

Democratic Split Threatens Revival Of Meat Controls

Maimed Bill Could Mean Second Veto

WASHINGTON, July 6 (AP) — A democratic split threatened today to block the revival of meat price controls in any OPA renewal bill the senate may pass next week.

With Republicans massing behind him, minority whip Wherry (Neb.), told a reporter he is satisfied at least a dozen Senate Democrats also will support his proposal to cut meat and poultry off the list of controlled products if the Office of Price Administration is re-vised.

Senator Murdock (D - Utah), said, however, that if any such action finally is sustained by Congress and the bill is sent to the President in that form, he expects that it will be vetoed.

Murdock, himself a stockman, challenged Wherry's estimate of majority support for the elimination of meat, asserting: "I can't see how any Democrat can go against the President's wishes in such a grave crisis."

Administrative lieutenants admitted that an informal nose count indicated they will have to bring back to Washington some of the senators who have gone home to patch up their political fences if they are to have a chance of beating down what they tabbed as a "highly objectionable" amendment.

It will be the Senate's first head-on collision with the meat issue. Democratic Leader Barkley (Ky.), carefully avoided any such showdown when he was piloting through the original extension bill which President Truman vetoed.

Barkley told reporters he thought there was "a chance" the new OPA bill might go to the White House by the end of next week. But he remarked that there were "prospects of considerable discussion" in the Senate.

He said he supposed the "most firework" will take place with respect to specific decontrols.

Barkley added that he hoped the bill would be passed "in its present form as near as possible."

Some of our constituents beg to disagree with stories that rentals in the main have remained fairly static here despite the demise of OPA. They, of course, speak with good authority in their particular cases. There have been increases, and some of them pretty steep. Generally these have centered around larger apartment houses. We have heard reports of hikes from 10 to 50 per cent, but an encouragingly large number of landlords are continuing on existing bases or with minor adjustments.

Here's hoping that history will repeat itself with minor modifications. Today, a year ago, a severe drought was broken with four and a quarter inches of rain. The city caught nearly a billion gallons of water in its lakes. Stock tanks were filled, farmers got planting moisture and ranges were revived. A week later to the day, another deluge soaked the area but did considerable damage to land, roads and some property. Most people would be willing to swap a little damage for a good soaking.

We're not the only ones hit by dry weather. It's general in West Texas, New Mexico, western Oklahoma, western Kansas and Colorado. Irrigation supplies in the Pecos and Rio Grande valleys are crucially low. Many cities in New Mexico are suffering from water shortages. Crop land and ranges are suffering or bare.

No Relief Seen For Hot Weather

Texas temperatures remained high in the 90's yesterday with three points reporting the mercury at 100 or more degrees and only three points reporting rain. No temperature relief was in sight for today.

Only cities with maximum temperatures under 90 reporting to the weather bureau were Galveston and Port Arthur and both had rains. Port Arthur reporting .45 inch and Galveston .22 inch. Houston was the only other city reporting rain with .20 inch, but the mercury there was 92 degrees.

Fort Worth, with 97 degrees, set a record for the season, while Dallas, with 98, equaled this season's temperature record.

Other maximum temperatures included: Abilene 96, Austin 95, Big Spring 98, Brownsville 93, El Paso 94, San Antonio 95, Sulphur Springs 98, Tyler 95, Waco 96, Alice 99, Brady 87, Clarendon 101, Corpus Christi 94, Laredo 100, Del Rio 95, Quanah 103, and Palestine 93.

Jews Flee Poland After Bloody Riot

WARSAW, July 6 (AP) — The flight of Jews from Poland was reported today to have increased in the wake of the bloody pogrom at Kielce and many were said to be trying to cross the frontier into Czechoslovakia or stow away on ships in Baltic ports bound for Scandinavian countries.

In Warsaw freighted Jews crowded the corridors of the Hotel Polonia seeking military permits from the American military attaché for transit through Germany en route to France. Others were being taken to Czech authorities which would permit them to leave Poland bound for France, America or Palestine via Czechoslovakia.

Despite the government's efforts to afford protection to the Jews, their fears, of additional anti-Jewish violence seemed to have been crystallized by the Kielce pogrom.

The newspaper Rzeźpoltka charged that agents of Gen. Wladyslaw Anders, who commanded the Polish troops fighting in Italy, took advantage of weariness of the police after Sunday's referendum to start the Kielce pogrom.

Milk, Meats, Butter, Rents, Jump In Price

NEW YORK, July 6 (AP) — Housewives in many sections of the nation paid more money today for milk, meats, butter and rents as the nation's complicated economy continued its irregular reaction to the end of OPA price controls.

The price of milk, effective Monday, will jump two to three cents a quart in New York, New Jersey and the Philadelphia area. Milk prices were expected to go up in Louisville, Ky., where dairy-ment claimed they were losing a total of \$10,000 a day.

Butter prices in the New York and Chicago wholesale markets were up 13 and 14 cents a pound, although the Philadelphia, Boston and San Francisco markets were attempting to hold the line at unchanged prices.

The retail price of butter at Louisville was 82 cents a pound, 20 cents over OPA ceilings. Richmond stores were getting 55 cents a pound for bacon, 41 for smoked sausage, 69 for loin lamb chops, 44 for hot dogs and 55 cents for chicken. In some instances prices were higher.

Consumer prices held fairly steady in a number of cities, notably Chicago, but in others the price increases were spectacular, ranging to as high as 50 percent in meat and other higher in rents.

The top price for meat at Clatskanie, N. C., auctions this week was \$22.80 for grades which were \$18.60 under OPA. Slaughterhouses were reported working at capacity.

There were some encouraging signs from the wholesale markets. The New Orleans Stock Yards, Inc., said cattle were pouring in to the yards with prices one-fourth to one-half cent below an 18.45-cent ceiling. Plenty of meat at former OPA price levels was predicted there in 10 days.

Corn futures in Chicago, which had been advancing upward steadily, dropped 3 3/4 to 5 cents on an extension in commission house selling. Oats reacted with corn, closing 1 5/8 to 3 5/8 cents lower.

Cattle receipts at Chicago also were considerably higher than usual for a Saturday.

Industrial operations as a whole continued an upward trend and physical volume was larger in retail stores, electric power plants, railroad loadings, crude oil output and bank clearings.

Bank clearings of more than \$14,000,000 were the highest for any week this year.

Film Of Bomb Test Rumored Missing

KWAZALEIN, July 6 (AP) — Reliable but unconfirmed reports circulated here today that top-secret film taken of the July 1 atom bomb test at Bikini was stolen in New York City while an officer-courier was using a telephone and that the FBI is engaged in an extensive manhunt. All mail packages for foreign countries were reported being examined.

There was no official comment at this for Operation Crossroads. In New York, E. E. Conroy, special agent in charge of the New York office of the FBI said "no investigation is being made in this case by the FBI."

Reds Reneged On Meeting, Bevin Says

PARIS, July 6 (AP) — British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin in a bitter debate tonight charged that Russia was trying to back out of her agreement to call a European peace conference July 29. American informants reported, and the Big Four ministers remained deadlocked for a second day.

Bevin and US Secretary of State James F. Byrnes both told Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov that they could not agree to his proposal that rules of procedure be imposed upon the peace parley by the four-power foreign ministers, they said.

In a 4 1/2 hour session, Bevin asserted that Molotov appeared to be stipulating new conditions to summing up the 21-nation conference after Britain, France and the United States had accepted all the other Soviet conditions.

The British minister declared he already had assured his own government and the dominions that he would not agree to anything which might limit their freedom at the peace conference.

Through Train Service Opens

BALTIMORE, July 6 (AP) — Through train service to Texas and the southwest will be inaugurated here tomorrow on both the Baltimore and Ohio and the Pennsylvania railroads, which will make connections with the Missouri Pacific line in St. Louis.

The "Sunshine Special," Pennsylvania train leaving Washington nightly at 8:45 p. m., and Baltimore at 9:25 p. m., will travel to Mexico City over the Texas and Pacific and National Railway of Mexico lines.

Miss Wanda Lyle, daughter of Rep. John Lyle, Jr. (D-Texas), of Corpus Christi, will make the first trip as "Miss Sunshine" and will be welcomed by Mayor Theodore R. McKeldin in Baltimore.

The B. and O. "National Limited" will leave Baltimore nightly at 5:15 p. m., arriving at Dallas and Fort Worth the second morning. The B. and O. "Diplomat," leaving here at 6:57 p. m., will have sleeping car through service to Tulsa and Oklahoma City and also will pick up sleeping cars at Washington for Dallas, Fort Worth and Houston.

Redin Takes Stand In Espionage Trial

SEATTLE, July 6 (AP) — Russian Naval Lt. Nikolai G. Redin took the stand to defend himself against espionage and conspiracy charges today after two character witnesses described Redin, accused by the US government of buying secret naval information, as "honest and trustworthy."

Lieutenant Redin, handsome in his naval uniform, started his testimony with a recital of his background and his arrival at San Francisco July 26, 1942, as a representative of the Soviet purchasing commission.

Defense attorneys have announced he would enter a flat denial to government charges that he purchased restricted information on the new type US destroyer tender Yellowstone from Herbert Kennedy, Seattle marine engineer.

Ex-GI To Remain In Mike O'Daniel's Apartment For While

DALLAS, July 6 (AP) — Wesley Bryant, the ex-GI ordered evicted from his apartment by landlord Mike O'Daniel, son of Texas' junior senator, will keep his apartment at least until July 20, his attorney said today.

Morris I. Jaffe, retained by the American Veterans Committee to fight Bryant's case, said since the veteran's rent is paid until July 20, O'Daniel can not file suit until that time.

Bryant said today he felt picketing of the apartment by approximately 80 members of the AVC yesterday "did the job" in giving widespread publicity to his cause.

Bill McGhee, living in the same block on which the O'Daniel apartment is located, said one purpose of the picket line was an attempt to embarrass landlords who have made what the AVC considered unreasonable increases in rent.

Jester To Meet Rainey In FCC Radio Hearing

GLADEWATER, July 6 (AP) — Beauford Jester, candidate for governor, announced here today he planned to meet Dr. Homer P. Rainey, also a candidate for governor, at a Federal Communications Commission hearing in Dallas Friday on radio time allotments by the Texas Quality Network.

Jester today challenged Dr. Rainey's charges that the network has not allotted enough time for political speeches. The hearing has been called to investigate the candidate's complaints. Jester wired the FCC asking that he be permitted to appear at the hearing.

Jester, in his telegram to the FCC, said Dr. Rainey's charges did not represent his opponent's views.

"I do not think any candidate could expect any more than a fair and equitable share of time for political broadcasts," Jester said in a statement. "My friends, who have been trying to arrange for radio time, tell me they have been treated fairly by Texas Quality Network. Texas radio audiences do not like their favorite programs to be interrupted so often by political speeches. No candidate ought to expect to be given so much radio time as to dilute programs which they regularly tune in."

Jester said he would cancel speaking appointments Friday to attend the hearing.

Rangers Called In On Kreager Case

SHERMAN, July 6 (AP) — Texas Rangers have been requested to aid in the investigation of the mysterious June 17 disappearance of Mrs. N. O. Kreager, 80, County Attorney Olan R. Van Zandt said today.

The request for assistance came after firemen failed to find a body in Lake Texoma after a fisherman had reported overhanging boatmen lowering "something with feet" into the water four days after Mrs. Kreager's disappearance.

Van Zandt said, however, that plans are being made to drag another unnamed small lake tomorrow.

Meanwhile, John Kreager, Sherman business man, has offered a \$500 reward for information pertaining to his mother.

Mrs. Kreager disappeared shortly after drawing about \$3,000 from a local bank. A Sherman druggist reported overhearing the woman in a telephone conversation regarding a real estate purchase.

Jim Winslow Dies; Old Settler Here

Funeral will be held at 4 p. m. today for James Sylvester (Jim) Winslow, 72, president of the Howard County Old Settlers Reunion and pioneer West Texan.

Mr. Winslow died at his home at 602 Abrams street at 2:30 p. m. Friday from the effects of a stroke he suffered the last week of May.

Services will be held at the Eberley-Curry chapel with the Rev. Charles Abele, rector of the St. Mary's Episcopal church, and the Rev. Robert Snell, a former pastor, officiating. Burial will be in the family lot in the Odd Fellow cemetery.

Perhaps no man was more typical of Howard county pioneers than was Jim Winslow, quoted frequently in Shine Philip's book, "Big Spring." In his time he had been a cowboy, rancher, railroad employee, grocery clerk, public official and contractor.

Born Nov. 4, 1873 in Parker county, he came to Big Spring in 1885. His first job was as a clerk with Frank Lester. Subsequently, he worked for the historic J.W. Fisher mercantile firm. Like most men of early Big Spring, he had a taste of work in the T.&P. shops where he served as a blacksmith's helper.

He resided two miles southwest of Big Spring for two years and later moved to a place near where Ackery now stands, ranching and carrying on some farming for 15 years. Returning to Big Spring he became a concrete contractor. Mr. Winslow served on the Big Spring Independent school district board of trustees for 12 years and was four years county commissioner from precinct No. 3.

Jovial and active, he revealed gatherings of old timers and Howard County Old Settlers reunion alive. He was widely in demand as an old time fiddler, always heading up the reunion contests in this

department as well as organizing bands to play for old settlers' dances and other old fashioned dance affairs. He had been a member of the I.O.F. lodge for more than 25 years.

He was married to Miss Josephine Mittie Burleson in Big Spring on April 29, 1894 by Judge Bowman, who also was a Methodist minister.

Surviving him are his wife; five daughters, Mrs. Zora Carter, Mrs. Odie Moore, Mrs. George Burke of Big Spring, Mrs. R. L. Morris of Jal, N. M., Mrs. John Morgan of Garland; two sons, Arthur Winslow of Fort Worth and James Winslow of Big Spring; a brother, A. B. Winslow of Big Spring; and a sister, Mrs. Effie Willis of Naravisa, N. M. He also leaves 11 grandchildren.

Funeral services will be W. C. Blankenship, B. O. Jones, Murph Thorp, Travis Reed, J. Ed Brown and Roy Hester.

Mexican Army To Make Sure Of Free Election

MEXICO CITY, July 6 (AP) — The army of Mexico, rifles and machine guns at hand, will guard the polls tomorrow in the federal government's first attempt to guarantee an honest presidential election free from bloodshed and gang violence.

Nearly 3,000,000 voters will choose a president for the next six years from four candidates: Miguel Aleman, 42, former secretary of the interior; Ezequiel Padilla, 46, former secretary of foreign affairs; Gen. Enrique Calderon, presented by the Popular Revolutionary party, and Gen. J. Agustin Castro, former secretary of war.

In addition the voters will name 147 members for seats in the house of deputies and 58 for the senate. There are approximately 1,000 candidates for the lower house and 800 for the senate.

Pre-election violence has been at a minimum. The polls will open at 9 a. m. (Central Standard Time) and close at 5 p. m. Soldiers will be on duty at 6 a. m. to conduct election officials to the voting places.

In the past, state governments and party gunmen have run elections pretty much to suit themselves.

President Manuel Avila Camacho, recalling the death of more than 100 persons and the wounding of thousands in his election six years ago, championed Mexico's new "honest election" law.

Aleman, hopes with the power of the government-dominated Institutional Party (PRI) to take the presidency on Dec. 1. He is supported by both the PRI, which includes almost every government official, and the powerful Mexican Federation of Labor.

Aleman's strongest opponent is Padilla, who served in Avila Camacho's cabinet with Aleman. Padilla has the backing of the newly organized Mexican Democratic Party (PDM).

Last rites will be held this morning at 10 o'clock for George Henry Pruitt, 40, who died in a local hospital Friday morning.

Rev. H. Clyde Smith will conduct the funeral in the Eberley-Curry chapel after which the body will be carried overland to Abilene for graveside services and burial at 3:30 p. m.

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Probe Testimony Implicates Him With Profiteers

WASHINGTON, July 6

Evidence before the senate war investigating committee today that an A. J. May endorsed \$18,634.07 in checks and a draft paid by two munitions firms to the Cumberland Lumber Company brought an assertion from Rep. Andrew J. May (D-Ky.) that "there was nothing out of line" with the lumber firm's accounts.

The committee's investigation into the war contracts of the Erie Basin Metal Products company and Batavia Metal Products company, two units of a 19-firm Illinois munitions combine, brought these developments:

1—Edward Schaffer of the general accounting office testified that the Batavia and Erie Basin firms paid \$48,634 in advances to the Cumberland Lumber company, whose agent was an Andrew J. May of Prestonsburg, Ky.

2—Schaffer testified that one of the checks paid by Erie Basin to the Cumberland concern, for \$3,156.47, bore the individual endorsement of A. J. May in addition to the signature on behalf of the Cumberland Lumber company.

3—Schaffer said that no lumber ever was delivered, as far as he could determine, by the Cumberland company and that he was unsuccessful in learning names of the others of the company.

4—Schaffer said one of the checks was endorsed "A. J. May, president," and added that the check for \$3,156.47 was cashed at the First National Bank of Prestonsburg, Ky.

5—Senator Mitchell (D-Wash.), a member of the investigating committee, demanded that Rep. May be summoned for questioning; and since, as a member of congress Rep. May would be immune to subpoena, Mitchell recommended that the senate and house authorize a resolution for subpoena if necessary to bring May before the group.

6—in the first of two statements May said he had never profited from his relations with the Illinois group, declared that he had appeared before the committee in executive session June 4, and called on Senator Mead, the investigating committee chairman, to make public what he said then; he said that testimony covered the ground of this week's public testimony in which witnesses have described him as "insistent" in behalf of war contracts for the Illinois combine; the committee said May's request in regard to publishing his testimony will be considered Monday.

7—in his second statement, Rep. May declared "there was nothing out of line" with the accounts of the Cumberland Lumber company, that his June 4 testimony "included the Cumberland Lumber company thoroughly," and that all documents, financial accounts and statements relating to that firm were in the hands of the committee.

8—The investigating committee met in closed session during the afternoon with three justice department officials in attendance.

9—in Prestonsburg, Ky., it was recalled that Rep. May confirmed to a reporter Dec. 28, 1943 that he had become the principal owner of a tract of some 2,000 acres of timberland near Partridge, Ky.

County Voting Strength Estimated At 7,000 In Unofficial Records

A potential of more than 7,000 votes will be at stake in the first Democratic primary three weeks hence in Howard county.

Unofficial tabulations by boxes show a preponderance of strength in commissioner precincts No. 2 and No. 3, accounting for about 70 per cent of the county's voting strength.

The apparent voting strength is 6,483, based on paid polls of 5502 and exemptions of 977. However, this is not an accurate figure for the exemption total is a minimum since the "overs" outside of Big Spring are not required under state law to secure exemptions each year. On the other hand, here are some deaths and removals which will tend to neutralize this factor.

Reds Take Over Austria Industry For Reparations

VIENNA, July 6 (AP)—The Russians announced today they had taken ownership of a major part of Austria's industrial capacity and other property as German reparations, and the Austrian cabinet summoned a special meeting of parliament.

The Russians acted without informing their allies. Austrian officials declared the Soviets were claiming 75 per cent of the republic's industrial capacity.

The Soviet order took over \$22,000,000 worth of industry in eastern Austria along with other "German external assets." The Russians insist property taken by the Germans after annexing Austria in 1938 is subject to seizure as German reparations under the Potsdam agreement—a view protested by the United States and by Austria.

Gen. Mark Clark, American commander in Austria, immediately sent a message to Soviet commander Col. Gen. L. V. Kursov urging great care in the carrying out of his order, and one to the Austrian government declaring it was not necessary to turn over property which was not a German asset.

Chancellor Leopold Figl's cabinet after a special meeting called an extraordinary session of parliament for next Wednesday. A communiqué declared socialist and communist members of the government joined with other members in the view that properties which were Austrian before the annexation should still be regarded as Austrian and not as German assets.

For months the Russians have been taking control of properties in eastern Austria which they classify as German assets. The United States has objected that properties taken forcibly by the Germans should not be classified as German-owned.

The Russians have refused to discuss the question in the Allied council for Austria, but last May 15 agreed they would not seize any more properties without informing the council.

Holiday Deaths Low Today Is Real Test

Fourth of July holiday deaths rose to 307 yesterday. Compared with advance predictions, however, the toll of death from violent causes indicated that safety-conscious Americans were keeping their celebration of the long independence day weekend on a comparatively safe and sane level.

Safety experts predicted the real test would come today when millions of motorists who left their homes for the holiday period return over the traffic-clogged roads.

A survey showed that since 6 p. m. (local time) Wednesday, 147 persons were killed in traffic deaths, 87 drowned and 73 met death from miscellaneous accidental causes.

New York led the states with 26 violent deaths. In Texas there were 15.

First American Nun Will Be Canonized As Catholic Saint

VATICAN CITY, July 6 (AP)—Mother Frances Xavier Cabrini, a gentle nun beloved for her charitable works, will be elevated to sainthood tomorrow in ceremonies at St. Peter's Basilica, marking the first canonization of a United States citizen by the Roman Catholic church.

Among the 40,000 Catholics from all over the world expected to attend the ceremonies will be nuns from the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart, the order founded by Mother Cabrini. Her death occurred three days before Christmas, 1917, in Chicago.

It was on April 18, 1933, that the congregation of rites at the Vatican inaugurated officially the examination of the cause for the beatification and eventual canonization of Mother Cabrini.

The congregation followed her steps from the little native town of Sant' Angelo Lodigiano in Lombardy, where she was born, on July 15, 1850, to Chicago and to the many parts of the world where her order established schools, orphanages, and hospitals.

Life Saving Course To Begin Monday At Swimming Pool

First session of a 15-hour course in junior and senior life saving will be held at 8 p. m. Monday at the Municipal swimming pool at City park.

The course, which has been prepared and approved by Red Cross water safety experts, is being sponsored here by the Howard-Glasscock Red Cross chapter, boy scouts, girl scouts, YMCA, the city and the Herald.

Those eligible for senior life saving instruction must have passed their 16th birthday or be in or above the 11th grade in school and be in sound physical condition. Preliminary requirements include: Reasonably good form on standing front dive, ability to swim 440 yards continuously employing standard strokes, dive from surface to minimum depth of six feet, tread water one minute with hands beneath surface, float motionless with minimum movement for one minute, spend at least 15 class hours and take two additional hours for examinations.

For junior instruction, boys and girls are eligible if not less than 12 or more than 15 years old, or if they are in the seventh to 10th grades of school, and in sound physical condition. Preliminary requirements include standing front dive in reasonably good form, swim 220 yards, employing standard strokes, dive from surface to minimum depth of six feet, tread water half a minute using hands beneath surface, float motionless with minimum movement for one minute, spend 15 hours in instruction, including examination.

Olen Puckett will supervise the course and serve as chief instructor. He will be assisted by Burl Haynie and Seth Garrison.

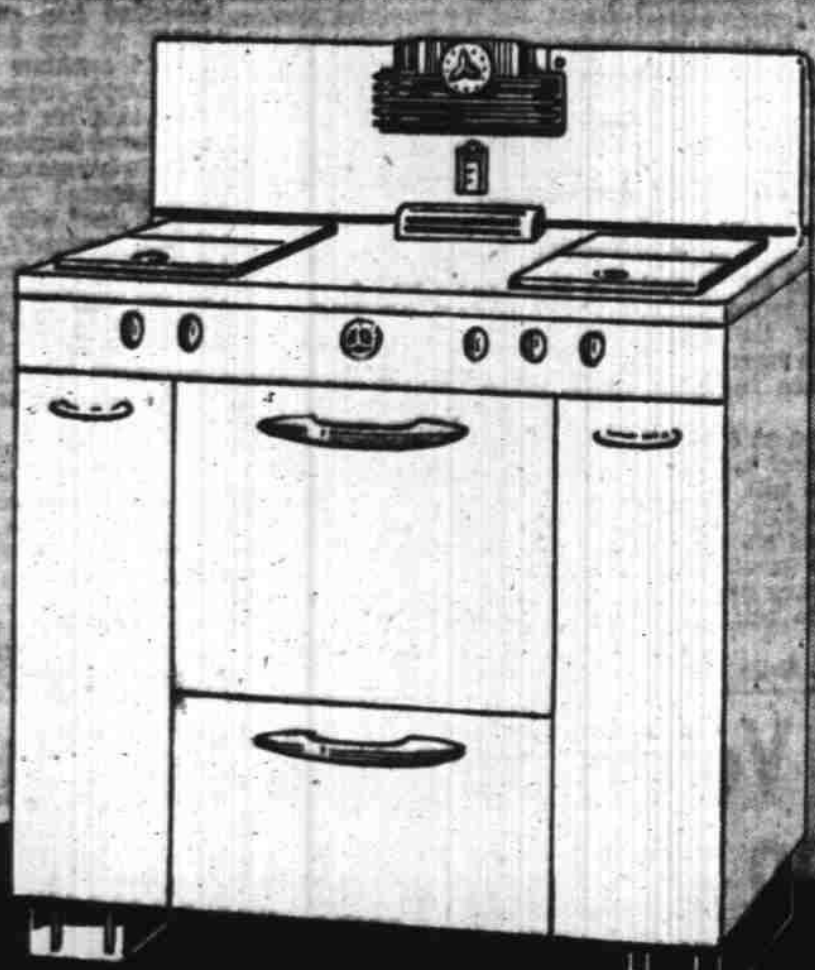

Ever-Increasing Era Of Crime Supplied By 6 Million Recruits

WASHINGTON, July 6 (AP)—FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover said today the nation "is facing a potential army of 6,000,000 criminals" and an "ever increasing wave of lawlessness which is feeding the criminal ranks with a never ending supply of recruits."

"Our homes and our lives," Hoover declared, "are daily threatened by this vast army. Law enforcement today is facing one of

its most gigantic tasks. "The crime increase so far this year is even greater than the 12.4 percent increase recorded for 1945. And every 20.1 seconds last year a serious crime was committed; every 6.4 minutes someone was raped, feloniously assaulted or slain."

Hoover stressed that the "vast army" of criminals "is 10 times greater in number than the number of students in our colleges

and universities. And for every school teacher in America there are more than seven criminals."

In an interview, Hoover outlined what he considers the immediate causes for "the present wave of lawlessness," and he suggested some remedial measures.

He attributed the crime wave to:

"A recession of moral fortitude, laxity in parental control, lowered moral standards, social and economic conditions, and abuses and maladministration of the penal system." He emphasized "laxity in parental control," saying:

"A lack of interest in the fundamentals of matrimony, in the proper rearing of children, is a cause for concern and is contributing to delinquency."

"We must eradicate the cause of crime at its roots. Small crimes generally precede great crimes and too often these small crimes are perpetrated by youngsters still presumably under home influence. Every home in America must become a sanctuary for good citizenship and not, as in many instances today, a breeding place for criminals."

Hoover asserted he "is convinced that if all parents fulfill their obligations to their children we would soon experience a sharp decline in crime."

Tests Made In Odessa Slaying; Ex-Husband Held

ODESSA, July 6. (AP)—The department of public safety in Austin today was testing a gun and mud found on the shoes and on the car belonging to John L. Nall, 28, charged with murder in the fatal shooting of Glen T. Thornton here Wednesday night.

Thornton, the husband of Nall's former wife, was killed and Mrs. Thornton beaten unconscious with a flashlight in their home here. They were attacked while asleep.

Nall was arrested the following afternoon in Houston, but said he was in Galveston the night of the shooting in Odessa. He maintained his alibi today in Austin, where he accompanied Sheriff Hugh Ratliff and Deputy Sheriff G. A. Ragsdale of Odessa for the tests.

Nall made no resistance in Houston when arrested. Deputy Sheriffs Bill Wingo and Gilbert Weaver said they had been notified to look for a car belonging to Nall.

They saw one being washed in a service station. It fitted the description and they stopped.

While waiting, Nall, dressed in khaki clothes, approached. When asked if he were Nall, he said yes. He accompanied the officers to the sheriff's office. That was 3:30 p. m. Thursday.

Wingo said a .45 caliber automatic pistol was found in the car. It contained one empty and five live bullets. Nall said he had fired the gun once at a bird. He said he missed the bird.

Nall told Houston officers he had never seen the man who married his divorced wife. He said he had been married eight years before they were divorced. Nall is an electrician. Thornton, a native of Temple, was a mechanic and had been in Odessa several years.

Sheriff Ratliff and Deputy Ragsdale drove to Houston to pick up Nall. Instead of driving back

to Houston, they continued to Austin, taking Nall with them, to make the mud and gun tests.

A cloudburst was reported in Odessa Tuesday.

Nall says he was in Galveston all night Wednesday. He said he slept on the beach.

Nall told Houston officers he had never been in jail before, and had never been accused of any crime.

Sheriff Ratliff, telephoning from Austin, told his office here he "might be delayed for the rest of the day" in Austin.

Two Prisoners Missing After Jail Escape

West Texas law enforcement agencies have been alerted to be on the lookout for two men who fled from a window in the county jail and gained their freedom sometime before daylight Friday.

The fugitives are J. R. Romines of Lamesa, returned here only last week to face a car theft charge, and Albino Renteria, who was being detained on a burglary count.

Romines and Renteria were not missed until Sheriff Bob Wolf went to feed them Friday afternoon.

The pair apparently used brute force to bend the bars of a window in the northwestern section of the jail. The barricades apparently had been weakened by freedom prisoners in previous escape tries.

Police theorized that the escapees might have remained in this vicinity until last night, then fled in a black 1941 Chevrolet coach reported stolen from a downtown section last night.

Police Search Homes Of Siam Journalists

BANGKOK, July 6. (AP)—Tension increased in troubled Siam today as police arrested a National Assemblyman and searched the homes of two other assemblymen and four journalists.

The actions continued an effort to halt opposition charges that the government had suppressed information concerning the death June 9 of King Ananda Mahidol, or was directly implicated in it.

Premier Pridi Phanomyong has prorogued the National Assembly, revived the wartime state of national emergency, imposed internal press censorship and appointed a former police general as commander-in-chief of the Siamese army.

Atomic Council Agrees To Punish Violations; Other Points Clarified

NEW YORK, July 6. (AP)—Delegates to the United Nations atomic energy commission were reliably reported today to be agreed that the Security Council must be the agency to punish serious violations of atomic control regulations.

Markets

NEW YORK, July 6. (AP)—While special stocks made a fair amount of headway during the past week, the market, as a whole, did little or nothing and dealings dwindled to the lowest level in almost a year.

Throughout the four sessions, brokers said, speculative and investment apathy was based on the question of price controls, consumer opposition to rising costs, and the idea that hopeful business prospects may have been discounted to a certain extent by the climb of the averages during May and June to new 15-year peaks.

Filipino Raiders Ambush Police Patrol

MANILA, July 6. (AP)—Filipino military police today sought to quell this new republic's first uprising after four men had been killed in Pampanga province when 200 raiders ambushed a military police patrol.

The raiders assertedly were giving battle to the Filipino police today after having taken the weapons of the men they ambushed.

A member of the commission, who did not wish to be identified, said this one of the major points clarified so far in private discussions of a six-nation sub-committee which has had the atomic control question under study the past week.

This informant said none of the delegates disputed the Security Council's right to act on all matters which threaten international peace even if these matters involve the misuse of atomic energy.

He said, however, that no agreement had been reached regarding the punishment of lesser violations of atomic regulations. The United States disclosed yesterday in a memorandum to the sub-committee that the US delegation wanted the atomic development authority to have the power to make final decisions in some matters.

These were understood to include punishment of violations which did not constitute actual threats to peace. Under the US plan, the authority would be able to impose such penalties as fines and revocation or denial of licenses for atomic production.

Russia, on the other hand, is understood to favor limiting the authority's power to the right to make recommendations to the Security Council.

Reynaud Given Seat In French Assembly

PARIS, July 6. (AP)—The constituent assembly voted 298 to 132 yesterday to seat Paul Reynaud, over-riding the recommendation of a communist-dominated election committee which had urged that the pre-war premier's seat be invalidated in view of his wartime record.

Reynaud defended himself before the chamber, accusing the communists of "wishing to make us turn away from our natural inclination toward the Anglo-Saxon democracies toward totalitarianism."

PRETTY CO-ED TIES ROBBER IN APRON STRINGS AFTER KICKING HIM DOWN

DETROIT, July 6. (AP)—Pretty Wanda Zebrowski, 18, a Michigan State College co-ed, planted a barefooted kick in an armed robber's stomach early today, then overpowered him and tied him up in apron strings.

Police took the man, 19, into custody and later picked up three other men suspected of acting as accomplices in the attempted robbery of a tavern operated by Wanda's father.

Wanda, a slim physical education sophomore in college, entered the main room of the tavern while her father, Stanley Zebrowski, pursued three men who fled into the night.

Barefooted and pajama-clad, Wanda raced across the tavern floor to intercept a shadowy figure headed for the window.

She kicked the man in the stomach and a shotgun flew out of his hands. As the girl seized the gun, it accidentally discharged, blasting a hole in the ceiling.

"The bandit ducked just in time," Wanda said, "or he would have gotten the entire charge. Then he begged me not to shoot any more. I told him to lie face downward on the floor and he did."

With the aid of her mother, Wanda then tied the bandit with apron strings before police, summoned by her father, arrived.

"I don't know where she learned her tactics," Deputy Sheriff Cornelius Gudenaw, Jr., said of Miss Zebrowski, "but she could compete with the average police officer."

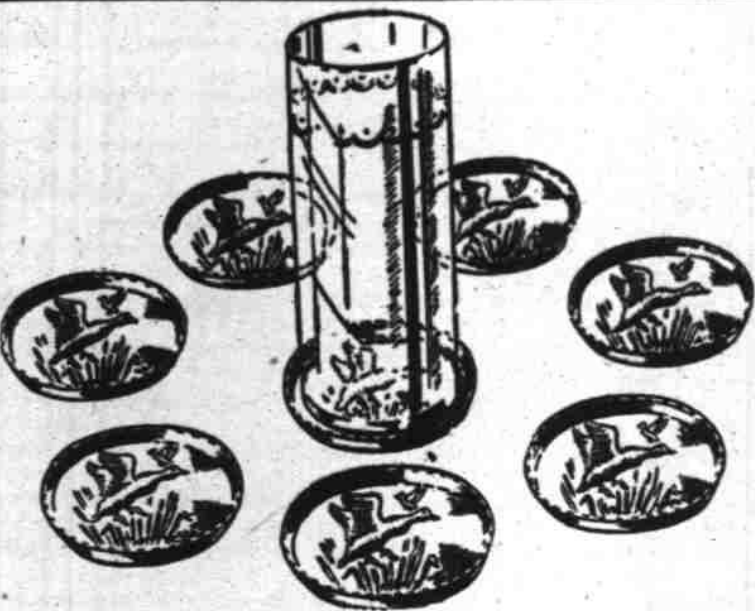

Family Grows So Large Officers Are Elected

PFLUGERVILLE, Travis County, July 6 (AP)—The 1,025-member Pfluger family for whom this 93-year-old settlement is named now finds it necessary to organize formally—with officers.

Election was held yesterday when 401 members of the family gathered in the hackberry and elm shade of the F. H. Pfluger farm to celebrate the 4th of July with one of the largest family reunions ever held in Texas.

The custom was started in 1934 by "Uncle Charley" Pfluger and missed only during the war year of 1945.

Sole business of the new officers will be to arrange for next year's reunion at the same place and time as this year's. D. J. Pfluger will be chairman; Gladys Pfluger, secretary; Roy Kuempel, treasurer; Mrs. Olin Teer, reporter; and Mrs. Walter Fuchs, program chairman.

In 1853 Henry Pfluger, Sr., an immigrant from Hessa, Germany, settled on a farm between the forks of Wilbarger creek near yesterday's reunion site. It was the beginning of Pflugerville, its 500 population today still being predominantly his descendants.

"I don't know one in ten of them," commented one of the middle-aged members of the family yesterday in surveying the reunion crowd.

They had come from Austin, San Angelo, Robstown, San Antonio, Houston, Temple, Dallas, and other Texas cities and towns.

The Rev. Alvin Bohls had brought his family all the way from Sioux City, Iowa.

They registered at a table beneath a hackberry tree, and went about the crowd introducing themselves to those they didn't know.

Ten lambs and a calf had been barbecued for the occasion. All the other "fixings" of an old-fashioned picnic were in abundance.

Only formality of the day was a brief memorial service for the family's dead of the past year and the three fatalities of World War II.

City Considered For Convention Of Phone Workers

Big Spring is one of five cities under consideration as site for a convention of Southwestern Bell Telephone union workers in Texas, W. D. Berry, chairman of the telephone workers local here, announced Saturday.

Officials requested information concerning hotel facilities here last week, Berry said, and they have been notified that adequate accommodations will be available.

About 300 delegates are expected to attend the convention.

Also being considered at present are Abilene, Waco, Temple and Wichita Falls. This does not necessarily mean that one of the five cities now under consideration will be named, Berry said, but present indications are that selection will be made from that group.

The convention is to be held late in August, with definite date yet to be announced.

Truman Confident Of Peace Treaty To End War Soon

GETTYSBURG, Pa., July 6 (AP) President Truman, filled with optimism over prospects for agreement on the European peace treaties, expressed a hope today for a united world pursuing the paths of eternal peace.

Conditions in the world as the aftermath of history's greatest war are much like those which beset this nation after the war between the states, he declared, and this knowledge can be a tremendous help in building the forces of peace.

The newsmen asked him about his transatlantic telephone conversation yesterday with Secretary of State Byrnes in which he was told of the four-power foreign minister agreement to start a general treaty writing conference in Paris July 29.

It looks very much like we are going to get a peace treaty one of these days, he said, and his whole countenance brightened.

The president and Mrs. Truman drove here from "Shangri-La," the presidential retreat in the Catskill mountains where they have been spending the long Fourth of July weekend.

Absentee Voting To Open Monday

Absentee balloting for the July 27 Democratic primaries will get underway Monday at the county clerk's office and continue through July 23.

Eligible voters can apply for absentee ballots if they have a physical disability, can produce an affidavit showing illness or are to be absent from the county on election day.

Application for the ballots can be made either in person or through the mail. Written applications will be accompanied by the voter's poll tax receipt, or exemption certificate.

The ballots will be retained by the county clerk's office until three days before election, then turned over to the county judge and will be tabulated at 2 p. m. on the day of the election.

Several hundred voters are expected to make applications for the absentee voting privilege here this year.

Texas Oil Man Killed In Fight With Police

CENTRALIA, Ill., July 6 (AP)—A Texas oil promoter was killed and an elderly policeman was wounded fatally when the Texan's resistance to arrest following an argument with a woman precipitated a swift exchange of close-quarter gunfire in a Centralia hotel early today.

The dead policeman's partner, who was wounded in the affray, was in serious condition.

Centralia's chief of police, Orville T. Bounds, gave this version: Policemen William Vaughn, 68,

and Welmas Owens, 38, were summoned to the hotel to stop Otis H. Gibson, 49, Waco, Tex., oil man, from allegedly beating Thelma McGee in the Texan's hotel room. The police returned to the lobby but were called back by the woman, who said Gibson had followed her to another room and was trying to force an entry.

Vaughn and Owens then took Gibson into custody and a struggle ensued in the dim hotel corridor.

Gibson brandished a tiny weapon, later identified as a .22 caliber pistol, and fired. The first shot pierced Vaughn's stomach and the second Owens' lung. Owens then fired two shots point blank into Gibson's chest. One slug pierced his heart.

Miss Lola Wright, 31, hotel manager, an eye witness to the affray, said Gibson fired first and that "at least three or four shots came almost at once."

Chief Bounds attributed Gibson's altercation with Mrs. McGee as "jealousy."

Dr. E. F. Stephens said Owens was being given transfusions and that "he has a 50-50 chance of survival."

US, Britain End Blacklisting Foreign Firms

WASHINGTON, July 6 (AP)—The United States and Britain have agreed to discontinue their blacklists of thousands of foreign firms accused of collaborating with the Axis during the war, it was learned today. An official announcement is due Monday.

The British and American lists, covering almost exactly the same names, total approximately 5,880 foreign firms and individuals in Latin America and in the former European neutral countries. Countries which will be most directly affected by discontinuance outside this hemisphere are Spain, Portugal, Sweden, Switzerland and Turkey.

Negotiations have been under way between the state department and British foreign office for about two months to work out a method of ending the list. It had been carried on long after the war's end, both to keep some economic controls on questionable firms and to give a competitive break to those firms which had collaborated with the Allies.

The method of abandonment agreed upon, according to authoritative informants, is supposed to provide for granting licenses for American companies which from now on wish to do business with the listed foreign companies and individuals. Thus a kind of control will be maintained for a relatively short time. The treasury is to handle the licenses.

The navy has corrected itself on a recent announcement regarding enlistment of men with dependents. Latest information is that men with three or less dependents may be accepted; married men with not more than two children; men between ages of 17 and 64 may be enlisted in the inactive reserve without physical examination if they had previous service in the navy. Those enlisted with dependents will draw family allowance for duration plus six months unless the enlistment expires sooner.

Chilean Election Set

SANTIAGO, Chile, July 6 (AP)—The government today set Sept. 4 as the date for the election of a successor to President Juan Antonio Rios, who died June 27. Chile's three traditional rightist parties met today to nominate a candidate for the presidency.

Fate Of County Cotton Crop Still Uncertain

Howard county's 1946 cotton
crop still constituted the proverb-

The county's acreage is consid-
erably below average, and prospects
have all but vanished for last
minute increases.

The chief uncertainty now,
however, is the ultimate fate of
the acreage planted and coming
up. Spotted showers have im-
proved conditions in localized
areas, and some farmers who ob-
tained only part of a stand with
first and second planting have
put more seed into the ground.
The result has been stalks of
varying height in many fields.
North and northwestern parts of
the county still appear to be
hardest hit by the continued
drouth. Hall also brought consid-
erable damage to crops near the
Fairview community, but other
parts of the county escaped the
storm of a week ago.

More showers, provided they
are distributed over wider terri-
tory, in the near future will raise
hopes for a feed crop, however.
More acreage will be devoted to
grain than previously estimated,
reports this week indicate.

Erickson Demands Smith List Funds Used For Campaign

HELENA, Mont., July 6. (P) —
Leif Erickson, opposing senator
Burton K. Wheeler (D-Mont) for
the Democratic nomination as US
senator, said today he had asked
that Gerald L. K. Smith, leader
of the America First party, be

Robert B. Barker, general coun-
sel for a Senate investigating
committee, had announced ear-

Erickson said he wanted Smith
subpoenaed "that we may be giv-
en an opportunity to examine into
the extent to which his organiza-
tion and other isolationist groups
are giving financial aid to Sen-
ator Wheeler's campaign."

Senator Wheeler said earlier he
asked for the investigation be-
cause "unfair propaganda" was
being circulated against him in
the campaign for nomination in
the July 16 primary. Erickson, a
former Montana supreme court
justice, "welcomed" the investi-
gation. Wheeler seeks his fifth
term in office.

The all-American final in women's doubles saw Miss Brough and Margaret Osborne outlast Miss Betz and Doris Hart of Miami, Fla., 6-3, 2-6, 6-3, in a renewal of a long-standing feud.

The only championship that escaped the American contingent in the first Wimbledon since 1939 was the men's singles, which towering Yvon Petro of France won yesterday with a five-set victory over Geoff Brown. Americans led by Bobby Riggs made a clean sweep in '39.

Tom Brown, Miss Betz and Miss Osborne, and another Californian, Budge Patty, will fly to Sweden tomorrow to play a series of exhibitions at the invitation of that nation's King Gustav. Sweden's Davis Cup players also will participate in the exhibitions on July 9, 10 and 11.

The only final that could have been classed as an upset was the straight-set spanking administered to Pails and Geoff Brown by Kramer and Tom Brown. The Australians were seeded No. 1 against the Americans' No. 2.

The Americans concentrated on Pails all the way, hanging every return they could to his court.

The 23-year-old Tom Brown, who created something of a sensation by reaching the semi-finals of men's singles, was pleased at his two victories in doubles, but said he hoped next year to win the triple crown.

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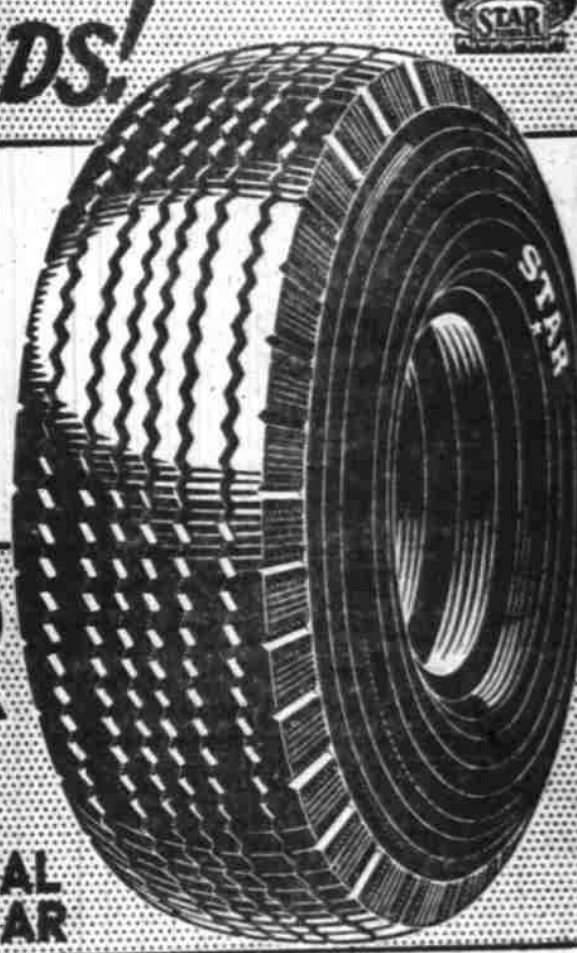
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Bristow Lowers Own Course Standard At Club With 65

Voters Listen To Political Talks But Think Radio Rationing Fair

By JOE BELDEN
Director, The Texas Poll

AUSTIN, July 6. — The voters of Texas want to listen to the political talk over the radio this summer, but they have no objections to stations limiting the number of speeches, a statewide opinion survey reveals.

More than four out of every ten people have, in fact, been tuning in to hear the candidates, The Texas Poll finds.

Dr. Homer P. Rainey, aspirant for governor, recently charged before the Federal Communications Commission, that the Texas Quality Network is violating the law by its restriction of the time it is allowing candidates on the air. The four powerful stations that make up TQN (WBAP in Fort Worth, WFAA in Dallas, KPRC in

Houston, and WOAI in San Antonio) are allowing only one speech per candidate until July 13. After that and until election day July 27, time for political broadcasts is to be prorated among all candidates.

The Texas Poll has conducted this survey to discover feeling among the voters themselves — at whom all the radio electioneering is directed. This Poll in no way attempts to prove whether the network or Dr. Rainey is right or wrong.

The figures below indicate that a majority of 64 per cent approves of the broadcasters curtailing time for political discussion.

Here are the questions interviewers put to a cross section of Texans, followed by the results obtained:

"Have you listened on the radio recently to any of the political speeches about the Texas election this summer?"

Yes 42%
No 58%

"Do you want the radio stations to which you usually listen to broadcast political speeches this summer, even if that means cutting off temporarily some of the other programs you like to hear?"

Yes 47%
No 53%

"Some of the radio stations say they will allow only a few speeches to each candidate in the Texas elections this summer. But some of the candidates say they should be allowed to buy as much time as they need on the radio to

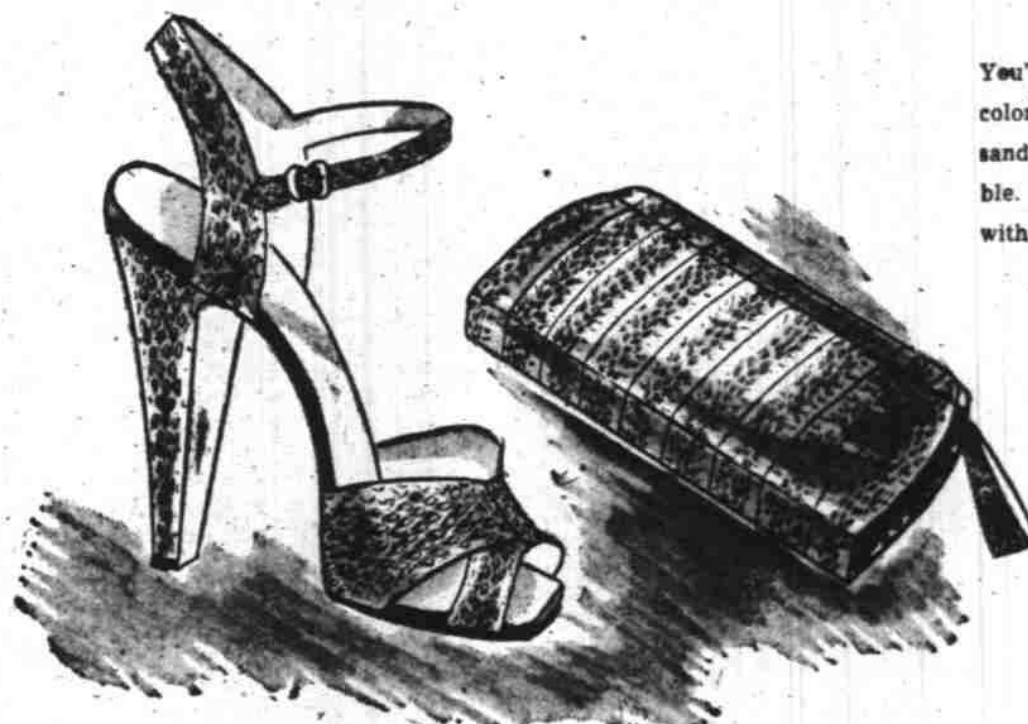

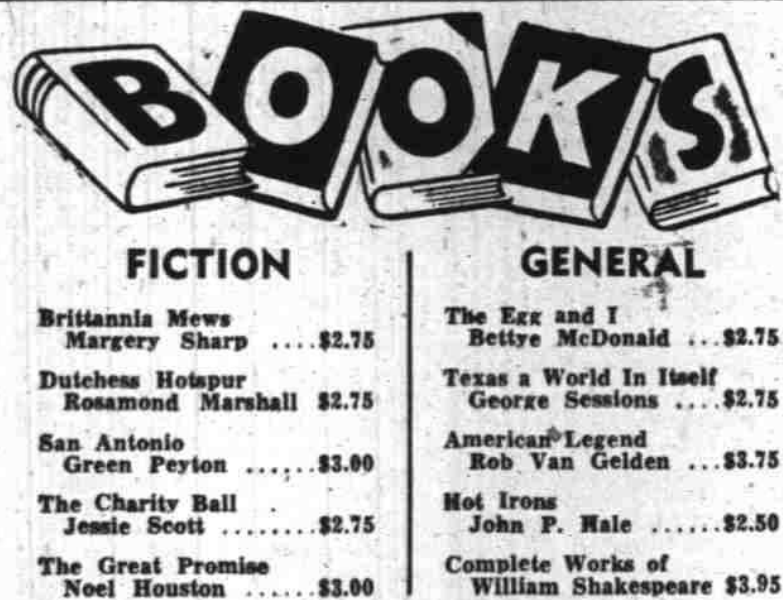

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Ford In "Desperados" Technicolored Feature At State Theatre Today

Perhaps no set of actors and no narrative of fact or fiction could take priority of attention over the technicolored grandeur of the settings provided by Mother Nature (around Kanab, Utah) for "The Desperados," a Western to be shown at the State theatre today and tomorrow.

With Glenn Ford, Randolph Scott and Claire Trevor, the picture rates praise for both on-screen and offscreen talent. If ever a picture were overwhelmed by its setting, this one is it. But this one is also, and nevertheless, a big league compounding of all the stuff of which Westerns are made.

The principals are ably supported by a fine cast in which Edgar Buchanan is outstanding. They portray characters in a Utah town of 1863, some good and some bad, related to one another circumstantially by contrasting interests in funds made available by

the Union Army's purchases of horses. There are plenty of clashes, fistfuls and armed, plus a wealth of characterization and the usual romantic competition; but it is a stampede of wild horses photographed on a vast scale in commanding color that will move the audience.

Robert Carson's screenplay, based on a story by Max Brand, utilizes the device of the sheriff who is the former pal of an outlaw wanted in another state, both of whom love the same girl. It surrounds this core of the plot with more than the usual array of secondary interests and conflicts. It interpolates more fights than is average for the distance and the Technicolor adds glamour and realism to the setting and the gore of the battles.

Week's Business—

New Residences Will Be Built; Livestock Up

Seven new residences, to be constructed at estimated costs ranging from \$3,000 to \$4,500 each, upheld the building permit average during the past week. Eight smaller projects and one small commercial contract accounted for a total of \$30,840 since the previous week's tabulation, with \$29,540 on the books for July. Late in the week permits for three residences were issued to Artie Williams. The houses are to be built in the 3000 block of Johnson street, and will cost an estimated \$4,500 each. Total building figures for the year now are \$841,531.

Warrenty deeds filed during the week involved \$52,229 in real estate, largest volume for a single week in more than a month. Total for the year is \$2,155,897.

Livestock prices advanced sharply at local markets, although prices were short of some predictions for the first week without OPA restrictions. Most cattle here sold at approximately 50 cents per cwt. above previous ceilings, but hogs were stronger, advancing as much as \$2.50 per cwt. Receipts were almost double records of the previous week.

Ordinance To Prohibit Sale Of Fireworks

A city ordinance to prohibit the sale and firing of fireworks in the corporate limits of Big Spring is to be submitted to city commissioners for action at their regular meeting Tuesday afternoon. City Manager B. J. McDaniel reported Saturday.

Complaints during the recent Independence Day activities prompted the new measure, which is being drafted over the weekend, McDaniel said. The ordinance, if passed by the commission, will make it unlawful to either sell or shoot fireworks in the city at any time, with penalties for violation.

Dan McRae Located At Patton Springs

Dan McRae, who resigned as superintendent of schools at Patton Springs, Dickson county, about 18 miles from Spout, McRae formally becomes head of the Patton Springs school system with the start of the September term.

A Record Deserving Real Support

In three short weeks, results from the first democratic primary will be tabulated. The Herald is confident that one of the turns of events will be renomination of George Mahon as congressman from this, the 19th, district.

We are not only convinced that George Mahon is deserving of the nomination, but that he is deserving of a vote of confidence that good public servants should have.

In addition, he is slated to become chairman of the Texas delegation next year, a position that commands high respect.

On top of all this, George Mahon is a high type of man and big enough and sound enough that his years in Washington have not altered him. It is a curious fact that those who have not been outspoken in support of his candidacy invariably end up with: "It would be fine if all congressmen were like him." That, from the camp of the opposition, is good and sufficient reason to give George Mahon the rousing vote on July 27 that he has so richly earned.

Bilbo Is Reelected

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Senator Bilbo's re-election in Mississippi calls for fact-finding.

Does his racial prejudice represent the thinking of white Mississippians?

He pitched his campaign on "white supremacy" and told whites to keep negroes from the polls.

This was all-out racial prejudice. He was elected. This was the third time he's been elected senator.

After his victory he said: "I made the same fight and have the same convictions that a great majority of southerners have."

Did he? Mississippians who actually voted gave him 97,000 votes to a combined vote of 93,000 for his four opponents. The total vote cast, almost entirely white, was about 190,000.

But—the majority of white Mississippians who voted for him were only a small minority of the 500,000 white people old enough to vote in Mississippi.

(About 500,000 Mississippi negroes are old enough to vote but only a handful did so in this election.)

The 97,000 votes Bilbo got was 19 1/2 per cent of the 500,000 potential white vote. His opponents' 93,000 was 18 1/2 per cent. So the total vote cast, 190,000, was only 38 per cent of the 500,000 potential vote.

So it would seem Bilbo's racial-prejudice campaign got the results he wanted.

For his prejudicial talk during his years in Washington, Bilbo has been criticized by writers and commentators, particularly northerners.

When the campaign started, some Mississippi opponents of Bilbo said in effect: "Mississippians resent the northern attacks on Bilbo. They

resent outside intrusion. It turns them toward Bilbo.

"If the outsiders would lay off, we could handle the situation here and maybe defeat him."

That, to this writer, seems a negative approach. It overlooks, or sidesteps, three main points:

1. The whole country has an interest in any senator, no matter who, since he can help or block legislation affecting the whole nation and the welfare of millions.

2. The cry—"Let us handle our own problems"—is the one always raised by southern democratic senators when they filibuster to death things like the anti-poll-tax bill.

3. It is asking people who resent Bilbo's tactics to remain quiet in the simple hope that Mississippians—if they can forget Bilbo by not hearing of him—may vote against him some time.

Racial discrimination—the issue Bilbo raised—is a very real thing in the south where Jim Crow laws and racial segregation are the law of the land.

The problem of negro voting will become more, not less, intense in the south, the more negroes try to vote.

For those outsiders and Mississippians who shudder at racial prejudice, what's the answer? It's an old problem, cutting deep, and probably will be long in solving. Better educational and economic chances for whites and negroes would help.

Truman Attends Party For Snyder

WASHINGTON. — It didn't get into the newspapers, but President Truman attended an interesting private dinner party the other night — a birthday party in honor of his new Secretary of the Treasury, John Snyder.

John was fifty years old, and his new assistant, Detroit's affable Republican Arthur Gardner, gave him a party. Vivacious Mrs. Gardner was a little nonplussed when she heard that the President of the United States was coming.

"Now we've got to have a lot of protocol," she half-protested. Also, she hadn't counted on the Secret Service. They came a day early and insisted on inspecting every corner of the Gardner home and garden. Also, they opened up the house next door belonging to Prince Pigmentelli, who was away for the summer, and the house of broker George Garrett, in order to make sure no one was lurking inside.

Delightful Mrs. Gardner, however, is a resourceful lady — in more ways than one. Her father drew up the corporation papers for Henry Ford when Ford first started making autos, and was paid in then worthless Ford stock. Mrs. Gardner's father was also smart enough to hang on to the stock.

Eighteen guests attended the dinner, including Senator Barkley, who, because of his wife's illness, seldom goes out to dinner. However, he made an exception in this case and was the first to arrive.

Thirsty Senator

Wary after a hectic day of trying to pilot price control through the Senate, Barkley suggested a drink. Polite host Gardner dined. He suggested they should not drink before the arrival of the President of the United States.

"I'll be damned if I'll wait for him," replied Truman's best friend in the Senate. "I've ranked him for years, and I'm not going to be out-ranked when it comes to a drink now."

The senator from Kentucky got his bourbon. Shortly thereafter, the President arrived. Host Gardner promptly shoved his highball behind a potted palm. Barkley did not.

"They tried to prevent me from having this drink," he remarked to the President. "But I told them I had ranked you for so many years I wasn't going to wait for you now."

Smiling, Mr. Truman agreed. Other guests included General and Mrs. Ira Baker, second highest ranking officer of the Air Force, General and Mrs. Hoyt Vandenberg, nephew of the senator from Michigan and top intelligence man for the White House; Mrs. Stuart Symington, wife of the Assistant Secretary of War and the daughter of GOP Congressman Jim Wadsworth; Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Ed Foley and wife; Mrs. A. Mitchell Palmer, widow of Woodrow Wilson's Attorney General; Arthur Krock of the New York Times, chief newspaper defendant of

John Snyder; Senate Secretary Leslie Biddle and wife, close friends of the President and from Snyder's home state — Arkansas; and Chuck Fisher, manufacturer of Fisher auto bodies, who served with Snyder on the RFC.

Presidential Toasts

Mrs. Truman was absent in Missouri. The British ambassador, only other invited guest, was also absent because of a previous engagement, but sent his personal Scotch bagpipes along with his Scotch pipe. And at an appropriate moment, the dining-room doors were thrown open and in came the piper, along with bagpipes and birthday cake.

Happy John Snyder cut his cake, passed the first piece to his good friend, Harry Truman. Toasts followed. Lifting his champagne, the new Secretary of the Treasury toasted "friendship."

"Is that why you're here, John?" jibed impish Mrs. Palmer, doubtless referring to the way Truman rewards his friends.

Senator Barkley toasted the many years he and Truman had spent together. Later, the conversation got around to Comptroller General Lindsay Warren's sensational charges that the Reconstruction Finance Corporation had not kept proper books.

"When is the Senate going to investigate you, John?" Senator Barkley asked the former chief of the RFC. "I don't want to miss it."

"I'm going to testify right after Jesse Jones," shot back Snyder. The President said very little. He seemed worried, grim, and unhappy. His chief remark of the evening came when Barkley started to tell a story.

"I've heard that one before," dryly remarked the President of the United States.

It was midnight when the President went home. At 3 a. m., 50-year-old John Snyder departed to catch a few hours sleep before beginning the day's work as Secretary of the Treasury.

Capital Chaff

Official State Department broadcasts to Russia in the Russian language will begin just as soon as the necessary staffs have completed their training. . . . One of John Snyder's first acts as Secretary of the Treasury was to agree to the release of gold to Argentina. This gold was seized by the US government at the start of the war. Its release is a major

victory for President Peron. . . . President Truman has decided to abandon his plans for an Alaska vacation this summer. Instead, he will make several political swings around the country, speaking in behalf of Democratic candidates whose elections are in doubt. . . . Presidential court jester George Allen is ill with a painful case of neuritis. . . . Montana's liberal Senator Jim Murray is furious with Wisconsin's Senator Bob La Follette, for the support he has given Senator Burt Wheeler for re-election in Montana. One of Murray's greatest hopes is to see Wheeler defeated. Murray now thinks La Follette's isolationist ties to Wheeler are stronger than his liberal domestic ties to Murray, and Murray may decide to mix into the Wisconsin picture to try to defeat La Follette in the Republican primary next month. . . . The American Theaters Association, despite its pledge to help the government in the post-war period, refused to sponsor an Army film "Seeds of Destiny." The picture shows famine conditions and the need for saving food. "Too gruesome" for the American public, said the theater men. Maybe the trouble is that European women can't get enough food to look like Betty Grable. . . . Postmaster General Bob Hannegan has planned his junket to the Pacific so he will arrive at Nuremberg in time to hear the final verdict at the Nuremberg war criminals' trials.

Valiant Try At Thankless Job

"In carrying out my responsibilities, it has been necessary for me to say 'no' one hundred times for every occasion on which it was possible to say 'yes.' I have been forced to step on many important toes."

So wrote Chester Bowles in his letter of resignation as director of the Office of Economic Stabilization. Bowles was no longer the immediate boss of price controls, but it was in that work that he incurred the displeasure of so many people by saying "no," and it was in that work that he stepped on so many important toes. He had recommended that the President veto the stripped-down version of OPA, and to remove the personal equation—many people said congress was madder at Bowles than at price controls, because he had stood up to it—he resigned.

Directing OPA was necessarily a thankless task from the beginning. Mr. Bowles realized that fact when he took on the job. Wealthy in his own right, thanks to a brilliant business career, he had assumed the unenviable task as a patriotic duty. It should be said to his credit that he stood to his guns. Maligned as all men in such positions must expect to be, he fought back with every ounce of his strength to the very end. He got the blame for everything—all the mistakes of his subordinates, all the wrong decisions, all the thousand and one petty annoyances inseparable from the task of saying "no" to important people with tender toes.

And yet we believe most fair-minded men, taking sober second thought, would agree that price controls were necessary and that in spite of obvious inequities and inabilities in its administration, the agency did a good over-all job of stabilizing prices.

Some of its bitterest foes may live to regret that OPA was done to death just at the time its services might have been most useful in holding back inflation.

But we are not here concerned with OPA as such. We are concerned with what somebody has called the ingratitude of republicans.

The reward of courageous and faithful performance of duty in such a job is calumny, imprecation, abuse, invective and slander. The man who holds an appointive office saddled with unpleasant duties is a shining mark for the vengeance of those he angers. An elective official can go to the people and place his case before them for a verdict. The appointive official has no such recourse. He automatically becomes that hated and derided functionary, a bureaucrat, fair game for any and all sharpshooters.

Weak men give in, and do the bidding of impudent special pleaders. If he is strong and resists all temptation and intimidation, and performs his duties fearlessly, impartially, and uncompromisingly, his reward is abuse and slander. He is alternately depicted as a scheming rascal, bent on aggrandizing himself, and a congenial halfwit with insufficient sense to come in out of the rain.

No wonder it becomes increasingly difficult to find good and able men to fill unpopular offices. Nobody except a man actuated by a genuine desire for public service would consider it. The result is that the appointive power must take what it can get in the marketplace, and all too often the choice is an incompetent hack looking for a meal ticket.

Whatever else he may have been, Chester Bowles was not that type. It seems only decent to give him credit for a valiant try, and to wish him peace and contentment in his retirement.

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Fraulein Wants A Man-- Especially US Soldier

(This is one of a series of columns written for Hal Boyle by representative Germans, expressing their own unencensored views of their nation's future. Today a middle-class fraulein tells of her problems in the occupied Reich.)

BERLIN, (AP) — I am a fraulein 23 years old, fairly good looking, and still with high hopes in my mind -- because I hope this world will someday come to an understanding.

Trouble nowadays consists of two different groups. We are, as German girls, involved with the problem of national hardship and the fear of what will become of our country in the future. Besides that political problem, we have our own little girl problems starting with "fraternization" -- whether or not to have an American boy friend -- and ending with your very same trouble: Is there no way to get a pair of stockings? But there is this difference: We don't worry about nylon. They are nothing but a fairy tale to us anyway.

I have a deep, deep feeling for my country. For all the bad things which were done under Hitler it is still the nation of Luther, Kant, Beethoven, Bach, Duerer and Wagner.

Politically, I don't see much difference between the British and the Americans in their attitude toward Germany.

I don't understand their policy and I don't agree with their future plans for Germany. Why do they keep us at war after one year of Allied victory? What is the use of talking so much about "democracy" and reconstruction if there is not the principal basis for it: peace. I feel they should not restrict us too much. Let Germany start running again -- have its industries working again first -- and then take the reparations you and other countries desire.

I am just in the marriage age. I wonder whether I will ever find the right husband. From the newspapers I learn that there are seven girls to every man in Berlin. I certainly don't want to share my boy friend or future husband with six other girls.

Generally speaking, I am very much in favor of American-Ger-

man marriages. I consider this a very lucky situation for the poor girls who otherwise would have to stay single all their lives.

I would marry an American. I feel I am marrying the man and not his nationality. If I love him I don't care what nation he belongs to, and I will follow him wherever he has to go.

I like to have dates, meet nice people, do a bit of flirting, throw a big party. I like an opera performance, a piano concert, a horseback ride in the morning, a golf game or a boat sail.

But very few of us can realize this, unless we have a friend in the occupation army. Many people watch German girls accompanied by an American with bitter ideas in their heads, but I cannot blame anybody or even myself for catching a little bit of this sunny side of the street.

I hate to run around improperly dressed in shabby shoes and wornout clothes. If there is no other way I even go to the black market.

When you go shopping, you meet all the daily problems combined. You have to take egg powder instead of meat and when you ask for your sugar ration you have to take crackers because they don't have sugar. You pass up the vegetable store because the queue there is so long you decide you would lose more calories standing in line than you get from the vegetables.

The family sits together in the evening discussing the project of selling a carpet or trading a china set for food.

I hate to see my mother as skin-needy as she is. She loves it if I bring her home some candy or a pack of powdered milk. But she would never want me to accept anything which is something else than a gift.

She needn't worry though. I have American friends, I have German friends, I know British and French people.

They treat me as a lady -- not as a Kraut. I am very grateful toward my American friends because they make me forget my daily troubles for a little while. They have made me curious about the States.

One thing I know -- I will go there and see the country and the people as soon as I have a chance. I wish also many Americans would have the desire to come here and find out that there is also something nice about our country.

Farm And Ranch News

By WACIL McNAIR

Although it is generally conceded that there is no such thing as unusual weather in West Texas, there have been a few instances recently which produced something other than routine. The spotted hail storm June 29 is one, and now farmers in various sections of the county find moisture conditions equally erratic. For example, Leland Wallace was in town Friday, taking a brief breathing spell from the farm, all because it was either too wet or too dry. Land south of his house was too dry to plant and to the north water was standing in the furrows on about 100 acres. About an inch of rain fell on the small strip in 15 minutes Tuesday, and a network of terraces caught practically all of the water from the brief downpour. Although the other land was dry, Wallace did plant a strip of sudan on the possibility that another centralized shower might bring it up. Of about 400 acres he is cultivating, 100 are in cotton and the remainder in feed, most of it potentially, however. The cotton ranges from some just breaking the ground to small spots already in bloom.

Big Spring's first week of livestock selling without OPA restrictions did not bring a real skyrocket in prices, although the market here was considerably stronger than at any other time this year. It did bring more cattle to market, however, after a season's low in receipts was marked up during the previous week.

A Texas Holstein cow has produced 20,701.8 pounds of milk and 777.1 pounds of butterfat—equal to 932 pounds of butter in 303 days to set a new state record for her breed. The cow is Lelaico Corona Starlight of Neale Farms, Waco. She finished out her 330-day lactation period with a total production of 21,785 pounds of milk and 825 pounds of butterfat. She was milked three times a day and her milk tested 3.8 percent fat. The record was set almost entirely on home-grown feeds, with cottonseed meal and bran the only items purchased commercially. The big part of the ration was corn, oats and alfalfa and Johnson grass hay. Good pasture was available in season and silage was fed the year round.

Prune shrubs now or wait until next year, says Sadie Hatfield, landscape gardening specialist of the extension service. Shrubs should not be pruned after mid-July, she points out. Cutting back shrubs in summer tends to hold back growth of limbs, twigs, and leaves and aids the plant to form a crop of fruit or flowers next spring. Plants also may be fertilized after pruning, but fertilizing later in the summer develops new growth which may be frost-bitten before it hardens. Late pruning may do the same thing.

First Sunday Singers Will Convene Today

Fourth meeting of the First Sunday singing convention will be held at 2 o'clock this afternoon at the Wesley Methodist church at 12th and Owens streets. Several quartets, including four girls from Midland and two units from Lamesa, are expected to provide special music. J. G. Kendrick, president of the convention, will probably lead most of the group singing in old, familiar hymns. The public is invited to attend.

Davis' Administration Often Called Carnival Of Crime And Corruption

(This is the twelfth in a series of articles based on the lives of governors of Texas.)

AUSTIN. — If a state could blush, the entire expanse of Texas would turn a bright crimson at the memory of the Edmund J. Davis administration.

Davis was the twelfth governor of Texas — from 1870 until 1874, and the people of Texas had very little to say about it.

When Congress took the reins of Reconstruction away from President Johnson and instituted "Congressional Reconstruction" in Texas, one of the first Congressional acts was to put the Military back in control. And as soon as the Military, headed by General Phil Sheridan, got control in 1867, one of the first acts was to remove Governor James W. Throckmorton as governor for being an "impediment to Reconstruction."

To fill Throckmorton's place, Sheridan appointed the man who had been the fourth and one of the most popular governors of Texas, Elisha M. Pease — to be provisional governor. Pease took the job and plunked, along with Congress, for the disfranchisement of all who had been affiliated with the Confederacy. That was the end of Pease's popularity. Finally, in September of 1870, Pease did an about face and got fed-up with the military despotism in Texas and resigned.

For three and a half months, until Davis took over, Texas had no civil government other than an adjutant in charge of civil affairs.

Davis had beaten Andrew J. Hamilton, Texas' tenth governor, appointed by Washington, in an election which no one believed fair. Accusations of fraud and intimidation were tossed at the military leaders in Texas and at the Republicans conducting the election. Davis won over Hamilton by a vote of 39,901 to 39,092 but history says that Hamilton won but was counted out.

Davis took office on Jan. 18, 1870, acting in a provisional capacity since actually the Military still ruled Texas. It wasn't until April 2, 1870, that Davis became governor in fact and then he did so by proclaiming himself governor. That was the date that President Grant signed the bill restoring Texas to her rights as a sovereign State of the Union. Under the new constitution, adopted in

1869, Davis' term was for four years.

In his inaugural address, Davis was boastful and arrogant. He called the admission of Texas back into the Union the "second Annexation of Texas" and added, "but a different Texas from that of 1845 with its thousands of slaves; now no bondmen trod her soil."

On Davis' ledger of public service, one act should go in the meritorious column. He favored a better school system for Texas and recommended the establishment of a public free school system.

From there on, however, Davis became an arrogant dictator. The Legislature came running at his beck and call. Under Davis, Texas had more dictatorial rule than it ever experienced while occupied by Federal soldiers. Davis set his military regime by forming two different forces. He had State Guards and Military Reserves, the latter being all persons subject to military duty who weren't already in the State Guard.

When Davis wanted to, he had

the power to declare martial law in any Texas county and suspend the laws of that county. And what's more, Davis ruled that the counties placed under martial law had to pay by assessments for their occupation by State Guards.

Governor Davis also had a personal guard which he called his State Police — or the 1870 Texas version of Germany's Elite Guards. The State Police consisted of 48 officers and 246 privates and most of them were negroes, ex-convicts, desperadoes and derelicts from the Federal Army. They made trouble wherever they went and made arrests at their pleasure. County officers, by law, were forced to cooperate with them.

Historians estimate that Davis appointed at least 9,500 persons to places of honor and trust during his administration.

The only way to describe the Davis regime is to say that it was a carnival of crime and corruption and that's exactly the way one Texas history book describes it. A corrupt legislature plundered the treasury, squandered public lands, officials openly sold

Northwest Test Below 2,400 Ft.

Decision on a northwest Howard county wildcat, the Dave Duncan No. 1 B. M. Newton, was expected within a week as operator made progress during the past week.

Saturday the test was down to 2,400 feet in broken formation and with the rotary rig. It was probable that contract depth of 3,200 feet would be reached in a few days. Schools Apply For Lunchroom Subsidy

Application has been made for aid on the school lunchroom project here, W. C. Blankenship, superintendent, said Saturday.

This is dependent upon two factors, namely, granting of the federal aid by the state department of education and of inclusion of funds in the local budget for the project. The board has indicated an appropriation of \$8,000 for the lunchroom, located at the high school but serving the junior high and Central Ward schools as well, subject to the public budget hearing.

Extent of aid is not known, but it may be nine cents per meal plus surplus commodities.

Quad Calves Popular
