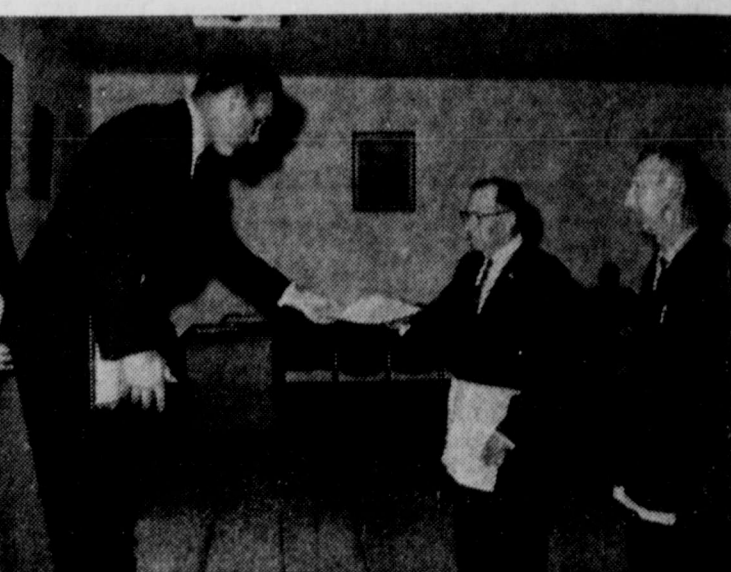
STORM HITS SUNDAY

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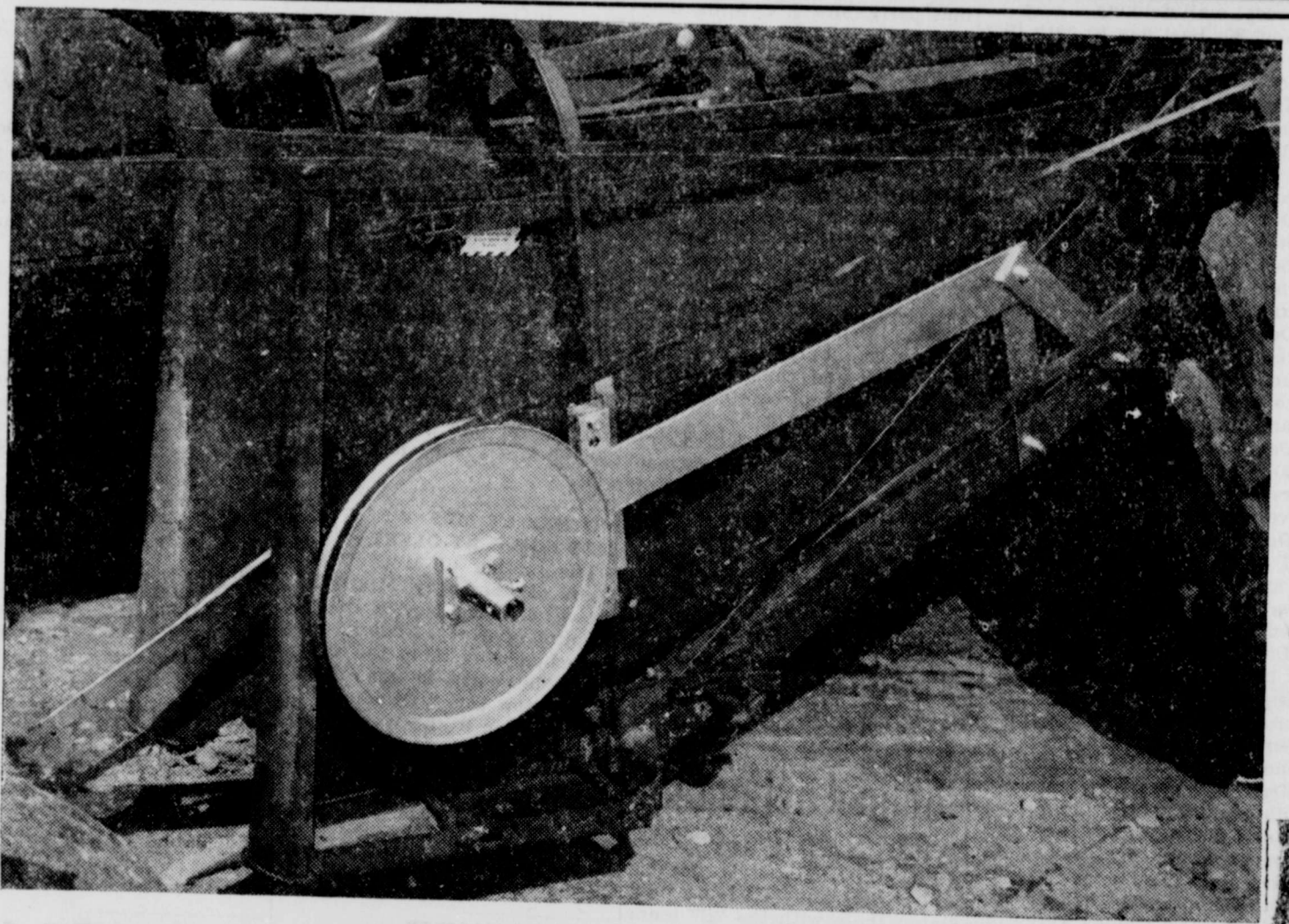
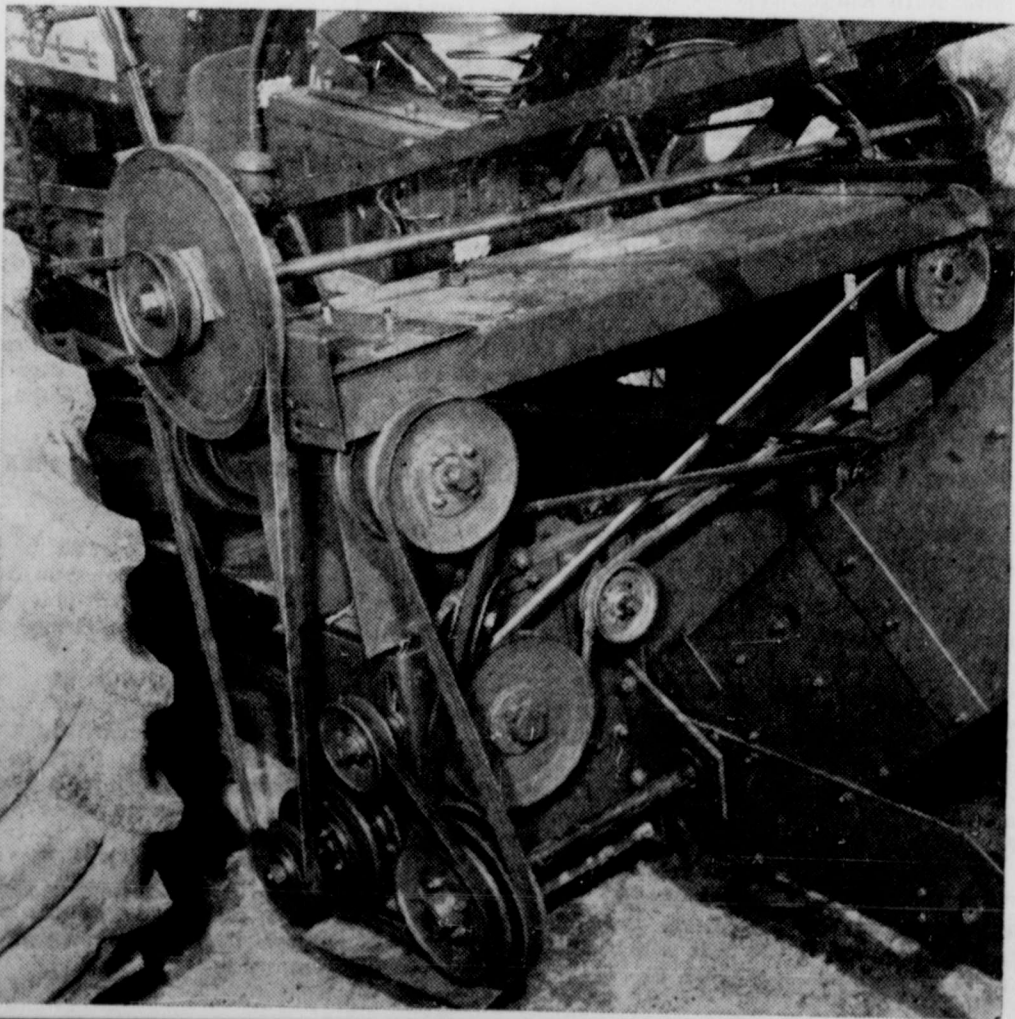
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News Of Men In The Armed Forces

In the third quarter, Abernathy scored its second touchdown on a pass from Lane Wade to Pat Hale. Hale caught the ball at the Lockney 30 and outraced the defenders for the score. 1:24 remained in the quarter as Tannehill's kick failed.

The 'Lopes kicked the ball off



and after four plays Lockney was forced to punt. The Longhorns got a bad punt off and the 'Lopes received the ball at the 25. The quarter ended at this position, but on the opening play of the fourth quarter, Nathan Knight carried the ball twenty yds., around the right end for the 3rd score of the evening. Knight attempted to run the ball over for two points, but he was stopped short of the goal.
