RAFB Delivers First T-41A Planes For Pilot Training Program Here

The first of the T-41A light aircraft arrived at Abernathy Municipal Airport June 1, to begin the movement of the light trainers from Reese Air Force Base to Abernathy where they will be used in the initial phase of Reese's Undergraduate Pilot Training beginning August 5. Prior to that date, the T-41's will be used to orientate the civilian instructor pilots, employees of Valley Aviation, who will be conducting the T-41 training.

Leading two of its sister ships was a silver T-41A with the title "City of Abernathy" emblazoned across its nose. Piloting the "City of Abernathy" was Major Raymond

Sofaly with Col. Victor Mahr, Deputy Commander for Training at Reese, making the trip as a passenger.

Following the small propeller driven aircraft, named for the city where the T-41 training will be conducted, were two other

T-41's piloted by Captains William Goldstein and John Cochran and carrying Colonel Richard A. Steele and Major Joseph Sullivan.

The Reese officers were on hand to participate in a ceremony turning the first of the light trainers over to Abernathy Mayor Roy Jones and Chamber of Commerce President Andy Reid.

The celebration began with a three ship flyover in formation by the 41's prior to landing. At this point, the light trainers circled for another flyover, and then peeled off to circle again and make their landing approach.

With the "City of Abernathy" leading the way, the three aircraft taxied down the runway and parked near the hangar.

Upon disembarking from the aircraft, Colonels Mahr and Steele presented the aircraft to Mayor Jones and CC President Reid in a ceremony beside the trainer named for Abernathy.

Following these first three T-41's will be an additional 18 of the small, propeller driven trainers. Students will receive their first 30 hours of flying training in the T-41A at the Abernathy Field.

RAFB officers began training the civilian instructor pilots Monday, June 7. The first T-41A took off from Abernathy Airport at 8:15 a.m. that day. Aboard were Major Raymond Sofaly, project officer for the training program here, and Verol Briggs, who will be the general manager and supervisor for Valley Aviation, the civilian contractor for the training program. The second plane up that morning had Cpt. John Cochran of RAFB and civilian instructor pilot Bill Hodges, Amarillo, aboard.

Killer Tornado Rips Across Hale Center

A killer tornado early Wednesday night, June 2, hit farm homes east of Cotton Center, then headed for Hale Center, where it swept a two-block-wide path through the town, from southwest to northeast. At press time, four women had died from injuries caused by the tornado.

Mrs. Floyd Shackelford, 50, was killed Wednesday night when the tornado hit her home east of Cotton Center. Her husband was critically injured and at last report, he was listed in poor condition at a Lubbock hospital.

Three Hale Center women died of tornado injuries. They were Mrs. Alma Woody 68; Mrs. Tom Rice, 60, and Mrs. Sarah Catherine Reed, 86. Reports said that 76 persons were injured.

The tornado damaged 300 homes and ripped the very heart out of the business section of the town. Damage in Hale Center was estimated at eight million dollars.

Thanks to Hale Center's highly organized Civil Defense unit, the death and injury toll was

comparatively light, considering the widespread damage to homes and business buildings. The unit tracked the tornado and the storm-alert also was sounded in time for most of the people to reach shelter in cellars.

HC was hit by the tornado about 9:35 p.m.

The following is comment on Abernathy's assistance to its sister city of Hale Center after the storm hit. Plainview, Lubbock and many other South Plains towns also gave the same help to the stricken town.

A doctor and nurse from Abernathy Medical Clinic went to HC following the storm. Mr. and Mrs. Paul Nesbitt and their daughter, Mrs. Doyle Johnson, who was visiting here from College Station, unaware of the tragedy in HC, drove to a farm near there to see if hail had hit crops on the place Nesbitt works. When they learned of the tornado, they went to HC, where Mrs. Nesbitt and Mrs. Johnson helped at the hospital until after 2 a.m. Paul helped Civil Defense workers in directing the heavy flow of traffic, and in other emergency work.

Abernathy's assistance to HC began shortly after the tornado hit. Joe Chambers took his ambulance to the ravaged town. Abernathy firemen and others went from here to offer assistance.

During Wednesday night, and the clean-up days that followed, help was sent from here by the City of Abernathy, fire department, C. of C., Lions Club, and other groups and individuals. Many farmers of this area assisted at HC. Men, equipment and vehicles from this community were at the disposal of HC authorities for assignment to various tasks.

Open House was held Sunday for people to drive through the stricken town. An estimated 30,000 people went to HC to view the damage during the open house. Abernathy firemen helped direct the heavy tour traffic through HC that day.

Four Abernathians, Mr. and Mrs. Rupert Lee Allen, their son, Dennis, and Joanne Klafka, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Klafka, were at St. Theresa's Church in Hale Center when the tornado swept through town. It missed the church about a block and a half, Miss Klafka said.

Brought to their knees by death, injury and destruction caused by the killer tornado, Hale Centerites Thursday morning viewed their ravaged city, then set to work clearing the debris to make way for re-building their town.

"That Was The Week..."

The week of May 31-June 5, 1965, was a history-making week, which will be long-remembered.

For Abernathians, the week started on a high note. Tuesday June 1, saw the delivery of the first three light plane pilot trainers from Reese Air Force Base to Abernathy Airport. The first of the three planes to land at Abernathy Airport that morning was christened "The City of Abernathy." On hand to greet RAFB officers and men were representatives of the City of Abernathy, Chamber of Commerce and Lions Club, Marlman and McPhearson are the civilian contractors for the RAFB pilot training in light planes at Abernathy Airport.

The elation which Abernathians felt over the RAFB training program here was replaced by shock and concern Wednesday night when news of the killer tornado in Cotton Center community and in Hale Center started coming in by radio and television. With communications to the two ravaged communities out, Abernathians spent a sleepless, restless Wednesday night worrying about their relatives, friends, and associates in Cotton Center community and in Hale Center. At the crack of dawn Thursday, Abernathians left for CC and HC to check on relatives and friends and to assist in clearing the tornado-scattered debris.

The tornado overshadowed the Gemini 4 space shot from Cape Kennedy Thursday morning. Hale County and South Plains residents were more concerned over the death, injury and destruction caused by the giant twister.

All South Plains news media had excellent coverage of the tornado aftermath.

Lubbock Avalanche-Journal staff photographer Mike Read's picture on page one of the A-J morning edition June 4 should be nominated as one of the best news pictures of 1965. Read's photo was of Mrs. Loyd Stuart, Hale Center nurse, standing on the porch of what was her home before the tornado scattered it over a wide area. The picture reflected the state of shock which most Hale Center people felt Thursday morning as they surveyed the damage done by the tornado.

Nomination for the best banner headline on last week's news is one which appeared on the front page of The Houston Post. The headline, "Aw, Ed, Please Get Back In The Spaceship," referred to Astronaut Edward H. White's reluctance to return to the spaceship after his "walk in space." Originally scheduled to space-walk for about seven minutes, Astronaut White found (Continued on page two)

TORNADO WARNING

The City of Abernathy has adopted the National Civil Defense warning system signals. They are the same all over the United States and will be used in case of enemy attack as well as for tornadoes. The tornado warning signal is a continuous, steady blast on the fire siren of three (3) to five (5) minutes duration. This signal means tornado clouds are in the area and possibly tornadoes exist in the area. The take cover signal will be a second signal which consists of a warbling tone or short blast of three (3) to five (5) minutes duration. This signal means that a tornado has been sighted and is moving toward Abernathy.

Due to trouble caused by high winds in hearing the siren on the water tower the fire department panel truck and police car will also sound the take cover signal.

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State Department To Aid Industrial Sales Abroad

The Department of State has begun a series of programs to strengthen its ties with the American business community, according to Benjamin Weiner, special assistant to the Deputy Undersecretary.

These programs include: the added use and display of American-made products in the 276 embassies, consulates and special offices abroad; and the assignment of Foreign Service officers to observe private industrial operations in order to develop an understanding in the participating officer of the concepts and pressures that motivate American business, plus an awareness of

business needs and problems.

Businessmen will be asked to serve as consultants to assist in screening applicants for the Service, to serve on teams of inspectors to evaluate operations of the Embassies and other posts, as well as to serve as public members of selective boards to determine grade promotions to service officers.

"The purpose," added Mr. Weiner, "is to create an attitude and atmosphere in the Foreign Service which will assist and perhaps even impel the American business community toward greater markets and greater sales abroad."

Several years ago some 1,800 old automobile bodies were chained down in 60 feet of water off the Texas coast.

Idea was to make three artificial reefs, each composed of 600 car bodies. First one was built off Port Aransas. Others are off Port Isabel and Freeport.

Only 200 wrecked bodies were dumped into the salt water the first go 'round. For a few days there were all sorts of rumors about the biologists throwing away a lot of money. They said the car bodies had washed away and no one could find them.

It wasn't very long, however, until boaters smart enough to find where the bodies had been dumped were circling them and coming up with a nice big fish on every trip around. Then some of the very fellows who cried loud against the initial experiment asked for more.

As a result the other two locations were made. They now produce thousands of fish a year.

Homes for Fish

Other states are using similar programs. Some use old auto bodies. Others have dumped in old street cars. One group weighted down old beer kegs with cement and still others have hauled in old freight cars.

Enroute to Dallas, recently, I saw a half dozen old Pullman cars. Couldn't help but think what wonderful fishing reefs they would make.

There is nothing new about building such reefs. It is following the principle of nature. For millions of years fish have been hiding among rocks,

old wrecked ships and other protective cover in the bottom of the oceans and lakes.

Perhaps this is one of the major secrets of the fine fishing right now in Falcon Lake, on the Rio Grande, below Laredo. The bottom of this lake is brush lined. Fish like to hide in that brush.

Also for years fishermen have learned to build brush covers in some of our lakes. We heard of one fisherman recently who chained together a bunch of old automobile casings and lowered them into the water at a secret spot where only he knows.

Since he keeps the hole baited he'll have a good fishing spot all his own, until someone else finds it. Then he'll have competition, for it will produce fish.

Building of brush covers and the lowering of automobile bodies or old tires, into a public impoundment, can cause trouble.

In the first place, unless the cover is lowered deep enough it might be a hazard.

Also water supply lakes would not be benefited by such practice.

And on the lakes built by the Corps of Engineers the practice probably would be frowned upon.

For that reason I'd suggest that, if you plan to build a cover in any lake, you first check legal requirements. Then proceed accordingly.

Baited Fishing Holes

Many pole fishermen now bait holes. There are numerous legal ways.

You can lower a bale of alfalfa hay, a sack of corn chops, some old bones or even a gallon of syrup with a hole

in the bottom of the bucket. Any of these things will attract fish.

Now we're getting around to a discussion of pole fishing.

With all that can be said of plugging or fly casting, the pole fisherman still is one of the few real lucky persons. After all, it's THE fishing for a man or woman who has the patience and who really enjoys the sport.

Every time I see a woman with a sunbonnet and a man with a straw hat and a cane pole I feel sentimental. It's a way of life for these people. It's an easy, relaxing, enjoyable life which most of them follow methodically.

But these pole fishermen are learning a few tricks for comfort. I've seen them drive their station wagons to the water's edge, set up nice folding chairs, put a pole holder into the bank, bait the hook, then sit back and take it easy. That is the original way to relax!

Barge Fishing is Fun

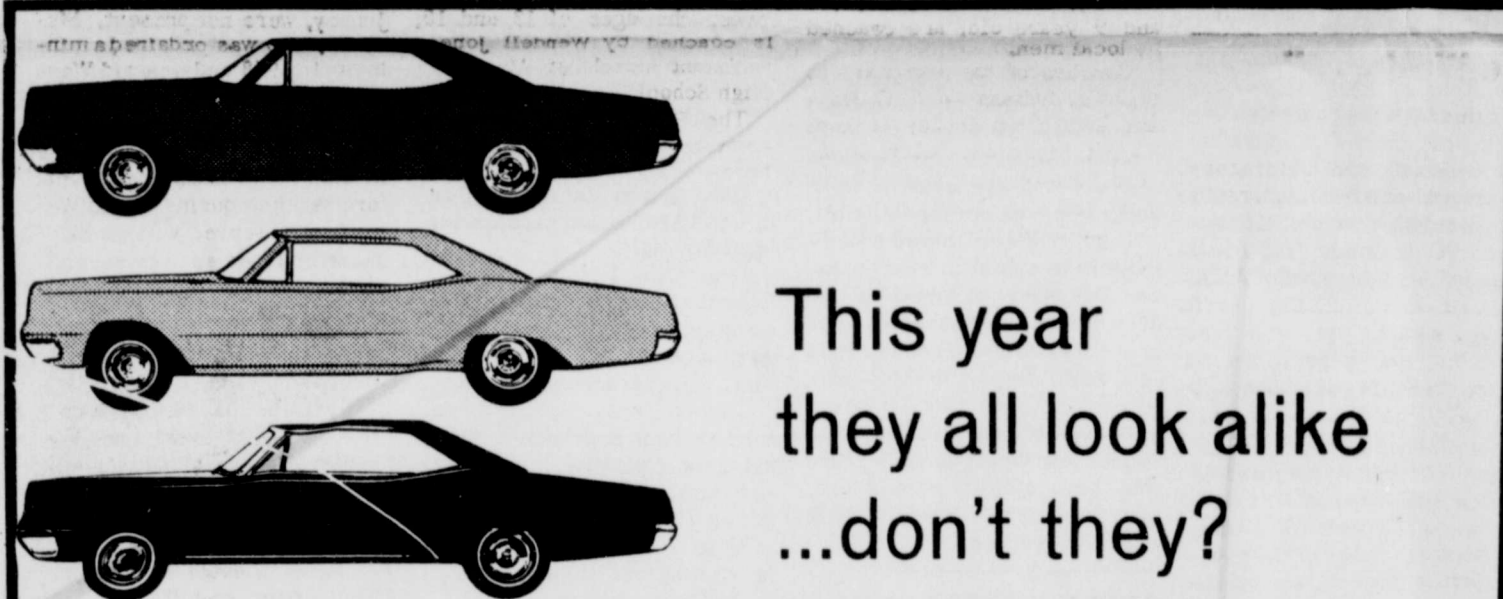
Another way to fish leisurely is to barge fish.

When it comes to easy fishing, barges now offer all the comforts of home. Practically every lake has one or more. Some are just tin barns. Others are deluxe structures. Many of them are heated in winter and air conditioned in summer.

They have comfortable chairs, a place for the rod to rest and a snack bar where you can buy a sandwich or something to drink.

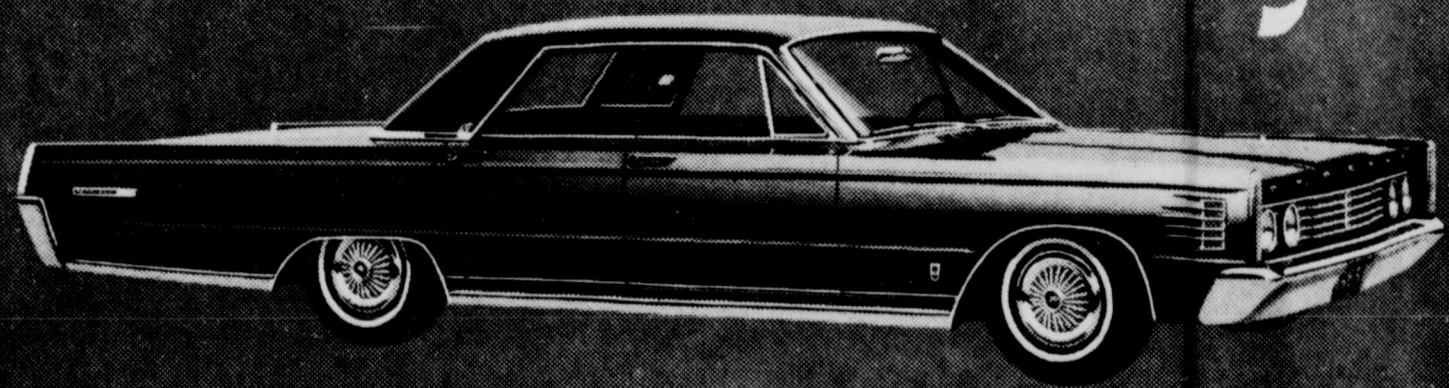

One thing for sure about barges — they provide fishing ease for a lot of people.



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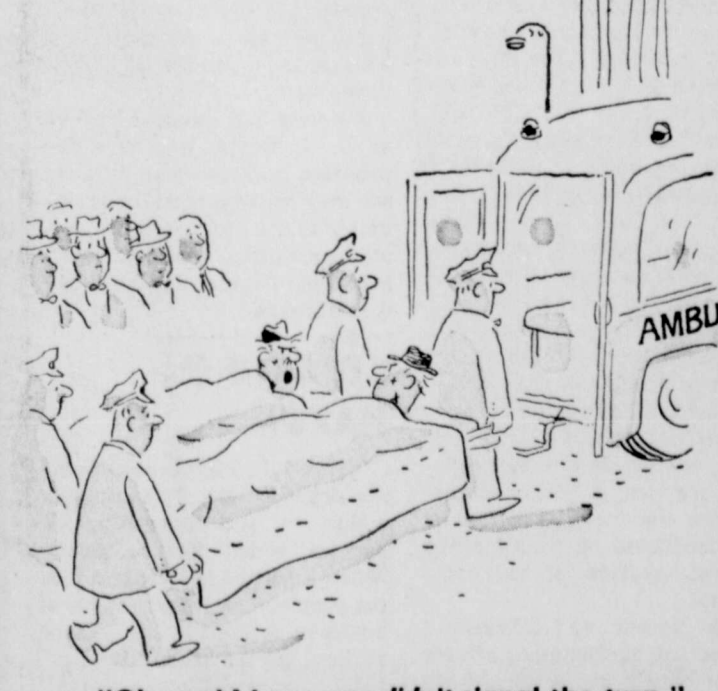
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PROGRESSIVE BUSINESS AND CIVIC-MINDED PEOPLE OF LUBBOCK AND VICINITY

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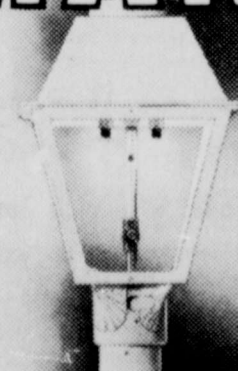
