

Bullock Announces Tax Assistance

State Comptroller Bob Bullock announced he is sending a representative from his Plainview office to Dimmitt Tuesday, March 13 to assist local taxpayers and answer questions about state taxes.

Bullock said Enforcement Officer Benito Rocha will meet with local taxpayers at the Castro County Courthouse from 10 a.m. to 12 noon.

"If Dimmitt-area merchants, or anyone else for that matter, have any questions about state taxes or need help in preparing tax forms, Rocha will be there to assist them" Bullock said.

"We're trying to cut the red tape in this office and we believe these face-to-face sessions with taxpayers help do just that," Bullock added.

Bullock reminded those taxpayers who are unable to meet with his representative

March 13 that they can still get their questions answered quickly by calling his toll-free tax information number in Austin. That number is 1-800-252-5555.

The Plainview/Lubbock office, headed by Vance A. Morfiro, serves Lubbock and surrounding counties.

Local youth did not fare as well as in some years past in competition in the Houston Livestock Show.

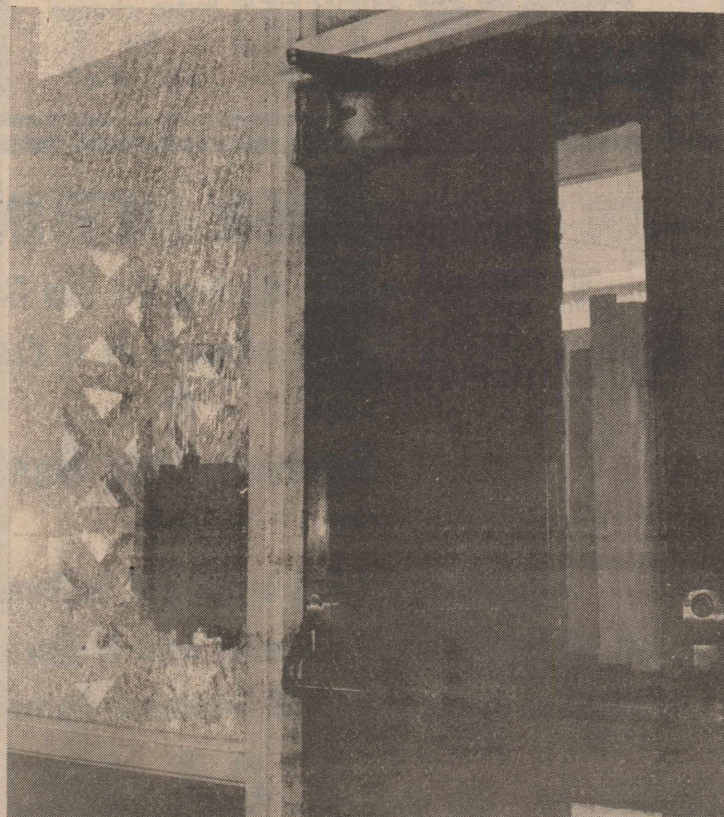

OVEN CARAMEL CORN
8 or 9 qts corn (popped)
2 c brown sugar
1 c margarine
1 t salt

1/2 c white syrup
1 t burnt sugar flavoring or vanilla

1/2 t soda

Boil all ingredients except corn and soda 5 minutes, mixing well and stirring occasionally. Remove from heat and add soda. Stir in quickly. Pour over popped corn, mixing well. Put in 2 large flat pans and place in 250° F oven for 30 minutes, stirring 2 or 3 times. Store in tightly closed container.

PEANUT BRITTLE

1 c sugar
1/2 c white Karo syrup
1/4 c water
1 3/4 c raw peanuts
1 t soda

Bring sugar, syrup and water to a boil. Add peanuts. Cook until light amber color. Remove from stove. Add soda. Stir fast. Pour out onto well-greased cookie sheet while mixture is still foamy. When cool, break into pieces.

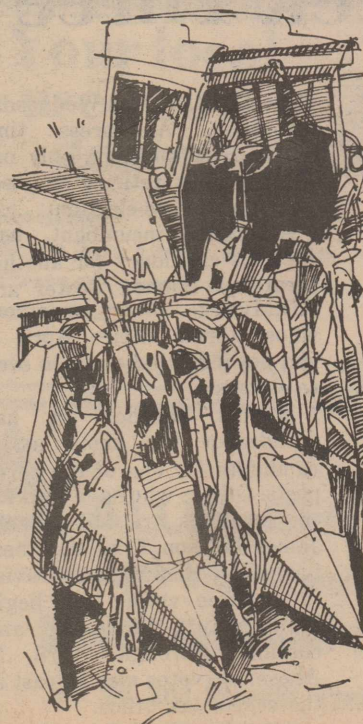
FROZEN CAKE ROLL

4 eggs yolks
1/4 c sugar
1/2 t vanilla
4 egg whites
1/2 c sugar
3/4 c sifted flour
1 t baking powder
1/4 t salt

Beat egg yolks till thick and lemon colored; gradually beat in 1/4 c sugar. Add vanilla. Beat egg whites till soft peak forms. Fold yolks into whites. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Fold into egg mixture. Spread batter evenly in greased, waxed paper lined 15 1/2 x 10 1/2 x 1 cookie sheet. Bake for 12 minutes or until done at 375°. Turn out on towel sprinkled with sifted powdered sugar. Peel off paper. Trim crust off sides. Roll cake and towel together and cool. When cool, unroll and remove towel. Stir 1 qt ice cream until soft. Spread on cake and roll up. Wrap in waxed paper and freeze. Slice and serve. Fruit filling or jelly can be used instead of ice cream.

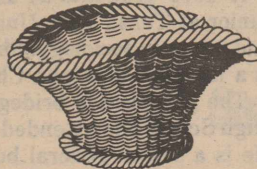

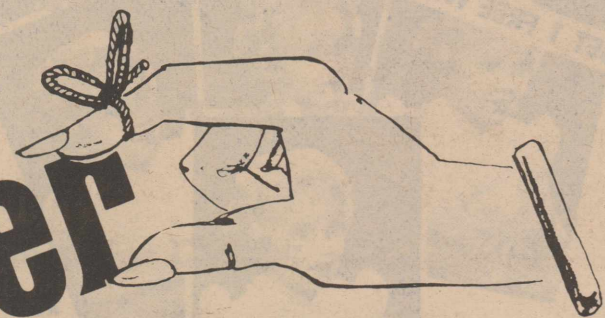

Mrs. Brookshire died Thursday morning.

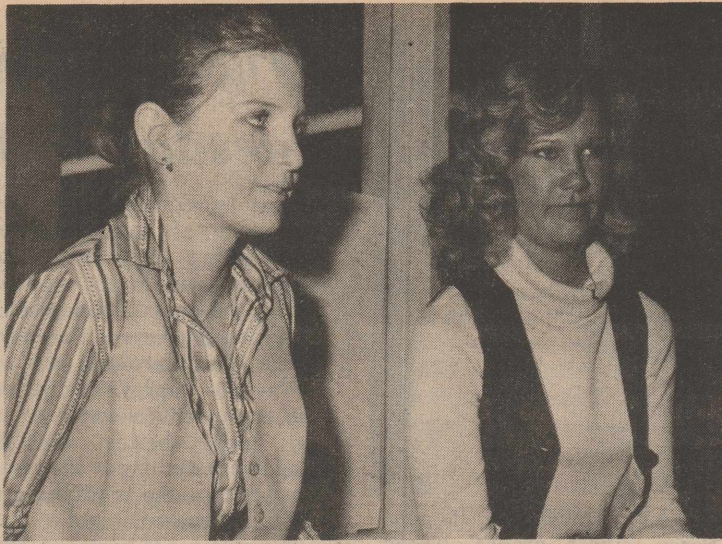

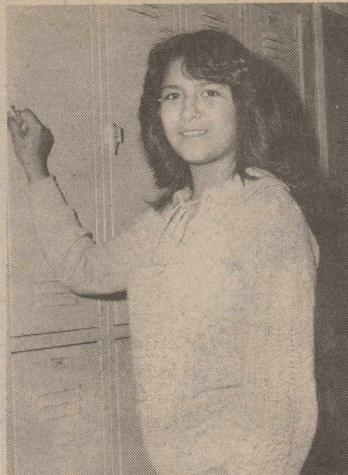

Irrigation Conference Set Tuesday In Hereford

Area agricultural producers will take a hard look at skyrocketing irrigation costs and plummeting water supplies during the annual High Plains Irrigation Conference Tuesday, March 13 in Hereford.

Ways to improve irrigation efficiency, reduce water costs and make better use of available water and at the same time improve the profit margin will be discussed.

The conference begins at 9:30 a.m. in the Community Center, 100 Ave. C at Park Avenue. It is sponsored by Deaf Smith County Water Association, Texas Agricultural Extension

Service, Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce and the Panhandle Economic Program.

Current water policies and prospects for importing water will be discussed by Duncan Ellison, executive director of Water, Inc., Lubbock. Dr. Ray Sammons, Extension area economist-management, will help the producers examine whether or not they can afford to irrigate.

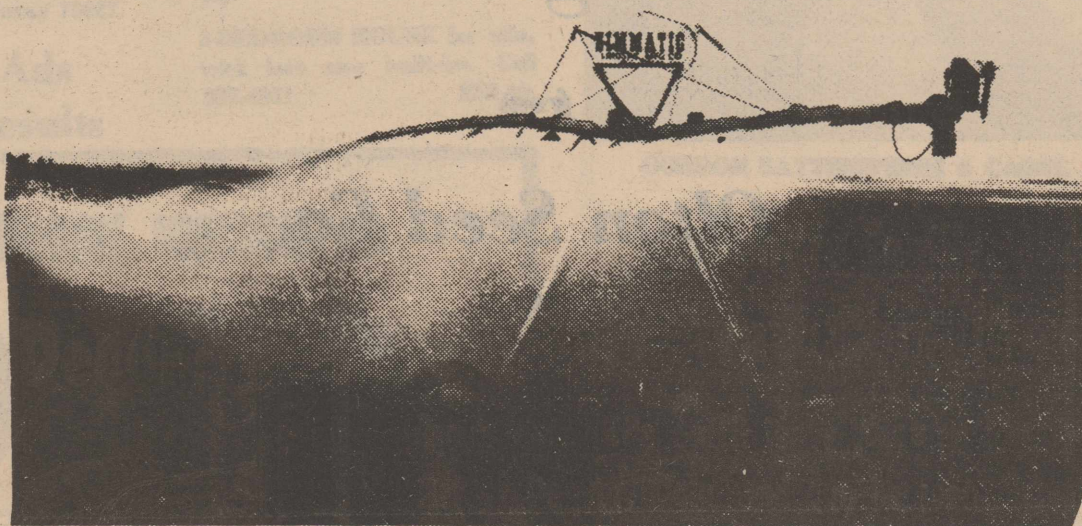
Irrigating wide beds and alternate furrows will be explained by Dr. John Stone, professor of agronomy at Oklahoma State University, Stillwater, Okla.

A luncheon will be provided by the Deaf Smith County Water Association. Dr. Ron Thomason, acting dean of the School of Agriculture at West Texas State University, Canyon, will be luncheon speaker.

Research being conducted in irrigation management will be outlined by Dr. Bill Lyle, research agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Halfway.

Effective use of center pivot sprinklers will be discussed by Leon New, Extension area agricultural engineer-irrigation, Lubbock. Ray Roberts, technical representative for Johnson Screens, Round Rock, will discuss procedures that permit wells to provide water on demand.

Moderators for the conference will be Charles Schlabs, Hereford grower and chairman of the Deaf Smith County Water Association, and Justin McBride, county Extension agent.

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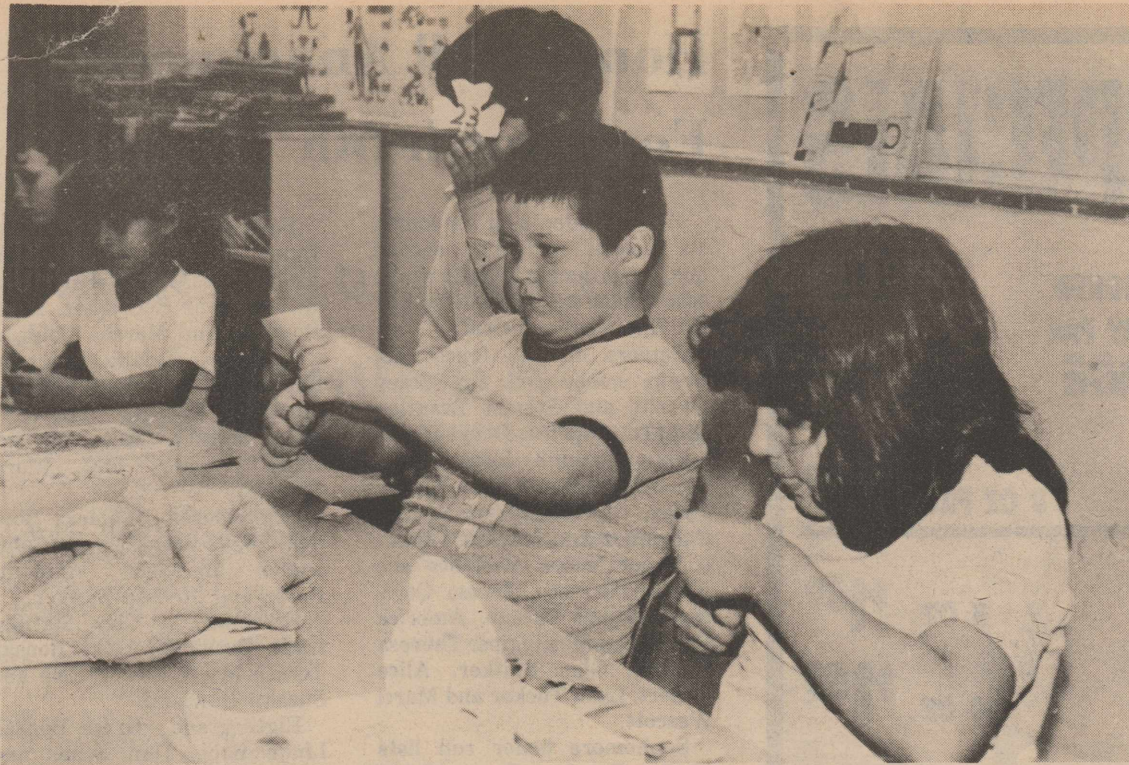

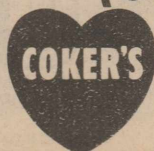
