

# Clues scarce in Ballard slaying

A 52-year-old Sunnyside man was stabbed to death early Thursday morning while investigating a disturbance outside his home.

Robert Glenn "Bob" Ballard was pronounced dead at about 4 a.m. Thursday by Dr. B. H. Lee at Plains Memorial Hospital, where Ballard was taken by his brother, Monty, after the stabbing.

Ballard died of a single stab

wound to the upper chest, according to the autopsy report prepared by Dr. Ralph Erdmann of Amarillo, forensic pathologist.

A ruling in the death has not yet been made by County Judge Polly Simpson. Judge Simpson told the News Tuesday she is waiting until she receives the final autopsy report from Dr. Erdmann, and said it may be sometime next

week. The case, however, is being investigated as a homicide.

Bob Ballard and his wife, Patty, had been living in a camper for the past three weeks after moving back to this area from Cope, Colo. They were living behind a house eleven miles south and three miles west of Dimmitt, and were planning to occupy the house about July 1 after the

contents of the previous owners were removed.

According to County Sheriff Lonny Rhynes, Bob and Patty Ballard were awakened at about 3:30 a.m. Thursday.

"They thought they heard the sounds of someone trying to break into the house," Rhynes said. "He went out to investigate and apparently saw someone trying to break into the house.

"He had taken a .38 special with him when he left the camper, and had told his wife to stay inside the camper. Three shots were fired, and she went out to see what happened. She saw her husband laying in front of the house.

Ballard had been stabbed once in the upper chest. Dr. Erdmann's autopsy report indicated the wound may have been inflicted by someone wielding a screwdriver, but no weapon has been located.

"The only weapon we've found is the gun he had," Rhynes said. "There were three empty chambers. If he hit someone, we haven't found them yet. We have been in touch with all of the area hospitals to be on the lookout for someone coming in with a gunshot wound, but we haven't found anything yet.

"With all of the rain, the weapon may have been thrown into some flooded area, and it may be a while before we find anything."

Rhynes said the heavy rains in the region last week hampered the Thursday investigation, causing officers to call on Rodney Miller of Dimmitt Aerial Spray to furnish a plane for an aerial search of the area. The search, conducted by Trooper Ron Morgan of the Dept. of Public Safety didn't turn up any clues.

"We thought we might find an abandoned vehicle, tire tracks or some other clue," Rhynes said, "but we didn't find anything. We did find a lot of fingerprints around the house, and they have been submitted to the DPS Crime Lab in Austin for analysis. We don't know how long it will be before we hear back from them.

## Board reviews new curriculum, tests

Dimmitt school board members were left "dumbfounded" and "flabbergasted" after breezing through a look at the new curriculum to be implemented in local schools over the next five to eight years Monday night.

DISD Curriculum Director Corky Lockmiller presented an overview of the new curriculum which will be used to implement mastery teaching, a concept mandated by the state in House Bill 75 in the 1981 legislature and Chapter 75 of Texas Education Agency guidelines.

The mastery teaching guidelines set forth by the state call for all students to master certain essential elements every year, with testing designed to indicate the mastery.

"Instead of calling these areas 'essential elements,' we'll call them teaching objectives," Lockmiller said. "The curriculum guide for each grade will explain to each teacher what will be taught. It is up to the teacher, of course, to determine the manner in which it is taught, and in what order the objectives are taught.

"In the past we have used general objectives, but we now have OUR objectives. We will be finding material to teach our curriculum, not the curriculum spelled out by the textbooks. Our teacher committees have been working on restructuring all of our curriculum, with the exception of business and vocational education programs, the only two areas left untouched in our system."

The teacher objectives are spelled out by the curriculum, which will be provided to every teacher, and available on computer along with a three-year history of every student in the system.

"Good teachers have been researching how far along students are when they've had the opportunity," Lockmiller said, "but in the past, it has taken a lot of research, digging through

student files. Now, teachers, in less than 20 minutes, will be able to find just what their students have already mastered, what their students haven't mastered, and know what they might have to go back and review before attempting to reach a new objective."

The computerized system will not only identify student needs, but will also assist in lesson planning, identify available resources, help assess mastery, score tests, and prepare for parent conferences.

The system will also help building principals monitor the delivery of the curriculum and the effect of the curriculum and curriculum development, management of teaching resources and identify areas where staff may need more training.

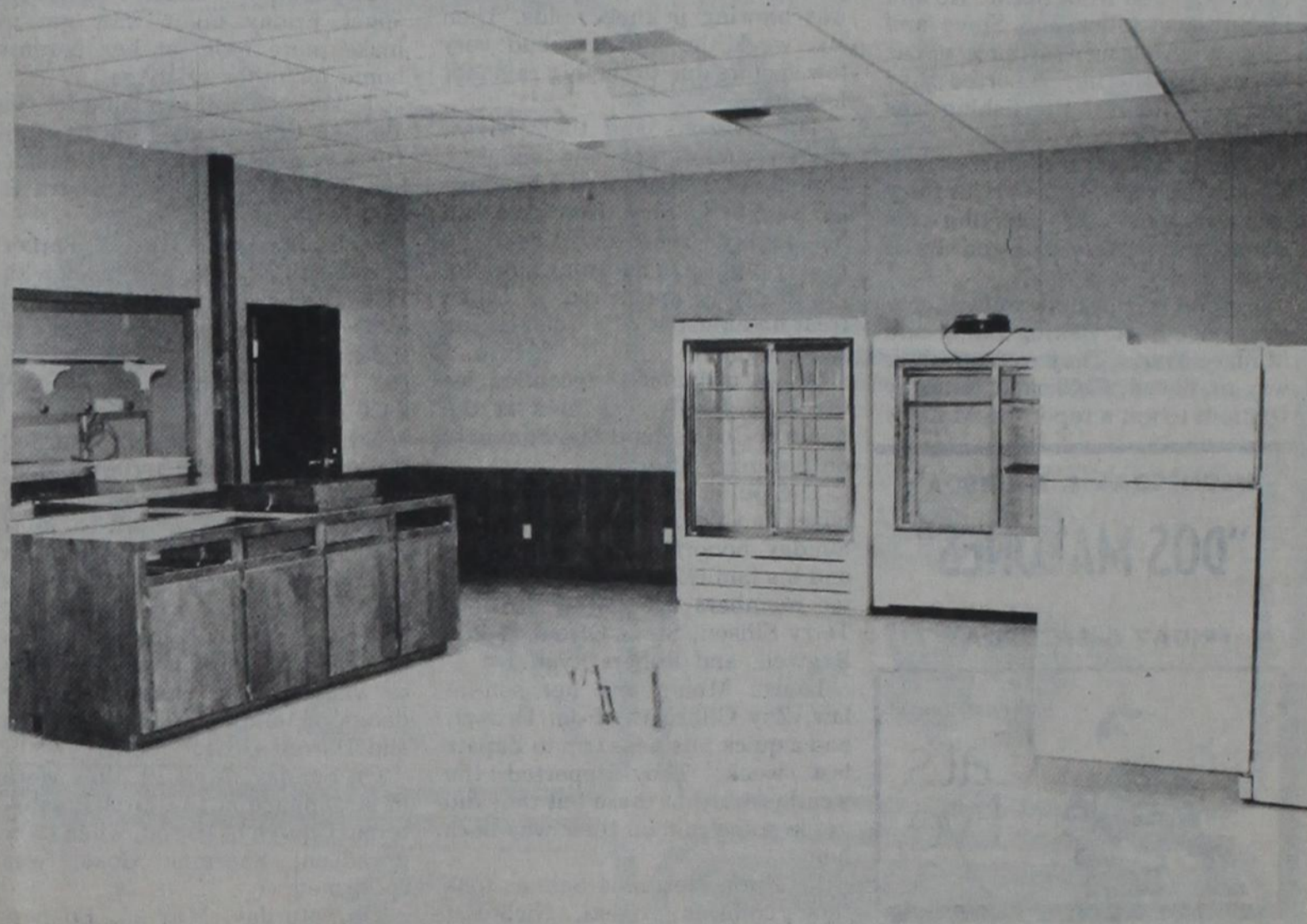
The system will help the central office monitor, system-wide, the delivery of the curriculum, needs for revision and needs for inservice training.

"This will prove valuable for restructuring our evaluation process," Lockmiller said. "We will be more able to identify the strengths and weaknesses of teachers, and will be able to prescribe remedies for improving weak points. The evaluation will be focused, in the future, on improving instruction, and improving our teachers."

Lockmiller also described an instructional model ("used by all good teachers") and other areas which will all focus on the students acquisition of curriculum skills, with those skills organized from pre-kindergarten through the twelfth grade.

"This is, more or less, weaving all of the pieces which have just been out there into one piece," Lockmiller said. "Plus, we are having to merge all of our special curriculum, Title I, Title I Migrant, Plan A, English as a Second

## County insurance costs skyrocket

Insurance costs for Castro County will almost double over the next 12 months, the County Commissioners Court learned Monday.

Jo Hickey and Gary Richardson of Associated Insurance went over the county's insurance for the coming year, the last year of a three-year contract with the county.

The total insurance bill will be about \$46,431.

Hickey explained AI had to find a new company to underwrite the county's insurance after St. Paul Insurance opted out of the business. The new insurance is being written by The Trinity Companies at a higher rate than St. Paul.

"St. Paul was writing the insurance much too cheap," Richardson explained. "They'll be reorganizing the company a little bit. They're not broke or anything, but they just decided not to make this insurance available to us at this time. The Trinity rates are much more realistic."

The Trinity rates include: \$12,745 for comprehensive automobile, up from \$10,402 last year;

\$7,779 for the equipment float-er, more than twice the \$3,590 last year;

\$300 for the two tenant dwellings, down \$10 from last year;

\$23,672 for multi-peril insur-

ance, more than twice last year's \$10,841;

\$525 for boilers and machinery, up \$105 from last year.

The rates are higher despite the removal of items that had been duplicated on the insurance and items that were being insured by the county that were not owned by the county, especially some fire department equipment.

The big ticket items in the insurance policy include:

•The county courthouse, insured for \$1.159 million;

•The county Expo Building, \$178,000;

•The county jail, \$250,000;

•Rhoads Memorial Library, \$355,000;

•County precinct barns, valued in total at \$75,000.

Commissioners also agreed to give Panhandle Transit, an arm of the Texas Panhandle Community Action Corp., \$1,000 in Revenue Sharing money that will be used to obtain matching funds from the State Dept. of Highways and Public Transportation and the Urban Mass Transit Program of the federal government.

The state and federal governments will award TPCAC \$5 for every \$1 in matching funds.

Panhandle Transit was begun in February primarily to assist elderly

people, low-income families and medical patients in rural areas with transportation.

TPCAC currently has a 10-passenger station wagon providing transportation in Dimmitt. The vehicle is one of 12 in the Panhandle offering transportation, while the TPCAC program is one of 32 in the state.

"The system is growing throughout the Panhandle," said Johnny Raymond, executive director for TPCAC. "We believe this is going to be the answer for our rural population that doesn't have available transportation, including bus and/or taxi service."

The commissioners also agreed to enter into a contract with Dr. Ralph Erdmann, forensic pathologist from Amarillo, to provide services to the county on a retainer basis for \$100 per month.

Erdmann will be serving about a 20-county area in the Panhandle-Plains, and will perform his forensic pathology duties as well as appearing at trials and other possible services.

Erdmann will also be responsible for providing a backup in case he is unavailable. Either party may cancel the agreement upon 60 days notice.

Reagan is the first President in the last 25 years with enough popular support in his second term to attack that two-headed, 40-legged dragon, the federal income-tax structure.

Tax reform is not, realistically, a first-term possibility. A President, his cabinet and staff must have support not only from the public at large, but from key committees and voting blocs in the House and Senate. And a President can't structure that kind of support during a first four-year term.

With the help of Congressmen Hance and Conable, Senators Gramm and Latta, and others, Reagan was able to oversee some cosmetic surgery on the income-tax dragon with the 1980 tax cut. But at that time, widespread reform was not considered a possibility.

However, tax reform is now an idea whose time has come. The combined efforts of those who oppose government waste and who favor budget control and a new tax system have amounted to a national educational process. Almost daily now, we hear or read about a \$1,300 toilet seat, or about another billion-dollar corporation that cheats the government on contracts but pays no federal tax, or about how the wealthy can increase their wealth through tax shelters.

Informed of such real or supposed inequities over a long period of time, the American public is now ready for tax reform. And the Congress knows it.

President Reagan's proposed tax-reform package has drawn little opposition so far. The main reaction, in fact, seems to be acquiescence. Washington insiders

## TDA monitors checking for drift problems

Inspectors with the Texas Dept. of Agriculture will be out in force in Castro and surrounding counties the next few weeks trying to avoid a repeat of the pesticide drift problems that have troubled the area the past two years.

12 agency inspectors plan to be "highly visible" in the region, according to Cliff Todd of TDA Field Operations.

The inspectors will also be in Parmer, Deaf Smith, Oldham

and Collingsworth counties.

"We want to have a very high visibility in the area so people will know we are there and can contact us for help," Todd said. "We certainly don't want to stop anyone from spraying. We just want to make sure that when they do spray, they hit the target."

Last summer, drift problems resulted in TDA seeking more than \$24,000 in fines from 38 pesticide applicators and

dealers for damage to cotton crops in Deaf Smith, Parmer and Castro Counties. TDA inspected more than 21,000 acres of cotton after receiving 117 separate complaints. A private action lawsuit has been filed by several area cotton farmers seeking more than \$5 million in damages.

Most of the damage occurred when 2,4-D, a defoliant, drifted onto cotton crops in Parmer county, ruining the crop for all

practical purposes.

The pesticide problems led to new restrictions for applicators and others that met with the wrath of many applicators, dealers, several farm groups and others. This is the first season for the new restrictions to be in effect.

"Our inspectors will be checking out the records of Panhandle pesticide applicators and dealers, inspecting aircraft, pulling soil

samples and documenting daily temperatures and wind speeds," Todd said. "We'd like to prevent any problems, rather than come in afterwards and start handing out fines and yanking licenses."

"We want to re-emphasize that we are not trying to stop anyone from killing the bugs and weeds in their own field. We just want to make sure that when they do treat their fields, they don't wipe out their neighbor's crops as well.

Language, all of our specialized areas, into one central curriculum.

"We can expect revision of the curriculum for at least three years, and maybe forever. We aren't going to get all of this into place in just one year. It will probably take five to eight years to get everything where we want it, because we can't dump all of this into the teacher's lap and say, 'Here it is.'"

Board members approved the new curriculum while heaping praise on Lockmiller for his work and the work of teacher committees who helped devise the new guidelines.

"We ought to get this patented and offer it for sale," said board member Cheryle Pybus. "This is really good work."

Board members also reviewed recent scores by Dimmitt students on Texas Assessment of Basic Skills and the California Test of Basic Skills.

"This is volatile data," Lockmiller said. "The amount of error is great in the testing procedure, but we held our own well. I don't think there is any reason for concern in any area, especially when you consider that our total school population, including children in Plan A and our other specialized areas, are in-

cluded in the testing."

The TABS testing indicated the Dimmitt schools had exceeded its goal of having 75% of the total students reading at least within one year of their grade level.

"We think this is great," Lockmiller said in reference to the scores which indicate 88% of the students attending Dimmitt schools are reading within at least one year of their grade level.

Reading has been the object of a five-year focus through the 1984-85 school year. While the reading program will continue to be emphasized, science will be the object of the next five-year focus for the Dimmitt schools.

who own tax-sheltered beach houses are reported to be putting them up for sale. City and county officials seem to be accepting the probability that they will finally lose their federal Revenue Sharing money. If there are any in Congress who oppose the plan, they're keeping mum.

But it isn't going to stay that way. Before the tax-reform battle is over, virtually all special-interest groups and lobbyists are likely to descend on the halls of Congress to argue for their exemptions, allowances and incentives.

Many of these exemptions will be justifiable — as they were when they originally were allowed into the tax structure.

It's going to be an interesting battle.

We will have tax reform. What specific shape it finally takes, and how it will affect individuals, businesses and local governments, remains to be seen.

One tax-reform proposal that's certain to draw heavy fire is the cancellation of the federal tax credit we now receive for the state and local taxes we pay.

S. R. Hutto of Dimmitt is especially worried about the consequences this proposal would have, and called Congressman Larry Combest about it.

"Combest said there hasn't

been much interest shown by Texans so far on this, and that they expect most of the opposition to come from the Northeast, where the local and state taxes are the highest," Hutto said.

"But although we don't pay as much in taxes in Texas as they do in the East, we still need to let them know in Washington that we need these exemptions. We've got to have our hospitals and schools, and the federal government ought to recognize this in its tax structure."

## County eligible for disaster loans

Castro County is among nine Panhandle counties eligible for emergency loans from Farmers Home Administration due to drought and freeze damage in 1984.

"Swisher County had over a 30 percent or greater loss from drought and freeze damage," said Larry Neal of US Sen. Phil Gramm's Washington office. "Because of this, all contiguous

counties are eligible for the assistance."

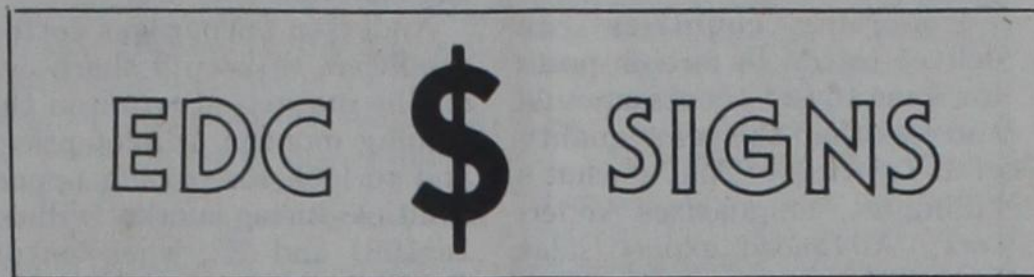
FMHA emergency loans are made to eligible farmers, ranchers and other agricultural operators to assist in covering losses from natural disasters.

"In most cases, the operator must prove a 30 percent or greater loss in 1984," Neal said. "Usually, the first \$100,000 is loaned at five percent interest, with anything

over that, up to \$500,000, at eight percent interest.

Other counties declared eligible

are Armstrong, Briscoe, Floyd, Hale, Randall, Collingsworth and Hall counties.

A national research group recently reported that half of all new jobs expected by the year 2000 will be created in just 30 metropolitan areas.

The National Planning Association reported that the majority of the new jobs seem likely to be in the South and West, following the trend of recent years.

Even as the total number of manufacturing jobs has been falling in recent years, those remaining have been spread out over a larger area of the country.

The report notes that population for the most part follows jobs. So when we have increased employment in some areas we have increased population and that further generates more jobs. Areas that have had the most significant growth in recent years are most likely to continue that growth in the next decade.

Houston, for example, is projected to be the biggest gainer by the year 2000 with an additional 1.3 million jobs added in that metropolitan area.

Besides Houston, four other Texas communities are expected to be major growth areas — Dallas, Austin, San Antonio and Fort Worth-Arlington.

California placed seven communities in the leading areas for new jobs and Florida did well, placing five metropolitan areas on the list.

We in the rural areas have reason to be concerned about these predictions. As the choice metropolitan areas continue to grow and prosper, our opportunities for meaningful job creation grow dimmer.

Increased effort is being made in Dimmitt and most other smaller communities to find ways through which we

can make our communities more attractive and inviting to job creating industries.

Our immediate goal is to simply make it easier for outside interests to invest in our community. We are trying to remove as many roadblocks to development as possible.

These efforts, simply stated, include:

1. Making information on our community immediately available.
2. Providing detailed information on land sites and buildings.
3. Exploring all possible methods of business and industrial financing.
4. Improving the infrastructure of our community so that we can accommodate the needs of business and industry.

If we are to be successful in these efforts, we will need the cooperation and interest of our entire community. It is an ambitious effort that will not be easily accomplished nor quickly rewarded. However, our future may depend on how successful we are in working toward these goals now.

## Veggies hurting from big rains

Now that several days of thunderstorms have abated, after flooding many areas of the High and Rolling Plains, vegetable growers have a lot to do in a hurry to keep vegetables healthy, warns a specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. And they want to do the most important thing first, he says.

"Plant foliage has been continuously wet for several days. This sets up ideal conditions for the germination of fungus spores and their growth into the leaves," said Dr. Roland E. Roberts, Extension vegetable specialist.

Potato early blight and onion botrytis (often referred to as "blast" or "leaf blight") are fungus diseases that are favored by extended periods of wet weather when the leaves stay wet for days, Robert noted.

Early blight infects the older leaves of the potato plant first. Botrytis will begin with spots of infection all along the leaves, and is usually more severe on the oldest leaves and those injured by hail and wind.

The Extension specialist said complete coverage of the foliage with a film of fungicide is necessary to prevent infection by early blight and botrytis. "It is very important to force the spray down under the lower potato leaves to

assure that the surface of the older leaves is covered with fungicide," Roberts said. He said a seven-day spraying schedule is needed to coat new leaves with fungicide.

Some potato growers are getting good control of early blight with flowable maneb, and application of Duter through center pivot systems, Roberts reported.

"If someone is using fungigation effectively on onions, please let me know," he requested.

Another problem from the heavy rains is that nitrogen has been leached out of the loamy sand and sandy loam soils. Potatoes don't usually respond to nitrogen side-dressing on heavier sandy loam, loam, and clay loam soils when the nitrogen is applied within six weeks of harvest, Roberts said.

On very light sand soils, where late season potatoes are growing and won't be harvested until mid-August or later, there is a strong chance that 20 to 30 pounds of nitrogen applied now, and again as soon as need is shown by soil test, will help finish the plant growth and size the tubers, he said.

"Don't apply nitrogen without first determining what is there," Roberts stressed.

To be sure of the nitrogen status of the soil, he urged producers to have a sample tested for nitrate nitrogen immediately. "It is an inexpensive test and most laboratories can give you the results fairly quickly."

He reminded producers to be sure to take the soil samples from between plants and to obtain uniform cores or slices which include soil from the top down to eight inches in depth.

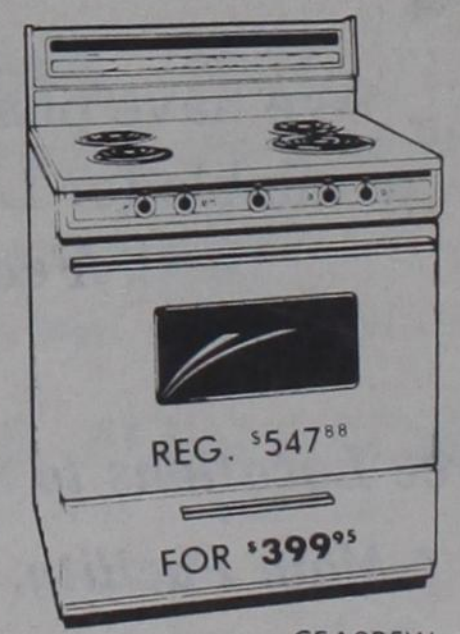

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# Crop outlook bleak for '85

There's both good and bad news regarding the 1985 cotton outlook, but the bad news outweighs the good.

First, the good news. Recent reports by the US Dept. of Agriculture show that cotton production last year was actually about 300,000 bales less than first estimated. At the same time, a lot of cotton farmers enrolled in the acreage reduction program this spring, so production should be a million or so bales less than

the 13 million produced last year.

Now for the bad news. This reduction in domestic cotton supplied may have little impact on market prices.

"Foreign production and the strong dollar abroad remain the culprits in our weak cotton market," points out Dr. Carl Anderson, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"These two things are challenging the market for US

cotton," Anderson says. "China and other exporting countries — Pakistan, Australia and South America — have plenty of cotton to sell. And the strong dollar gives them a favorable price advantage."

Exporting countries can deliver cotton to foreign ports for some 10 to 12 cents a pound and less than the same quality of US cotton. "That's what's killing us," emphasizes Anderson. "Advanced export sales for 1985 cotton are lagging behind a year ago by more than 50 percent."

Unless American trade policies supporting cotton are

strengthened, cotton exports will continue to fall, contends the economist. As a result, only a poor US crop this year is likely to keep carryover supplies from growing and market prices from being much above the loan rate this fall.

Anderson encourages cotton producers to keep a sharp eye on the market situation in the coming months, to plot prices and to look for pricing opportunities during market rallies. In 1981 and '82, when cotton supplies were plentiful as they are now, December future contracts slipped sharply in August from earlier levels, he notes.

## Lightning safety important

When it comes to a brilliant display of lightning in Texas skies, "better safe than sorry," is a good motto.

Deaths from lightning may be rare, but it's shortsighted for anyone to ignore the simple precautions and slight inconvenience of safety measures, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service health education specialist Dr. Mary Ann Heussner.

She says the first rule of lightning safety is to get away quickly from any open space — a field, golf course, hill-top, beach or pool. Get away before the rain starts, since lethal bolts sometimes strike during the muggy lull before a storm.

"If you're caught outside, the best kinds of shelter are buildings equipped with a lightning protection system, steel-framed buildings, and cars, buses or tractors with metal tops and closed windows," advises the specialist.

When you can't take cover, you can better your chances by taking refuge in a ravine, culvert or ditch — keeping away from pipes and staying alert for flash floods, Heussner says.

When none of this is practical, crouch as low as possible with no part of your body except knees and toes touching the ground. Also remember to avoid tall isolated objects, like a lone tree, staying twice as far away as the tree is high.

Stay away from open doors and windows, fireplaces, radiators, stoves, metal pipes, sinks, bathtubs, shower stalls and plugged-in electrical appliances.

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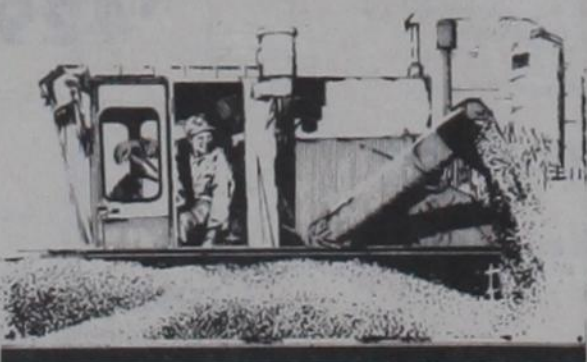

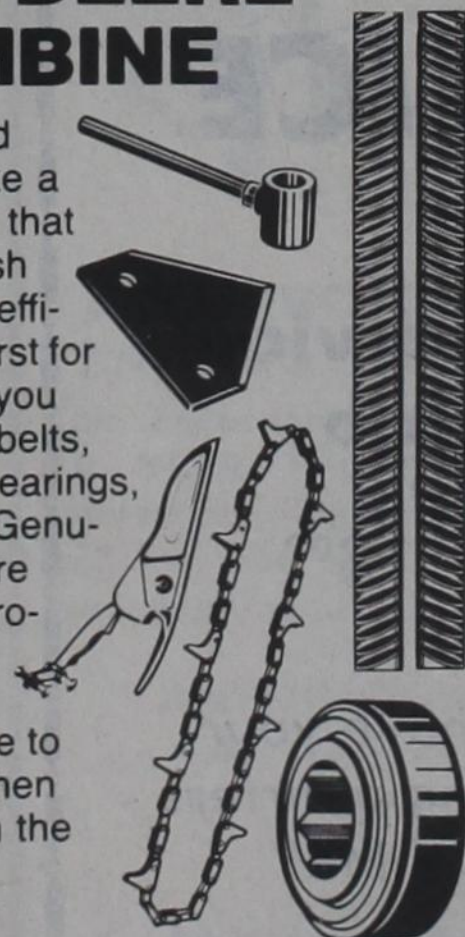

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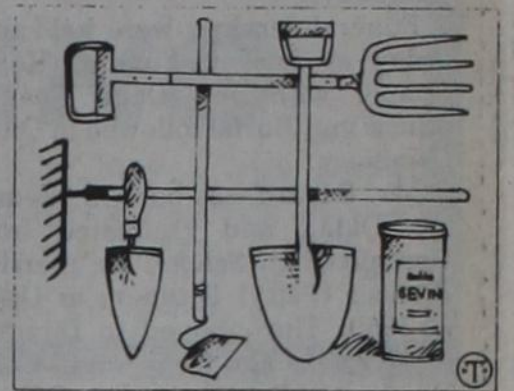
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## GARDEN TIPS

Q. We've just bought a new home, and I'm planning to start a garden for the first time. What tools will I need to get started?



A. The basic tools for a small or beginning garden are a spading fork, steel rake and garden hoe. With these, you can turn soil, remove stones and sod, form rows, cultivate and dig root crops. As the garden grows, you may need other hand tools. A round point shovel is useful for turning sod, digging holes for plants, moving soil or edging a bed. For transplanting, a trowel is handy. Many gardeners also like to start out each season with an adequate supply of a widely recommended insecticide such as SEVIN® brand carbaryl insecticide. 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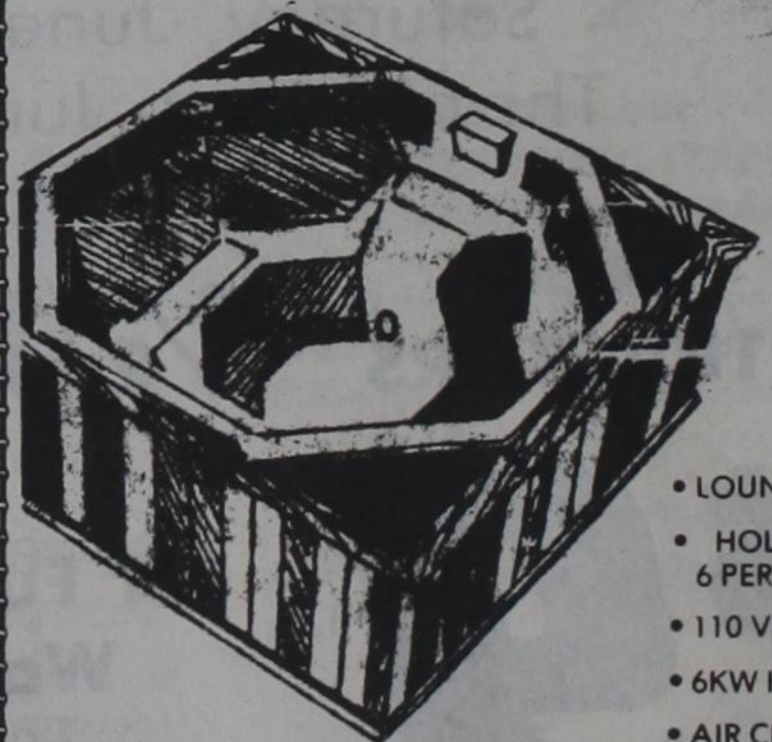
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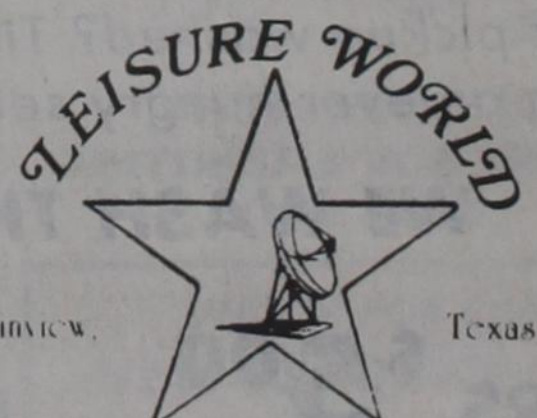
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**Social Security in Castro County**

The retirement test — the limit on the amount of earnings people can have without affecting their social security benefits — is different for self-employed persons. People who continue to do some work after retirement or receive income as farmers, insurance agents, and sales persons, and other types of self-employment should note the differences so as to avoid any disruption of their monthly benefits due to overpayments.

Like regular wage earners, the self-employed person is subject to the annual earnings limit, which was \$6,960 in 1984 and is \$7,320 in 1985 for people 65 and over. For people under 65 the 1984 limit was \$5,160 and is \$5,400 in 1985. There is no limit on earnings for those age 70 and over. Earnings over the annual limit cause the monthly benefits to be reduced \$1 for each \$2 of earnings over the limit.

The first year of retirement is where self-employment income is treated differently. A monthly test is usually applied during the first year a person starts receiving benefits. This permits a person to retire any time during the year and have his or her earnings count against the retirement test only for the months after retirement. For regular wage earners, the monthly test is one-twelfth of the annual test. This means that a person may earn any amount during the year as long as he or she does not earn over the monthly limit beginning with the month in which he or she starts receiving benefits.

However, because the income of the self-employed tends to be irregular — it may be received months or years after it is earned — a test of "substantial services" in the business or trade is used. During the first year of retirement, a person who receives earnings from self-employment can get a full benefit for any month he or she doesn't perform substantial services in self-employment.

Whether or not services are substantial depends on a number of factors. They include the amount of time devoted to the business or profession, including time spent planning and managing, the kind of work done, and how the work compares with what the person previously did.

In general, more than 45 hours of work devoted to a business during a month constitutes substantial services. Less than 15 hours a month is never considered substantial.

Another provision unique to the self-employed holds that certain self-employment income received after the first year of retirement from work performed before retirement is not subject to the annual limit. This rule was designed to help insurance agents who receive renewal commissions after they retire, retired farmers whose left-over crops are sold in a year after they stop farming, sales people who receive deferred commissions, and persons who continue to receive income from their investment in a business or partnership.

**Babbling Brooks**

If you haven't read *Iacocca*, the autobiography by Lee Iacocca, it's probably because I have had the book "on loan" from Rhoads Memorial Library.

There is no other excuse for not reading the book.

Iacocca, of course, is the man who borrowed a billion dollars of our money to salvage the Chrysler Corporation. Lee caught a lot of flack for that, but, as he explains in the book, the government had guaranteed loans out in 1979 for \$146 billion, so why not make it \$147 billion?

The book explains what else Iacocca had to do to salvage Chrysler, his work at Ford (most of it in spite of Henry Ford II) and his ideas on what's right and what's wrong with and for America.

It's great reading, and it's available at your local library — if I take it back.

One of the ideas Iacocca has is how to improve our country's trade deficit, and specifically how to deal with the Japanese.

As anyone who has been awake in the last 20 years knows, we have an abundance of Japanese products in almost any store in town.

On the other hand, the only thing Japan seems to have of ours are a few scars from World War II. And very little else.

The Japanese are smart. They don't want an abundance of foreign goods hanging around all over the place collecting yen. They just want their goods over here, hanging around collecting dollars.

Iacocca claims it's all because America (himself included, and count me in, too) is, well, still America . . . we're a legend in our mind.

The government — not Reagan, but go back to Eisenhower, Kennedy, Nixon, Ford and Carter too — is obviously still feeling sorry for Japan. Why else would we give the Japanese virtually unlimited open trade?

Example: You can buy a Toyota for about \$2,000 less in America than you can in Japan. It isn't because of cheap labor or some other simple reason.

It's because Japan has a national industry policy and energy policy. The Japanese are supporting themselves.

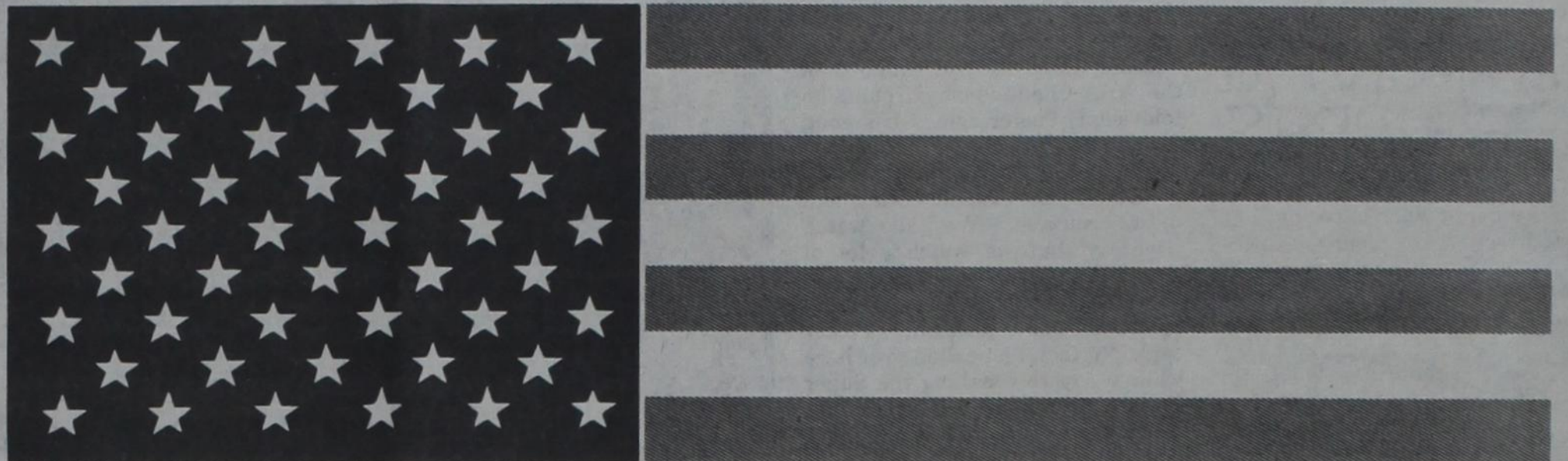

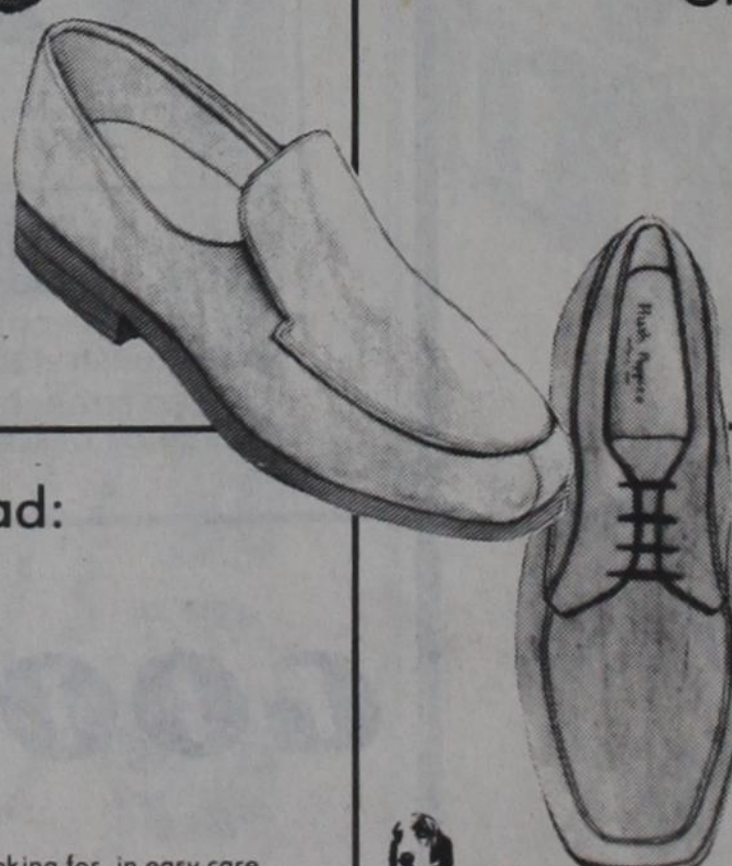
