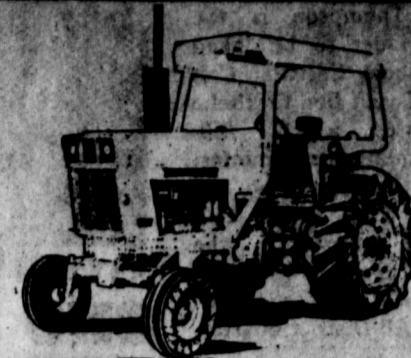

CITY BOND ELECTION MAY 19

VOTE TUESDAY AT CITY HALL

Water improvement

Benefits of the proposed water improvements project which will be decided by an election on Tuesday, May 19, were detailed at the meeting held Thursday, May 7, at Clarendon City Hall.

As a water user and voter these are things you will want to know about the project.

The eight inch line (see chart) which will circle the town is badly needed to give volume and pressure to all sections of town. It will be tied into existing city lines.

One water tower (number 1 on the chart) is in service. The outservice water tower in the southeast part of town (number 3 on the chart) will be raised to the correct height and put into use. The extra storage will be 80,000 gallons of water which will greatly help to relieve low pressure when emergencies of high demand for water occur.

A new standpipe, 13 feet in diameter and 120 feet high will be erected in the west part of town near the existing water tower. This will provide adequate pressure and adequate water for the present homes in the west part of town and for future construction, and provide additional water storage.

Larger pumps will be built to pump water from the low pressure system to give adequate pressure where needed.

The eight inch line which circles the town will circulate water between the east and west water towers for good supply.

There will be a lot of two inch steel lines replaced. These lines have corroded inside and space for water is greatly reduced. These lines are the ones which develop leaks. These leaks are both time consuming to repair and expensive to the city.

In addition to the benefits just listed the cost of city services, (water, trash pick-up, and sewer) the customer will be receiving twice as much water for the minimum cost of \$24 as was received for the minimum cost of \$14. Some users will not use the 10,000 gallons on the minimum cost. Some persons who raise gardens and keep a yard will use all of it.

An important thing to consider is the FHA loan for 5% interest. This money has been designated for Clarendon for this purpose for this interest rate, if the voters elect to vote FOR the bond issue. There will be no more 5% interest at any time. As a matter of fact the last bonded indebtedness (incurred in 1926) by the City of Clarendon was paid off several years ago and had an interest rate of 6%.

If these badly needed improvements are to be financ-

ed, now is the most economical time for citizens of Clarendon to borrow the money.

Repayment of the bonds will be done over a 40 year period, by the money which comes to the city from its city water bills each month.

You need to know too that all water problems will not be solved by the new improvements. Feeder lines (running to meters) are in poor condition in some places. These must be replaced to carry the proper amount of water.

Some property owners have old lines which have filled with corrosion and are too small to carry the amount of water needed for the average household. If this is the case they must be replaced to get good supply.

The water system in Clarendon is about 70 years old. Many of the lines are that old. The lines which are to be used in the water improvement project should last as long or longer. They will last longer than the bonded indebtedness.

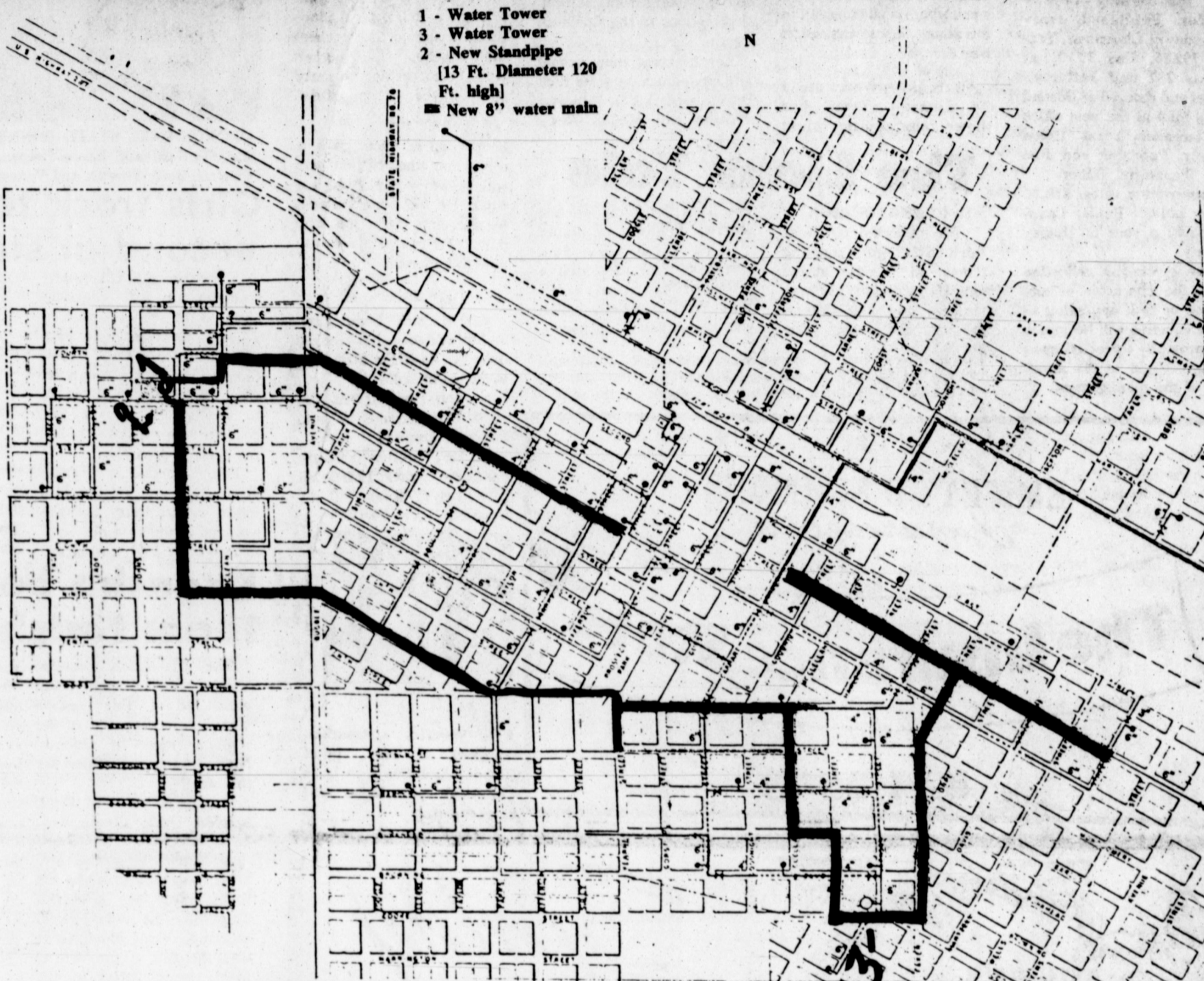
Rabies clinic at city hall May 22

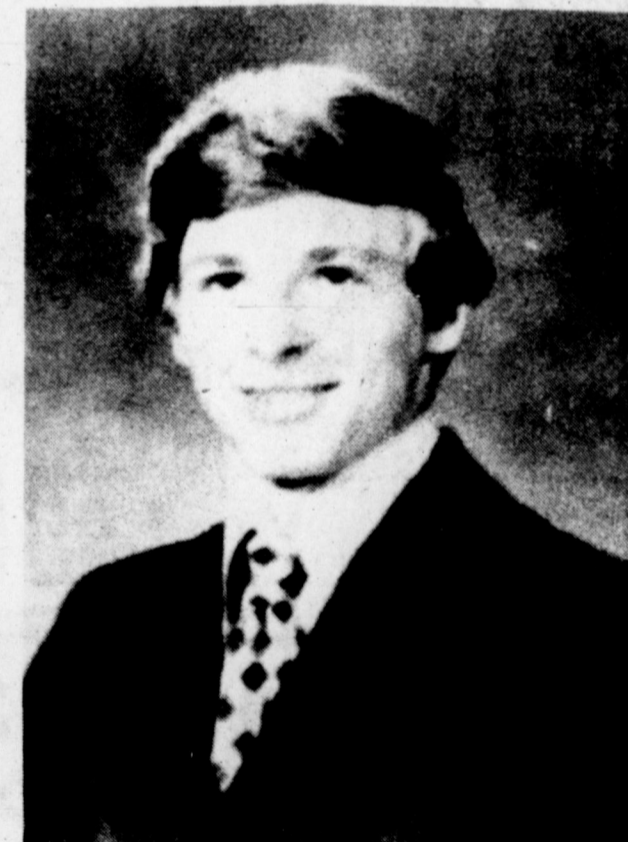
Steve enjoys hunting, fishing, camping and skiing and plans to attend Clarendon Junior College and Texas A & M and enter the field of engineering.

The Clarendon Broncho Varsity Boy's Track Team concluded a fine season when they competed in the regional meet at Odessa. Nine Bronchos qualified for the meet.

The sprint relay of Craig Shields, David Weatherton, Randy White, and Drew Thornberry ran in the prelims, but failed to make the finals when they missed a hand-off at the first exchange. Craig Shields who won the 800 at the district meet ran a 2:10.3 in the prelims but failed to reach the finals in the tough competition. Lance Thornberry ran a 15.43 in the 110 meter high hurdles but just missed making the finals. Bobby Weatherton qualified in the 100 and 200 meter dashes but was unable to run due to an injury. Lance Thornberry and Alton Gaines both cleared 5'10" in the high jump but did not place. Shawn Heil recorded a 10:51.98 in the 3200 meter run for his personal best but he failed to reach the finals. His height tied the second place finisher from Rotan who will be going to state but Gaines finished 3rd as a result of misses at a lower height.

The Bronchos conducted themselves and competed as champions all season and brought much credit to themselves, their school, and the community. EMS receives equipment

The Clarendon Emergency Medical Services recently received some new equipment in a continuous effort to maintain the finest in emergency medical equipment.

Three new portable radio units were purchased, one each by the City of Clarendon, Donley County, and the Donley County Hospital District. The portable units (walkie talkies) were purchased from Motorola, Inc. They are 4 watt, UHF units and are very compact and easy to use but serve a very important role in providing EMS to the citizens of this area.

With the portable units, the ambulance crew has constant contact with the Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center, Poison Control Center, Northwest Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, Suicide Prevention and Crisis Intervention, as well as all Panhandle area hospitals, many law enforcement agencies, and some physicians throughout the region. Since Clarendon does not have a 24 hour emergency room, the ability to reach a physician for medical advice at any

time is very important. The portables have been assigned to the local EMS Coordinator as well as each of the Paramedics. After the inception of the Paramedic program, the biggest problem encountered in the Panhandle was reaching a physician for medical control for orders for the administration of drugs, cardiac defibrillation, IV fluids, and other advanced life support. Texas law requires that Paramedics be given voice orders before instituting any advanced life support. EMS personnel soon realized that the portable radio was the best and fastest means of achieving physician contact.

The Paramedic program operates on the idea of stabilizing the patient prior to moving him from the home or other accident scene to the ambulance. This was not possible unless the Doctor was available by phone. With the portables, contact can be made immediately when necessary to the AERC Physician and he can provide orders for the treatment of the patient at any time of the day or night. This is especially important in homes where there is no telephone

or at an accident scene in a remote area (like Greenbelt Lake) when the patient needs to be stabilized and treated in the environment he is in before moving to the ambulance.

Shortly after receiving the radios, contact was made with the AERC and Poison Control Center when a young person had overdosed on tranquilizers after removing the label and was almost unconscious. By describing the pills, a determination was made of their composition and treatment ordered by the physician. The patient was treated at the scene, regained full consciousness, and transport to the hospital was no longer necessary. A few days later, Paramedics were in contact with the Commcenter in Amarillo while working to free an accident victim from an automobile. All communications were done with the portables. These are just a couple of examples of how valuable these radios are in the treatment of acute emergencies. In addition, the portables can be used to trigger the pagers of some of the other ambulance crew members in case of power

failure when the base is un-operational, ambulance personnel have greater freedom of movement while on and off of their regular job since they can be reached without being near a phone constantly, response time is improved due to more coordinating dispatching, should a radio on an ambulance malfunction while on a run, the portables can provide a back up communication system without an interruption in communication with the hospital or physician.

The medical equipment owned by the Clarendon EMS is second to none anywhere else in the Panhandle, including Amarillo. The people in this community are most fortunate to have members of the City, County, and Hospital Governments who are willing to put forth so much effort and money to see that the residents of this community are not shortchanged when it comes to receiving the best medical care in an emergency situation.

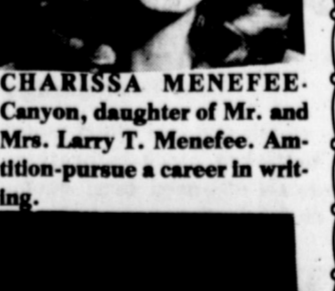

for nursing home

Residents of the Panhandle region's 33 nursing homes will soon have an independent network to resolve their consumer complaints, due to a system recently instituted by the Governor.

The Nursing Home Ombudsman Program is the result of an agreement between the Governor's Committee on Aging and the Texas State Department of Health. It created a network of local, regional and state citizens who are concerned about the care offered in the nursing home. It also insures that residents of nursing homes will have spokesmen for their concerns.

In the Panhandle area Ola Kidd, an ombudsman with the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission's Area Agency On Aging will be working with the extended care facilities. Her major job will be to train volunteers to work with nursing home administrators in an attempt to find solutions on the local level. The volunteers will also act as advocates for the residents of the facilities.
Beginning Monday, May 11, Ola Kidd will interview prospective volunteers in each of the PRPC's five planning and service areas (PSAs) in the Panhandle region. After completing the interview cycle in late May, she will begin training the volunteers.

Their next involvement will be directly with the nursing homes in their areas. They'll be looking regularly into living conditions, nutrition, sanitation and other areas which affect the lives of the residents. The volunteers will be the first to deal with the complaints. If they can't be resolved on the local level, Ms. Kidd will be the next to hear them.
After examining the facts, she will report to the State Aging ombudsman who will make a final decision. Ms. Kidd points out that a report filed by the volunteer who first handled the case will have a lot of weight with the state official who makes the final disposition. In every case, the decision made by the state official will be final and binding on the nursing home.

Ms. Kidd will begin interviewing for volunteers in Hereford on Monday, May 11, and in Dalhart on Tuesday, May 12. During the next two weeks she will be conducting similar sessions in Clarendon May 18. Interviews will last from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Ola Kidd's responsibilities will involve nursing homes in the 25 counties with a total of 2,554 beds in combined facilities.

IN SUMMARY.. JUST WHAT IS THEIR BAG?

Are they Protestant, Catholic, or something in between? Call them anything you please. Episcopalians are Protestant because their forebears were among the leaders of the Protestant Reformation in 16th-Century England. But the word "Catholic" means "universal"...and Episcopalians are quick to embrace the universality of all Christian denominations. They do not believe that heaven is reserved for those who agree, jot and tittle, with their particular views.

What place does the Bible occupy in the Episcopal faith? It's central. No Episcopalian is required to accept any belief that doesn't agree with Holy Scripture.
Then why do they use a Prayer Book? The Episcopal Book of Common Prayer serves several purposes. It's an excellent key to understanding the Bible. It assures reading and teaching in church solely from the Bible; it's a complete guide to worship.

The word "common" in the title means "together." Episcopalians pray and praise God together, believing as they do-that worship is no spectator sport. Thanks to the Prayer Book, their services cannot be dominated by the minister's whims.

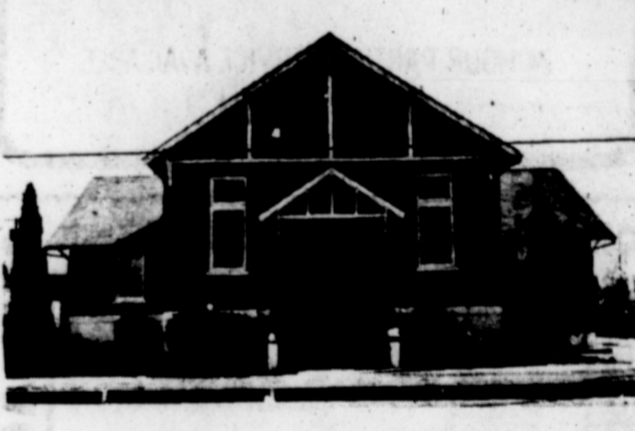
Then why the need for instruction and confirmation? The Church has always regarded confirmation as completing baptism. Thus the promises made for a child in baptism are confirmed by the candidate himself.
Correspondingly, the service signifies a confirmation, on God's part, of His promise of

those who agree, jot and tittle salvation.
Simple instruction by the minister assures an understanding of the Church's basic creeds before the candidate assumes the responsibility of communicant status.

Does this mean they have a "closed" communion? Not at all, although the Episcopal church regards communion as a true sacrament and not just a memorial. Anyone who may receive communion in another Christian denomination is welcome to join in an Episcopal communion service if his own church's discipline permits him to do so.

Are visitors welcomed to Episcopal services? Absolutely. At any service. It's customary for Episcopalians to remain quiet until they're outside the church, which explains why some visitors look on them as unfriendly. Just stick around after the service. There's usually coffee in the nearby parish hall...and plenty of opportunity to get acquainted. Feel free to ask the minister for an appointment to discuss anything you find puzzling about the Episcopal faith. He'll be delighted...and wouldn't think of "twisting your arm" to join his church. That sort of decision must come from you, or it loses meaning.



PUBLIC NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AND CHANGING A FRANCHISE ORDINANCE ENACTED BY THE CITY OF Hedley, Donley COUNTY, TEXAS, ON April 6th, 1972 AND BEING PARTIALLY STYLED, "AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO LONE STAR GAS COMPANY, A CORPORATION, ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, A FRANCHISE TO FURNISH AND SUPPLY GAS TO THE GENERAL PUBLIC IN THE CITY OF Hedley, Donley county, TEXAS;" AND PROVIDING FOR A MODIFICATION OF THE DEFINITION OF THE TERMS "SERVICE LINES" AND "YARD LINES" REFERENCED IN SECTION 4 THEREOF.

SECTION 1. As of the effective date of this amendatory ordinance, and upon acceptance by Lone Star Gas Company of the provisions hereof, Section 4 of the aforesaid captioned franchise ordinance enacted on April 6th, 1972, shall be stricken, cancelled and nullified and there shall be substituted in lieu thereof a new provision reading as follows:

"SECTION In addition to the rates charged for gas supplied, Company may make and enforce reasonable charges, rules and regulations for service rendered in the conduct of its business including a charge for services rendered in the inauguration of natural gas service, and may require, before furnishing service, the execution of a contract therefor. Company shall have the right to contract with each customer with reference to the installation of, and payment for, any and all of the gas piping from the connection thereof with the Company's main in the streets or alleys to and throughout the consumer's premises. Company shall own, operate and maintain all service lines, which are defined as the supply lines extending from the Company's main to the customer's meter where gas is measured by Company. The consumer shall own, operate, and maintain all yard lines and house piping. Yard lines are defined as the underground supply lines extending from the point of connection with Company's customer meter to the point of connection with consumer's house piping."

SECTION 2. Enactment of this amendatory ordinance shall in no way ever be construed so as to diminish or impair any consumer's ownership interest in service lines (or portions thereof) installed prior to the effective date of this amendatory ordinance.

SECTION 3. The terms and provisions of this amendatory ordinance shall be deemed to be severable, and if the validity of any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this amendatory ordinance should be declared to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of any other section, sentence, clause or phrase of this amendatory ordinance.

SECTION 4. Except as heretofore and hereinabove changed and amended, the terms, provisions, conditions and requirements of the aforesaid franchise ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 5. This amendatory ordinance shall become effective as of June 8, 1981 if the Company files its written acceptance of the provisions of this ordinance within sixty (60) days after its final passage and approval by this City and upon acceptance, the provisions hereof shall be binding upon City and Company, their successors and assigns.

Please note that the sewer charges are going up whether you vote for the bond election or not. Note also that the real increase is \$4.00 for twice as much water. This is water for yards, gardens, flowers, etc. You won't have to skimp on water any more.

COMMENT: For many years, water from our wells was the only revenue that operated our city. Now the water costs our city. Your taxes, general funds, and revenue sharing funds, pay the cost of the water and the cost of repairs to our 50 yr. old water lines. The City of Clarendon pays more for water than it collects. That's correct. Our water bills do not cover the cost of the purchase of water from Greenbelt. I know, because I asked.

I'm voting FOR the bond proposal. Sooner or later we're going to have to replace those water lines. And we won't have the chance to do it again without a big increase in cost. To spend \$4.00 now, will cost us less in fire protection and water service in the future.

**West Texas
Utilities files
for a certificate
of convenience**

An application has been filed with the Texas Public Utility Commission for a certificate of convenience and necessity for a coal-fired generating plant to be built in North Texas by West Texas Utilities Company and two other operating companies in the Central and South West Corporation.

The certificate is required before actual construction can start on the plant, which will be built on a 1,937-acre tract which WTU purchased from the fabled Waggoner Ranch eight miles southeast of Vernon and three miles southwest of Oklahoma. The application is for Oklahoma Power Station No. 1, which will have a net capacity of 1,920 megawatts are planned.

Cooling water will come from Lake Diversion, 20 miles south of the site. WTU purchased water rights in 1977 from Wichita County Water Improvement District No. 2 and the City of Wichita Falls. Boiler fuel will be low sulphur western coal, probably from Wyoming mines.

Oklahoma will be the first power plant to be jointly owned by CSW operating companies. WTU, the managing partner, will own 350 megawatts, Central Power and Light Company of Corpus Christi 115 megawatts, and Public Service Company of Oklahoma 175 megawatts. The other CSW operating company, Southwestern Electric Power Company of Shreveport, will not participate. PSO's participation hinges on a favorable ruling by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission regarding an agreement between the CSW System and members of the intrastate Texas Interconnected System to install direct current interconnections across state lines.

The application states that the plant is needed to satisfy load growth of the companies and to reduce dependence on natural gas as a boiler fuel. Unit One is scheduled for commercial operation by December, 1986. Total cost is estimated at \$675,104,000.

HOT OR COLD?

The application of heat or cold to the body to relieve pain is a practice we have inherited through years of tradition. Clinicians report that heat and cold can reduce certain types of pain. Heating pads, ice bags, and other devices can be valuable self-care aids.

COLD: When bruises and sprains occur, ice packs should be applied during the first 24 to 48 hours following injury. Heat should not be used initially . . . this could lead to increased bruising and swelling. After 48 hours, heat may reduce pain.

In a similar manner, cold water applied to burns relieves pain, reduces inflammation, and helps prevent swelling. In one study, running water reduced burn pain better than any other measure tested.

HEAT: Although heat is used traditionally in chronic diseases [such as arthritis], there is evidence that cold may be equally effective in relieving pain.

Which, then, is best ... hot or cold? It appears that cold is appropriate in acute problems [such as sprains] immediately following injury. Cold also seems to be of value in chronic diseases. Heat may provide relief in chronic diseases and is of value beginning 48 hours following an injury.

Older American Month

May is "Older Americans Month," an appropriate time to recognize the work that many older Texans are doing to fight a problem common to people of all ages -- high energy costs.

"Older Texans are working in many areas of energy conservation and alternative energy," says Diane Parrish, director of Texas Green Thumb, an employment program for people 55 and over.

"Older persons take the energy crisis serious. They have many skills and a basic understanding of natural elements. They are applying their knowledge and interests to help rural businesses and communities increase energy efficiency or produce alternative forms of energy," she says.

The Green Thumb program employs about 960 older worker in exas to assist local agencies in needed community services. It also operates an Energy Employment Training Program to place older persons in energy-related jobs with private and public employers.

In central Texas, for example, an experienced pipefitter is preparing to lay a pipe system from a geothermal well to the town of Hubbard. The natural hot water will be carried first to city hall and the fire station to provide water and space heating. This will greatly reduce the need for gas and electricity. Later the system will be expanded to other buildings and to the homes of residents.

In south Texas, young residents of Crystal City were at a loss when the gas company cut off services to the entire town. With the guidance of senior residents, they turned to traditional natural methods of producing energy. Many residents placed their water tanks over wood-burning stoves; others used buckets to burn mesquite wood down to hot coals to heat their houses. About 82 homes were equipped with solar collectors to capture and retain the sun's heat for water and space heating.

Now the young city officials are working on ways to employ their older residents to operate a solar collector factory and solar greenhouses.

In nearby Carrizo Springs, an inventor and manufacturer of an electric switch device which cuts down the amount of electricity used when turning on and off lights and which will permit dimming lights with less electrical flow, says "I want to hire older workers. You can depend on them. They appreciate work and they take a genuine interest in the needs of their community and employer."

In east Texas, a Mount Vernon greenhouse employer hired an older worker to help construct a passive solar greenhouse system. An angled fiberglass wall will attract the sun's heat to a rock bin which will absorb and then release heat to the greenhouse as temperatures lower at night. A woodburning stove will provide back-up heating on unusually cold nights. The stove will be fed scraps of wood from a local mill -- which is another energy conservation measure.

In north Texas, the owner of Mother Nature's Farm in Argyle is building an active solar greenhouse system with the help of a retired navy engineer. They are running water from a huge tank through a large solar collector to the base of 24 greenhouses where gravel will absorb and release the heat. The owner said, "I'll happily hire older workers to operate the

greenhouses. They are dependable and they understand the basics of plant growth.

In all areas of Texas, Green Thumb crews and other older persons employed by local agencies have weatherized many houses of the low-income elderly. From January to March, 77 older workers on 19 Green Thumb crews weatherized 127 houses, using materials valued at \$43,895.00. Had their local communities employed contractors for the work, the labor costs would have added approximately \$115,550 -- which could not have been afforded by local non-profit agencies.

"These are just a few examples of how older Americans are helping solve the energy problem in Texas," says Parrish. "We are also developing jobs for older workers to operate alcohol fuel plants, to assemble dual fuel carburetor kits, to disseminate literature in energy developments and to assemble wind generators.

"We are exploring all areas of energy conservation and renewable resources with older workers," added Parrish. Through the Green Thumb Energy Employment Training Program, employers are offered up to 50 percent wage reimbursement for a specified training period when they hire low-income, rural residents in the field on energy.

Green Thumb is a rural, non-profit training and placement program, sponsored by National Farmers Union and funded the Department of Labor. It is an equal opportunity employer with a state office located in Waco.

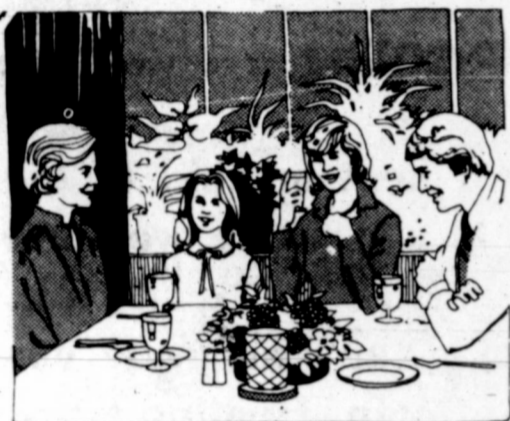

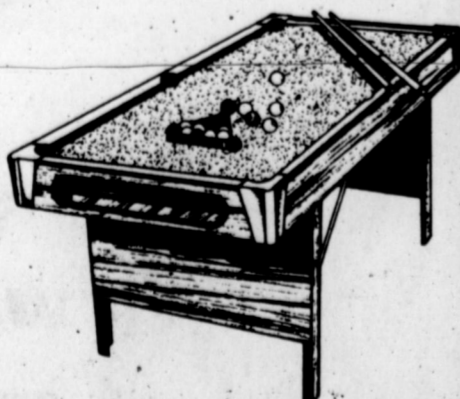

Panhandle weather changes very little

July 8, 1917
Frank, Lucy and little grand children,
Dear Folks—

Never was engaged in bloody conflict of war on a battle field, but I have witnessed some of the damndest sand storms the west ever saw. Yet they are grand, inspiring, animating and gives the mind a change of thought: you see a wind cloud with great wing shaped billows; soon you see clouds of sand hovering in the air—"A sand storm is coming." Death stillness reigns around you—not a leaf shaking, all still, you begin to move in all loose house goods, bar the door. Every living thing realizes the approach of a sand storm. The dogs set up a mournful howl. Cats with a squawl and swollen tail dive deep under bed; lowing of cattle, neighing of horses; little birds nestle deep in weeds and grass; the little koyote goes in his pet with a yelp. It's

on—the Storm! Wind at the rate of 60 miles an hour, the air full of flying debris. These sand storms remind of the great prairie fires back at Kaufman County, long before Rockwall Co. was born. Many new comers bought land here last fall; now there is nothing left but four corners of their once real estate holdings. These people will go back cussing the west, how unjust. Some people would kick if they were in heaven. Yes, we have had to replant crops so often the teams are trained like circus horses: just hook them to the planter, fill hopper, set in gear and give the word "go". They turn on the ends, never miss a row. No driver needed. Finally we got a crop to stick, prospects good, all humanity felt good. On the eve of July 3rd., a cloud heved up. That looked good as we were needing rain. This was a business cloud, a down pour of rain and the most destructive hail

I love the weather in the shape of my granddaddy. All panhandle weather is like a grippe. The leaves are stripped of leaves. My car and cattle coats are taking the black sun. Birds in my lowest grove are killed. Jack rabbits, colts and calves killed. One man, a neighbor, lost 90 head of hogs. Such is life, so why kick. Next day after this hail every planter was at work in a rush. Give my love and best wishes to the other children. Just learned of Walker Bros.


