 22 with Sihanouk's neutral faction and a non-communist group called the Khmer People's National Liberation Front. Once bitter rivals, they joined forces to topple the pro-Hanoi communist government Vietnam installed in Phnom Penh, the Cambodian capital, after it invaded.

ern Cambodia and later toured a Cambodian refugee camp in Thailand where he was cheered by thousands of countrymen as he vowed to lead them in expelling the Vietnamese.

Pennzoil Co. finds North Dakota oil

HOUSTON — Pennzoil Company reported a Red River formation oil and natural gas discovery in western North Dakota that tested 557 barrels of high-gravity oil per day on restricted choke.

The McKenzie County well, Little Tank 19-21 BN, also flowed 50 barrels of water and 1.2 million cubic feet per day of gas through a 16/64-inch choke with 1,300 pounds per square inch tubing pressure.

The Williston Basin discovery is producing 50-gravity oil from the Ordovician Red River "C" formation from a gross pay section between 13,470 and 13,514 feet.

Pennzoil is operator for the well and holds a 25 percent working interest prior to project payout. The remaining 75 percent working interest is owned by: Laguna Petroleum Corp., NRM Petroleum Corp., Mineral Development Inc., Vision Inc., Petroleum Acquisitions Corp., Arbusto Energy, and Ivory and Sime Oil and Gas, Inc.

Milestone Petroleum Inc., a Burlington Northern Inc. subsidiary, manages a royalty interest and can assume a 45 percent working interest after project payout. The Little Tank discovery is Pennzoil's fourth this year on Burlington Northern's McKenzie County block.

The Little Tank well is located a little over two miles from the nearest oil production, and six miles northwest of Bull Moose field, a previously announced Pennzoil discovery in the Mission Canyon and Red River formations.

UNC tests metal ore analyzer

RICHLAND, Washington — UNC Nuclear Industries reports development of a portable, direct-reading ore assay instrument for silver, as the second application of its Metals Analysis Probe, or MAP. The MAP for uranium has been used successfully in both exploration and mine control since its introduction last year.

UNC Nuclear Industries is a subsidiary of UNC Resources, a diversified resource and manufacturing company, parent company of U.N.C. Texas, Inc., Midland.

"The development of the silver MAP now makes possible fast, on-the-spot silver analyses for exploration, longhole probing, ore pile evaluation and grade control," according to B. James Lowe, President of UNC's Systems and Service Division, where the MAP was developed. Lowe reports that the silver MAP will accurately and reliably assay silver at concentrations as low as one ounce per ton, making it an especially powerful tool for mine development and control.

The MAP, a highly-portable X-ray fluorescence assayer packaged into a rugged three-foot long, 1 1/4-inch diameter probe, gives a readout in a matter of seconds, while conventional assays often require weeks to be completed, Lowe noted.

The successful application of the MAP to silver is the second step in a UNC program which includes developing MAP systems for gold, tungsten, molybdenum, lead and the rare earths. Further extensions of MAP technology may include a portable field assayer capable of multi-element analysis.

Forced retirement studied

AUSTIN — Involuntary mandatory retirement — have you learned to love it or would you rather leave it? Dr. Guy Manaster would like to know.

Manaster, professor of educational psychology at The University of Texas, is conducting a study for the new State Department on Aging on the effects of involuntary mandatory retirement. Already completed is a survey of national and international literature dealing with the subject, but now some case histories showing how such retirement changed Texans' lives are needed.

The confidential information will be used to gauge how frequent involuntary retirement really is in Texas, as well as its effects.

The literature survey trends to be very biased, so personal comments would be an aid in assembling a more balanced picture, in Manaster's opinion.

The changing retirement age, existence of better business pension plans and inflation are all playing a role in retirement decisions today, both from the individual's point of view and the view of business, he notes.

Loffland christens ocean rig

TULSA — Loffland Brothers Company, oil industry pioneer of inland barge, offshore platform and mobile jackup rig drilling, has christened Ocean Master IV (OM IV), the first Loffland rig built in Japan, according to George W. Perry, executive vice president, international operations.

OM IV is a Baker Marine Corp. designed cantilever jackup rig (BMC-150) able to drill to 18,000 feet with five-inch drill pipe in 110 feet of water. Designated as Loffland's Rig 180, OM IV was manufactured and completed on schedule by Nippon Kokan K.K. (NKK) shipyard, Yokohama, Japan, site of the christening. The rig is the first of its class built under 1980 American Bureau of Shipping rules and to the rules of the U.S. Coast Guard.

SCR diesel-electric powered, the rig is equipped with four Caterpillar D-369 engines, a MidContinent U-914 drawworks and two Continental-Emco FB-1600 mud pumps. It begins its first assignment in Abu Dhabi in the Arabian Gulf. Operations Manager Richard Tucker will head Loffland's operation in Abu Dhabi, having transferred from Loffland's Venezuela operations. Other Loffland personnel also have been transferred to complement the Abu Dhabi staff.

Loffland Brothers offshore fleet of rigs now totals 27 with the addition on OM IV, making the company's worldwide land and sea inventory equal 129 rigs. Loffland Brothers, the largest drilling contractor, is a Kendavis Industries company.

Texaco strikes down south

HOUSTON — Texaco U. S. A. has made a new field discovery of natural gas and condensate in the south-central Rio Grande Embayment of south Texas.

The wildcat well, named No. 1 Barrera Estate, is located in southwestern Starr County, about 11 miles northwest of Rio Grande City. The well is 2.5 miles northeast of Texaco's Draco Field, which produces natural gas and condensate from the Eocene Queen City formation. The discovery tested at a rate of 3.5 million cubic feet of natural gas and 36 barrels of condensate per day from the Queen City sands at selected intervals between 6,240 and 6,256 feet through a 14/64-inch choke with flowing tubing pressure of 3,021 pounds per square inch. The well was drilled to a total depth of 9,017 feet.

The Rabbit GTI, to debut in October, will have a powerful four-cylinder engine but will look like the typical Rabbit on the outside, said James R. Fuller, vice president of the Volkswagen Division of VW.

"It's almost an understatement the way it is designed," he said Wednesday in an interview. "That's the beauty of the car. It will have an immediate transference of image from the Rabbit."

The GTI has been sold in Europe for four years and has become such a success it is sold on an allocation system, he said.

Solar energy installation dedicated

DALLAS (SWN) — The world's first linear Fresnel lens (optical magnifying device utilizing prisms to concentrate the sun's rays) photovoltaic solar energy installation was dedicated today at the Dallas/Ft. Worth (D/FW) Airport. The system was designed and engineered by E-Systems, Inc. under contract to the U.S. Department of Energy, Energy Programs Division.

"This system is the most efficient commercial-size photovoltaic power plant ever installed," said Dr. Walter J. Hesse, Vice President and General Manager of E-Systems Energy Technology Center.

The solar facility was built at a cost of \$1.1 million and is the only total solar energy (electricity plus hot water) system installed at an airport.

The solar power plant uses 110 collector modules which concentrate the sunlight onto photovoltaic cells. The cells, in turn, produce direct current electricity which is then inverted to 60 cycle alternating current electricity by a unique advanced-technology transistorized power conditioning unit. Collectively, the system generates 27 KW of electricity which is used to power the emergency lights in the airport's Central Utilities Plant, which is where the project is installed. It generates about 140 KW of thermal hot water to pre-heat the boiler feed water used to generate steam for air conditioning the total airport complex.

E-Systems is currently under contract to deliver to Sandia Laboratories a 22 KW photovoltaic total energy system. In addition to the D/FW project, E-Systems also has advanced-technology solar energy programs in Crosbyton, Texas, Phoenix, Arizona and Edwards Air Force Base, California.

Diamond Shamrock to buy Sigmor

DALLAS (AP) — Diamond Shamrock will buy out Sigmor Corp., a gasoline retailer which now carries Diamond Shamrock products, both companies announced Wednesday.

Diamond Shamrock, an energy and chemicals company, already owns 21 percent of the San Antonio-based Sigmor, which operates about 600 service stations, primarily in Texas, and a modern 50,000 barrel-per-day refinery.

The two have signed a letter of intent that calls for 44 shares of Diamond Shamrock's convertible preferred stock to be exchanged for every share of Sigmor's outstanding stock.

The preferred stock will earn a dividend of 34 cents the first year and \$2.07 per year thereafter. Each share of preferred is immediately convertible into one share of Diamond Shamrock common stock, the announcement said.
