CLARKE WANTS KLAN CLEANED

(By Associated Press)

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 2.—E. Y. Clarke, imperial giant of the Ku Klux Klan, today issued a call for a national congress of the Ku Klux Klan to meet here on February 26th.

Clarke wants the Klansmen to meet and take steps to eliminate evils which he says exist in the organization, and he says in his appeal, for the Klansmen to "gather together to prayerfully consider methods for eliminating existing evils, or else to follow the examples of the founders of the original Ku Klux Klan, and have the courage and manhood to devise ways and means for immediate disbandment of the organization."

BALLINGER BOY IS STILL MISSING

Mr. and Mrs. E. M. Eubank are still without information as to the whereabouts of their son, Carl, who was last heard from more than a month ago at Wewoka, Oklahoma, and who wrote his parents that he would be home for Christmas. The young man had made it a rule to come home regularly, and his sudden disappearance is causing Mr. and Mrs. Eubank much anxiety. Mr. Eubank has been in communication with the authorities at Wewoka, and in other cities, and has taken the matter up with the company with which his son was employed, but has been unable to get any trace of him.

Officers in practically every county in Oklahoma and throughout North Texas have been requested to help locate the young man, and if nothing can be heard from him within a day or two, Mr. Eubank will leave for Oklahoma to see if he can get any clue to the whereabouts of his son.

ITALY OPPOSES IMMIGRANT RULE

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—Italy has made representations through the state department opposing the immigration quota revision which is now under consideration by the House immigration committee.

The communication was forwarded to the committee today by Secretary Hughes. It is aimed at the provision of the bill which was drafted by Chairman Johnson.

The Johnson bill proposes to restrict each nation's quota of immigrants to two per cent of the number of their native born citizens in the United States in 1919. This stipulation is described by the Italian government as unjustified and a discrimination to the detriment of a friendly nation.

NEW HOMES FOR FEW BUSINESS RURAL SCHOOLS CHANGES HERE

There is perhaps no county in West Texas, or in any other section of Texas, that is making more rapid progress in the development of rural schools than Runnels county.

During the last three years seventeen new rural school buildings have been erected at a cost of approximately \$60,000, or an average of about \$3500 per school.

Other buildings have been improved and teachers' homes constructed, and upwards of \$125,000 has been spent in school improvements in the rural districts of the county during the last three years.

POSTAL BUSINESS WAS 17 PER CENT BETTER

Postmaster J. A. Reese reports that business at the Ballinger office for the quarter just closed shows an increase of 17 per cent over the last quarter of 1922, which adds considerable to the revenue of the postal department at Ballinger.

It must be remembered that the fall of 1922 was a good fall for Ballinger also, and that business showed a big increase over the 1921 fourth quarter. Mr. Reese stated that most of the seventeen per cent increase made for the quarter came in holiday business, the Christmas business being much heavier than for many years at Ballinger.

ARMY OFFICER FOUND DEAD

SAN ANTONIO, Jan. 2.—Maj. A. R. Gardner, executive officer of the Fourth Artillery Regiment, Fort Sam Houston, was found dead in his room here today.

A pistol was found lying on the floor near his body out of which one cartridge had been fired. The officer was shot in the head.

SIMS & SONS RECEIVE CONSIGNMENT STEERS

D. E. Sims & Sons of Paint Rock, Concho county, have received 250 out of approximately 1,000 head of four-year-old steers they have purchased in Kimble, Mason, Gillespie and other counties, it was learned in San Angelo Saturday.

The 250 animals were purchased from George Farmer of Kimble county. The price paid for the steers averaged around \$50, it is understood.

Mr. Sims and sons handled around 2,000 steers last season and of this number about 1,400 still are on feed in Kansas.—San Angelo Standard.

The fuel dealers declare that they have not been able to get wood loaded on cars at the other end of the line and shipped to Ballinger on account of the condition of the public roads. Wood haulers have been on a strike, and refused to haul wood over bad roads. People who depend on keeping comfortable by stoves heated with wood, may have to discard their wood burners and install coal stoves.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 2.—Infatuation of his chauffeur for his film actress employer, and his jealousy for her wealthy Denver acquaintance, according to the police, were the motives which prompted Joe Kelly, alias H. A. Greer, to shoot Courtland Dines, of Denver, last night, in the presence of two moving picture actresses, Mabel Normand and Edna Purviance.

Greer is being held on a charge of attempted murder, while Dines has a good chance for recovery, according to attending physicians.

REBELS ADVANCE ON MEXICO CITY

(By Associated Press)

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 2.—Enrique Colunga, secretary of the interior, announced today that President Obregon has decided to send during the coming week an initiative to the permanent congressional commission requesting a convocation of an extraordinary session of the Mexican Senate for the sole purpose of considering the general United States-Mexican claims commission. Obregon contends that this matter was not acting upon during the regular session of the congressional commission.

VERA CRUZ, Jan. 2.—Rebel General Figueroa, in the state of Guerrero, and General Estrada, in the state of Jalisco, are advancing on Mexico City, according to a statement given out at the general headquarters of the revolutionary forces here.

According to the same authority, General Cavazos, has also been successful in his advance on Pachuca, in the state of Hidalgo. Reports here say that the rebels are seriously menacing the railroad from Tampico to Laredo.

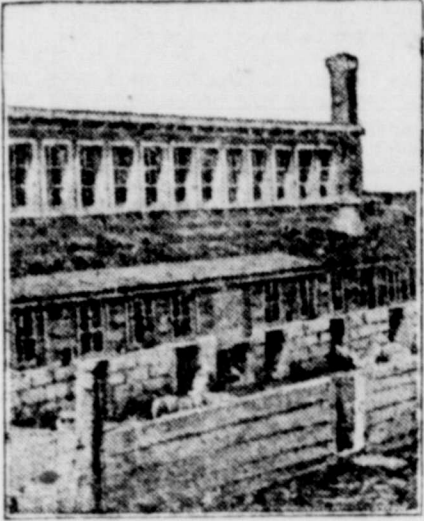
LIVE STOCK

Healthful Quarters for Hogs of Big Importance

If hog raising is to be a profitable business the animals must be kept healthy. This requires that sanitary quarters and equipment be provided.

Hog houses can be designed and built of concrete block so as to satisfy every requirement. They possess all the advantages of houses built of other materials and, when properly built, have none of the disadvantages.

The accompanying photograph shows a swine house which forms part of the equipment on a large farm in Illinois.



Swine House Made of Concrete Blocks.

Concrete block is the material used in constructing not only the walls of the house itself, but also in inclosing small runways at the front. The design shown is known as the half-moisture type. It is always built to face the south, so that sunlight may enter through both the upper and lower tiers of windows. A passageway runs from one end to the other, which facilitates cleaning the bins, which are located at both sides of the passageway.

At one end some space is set off for feed storage and mixing. Provision is made here for the cooking of feed, which is especially advantageous in cold weather and for early spring litters.

The swine house should be kept comparatively warm, either with a small heater or by insulating the walls so that the animal heat is retained. Adequate ventilation is also very essential.

Dry Mash Is Excellent Feed All Year Around

Many poultry raisers are feeding cockleburds to get in shape to sell as broilers. Purdue university recommends for this use a ration composed of two pounds of corn, one pound of shorts, one pound of ground oats, and eight pounds of buttermilk.

This should be mixed and allowed to stand and sour for 24 hours before feeding. Feed in a trough placed outside the crate in front of the birds. The birds should appear ravenous and eat greedily. If they do not, there is something wrong with them, and they should be removed from the coop. When the birds have eaten for 30 minutes the trough should be taken away, thoroughly cleaned and allowed to dry. Give the fowls all they will eat in 30 minutes and no more.

Water is not necessary except in hot weather. It is advisable to feed grit every few days. Two weeks is a good average length of time to feed. The greatest gain should be made during the first week, but it is profitable to continue in most cases for another week.

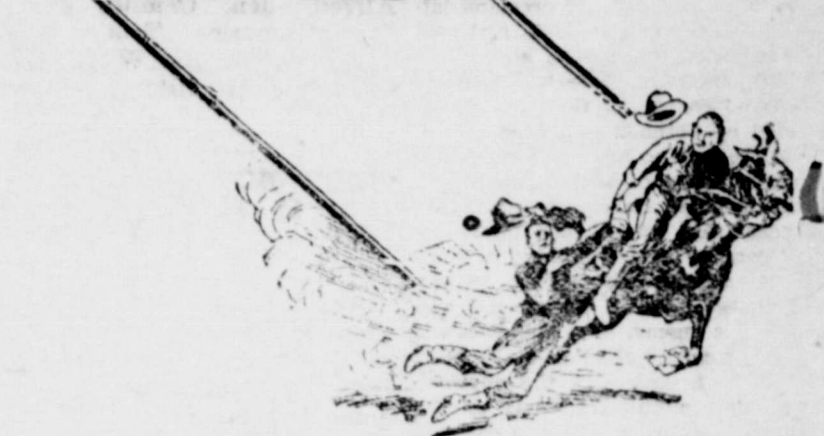
