The item appearing in this column last week brought a lot of favorable response from area cattlemen and producers. We might add that unfortunately we didn't author this column but clipped it from a "big-city" newspaper, namely the Cincinnati Enquirer. Much as we'd like to claim credit for it, we just didn't write it, but thought you'd enjoy it as much as we did. A week or so ago another item appeared over the AP wire which caught our eyes. We haven't heard anyone discuss it, and were surprised that many must've missed it.

The item dealt with a statement made by one of the bigwig Washington bureaucrats, one Dr. John T. Dunlop, director of the Cost of Living Council.

Dunlop was making an address to the Advertising Council out in California when he made the following statement.....

"Cattlemen who have been withholding cattle from the market to help keep meat prices up must stop the practice or face Federal action," he warned.

"If the practice continues," Dunlop said, "then we have to act."

Dunlop did not elaborate on what "we have to act" may imply but did give the idea that perhaps force may be used if the cattlemen didn't swing into line.

The speaker went on in the speech to say that because cattle sales dropped during January from 20 to 25 percent pointing out "We know this is partly deliberate."

Our first reaction to Dunlop's bunch of hogwash was just that here is another politician making noises to influence opinion that the rancher and farmer is out to make a buck at the expense of the consumer, which just isn't so!

We quickly recall that in our area during January the weather was pretty bad, and not at all conducive to the trading of cattle. Naturally, Dunlop either ignored this fact or is just plain ignorant.

Like so many others, Dunlop reminds us of the politician who said, "Don't confuse me with facts, my mind is made up."

In this case, his mind is made up that the rancher and cattle producer must be brought into line regardless.

For some reason or the other, we always figured that a fellow could buy or sell when he danged well wanted to. Whether he happens to be a rancher or cattleman makes no difference, or at least it sure shouldn't make any difference.

We would also imagine that if Dunlop wishes to press his case he would have a hard time proving that the producer deliberately withheld cattle off the market.

During the week of the meat boycott we all know that sales of fat cattle came to a halt. It wasn't that the producer or feedlot operator didn't want to sell, the buyers weren't around.

Now what about putting the shoe on the other foot...if Dunlop wants to make a real case it has to work both ways and we don't believe it is right to make a man sell if he doesn't want to do so any more than it is right to make a man buy if he doesn't choose to do so!

All in all, it does worry this scribe when a person in the position of Dunlop would have the gall, or ignorance, to publicly make such a statement.

This past week has been pretty fair, with a bunch of wind last week one day which blew pretty hard but not nearly as hard as further south, for which we can be grateful.

Farmers have been busy and getting ready to plant corn and preparing seedbeds of all kinds.

**PRE-SCHOOLERS INCLUDED
TB Testing Slated
At Schools Friday**

All students in the Stratford Schools, including those who will be attending kindergarten and first grade next fall, will be given the TB skin test beginning at 9 a.m. Friday at the Mary Allen Elementary School, announced Supt. E.L. Bass.

This is an annual testing program, Bass pointed out, and is held in conjunction with the local health authorities and the Texas Department of Health.

The test itself is a simple one, one that is done quickly and consists of placing a test solution into the skin to determine whether or not the child carries the germ which causes tuberculosis.

All parents are urged to cooperate in the testing as this will be the last free examination given in this area for about three years and one is required before a student is allowed to enter public school.

All students in the Stratford Schools have been given forms that must be completed and turned in Friday. All parents of pre-school age children will be furnished forms on Friday the day of the testing.

No test may be given unless the form is completed and signed by the parent. All are urged to complete them and have them returned to the school by Friday.

**Civil Defense Test
Siren On Friday**

The Civil Defense Siren will be tested at 11 a.m. Friday morning, announced County Judge W.S. Frizzell Jr.

The siren, located at the Court House, is used to notify Stratford citizens of impending tornadoes and other storms.

A change in the use of the siren is also announced by Judge Frizzell. In the future, there will be no "all clear" given on the siren. An alert Tornado Signal will be a series of short blasts indicating for residents to be on the lookout for tornadoes, and a long single blast will be used as a "Take Cover" signal indicating a tornado has been sighted or is in the immediate area and all residents to take cover.

"We really feel the All Clear that has been used in the past may have been confusing and citizens use their own judgement as to when it is safe to come out of their cellars," Judge Frizzell stated.

Spray-Dip Bill Goes Into Hopper

Representative Dean Cobb of Dumas passed before the House this last week a bill which would allow livestock under a quarantine condition in the State of Texas to be "spray-dipped" by machine method rather than total submersion, the method being used presently under the direction of the Texas Animal Health Commission. The bill will help to define many terms of the present law which was written thirty to forty years ago that is now obsolete and ineffective under the newly acquired technical system of feeding and managing cattle. According to the Texas Cattle Feeders Association the inactment of this legislation. The present program is now costing the government about one million a year and feeders ten times that amount. The "spray-dip" method is accepted by the United States Department of Agriculture for treatment for psoroptic cattle scabies. "The bill does not usurp any of the existing powers of the Animal Health Commission. Rather it gives them a modern day tool to use in administering their existing controls." said Cobb.

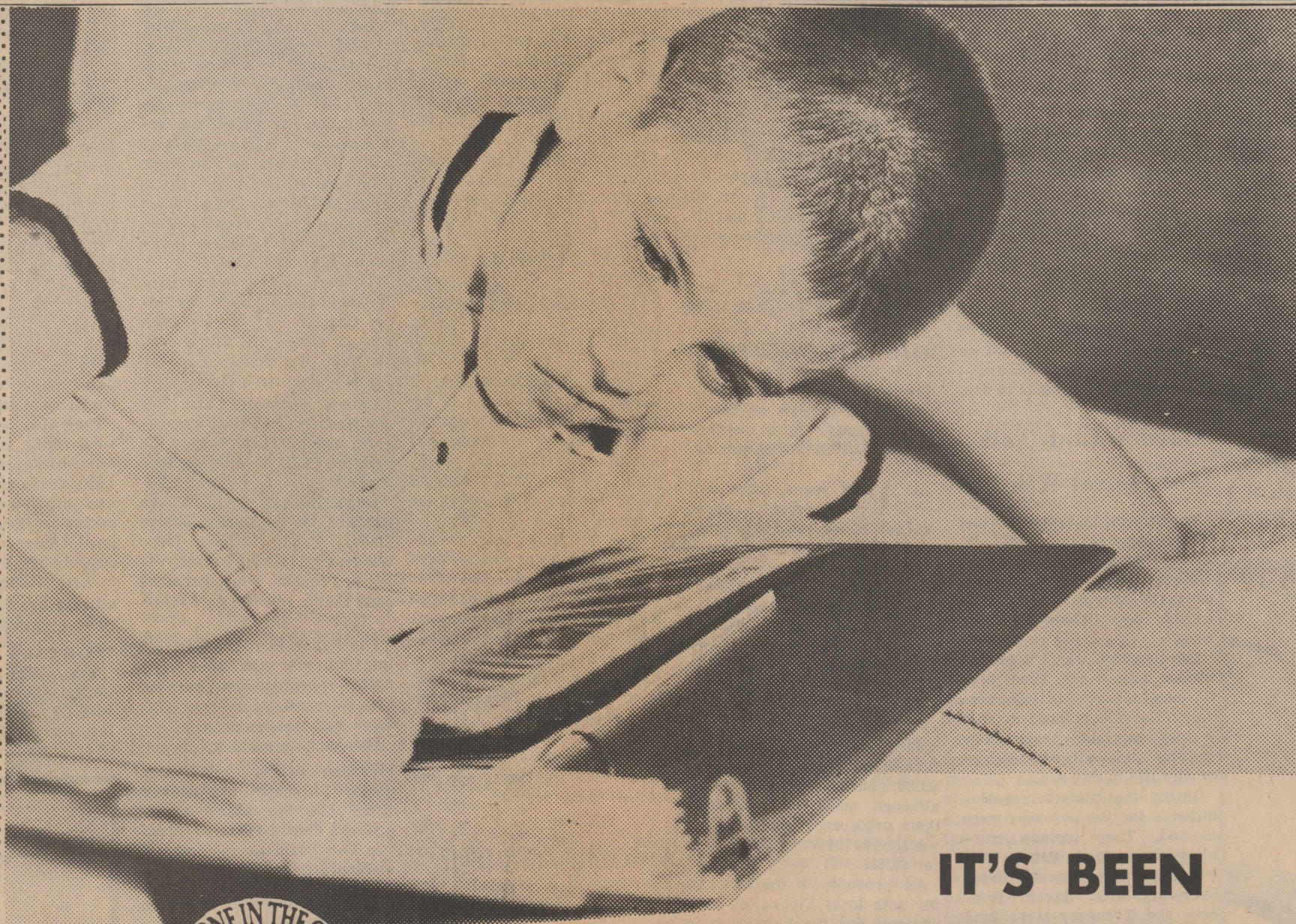
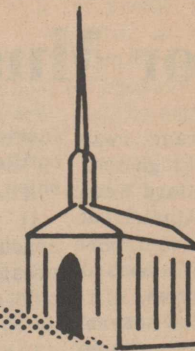

The GCFR program is directed at the design and development of a gas-cooled nuclear reactor that will "breed" more nuclear fuel than it consumes by converting nonfissionable uranium into fissionable plutonium. The reactor will be used for the production of electricity.

1 t. vanilla

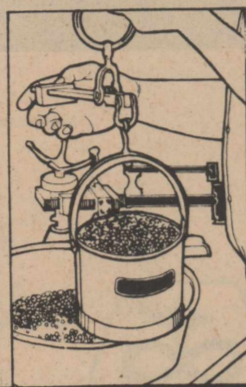

That was the rationalization of Wales Madden, Amarillo attorney, and member of the new 37-member Constitution Revision Commission. He spoke before the Panhandle Press Association on the tedious chore before the Commission, and invited editors and publishers to attend the first public hearing of the Commission on April 25 in Amarillo.

"We will hold 18 public meetings throughout Texas," Madden told his Amarillo audience, and we'll be hard pressed for time to get the new draft of the proposed constitution to the Texas Legislature by November 1, 1973."

The Texas Legislature becomes a ConCon in January, 1974, and has been charged by the voters to write a new constitution by May, 1974.

There will be no changes in the Texas "bill of rights"--Madden pointed out.

Texas Constitution is longest in the nation -- five times longer than the U.S. Constitution. Voters have approved 200 amendments (out of 317 submitted) to the document since 1880. "If the new constitution is not approved," he added, "we predict that we'll have 200 more amendments approved by the year 2,000."

Several Texas House members attending the Panhandle Press meeting said they believed that the voters would approve the constitution -- as submitted by the Legislature.

Madden predicted that the Speaker of the House of Representatives would be the presiding officer of the ConCon in 1974 because "the House has more votes than the Senate on the decision."

"It will be a 'people' document," he concluded, "a document of 'all seasons.'" **BUSY LEGISLATURE**--Returning from a four-day Easter holiday this week, the Legislature is faced with a hurry-up schedule and a mountain of work before its late May adjournment deadline.

The House plodded for days through stacks of mainly-fordoomed amendments before passing its \$9.7 billion appropriations bill.

A \$9.5 billion version of the state budget for 1974-75, meanwhile, zipped through the Senate finance committee and was expected to pass quickly and smoothly.

Since both houses were ready to bow to Gov. Dolph Briscoe's demand for a no-new-taxes appropriations bill, little hangup is seen for budget conferees in closing days of the session.

Main differences in the House and Senate spending bills lie in the area of public welfare, and that is a fast-changing field, considering federal funding laws are subject to Washington agency interpretation.

While the budget remains the principal job unfinished, there are numerous other major pieces of legislation awaiting action. They include:

- * Code of ethics and lobby control strengthening.
- * Election measures.
- * A sweeping variety of environmental bills.
- * Penal code revision.

* The newsmen's "shield law" to protect information sources, which is stalled in a conference committee, with conferees at odds over whether courts should be empowered to force disclosure.

* Overhaul of the school finance system to benefit poor districts -- a job which almost certainly will be left to a later legislature.

ALLOWABLE HELD UP--Texas Railroad Commission for the 14th straight month set the May oil allowable at 100 per cent of potential.

Chairman Jim Langdon said gasoline stocks were down 10 per cent from last year -- or at 189.5 million barrels as of April 13.

Ten of 14 major crude buyers requested the same output for May as in April. Three requested less and one, more.

Exceptions to the 100 per cent allowable are East Texas field (86 per cent); Tom O'Connor (70 per cent) and some small fields (80 per cent).

SCANDAL COMMITTEE REPORTS--A House Investigating Committee named two years ago to investigate the scandal-marked Sharpstown banking bills of 1969 handed in a belated report and six recommendations, five of which already have been passed on by the House.

The Committee's new recommendation urged that speakers of the House not have personal legislative programs.

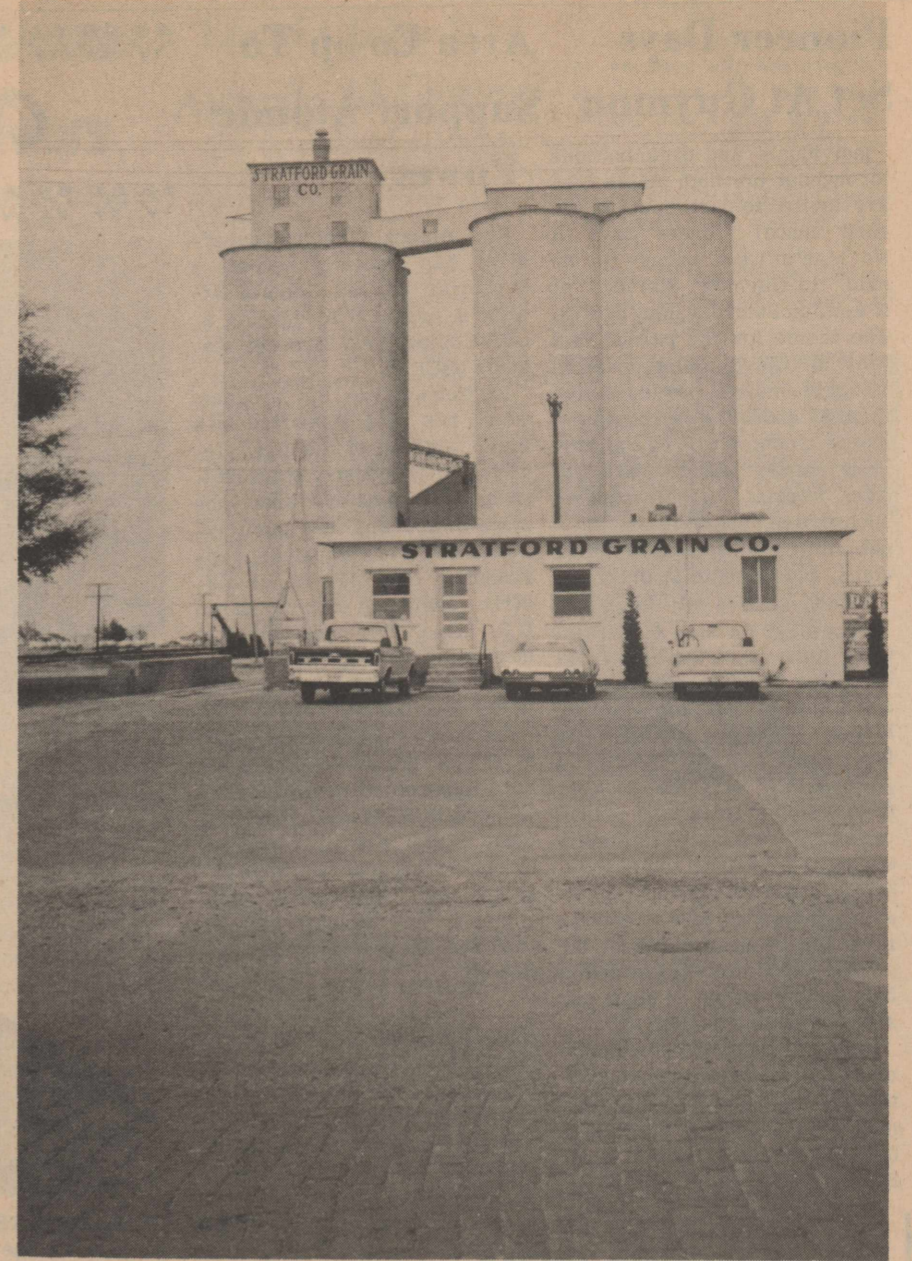

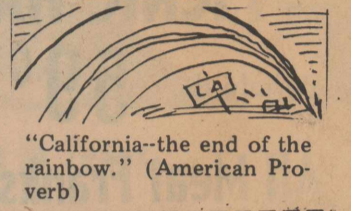

Palm Canyon Drive, Palm Springs, California, 92262, who holds License No. 73-4 of the State of Texas, is now applying for a permit to engage in operations and to locate ground-based generators for operational purposes in certain counties of the State of Texas on behalf of farmers and ranchers located in the State of Oklahoma and for the purpose of augmenting precipitation within said area of Oklahoma. These operations shall be by means of ground generators as follows:

1. Area in which equipment will be operated is the following: Counties in Texas consisting of: Dallam, Lipscomb, Hansford, Roberts, Hemphill, Ochiltree, Moore, Sherman and Wheeler.
2. The target area will be the farm and ranch lands within counties in the State of Oklahoma consisting of: Texas, Beaver, Harper, Woodward, Ellis, Custer, Washita, and Kiowa.
3. The areas adjacent to target area which may be subject to the effects of the operation are within the State of Oklahoma and in general within 15 to 20 miles of the target area. The maximum intentional effect is in the target, but some downwind effect may occur in Oklahoma mostly to the immediate northeast of the target. There would be no significant effect in Texas from the operation of any of these proposed generators. It is important to note that this notice is simply to apply for permission to install generators in Texas, not to increase rainfall in Texas, and for the sole purpose of increasing rainfall in the target area located in the State of Oklahoma.
4. The materials and methods to be used in conducting the operation are silver iodide electric arc (Model 1730) ground-based generators that have an output of an optimum amount of 0.5 grams per hour per generator.
5. Person who will be in charge of operations is Mr. Newton C. Stone.
6. The operations will be performed in the State of Oklahoma for the following clients: Henry C. Hitch Ranch, Inc., Beaver County Weather, Inc., Harper County Weather, Inc., Woodward County Cloudseeding Assn., Ellis County Weather, Inc., Custer County Weather Assn., Washita County Weather Modification Assn., and Kiowa County Weather Modification Assn.

The operation will extend during the period beginning around 6 June 1973 and continue through 5 June 1974.

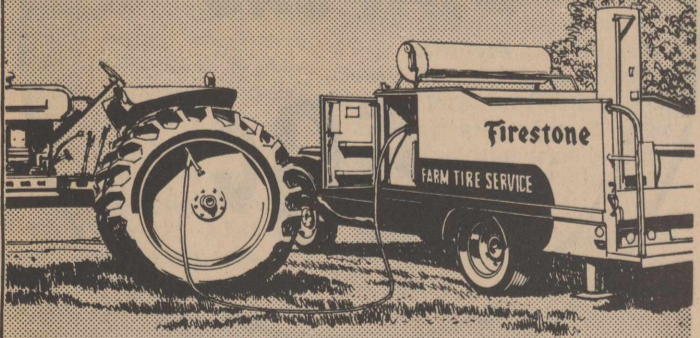
