Escaped Convict Arrested in Munday; Escapes Again

A man arrested by Knox County officers in Munday Sunday and turned over to officers from Crystal City escaped from the jail there Tuesday morning, Sheriff Homer T. Melton said Wednesday.

The man, whose name is Edward Tate Ragland, had been living in this area under the name of Edward Tate, and worked for Jack Tankersley for a time several weeks ago. He was arrested by Sheriff Melton and Deputy H. C. Stone on suspicion of theft after he had sold a television set and a battery.

Investigation showed the television set was not stolen, but was purchased from a Lubbock firm on the time payment plan and was mortgaged. Under questioning, however, Ragland revealed that he had passed forged checks, totaling several thousand dollars, from Ralls to the Eagle Pass area and back. Subsequent investigation has turned up the fact that he is an ex-convict and an escapee from the Arkansas state penitentiary.

Sheriff Melton turned Ragland over to Texas Rangers at Abilene, who delivered him to Crystal City officers. He made his escape from the jail there early Tuesday morning.

Voters of the Benjamin Independent School District in a special election Saturday approved a \$20,000 bond issue for construction of a vocational agriculture building.

The proposition, one of three voted on in the election, carried by a margin of 104 to 5. The second proposition, for maintaining a tax of \$1.50 on \$100 valuation, was approved 102 to 5. The third, on assumption of the outstanding indebtedness of the former Benjamin Common School District, carried 102 to 4.

The second and third propositions weren't included when it was voted about a year ago to make the school district an independent school district.

Murder, Assault Cases Tried in District Court

One man was convicted of murder and another of assault with intent to murder in 50th Judicial District Court this week, with Judge Lewis M. Williams presiding.

A jury of five women and seven men found Clarence Smith, Goree Negro, guilty of murder and sentenced him to three years in the penitentiary. A special jury venire of 75 men and women had been called for the trial.

Attorneys for the defense were Bill Brookreson and Earl Garrison of Seymour, and District Attorney A. W. Davis of Paducah was prosecutor for the state.

Smith was charged with murder of Mary Ann Evans, Goree Negro woman, on the night of Oct. 21, 1955. The woman was in the Sweet Dream Cafe in Goree, and was killed by a shot fired through the window.

The convicted man is in jail at Benjamin awaiting transfer to the state penitentiary.

Tom B. Arrington of Tulsa, Okla., was found guilty of assault with intent to murder and assessed a five-year suspended sentence by a jury of three women and nine men. Attorneys were Judson Balch of Seymour for the defense and Davis for the state.

Arrington was charged with shooting J. R. Davis of Carlsbad, N. M., last November. The shooting occurred in the office of Pecos Valley Construction Co. in Knox City. Davis was employed by the construction firm and Arrington was employed by the consulting engineer for the city. Both men were working on a paving project in Knox City.

On the witness stand Arrington said he purchased a pistol a short time before the shooting with the intention of taking his own life. A note he had written to his wife and left in his hotel room was read into the evidence. He said he shot Davis because he thought Davis was going to do him serious bodily harm.

Davis was the only witness for the state. Bill Ross and Jim Bohm, Pecos Valley employees who were eye-witnesses to the shooting, failed to appear. Both are residents of New Mexico.

Several civil cases were on the court docket for Wednesday, but all were continued to a later date.

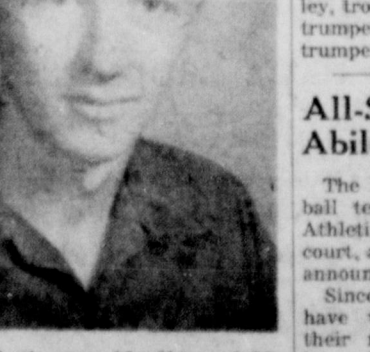

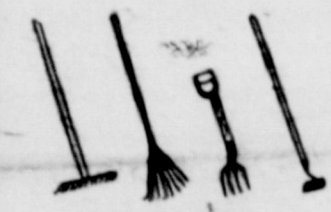

Hybrid Grain Seed Supplies Are Short

COLLEGE STATION. — Reports have come from farmers and seed dealers not only in Texas but also Nebraska, Kansas and Oklahoma that ordinary white and in some cases red grain sorghum seed are being sold by transit salesmen as hybrids.

Farmers and seed dealers are reminded by Jack G. King, Texas A&M College System agronomist with headquarters in Lubbock, that only a very limited supply of hybrid grain sorghum seed is available for planting this year. Most of the seed produced in 1955 is being used in demonstration plantings of from one to five acres. These demonstrations are widely scattered over the entire State and demonstrators are being supplied with planting seed.

Adequate supplies of hybrid sorghum planting seed should be available to all farmers for 1957 plantings but the supply to be sold for 1956 plantings is very small.

Finally, King says, buy hybrid sorghum planting seed only from a reliable local dealer or seed grower.

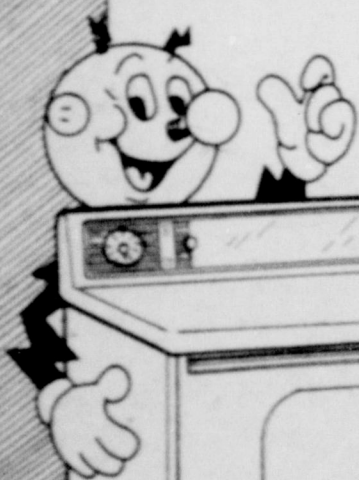
