Sandino, Nicaraguan Rebel Chief, Reported Slain Michigan Child Slayer Sentenced And Sent To Prison

Victim's Father Attacks Prisoner At Court Hearing

Adolph Hotelling Bears the Mark of Parent's Just Wrath As He Enters Prison for Life Term.

JUSTICE WAS SWIFT FOR THIS MURDERER

Judge "Almost Convinced" That Michigan Needs the Death Penalty to Care for Such Cases.

PLINT, Mich., Jan. 18.—The slayer of golden-haired Dorothy Schneider is on his way to pay the penalty for his crime. Judge Fred W. Brennan of the Genesee county court today sentenced Adolph Hotelling to life imprisonment at hard labor in solitary confinement in the state prison at Marquette.

The murderer bears with him on his trip to the bleak upper peninsula institution, a mark that brands upon him the hate and desperate grief of the father of his victim. As the stolid, disheveled, Orono carpenter and church elder, was brought into the court today, Leslie Schneider, father of the girl, sprang from the anteroom, rushed out with all his strength and struck Hotelling full in the face. The man blinked, shook his head and placed his hand to his face. It was evident the blow was painful.

In placing sentence upon the confessed murderer, who had entered a plea of guilty, Judge Brennan declared, "The details as shown by this confession and the proof all convince me we should have capital punishment in this state."

Three witnesses only were called by the state, including the girl's father, a physician who told of the autopsy, and a court reporter who identified Hotelling's confession.

PHILADELPHIA'S PAUSE IN MEMORY OF FRANKLIN

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 18.—(P)—Hundreds of Philadelphians paused yesterday to honor the 222nd anniversary of Benjamin Franklin, statesman, scientist, and homely philosopher. The ceremonies were sponsored by the Poor Richard club, named for the non-de-plume under which Franklin gave most of his sage observations to the world.

Ranger Probing Shooting of Hall

Gonzales in Justiceburg Near Scene Where Posse Shot Oil Scout, Mistaken for Robber.

(By Associated Press) SAN ANGELO, Jan. 18.—(P)—Texas Ranger Gonzales, investigating the shooting of E. V. Hall, oil scout, who was wounded when a posse mistook him for a robber of the Sylvester bank, was in Justiceburg today.

The ranger will continue his investigation at Justiceburg, near where Hall was wounded, and return to Dallas late Thursday before making a report of his findings. The investigation was ordered by Governor Moody at the request of an oil scouts organization.

AXE MURDER

Man Found Slain Near Hearne Yesterday

HEARNE, Texas, Jan. 18.—(P)—While an undertaking company here vainly tried to establish the identity of a man whose body was found near here by a negro boy, county officers Wednesday were The man apparently had been scouring the county for his slayer, slain by being struck on the head with an axe.

Officers doubted that the motive was robbery, as the victim was poorly dressed. The name "J. Robinson" was stitched in his coat which bore the label of a chain clothing store.

Cordiality Forms Keynote as Cuban Convention Opens

Hughes' Speech, Urging Frankness in All Dealings, Is High Point Of Wednesday Session.

HAVANA, Jan. 18.—The sixth conference of American Republics opened here today in an atmosphere of cordiality and frankness which appeared to augur well for the fulfillment of the Pan-American ideal of international collaboration for peace.

A man who was proclaimed as a leading authority in such matters, Dr. Antonio Sanchez Bustamante of Cuba, was elected president of the congress. Charles Evans Hughes, chairman of the American delegation, was named vice-president.

Rafael Martinez Ortiz, Cuban secretary of state, opened the proceedings with an eloquent address, in which he stressed the friendly attitude of the Pan-American congress to the establishment of the principle of arbitration in international disputes.

Losing no time in setting down to business, the congress today completed its organization and stood ready to proceed with consideration of its agenda.

The representatives of the United States were the objects of special attention from most of the delegates while the part which American publicity men have played in promoting peaceful settlement of international disputes and in the advancement of Pan-Americanism was the subject of resolutions and speeches.

Hughes Speech Climax

Charles Evans Hughes, chairman of the American delegation, took cognizance of the friendly attitude of the conference in an impromptu speech.

ROBINSON, ARKANSAS COMES OUT IN DEFENSE

Senate Shocked By Fury of Arguments Which Wax As Bombshell During Senate Session.

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—Rebuked in vigorous terms by his party leader, Joseph T. Robinson, for his attacks on the Roman Catholic church and Governor Alfred E. Smith, Senator Thomas Heflin of Alabama, today challenged the Democratic senate leadership of the Arkansas.

The challenge was accepted immediately and Senator Robinson issued a call for a party conference tomorrow to settle the issue. He declared on the floor of the senate that if Heflin could dictate who should lead the minority "that party can get someone other than myself to lead it."

In Bitter Exchange

The most bitter exchanges the senate had heard in years broke suddenly after the Alabamian had spent two and a half hours in a new attack on the Catholic church and on Tammany Hall and Governor Smith.

Smith, before a crowded chamber and galleries, the Democratic leader took Heflin to task for his repeated attacks on the Catholic church and the New York Governor and with all the vigor at his command declared "He does his country no service who lights the torch or sounds the cry of religious intolerance and persecution."

The massive Alabamian was on his feet frequently with protests.

REED DENIES CHARGE

Takes Stand In Own Defense at Assault Trial

PORT WORTH, Jan. 18.—(P)—Flatly denying that he criminally assaulted Miss Fay Lee, 16-year-old Arlington Heights school girl, O. F. Reed testified in his own defense in criminal court here today.

His testimony and cross examination consumed the afternoon session today.

Miss Lee this morning pointed out Reed as the man who, against her wishes, took her to a vine and attacked her after he had lured her into his automobile under the pretense that he would take her to school.

Grim Story of Death In Submarine Is Related To Naval Board of Inquiry

Naval Officers, Testifying At Hearing On S-4 Reconstruct Story of Victims, Suffocating to Death In Sunken Ship and Making Futile Efforts at Rescue

(By Associated Press) BOSTON, Jan. 18.—A grim tale of death in the two after compartments of the sunken submarine, S-4, was related to the naval court of inquiry investigating the disaster today by Commander Harold E. Saunders, submarine construction expert, who is acting as salvage officer in the raising of the S-4.

Piecing together the reports of deep sea divers who have entered the hull of the wrecked submarine and brought to the surface the bodies of 23 of the 40 men who perished when the S-4 was rammed and sunk December 17 by the coast guard destroyer, Paulding, Commander Saunders gave the court the most complete report yet made public of the condition of the submarine and the efforts made to rescue her company.

Tax Survey Board Completes Study Of Better System

Colquitt Resigns As Chairman, Announcing for Senate; Legality of Body Is Still Uncertain.

WORK TO BE ENDED, HOWEVER, STATEMENT

More Equitable System Of Taxation Is Sought By Board, Which Names Committees to Finish.

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Jan. 18.—Former Governor O. B. Colquitt resigned his chairmanship of the state tax survey commission Wednesday shortly after definite announcement had been made that he would run for the United States senate, and final arrangements were made to recommend measures for a more equitable tax system to the governor and legislature.

Sub-committees who have been going into almost every phase of taxation and cost of government, were given until February 20 to make their final reports. These will be worked into a general report to the legislature by a new sub-committee of three, including the new chairman, former Senator J. G. Willacy of San Antonio, unanimously elected after Mr. Colquitt resigned. The latter will remain a member of the commission, thus preserving the majority until after the district court ruling that

Mrs. R. S. Thompson Of Amarillo Announces

AMARILLO, Jan. 18.—(P)—Mrs. R. S. Thompson, candidate for the state legislature from the 123rd district two years ago, announced Wednesday that she will seek the seat left vacant by Lee Saterwhite of Amarillo, who will not run for reelection. In the former race against Mr. Saterwhite and A. D. Payne of Amarillo Mrs. Thompson lacked 300 votes of getting into the runoff.

COL. HOLLAND DIES

Editor of Farm and Ranch Dead At Dallas

DALLAS, Jan. 18.—(P)—Frank P. Holland, 75, one of the foremost editors and publishers in the southwest and one of Texas' leading benefactors, died at his home here at 3:30 p. m. Wednesday. He had been ill four weeks. Funeral services will be held at the home at 2:30 p. m. Thursday with burial here.

Colonel Holland, as he was known, contracted his fatal illness as the result of a cold which followed a duck hunt a few days before Christmas day, when he was to have celebrated his golden wedding anniversary.

State Political Pot Seethes With 4 In Senate Race

Blanton, Mayfield, Owsley and Woman Enter; Moody Is Hinted As the Fifth Candidate for Place

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Jan. 18.—Former Governor O. B. Colquitt's definite announcement Wednesday for the United States senate put four out-and-out candidates in the race, including Senator Earle B. Mayfield, incumbent.

Meantime, a very complicated deduction going the rounds here had Governor Dan Moody figured out as likely fifth candidate. Nobody seems to know first hand what he is going to do. Politicians whose own plans depend largely on his have been interviewing newspapermen and vice versa ever since the governor came back from Washington. What they know for sure about his intentions would not ratle in a peanut shell, and he could not be seen by reporters Wednesday, anniversary of his taking office.

The deduction about a possible Moody race for the senate starts with State Senator Edgar Witt, of Waco. He is understood to have practically abandoned plans to run for Congressman Tom Connally's place on the assumption that Connally would run for the senate. Since Mr. Connally would run for the senate only if Governor Moody does not, and Mr. Witt would run for Congress only if Mr. Connally runs for the senate, Mr. Witt's reported change of plans is taken

London, Jan. 18.—(P)—A British note to the League of Nations on security and arbitration made public tonight by the foreign office, deprecates all-around agreements for arbitration of disputes but favors regional pacts such as the Locarno treaty.

RADIO POLICY

Seeks International Code For Short Waves

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—(P)—A uniform international policy for allocations of short radio waves was suggested by William R. Vallance, at the close of hearings today by the federal radio commission on the short wave problem.

Under this plan the following order would be used in assigning short waves: ships, aircraft and others entirely dependent on radio for communication; emergency service for public utilities; public service dependent on radio; public service not dependent on radio and private messages.

ENDORSE PEACE MOVE

U. S. Pact, Outlawing War, Gets Praise

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—(P)—A resolution endorsing the move of the state department for a treaty renouncing war was adopted unanimously today by the conference on the cause and cure of war, which is meeting here, and a copy ordered sent to Secretary Kellogg.

The measure was introduced by Mrs. William D. Spangberg, of the National Council of Jewish Women. It received ready support and was termed by one speaker as recognizing in such a treaty "a distinct step in advance in the foreign policy of the United States."

Dashing Young Leader of Revolution Against Marines Was Victim Bombs In Attack Last Week, Report States

Dispatch Unconfirmed But From Many Sources Comes Same Information: Forty Were Killed.

SANDINO RESPONSIBLE FOR LATEST UPRISING

Banded Disgruntled Natives Together and Made Most Serious Resistance to Marine's Rule.

(By Associated Press) MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Jan. 18.—Marine corps headquarters tonight were attempting to verify a report that the rebel general, Augustin Sandino, was killed in an airplane bombardment of his headquarters at El Chipote Saturday.

Nicaraguans arriving from the department of Nuevo Segovia, in which fighting between marines and Sandino's forces has taken place, speak at the time of the "first part of the week." They say his wife left San Rafael hurriedly for El Chipote, in response to an urgent message.

The Nicaraguans assert that Sandino's body was turned over to his widow at El Chipote, and that she is returning with it to San Rafael where a big funeral is to be held.

Marine aviators place the most severe bombing of Sandino's strongholds since operations against him began as having taken place Saturday. They say that 40 rebels were killed, and many wounded.

BOND IS MADE BY "Blackie" Lester

One of Those Shot On Raid By Sheriff and Deputy Out of Jail, Furnishes Bond.

R. B. "Blackie" Lester, one of the two men wounded when Bill Richardson, alleged bootlegger, was killed in a raid made by Sheriff H. L. Johnson and Deputy Vernice L. Ford here last January 5, is now out on \$1,000 bond, and Bryan Lewis, the other wounded man is yet in the West Texas hospital as a result of wounds incurred in the raid.

Both Lester and Lewis are charged with transporting liquor, charges having been made by Justice G. R. Scott's court immediately after the shooting and arrest.

Reports from the hospital last night said that Lewis would not be able to leave for several days yet, though his condition is better at present. His bond is fixed at \$1,000.

BEAUTY FORM THE LOWLY LEMON

In much the same way that the women of the Orient use benzoin as a beautifier and delicate balm for the skin of hands and face, so do the Occidental devotees at the shrine of beauty pin their faith to the juice of the lemon.

This acid liquid, though far removed in physical characteristics from the Oriental beautifier, still has a certain similarity of action, in that it is astringent and also bleaching.

Lemon juice should never be used in an undiluted state, but should be combined with glycerine and perfumed water when functioning as a lotion. Even when the purpose for which it is intended is the removal of a stain from the hands, it is well to dilute the juice somewhat since the acid (citric) is severe in its action.

In my opinion, lemon juice lotions should never be used on the face, but in the correct proportions they are fine for keeping the hands white and for removing stains from them.

Here is the formula for making a lemon juice lotion which applied twice daily will put your hands in fine condition: lemon juice, 1 ounce. Glycerine, 1 ounce. Alcohol, 1 ounce. Rose, lavender or orange flower water, 3 ounces.

BREAKFAST—Stewed dried apricots, whole wheat cereal, cream codfish puffs, corn bread, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Cream of onion soup, spinach and egg salad, chocolate bread pudding, milk, tea.

DINNER—Pot roast of veal, baked squash, tomato jelly salad, date and nut pudding, milk, coffee.

Chocolate Bread Pudding
One cup stale bread crumbs, 2 cups scalded milk, 1 square bitter chocolate, 1-2 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1 tablespoon butter, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla, few grains salt.

Pack crumbs firmly in cup to measure. Soak bread in milk for 30 minutes. Melt chocolate over hot water, add half the sugar and enough milk taken from the bread and milk to make thin enough to pour. Beat yolk of egg until thick and lemon colored. Stir into bread and milk and add chocolate mixture, remaining sugar, melted butter, salt and vanilla. Mix thoroughly and fold in white of egg beaten until stiff and dry. Turn into a buttered pudding dish and bake 30 minutes in a slow oven. Serve warm with whipped cream flavored with slightly with peppermint. One drop of oil of peppermint will be sufficient to flavor 1 cup of whipped cream. Use 2 tablespoons powdered sugar to sweeten slightly.

GASOLINE PRICE WAR

Royal Dutch Shell Fights Standard Oil

NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—The "price war" now raging between the Royal Dutch Shell group and the Standard Oil company of New York in India will immediately be extended if the American company offers Russian oil for sale in other countries. This was made clear here tonight by Richard Airey, American representative of Sir Henri Deterding, head of the Shell interests. "I do not anticipate a price war in any other country," Mr. Airey said, "but this is entirely in the hands of the Standard Oil company of New York. If they ship Russian oilen goods to any other country, the Royal Dutch Shell will fight it."

Split Develops In Farm Bill Forces

Several Express Opposition To Equalization Fee Proposal, Fearing White House Veto.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—A split in the ranks of the supporters of the equalization fee principle of the McNary-Haugen farm rent bill developed today at a meeting of the house agricultural committee.

One republican, Williams of Illinois, announced that he would not again vote to report a bill embodying this controversial provision. His statement was seconded by Representative Ketchum, republican, Michigan. The opinion that such a bill would be amended on the house floor to cut out the equalization fee previously had been expressed by Representative Adkins, republican, Illinois.

The McNary-Haugen bill was approved by the committee last year by a margin of one vote, eleven to ten, as a substitute for the crisp measure patterned on a different line. With this in mind, its proponents are anticipated a hard fight in view of the changed sentiments announced today.

While they did not renounce what they regard as the merits of the equalization fee proposal the three republican committee members commented that a bill should be reported which would meet administration approval if passed by congress. They held no hope that President Coolidge would approve a bill embodying the equalization fee principle inasmuch as he condemned it last year in vetoing the McNary-Haugen bill.

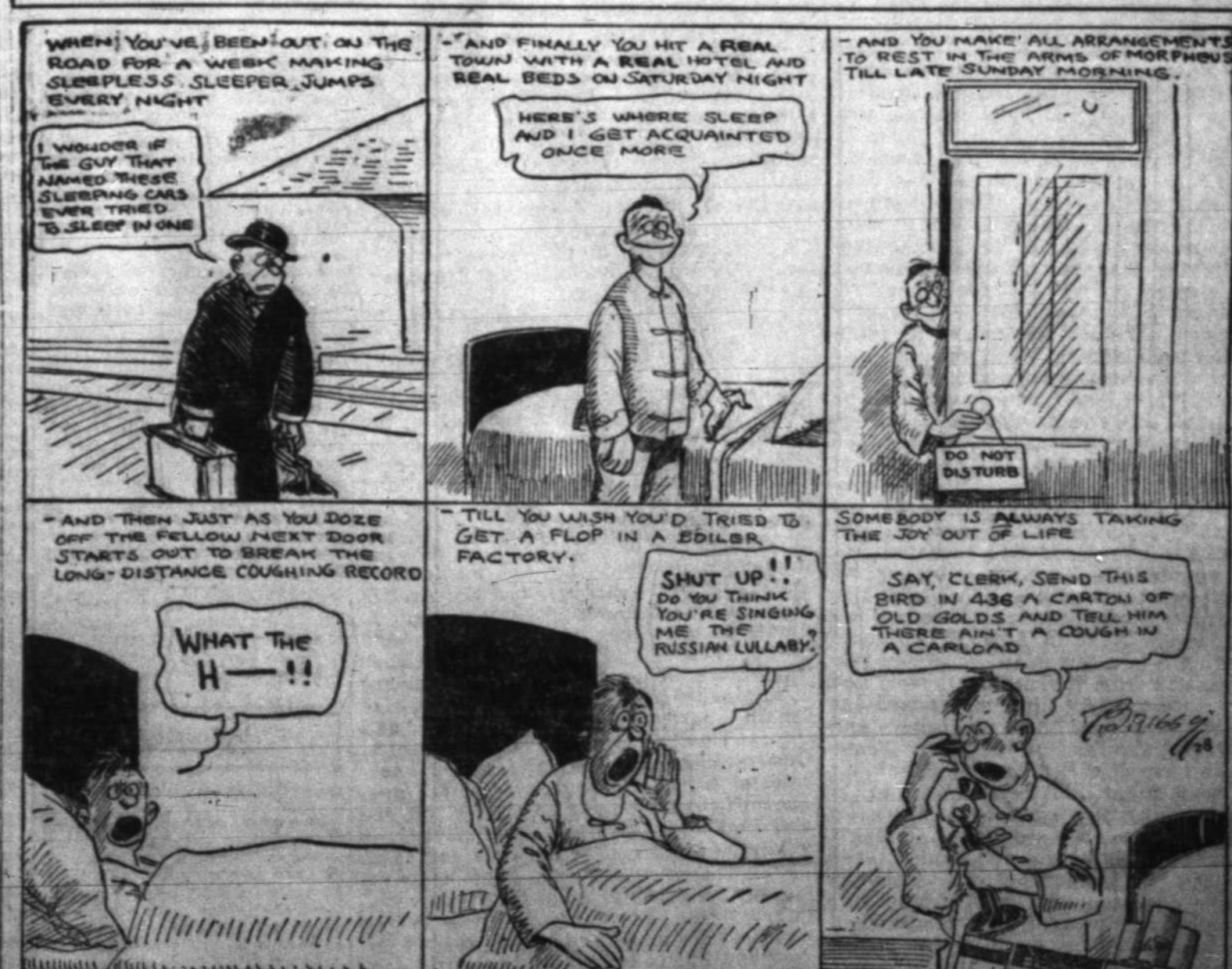

SANDINO KILLS WOMEN AND CHILDREN KILLED

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 18. (P.)—A letter to the newspaper, El Universal, addressed to Nicaraguan Liberals in Mexico City and purporting to come from the rebel general, Augusto Sandino, accuses American marines of the massacre of civilians, including women and children.

The letter, dated Jan. 2, at El Chipote, just three days after the marines took Quilali, Sandino's headquarters, from him contains an urgent appeal for medical supplies, saying the air raids prevent prompt medical treatment, with the result that many wounded die from lack of attention.

"Our wounded are dying from lack of opportunity treatment of their wounds," says the letter, "after they are harassed by bombs and shrapnel, and also owing to malaria. I am speaking not only of soldiers but of civilians, among whom are many women and children, as the airplanes of these bandits are doing more damage in towns than in our trenches."

"The towns of Guasacaste, Ciudad Vieja and San Jacinto are only smoldering ruins."

Work on the special auditorium in which the city will build to house the convention is expected to start immediately after Mayor Holcombe returns. Plans for the structure, which is expected to cost about \$100,000 are being drawn by Mr. Jones' architects in New York. Those plans are among subjects which the mayor will discuss with Mr. Jones. The auditorium is expected to cover about two city blocks, probably in the civic center, and accommodating 25,000 persons.

All Seats Taken

From the main floor occupied by the official delegations of twenty-one republics represented to an especially constructed balcony all seats were taken. It is estimated that the attendance was at least fifteen hundred persons.

After the nominations of Dr. Bustamante for the presidency of the conference by Mr. Hughes, Orizaba, Cuban ambassador to Washington, proposed Mr. Hughes for the presidency explaining the home delegation could not join in nominating a Cuban by acclamation. Mr. Hughes immediately arose, expressed appreciation, but declined the honor. Later Mr. Hughes suggested a member of all committees and his suggestion was immediately adopted.

and threats while an almost full membership of the senate and Southern and New York members of the house, gathered on seats in the rear of the chamber, sat in almost stunned silence. The blunt declarations of the two senators on religious and political issues within their party brought frequent outbursts from the galleries.

Feeling Becomes Intense

As they fired back and forth, the speakers were separated by only a single row of seats. Robinson gripped his desk or pounded palm against palm as he drove home his thrusts at his Southern colleague. At times the Democratic leader showed the intense emotion under which he labored and once warned Hefflin not to interrupt him again.

The Alabama, too, appeared under an intense strain. His voice was husky after his long speech and he was wrapped in a great coat with up-turned collar. As Robinson concluded he doffed his coat and launched into a heated reply to which the Democratic leader gave close attention, but which he did not interrupt.

Started With Hearst Attack

Immediately after the senate convened, Hefflin obtained recognition for a defense of himself against imputations in documents published in the Hearst newspapers and purporting to be of Mexican origin. He attributed publication of the documents to a conspiracy of the Roman Catholic church against him. Then he began a double-barreled

attack upon the "Pope of Rome and Al Smith," and warned his party not to nominate Smith for presidency.

"If it does," he shouted, "The Republicans can defeat him with any body by from fifteen million to twenty million votes. The American people, knowing what the Roman Catholic political machine is doing, are not going to put him in the White House. Any leader in the South who supports Al Smith will never come back to this capital."

Charges a Catholic Ring

Charging the Catholics of all countries would contribute funds to Smith's support, Hefflin asserted they already were spending money in the South and "are sending writers down there from New York to traduce my state."

In opening his reply, Robinson said, and other members of the special committee which investigated the Hearst documents agreed with him, that there was no suspicion that the Roman Catholic church had anything to do with the documents. Then the Arkansas expressed "amazement" that Senator Hefflin had called attention that Mr. William Randolph Hearst was a Catholic as if that had any connection with the publication of the documents.

Hefflin on his feet immediately

demanding the discharge of Robinson from the committee, but when the Democratic leader asked unanimous consent for an immediate vote on the proposition the Alabama objected in a strident voice.

As the Arkansas senator then denounced Hefflin's attack on the

Catholic church and Gov. Smith, the Alabama challenged his leadership of the party in the senate.

"The senator from Arkansas can not demand leader of the Democrats and fight the Roman Catholics' battle every time it is raised in this body without some expression from a constitutional Democrat," Hefflin said.

Asks Immediate Vote

"Whenever the senator from Alabama can determine who shall be the leader of the Democratic party in the senate of the United States," Robinson retorted, "that party can get somebody else than myself to lead it here."

"Well, you have my consent to do that now," Hefflin came back.

"The senator from Alabama has asserted over and over that the governor of New York, Mr. Smith, will not be nominated and he gave as his reason the assertion that Governor Smith is a Catholic," the Arkansas continued.

"That he was a Tammanyite, a 'wet,' and a Roman Catholic," interrupted Hefflin.

Denounce the Catholic Church

"I will make that speech in Arkansas and I will make it in Alabama, too," returned the minority leader.

"Yes, and if you do, they will tar and feather you," shouted Hefflin.

It support of its motion for continuance the defense introduced Deputy Sheriff Cy Bradford of Eastland. He testified that he was present when Ratliff was shot down and captured near South Bend in Young county and said he saw some of Ratliff's wounds, but did not make any examination in detail of them.

In answer to questions, Bradford made the surprising answer that on the way from the Eastland county jail to the courtroom Wednesday, Ratliff had remarked to him that he would out-run the deputy "right now."

Kennedy Closes Roswell Contract For New Railroad

Line To Connect Proposed Trunk On East And North Route Through Lubbock Is Also Contemplated

(Special To The Avalanche)
SNYDER, Jan. 18.—Captain Ed Kennedy of Houston, has just closed a contract with the Roswell, New Mexico, chamber of commerce to build the Artesia-Roswell and Snyder rail road east to intersect with a trunk line, according to W. E. Wheeler, manager of the Dispatch Publishing Co., at Roswell. The amount asked for by Capt. Kennedy was immediately subscribed.

Behind Proposed Road
Roswell and southeastern New Mexico are squarely behind this proposed road, and according to tentative plans, the rail line will be built east from Roswell to Caprock, a distance of forty miles. At this point one line will be built east through Brownfield, Lamesa and on to Roswell. A second line, according to the plan, will connect at Snyder, Capt. Kennedy also plans to build the road northeast from Caprock, through Lubbock, Floydada, Memphis to Wellington. Both branches connecting up with branches of the M. K. & T. System.

It appears that the promoters are also trying to interest the Frisco in coming onto this track at Floydada and following this line to Roswell, from which point another line would be built to El Paso.

Branch Mentioned
It is expected that in the event the Katy owns this line or has a traffic agreement to use it to Roswell—that a branch will be built 40 miles northeast from that city to the coal fields. A meeting has been called at Lamesa within the next two weeks at which time, rail line officials will meet with the promoter, and citizens in a mass meeting. All towns along the route will send delegations.
