

First Bale 1934 Cotton Ginned Here August 13

In spite of the drouth and hot weather Dawson county will produce a few bales of cotton this year. Mr. R. J. Cox of the Patricia community has added proof to this statement as he brought in the first bale of cotton for Dawson county of the 1934 crop on Monday afternoon, August 13.

The cotton for the bale was gathered from 30 acres of cotton and weighed after being ginned 420 pounds. The farmers cooperative gin had the honor of ginning.

The bale was bought by Forrest Lumber Co. at 16 1/2¢ per pound making the bale bring a total of \$69.30. The seed was bought by the Lamesa Oil Mill at the rate of \$50.00 per ton. The added premium, for the first bale totaled around \$35 making the bale bring Mr. Cox around \$125.00.

This is the earliest that the first bale of cotton has been ginned in Lamesa in the past seventeen years. Last year the first bale was ginned on August 17th and sold for 12 1/2¢ per pound, while four times in the last nine years the first bale was not ginned until after September 1st.

Mr. Cox says that he has an excellent crop this year that he will make from a quarter to a half bale per acre. There are several communities in the county where the crops are fairly good and it is estimated that 1500 bales will be ginned in the county.

To date there have been four bales ginned in Dawson county.

Luncheon Club Elects Sweetheart

The Lamesa Luncheon Club elected a Sweetheart at Tuesday's Luncheon. They elected unanimously, and enthusiastically Patsy Jo Rountree and requested her to be present each Tuesday noon for the program. Ed Haynes had charge of the program and presented the Subject "The New Housing Deal" S. L. Forrest, local Lumberman outlined before the club the purposes of the Government National Housing Act and stated that efforts were being made locally to benefit from this program as soon as it could be set up. Mr. Forrest said that if such a program could be set up here it would do much to both business and in creating a better place for people to live.

He pointed out that 80 per cent of all building was at one time to be the finish, labor and when labor was employed, and busy, there was always better business. He stated that over the nation there was actually a shortage of homes and in Lamesa "we have a shortage of homes of the better type," Mr. Forrest stated.

Owen C. Taylor was elected song leader for the club by unanimous vote of the club.

There were 25 present at Tuesday's meeting. Each week some constructive topic is discussed at the Clubs meetings and those who attend are much benefitted.

Next week with J. D. Dyer in charge we will hear the discussion on the subject, "Lamesa's Mail and Transportation Service." On August 20th the program will be built around the information on the Yaqui Indians with Chas. A. Guy of Lubbock in charge.

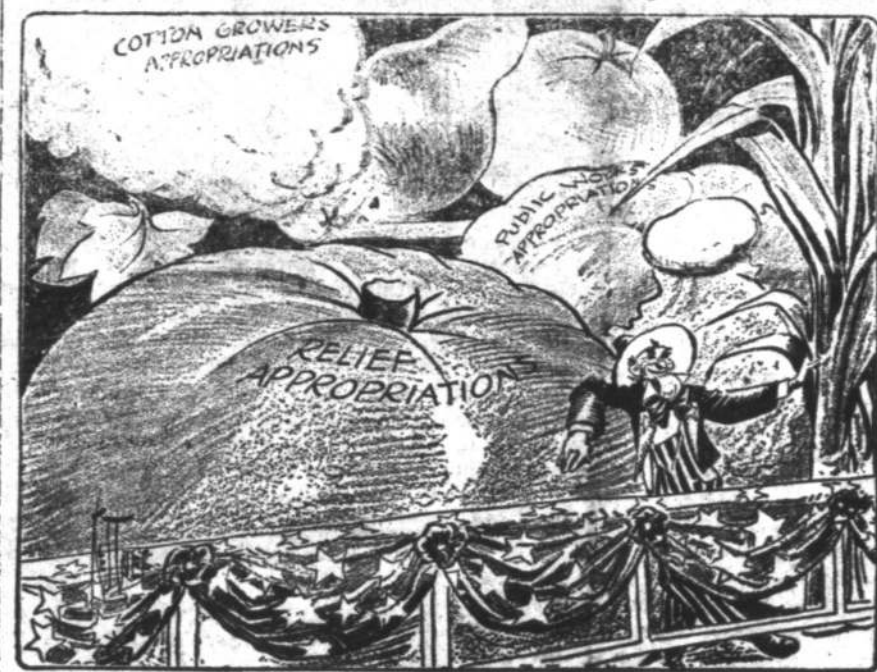

Baseball Tournament Starts Sunday Aug. 19

The annual Dawson County Tournament is to start Sunday August 19, with indications that ten teams will be entered from communities in Dawson and Lynn Counties.

The ten teams are to represent: T-Bar, New Moore, Welch, Pumpkin Center, McCarty, Key, Lamesa, Ballard, Klondyke and Sunset. Due to prevailing drouth conditions the Championship team of last years tournament, Swenson of Stonewall county, will not be present to defend their honors.

The tournament is to be a two game elimination affair, with two lost games to eliminate a team. Winners will play until the championship is decided.

Two games will be played each day, and while the entry list is not as large as the ones in the past, the promoters of the tournament declare that all of the teams will be hard to beat and that some good games will be played.

The prizes for the winners of the first and second places in the tournament have as yet not been decided upon but we are sure that they will be well worth the playing for, and will be well worth winning.

The games will be played at the Lamesa ball park as is usual. The Admission fee if any will be nominal and it is hoped that a large number of fans will turn out for these big games. Lets all forget about the drouth and the heat and get out and watch the boys play.

Weather Bureau Says 1934 Dryest Ever

Season to date is Also Hottest in The United States Since 1864

The year 1934 is the dryest and hottest on record thus far.

The weather Bureau says so and it has been keeping tab on precipitation and temperature since 1864.

"Nothing remotely approaching the severity of this combination appears in the annals of the Weather Bureau," J. B. Kinser, Weather Bureau meteorologist, said Saturday.

Other drouth years, notably 1894, 95, 1901, 1910, 1914 and 1930, were exceedingly dry in many sections, he said, but no previous twelve months has shown such generally deficient rainfall during April, May, June and July.

In addition, to emphasize the seriousness of the situation, Kinser pointed out that most of the previous dry years were preceded by years of adequate rainfall, whereas the past 3 years have been abnormally dry many parts of the country most seriously affected by drouth this year.

Cattle Buying to Be Resumed Monday

With telegrams, checks, news from Washington, and anxious information seekers flooding the County agent's office, this office seems to be the busiest cattle buying center in the county.

The first of the week news was received that due to the fact that cattle are being delivered to the Relief Commission so much faster than they are able to dispose of them, it was deemed absolutely necessary to group certain counties. As a result of this, Gaines and Dawson Counties will be worked under one BAI Inspector and Appraiser. B. Moore will be appraiser for Gaines and Dawson counties. The first three days of the week will be devoted to Dawson county and the last three days to Gaines county. The cattle buying will be resumed Monday August 20. Up to this time Dawson county has received over \$30,000.00 in cattle benefit payment. These checks are usually received from ten to two weeks after application is sent to Washington.

Corn Hog Contracts Dawson county corn and hog contracts were mailed to Washington Monday, August 6, and checks for the signers of these contracts are expected approximately September 10.

Cotton Option Participation Certificates The county agent has received a telegram advising farmers who hold Cotton Option Participation certificates not to sacrifice or sell them as the government is planning to buy the checks at market price. Authorities state that the farmers are entitled to receive this price. The Agent will publish whatever regulations are made as soon as details are received from the Washington office.

Home Canning of Meat Not Recommended In Summer Time Meat canning at home during the summer months is not recommended unless the most strict observance of cleanliness and chilling is practiced. Meat should be placed directly in a refrigerator after dressing. Delay is most dangerous. A temperature between 38 and 42 degrees should be maintained constantly. The meat should be left at this temperature from 24 to 48 hours. The chilled meat must be canned immediately after leaving the cold storage. Do not remove more than can be canned before it becomes hot. Under no condition should meat be canned until it has thoroughly been chilled.

ADDITIONAL FUNDS ASKED FOR COUNTY

Last week it was announced that the local chamber of commerce had joined with Midland, Stanton and Big Spring in a petition to the Texas Relief Commission, requesting them to ask of the Federal Relief Commission at Washington to grant these counties extra Federal money on account of the most serious situation here, to be applied on highways.

This money was to be in addition to what had already been spent and in addition to the regular amount coming to these counties. The relief Commission asked the federal government to grant some 23 counties in the Panhandle and the South Plains of Texas, including Midland, Martin, Howard and Dawson counties around \$400,000.00 per month to carry on Hi-way work. If the Federal Relief Commission at Washington grants this request we have hopes of carrying to a finish the drouth or the highway construction program outlined in Dawson county.

Klondyke School Begun August 13th

Unusual interest was shown at the opening of the Klondyke school when one hundred and twenty five pupils enrolled. More than one hundred patrons and all school board members were there with a feeling that this school year will be more successful and beneficial than any of the preceding years.

Rev. W. B. Wages conducted the devotional services. Mr. W. C. McKenzie superintendent, advised in regard to the laws pertaining to bus transportation.

The faculty members for this year are W. C. McKenzie, Superintendent Irvin Clayton, Coach, and high school teacher, Miss Webb, English teacher Mrs. Tom Woods, fourth and fifth grade, Miss Maxine Clark, second and third grade teacher, Miss Flora Chaffin, primary, Messrs Melvin Hall and W. W. Beeman bus drivers No. 1 and 2.

Tuition Warrants Received Here

Warrants amounting to \$2,241.00 for High School tuition were received by the County Superintendent August 13. This is to pay the tuition of pupils who because their grades are not taught in their home districts are forced to attend school in other districts. Twenty one of the twenty-eight districts will benefit from this appropriation.

President Orders Silver Made Govt. Property

Thursday of last week marked what economists believe to be the second step in President Roosevelt's plan for a further elevation of the price of gold, when the President ordered silver made the property of the government.

Markets showed an immediate upturn, and the move was hailed by some of the leading politicians as the beginning of a "new era of prosperity."

The presidential decree means the completion of the taking over of the nation's supplies of precious metals, begun by gold nationalization last year. Domestic stocks of silver, with some exceptions, are to be delivered to the treasury within 90 days. The price to be paid is 50.01 cents an ounce.

Apart from its implications, some said the nationalization of silver lacked unusual significance. The authority to take over the metal was granted in the act passed by the last congress. It had been predicted on several occasions.

Then too the supply which the treasury will acquire is estimated at between 50,000,000 and 200,000,000 ounces. The treasury will issue notes amounting only to the money paid out for the stocks. Consequently additional currency to be issued will be small, comparatively speaking.
