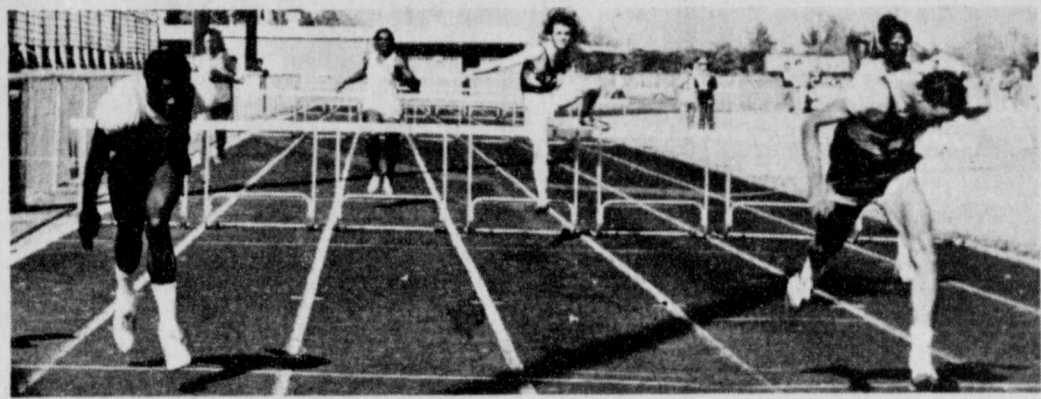

Rivercrest Takes Second In District

The Rivercrest Rebels accumulated 120 points in running and field events at the District 15AA Track Meet at Rivercrest Friday to take second place. Quitman won the meet with 136 points.

Qualifying to go to the Regional Meet at Arlington April 19 from Rivercrest were Terry Giddens, who qualified in the 100 yard dash, high jump, long jump and sprint relays. W. M. Simpson, Glen Fulbright and Randy Jones are the other region qualifiers on the sprint relay team. Ricky Norman qualified on the 120 yard high hurdles and the 330 yard intermediate hurdles. Alternates will be Jimmy Curties, Jerry Curties and Danny Black.

Dr. E.E. Brooks, Bobby Martin, Tommy Easley and Robert Canfield were elected to the Talco-Bogata School Board in balloting Saturday at three polling places.

Brooks of Bogata and Martin of Talco were each

elected to fill a two-year unexpired term and Canfield will fill a one year term.

Brooks received 248 votes, Martin had 217, Easley got 199 and Canfield received 156.

Candidates defeated and the votes they received were Mrs. Olen (Claire) Jessee with 134, Clovis (Duncan) Brown with 82, James Dunn with 68 and Troy D. Brown with 64.

Beef Cattle Tour Planned For Red River County

A two day Beef Cattle Tour has been planned for Beef Cattle Producers of Red River County reports Robert J. Moody. The tour is scheduled for April 22 and 23 and the following points will be visited: The Merchinson Ranch located near Athens where Beef Producers will observe a cow-calf operation and pasture improvement. Late in the afternoon the group will observe grass fat steers conducted by TP&L at Trinidad. The group will have dinner and spend the night at TP&L's Trinidad Facilities with an Educational Meeting that night.

On April 23 the group will tour the Big Brown Facilities near Fairfield, Texas and return home in the afternoon.

Moody states that a forty passenger bus will cost each Beef Producer approximately \$10. per seat. The seats will be sold on a first come basis and anyone interested in making the tour should contact the County Extension Office as soon as possible.

Rebecca Sikes To Compete In State 4-H Contest

Rebecca Sikes, granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. M. Sikes of Talco, won first place in the Snacks and Beverages competition at the district 4-H Food Show. Miss Sikes and three other girls from Extension District 5 will represent the district at the State 4-H Food Show at College Station in June.

The senior division, in which Miss Sikes competed, attracted 54 entries while the junior division had 65 entries. Only the first place winners in the senior division are eligible for state competition.

Rivercrest won first place in three events, the sprint relays, the long jump by Giddens, and the 330 yard intermediate hurdles by Norman. Norman also placed second in the high hurdles.

Jerry Curties placed third in the 330 yard intermediate hurdles, fourth in the 120 yard high hurdles and third in pole vault.

Simpson placed third in the 220 yard dash, and fifth in the discus.

Fulbright placed fourth in the 220 yard dash, sixth in long jump, and third in the 100 yard dash.

Constitution Delegates Recess

Delegates to the 1974 Constitutional Convention have taken a breather from their efforts to rewrite Texas' 1876-model Constitution.

The 181 Delegates will spend the next 30 days in their home districts discussing with their constituents the work accomplished thus far on the Constitutional redraft.

Decision to take the recess until May 6th was prompted partially by the need for some Delegates to return to their districts to present themselves to the voters for reelection and by a desire of many other Delegates to seek citizen comment on the work of the Convention so far.

During the recess, the Convention's Style and Drafting Committee will continue to work preparing all adopted articles for final vote by the Delegates.

Before taking a break from their work, Delegates gave tentative approval to seven of the 11 articles that will make up the proposed Constitution of 1974.

When they return, Delegates will continue work on the Legislative Article and move on into articles dealing with the Judiciary, General Provisions and Separation of Powers. Work of the Convention was recessed midway through debate on the

Legislative Article.

Tentatively approved after many hours of Committee hearings and lengthy debate on the floor of Convention Hall are articles dealing with Education, Elections and Voter Qualifications, the Executive, Finance, Local Government and the Mode of Amending the Constitution in future years.

Also given tentative approval is the Bill of Rights. Language of the Bill of Rights as it appears in the present 1876 State Constitution has been retained without change.

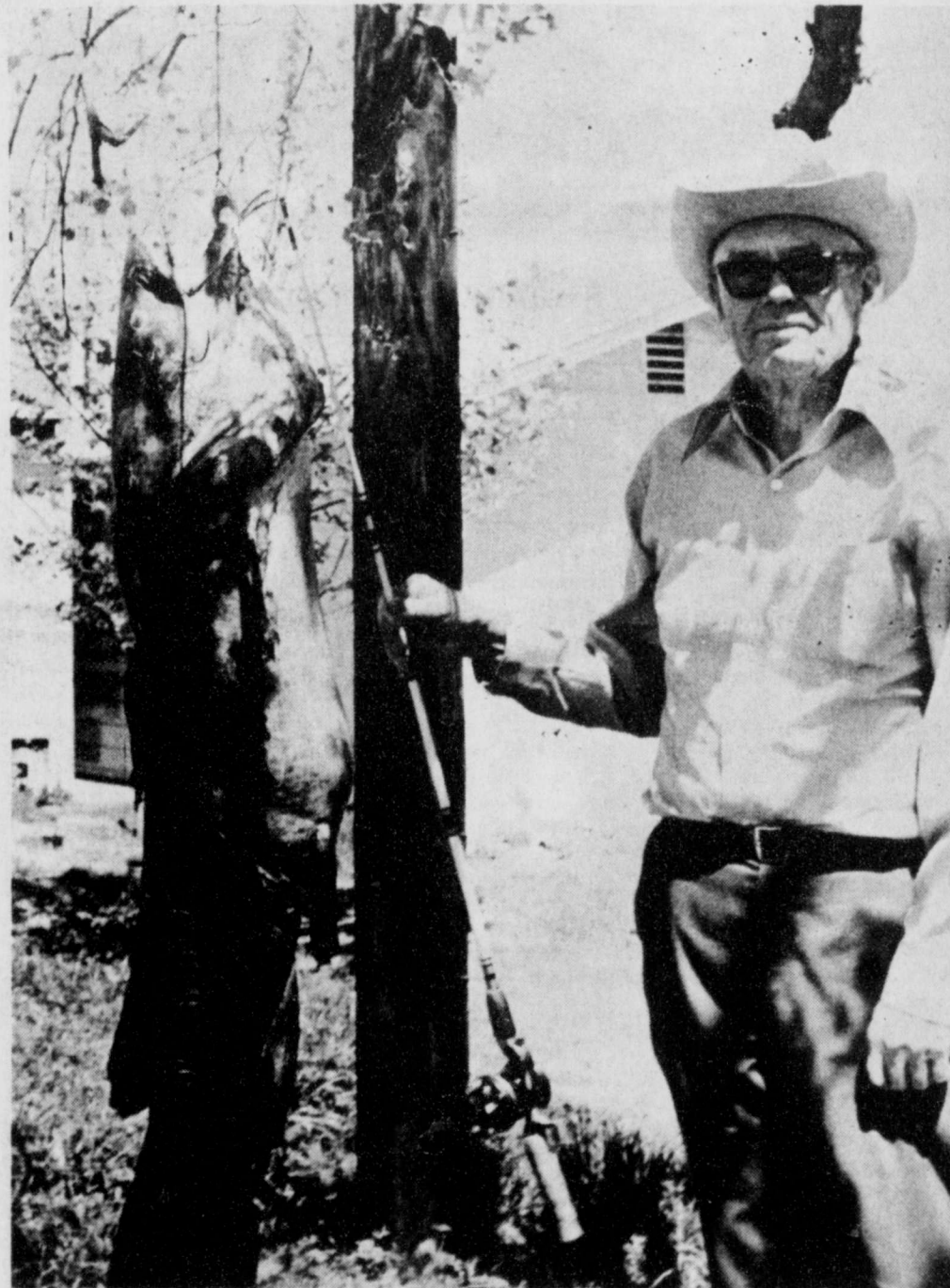
The recess interrupted a strenuous Convention schedule which required Delegates to work at the task of constitutional revision five days a week. Constitutional Conventions in many other states have met only two to three days weekly.

In addition to the work on the floor of Convention Hall, Delegates to the Texas Constitutional rewrite session have had to schedule Committee hearings around Convention general sessions.

On their return to Austin, Delegates will go to work on the three remaining articles and then begin final consideration of the entire document to be presented to voters — probably in the November general election.

The decision to submit the Convention's final document to the people for their required vote will take a two-thirds vote of the Convention membership.

Floritam Grass Solves Problems

Texas homeowners have a new weapon with which to battle chinchbugs and St. Augustine Decline (SAD) in their St. Augustinegrass lawns.

Floritam, a new variety of St. Augustinegrass that is resistant to these maladies, is now available at most local nurseries, notes Dr. Walter Walla, plant pathologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The new grass was developed jointly by the Florida and Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations. It was released to commercial sod producers in 1972.

"Besides being resistant to SAD and chinchbugs, Floritam is also tolerant to downy mildew and gray leaf spot. However, brown patch and rust still pose problems, and the new grass is less hardy than Common St. Augustinegrass," points out the Texas A&M University System specialist.

The new grass is moderately coarse-textured, is fast-growing and has a dark-green color. It also has a larger root system than common St. Augustinegrass. Floritam can be used in establishing a new lawn or for interplanting in established lawns that are affected by SAD. However, late fall planting is not recommended.

"When interplanting, plant the sprigs on 18-inch centers. For new lawns or seedbeds, plant on 12 to 18-inch centers," suggests Walla. "Keep unplanted sprigs out of heat and drying conditions. After planting, water the grass thoroughly and keep it watered. Apply a complete fertilizer when the new runners begin to grow."

"Be sure to purchase Floritam sod or sprigs from a reputable nursery since it is hard to distinguish from Common St. Augustinegrass," advises Walla.

"A list of certified Floritam producers is available from your local county Extension office."

Cotton Markets Slow In Western Regions

Activity in Western Region cotton markets was slow this week, according to the Agricultural Marketing Service USDA. Demand was described as weak, although both foreign and domestic mills made purchases during the week. Growers, with only a limited volume of cotton on hand, continued to resist offering prices. Merchants were not aggressively seeking additional supplies. Contracting of the 1974 crop was slow. A limited volume of San Joaquin Valley, California growth was contracted at 62.00 to 62.50 cents per pound, basis grade 31 staple 35, 3.5 to 4.9 mike. Elsewhere, growers were not willing to accept offered prices. Many merchants were not attempting to contract at the present time. Unsettled weather slowed planting in the San Joaquin Valley of California during the week. Some early planted cotton had emerged. In Central Arizona, planting activities were increasing and earlier planted fields were up to a stand. High winds and blowing dust delayed land preparation in many areas of Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico. Pre-plant irrigation continued in New Mexico and West Texas. A limited amount of planting was getting under way in Southeastern New Mexico and the El Paso-Pecos areas of Texas. Planting continued in the South Texas-Coastal Bend areas

where some replanting was necessary because of cold and wet weather. Conditions varied with some fields too wet and some too dry to plant. The Texas plains area and portions of Oklahoma continued to need moisture.

1 2-ounce jar pimiento, sliced
½ c. slivered almonds

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Grocer Hawkins put up no resistance as the youthful robber cleaned out his cash register. To Hawkins, the young man's pistol was all too real.

But in fact, the pistol was a toy. When the robber was later caught and brought to trial for "armed robbery," he insisted that the charge would not stand up.

"The simple truth is," he told the court, "that I was not armed at all. That gun I had couldn't hurt a flea."

Nevertheless, the court decided he was guilty as charged. The court said what mattered was not the actual character of the gun but the way it looked to the victim.

Most courts agree. That is, they view the holdup weapon "through the eyes of the beholder." They reason that the essence of the crime is putting the victim in fear, which can be done as effectively with a gun that only looks deadly as with one that really is.

There have even been cases of "armed robbery" in which the robber had no weapon at all. Thus: another holdup man terrified his victim merely by showing a menacing bulge in his coat pocket.

Yet, a court decided this was enough basis for a charge of armed robbery. The court said the fear that the robber had a gun, plus the fear that he might use it, was all that the law required by way of intimidation.

Still, the fear must be at least of physical harm—not of a lesser form of pressure. Suppose A says to B:

"Unless you hand over \$500, I'll get you in trouble with the Internal Revenue Service."

If B pays off, A may be guilty of some offense—but not robbery. As one court put it:

"There can be no robbery without violence. The menace must be of a sort to excite reasonable apprehension of danger. Threat of prosecution for a crime is regarded as insufficient (because) a man in the hands of the law is not legally presumed to be in danger of bodily harm."

Jerry, The Jenny, And Jenkins Plow The Old Way

Plowing today is a lot different from what it used to be. Huge tractors, air conditioned and with cabs, pull four or even eight row equipment over the land at a fast speed. But Oliver Jenkins isn't very concerned about that, he and Jerry, the jenny, still do their plowing the old way.

In the early spring anyone who happens down a certain side road at Cunningham is likely to see Oliver and Jerry "Bustin' up middles" for the garden.

Jenkins, who is 77 years old, has been plowing behind a mule or jenny for about as long as he can recall. Of all the animals he has used for tilling the soil though, Jane was his favorite. She lived to be some thirty years old, and during that time he could leave her standing, untied, and go to the house for a drink or bite to eat. Upon his return, there would be Jane, still standing patiently. Every year he broke and cultivated a big vegetable garden and a corn patch. One day though, he turned his back on Jane for a moment, and when he turned around he saw that she was trembling and her nose hung down to the ground. Right then he unhitched her and led her to the barn. He never worked her again. "Poor old thing," he says, "she was just worn out."

Jerry came to replace her then, but he isn't always as eager to work as his predecessor. One day he was acting up so bad that Oliver says he led him to the barn, tied him, and got his whip out. He shook it at Jerry, gave him a good scolding, and told him he would use the whip if he didn't behave. Then he took him back to the field and Jerry settled down and plowed with a will, never making any more fuss. "He just needed a little persuasion," chuckled Jenkins.

Oliver has used the same harness for some thirty-five years, and new he paid five dollars for it. It has been so well taken care of that the leather is still strong and pliable. The collar is worn smooth as silk, from an animal leaning into it to plow the rich soil, and the handles on the plow are smooth too, from Jenkins' hands guiding it.

They have owned only three vehicles since the wagon days, the first being a model T cut down into a truck. The only time they see much use is an occasional trip to Paris or Deport.

The Jenkins' raise all their own vegetables in their garden and require little in the way of "store-bought" goods. Their garden is neat and well ordered, as is their whole yard and house. Their water comes from a main

tank, and Emma, Oliver's wife, carries water carefully to the flowers and shrubs that surround the house.

Oliver and Emma tend their animals with the same loving care that they tend the house and garden. Up until the last few years they always kept a milk cow and chickens.

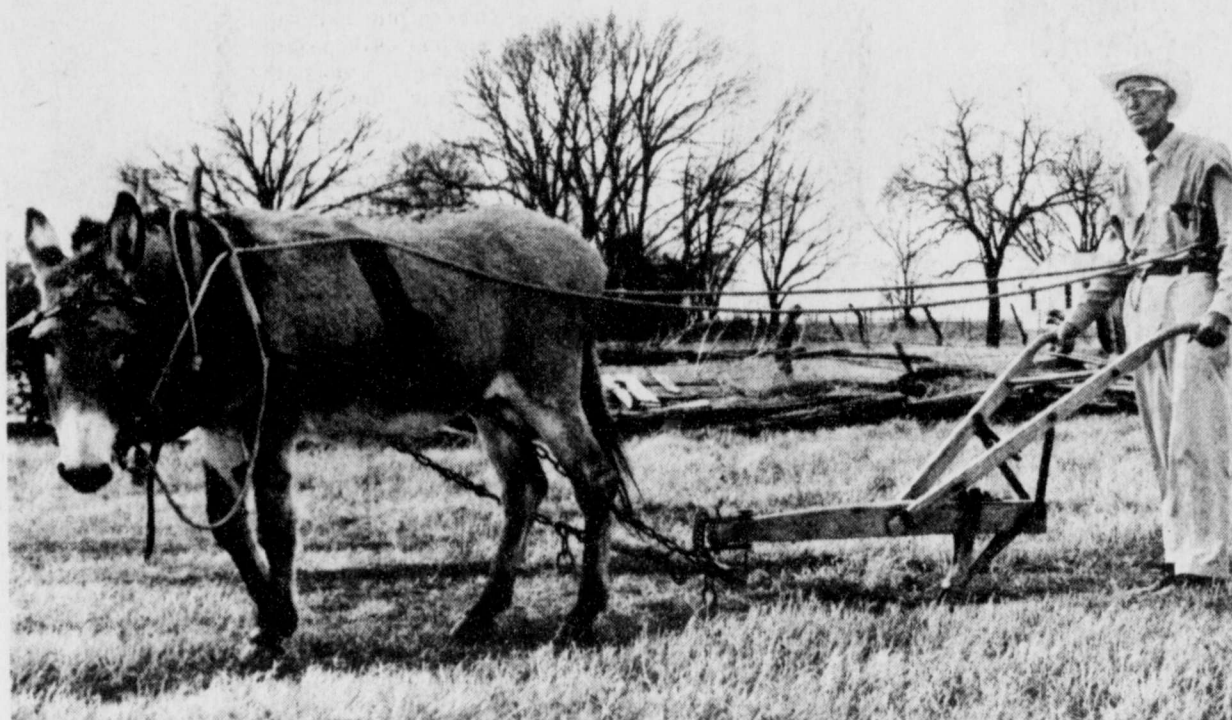
Only recently did they lose their dog, who had been with them for over 14 years.

All animals are much beloved to the gentle pair, and no beast was ever sold for slaughter or neglected because it had outlived its usefulness. Oliver and Emma care for them in old age with

careful dedication. The memories of each dog or cat, cow or mule is dear to them.

Oliver Jenkins doesn't care much about new tractors, he and old Jerry can handle what plowing they need to do, and perhaps we might all take a lesson from the Jenkins'. There are no castoffs in their

world, and stray is taken in, loved and fed. There is no hurry in their world, either. The peaceful kindness and gentleness in a world that seems to be rushing by at a tremendous pace is as refreshing as a cool breeze on a front porch at evening.

IRS Warns Against Mailing Cash

Cold, hard cash is not the way to pay your 1973 federal income tax, Robert A. LeBaube, Acting Internal Revenue Service (IRS) district director for North Texas, said today.

"Cash can get lost in the mail," he said, "leaving the taxpayer without a record of payment."

For the sake of assuring proper payment and further keeping good records, Le-

Baube said, taxpayers should use either checks or money orders payable to the IRS. That way, if the check or money order is lost, taxpayers can stop payment and issue a new one.

Another advantage of this type of payment, LeBaube said, is that taxpayers can write their social security number on the check or money order and further assure proper identification
