Holmes, attorney for this judicial district who has been in the district for 13 years, has completed a reward of \$1,000 to assist in the apprehension and conviction of the slayer, to be added to the rewards over the state. A number of years Holmes served the people of this and other counties and was a popular official. State Ranger and other state officials, as well as county officials over the Panhandle, have been working on the case as yet no arrests have been made. According to late news reports a special officer is making a search for the slayer. Dan Moody will take his own case as to whether or not the city should be put under rule.

Injured In Car Wreck

County Attorney and Mrs. J. M. Bull Injured in Wreck Near Arnett, Okla.

Mrs. J. M. Bull is in the Shattuck Hospital as a result of injuries received in a wreck last Sunday afternoon when the Bull car collided with an automobile driven by E. J. Lee, Hume, Mo., near Arnett, Oklahoma. Mr. and Mrs. Bull, with their grand-daughter, little Miss Elsie Bull, were returning from Enid, Oklahoma, where they had visited with relatives.

From reports of the accident, Mr. Lee was an inexperienced driver and in some manner, his car got out of control and was across the road directly in front of the Bull car, thus making an unavoidable collision. Mrs. Bull received severe injuries. She was taken to the Shattuck Hospital where she is still a patient. Mr. Bull was bruised and considerably cut up but he was able to come to Perryton the fore part of the week. The Bull car was a wreck. In the Hume car, only one occupant was injured very much. She was a sister of the driver.

LUCK WINS FOR RANGER ELEVEN

RECOVERED FUMBLE BEHIND HOOKER GOAL LINE IS ONLY SCORE: WIN 7 TO 0

A lucky break was the deciding factor in the Hooker-Ranger game played on the Ranger field last Friday afternoon as the grid seasons opener. Schollenbarger, Ranger end, recovering a fumble behind the Hooker goal line in the first two minutes of play, Lee Tucker kicking goal. The remainder of the game was scoreless, the Rangers winning by the 7 to 0 count.

Bruner kicked off for the Rangers, with the wind and the ball was downed on Hooker's 2-yard line. On the first play, an end run, a Hooker back fumbled the ball. Schollenbarger recovering for the lone touchdown.

Although it was a lucky play that won for the Rangers, they showed up to be the better team in the game that followed. Repeatedly they advanced the ball with striking distance, only to be held for downs. Practically the entire game was played in Hooker territory.

The line-up for the starting of the game follows:

A number of substitutions were made by the Rangers. Withers going in for Skeen early in the second quarter, and Coffee for Brewer a few minutes later, both players being retired because of injuries. At the half, Murphy was substituted for Withers and several shifts were made in positions. In the final quarter Hamker was put in for Williams and near the close of the quarter Brewer was sent in again for Hamker.

The game was not spectacular but was featured by many flashy bits of football, the Rangers showing promise of developing into a formidable grid team with a few weeks of hard workout under Coach E. E. Shupe.

Many members of the team played their first game Friday, and much promising material was found. The summaries of the game disclose some odd results. The Rangers made seven first downs while Hooker counted only three. However the Rangers were held for downs seven times and Hooker but one. Hooker on the other hand punting eight times and the Rangers but three. The Rangers intercepted two passes.

DELEGATES TO C-C MEETING

PERRYTON TO BE REPRESENTED AT W. T. C. OF C. CONVENTION AT SHAMROCK

Perryton will send a good delegation to the district convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce at Shamrock, October 3. A good program is being planned, with some vital problems to come up at the convention, and a big barbecue featured at noon, according to Guy Hill, manager of the Chamber of Commerce at that place. The local delegation will go by automobile over Highway No. 4 which runs from Perryton through Shamrock, and will return the same day.

At a conference held at Shamrock last week Andy Bourland, president-manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and Grady Shipp, his assistant and members of the local committee, final arrangements were completed for the convention.

A constructive program has been arranged for the day of which Senator C. C. Small, Wellington, will be the principal speaker. His topic will cover the "Small Land Bill" which is of vital importance to the Panhandle. Other speakers of equal importance include Andy Bourland and Victor Grima of the Texas Air Transport, Port Worth, who will talk on modern aviation.

Three bands will be in attendance at the convention, Wellington, McLean and Shamrock. A parade will be held in the morning and just prior to the opening of the morning business session there will be a massed band concert. At noon there will be an old fashioned West Texas barbecue with all the trimmings and another band concert. The barbecue will be served by the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Because of the recent unrest in the Panhandle concerning the future of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce it is believed there will be one of the largest gatherings ever to attend a district convention here that day.

There will be no charge for registration of delegates.

HIGHWAY MEN VISIT IN CITY

STATE HIGHWAY OFFICIALS VISIT IN PERRYTON ON FIRST OF WEEK ON BUSINESS

Gibb Gilchrist, state highway engineer, Austin, A. P. Rollins, highway engineer, Dallas, and W. A. French division engineer, Amarillo, were in Perryton Sunday and Monday of this week conferring with Chamber of Commerce officials and looking after highway matters in this section.

An informal meeting was held Sunday evening, attended by the three state highway representatives as well as a number of local citizens. Some of those present were R. T. Shindler, Jas. W. Wilson, W. B. Irvin, W. B. LaMaster, R. L. Keith, Dave Shanks and C. W. Callaway.

According to Mr. Gilchrist, the City of Perryton has granted the highway department a ten year lease on the northwest corner of the city property south of town and a warehouse will be built in the near future for the storage of tools and building materials. It is also on their program to place a resident engineer in Perryton in the near future to oversee work in this district.

At present the highway department is working on the survey of Highway No. 117 between Perryton and Booker. The route between Spearman and Perryton has been surveyed.

Judge Geo. M. Perry is in Oklahoma City this week meeting with the state highway department of that state in regard to a connection with No. 117 at the east end of Lipscomb county, extending the road.

During the past few months, Schack has made quite a name for himself as a runner. He won first in a foot race up Cheyenne mountain at Colorado Springs, recently, making a five mile climb in forty-five minutes. He also won third out of a group of two hundred, fifty runners in a marathon from New York City to the tip of Long Island, beaten only by two other Indian runners.

According to the rules of the race to be staged in Perryton, Saturday afternoon, neither horse nor runner will be allowed to stop but must continue running over the entire course.

EXHIBITS ARE TAKEN TO FAIR

LIKE SHARPE PLACES WITH ALL FOUR ENTRIES IN TRI-STATE FAIR, AMARILLO

Ike Sharpe, truck farmer of Perryton is building up quite a record with his fine vegetables and is proving that prize vegetables can be grown here without the aid of irrigation. Mr. Sharpe and his son had four entries in the Tri-State fair at Amarillo in the vegetable class and won first and second on cantaloupes, first on onions, and second on cabbage.

The cantaloupe prize is all the more remarkable because of the fact that Mr. Sharpe raised a real Irish potato crop this year on the same ground that produced the cantaloupes. He furnished many of the fresh vegetables for the Wonder District exhibit at Hutchinson and Dodge City, Kansas fairs, and will probably have a number of entries in the Texas county and Panhandle fair at Guymon, Okla.

Mr. Sharpe has between four and five acres in vegetables and finds a ready market in Perryton for his stuff. He finds that most of the vegetables do as well one year after another, without irrigation as with the water. His truck patch will make him more money than the rest of his twenty acres that is in cane.

Guymon Sells Water

Municipal Water Plant Is Sold To Texas-Louisiana By Ten to One Majority Vote

An election was held in Guymon on Tuesday, September 17, to determine whether that city should sell its municipally owned water works system to the Texas-Louisiana company for the sum of \$50,000. In the election, 270 votes were polled, there being 245 votes for and 25 against the proposition. About the same condition confronted the people of Guymon as confronted the people of Spearman in the sale of the water works, yet Spearman turned down the proposition by a big majority. Both the plant at Guymon and the one here is run-down, and must be repaired and added to at once. This will require considerable money. The people of Guymon decided that they would let this big company furnish the money and do this repairing. In other words, after about fifteen years of municipally owned water works, Guymon decided almost unanimously that the idea is all wrong. Now that the Texas-Louisiana company own the property, it will go on the tax rolls for taxation and will help build Guymon instead of pulling her backward. The Spearman water plant is growing old, and caused much trouble during the hottest part of the summer, when water is needed most. Just how the money to make necessary improvements is to be provided has not been decided. But the money must come from some source. Spearman must have water.—Spearman Reporter.

LOSES HAND IN GUN ACCIDENT

KENNETH MOUNTS HAS LEFT HAND AMPUTATED AFTER ACCIDENTAL GUN SHOT WOUND

Kenneth Mounts, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Mounts, of the Union neighborhood, and a student in the Perryton high school, had his left hand amputated last Saturday afternoon, after it had practically been shot off by the accidental discharge of a small shotgun.

Kenneth was drilling wheat Saturday and had taken his 410 gauge shotgun to the field with him to kill rabbits. He had shot and killed one rabbit and had reloaded his gun when in some manner the gun slipped out of his hands and was discharged the full load hitting his left wrist shattering both bones. He was brought to the offices of Drs. May and Travis where the operation was performed.

The many friends of this young man will be glad to know that his condition is improving. Kenneth was an all round athlete and was a promising candidate for a place on the Perryton football team.

CORN AND ALFALFA LEAD AS CROPS FOR DAIRYING

Corn, alfalfa, and pasture grass have proved to be the most profitable crops grown on the dairy experiment farm operated at Beltsville, Md., by the United States Department of Agriculture. The Bureau of Dairy Industry uses a 6-year rotation, three years alfalfa and three years corn. The pasture is comparatively permanent and does not enter into the rotation except at intervals.

T. E. Woodward, in outlining the rotation, says: "In changing from corn to alfalfa the ground is manured in the fall after the corn is removed for silage. The land is then plowed and left in the rough to allow pulverization by freezing. The alfalfa is sown about the 1st of April and produces two small cuttings the first year.

"In changing from alfalfa to corn the first cutting of alfalfa is removed the latter part of May, the ground is plowed, and corn is planted for silage. Manure is applied for each crop of corn except the one following the alfalfa, and in summer, when it can be used on the corn or alfalfa, it is placed on the pastures. Lime is applied every six

years previous to sowing the alfalfa."

A mixture of 6 pounds of orchard grass, 4 of timothy, 3 of redtop, 4 of bluegrass, 4 of red clover, and 2 of alsike, sowed about April 1 on land that has been fall plowed and manured, provides pasture about June. If the first crop of newly sown alfalfa is weedy it is made into hay, but instead of giving it barn space it is stacked in the pasture, which is fenced so cows can eat it when pastures are short and dry.

MARKET FOR ALL FARM WASTE GOAL OF FEDERAL CHEMISTS

Such marked advances in the utilization of farm waste have been made during the past few years, according to Dr. Henry G. Knight, Chief of the Bureau of Chemistry and Soils, United States Department of Agriculture, that "we have hopes we will be able to obtain satisfactory markets for all products of the farm rather than for the half or third now considered marketable material. The hope lies in more intensive research."

"For every pound of grain harvested and sold 1 to 3 pounds of residue in the form of straw and stalks are left upon the farm to be disposed of in the best manner possible. For every pound of seed cotton sent to the gin from 1 to 2 pounds of cotton stalks are left in the field," he says.

Illustrating the increasing uses chemists are finding for the by-products of our staple crops, Doctor Knight cites the fact that fermentation industries now produce from corn alone, products which are annually valued at \$118,000,000, besides the cornstarch glucose, corn oil, and stock feed which add other millions to that figure. Even straw may now be converted into human food by a process used in Switzerland and Germany to convert wood waste into stock food.

Among definite results secured from the application of chemistry to agriculture, Doctor Knight mentions the transformation of California fruit culls which, with the help of chemists from the Department of Agriculture, were changed from an expensive waste to a highly profitable byproduct of the citrus industry. Cottonseed, formerly wasted and thrown into the streams, he says is now the basis for cottonseed cake, cottonseed oil, cattle feeds, or a total of 30 products the price for which is reflected in a higher value for the farmers' cotton. Sugar-cane bagasse, which until a few years ago was burned under boilers of the sugar mills, is now made into insulating material for refrigerators and other uses by the building trade.

Active research looking to utilization of such by-products of the farm as corn stalks, straw, peanut hulls, lignin, and surplus sweet potatoes is now carried on by the Bureau of Chemistry and Soils, which Doctor Knight directs.

POULTRY TUBERCULOSIS IS WIDELY SPREAD

Tuberculosis in poultry flocks has been found much more prevalent than was suspected, and in many counties, especially in some of the North Central States, the disease is present to a greater or less extent in about 70 per cent of the flocks, according to the United States Department of Agriculture. Tuberculous birds show loss of vigor and flesh, lameness, swollen joints, drooping, and general unthriftiness. T. B. in poultry can be definitely diagnosed by a post-mortem or by the tuberculin test given by a veterinarian.

If the disease is discovered in the poultry flock, all diseased birds should be immediately killed and burned, and the remaining fowls over 1 year old should be marketed. The chicken house should be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected, and moved to clean ground. Lots and runways should be plowed up and seeded to some grain crop, and a new start made on clean ground with young healthy, vigorous birds of good breeding. Avian tuberculosis is doubly harmful in that it affects swine as well as poultry.

DAIRY PRODUCTS ACCOUNT FOR PART FARM INCOME

Last year the farm value of dairy products amounted to approximately three billion dollars, according to figures compiled by the United States Department of Agriculture. "Many people fail to realize the size and importance of this industry," says O. E. Reed, chief of the Bureau of Dairy Industry. "It may help some to a clearer realization of the dairying business to learn that this three billion dollars amounts to 26 per cent or a little more than a quarter of the total value of all agricultural produce. The dairy cow accounts for about one dollar as against three by all the other animals and crops in the country."

"This development," Doctor Reed says, "has been accompanied by an ever increasing appreciation by the public of the value of milk and dairy products in the diet and their relation to the health and general welfare of the people."

In the relative stability of the dairy industry, Doctor Reed finds an obvious explanation of the increasing number of investors who are keenly interested in the industry. "The stability of dairying," he says, "has resulted in large investments of capital, not only on farms but in manufacturing, processing, and distribution plants."

It would be unfortunate, however, Doctor Reed points out, if the present favorable position of the dairy industry should lead many producers to expand their business or if it should induce many men not now in the business to enter the field. In recent years the domestic

production of all dairy products has amounted to about 99 per cent of the demand, a close margin.

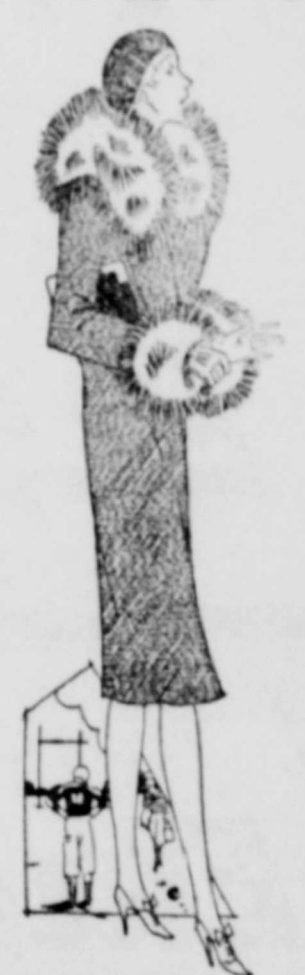

NORTHERN LAWNS SHOULD BE SEED IN THE FALL

The urge to indulge in growing green things usually reaches the point of action in the average individual in the spring, about the time the mail man delivers the seed catalogue.

As a result of this "spring fever" many lawns are seeded in the spring instead of in the fall. Seeding northern lawns in the spring is a fundamental error, according to R. A. Oakley, of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Northern turf grasses, Doctor Oakley explains, may be likened to winter wheat in certain vegetative habits of growth. Winter wheat, as is well known, requires for its best production fall sowing in order that it may stool out before the severe winter arrives and be ready for the business of making a crop the following spring. A careful study of the northern lawn grasses, he says, shows that they should be sown in the late summer or early fall if they are to compete successfully with the noxious weeds the next spring and subsequently.

Seed of most southern lawn grasses, however, should be sown in the spring; consequently southern lawns usually escape the error that so badly handicaps many northern lawns.

RED SQUILL BEST POISON FOR RATS, SAYS SPECIALIST

Nothing good can be said of rats. The United States Department of Agriculture estimates that on the average every rat in the United States does damage amounting to fully \$2 a year, and that there are at least as many rats as human beings in this country, altogether too many rats levying this tax on national production. Their economic wastefulness requires vigorous measures for their control.

In addition to the physical dam-

age rats do by destroying food and property, the Bureau of Biological Survey points out that they are a serious menace to the health of the Nation. Rats are known to spread trichinosis and carry bubonic plague and other diseases, either directly or by means of the fleas that live on them.

It is not easy to kill rats. They avoid their natural enemies and they are careful and cautious. If their suspicions have been aroused they refuse to eat many tempting bits of food containing rat poison. Poisons set for rats sometimes have

killed other animals or children. Phosphorus is a menace, as it may set fire to buildings or field grasses. Arsenic and barium carbonate are dangerous to other animals. Thallium is particularly dangerous and it is costly as the supply is limited.

Red-squill powder, in the opinion of the Biological Survey, is, if properly prepared, one of the most satisfactory rat poisons now known. Cats, dogs, and other animals usually refuse to eat the material because it causes a tingling and irritation of the throat. It is full of small crystals of calcium oxalate. Rats pay no attention to this fea-

ture. It poisons rats, but chickens can eat it without harm. It is a brown powder and can be mixed with the feed the rats ordinarily favor.

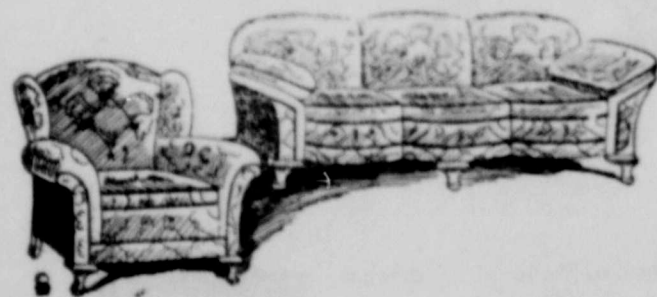

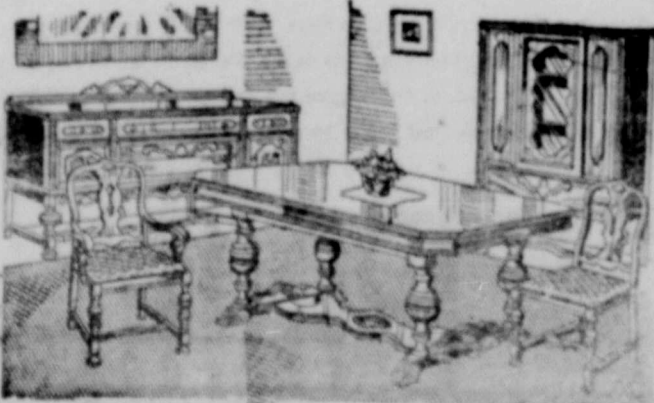

for September 29

REVIEW: SIGNIFICANCE OF THE EXILE AND RESTORATION

Golden Text 103: 17
Rev. Samuel D. Price, D. D.
The review lesson is like clinching the nail. A careful study of this quarterly lesson will help to hold the facts in memory, and especially as you are putting the truths into practice in your life. Something over 150 years in time are covered in the past twelve lessons. The title gives the two subdivisions from the historical standpoint: Exile and Restoration.

Those who are seeking to get all out of this course that is possible will read the entire books from which these lessons are taken, and they are Ezekiel, Daniel, Ezra, Nehemiah and Malachi. You should read at least the selected portions that were studied in connection with each lesson. Very little success comes without genuinely hard work.

Sincere history is usually centered about the lives of individual leaders you can get much by giving special attention to the biography of the men whose books are named above. Then look up Esther as she is contemporary, though no lesson was given this quarter to her life. Also look up the secular history of that century and a half. You will observe that rise and fall of vast empires: Babylonian, Persian and Greece.

The horizon of Israel was greatly broadened during the years of Exile. They began to realize that there were other nations that were playing a great part in the life of the world. They had been largely an agricultural nation, but the contacts in Babylon thrust them into the commercial activities that they have ever since maintained. Their cultural development was increased as they became students in the schools of other nations.

A purpose from Jehovah's angle was to stamp out idolatry which in Palestine was polluting them physically and enervating them spiritually. They went back to Jerusalem to live according to the Law of God. To be sure there were lapses: there always are. They rebuilt the Temple and then protected it by placing a good wall around the city. The rolls of the Law were studied that they might follow the teachings both as they applied to sacrifices and to the manner of their daily living.

Individual relationship and responsibility unto God was understood. This aroused personal conscience and no one could hide behind a people's sacrifice. Each must live rightly and justly before both God and man. They had experienced both the mercy and forgiveness of their loving Jehovah. Through prophecy they could look for their greatest blessings in the future when the Messiah should come.

SANDWICH HINT

To give variety to sandwiches, add finely chopped onion or olives or peanut butter to your filling.

SALAD DRESSING

One tire of the same old salad dressing. Try this one: Beat well two eggs; add gradually a tablespoon each of oil and vinegar; cook in a double boiler until thick. When cold, add two teaspoons of sugar, a tablespoon of oil and one of vinegar, and two-thirds teaspoon of salt; and set away to chill.

Put through a sieve two tablespoons of cooked tomato and one tablespoon of pimento; add this to a half cup of thick cream and whip stiff, and combine with the dressing when ready to serve. To vary this dressing, use chili sauce instead of tomato.

RAYON

At first, rayon accepted as a substitute for silk, but of late, it frankly glories in its own right. It is more enduring than silk and may be as beautiful. Frequent washings, if wisely done, do not injure rayon. As much may not be said of silk.

To wash rayon, plunge it in and out of suds until the soil disappears. Rinse it thoroughly. Do not wring nor squeeze it, but press the water out gently and wrap it in a towel to dry. Iron while still damp, with an iron which is not too hot.

FOOT VIGOR

Foot health is a grace and efficiency asset. Shoes too short, too narrow or too small are sometimes worn because there is still some wear in them, but that is poor economy. They cripple the feet, cause bone deformity, deprive one of joy in walking or sports, disqualify one for active enterprises, cause much discomfort and a possible lack of success.

Shoes with very high heels throw the body out of line, make one ewe necked, cause the abdomen to protrude and affect the spine. The proper shoe is low heeled, broad at the toe, straight on the inside line and as flexible as the foot.

To cure sick feet, wear proper shoes, wash the feet frequently with cool water and exercise the foot by walking tip-toe while barefoot. Do not toe out, as that leads to weak or flat foot. The correct way is to toe straight ahead.

Important Wheat Sowing Factors

Director of the Department of Agriculture, United States Department of Agriculture, has issued the following instructions for the sowing of wheat:

SEED PER ACRE. A well prepared seedbed requires less seed than one poorly prepared. Early sowing requires less than late sowing and sections of limited rainfall requires less than humid sections.

SOWING DATE. For best results it is advisable to spread the seedling date over 2 to 4 weeks, sowing one-fourth of the acreage early, one fourth late and one-half in between.

EARLY PREPARATION. There is no single factor that will increase the wheat yield more than early disking, plowing or listing. July preparation insures several bushels more wheat per acre than later work.

ROTATION. Continuous cropping of wheat not only decreases the yield but increases the risks and damages by insects, plant diseases and weeds. Crop rotation is the remedy.

COD-LIVER OIL MAY LOSE VITAMIN A IN MIXED FEED

Cod-liver oil is an excellent source of vitamins A and D, and scientists of the United States Department of Agriculture who have tested it in feeding trials recommend it in certain cases. They are less enthusiastic about some of the commercial preparations in which cod-liver oil is used as an ingredient.

"Commercial practices detrimental to the vitamin A of cod-liver oil may be employed unwittingly by the commercial feed producer," says Dr. E. M. Nelson, of the Bureau of Chemistry and Soils. "For example, much of the cod-liver oil for animal consumption is sold mixed with a feed or proprietary preparation, and although it may be possible to handle some of these products in such a way as to preserve the vitamin A, as yet this has not been adequately demonstrated."

"When used as a source of vitamin A in laboratories engaged in nutrition studies, cod-liver oil is either fed separately or mixed with small quantities of other food, since this vitamin disappears rapidly from cod-liver oil spread over large surfaces, particularly when exposed to light and air."

"Vitamin D, on the other hand, same conditions. Whether the benefits derived from cod-liver oil supplements are due to vitamin A or D, or both, it is not always possible to judge, but the full benefit of both vitamins is not assured unless the cod-liver oil is properly handled. If the diet must be fortified with vitamin A and the feed-dealer can not guarantee that the vitamin A of his cod-liver oil to buy cod-liver oil of a good grade products is stable, it is advisable and either give it separately or mix it with the other food shortly before feeding."

SELECTING THE DAIRY BULL

In selecting a dairy bull on the basis of the records of his ancestors consideration should be given to the conditions under which the records were made, says the United States Department of Agriculture. An investigation by the Bureau of Dairy Industry at Beltsville, Md., showed that when cows were milked and fed three times a day instead of twice, confined in box stalls instead of in stanchions, fed enough to make

them fat instead of keeping them in ordinary flesh, and bred to freshen at intervals of 15 months instead of 12 the production was increased 50 per cent.

A herd improvement association record of 400 pounds of butterfat if made under ordinary farm conditions, the bureau says, is equal to an advanced registry or register of merit record of 600 pounds.

WOOL RESEARCH DISPROVES TRADITIONS OF SHEEPMEN

Traditionally sheepmen have believed that the best sheep have coverings of wool over their faces. Another common belief was that folds around the neck and shoulders of a sheep was an indication of a fleece of superior quality and value. Another idea commonly held was that the weather exercised a controlling influence in the quality of wool.

Research work by the United States Department of Agriculture has disproved two of these ideas and confirmed the other, but with a highly important modification. To bring out the facts, the department workers have for years carried on painstaking investigations, using methods which they admit seem wasteful and useless until the methods and results are understood.

The Bureau of Animal Industry maintains a flock of sheep in eastern Idaho. Each June at shearing time each sheep is identified, weighed, and sheared. The staple is measured. The fleece is weighed. A sample is inclosed in a tin container and sent to the United States Experiment Farm, Beltsville, Md. In the wool laboratory skilled workers dry the samples in an electric conditioning oven and get the moisture-free weight. They remove grease with carbon tetrachloride and dirt by a special scouring process. Another drying makes possible a determination of the weight of clean wool and of dirt. Thus it is possible to compile a complete record of each sheep's production each year and successive years.

These records have disproved the first two ideas which were widely believed. Weather does make some difference in wool production, but there is much more difference between individual sheep in one season than there is between flocks in different seasons. This points the wisdom of constant culling of low-yielding ewes and selective breeding for heavy fleece production.

Application of these facts on the sheep ranges is returning to sheepmen each year many times the cost of the research says E. W. Sheets, who is in charge of the animal hus-

bandry work of the Department of Agriculture.

APHIDS, OR PLANT LICE, HAVE ODD LIFE CYCLE

Aphids, or plant lice, which often do serious injury to the plants they infest, have a curious life history, which Dr. P. W. Mason of the Bureau of Entomology describes in the 1928 Yearbook of the United States Department of Agriculture, issued recently.

"If we examine a branch of a tree or other plant which is infested," says Doctor Mason, "we will see the aphids, in most species grouped together in colonies, usually either on the under side of a leaf or along a twig. They may be greenish, brownish, black, or of other color, depending on the species, or even covered with a mealy powder or long waxlike filaments."

"These insects have a very unusual life history; one differing from those of almost all other insects. The egg is laid in the fall of the year, usually on the bark of the twig. With the coming of warm weather in the spring this egg hatches into what is known as the stem mother. There are no

males until the next fall. The stem mother gives birth to living young, without the necessity of fertilization. These young are all females, and, when mature, give birth to other living young. This continues throughout the summer, there being numerous generations. In each generation there are usually some which are winged and others which are wingless, each form being fully mature. As the spring advances the number of winged form increases, until, in the case of many species, they fly away to an entirely different kind of plant. Plants so chosen are known as summer hosts; on them new colonies are started, and there may be several generations on them before the return migration to the winter host. On the latter the true sexes which have been produced mate and the eggs are laid.

"Thus we see that there are several forms of aphids, such as the stem mother, the wingless viviparous female, the winged viviparous female, the male, and the egg-laying female. These may vary considerably from each other in appearance and have often been described as distinct species."

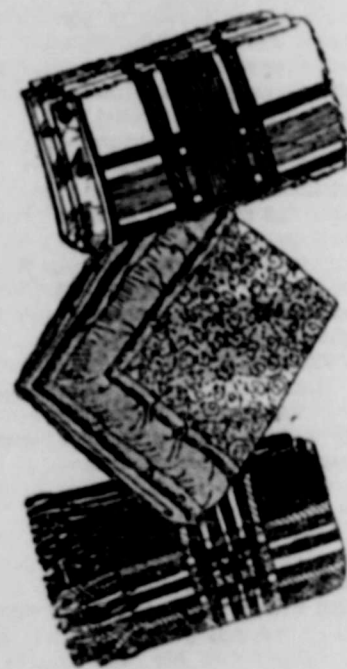

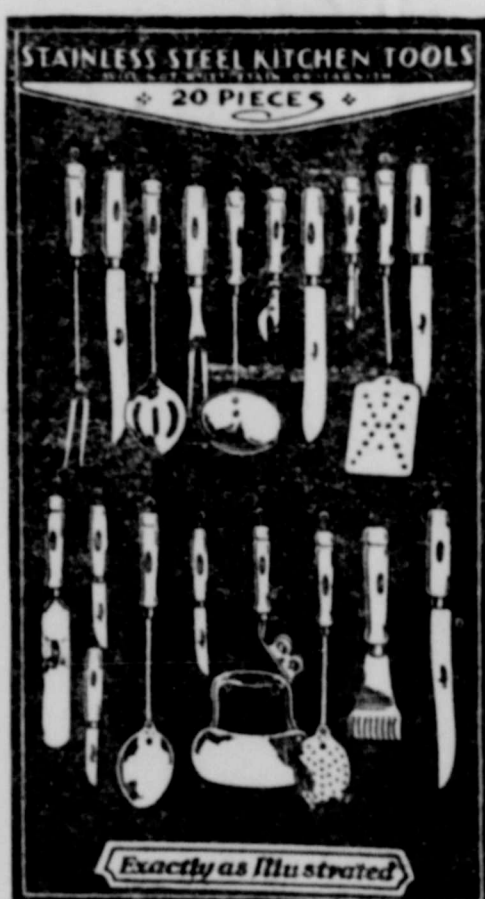
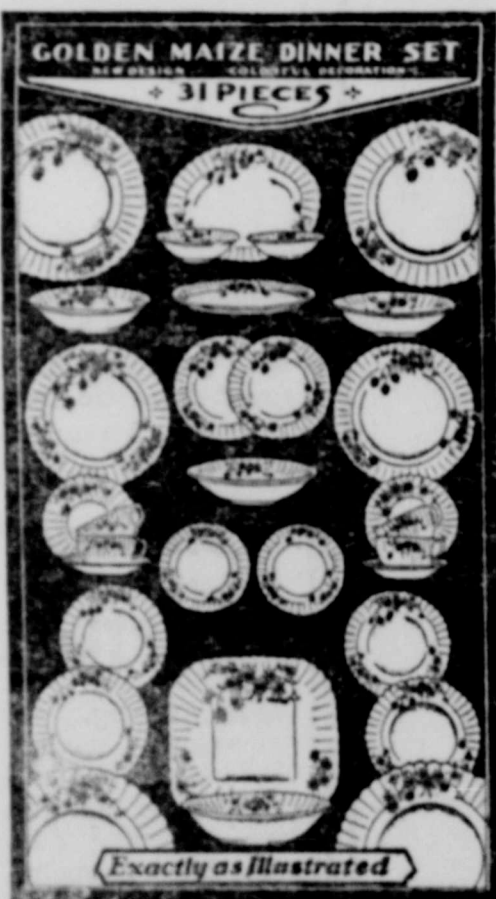

PACKERS AND CHAIN STORES

What changes time does bring!
Only a few years ago four large
packers were enjoined by court
order to cease the manufacture, dis-
tribution and sale of all other than
packing house products, and to dis-
continue the retail marketing of
even their own products. Prior to
that time the packers had acquired
canning factories and had begun
the distribution of canned goods
along with meat products.

Farm interests generally approved
the decree with a feeling that the
public interests were being served
by this limiting the activities of the
packers solely to the packing and
wholesaling of meats.

Now the packers are asking that
the decree be set aside. Hearings
are being held in Washington, D. C.,
by the department of agriculture to
ascertain the views of the farm in-
terests. In the hearings have ap-
peared representatives of livestock
organizations the nation over, as well
as general farm organizations, who
with one voice have asked that the
decree be set aside and that the
packers be permitted to compete
freely with other agencies in the
manufacture, distribution and sale
of all kinds of food products.

This change in attitude is the re-
sult of chainstore competition. These
chains have grown to enormous size.
There are 800 of them. Some of
them are composed of from 20,000 to
25,000 stores. These stores have
their own butcher shops. And in re-
cent months they have entered into
the packing business, butchering
and curtailing their own meats.

Thus they are doing what the pack-
ers were ordered not to do, namely
the packing and retailing of meats.
If the order is set aside by the
supreme court the packers will un-
doubtedly enter the retail distribu-
tion of meats in order to provide
an outlet for their goods. Livestock
interests feel that the competition
thus provided will better protect
the grower in a market for his an-
imals.

It would seem that unless this
competition is provided that the
chain systems in a few years might

well control the price which farm-
ers receive for their animals, for
whoever controls the buying for the
retail meat shops largely controls
what the farmer gets for his live-
stock.—CLARENCE ROBERTS in
the September 15 Oklahoma Farm-
er-Stockman.

HINTS FOR HOUSEWIVES
The biggest job of the homemaker
is the preparation of the "three

that of serving something new and
appetizing every day. Why not try
one of these old-time recipes given

ily will be pleased with the results.

Cream Scones—These are an old-
fashioned bread, indeed they are so
old-fashioned that a good many peo-
ple never heard of them but they
make a pleasing addition to the
menu.

Sift together 2 cups flour, 2
teaspoonfuls sugar, 1-2 teaspoonful
salt and 4 teaspoonfuls baking pow-
der. Cut 6 tablespoonfuls butter
into the dry ingredients. Beat 2 eggs
well reserving some of the white of
one egg. To the eggs add 1-3 cupful
thin cream, then add to the
flour mixture. Roll out as you
would baking powder biscuits, brush
with white of egg, sprinkle with su-
gar and cut into diamonds with a
knife. Bake on buttered pans about
the same time as you would biscuits.

Doughnuts with Mashed Potatoes
—Often the housewife says dough-
nuts dry out before they are eaten.
Try this recipe.

Take 2 cupfuls mashed potatoes,
2 cupfuls sugar, 2 tablespoonfuls
melted butter, 5 heaping or 8 level
teaspoonfuls baking powder, 1 cupful
sweet milk, 3 eggs, 1 teaspoonful
salt, 1 quart flour, nutmeg and
vanilla to taste. Sift flour, salt
and baking powder together. Beat
milk into potatoes, then the sugar.
Add eggs and beat again, then add

sifted dry ingredients. This makes
about 50 doughnuts. Sour milk

may be used by the addition of soda
and the omission of part of the bak-
ing powder.

CHEESE BROWNIES
Cut cheese into half inch strips
and roll each in a slice of dried
beef. Lay this on a slice of but-
tered whole wheat bread and bake
in the oven until the bread browns
and the cheese is melted. Garnish
with parsley and sweet pickles and
serve for supper with a glass of but-
termilk or a cup of hot chocolate.
