ELECTION FOR MILLION DOLLAR BOND ISSUE PROBABLY JAN. 12

A county-wide road bond issue of \$1,000,000 to finance Lubbock county's part in paving the federal and state highways in this county probably will be held January 12, it was announced here yesterday by county commissioners following a meeting of the commissioners' court.

Because of the absence of J. T. Pinkston, commissioner of Precinct No. 2, definite action was not taken at yesterday's meeting on a petition containing more than 300 names presented to the court. The petition asked that an election be called for the million dollar issue, including the assumption of \$22,000 outstanding bonds in District one in addition to the highway paving construction. ROCHESTER, N. Y., Dec. 6 (P)—A telegraph wire operated two newspaper typesetting machines here today at the plant of the Rochester Times Union.

Dispatches by wire were transferred mechanically directly into the machines, with human touch eliminated, and were recorded in lines of metal type, each as long as a news column is wide. The object of the invention is to shorten the time and work required to transfer news from the place where it occurs to the printed page.

Today's operation was a private demonstration held in the presence of a gathering of men who direct large printing and publishing en-

terprises. They were the guests of Frank E. Gannett, publisher of the Gannett newspapers, who by his backing sponsored the invention.

Walter W. Moore, of East Orange, New Jersey, invented the machine, known as a teletype setter, and the Morkrum-Kleinschmidt corporation of Chicago built it.

The sending was done in the demonstration room to two machines on the opposite side of the room, which were operated simultaneously from the same wire. One was a Linotype and the other an Inter-type. The short sending wire was made equivalent to a distance of 140

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 6 (P)—Noah Beery, villain of the motion picture screen, today was under summons to appear in court and answer the charge of his wife that he carried the role into his home.

Mrs. Beery filed suit yesterday for divorce, charging cruelty.

Superior Judge Bishop ordered the screen actor to appear in court December 14 to show cause why he should not pay fees to his wife's attorney and an allowance for her support pending trial of the case.

Mrs. Beery's suit charged that her husband "abused, choked, struck and threatened" her.

Beery denied all the allegations. He said the divorce action was the result of "too much money and too many people to help her spend it."

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MAIL STUDY IS ATTACKED

INVESTIGATE EXTENSION COURSES OFFERED BY TEXAS COLLEGES

(By Associated Press)

PORT WORTH, Dec. 6.—An investigation into correspondence and extension courses offered by Texas colleges, which might result in removing some of them from the approved list, or in concentrating such work in one state institution, was authorized today by the Association of Texas colleges, which elected officers to head the group next year.

The investigation was voted after a report condemning practices allegedly involving almost every extension department in Texas. Dean W. J. McConnell of the North Texas State Teachers college, Denton, read the report.

A reply to his paper was made by H. H. Shelby, director of the extension service of the University of Texas, and general discussion followed McConnell's report.

As a result of this report, the report of another committee grading the three divisions the various extension and correspondence schools was only tentatively approved.

McConnell charged that correspondence courses in some cases are more a matter of convenience than of recognition with honesty in giving credit toward a degree.

The dean also charged dishonest practices by students and carelessness by instructors.

Detailing findings of a secret questionnaire among students of the teachers' college at Denton which showed students had selected personal friends as examiners and "an astonishing per cent" had used note books, text books or personal help in answering questions.

McConnell declared that the result led to definite conclusion that the grade of "D" for residence work is worth as much as an "A" or "B" for correspondence work.

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GANGSTER SLAIN

Threat To Kill Judge Ends In Own Death

NEW YORK, Dec. 6 (AP).—A spectacular scheme of a notorious gangster to make good in the court room a death threat of a pal against the judge who had convicted them ended today in the killing of Sigmund (Whitey) Weiss, jewel robber, and the wounding of two guards in the criminal courts building.

Murray Fershing, the pal, went to Sing Sing last June for 20 years after telling Judge Donnellan "you won't live much longer." This morning while Weiss was being taken to court for proceedings instituted to send him to prison for life as a fourth offender, but a revolver dropped from a leg of his trousers and he was forced to turn what police regarded as a plan to kill the judge into a fatal effort to escape.

With the weapon, which presumably had been smuggled to him, Weiss had put guards out to combat in a corridor of the building, when his gun jammed and he became the target for two bullets from the pistol of John Doyle, captain of the criminal courts building attendants. He died instantly.

Five months ago Fershing had stood in the same court room, and after being sentenced, shouted to Judge Donnellan.

"I thank you from the bottom of my heart. You won't live much longer."

On the way to Sing Sing later Fershing was quoted by detectives as saying:

"Weiss will get Judge Donnellan. I would have got him if I could."

Police Minus Clue
In Atlanta Murder

ATLANTA, Ga., Dec. 6 (AP).—The unnamed man sought in the slaying of Robert M. Brandon, 41, here Monday night, last night voluntarily appeared at police headquarters and after establishing an alibi, was released, leaving detectives still without a tangible clue to the man who fired the fatal shots.

J. D. Paramore, 40, a salesman was the man police sought for questioning in connection with the slaying of Brandon, a wealthy mortician. His 18-year-old estranged wife was questioned by police last night. She declared she knew Brandon "casually" but knew nothing of the killing.

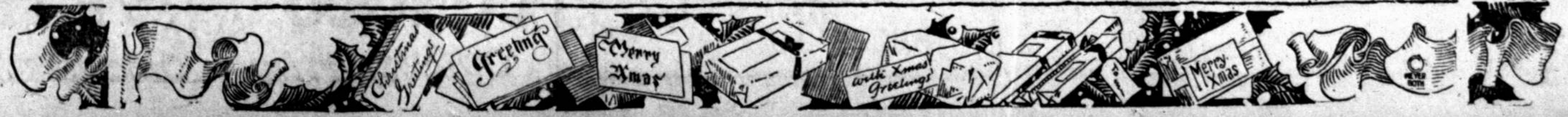

SEASON WAS SPOTTED WITH 'BIG DAYS' FOR FOOTBALL TEAMS

TEAMS WERE GOOD AND BAD DURING YEAR

COMMITTEE TOSSES LUBBOCK BACK TO SECOND PLACE

BIG TEAMS PLAYED IN SENSATIONAL FORM CERTAIN 'DAYS'

NEW YORK, Dec. 6 (AP)—Football teams that had one "Big Day" this year are more conspicuous than those enjoying a big season from start to finish.

Some, such as Georgia Tech, Florida, Boston College and Detroit, have been good all the way but most of the others were good only "when they had it."

The disposition has been to "throw out" the days when they didn't have it. New York University partisans still were busy "throwing out" the Georgetown defeat when along came Oregon State, which couldn't be thrown at all. Nevertheless N. Y. U. had its big day against Carnegie when the Violets impressed the critics as being as violent as any team in the country.

Only a guess can be made as to the ensuing shock if the violence of N. Y. U. as exhibited against Carnegie, had been tossed against the counter-violence of Stanford as turned loose against the Army.

The Naval Academy had two big days and both were at the expense of teams not otherwise defeated Princeton and Pennsylvania.

Carnegie had its big day against Notre Dame. Notre Dame against the Army and the Army against Nebraska.

Teams of the Big Ten and Southwestern conferences had a merry-go-round of big days, the object apparently being to take a pot shot at any team presumptuous enough to gain the lead.

Turning to more consistency, however, it is difficult to find a more impressive record in conference competition than that of the Army-Navy football team. The simple but direct expedient of whipping all four of the teams that ranked next to them in the final standing, Utah, Stanford, Princeton and Pennsylvania, the team was tied by Creighton and Brigham Young, but the Indians went on the warpath any time they met a real contender.



By Golly: A War!

Some young typewriter athletes of the Western Conference, in a militant mood, started something a few days ago that put their athletic officials in the grease.

The young men who manufacture the powerful pieces in the Daily Northwestern got hunched up on a hot idea and proposed that Chicago be kicked out of the Western Conference because of her lack of competitive spirit and, incidentally, her terrible football team.

The literary athletes at Michigan intercepted the pass and ran 70 yards with the editorial opinion that Northwestern ought to be tossed out of the conference because of her low standard of eligibility.

The figures which are quoted as a fighter's income, however, are based on the gross receipts of the firm and it has to be whacked many ways in many splits.

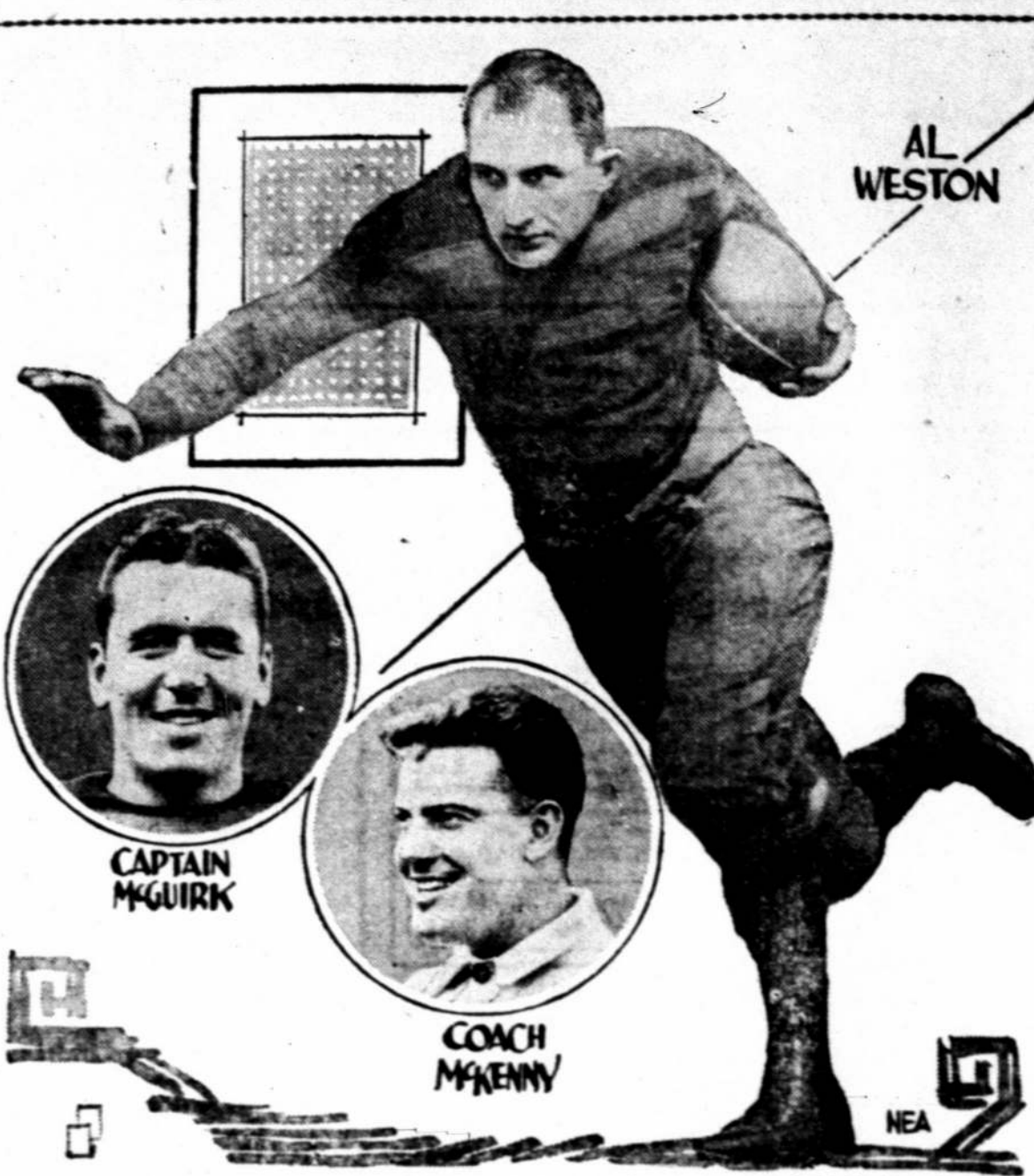

SCION OF RICH FAMILY THROWS MILLIONS BACK OF HIM IN RACE FOR PUGILISTIC FAME

NEW YORK, Dec. 6 (AP)—Two tiny French phones twinkled unheeded on the desk of "Tony" Biddle, wealthy son of a famous family, and the youthful financier needed neither phones, nor a "two-way market" that should have commanded his attention.

Instead he lolled in a soft desk chair, or rose to stretch his six feet of brawn and muscle as he paced up and down the carpet. The subject that lured this athletic scion of the "Biddies of Philadelphia" for hours from the manifold duties of a modern multi-millionaire was boxing—a game that has fascinated and lured to its fold the male Biddies from the first "Nick" dawn.

At the moment "Tony"—you'll find him listed as Anthony Joseph Dreese Biddle, Jr., in "who's who"—is the center of the latest fistic sensation. A few days ago he paid \$20,000 for the managerial contract of Rene De Vos, crack Belgian challenger for the middleweight championship. Then Tony turned the battle over to Jimmy Bronson, crack second of Gene Tunney. He will advise and Jimmy will manage and between them they expect to land the blonde fox of Belgium in the throne now occupied by Mickey Walker.

That is just a start, however. The Biddle millions are at the disposal of Bronson in the quest of the next heavyweight champion. Tony will purchase any boxer in any division upon whom Bronson places the stamp of approval. Furthermore they are considering the erection of an ideal training camp on the outskirts of the city, to be run without profit and provide perfect quarters for any boxers, trainers, managers or promoters willing to meet a nominal portion of the expenses. A "glorified boxing emporium," Tony calls it.

Big, democratic and affable, Tony frankly is "crazy" about boxing. He believes the boxer is of modern patrons of the sport to boxing "will add interest to our own lives and possibly strengthen the sport." 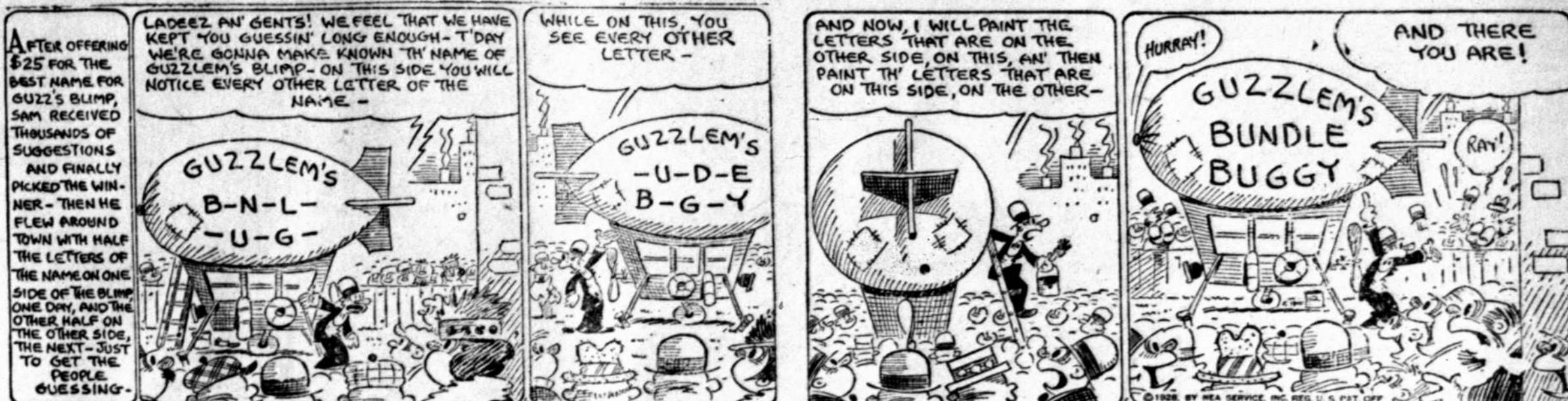

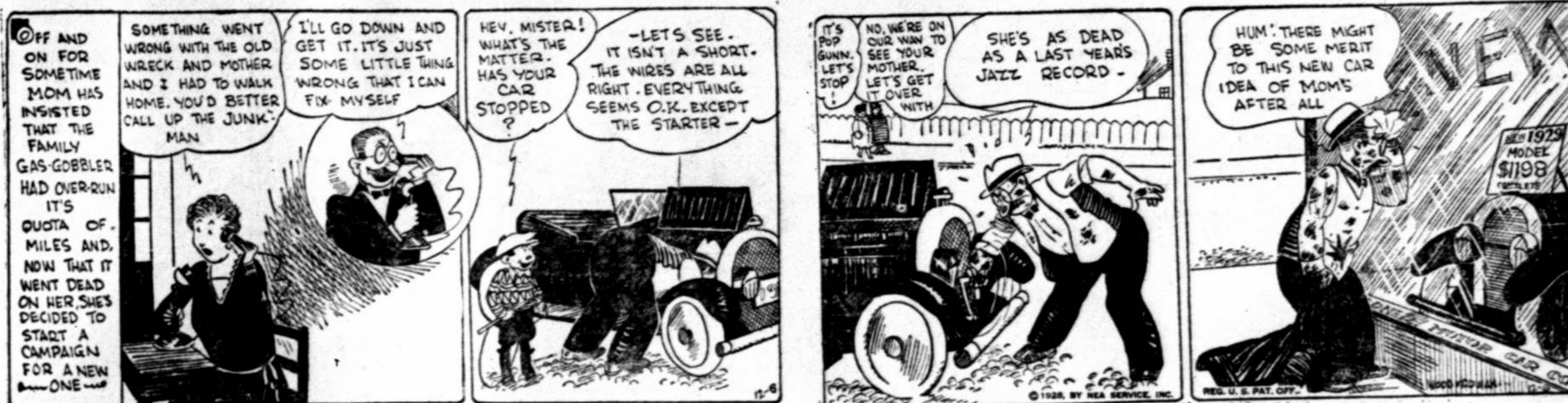

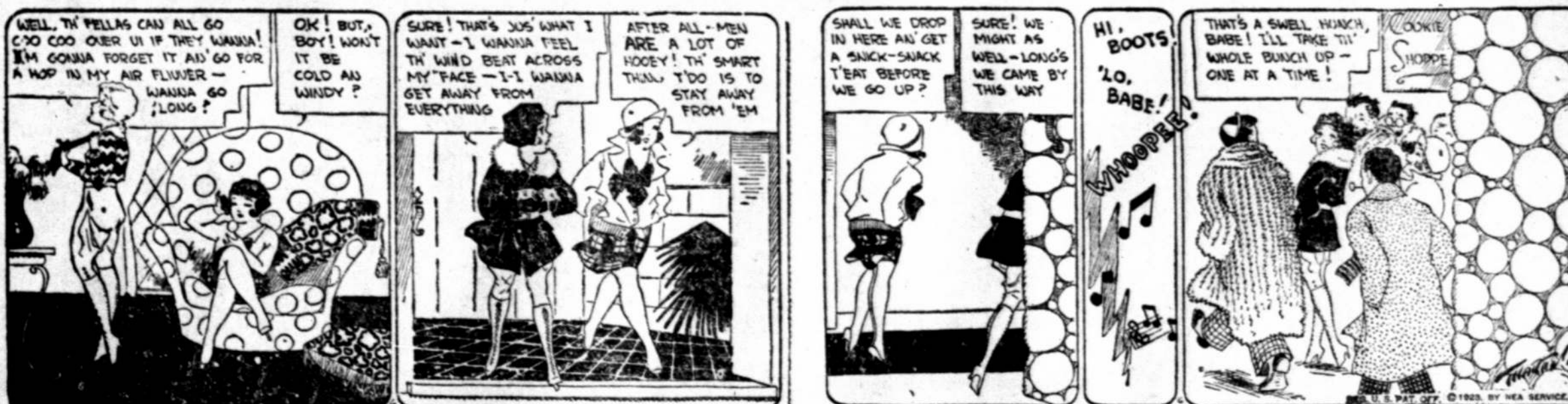

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MARTIAL LAW IN COLUMBIA

STRIKERS IN ARMS ON FRUIT PLANTATIONS THROUGH NATION

(By Associated Press)
BOGOTA, Colombia, Dec. 6.—Declaration of martial law in the Magdalena banana region, where violence has accompanied a strike of plantation workers, has been requested of the council of state. It was announced that the situation was very grave.

Official advice stated the strikers had adopted violent measures to prevent other workers from taking their places. An exodus of workers from the region was reported. Should the council of state agree to the establishment of a state of siege, federal troops would be sent to the disturbed areas.

The strike has been in progress for several weeks. The ministry of industries attempted to mediate between the workers and their employers, but this attempt to settle the controversy failed when the United Fruit company refused to accede to the request of strikers for general insurance. Since then the strikers have clung steadily to their demands with the support of socialist directors.

Private dispatches received in New York by companies with interest in the region said martial law had already been proclaimed in the province of Magdalena. An army of laborers armed with machetes and other weapons, was stated to have begun raiding plantations. Twelve thousand workers were reported to be on strike and to be under the leadership of Mexican communists.

The towns of Santa Marta, Cienfuegos, and Aracataca were stated to have been affected. Property worth millions of dollars was understood to be menaced.

The Leigh-Manuelles have been married thirteen years. Mrs. Leigh-Manuelle explained to police that she became aware last summer that her husband was infatuated with his pupil but when she found herself unable to check this she resigned herself to the situation.

At the request of her husband she called at the Van Wyen home yesterday and asked whether Martha could accompany her to a dentist in New York. Permission was granted. At the station they were joined by Leigh-Manuelle.

The three went to the municipal building where a license was taken out and later Leigh-Manuelle and Mrs. Van Wyen were married with Mrs. Leigh-Manuelle as a witness.

Leigh-Manuelle with his two wives then returned to Sayville where the second Mrs. Leigh-Manuelle prepared to gather her belongings. Her parents, however, objected to the marriage and her father, Cornelius Van Wyen, a storekeeper, struck Leigh-Manuelle in the face. A brother then had him arrested on a charge of disorderly conduct. After he was released under \$250 bail on this charge he was rearrested on a charge of bigamy.

The Leigh-Manuelles had been living in West Sayville ten years where he is organist at St. Ann's Episcopal church. He refused to discuss the matter.
